Hance Has Hope For Farm Sector

CONGRESSMAN KENT HANCE says that the best thing that has happened to America's foreign policy was the resignation of former Secretary of State Alexander Haig.

"Haig wanted to run things and not be responsible to anyone," Hance said at his Town Hall meeting this week in Friona.

The new Secretary of State, Schulz, is envisioned as a good choice.

"Schulz held two different cabinet positions under President Nixon, during the Watergate period, and never was involved in any scandal," Congressman Hance points out.

Hance said that his first run-in with Alexander Haig was during the Russian grain embargo. The embargo was costing American farmers millions of dollars, but Haig wouldn't budge in his stance on the embargo.

During the Carter administration, the U.S. didn't quit selling the Russians equipment, Hance points out. Yet, the decision was made to cut back on grain sales.

"This didn't make a bit of sense to me. I would much rather have the Russians well fed and without weapons to use against us, rather than well armed and hungry," the congressman stated.

Hance says Alexander Haig had apparently sent signals to Argentina to get more involved in Central America, but they misread the signals and went into the Falkland Islands, instead.

"It should not have taken us three weeks to side up with Great Britain," Hance says, laying the blame for this delay at the feet of the former Secretary of State.

YOU ALWAYS HEAR that the Russians are ahead of us with their technology, but he feels this charge is unfounded. "In the Israeli's battle with the Syrians and P.L.O. in Lebanon, Syria was using Russian MIG fighters, and Israel was using U.S.-built F-15s and F-16s. In one of the early fights, the Israelis knocked out 85 MIGs and didn't lose a single plane," Hance said.

"If we could have 'sub contracted' the Vietnam conflict to Israel, they could have won it in two months. But instead, we bogged around for a period of years, and had to settle for a no-win situation," Hance said.

As to why the United States bothers to get involved in the situation in the Mid-East, Hance reminds his constituents that our nation gets 35 per cent of its oil from that area of the world, and that if this supply were suddenly cut off, it could "bring us to our knees."

"There is a strong possibility that once the Syrians and P.L.O. (Palestinian Liberation Organization) are out of Lebanon, that country can re-establish itself as a free country, and a pro-U.S. government in that area is very critical to the United States," Hance says.

THE CONGRESSMAN said he has received a lot of communication about the John Hinckley "not guilty by means of insanity" court decision. "I had a bad feeling about that trial from the first, but I feel that as a result of this decision, one of two things may happen. Congress may pass a law changing the burden of proof on insanity, which now rests with the prosecution in a federal case, or it may completely outlaw the insanity plea.

Due to the extreme feeling following the Hinckley case, many people would not be surprised to see the latter choice exercised.

ONCE AGAIN, Friona's July 4th celebration was top notch. As a spectator, participant and news reporter, ye editor thoroughly enjoyed every phase of the day's activities.

Congrats to the Chamber of Commerce, and thanks to all those who helped, especially the firemen, for doing their usual good job with the fireworks. The display drew its usual capacity crowd.

Congressman Kent Hance commiserated with the area's farmers, during a Town Hall meeting Monday evening at Friona, and voiced some hope for the future.

"I feel that things have got to turn around, as far as agriculture is concerned. We have these cycles, where things go from 'boom' to 'bust' and I feel that if farmers are able to hold on for another six to 12 months, things are bound to change for the better," Hance said at the conclusion of his remarks.

"We are not going to give up, so you don't give up either," the Congressman challenged his audience.

Earlier, Hance had admitted "We're in a depression (in agriculture) right now, but I don't have to tell you that."

Hance said that while touring this area last week with the special Task Force appointed to Secretary of Agriculture John Block, he had pointed out to those on the Task Force that farmers weren't the only ones hurting in this area.

"I pointed out that in your small communities, where virtually every business is dependent upon agriculture, everyone is suffering, because the farmer has cut his services to the bone, in an effort to come out," Hance said.

Hance said that the disaster program, which was the reason for the task force's tour of area, "land which had been hailed out, will have to be approved by Secretary Block."

"I think we have a good chance of having the disaster program re-instated. I have talked to Sec. Block, and to (budget director) David Stockman. When the disaster program expired in 1981, there was a provision that it could be re-instated should certain conditions warrant that it should. We have met these conditions," Hance stated.

The congressman predicted that we should know something "within the next 10 days" concerning the disaster program.

"I told the people when we were touring 'You're going to see three out of ten of these farmers out of business next year, and maybe more than that if they don't get the disaster relief,'" Hance said.

"The longer we put off addressing farm problems, the worse (the cure) is going to be. I can see the problem, and I can see the answers, but politics are such that you just can't get legislation passed that you need," he said.

