# **Marlene Drake Is Contest Winner**

Marlene Drake was the winner of the "strike week" of the Friona Star's football contest, missing only one of the 14 games which counted in the contest.

Marlene, longtime contest entrant, was one of only two contestants entering the fourth week of the event who correctly picked 13 of the 14 games. She claimed the week's top prize on the basis of the tie-breaker game.

Even the tie-breaker game had to be re-arranged, after the National Football League strike. The Friona-Dalhart game was used to break the tie. Luckily for contest editors, all the contestants involved in the top places had written in the Friona-Dalhart score

Mrs. Drake missed the Chieftain-Dalhart score by 18 points (as any good FHS fan would have), to edge out Kemal Tongate for the week's top prize of \$10.00 cash.

Tongate, the other contestant to miss only one game, missed the tiebreaker score by 22 points. Mrs. Drake picked Friona to win, 10-7, and Tongate picked the Chieftains, 17-10.

All eight of the NFL games which had been included on the slate of games, printed prior to the strike announcement, were disregarded, and 14 became the best possible score for the week

Thirteen contestants had scores of 12, and from this group, Martha Clements claimed third place in the weekly race.

Mrs. Clements (who might have an edge over some contestants, since she has children in Dalhart) missed the game score by just one point, pegging Dalhart to win, 23-7.

Other contestants correctly picking 13 games were Jackie Morgan, Cara Brockman, Kenneth McLellan, Danny Guerra, Rodney Allen, Phillip Johnson, Ruth Smith, Cynthia C. Smith, Sam Drager, Jack Clark, Charlie Fleming, and one contestant who failed to sign their entry blank. The need for using the Friona-Dalhart game for the tie-breaker score was announced locally at midweek and posted at the Star office, and most of the contestants managed to make the change. Only the mailed-

in entries failed to get the message, but none of these were in the running for a top spot.

"We appreciate the cooperation and flexibility of the contestants in this unusual circumstance," said Star publisher Bill Ellis. The Friona Chieftain game will be used as tiebreaker for the remainder of the season, as it's very unlikely that the Chieftains will go on strike.

Mrs. Drake's only miss was in picking Nebraska over Penn State, one of the college games which troubled most contestants. Tongate called this particular game right, but missed by picking BYU over Air Force, one of the one-point upsets on the list.

Mrs. Clements missed both of these games, but came back on her point prediction to nail down third place.

Other games which troubled contestants included Oklahoma-Southern Cal, Littlefield-Post, Michigan-UCLA, and Boys Ranch-Clarendon.

Mrs. Clements used her 12 to pull into a first-place tie with John Seright of Lubbock and Clint Mears of WTSU for the contest lead. (Seright was the outright leader of the contest a week ago with a score of 47, but his score was inadvertantly omitted .--Sorry about that, John!)

Jack Clark, who entered the contest even while a hospital patient in Lubbock, and Coach Tom Johnson are tied for second place at 55.

Marlene Drake, David Gowens, Phillip Johnson, Eddie Mann and Kenneth McLellan are in a five-way tie for third place at 54. Scores of all the leading contestants may be found elsewhere in this issue.

The contest leader at the conclusion of the 13-week event will be awarded \$100.00 as grand prize in the annual event.



State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.





# **Chiefs Fall To Dalhart** In Bruising Battle, 22-7

For awhile there last Friday, it looked as though the 1982 Friona Chieftains might break a longstanding jinx by becoming the first Friona football team to win a game against Dalhart at Dalhart.

The Chiefs had been impressive in holding a 7-0 lead at halftime, a lead which they carried into the last quarter.

But the roof caved in on the Chieftains in the final quarter, with all the breaks going Dalhart's way, and the hard-hitting Wolves earning many of the turn-arounds, as the hosts scored 22 final-period points for the 22-7 win.

The final score was not at all indicative of the game, and Dalhart's final touchdown would never have come about except that Friona. trailing 14-7, called three time outs in a row in hopes of getting the ball back, only to see Dalhart score a third touchdown with 54 seconds left in the game.

The Chieftains discovered early in the game that they were in for a tough evening, after failing to score twice from a third and goal situation from the Dalhart one-foot line.

Friona had started the game with a bang, when kick returner Mike Neill ran the opening kickoff back 56 vards, from his own goal-line to the Dalhart 44.

Runningback Charlie Morgan gave the team a first down at the Dalhart 34, and then a big pass play from Bruce Patterson to Mark Montoya on third and 13 kept the drive alive. Montoya was forced out of bounds at the Dalhart seven.

