#### SCALDED TO DEATH.

H. N. Walker, fireman on engine pulling local between Baird and Big Springs was scalded to death at the sand pit on the hill west of town Tuesday morning. So far as we can learn the accident occurred as follows: The engine went in on the side track to pull out some loaded cars, and went back the second time to place some empty cars on track and in coming out the engine turned over and caught Mr. Walker under the engine and escaping steam from a broken pipe scalded him to death. The engineer, Zack Mullins jumped when the engine started to turn over but Mr. Walker was caught in some way and lost his life.

It was a horrible accident and again exemplifies the danger all train men, especially engineers and firemen are exposed to at all times. Mr. Walker leaves a wife, formerly Miss Nora Hammonds, of Baird and three children and to them THE STAR extends heartfelt sympathy in their bereavement.

The body was brought to Baird on the passenger train and prepared for burial by undertaker, Schwartz and shipped to Big Springs Tuesday night where enternment was made yesterday.

#### BONUS FOR SOLDIERS

The bill allowing all honorably discharged soldiers from the U. S. Army a bonus of \$60.00 has passed, and signed by the President, effective Feb., 25. This means that all honorably discharged soldiers will receive \$60.00 in addition to their regular pay.

#### ANOTHER BURGLARY

Burglars entered the dry goods department of B. L. Boydston's store last Friday night. A lot of men's and ladies' fine clothing, fine shoes and silk was taken. John Asbury says the total value of the goods taken was about \$1000. They must be a lightened outfit as only the finest and best grades of goods were taken. This is the biggest haul robbers ever secured in Baird at one time and such losses are serious. The city should put at least one large street "gas" light in each alley back of the two main business blocks where practically all the robberies occur. Then all business houses should have heavy iron grating outside of each door and window, front and rear. With plenty of lights in streets and alleys with heavy iron bars over openings it would be more difficult for even expert cracksmen to break into business houses, and no doubt many a robbery would then be prevented.

#### OIL NEWS.

The Cathey No. 1 drilled by R. O. Harvey & Co., blew in during the past week, and it is estimated that same will be a producer of at least 500 barrels of oil per day, when opened. This well is now closed down for storage, and as soon as storage is provided same will be opened. This well has caused a great deal of excitement among the oil men, and the crowd who have been singing "Putnam is a dry hole" have all closed up now, and are now enjoying the excitement and high prices of leases and royalties.

The Trustees of the Putnam High School have leased the 4 acre tract on which the building is located at \$500.00 per acre.

Leases within 2 miles of the well are selling from \$100.00 to \$250.00 per acre.

Several large sales of royalties have been made at from \$50.00 per acre and up.

Callahan County will soon get the development to which it is entitled, and by the Putnam well coming in, Callahan County is destined to be the best territory in the field, and all of the large companies are represented here, and drilling will be commenced in earnest.

Cordwint No. 1, drilling at 900 ft Hart No 1 is again drilling at 2456 ft after underreaming for the past month.

Hart No 2, Roxana, all material on ground except boiler.

Litzinger, Albin's No. 1, is drilling at 1100 feet.

Henderson Oil & Gas Co., Childs No. 1, is drilling at 1658 feet.

Odom No. 1, drilling will commence next week.

John R. Dawkins and Associates of Dallas have made a location on the Cordwint ranch. This well will be about three-quarters of a mile northwest of West Caddo Peak.

Clyde Callahan County Oil Co., will make a location next week, about four miles west of Baird, for a deep test. This is a local company, and practically all funds necessary for a deep test have been raised.

Baird property is going sky-high. Business lots worth \$250.00 a year ago are now selling at \$1500 to \$2000.00. Residence property has also advanced.

J. D. Boydston has sold his home place to T. P. Bearden, and the Home Telephone Company. The latter will erect an office building on this property during the summer.

Vacant lots are in demand, with practically none to be had.

