# Friona Flashbacks

**50 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 23, 1932**

Quite a bit of excitement was occasioned here Monday morning when Nightwatchman C.M. Jones released himself from his gag and hookwink and the post to which he had been tied, and gave the alarm of burglars. It appears that Mr. Jones had just driven up town from the south side of the railroad in a car with Reeve Guyer, and had alighted from the car about the middle of Main Street near the T.J. Crawford store, when Mr. Guyer had driven on to his home at the north end of Main Street. They had seen three men sauntering along the street and Mr. Jones went to find out their business. They were looking for a bed for the night and it was already 1:30 a.m. When he told them there were no beds or jail to sleep in they gagged him and tied him up. They broke into the Crawford store and took about \$6.00 from the cash register.

**40 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 25, 1942**

G. Cranfill, manager of the Santa Fe Grain Company, announced this week that his company has secured the dealership for Purina Feeds in Friona.

**30 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 18, 1952**

Parmer County last week staged a county fair that ranked with the very best of county fairs in Texas, according to "those in the know" who have made the circuits this year. Over 2200 people were present at the Friday night barbecue that highlighted the social activities of the fair. M.C. Osborn, Friona FFA member, showed the grand champion in both male and female divisions of the beef cattle group with his Hereford entries.

**25 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 19, 1957**

The Friona Chapter of FFA Monday won second place in the second division of the FFA exhibits and \$55 as prize money at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo. The local chapter displayed the advantages of debeaking chickens in an educational exhibit.

**20 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 20, 1962**

A truly representative group of beauties got the festivities rolling with the queen's contest last Thursday night. When the judges tallied their decisions, 17-year-old Janet Buckley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Buckley, was chosen to reign over the celebration. First alternate was Barbara Fallwell, 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Buck Fallwell of the Hub Community. Second alternate in the contest was Carolyn Herring, 16 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D.C. Herring. Twenty-two contestants appeared in formals and bathing suits.

Friona's first bale of cotton for the 1962 harvest season was ginned last Friday, September 14 with O.T. Patterson growing the premium bale. The bale was brought to Country Club Gin on Wednesday afternoon, but lack of electrical power at the gin forced the two-day delay in its ginning.

**15 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 21, 1967**

Paula Fortenberry, 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Fortenberry, was crowned the 11th Maize Days Queen as a highlight of the city's 1967 celebration last Thursday. 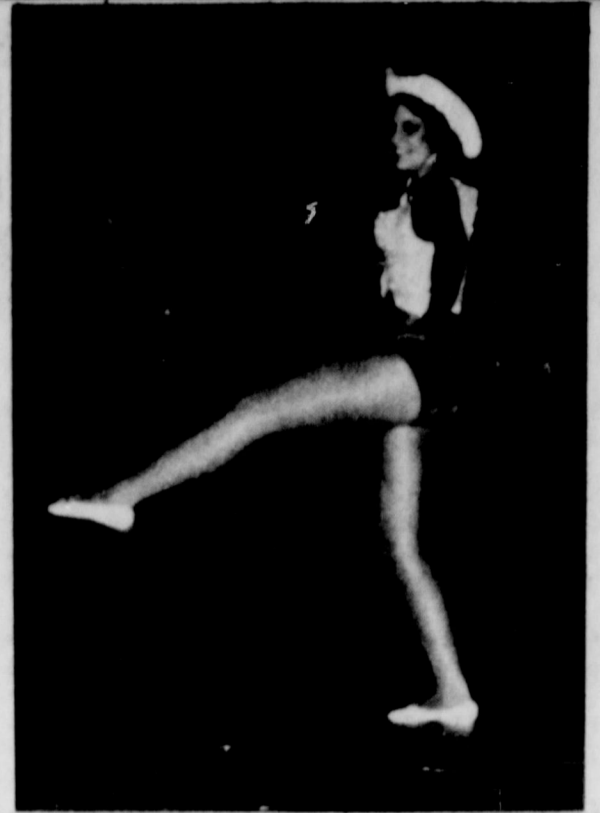