Morgan picked up close to five yards on first down, and then on second down it looked as though he had scored, but officials spotted the ball just outside the Dalhart goal-line.

And that's where the ball stayed, as Morgan was stopped for no gain on third down, and then trying for the TD on fourth down, Patterson was "d for a two-yard loss on a

touste "lay. The Wolves surprised Friona tom that, running one play which gai ed only a yard, and then pulling a qu ck-kick from their own end zone. The punt was good for 66 yards, but Neill corralled it and ran the ball back to midfield.

situation for both teams, as the two defensive-minded teams, like a pair of heavyweight boxers, sparred with each other, but never could get in a scoring lick.

Friona did pick up its fourth first down of the half on a Patterson to Max Perea pass for nine yards and then a one-yard gain by Perea. That moved the ball to the Dalhart 49, but a pass interception and a face-mask penalty against the Chieftains ruined that drive. A few minutes later, Dalhart had good field position after recovering a fumble at the Friona 29.

In fact, it took an interception by Neill at the Friona 13 to prevent Dalhart from getting on the scoreboard first after the series of bad breaks for Friona.

Late in the half Dalhart had the ball and mounted a drive. The Wolves picked up a pair of first downs, and then aided by a 15-yard penalty against the Chiefs, had the ball at Friona's 18, their deepest penetration of the first half.

But at this point, lightning struck the Wolves. Cornerback Patterson intercepted a halfback pass by the Wolves at about the Friona 20, and ran an 80-yard dash up the north sidelines into the end zone for the touchdown.

Montoya's PAT kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead. The score came with 59 seconds left in the half.

It's too bad for the Chieftains that there wasn't a flood, or other act of nature that would have cancelled the second half, because it all belonged to Dalhart.

Friona fans were suspicious of the changing of momentum when Dalhart had the ball for about 10:30 of playing time in the third quarter, to 1:30 for Friona. The Chieftains had the ball for only three plays which gained nine yards, and then a punt.

Late in the quarter, the Wolves mounted their only sustained drive of the night, mixing up their offense to drive from their own 36 to the Friona eight, where the quarter ended.

But on the second play of the final quarter, the Wolves punched over a touchdown to get on the scoreboard. Dalhart opted to go for a two-point conversion, but a pass try was foiled, so Friona held onto a one-point lead

idle virtually all the third quarter, apparently went stale, and twice more the team was unable to muster a first down.

Midway through the quarter, came the play which may have turned the game in Dalhart's favor. Friona had the Wolves backed to their own ten, after a Montoya punt to the Dalhart eight.

But quarterback Chris Smith hit end Richard Steel with a long pass, and Steel was finally tackled at the other end of the field, at the Friona 13, by Jeff Lundy. Friona safety Mike Neill pulled up lame on the play, which was a factor in Dalhart being able to complete the long pass, a 77-yard gainer.

Two plays later, the Wolves converted the break into points by scoring a touchdown. This time the two-pointer clicked and Dalhart had a 14-7 lead with 4:57 left in the game.

"That pass (the 77-yard gainer) was an interception all the way. We had it played perfectly, but Neill pulled up lame. If we'd had the interception, we could've turned the game around the other way, but that's just one of several big 'ifs'," said Coach Tommy Moss this week.

Friona picked up its only first down of the second half with less than three minutes to play, then disaster struck in the form of an intercepted pass.

Dalhart was content to run out the clock, but the Chieftains, trying desperately to get the ball, used all their time outs, only to see the Wolves score another touchdown on a fourth

down run with 54 seconds left. The two-point conversion completed the nightmare fourth quarter and the game, with a final score of 22-7.

The Chieftain offense was hurt when Max Perea also suffered a knee injury early in the game, and didn't carry the ball afterwards.

"It was really a hard-hitting game. We thought Dalhart played their best game of the season, and the final score was not indicative of the closeness of the game," Moss said. . . .

Child abuse is the intentional abuse of a child by an adult--usually in the home. It may be physical, sexual or emotional abuse.

In 1980, the Texas Department of Human Resources received nearly 50,000 reports of child abuse which were confirmed

Fifty per cent of those who die of abuse and neglect are under age six. As many as 85 per cent of the persons in prison for violent crime are believed to have been abused or neglected as children.

There is a child protection law in Texas. It says you MUST report child abuse. It's a misdemeanor if you do not. This is not to threaten you -- it's to save children.

The law protects those who report child abuse, if the report is made in good faith. You don't even have to give your name.







The Friona Woman's Club met Wednesday, September 22 at Federated Club House.


