MOST OF THE TALK this week is concerning the tragedy involving the seven deaths in the Chicago area which have been blamed on people taking what they believed to be extrastrength Tylenol, when the capsules had been filled with cyanide poison.

What kind of mad-man could perpetrate such a thing, in which innocent people--strangers--would be killed? It is a mind-boggling situation, since most people cannot imagine what would cause someone to act in this manner.

Psychologists have been quoted as saying that it is a very unusual situation when a person does something in this manner, which could cause the deaths of total strangers, and for no apparent

The sad part about this situation, in addition to the fact that it affected innocent victims, is that they each were attempting to make themselves feel better, either to relieve a headache or cold symptoms, when the end result was a very untimely death.

Another unfortunate side effect is that a well-known product has been adversely affected, probably to the point that it may never reach its former status on the drug counters. People may develop a suspicion in regard to Tylenol products that would make it virtually impossible to again be a success in the marketplace.

And prior to this past week, Tylenol was the most popular pain relief medicine on the market.

The whole situation is regretable. It is hoped that the perpetrator of all this madness would be caught, although at this point the chances of an arrest appear dim. At least society might get the opportunity of asking the person "why?" if the guilty party could be caught.

MEASURES DESIGNED to tighten control over abuses in the food stamp program have been announced by the Department of Human Resources, which administers the program in Texas.

Marlin Johnston said food stamp recipients in Texas have been instructed to sign each book of food stamps as soon as it is received so that no one else can use the stamps, and to have their food stamp ID card with them and be prepared to show it to their grocer whenever buying food with food stamps.

In addition, the department has redesigned the food stamp ID cards using special serial numbers and a new code to verify that the authorized family representative or family member is the only user of the card. All food stamp recipients will have the new cards by November 1.

In the past, Johnston said, the agency had limited controls over how many ID cards were issued to a family, since a family member or its authorized representative could claim to have forgotten or lost an ID card, and obtain new cards. This facilitated some program abuse through duplicate participation, Johnston said

The coding of the card is an innovation developed in Texas as an alternative to a more costly federal proposal that all food stamp ID cards carry the photograph of the participating family member or its authorized representative.

Johnston said 390,300 Texas households receive food stamps in a typical month with the average monthly food stamp allotment per household being \$135. There are three people in the average food stamp household, with 61 per cent of the recipients being children.

Audits and investigations conducted routinely by the department indicate a 1.8 per cent fraud rate in the program, Johnston said. Food stamp allotments per month in Texas total about \$53 million

### Derailment Suffered By Santa Fe

Twenty-one cars of a 72-car Santa Fe freight train derailed just south of Hi-Pro Feeds on the outskirts of Friona early last Saturday morning, causing a 15-hour break in rail service on the Santa Fe's main line from Chicago to Los Angeles.

The derailed cars spilled some of their freight along the right of way, and salvage operations were underway by the railroad throughout the day, along with clean-up procedures.

"Freight of all kinds" (FAK) was how Santa Fe official Bob Perry of Amarillo described the contents of the eastbound freight train.

Some of the things being hauled included cat food, water heaters, some furniture, and a couple of vans with tuna fish for human consumption, all from the West Coast area. Local youths were employed during the day, stacking crates of packaged items, which were reloaded onto other freight vans.

"We tried to keep from damaging the freight any worse than it was, and transferred it onto other vans," Perry

The Santa Fe spokesman blamed the derailment on "truck humping," where an empty freight car, under certain conditions, will oscillate, and with the right harmony, will "set over."

a.m. Saturday, October 2. The track was cleared and back in service by 5:15 p.m. that afternoon, after officials had projected 5 p.m. as their goal.

"That was an especially messy one," said Perry. "We pick up every bit of trash and debris, and attempt to leave the site exactly as it had been before."

Helping with the cleanup were Santa Fe officials from Amarillo and Clovis, as well as the Hulcher Emergency Service of Amarillo, a company with heavy equipment designed to pick up heavy loads, including two side-booms and a front-end loader. An enormous crew of Santa Fe workers was on hand throughout the day.