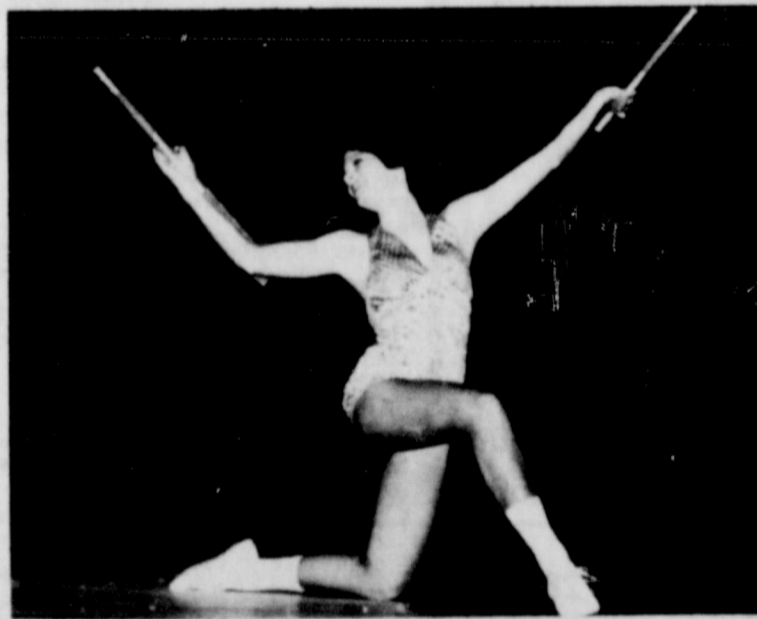

# Pilot Escapes Close Scrape

Bovina spray plane pilot, Ted Stallings of Chuck Stallings Aviation, escaped without injury Thursday when he made an emergency landing without landing gear at Clovis Municipal Airport.

Stallings circled the airport several times and made a pass over an east-west grass runway, apparently to let emergency crews know where he would land.

The single-engine aircraft, called a Turbine Air Tractor, was equipped with a radio, but the device was inoperative.

As rescue and airport personnel and passengers waiting for a flight looked on, the plane flew low to the ground and settled onto Runway 8-26, a turf runway used mainly by light planes in high winds.

The aircraft came to a stop after skidding about 100 to 150 feet.

The plane suffered no obvious

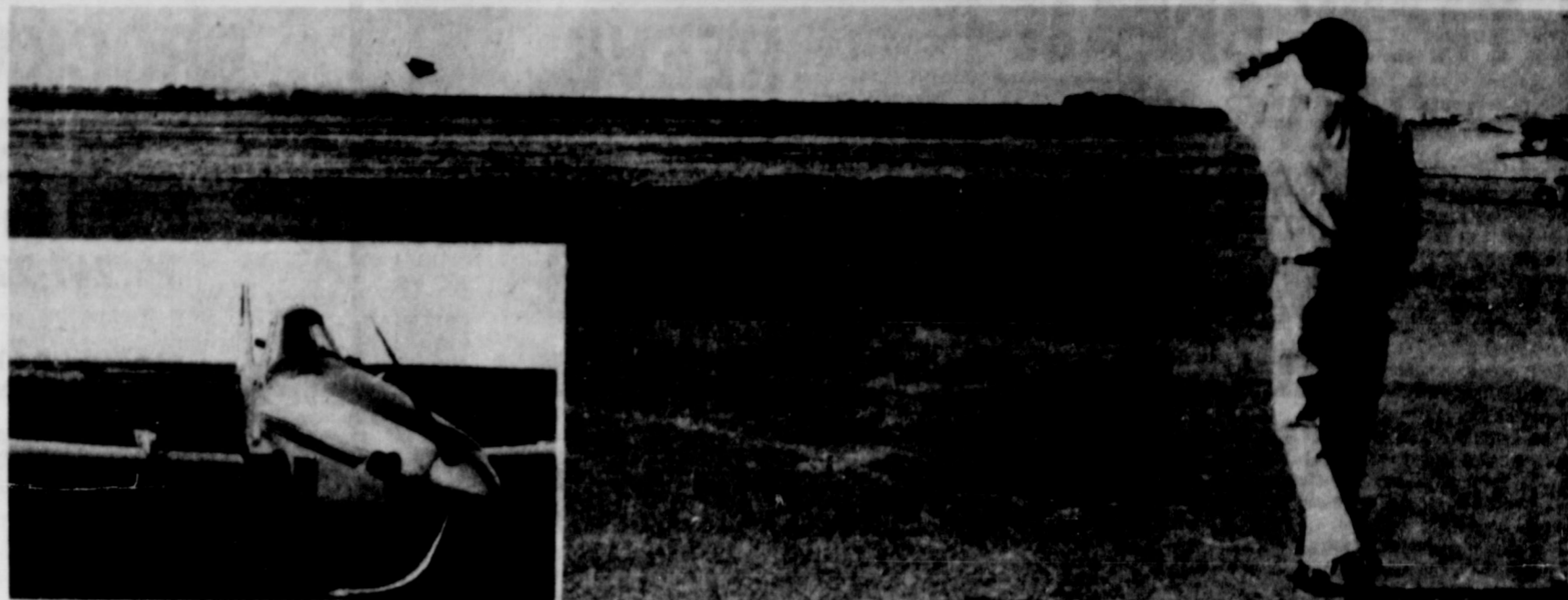
damage, except to the propeller, and Stallings walked away from the crash.

