We thought Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz had his stuff all together last week when he chided those in government who didn't know "grain from chaff" for their criticism of recent sales of feed grains to the

We guess he just couldn't lift it! Monday he asked U.S. grain dealers to "refrain from further negotiations" with the Soviet Union until the government is in a better position to project this year's corn

Butz' speech came after the USDA estimated this year's crop at a record 5.85 billion bushels, up 26 per cent from last year's harvest, but three per cent below last month's

His request also came after we were told the grain sales wouldn't be inflationary....and after George Meany blasted farmers and grain dealers for their export sales. Meany forgot to mention several

other things, but Leo Witkowski, president of the Texas Wheat Producers Association, didn't.

Said Witkowski: Butz' action served to "distort downward the true value of the crop now in producers' hands despite a growing world demand."

Witkowski also noted that wheat prices now stand at \$3.60 a bushel, \$1.27 below the price last October when the wheat was planted.

It's regrettable that the secretary of agriculture is yielding to the big labor bosses who are guised as protectors of the consumer by stopping exports and holding the cost of food down.

"Longshoreman loading grain ships received a 40-cent per hour increase in base pay and another 40-cent per hour increase is scheduled to go into effect this October. These are the true inflationary inputs to the cost of living in this country and into the cost of agricultural products,' Witkowski said.

HAROLD HUDSON in The Perryton Herald:

It appears that the State of Texas is going to come into a lot of money people didn't know it had because Comptroller Bob Bullock is harvesting plenty of dollars from retail establishments that have failed to remit state sales tax money as they should. Bullock and his "raiders" have swooped down upon stores in San Antonio and Houston and Fort Worth, enforcing collection of sales taxes due.

This has been accompanied by a lot of publicity and some people are trying to dismiss this as a mere publicity stunt on the part of Bob Bullock as he has his eye on greater things in Texas, probably the governor's office, if he can build a statewide reputation.

There may be something to this, but we are more inclined to go along with him as a public servant out to do the best job possible. It is odd that some Texans appear to be siding with those who are being locked up rather than with the official who is enforcing the law. After all, this sales tax money does not belong to the owners of the liquor store in San Antonio or the discount center in Richardson or the appliance store in

Houston. This is money that has been collected from the customers of these stores and then, instead of being sent on to Austin, was conveniently placed in the pocket of the store owner.

'Preach' quit a responsible job as a senior purchasing agent for the State Board of Control to take over the job with Bob Bullock and he is sold on the present Comptroller.

Texans went along for years proud of the fact that it didn't have a state sales tax or a state income tax. Once installed, the sales tax has proved to be the chief source of revenue for the state and on the state level far

outstrips any type of property tax. When the financial pinch gets tighter, we can look for some legislature to pass a state income tax law and we will join the rest of the states in this type of taxation.

Texas has been fortunate over the years to have received much of its income from taxes on the oil and gas being exported and this has kept the pressure off for sales and income taxes. The stage is being set for an income tax, however, and it will likely be passed on the issue of soaking the corporations. When that is done, of course, the individuals will have to pay an income tax, too.

# Bovina Crash July 16 County's 1st Fatality

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of July, 1975, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and one person injured. The fatal crash occurred in Bovina on July 16, involving a Clovis

The rural traffic accident summary for the county during the first seven months of 1975, shows a total of 68 accidents resulting in one person killed and 40 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July, 1975, shows a total of 568 accidents resulting in 22 persons killed and 398 persons injured as compared to July, 1974, with 485 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 280 persons injured. This was 83 more accidents,

four more killed, and 118 more injured in 1975 at the same period of

The 22 traffic deaths for the month of July, 1975, occurred in the following counties: two each in Clay, Haskell, Randell, Jack, and Sherman; and one each in Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock, Montague, Carson, Collingsworth, Moore, Parmer, Potter and Wheeler.



### **Marital Status Change** Needs To Be Reported

Statistics 2,241,000 couples were married and 940,000 couples were divorced during a recent 12-month period," Jose A. Martinez, social security field representative, stated today. "Most of these couples should have notified the Social Security Administration of this event.

"Those receiving social security benefits should report promptly in order to avoid an over payment. In many cases marriage or divorce will terminate a benefit or reduce the amount. In other instances the Social Security Administration needs to know the new name in order to change the name on future checks.

"Even if a new bride isn't receiving social security benefits she needs to notify the social security office of her new name so that the name on her social security card may be changed. This

"According to the Na- can be done by contacting tional Center for Health any social security office and completing a small green card--'Request for Change in Social Security Records.' If she will take her old card with her the change can be made immediately. If she is unable to visit the social security office in person, the matter may be handled by mail or telephone," Martinez concluded



Another Federal Agency moving closer to the farm. This time it's the Environmental Protection Agency. EPA offi cials are now sifting through the chemical analysis of nearly 35-thousand pesticides to decide which ones will require a government restriction. Those chemicals classed as restricted may be applied only by persons certified. Although the starting date for the certification requirement is more than a year away (October, 1976), many farm operators are all ready checking the requirements for certification. The establishment of two levels of certification will make things easier for most ag producers. To be certified as a private applicator (applying pesticides on your own land) boils down basically to being able to read and follow instructions. Commercial certification will involve passing a written test which will cover chemical formulas, equipment specifications and EPA rules and regulations.