No one was hurt in the derailment.
The freight was described as a "run through," which Santa Fe was to transfer to Burlington in Kansas, for a final destination of Memphis, Tennessee.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 10, 1952

Committeemen representing the 13 counties in the Hi-Plains Water Conservation District voted to require permits for drilling water wells and to leave well spacing in the hands of county committees. The action, taken at a meeting in the Hotel Jim Hill at Hereford October 2, was a followup of recommendations made at recent county meetings in the district. Only one dissenting report was presented against the well permit and spacing action. Parmer County farmers, Committeemen Bruce Parr reported, are opposed to any rule which would limit their freedom in drilling wells.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 10, 1957 Easements for seven and twotenths miles of new farm-to-market road right-of-way has been arranged with property owners bordering the proposed road, reports E.G. 

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

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

### Friona, Tulia Vie For 2-3A Position

Two teams trying for a better season record were squaring off Friday at Chieftain Field when the Chiefs hosted the Tulia Hornets in the first district game of the 1982 season.

Friona went into the game with a 3-2 mark, and the Hornets were 2-3. The Hornets were contenders for their district title a year ago, but graduation stripped the team of most of its talent, and they were generally rated toward the bottom of district play this year.

But the Hornets raised some eyebrows by posting wins over Lockney and Idalou to open their season, but in the last three weeks,

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Tulia has lost in succession to Frenship, Floydada and River Road. so are wanting to break their losing streak.

But, speaking of streaks, Friona was hoping to break a seven-year jinx in which they had been unable to beat the Hornets, at home or away.

Friday's game marked the first time since 1961 for the two schools to play as members of the same district. Tulia and Friona had been district mates from 1941-47, and again from 1958-61.

In fact, there was a 12-year lapse of the series from 1962 through 1973, when the teams went into different districts.

Friona coach Tommy Moss has seen the Chieftains suffer more than their share of injuries during the past few weeks. Starters Max Perea and Mike Neill will be out with knee injuries. Runningback-kicker Mark Montoya was sick Friday morning and his status was questionable.

However, Juan Sammarron, defensive tackle, who suffered a bruised calf muscle against Farwell, was expected to play.

And runningback Richard Malouf, out with a broken arm, was to be fitted with a fiberglass cast which would enable him to re-join the team a week from Monday, for possible duty against Dimmitt.

### **Quarterly Report Shows Nice Gain**

Improved profitability from the sale of Company-owned cattle. particularly in the fourth quarter, and continued expansion of meat processing and distribution operations enabled Friona Industries, Inc. to generate net earnings of \$3,425,000, or \$1.57 per share, on sales of \$205 million for its fiscal year ended June 30, 1982.

This was a 51 per cent increase in net earnings and eight per cent higher sales than in the prior fiscal year.

All of our industry segments achieved good profitability," said Ron Davenport, chairman, president

"The main difference between fiscal 1981 and fiscal 1982 was in the Company-owned Cattle segment," he explained.

"In fiscal 1982 the Company sold about 17 per cent more cattle, or 74,000 head versus 63,000 head last year. The cost of purchasing and fattening the cattle was six per cent lower than in fiscal 1981."

Operating profits from the marketing of Company-owned Cattle amounted to \$2.3 million, compared to a \$392,000 loss reported in the prior fiscal year.

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## Late Rally Pushes Chiefs Past Rival Steers, 27 - 10

The Friona Chieftains awakened for 20 fourth-quarter points, to down the underdog Farwell Steers, 27-10 here last Friday in Friona's Homecoming game.

But, although Friona scored its tenth win over the Steers in the teams' last eleven meetings, it appeared for three quarters as though Farwell had borrowed a page from the past and was about to start a streak of their

In the final analysis, Farwell led in first downs and in total yardage, but Friona's big plays of the final seven minutes of the game made the difference.

The Steers took advantage of a big call in their favor in the first quarter, to take an early lead in the game. Farwell drove from their own 45 to the Friona 27, where they faced third down and 17 after a pair of tough defensive plays by the Chiefs.

But Friona was flagged for pass interference on a third down play, which looked to Friona fans like a good defensive play by Mark Montoya. That gave the Steers the ball at Friona's ten, and they scored on the next play.

Quarterback Alan Eubank hit runningback Santiago Lucio at the goal-line. Roger Robertson booted the point for a 7-0 Steer lead with 3:10 left in the first quarter.