The undercarriage of Stallings' plane had struck an overhead sprinkler system during a crop-dusting run, according to reports received by Jerry Golledge, airport manager.

Golledge said reports from ground "spotters" were that the sprinklers were actually lifted off the ground by the impact. The front landing gear was sheared off.

Golledge said he was notified about 8 a.m. by Cannon Air Force Base about the emergency landing. He said that Stallings company had called CAFB first about a possible landing there.

Rescue and fire units of the Clovis Fire Department and the Texico Volunteer Fire Department were called to the airport to stand by during the landing.

## Toll-Free Alcoholism Number Is Available

Area residents who need confidential help with an alcoholism problem can call toll-free 1-800-692-4165 from anywhere in the Panhandle and get referral information. The new service offered by the Amarillo Council on Alcoholism is made possible by a grant from the Texas Commission on Alcoholism.

The 24-hour service is linked to a corps of volunteers who are available to give information on treatment and

rehabilitation programs, and prevention methods. A volunteer coordinator has been selected by the Council and training of the volunteers is under way.

"This service is for anyone who has a problem with alcohol," said Don Pipes, Executive Director of the ACA. "When we hear about someone having an alcohol problem, we usually think of a person who

drinks too much and needs to stop. We're certainly going to be dealing with those kind of people but, we're also going to be helping the families of those abusers, employers who are trying to find help for a worker and people who need more information about alcohol treatment and rehabilitation."

"A major problem the abuser has," Pipes continued, "is in making that first call for help. If he or she is

somewhere outside Amarillo, it takes considerable effort to make a long distance call. We feel the toll-free number will make that first step easier to take."

Figures assembled by the Regional Alcoholism Authority show the volunteers will be busy. About seven per cent of the area population, or just over 21,000 people, are directly affected by the disease of alcoholism.

Two plays following Berend's fumble recovery, Bruce Patterson threw a strike to Mike Neill in the end zone. Mark Montoya kicked the point after, and Friona had grabbed a 7-0 lead over the stunned Boys Ranch team. Only 1:06 had elapsed from the clock.

Friona Coach Tommy Moss would like to patent the first quarter, and get his team to follow a similar script in every game. Boys Ranch took the kickoff, gained seven yards in three plays and punted short, to their own 49 yard line.

Charlie Morgan ripped off 22 yards on his first carry of the night, to the Ranchers' 27, then gained five more

to the 22. A penalty stalled the Chieftains momentarily.

On a big third down and nine play from the BR 25, Morgan took a pitchout from Patterson, headed around the right end, and outraced the defenders into the end zone. Montoya kicked again, and Friona's lead became 14-0. The game was yet only 4:43 old.

