Due to the nice rains of the month of July, weeds have become a problem. If you're a farmer, this probably does not come as a big surprise.

Weeds are a nuisance, besides being a breeding place for mosquitoes, and we thank the city boys for their help along this line.

**ONE OF OUR** readers sent us the following, which sounds like a tongue in cheek story about our way of doing things in America.

Wildcat, Wyoming was a prosperous town where the populace subsisted (at least partially) on buffalo with which the local Indian hunters kept them supplied. To supplement meat from this source, Wildcat residents (called Wildcatters? or Wildcattians?) bought some of their buffalo meat from far-off hunters. By buying enough outside they were able to hold the local price to \$2 a buffalo, which didn't make the Indians very happy, but who cared?

Then one day the distant hunters decided to quit delivering buffalo meat. Panic ensued. The local Indians just couldn't increase the domestic supply fast enough so rationing was instituted. Even the Indians had to stand in line for their share.

The townspeople blamed the Indians for the shortage. Some even said the tribe purposely made unsuccessful hunts—even stampeded buffalo over the cliffs in order to create shortages. The Government Agency came to the Indians and told them they must procure more buffalo. Fine, said the Indians. But their bows and arrows were old and had been stored in tepees for years. They needed twine and arrowheads with which to repair them. But bow and arrow makers were two years behind on deliveries already.

Buffalo were not as plentiful as before, and the Indians had to roam farther and farther to find them. New braves recruited for the stepped-up hunts demanded higher wages. Bow-and-arrow prices shot up. The buffalo price would have to be raised to \$10 to cover higher costs. "Excess profits!" the people cried. Some suggested using canned food instead of buffalo, but cans hadn't been invented yet.

Many years before, the Government Agency had ruled that the tribe must give it part of the buffalo earnings each year. But a portion of this was returned at times in the form of a depletion allowance when the hunting was bad.

# School Term Begins In Friona Aug. 25

The school term in Friona schools will begin on Friday, August 22 with registration for students in grades 6-12, it was announced this week by Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

Monday, August 25 will be the first day of instruction for the 1975-76 term.

Students who will be in kindergarten through the fifth grades will register on the first day of school.

"Parents of prospective kindergarten students, as well as others who have not previously provided immunization records or birth records are asked to bring these records to school with them on registration day," Jarboe said.

Required immunizations for students in the Friona school system are polio, Rubioli, Rubella and DT

(Diphtheria-Tetanus). Kindergarten students must have had their polio and DT booster shots since their fourth birthday.

The schedule for students in the public school kindergarten will be as follows: Children born after September 1, 1969 and before March 1, 1970 may attend the first half of the term. Those born between March 1 and September 1, 1970 are eligible for the second half of the 1975-76 term.

Jarboe pointed out that students moving into the community during the summer who are new to the Friona schools should contact their respective principals to pre-enroll, preferably prior to August 25.

The teacher in-service week will be held the week of August 18, beginning with a general faculty meeting at 8:30 a.m. Monday, August 18.

Buses will run for the first time on Monday, August 25. School hours will remain from 8:45 a.m. to 3:45 p.m.

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Three instructors were employed during the past week, which all but completed the staff for 1975-76.

Those employed included Richard L. Neel of Oklahoma City, Okla., who will serve as chemistry and physics instructor in high school. Neel has ten years of teaching experience.

Also employed were Sue Fancher, who will serve as a fifth grade teacher, and Linda Kay Cord, who will teach fourth grade. Both of these teachers are local women, and it is the first teaching assignments for both.

## City Approves Hike In Trash Charges

Trash collection charges, and the sanitary landfill problem took up a major portion of the monthly meeting of the Friona City Council Monday night at the city council meeting room.

Minimum charges for residential trash pickup will be increased to \$2.50 per month. This will apply to each individual residence, whether a person is an individual homeowner, apartment dweller or whatever.

Commercial trash pickup also will be increased. Charge for dumpster boxes will be \$10 per month, although businesses sharing the boxes will be allowed to go together to make up the minimum charge.

Another ordinance was passed establishing a re-connection charge for water accounts where service is shut off.

Ordinance 496 was passed, establishing sanitary landfill operations and providing charges for individual use of the landfill.

A new agreement with Southwestern Public Service Co. was passed, providing for approximately 15 per cent increase in the rate the city pays for the street lights.