Friona didn't bounce back right away, but on their fifth possession of the game, took advantage of a poor Farwell punt. Preceding the punt was an errant pitchout, which lost 17 yards back to the Farwell eight, with the Steers lucky to maintain possession. The ball rolled out of bounds before Friona could recover.

But three plays later Friona took over on the Farwell 28 after the short

Charlie Morgan gained a quick nine yards, Reese Fleming made 13 yards up the middle, and Morgan scored from three yards out. Montoya's kick tied the score at 7-all with 5:14 left in the half.

Friona had another good chance to score after again backing the Steers up and taking the ball at their own 40.

A face mask penalty moved the ball to the Farwell 45, and Morgan made eight yards.

Quarterback Bruce Patterson made a nice 15-yard run on the option play, to the Farwell 21, but lost the ball as he was tackled, and Farwell recovered to stop the Friona threat.

Things didn't change for the Chieftains in the third quarter, especially after Farwell mounted an 18-play drive which resulted in a field goal. Similar to the preceding week, Friona had the ball only 21/2 minutes of playing time in the quarter, with Farwell holding it the other 91/2 minutes.

The Steers converted three fourth down plays during the drive, to retain possession. Friona's defense finally stiffened inside their own ten, and forced Robertson to try a field goal. The kick resembled a dying quail, but it topped the crossbar, and Farwell had a 10-7 lead with 1:34 left in the

The next time Farwell got the ball, it looked as though they were out to increase their lead. Montoya punted the Steers into a hole at the Farwell eight, but they recovered nicely and drove across midfield.

Finally, a rib-rocking tackle separated Robby Armstrong from the ball at the Friona 37, and Friona began a drive of its own.

Reese Fleming was the man of the hour from the Farwell 44. He shook off two or three would-be tacklers and rambled 44 yards for the TD, giving Friona the lead for the first time in the game. Montoya's kick made the margin 10-7 with 7:06 left in

Still, Farwell didn't give up, and came out with a passing attack that moved the ball from their own 22 to the Friona 33 in short order. But Friona held on a fourth down play from their own 33, to prevent the Steers from regaining the lead.

And, with most folks thinking mainly of trying to run out the clock with just over three minutes left, Morgan went one better. He found a hole after taking a pitchout, and then outraced the Steer defenders enroute to a 67-yard touchdown scamper which sealed the verdict. Montoya kicked a 26-yard PAT after a penalty, and the lead became 21-10 with 2:54

Farwell tried a little razzle-dazzle on the kickoff, which backfired. The Steers tried a reverse handoff, but the two crossing backs fumbled, and David Hough claimed the ball at the Farwell nine.

Four plays later, Friona once again found the end zone, with Morgan going over from the one. The PAT try was missed, but Friona had scored 20 points in 5:18 of playing time, to completely change the complexion of the game.

Morgan's 166 yards rushing led all players in this category, with Fleming's 90 yards, including the goahead touchdown, aiding the cause greatly, especially with two of the Chieftains' starting backs (Richard Malouf and Max Perea) sidelined with injuries.

"Farwell had an exceptional night in passing. I don't think they've done that well all season. They got the momentum after that first touchdown, and we had a hard time getting the upper hand," said Coach

## Hospital Auxiliary Meets **Needs Of Local Facility**

"I don't know how we would exist without the help of the Auxiliary" said Elda Hart, manager of Parmer County Community Hospital. As one tours the hospital they see an abundance of the society's projects.

Walk into the waiting room and see the tasteful drapes, carpet, decorating and furnishings which came from Auxiliary funds. In patient rooms decorations and curtains are renewed and maintained as the need arises and the automatic beds, bedtables, lockers and most of the chairs are the outcome of Auxiliary projects.

Two maternity rooms were furnished at a cost of \$3,500.00, and an auto-clave machine for \$3,000.00. In the kitchen a microwave oven and new silverware were provided. In the surgery, an anesthetic machine and surgical light have long been in use due to Auxiliary projects.

An I.B.M. typewriter was needed in the office and was forthcoming. The latest purchase is new lab equipment at \$12,000.00. For an organization that just celebrated its silver anniversary, this is a pretty good track record.

Back in August of 1956, June Spring suggested to other doctors' wives and wives of hospital board members that they form an organization to help the hospital, such a group as worked for hospitals in larger towns.