On Boys Ranch's third possession, three plays lost ten yards (the quarterback was blitzed on a third down passing try), and Friona was about to be back in business once again.

Mike Neill fielded the BR punt at about the 40, on the dead run, and was not corralled until he had reached the 13 yard line.

Max Perea gained three yards to the ten, and from this point Morgan again ran it in. The kick was deflected, but Friona's lead had become 20-0 with 4:50 left in the opening quarter, and Boys Ranch must have been wondering if it were Friday the 13th, rather than the 10th.

Once again, Friona held, took over following a punt, and looked to be on

the way to a fourth TD of the opening quarter, and all that saved the visitors that embarrassment was a fumbled Chieftain pitchout from the BR 14.

The break in momentum didn't last long, however. Boys Ranch picked up a first down out to their 35, only to have Jeff Lundy intercept a pass at the visitors' 43.

Mike Neill passed to Alfredo Mata on a 19-yard gainer, Neill taking the ball on the end-around. That moved the ball to the Boys Ranch 18.

A holding penalty threatened to stymie the Friona scoring bid, but Morgan ripped off a 13-yard gain to the 12, and on fourth down Patterson passed to Mata in the end zone for the score. Morgan ran in a two-pointer, to increase Friona's lead to 28-0, 6:53 before halftime.

Boys Ranch, which gained only 22 yards in the first half, never had the ball across the mid-field stripe but once in the half, that coming after another errant Friona pitchout, and at that they could move only to the Friona 48 as the clock expired.

Friona received the kickoff to begin the second half, and had a new experience--failing to move the football. This brought about the team's first punt in the game, a 36-yarder by Montoya.

The Chieftains failed to score in the third quarter, but it wasn't Charlie Morgan's fault. The 155-pound runningback went up the middle, to the outside and raced 43 yards for an apparent touchdown late in the quarter, but a motion penalty against the Chieftains erased what would have been his third TD of the game. Friona finally had to punt again, after two straight penalties.

Neill intercepted a Boys Ranch pass at the opponents' 42, to put the Chieftains back in business a little later.

Patterson connected with Perea on a 16-yard gain to the BR 30, Morgan ripped off an eight-yard gain, and then an 11-yarder, to set Friona up first and goal from the five yard line. Patterson passed to Eloy Caballero in the end zone, but once again the yellow flag erased the play and moved the ball back five yards. But Patterson just duplicated things, hitting Morgan at the goal-line for one that counted.

The PAT kick was deflected, but Friona had upped its lead to 34-0 with 7:59 left in the game.

The Chieftains' only defensive lapse of the entire game cost the team their shutout, as a BR receiver got behind the Friona defense, took a pass and outraced his defenders on an 80-yard scoring play.

In addition to cracking the scoring ice, the pass-run play more than doubled the yardage to which Boys Ranch had been limited during the balance of the game. The TD brought the final margin of 34-6.

The win was the first for Friona over the Ranchers since the schools began playing a regularly-scheduled season game in 1980. Boys Ranch had posted a win that year, 33-16, and won last year's game, 6-0 in a defensive struggle in the rain.

Coach Tommy Moss called the game a "Good, overall effort. It was a team victory," he said. Moss said that Alfredo Mata, who had been elevated to the team late in the week, played an exceptional game, considering the short length of time he had practiced with the varsity.