Representatives from the city's library board presented a request for the library to move from the present location at the American Legion Hall into the former Ben Franklin location on Main Street.

After much discussion as to the pros and cons of the move, the council finally gave its approval, subject to being able to terminate its lease with the American Legion and working out details with Eric Rushing, owner of the Main Street property.

At the beginning of the meeting, Sheldon Ellis of Amarillo discussed a proposal to do the city's trash collecting on a custom basis. His method would necessitate curb-side pickup, with residents using plastic bags.

City Manager Jake Outland presented the rough draft of the city's 1975-76 budget for the council's consideration. The final budget is to be approved at the board's September meeting.

Keiichi Miyake, Japanese visitor through the Lions Club exchange program, presented Mayor R.L. Fleming greetings from his home town of Kurashiki City, Japan. Mayor Fleming in turn presented Miyake a letter to take on his return to Japan. Also presented were brochures on the Friona area.

## Nursing Home Bids Set

The Friona City Council will meet at 2 p.m. Monday, August 11 to open bids on the nursing home.

## Commissioners Hear Reports On Road Work

The regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners will be held Monday at the court house, beginning at 11 a.m.

Among the items considered at the last meeting of the commissioners was the approval of the appraisals made on the right-of-way needed to widen State Highway 214 between Hub and Clay's Corner.

Eight property owners are affected by the proposed widening, in the area around Running Water Draw and the SIB Gin.

Glen Johnson of the Texas Highway Department's Lubbock office reported that the state office has approved a Farm to Market road running directly south from Lazbuddie to the Bailey County line. This project must now have federal approval.

Commissioners approved payment of \$1,000 to the Central Plains Mental Health Center in Plainview. The center operates an outreach office in Friona.

All things being in order, the council hopes to award a contract on the job at the Monday meeting.

## Reeve Chevrolet-Olds Sets Formal Opening

A formal opening for Reeve Chevrolet-Olds at their new location on West Highway 60 has been scheduled for Friday, August 15, it was announced this week.

Residents of the area are being invited to visit the Chevrolet and Oldsmobile dealership anytime that day, and enjoy free coffee and apple pie.

The longtime Friona automobile dealership has moved into the newly-renovated quarters previously housing Parmer County Implement Company.

The offices have been remodeled; the service area has been repainted, and new offices have

been established for the company officials.

The spacious parking lot at the new location also allows for adequate display room for the company's automobiles and pick-up trucks.

Glenn E. Reeve, Sr., who has been serving the folks of the Friona area since 1938, and all of the other folks at Reeve Chevrolet-Olds, invite the area residents to come visit them at the new Reeve location and look around.

# Friona Woman Meets Sister For First Time

A 25-year old Friona woman discovered about two weeks ago that a sister she thought had died in infancy was married and the mother of two children living in Fort Worth.

Marnita Bush Martinez has spent the past couple of weeks getting acquainted with her older sister, Betty, who had uncovered the relationship by doing a little amateur detective work.

Martina is the adopted daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. E. Bush of Friona. The Bush family has had Marnita since she was three weeks old.

The sister, Betty Perkins, became interested in finding her sister several years ago. Her interest finally paid off on July 25 when a letter she had written to the Bush family was delivered in Friona.

Betty had spent several years in the St. Teresa's Catholic orphanage in Fort Worth, and was adopted at the age of six by Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Zacha of Fort Worth. She was raised as an only child by the Zachas.

The Fort Worth sister became interested in her real family when she was 18 and was getting her Beautician's license. She had to go to Austin and secure her birth certificate. It was from the birth certificate that she found out her real father's name. It was an unusual name, Sheddie Decker.

Sometime later, in researching records at the Tarrant County Court House in Fort Worth, she discovered that Sheddie Decker had died in 1960.

She dropped the matter for a few

years, but still remained interested in the sister she believed she had "somewhere." The thought that this sister might not know that she was

adopted also caused her to wonder whether or not she should try to find her.

But recently, Betty had visited the

father's subsequent wife, who told her the name of the Bush family, and that she knew them to be the family which adopted Marnita. The last forwarding address available for the Bush family was in Muleshoe.

Betty wrote a letter introducing herself and telling that she believed a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bush was her sister. Muleshoe postal officials were familiar with the Bush family, and forwarded the letter to Friona. Mrs. Bush is a postal employee here, serving as a mail carrier.