The Dimmitt native pointed out that of the 435 members of congress, only 85 have farming in their districts. ("The others are tied to Ralph Nader and his consumer groups.")

"Then another problem is, besides our lack of votes, when we propose something for agriculture, we can't even get the various sectors of agriculture to agree on a certain matter," Hance said.

Hance said that the so-called "Boll Weevils" (conservative Southern Democrats, of which he is a participant) would pressure the White House to include a farm program in the budget.

He mentioned a "Reconciliation bill" which would deal with the budget, and said that he would attach his Farm Crisis bill to this bill, which

will be drafted later this year.

Hance said that the United Auto Workers, realizing the strain put on factories due to the depression in Agriculture, is backing his farm bill.

Concerning congress' efforts to pass the 1983 budget, Hance said the budget passed by the House of Representatives "wasn't what I wanted, but it was the best choice of the choices we had."

The congressman said that one of the big problems in getting a budget passed is that President Reagan has cited two things as "off limits" from the budget cuts, and these are (1) the Department of Defense, and (2) the interest on the national debt.

"Taking out these two areas only leaves you about 20 per cent of the entire budget, which has had to bear the cuts," Hance explained. Thirteen per cent of every dollar in the federal

budget goes to pay interest on the national debt.

Hance said that the senate has passed a bill which would provide for automatic withholding of taxes on individual savings accounts ("But I don't see any way in the world this can pass the House.") Hance's bill opposing this program passed the house last year with only four dissenting votes.

Other matters covered by the Congressman in his talk included Foreign Policy (see publisher's column); the John Hinckley trial verdict; keeping the Social Security system solvent; Federal Crop Insurance (which he called a sham); and flat-rate taxes. The tax code is so complicated that people make business decisions based on the tax code, rather than whether or not (the decision) is good business."

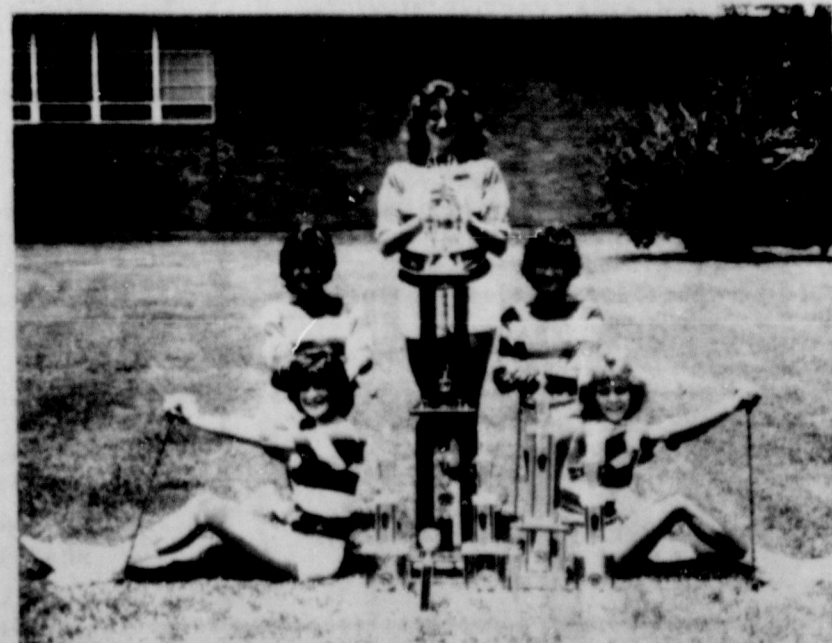

50 YEARS AGO--JULY 15, 1932

Work on the construction of the
new Friona gin was started early this
week, and has progressed thus far at a
good rate. The framework of the
walls is all up and it is expected that a
large part of the roof and siding, or
perhaps all, will be on by the close of
the week. Manager C.S. Waddell is
employing all the local labor he can
use in this work, helping out a
number of local heads of families by
giving them employment.

40 YEARS AGO--JULY 10, 1942

Floyd Dewey Golden, who began
his teaching career in 1920 at Friona,
was elected president of the Eastern
New Mexico College at a meeting of
the Board of Regents Tuesday, July
1. Golden had served as acting
president since the resignation of
Donald MacKay in the spring of
1941.

35 YEARS AGO--

30 YEARS AGO--JULY 10, 1952

An old fashioned 4th of July
program was conducted in the Rhea
Community last Friday evening under
the direction of the Farm Bureau
organization there. A crowd
estimated at 150 or more were present
for the chicken-fry and picnic
followed by games and a program of
musical selections. "Cotton John"
Smith of Radio Station KGNC,
Amarillo, was present, giving a short
talk and later interviewing the road
sign committee. This interview will be
broadcast on KGNC this Saturday.