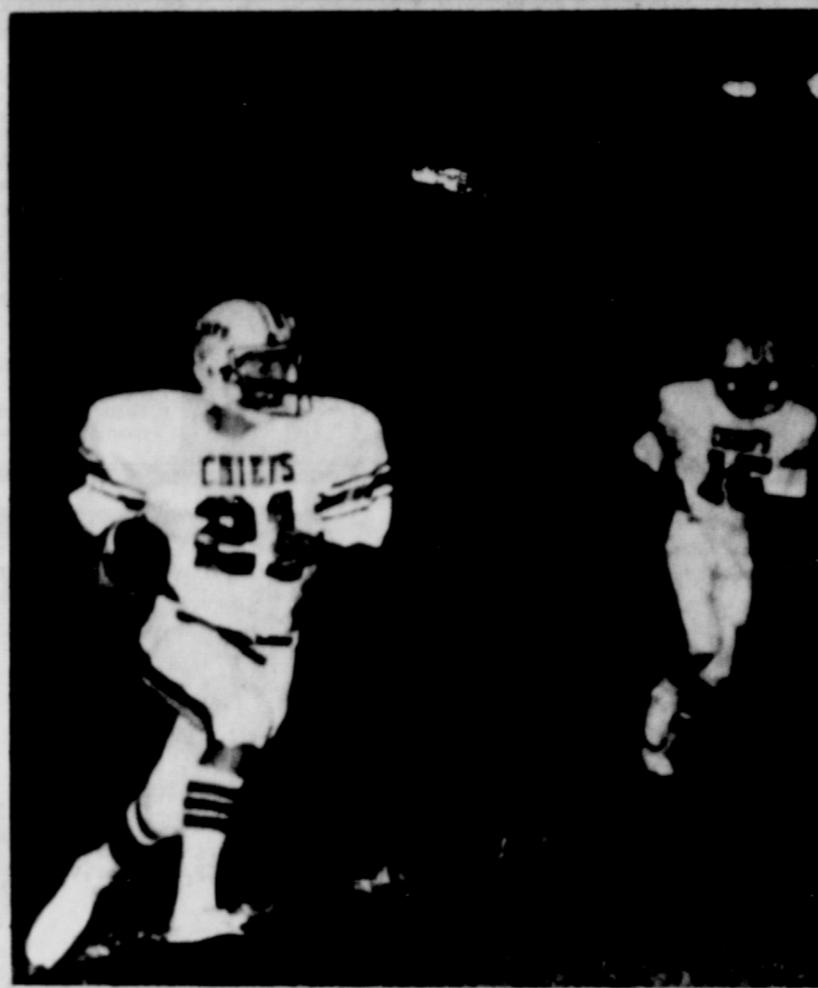

## County Employees To Get Slim Raises

Mostly routine business was transacted at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court this past Monday.

It was voted to give all county employees a three per cent increase in salary, except that the four county commissioners are to receive no increases in salary or travel allowance. The pay increase is to become effective January 1, 1983.

Payments approved by the court included \$75 for law books for the District Judge; \$75 to Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home for arrangements and transportation expenses involved in an autopsy ordered by a county Justice of the Peace.

Also approved was boarding care bills for Parmer County foster children in the amount of \$1,312, which amount will be reimbursed to the county; and a filing fee of \$65 for a mental health hearing in Wilbarger County for the indefinite commitment of a Parmer County patient.

A bill from the Parmer County Tax Appraisal Office in the amount of \$83.96 for extra fees was approved. Motion was approved to service the fire extinguishers in the court house, which had not been serviced since 1980.

A request for an easement for a water line in Precincts 1 and 2 for the city of Friona was approved. This deals with piping the city's new water supply into town.

Motion was passed to purchase lots 1 and 2, Block 79 in Friona, for county use was approved.

Bernie Gowens presented the 1981 audit of the county's financial records. Motion was passed to accept the report.

A lengthy discussion was held on items to be added or deleted from the 1983 budget. A motion was passed unanimously that a fourth county deputy be hired for the Sheriff's Department for the Lazbuddie area.

The tax rate for the county was set at \$.3125 per \$100 valuation, the same as it had been the previous year.