Ironically, the day Mr. and Mrs. Bush received the letter, their daughter Marnita was visiting an aunt in Fort Worth, and was in the same city as her unknown sister.

Mrs. Bush telephoned Betty and told her where she could reach Marnita, and in a short time Betty was knocking on the door in Fort Worth.

"I was taking a nap at my aunt's home. My nephew came in and said, Marnita, your sister is here to see you. I told him he must be mistaken. I'm still having to get used to having a sister," Marnita related this week.

Mrs. Bush made a trip to Fort Worth to get the young ladies, and brought them back to Friona for a visit. They returned late this week, so Marnita could visit Betty's folks.

The two sisters discovered that both are afflicted with an unusual disease, von Recklinghausen's disease, or Neurofibromatosis. The disease, which causes skin tumors, is thought by medical specialists to be hereditary.

The disease has cost Marnita the sight in her left eye. Her young daughter does not have the sight in her right. Both Betty and her daughter also have been affected by the disease.

"I discovered, after I was several months pregnant, that I was not supposed to attempt to have children," said Betty, about her health condition.

Marnita says she had wondered about her real parents, but since she was raised with five other children by Mr. and Mrs. Bush, she did not have a "lonely" feeling that Betty did, who was raised alone.

The girls have four half brothers and four half sisters in Kansas. One of the half brothers was instrumental in assuring Betty that she had a sister.

And finally, this summer, after years of wondering Betty finally got to meet her sister. The sisters have a lot of visiting to catch up on.

Mr. and Mrs. Bush have raised six children, all of whom were adopted.

With one farm bill dead as a result of veto, Washington lawmakers are now at work on a second one. Members of the Senate and House Agricultural committees are predicting early fall as the time the new bill should be ready for formal consideration. From reports which have come out so far the consensus is that the measure will be pretty much a rewrite of the emergency bill earlier this year. Higher dairy, grain and cotton supports are considered a priority along with a target price program for rice. Some sort of new approach for a commodity reserve system is reported to be under consideration and there may be some changes in the disaster payment program. Perhaps the most extensive part of the bill will be indirectly related to agriculture since support is said to be heavy for an expanded food stamp program.

2. How will I benefit from direct deposit of my social security check?  
It saves a special trip to the bank just to deposit your check. It eliminates worry about the check being lost or stolen in the mail. And, any time you are away from home or cannot come to the bank, your check is automatically deposited for you.
3. Can I have it deposited to my savings account as well as my checking account?  
If you want a portion to go into the savings each month, ask your bank about an automatic transfer of a specified amount each month from checking into savings. By law your Social Security check must be directed to one specific account, either checking or savings.
4. How do I sign up for this service?  
Simply complete the government form (SF1199) available at the bank
5. How do I get the information needed to complete the forms?  
All the Social Security information you will need is on your monthly check or in your initial awards letter from Social Security. If you need any assistance or have any questions, your bank will be glad to assist you.
6. Do I send the form directly to social security?  
No, you should complete the top half of the form only and take it or mail it to your bank. They will complete the form, sending one copy to you and one to Social Security.
7. After I sign up, when will the bank start receiving my check?  
It should take about a month for the form to be processed. At the start of the program, it could take slightly longer.
8. What about terminating the direct deposit program?  
Simply contact the Social Security office and request that they start sending the checks directly to you. Also notify your bank.
9. Is there any charge for this service?  
No, it is completely free service
10. What if the amount of my check changes?  
The correct amount of your check will be deposited each month.
11. I get payments from both the social security and supplemental income. Do I have to fill out two forms?  
Yes, a separate form is necessary for each check you receive.
12. My spouse and I receive a check jointly. Can we use direct deposit?  
Yes, just so the account in which it is deposited is in both your names.
13. Can I deposit my check directly to my spouse's account?  
No, the account to which your check is deposited must carry your name.
14. Can my minor children's checks be deposited to my checking account?  
If the checks carry your name as representative payee, they may be deposited to your checking account. If you wish to deposit these funds to a savings account, you must have a separate account for each child.

# Friona Flashbacks ...from the files of The Friona Star

**45 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 22, 1930**  
 Buford Taylor, who has been conducting a cafe on the west side of Main Street just opposite the Blackwell Hardware Store for the past few years, has moved his business into the new Hicks building on Main Street south of the railroad.