Representatives from around the area were invited to attend, but the group has mostly been made up of Friona women, an outgrowth of the Modern Study Club. They organized and became Parmer County Community Hospital Auxiliary and their aim was to help the hospital in any conceivable way.

Katy Osborn was the first elected president and Eufaula Ethridge her secretary-treasurer. Other early members were Mesdames Paul Spring, Frank Spring, Eugene Ellis, Dean Bingham, Roy Clements, J.T. Gee, Carl Schlenker, Guy Latta, Deon Awtrey, Bill Stewart, A.L. Black, Pete Buske, M.B. Buchanan, Rene Snead, A.W. Anthony Sr., A.W. Anthony, Jr., and Lucy Vestal.

The first major task of the newlyformed club was to have guided tours of the new hospital before patients were transferred from the old barracks building and 470 people took the tours and were treated to refreshments.

The big moving day was October 6, 1956 and the auxiliary served breakfast to the patients and a total of 85 lunches to patients and workers

that day. Even in a new hospital the group found room for improvement and were soon raising funds for landscaping the hospital grounds, subscribing to popular magazines for the waiting room and creating a children's corner in the waiting room equipped with rocking horse, toys, books, and tyke-sized furniture. Here each Christmas, a tall decorated tree brought ohs and ahs from the small

The Hospital Auxiliary has three ways of raising money to pay for their various projects, the most successful

being the spring and fall rummage sales. Auxiliary members and friends of the hospital turn out their closets and donate good, used clothing and household wares, toys, costume jewelry and knick-knacks. A local merchant grants the use of an empty downtown store and the various committees go to work. These rummage sales bring in over \$2,000.00 annually.

Another money-making project is T.V. rental. For \$2 a day, a patient may rent a color television set to while away long hours of hospitalization. The T.V. committee collects and banks these fees, pays for repair, upkeep and insurance on the sets and the rest is profit.

In 1968 the Hospital Memorial Fund was begun, and this helps the hospital auxiliary to buy new furnishings, etc. Instead of sending funeral flowers, a donation in the name of the deceased may be made at the Friona State Bank or directly to the hospital.

Cards of acknowledgement are then mailed to the bereaved family listing the name of the donor. This is a living memorial and money paid into this fund has already furnished the two maternity rooms.


The Hospital Auxiliary has now begun its 26th year of dedicated service and another generation of Friona ladies has become active in its doings. President for 1982-84 is Doris Barnett, neice of the first president, Katy Osborn. Doris would like to invite all interested ladies of the community to meet with the auxiliary on the first Tuesday of each month, 2 p.m. in the Sun Room of the hospital.


"The work is not timeconsuming," said Doris. "Perhaps you will help on the T.V. committee, the decorating committee or the new equipment committee. Everyone gives from 2-4 hours each year to the rummage sales, but this is a lot of fun in the company of other willing workers.'

"Hospital costs are climbing higher and higher," said Elda Hart. "Check around most other towns, Amarillo, Lubbock, and you will see, the costs in Friona would be a lot higher if it wasn't for all the assistance given by the auxiliary. We are more than grateful to the other service clubs in town, for their generous donations, but the auxiliary is strictly a hospital organization and we can never thank them enough."

That's how it is in Friona. Parmer County built their own hospital and local folks go right on helping out. Whatever needs the hospital may have in the future, be sure the ladies of Parmer County Community Hospital Auxiliary will provide the ways and means to meet those needs.

### Cooperative Announces 42 Per Cent Increase

Effective November 1, 1982, members of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative will have their electric bills computed under a new rate

"In these days of steadily rising costs, Deaf Smith REC is fortunate to wait this long before implementing a rate increase," stated Board member Donald Wright of Dimmitt.

The new rate will consist of a 42 per cent average increase over the previous rate. This does not indicate all rates have increased 42 per cent, but rather an average of all services combined on our system will increase about 42 per cent based on 1981


The wholesale power contract which our power suppliers have been governed by the past ten years expires this month. In addition to increases in the wholesale power, normal operating expenses have continued to increase due to inflation. These two items are responsible for the proposed rate adjustment.