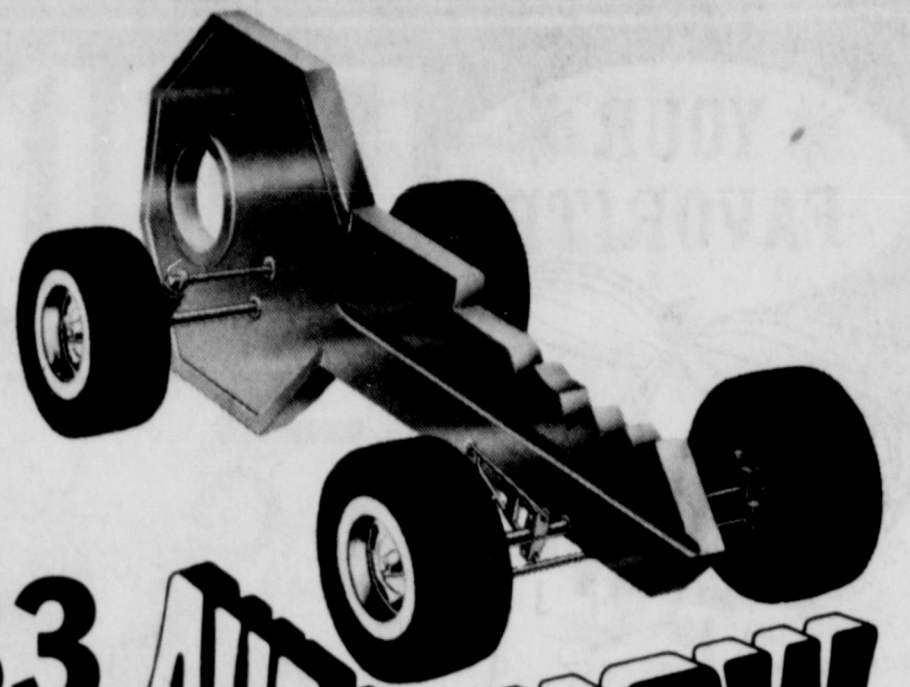

## Child Abuse Is Major Problem Statewide

Child abuse and neglect can be prevented by Texans building a network of services to help families in distress, the president of the Texas Council of Child Welfare Boards declares.

"We can help parents learn how to discipline their children without injuring them," said Susan Bush of Athens.

"Where local communities support a wide range of family services, child abuse can be reduced. And, there's a bonus in keeping an abused youngster from repeating the cycle of abuse when the child grows up and becomes a parent," Bush said at a council meeting to plan the 50th anniversary in 1982 of the beginning of child protective services in Texas.

Bush and the Rev. Bill Hughes of Jourdanot head a committee to recognize state-county cooperation in child protection since 1932. Today, more than 1,800 Texans on 172 county boards offer time and service to protect children from abuse and neglect in partnership with the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Bush noted that the likelihood for abuse or neglect goes up in families under great stress from financial difficulties, marital discord, social isolation, or poor health.

"Something as simple as talking to a neighborhood father who has lost his job can defuse the frustration and guilt that otherwise might be taken out on the children," Bush said. She said an old-fashioned concern for neighbors could go a long way toward helping families cope with modern stresses that are related to many abuse cases.

"Admittedly, such informal actions aren't enough to help some families who need comprehensive therapeutic services," Bush said. "Even in those families, however, Texans can play a supportive role in programs to protect children."

Texans who want to do more to prevent child abuse and neglect

usually find that an effective approach is to serve as a volunteer, or involved citizen, by working with the Department of Human Resources, the county child welfare board, or through a church or civic group.

Ways to get involved:

1. Most importantly, report suspected instances of child abuse, neglect, or exploitation by calling the toll-free Child Abuse Hotline at 1-800-252-5400. It's answered day and night, seven days a week, and callers are not required to give their names.

2. Join an organization that offers caring attention to family groups suffering from frustration and isolation.

3. Increase your knowledge and understanding of child maltreatment, its causes and cures. Local libraries carry books and professional journals that discuss the subject.

4. Contact a local child welfare board, as it deals with child abuse regularly, and offer your help as a volunteer.

5. Guide a group in which you are active, such as an athletic team, neighborhood group, or church assembly, into doing something to help stem the incidence of child maltreatment in your community.

6. Assist your schools and churches in developing programs and audiences for basic education about child rearing, parent training, and subjects dealing with human development.

7. Volunteer your time to troubled parents, "adopt" a family in trouble, become a parent aide to mothers who are young and inexperienced in raising children, help recruit foster parents and adoptive parents, and reach out to neighbors having problems.