# Football Schedule For '74 Is Tough

Friona's 1975 football schedule is made up for the most part of longtime opponents, and a check of the record shows that some hard-fought games might be in store for the upcoming season.

Three teams on the current schedule have been met a total of 101 times on the gridiron, dating back as early as 1926. They are Farwell (38 meetings), Dimmitt (39 meetings) and Muleshoe (24 meetings).

Of those three longtime rivalries, the Chieftains hold a series advantage only over county rival Farwell, and that by a slight one game. The Farwell series, thanks to a record fifth straight win by Friona last fall, now stands at 19 wins for Friona, 18 for the Steers and one tie, of games played since 1931.

Dimmitt, which held a 14-game winning streak over Friona at one time, leads the Bobcat-Friona series, 27-11-1, and Muleshoe holds a 15-8-1 advantage.

The Chieftains hold series advantages over Hart (3-0), Abernathy (6-3), and Morton (11-7), giving the Red Rage the edge over four 1975 opponents.

The Chieftains scored their second-ever win over Littlefield last fall to tighten that series with the Wildcats holding a 3-2 edge. The Chiefs will have a shot at knotting that short rivalry up when the teams meet on October 31 (Halloween Night).

Dalhart, which has not been a steady rival, holds an 8-6 edge over Friona in games played. The Tulia Hornets, who were back on the 1974 schedule after an absence of 13 years, holds an 11-4 advantage, and district rival Olton has won 11 games to five for Friona.

Although longtime rival Dimmitt, which has provided the opposition for Friona on 39 earlier schedules, holds the widest margin of any of the opponents (27-11-1, .705 pct.), the Chieftains have hacked at the Bobcat margin somewhat by winning seven of the last 12 games between the two schools.

An idea of how tough the schedule might be can be seen by looking at last year's scores. In 1974, the Chieftains edged Muleshoe, 13-0; sneaked past Tulia 6-0; topped Hart 21-6 after leading 14-6 late in the game; and edged Littlefield, 21-14.

The team's two losses in 1974 were by a total of only ten points. Olton edged Friona 6-0, and Dimmitt scored a hard-fought 10-7 win.

Dalhart always gives you a tough game at Dalhart. The last game in the Wolves' den came out 19-13 in favor of the hosts.

The teams on the 1975 schedule have been played by Friona a total of 191 times, or an average of 19 games per opponent. The team's overall record against the ten-team

Springlake, met in 1972 and 1973 after a schedule break, has been on Friona's schedule a total of 20 times.

Neighboring Bovina, last met in 1973, has been played a total of 14 times, and another neighbor Vega, has been a Friona oppone \* 12 times.

The 1975 schedule is virtually a replay of the 1974 state, reversing the game sites. The schedule consists of seven class AA opponents, two class A (Farwell and Hart) and one AAA eleven (Muleshoe).

was told the premiums on an insurance policy could be deducted from my income tax. Is this true?

Fifty percent of the premiums on hospitalization insurance may be deducted from your income if you itemize deductions. A corporation may deduct the premiums for group insurance and are not taxable to the employee unless the amount of life insurance exceeds \$50,000 on any individual. For several years there have been plans such as "split dollar," "minimum de-posit," and recently, the "IRS Section 79." These plans, when properly used, following specific IRS rules and regulations, will allow legitimate deductions of life insurance premiums. These plans, however, require the counsel of a qualified life underwriter and accountant and generally an applicable only to the few and not to the average taxpayer





### Women May Receive SS Benefits

"1975 is International Women's Year and women are asking questions regarding their rights to social security benefits on their own work record. A popular theory has been that a working wife does not need social security coverage on ber own work since she could qualify on her husband's work record," Jose A Martinez, Field Representative for the Clovis social security office, commented recently. "This is ot necessarily true. "Social Security furnishes

additional security to the working wife. For example, she may receive retirement, Medicare, or disability benefits on her own record when she becomes of retirement age or is disabled, regardless of her hisband's age or eligibility for benefits. The fact that her husband may still be employed full time will not affect the amount of her

heck.

"A working wife is building protection for her children, also. In case of her death her dependent children will receive monthly benefits to partially replace her lost earnings. The same hing is true if she becomes disabled. Also, father's monthly benefits are now available for her widower if he has her children under 18 disabled in his care, and his earnings are low. If he earns more than \$2520 per ar his benefit will be educed \$1 for each \$2 he xceeds that amount. His arnings do not affect the midren's check," Martinez encluded.
