

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Pilot Escapes Close Scrape

Bovina spray plane pilot, Ted Stallings of Chuck Stallings Aviation, escaped without injury Thursday when he made an emergency landing without landing gear at Clovis Municipal Airport.

Stallings circled the airport several times and made a pass over an eastwest grass runway, apparently to let emergency crews know where he would land.

The single-engine aircraft, called a Turbine Air Tractor, was equipped with a radio, but the device was inoperative.

As rescue and airport personnel and passengers waiting for a flight looked on, the plane flew low to the ground and settled onto Runway 8-26, a turf runway used mainly by light planes in high winds.


The aircraft came to a stop after skidding about 100 to 150 feet. The plane suffered no obvious damage, except to the propeller, and Stallings walked away from the crash.

The undercarriage of Stallings' plane had struck an overhead sprinkler system during a cropdusting run, according to reports received by Jerry Golledge, airport

Golledge said reports from ground "spotters" were that the sprinklers were actually lifted off the ground by the impact. The front landing gear was sheared off.

Golledge said he was notified about 8 a.m. by Cannon Air Force Base about the emergency landing. He said that Stallings company had called CAFB first about a possible landing

Rescue and fire units of the Clovis Fire Department and the Texico Volunteer Fire Department were called to the airport to stand by during the landing.

Toll-Free Alcoholism Number Is Available

tial help with an alcoholism problem can call toll-free 1-800-692-4165 from anywhere in the Panhandle and get referral information. The new service offered by the Amarillo Council on Alcoholism is made possible by a grant from the Texas Commission on Alcoholism.

The 24-hour service is linked to a corps of volunteers who are available

Area residents who need confiden- rehabilitation programs, and prevention methods. A volunteer coordinator has been selected by the Council and training of the volunteers is under way.

"This service is for anyone who has a problem with alcohol," said Don Pipes, Executive Director of the ACA. "When we hear about someone having an alcohol problem, to give information on treatment and we usually think of a person who

drinks too much and needs to stop. We're certainly going to be dealing with those kind of people but, we're also going to be helping the families of those abusers, employers who are trying to find help for a worker and people who need more information about alcohol treatment and rehabilitation."

"A major problem the abuser has," Pipes continued, "is in making that first call for help. If he or she is somewhere outside Amarillo, it takes considerable effort to make a long distance call. We feel the toll-free number will make that first step easier to take."

Figures assembled by the Regional Alcoholism Authority show the volunteers will be busy. About seven per cent of the area population, or just over 21,000 people, are directly affected by the disease of alcoholism.

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

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

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

Morgan, Berend Spark Chiefs Past BR, 34-6

Roddy Berend, center and linebacker for the Friona Chieftain football team, recovered a fumble on the second play from scrimmage against the Boys Ranch Roughriders last Friday night.

It's 'way too early to say that a single play might be the turning point of a season, but it's a proven fact that it set the wheels in motion for Friona's 34-6 win over the visiting Ranchers last Friday.

Two plays following Berend's fumble recovery, Bruce Patterson clock

to the 22. A penalty stalled the Chieftains momentarily.

On a big third down and nine play from the BR 25, Morgan took a pitchout from Patterson, headed around the right end, and outraced the defenders into the end zone. Montoya kicked again, and Friona's lead became 14-0. The game was yet only 4:43 old

On Boys Ranch's third possession, three plays lost ten yards (the quarterback was blitzed on a third down passing try), and Friona was about to be back in business once

Mike Neill fielded the BR punt at about the 40, on the dead run, and was not corralled until he had reached

the ten, and from this point Morgan again ran it in. The kick was deflected, but Friona's lead had become 20-0 with 4:50 left in the opening quarter, and Boys Ranch must have been wondering if it were

Once again, Friona held, took over

the way to a fourth TD of the opening quarter, and all that saved the visitors that embarrassment was a fumbled Chieftain pitchout from the BR 14.

The break in momentum didn't last long, however. Boys Ranch picked up a first down out to their 35, only to have Jeff Lundy intercept a pass at the visitors' 43.

Mike Neill passed to Alfredo Mata on a 19-yard gainer, Neill taking the ball on the end-around. That moved the ball to the Boys Ranch 18.

A holding penalty threatened to stymie the Friona scoring bid, but Morgan ripped off a 13-yard gain to the 12, and on fourth down Patterson passed to Mata in the end zone for the score. Morgan ran in a two-pointer. to increase Friona's lead to 28-0, 6:53 before halftime.

Boys Ranch, which gained only 22 yards in the first half, never had the ball across the mid-field stripe but once in the half, that coming after another errant Friona pitchout, and at that they could move only to the Friona 48 as the clock expired.

Friona received the kickoff to begin the second half, and had a new experience--failing to move the football. This brought about the team's first punt in the game, a 36varder by Montoya.

The Chieftains failed to score in the third quarter, but it wasn't Charlie Morgan's fault. The 155-pound runningback went up the middle, to the outside and raced 43 yards for an apparent touchdown late in the quarter, but a motion penalty against the Chieftains erased what would have been his third TD of the game. Friona finally had to punt again, after two straight penalties.

Neill intercepted a Boys Ranch pass at the opponents' 42, to put the Chieftains back in business a little

Patterson connected with Perea on a 16-yard gain to the BR 30, Morgan ripped off an eight-yard gain, and then an 11-yarder, to set Friona up first and goal from the five yard line.