**40 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 16, 1935**  
 The Friona territory, especially to the west of town seems in line to produce some good row crops far above average, especially as to sudan and hegar, also much good kaffir. This condition, however, does not prevail in all localities nor on all farms, as the rainfall has been very spotted this summer.

**35 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 23, 1940**  
 Mr. Brunk, manager of the Harley Saddler comedians tent show, was a business visitor here Tuesday forenoon. Mr. Brunk was making arrangements for his show to appear here on the night of September 20. Further details for the show will appear in the Star at a later date.

**30 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 24, 1945**  
 Issuance of sugar for home canning will stop August 25, the War Price and Rationing Board states. All applicants in this county

received only five pounds per person after the drastic cut in sugar rations were announced in the early summer. Originally plans were to continue issuance through October, but the local board has been advised to issue the entire allotment for 1945 by the end of August.

**25 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 17, 1950**  
 "Along with six of new inventions, etc., the Perfect Circle Piston Ring magazine for August carries the picture of Ray Landrum's landlocked sailboat. The caption reads "No telling how many drivers took the pledge when they saw Ray Landrum of Friona wheeling across the plains of the Panhandle in his road-rolling sailboat." Bert Neelley's column.

**HAROLD HUDSON** in the PERRYTON HERALD... A news story came out of the Ochiltree Soil Conservation tour last Saturday which has caused a ripple across the country and if true should cause some action to be taken to straighten out the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

U.S. Rep. Glenn English, Cordell Democrat, told Herald news editor Bob McVey that he is investigating reports that the USDA is telling other countries not to buy American farm products.

English said he had talked to members of the Oklahoma Wheat Producers Association who had been in the Philippines trying to drum up business in grain sales.

These Philippine officials told the group that USDA officials advised them to wait a few months before buying American farm products because by then the price would be down.

The motive, as explained by English, is that the Ford administration might feel that lower food prices at home would be an advantage when the 1976 elections were held. Overseas sales would raise prices at home.

At the meeting in Perryton, our own Rep. Jack Hightower expressed concern at this report and was properly motivated to do something about it. Certainly we cannot let the USDA or any government official

make our grain export program a political football.

The American farmer has responded to the plea to produce more food. This year's wheat crop is a big one and the corn crop promises to be a good one as well.

And what does the farmer get for his cooperation? He gets the feet chopped out from under him because export sales are what keeps grain prices at a decent level. The government has already messed up

the market by manipulating exports.

We in this area have a real stake in an investigation into these charges. If we have USDA officials bad-mouthing the wheat farmer, we need to throw the rascals out.

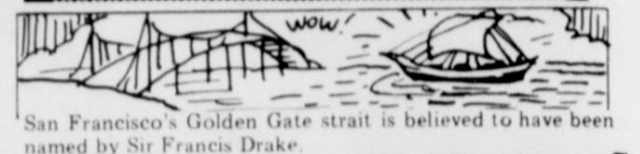

## LEGAL NOTICE

**ORDINANCE NO. 495**  
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 28 OF ORDINANCE NO. 87, CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS, REGULATING THE CHARGES FOR RECONNECTION OF WATER SERVICES WHEN SHUT OFF FOR DELINQUENT PAYMENT.

Section 28. All charges for water service furnished or rendered by the City of Friona, Texas, shall be due and payable on the first day of each month at the office of the water department of City of Friona, and if not paid within 10 days after the same becomes due and payable, a ten (10) percent penalty will be added to the bill, and if not paid within 15 days after becoming due and payable, and the city reserves the right to shut off and discontinue the water service to the said premises without further notice, and the same shall not be reconnected and no additional water furnished until all past due accounts and charges are paid in full. Where service has been disconnected for failure to pay for services rendered, a charge of Five (\$5.00) Dollars shall be made for each and every meter so disconnected before such service shall be restored and the water turned on again. If all charges for water service are not paid within 15 days of due date, the Superintendent of the Water Department shall cut off and disconnect such water service.

The provisions of this ordinance in no way changes the provisions of the remainder water ordinances of the City of Friona, Texas which are to remain in full force and effect.

This Ordinance shall become effective upon date of passage and publication. Passed and Approved this the 4th day of August 1975

**ORDINANCE NO. 496**  
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDED FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF SANITARY LANDFILL OPERATION FOR THE CITY OF FRIONA, PARMER COUNTY, TEXAS, SETTING FORTH CHARGES FOR THE DISPOSAL OF MATERIALS AND PROVIDING PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS.