**HOW TO GET INVOLVED:** Contact a member of your county's child welfare board or the citizen involvement office in the nearest Department of Human Resources office.

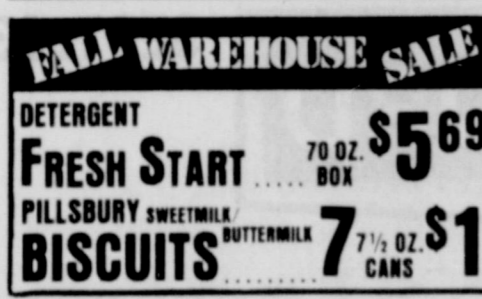

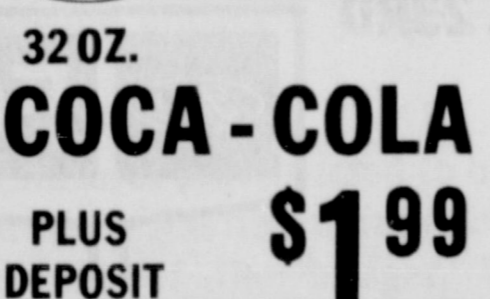

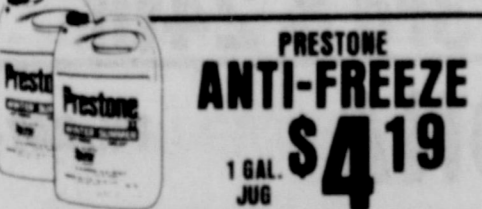

**SMALL BUSINESS—  
A RESOURCE WE MUST PROTECT**

You can look around the square of any Texas town and see the backbone of the state economy—and of the national economy. It's small business and it provides half of all jobs. By the current state definition there are 260,000 in our state—that's 97% of all Texas businesses. The small businessman and woman not only provide jobs and pay taxes; their independent tradition also helps explain the enduring quality of our democratic form of government.

The state of Texas recognizes the importance of small business and has programs to help it. But we can do better.

For one thing, we can abolish the sales tax on utility bills which now falls basically on small business owners. Large manufacturing and processing firms don't have to pay the tax, but the grocer, retailer and florist do. It is not fair.

My opponent opposed doing away with this tax in the last session of the legislature. The tax will bring in an estimated \$220 million in 1984-85. But when you compare that with the extra \$5.1 billion the legislature will have to spend during that time, I feel we can do without the tax and the revenue it will bring. And, as Lt. Governor, I would support its repeal.