Patterson passed to Eloy Caballero in the end zone, but once again the yellow flag erased the play and moved the ball back five yards. But Patterson just duplicated things, hitting Morgan at the goal-line for one that counted.

The PAT kick was deflected, but Friona had upped its lead to 34-0 with 7:59 left in the game.

The Chieftains' only defensive lapse of the entire game cost the team their shutout, as a BR receiver got behind the Friona defense, took a pass and outraced his defenders on an 80-yard scoring play.

In addition to cracking the scoring ice, the pass-run play more than doubled the yardage to which Boys Ranch had been limited during the balance of the game. The TD brought the final margin of 34-6.

The win was the first for Friona over the Ranchers since the schools began playing a regularly-scheduled season game in 1980. Boys Ranch had posted a win that year, 33-16, and won last year's game, 6-0 in a defensive struggle in the rain.

Coach Tommy Moss called the game a "Good, overall effort. It was a team victory," he said. Moss said that Alfredo Mata, who had been elevated to the team late in the week, played an exceptional game, considering the short length of time he had practiced with the varsity.



Child Abuse Is Major Problem Statewide

Child abuse and neglect can be prevented by Texans building a network of services to help families in distress, the president of the Texas Council of Child Welfare Boards declares.

"We can help parents learn how to discipline their children without injuring them," said Susan Bush of Athens.

"Where local communities support a wide range of family services, child abuse can be reduced. And, there's a bonus in keeping an abused youngster from repeating the cycle of abuse when the child grows up and becomes a parent," Bush said at a council meeting to plan the 50th anniversary in 1982 of the beginning of child

protective services in Texas. Bush and the Rev. Bill Hughes of Jourdanton head a committee to recognize state-county cooperation in child protection since 1932. Today, more than 1,800 Texans on 172 county boards offer time and service to protect children from abuse and neglect in partnership with the Texas

Bush noted that the likelihood for abuse or neglect goes up in families under great stress from financial difficulties, marital discord, social

isolation, or poor health. "Something as simple as talking to a neighborhood father who has lost his job can defuse the frustration and guilt that otherwise might be taken out on the children," Bush said. She said an old-fashioned concern for neighbors could go a long way toward helping families cope with modern stresses that are related to many abuse cases.

"Admittedly, such informal actions aren't enough to help some families who need comprehensive therapeutic services," Bush said. "Even in those families, however, Texans can play a supportive role in programs to protect children."

Texans who want to do more to prevent child abuse and neglect usually find that an effective approach is to serve as a volunteer, or involved citizen, by working with the

Department of Human Resources,

the county child welfare board, or through a church or civic group.

Ways to get involved: 1. Most importantly, report suspected instances of child abuse, neglect, or exploitation by calling the toll-free Child Abuse Hotline at 1-800-252-5400. It's answered day and night, seven days a week, and callers are not required to give their names.

2. Join an organization that offers caring attention to family groups suffering from frustration and

3. Increase your knowledge and understanding of child maltreatment, its causes and cures. Local libraries carry books and professional journals that discuss the subject.

4. Contact a local child welfare board, as it deals with child abuse regularly, and offer your help as a

5. Guide a group in which you are active, such as an athletic team. neighborhood group, or church assembly, into doing something to help stem the incidence of child maltreatment in your community.

6. Assist your schools and churches in developing programs and audiences for basic education about child rearing, parent training, and subjects dealing with human development.

7. Volunteer your time to troubled parents, "adopt" a family in trouble, become a parent aide to mothers who are young and inexperienced in raising children, help recruit foster parents and adoptive parents, and reach out to neighbors having problems.







To qualify for a dean's honor roll a student must have a grade point average of 3.5 or more on a 4.0 scale and must have taken at least six semester hours of work.



A RESOURCE WE MUST PROTECT

You can look around the square of any Texas town and see the backbone of the state economy-and of the national economy. It's small business and it provides half of all jobs. By the current state definition there are 260,000 in our state-that's 97% of all Texas businesses. The small businessman and woman not only provide jobs and pay taxes; their independent tradition also helps explain the enduring quality of our democratic form

of government. The state of Texas recognizes the importance of small business and has programs to help it. But we can do better.

For one thing, we can abolsh the sales tax on utility bills which now falls basically on mall business owners. Large nanufacturing and processing firms don't have to pay the tax, but the grocer, retailer and florist do. It is not fair.

My opponent opposed doing away with this tax in the last session of the legislature. The tax will bring in an estimated \$220 million in 1984-85. But when you compare that with the extra \$5.1 billion the legislature will have to spend during that time, I feel we can do

nue it will bring. And, as Lt. Governor, I would support its I would also support putting into effect recommendations of

the small business task force initiated by the Governor. Two of these recommendations are especially appealing. One is to help small business borrow money at better rates. Most small businesses which fail do so because they are undercapitalized. To help that situation, franchise tax money would be deposited in participating banks, which would, in turn, make loans at lower rates to small businesses. The other recommendation

is that we form a group of small business development centers at colleges and universities statewide. Money for the centers would come from the U.S. Small Business Administration, the state and participating schools. The centers would provide training, counseling and other help to small business owners so that they could be more competitive in the marketplace.