In compliance with regulations, Texas State Health Department, for the disposal of municipal solid wastes within Parmer County, Texas, a Municipal Sanitary Landfill operation is hereby established by the City of Friona, Texas.

The Landfill is to be operated within the provisions of the regulations for a Type II Sanitary Landfill. All deposited refuse will be compacted and covered daily. Making deposits of waste material at the site will be under the guidance and supervision of city employee personnel. Only bonafide residents of the Corporate Limits of the City of Friona will be allowed free access privileges to the landfill site. Others desiring the disposal of acceptable waste-refuse materials may do so at the following rates:  
Minimum Load - \$1.00  
Pickup Load - \$5.00  
Truck Load - \$10.00  
Automobile bodies - \$10.00

No organic materials or dead animals will be accepted. The hours of operation at the sanitary landfill will be between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday's through Friday's. The site will be closed to all persons Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays.

Scavenging will not be permitted at the landfill site. Salvaging will be permitted only upon permit from the city office.

Penalty for violation of the provisions of this ordinance will be a Maximum of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars; each and every separate violation will constitute an additional offense.

The passage of this ordinance creates a public

emergency for all preservation of public health, safety and general welfare, requiring that all ordinances and rules requiring more than one reading or prohibiting the passage of an ordinance on the date of its introduction and passage, be, and all of the same are, hereby suspended, and this ordinance shall be passed on this date and shall take effect as an emergency measure and be in full force and effect after its passage, and it is so ordained.

**ORDINANCE NO. 494**

An ordinance to amend section 16 of ordinance No. 416, City of Friona, regulating the charges for garbage and-or trash removal services outside the corporate limits.

(Summarized)  
There shall be charges, assessed and collected, from each person, firm or corporation within the corporate limits of the City of Friona, Texas, for each and every water meter or meters, listed or registered in his, hers or its name, and through which water is purchased, used or obtained from the City of Friona, and said charges shall be listed as a separate item on each bill and shall be due and payable as and when the bill charged against any water consumer for water used is paid, said sum of money derived therefrom shall be used for the purpose of aiding and assisting in the maintenance and operation of the Sanitation Department of the City of Friona.

A minimum charge of \$2.50 per family unit will be charged for residences. This minimum of \$2.50 shall also apply for each family in a garage apartment, duplex or apartment house.

A minimum charge of \$10.00 per month shall be made on each Dumpster Box. A combination of

customers allowed to meet the \$10.00 charge. Grocery Stores, Hospitals or other commercial installations requiring daily dumpster service will be charged additionally.

For customers outside the corporate limits of the City of Friona, the stated rates will be increased 50 per cent.

It shall be unlawful for any owner, occupant or lessee using or occupying a building, house, structure or apartment as a separate unit, to utilize the garbage containers or receptacles of another owner, occupant, tenant or lessee, for the disposal of his own refuse or garbage for purpose of avoiding payment of the fees levied by this Ordinance.

The provisions of this Ordinance in no way changes the provisions of the remainder of Ordinance No. 416, City of Friona, Texas, which are to remain in full force and effect.

This Ordinance shall become effective, 1 October 1975.

# Workouts Begin For Chieftains Monday

Prospective members of the 1975 Friona Chieftain football team will begin their two-day workouts on Monday morning. Some 70 varsity hopefuls and 39 freshmen are expected to greet new head coach Mike Garrison and his assistants on Monday.

The workout schedule for the first week will be 8 to 9:30 a.m. and 6 to 8 p.m., with a squad meeting at 5:30 p.m. each day. Workouts will be held at the high school practice field or Chieftain field.

Workouts the second week will depend on the teacher in-service schedule. The probable schedule will be 7:30-9 a.m. and 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Freshmen work out at 10:30 to 12 noon each day.

"We want to stress how important it is for parents and fans to attend our workouts. The public is welcome and encouraged to attend all workouts," Garrison said this week.

He pointed out that since he would be installing a new offense and defense, fans might be more interested in attending the workouts.

Although on paper it would appear that Garrison and his staff are faced with a tremendous rebuilding job (the Chiefs lost 22 of 29 varsity members to graduation), the new Chieftain boss says he is approaching the 1975 season with optimism.