Deaf Smith Electric has postponed this rate increase as long as possible. Now more than ever before, fixed expenses account for the largest

portion ever, of our total cost of service. For example, wholesale power cost, depreciation, interest, and taxes alone amount to 89 per cent of the total cost of electric service. These are expenses that are completely beyond the control of cooperative management and the Board of Directors.

Wright explained, "We realize people of this area share the concern over the rising cost of production which includes cost of electricity, and trust you understand our plight and efforts to minimize these inevitable rate increases."

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


Others attending were Duval Burton, District Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service and his

The purpose of the meeting is to review developments affecting Texas conservation programs and to plan future conservation district programs and activities. Governor Bill Clements will highlight the program when he will address the group at their banquet in the Hyatt Regency's ballroom on Tuesday evening.

Other speakers scheduled for the meeting include Mark White, Attorney General of Texas; State Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls; State Representative Jerry Clark of Buna; and Milton E. "Bud" Mekelburg of Yuma, Colorado, president, National Association of Conservation Districts.

As the state's chief enforcement officer, Attorney General White co-chairs the Federal-State Law Enforcement Coordinating Committee and is a member of the Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Council. He is also chairman of the Southern Conference of Attorneys General. White will speak at the Tuesday morning general session.

Senator Farabee, who will also speak at the Tuesday morning general session, currently serves on the Legislative Budget Board and the



Governor's Task Force on Water. Though he serves on several other committees, he is particularly noted for his interest in strengthening Texas agriculture.

Representative Clark will also address conservation district directors at the Tuesday general session. He is a member of the House Natural Resources Committee and vice-chairman of the Energy Resources Committee. He is also a member of the Western States Legislative Forestry Task Force and a member of the Coastal Subcommittee on Natural Resources.

Mekelburg, a farmer and businessman, is a spokesman for the nation's 3,000 soil and water conservation districts. NACD's primary purpose is to serve its member conservation districts in the conservation, orderly development and wise use of the nation's natural resources. Mekelburg is scheduled to speak at the Wednesday morning general session.

Joe Montgomery of Abilene, president, Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts, will also address the group. Charles D. Clark of Menard, president, Hill Country Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, will real come the group to Austin

Four concurrent workshops will be conducted on subjects of interest to SWCD directors on Tuesday afternoon. Each workshop will be repeated.

The workshops will feature discussions on district program development, conservation legislation, district operations and a session on recent technological developments in range management.

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





### Microfiche Makes Paperwork Easy

James E. Denney claims he can put 18 file cabinets full of documents into a single shoe box.

How?

He's not a magician, but he has a huge camera that reduces the documents onto small sheets of microfilm, called microfiche.

Denney said some government agencies and private companies are awash in a sea of paper work and overflowing file cabinets and he wants to come to their rescue.

Denney's company, Timely Information Management Enterprises, Inc., open since January, is working on microfiche projects with the Law Revisions Commission and a local accounting firm.

"This is the answer for people who have cases and cases of paper," Denney said.

Behind a bolted door (many of the documents are both valuable and private) in the Julale Shopping Center, Guam, Denney and two assistants are busy using a giant camera to take the picture of thousands of documents on microfiche, a type of film card.

"Our customers are realizing a savings in space and time," Denney

He said the microfiche is indexed, making it easier to find documents and harder to misplace them.

"It's one thing to keep records, it's

another to keep them safe and immediately retrievable," Denney said.

To retrieve a document, the customer simply slips an indexed microfiche card into a reader-printer machine to look over or make prints of documents.

Other advantages to storing reduced-size documents on film, Denney said, is that termites don't eat film, and the film quality is guaranteed by its maker for 99 years.

Microfilm-stored documents are acceptable in court, Denney added.

Denney, 33, said he started T-I-M-E with just \$5,000 and he has more contracts in line. He said he wants to provide complete micrographic services and will expand his business to include standard 35mm microfilm services when a customer wants it.

Most of Denney's work experience lies in computers. He spent 15 years as a data processor for banks on the U.S. mainland and he runs a sister company to T-I-M-E called TRIAD Computer Developers Inc. It offers software and computer operating

Denney and his wife, Peggy, a free lance court reporter, came to Guam in 1979 on invitation from his inlaws, Dr. Don and Jeannie Weaver,

currently residing in Guam. Before starting up T-I-M-E, Denney had computer analysis and design contracts with the Department of Education and a local bank.



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
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