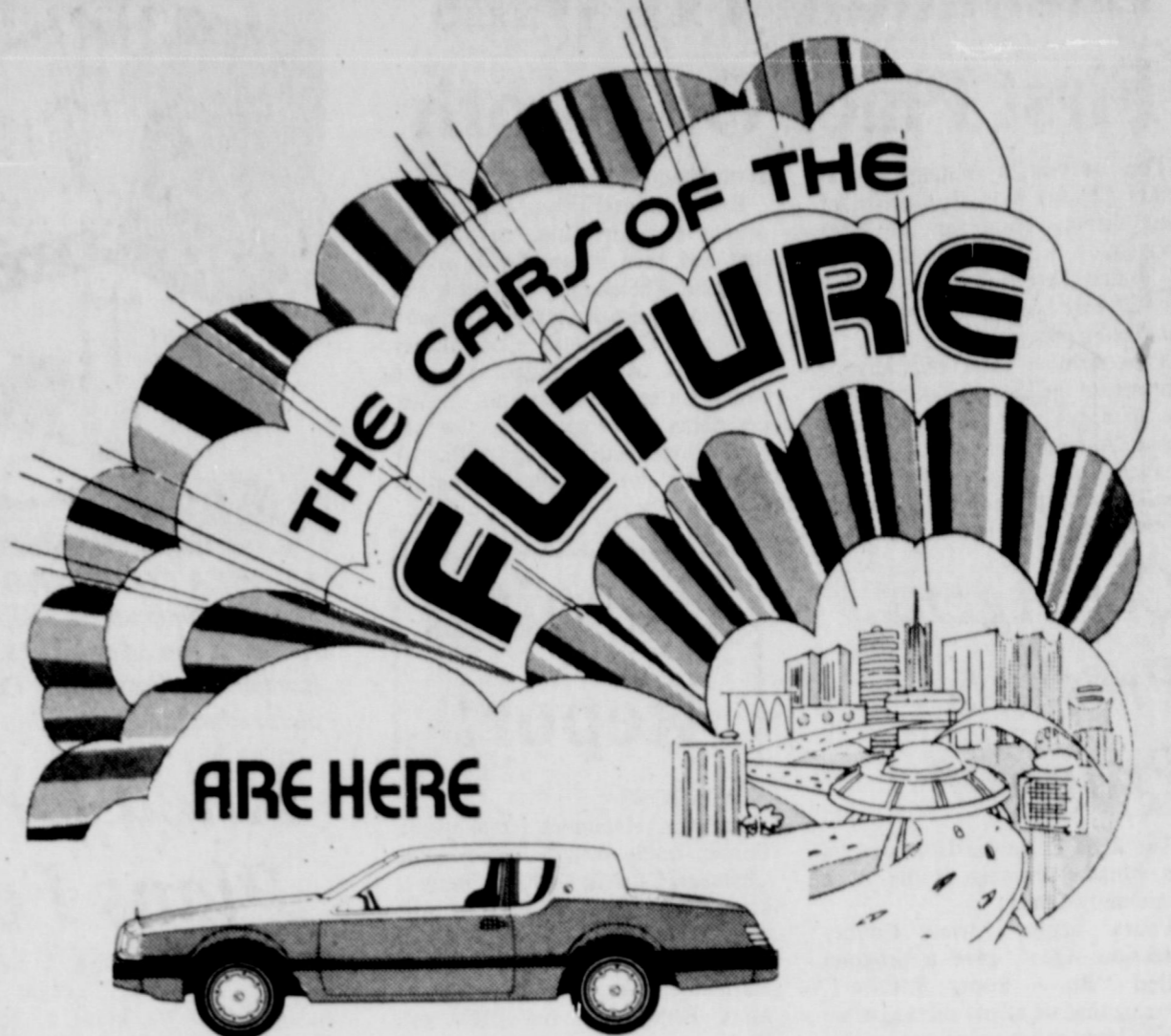
I would also support putting into effect recommendations of the small business task force initiated by the Governor. Two of these recommendations are especially appealing. One is to help small-business borrow money at better rates. Most small businesses which fail do so because they are under-capitalized. To help that situation, franchise tax money would be deposited in participating banks, which would, in turn, make loans at lower rates to small businesses.

The other recommendation is that we form a group of small business development centers at colleges and universities statewide. Money for the centers would come from the U.S. Small Business Administration, the state and participating schools. The centers would provide training, counseling and other help to small business owners so that they could be more competitive in the marketplace.

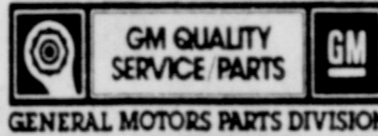

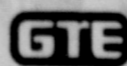

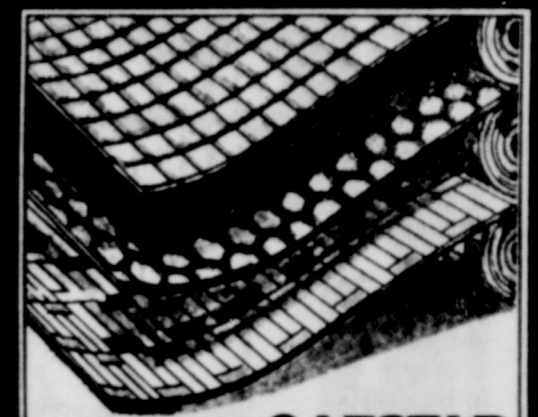