"We'll have good senior leadership. This will be a big asset. Also, we have good tradition here at Friona, and the attitude of the players appears to be good," Garrison says.

He pointed out that coaches were looking forward to the season with optimism. "I am well pleased with my coaching staff. I think we have the best staff in the state," Garrison said.

Pre-season football magazines have rated the Chieftains third or fourth in District 3-AA, depending upon which one you read.

Oton's Mustangs, with a batch of returning starters, are unanimous favorites to defend their title. The Chieftains are rated third by "Texas Football," and fourth by "Top of Texas Football."

The latter magazine hedges a little by remarking "Friona could be the Cinderella team of the area," hinting that Garrison's optimism might be infectious.

"If we come out of our non-district schedule all right, and without any key injuries, we could do all right in district," the new Friona coach says. He thinks the non-district schedule should be a great conditioner for his young team.

In addition, he has lined up a pair of top scrimmage games for his troops. The first one will be Thursday, August 21 against Boys Ranch at Friona. Freshmen will scrimmage at 5 p.m., followed by the Varsity at 7 p.m.

On Friday, August 29, the Chieftains will scrimmage Stinnett at the West Texas State University practice field at Canyon. The varsity will scrimmage at 5 p.m. in this outing.

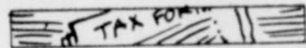
Garrison announced that he will use a two-platoon system this year with the Chieftains, with offensive and defensive specialty units.

"This will involve more kids, and will assure that more kids will get to play. We plan to let everyone play, and utilize the kids to their best abilities," Garrison says.

He said that he thought the two platoon system would give him 11 fresh youngsters on the field at all times. Football has become too technical and demanding to expect a kid to play the entire 48 minutes, he says.

The Chieftain coach said that the philosophy of playing all of the kids would be carried out throughout the program.

Interest in football seems to be keen this year, with around 120 seventh and eight graders signed up for the sport, in addition to the 109 prospective high school players.

Three starters, Danny Campbell, Davy Carthel and Kenny Stowers, will be among the returning lettermen. The trio started on offense a year ago. In addition, Stowers and Carthel were starters on defense.

Now, even though the Indians were working harder than ever to try to scare up more buffalo meat, the townspeople stepped up their attacks on them. They said the hunters' horses messed up the land and smelled up the air (even though some had never even visited the hunting grounds where this fouling was alleged to be taking place).

Some Indians began hunting from the water in canoes. Townspeople complained that this would ruin the rivers. One day, despite all the Indians' precautions, a buffalo did fall in the water. The Indian who shot it cleaned up the mess by himself and paid all the expenses while the townspeople stood on the bank and complained.

The Agency then decided to make hunting safer. It decreed Indians must put saddles on the horses, tie the braves to the saddles, put safety tips over arrow heads, and wear hard-toed moccasins—all at Indian expense. The tribe protested that this would hamper the hunt; besides, the tribe already had safety regulations of its own.

Next an Agency safety group, called "Safety and Health for Indian Tribes," was set up; its membership included storekeepers, bartenders, blacksmiths and other experts on Indian safety. Despite all these handicaps, the hunt went on.

"Then the evil spirit-Agency leader 'Trader Jackson' came upon the tribe. He said that the depletion allowance should be taken away and that the price should be rolled back to \$2 a buffalo. The Agency and the townspeople agreed and it was done. So the beaten Indians put away their bows and arrows and returned to the reservation never to hunt buffalo again. The next winter was extremely long and cold. Most of the townspeople starved to death. The town of Wildcat perished."

## SCS Report

If you have been around cattlemen (pardon me cattlemen) the last two years, you have heard conservation talked. How come? It seems as though there is going to be more grass fat cattle than in the past.

There is no better conservation practice than well managed grass. I say well managed because abused grass land is only good for low grass production and high weed production.

Just why is grass such a good conservation practice? A few reasons are:

1: A good grass cover puts cover on the soil. This cover prevents rain drops from hitting the bare soil, sealing it over, and running off.

2: The fibrous root system allows the rain or irrigation water to percolate. This cuts down on runoff. If during heavy rains water does run off it is clear water.

3: Grass cover prevents wind erosion.

I could go on and on about the advantages of grass, but I just want to conclude with the opening statement that when cattlemen are

talking grass fat cattle they are talking conservation.