25 YEARS AGO--JULY 10, 1957

Construction of new buildings for
Friona School is to start tomorrow, in
accordance with the proposed
starting date in the contract awarded
Tuesday of last week. The bid was
awarded to J.D. Jones Construction
Co. of Big Spring upon their
submission of the low bid of
\$284,830. Included in the project is
29,000 feet of floor space. A building
for grade school with ten classrooms,
a study hall, teacher's lounge, office,

reception room, textbook room, and
gymnasium is to be constructed near
the two-story building.

A butane gas fire struck Kendrick
Oil Company outside the south city
limits of Friona Monday at 5:30
p.m., bringing an emergency to the
surrounding area as flames erupted
from a tank truck and small storage
tank. Total damage was about
\$8,000, estimates H.K. Kendrick,
owner.

20 YEARS AGO--JULY 12, 1962

The plane which crashed near
Muleshoe Sunday killing two persons
belonged to Elvie Jennings of
Friona's Benger Air Park. The plane
was a World War II Boeing two-
passenger model. Killed in the crash
were Joe Milsap, 22, of the Needmore
community, south of Muleshoe, and
Walter V. McMahan, 40, instructor,
of Muleshoe.

15 YEARS AGO--JULY 13, 1967

Two Friona doctors are planning to
leave Parmer County Community
Hospital, it was disclosed this week.
Dr. Lee Cranfill, the hospital Chief
of Staff, and Dr. J.L. Humphrey
have announced their intentions to
move. It will be some time before
either leaves.

years ago, because she has returned

and Mrs. W.M. Massie, her
American parents. Anni Jensen, now
Mrs. Eric Jensen, was a senior at

station was the main item of business
at the monthly meeting of the Friona

age or national origin.

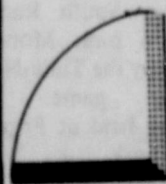

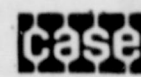

Ex-Resident Uses Special Module Tester

A former Friona resident, David Woodruff, is benefitting from new technology which enables him to test equipment manufactured at Texas Instruments' Lubbock plant.

Woodruff, who has been blind since he was a child of about ten, after being struck in the head by a baseball bat, tests modules for machines manufactured by Texas Instruments for distribution on a regional basis.

The tests are given to assure that the manufactured instrument meets the test and is ready to market. Previously, the testing machine used for the job used a light system.

But thanks to some modifications by Terry Reynolds, supervisor, and Gary Miskell, manufacturing

engineer for TI, the tester was altered to emit a beeping noise instead of a flashing light.

When Woodruff does his testing, the "okay" signal comes in the form of a "beep, beep" noise. The adjustment made by Reynolds and Miskell will enable the visually impaired to operate the tester just as accurately as a sighted person could.

Woodruff has been working at Texas Instruments since September 14, 1978. Besides his module-testing responsibilities, he also works on the "RMR Pack Line."

The modules he tests are used for such Texas Instruments machines as "Speak & Spell," "Speak & Read," "Speak & Math," etc.

David and his mother, Mrs. W. P. Woodruff, live in Lubbock.

Pickup Bids Are Given Approval

Awarding of contract for pickups for County use was the main item of business on the Commissioner's Court agenda Monday, June 28.

Only one bid was received for the pickups, from E.R. Coffman. The bid for Precinct 3 was a trade difference of \$4,150, and the bid for

Precinct 4 was a straight purchase price of \$5,000. Motion was passed accepting the bids.

Notation was made of a letter from the U.S. Department of Justice concerning the reapportionment of the commissioners' precincts, JP precincts and the creation of two new voting precincts and a new JP and constable precinct.

Judge Porter Roberts said that the Attorney General does not interpose any objection to the changes. "This does not, however, bar judicial action to enjoin the enforcement of such changes," Roberts said.

Payment of an attorney's bill to Norman Bays, who had been appointed as attorney in a mental hearing, was approved. Payment of final bill to Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley on the reapportionment project was also approved, in the amount of \$17.41.

A jury of view was appointed to survey and access possible damages in preparation for a road being opened in Precinct 3. Members of the jury are Gilbert Kaltwasser, Henry Haseloff, Hubert Gohlke, Billy Mayfield and Richard Haseloff.

Approval of several requests for soil conservation work on county farms was given, subject to availability of the machinery, with the county to be reimbursed by the individuals.