Three local members of the Soil Conservation Society of America will attend the Society's 30th annual meeting in San Antonio August 10-13. Herb Evans, Edwin Linengood, and Duval Burton will attend from Parmer County.

South Dakota Senator George McGovern will make the keynote address on Monday, August 11. His topic will be the meeting theme—"Land Use: Food and Living."

More than a thousand professional conservationists from the United States, Canada and Mexico are expected to attend the four-day meeting, which begins on Sunday, August 10, with registration and reception.

The Society is a nonprofit scientific and educational organization dedicated to advancing the science and art of good land use. It has about 14,000 members throughout the world.

## DPS Now Seeking Trooper Applicants

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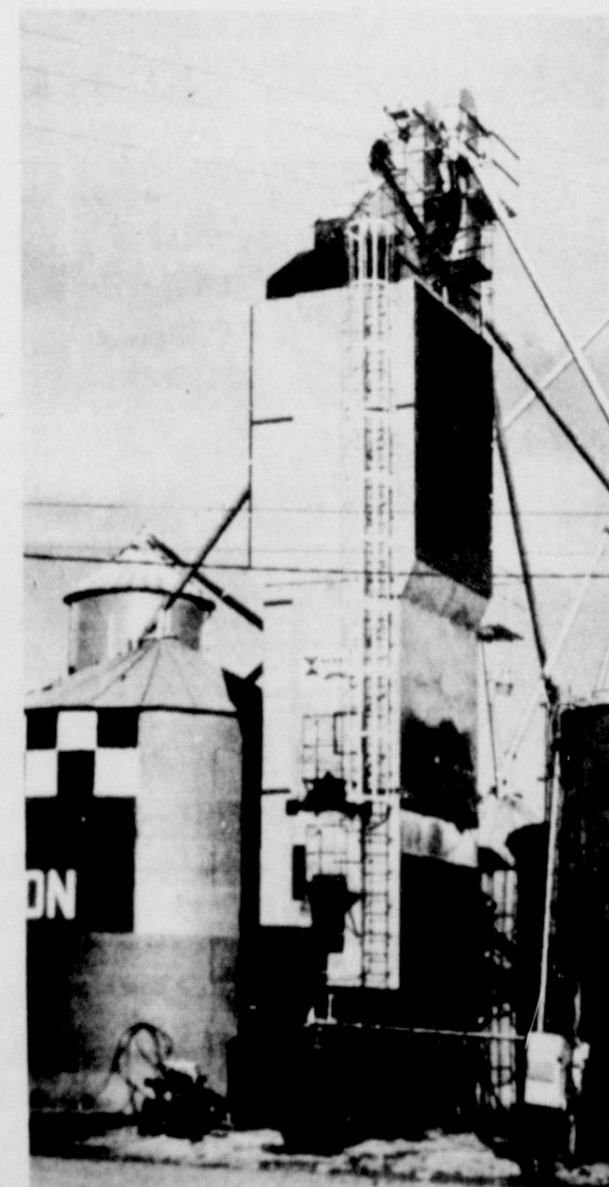
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# Bovina Ready For Bull Town Days

## New Book Of Games At Library

All children love a game and are especially interested in learning if parents will play with them. Of interest to parents and youngsters is a book just received at Friona Public Library titled "Deal Me In!"

The author, Margie Golick, is a psychologist in a center for children who have trouble learning at school. She had always loved card games as she was growing up and had taught many to her own children as they grew up.

In her work with special education children it seemed natural for Ms. Golick to add card games to her teaching tools and she contends that they are most successful teaching devices.

Childrens needs are curious, the author states. They have to know how to sit still and listen. In order to learn arithmetic or even to cross a street, a child has to be a good estimator of distance, direction and number in the three dimensional world. Children have to know their native language and be able to talk about what they see, hear and feel.

Arms and legs, eyes and hands must be able to move with intent before a child can succeed in learning situations. He must be able to remember and store facts for later use. The good learner must be happy in relationships with other children and with adults.

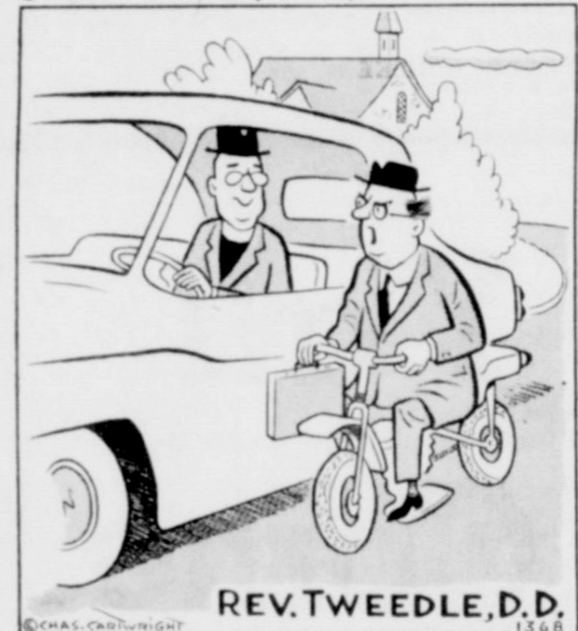

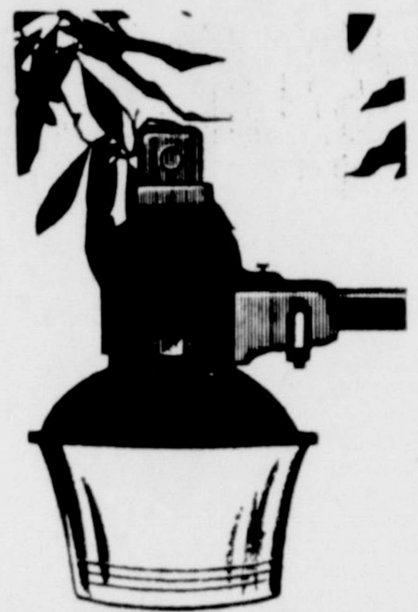

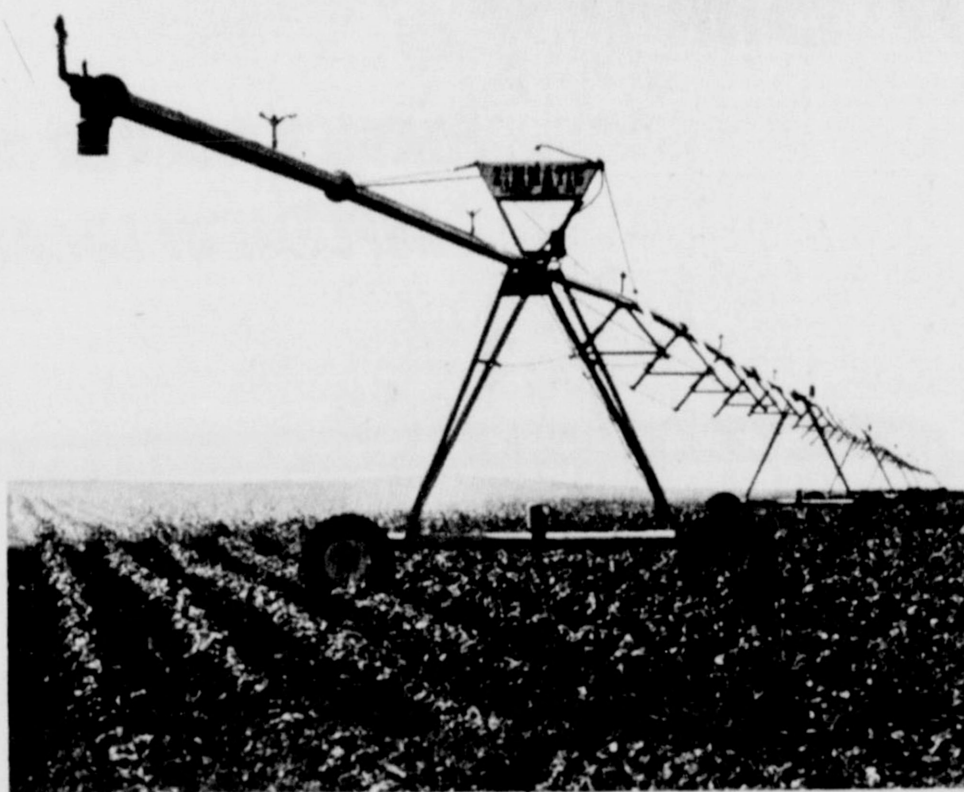