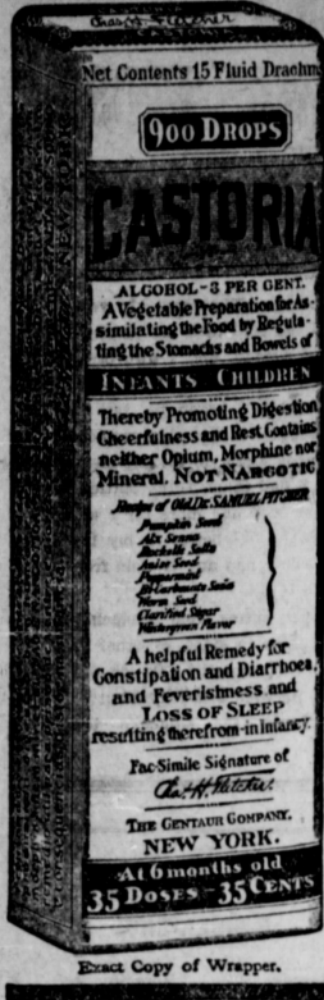

### Texas News

More than fifty French orphans have been adopted by the people of Hays county.

The Girls Canning Club at Webster, which has done excellent work in the past, reorganized this week, with a membership of 12 girls.

Tom Green county on March 29 will vote on a \$500,000 bond issue, according to an order unanimously passed by the county commissioners court.

A petition has been circulated at Freeport asking the State highway commission to designate a road from Rosenberg to Freeport as a State highway.

The \$200,000 bond issue for the Freeport road district has been sold and construction work on the roads will start as soon as the road routes can be laid out.

West Columbia oil field has grown in the past two and a half months from a hamlet of probably a dozen houses to a town of more than one hundred houses.

Forty-one leases for oil and gas have been filed for record the past week at Coleman. The leases embrace a section of county about eight miles south of Coleman.

Governor Hobby has signed senate resolution directing that the Texas flag be displayed inside of school houses instead of being exposed to the weather on flag poles.

Work has been started by the government in dredging out what is known as Harbor Island in the turning basin at Beaumont. Congress appropriated \$75,000 for the work.

According to J. C. Eisenbraut, county farm demonstrator, 6,500 acres of unthrashed rice remains in the fields of Jefferson county at the present time. Rains have prevented thrashing.

The citizens of Eastland have furnished capital for building a branch line of railroad connecting Eastland with Mangum, and work is to start on the seven-mile stretch in a few days.

The Travis county grand jury adjourned Friday. No indictment was returned against Ranger Captain K. F. Cunningham, who was charged with the killing of Ranger B. C. Veale in South Austin February 7.

Rockwall county has just voted bonds in the sum of \$800,000 for the construction of permanent roads. Rockwall county is the smallest of the counties in Texas, having an area of about one-fourth of the average county in the State.

The financial statement of the state prison commission for January, filed this week with the governor, shows receipts aggregating \$99,264 and total disbursements during the month of \$264,953, leaving a balance of \$996.37 on hand January 31.

The Texas Cotton Association will hold its annual meeting in Galveston on March 7 and 8. The membership of the Texas Cotton Association is composed of all leading cotton exporters, shippers, buyers and brokers of the State to the number of about 150.

The commissioners courts of Brazoria and Matagorda counties are asking the State highway commission to designate a road from east to west through both counties as a State highway. This would give a road through Brazoria county in two directions, north, south, east and west.

The Texas Iron and Steel Company, with a capital stock of \$10,000,000, incorporated under the laws of Delaware, has been granted a permit by the secretary of state to do business in Texas. The business of the company is to be transacted in Cass and Marion counties, with headquarters at Dallas.

A reunion of all the men from Dallas county who served in the army, navy or marine corps during the war will be held during the State Fair of Texas at Dallas in October, at which time citizens of city and county will unite in extending to them a welcome upon their return home from France and the training camps.

Organization of War Savings Societies in every Texas school is recommended by Miss Annie Webb Blanton, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, in a communication being sent out to all school officials in the State. She urges that instruction in the elements of economies and thrift be included in the curriculum of every school.

Four cars of purebred Holstein dairy cows, for distribution among Texas farmers, will be purchased by C. M. Evans, dairy husbandman of the Agricultural and Mechanical College extension service, who is now visiting points in Ohio for that purpose. A car and a half of the cows will go to Lamar county and one car will go to Nacogdoches county, while smaller shipments will be distributed among the farmers of Limestone and Deaf Smith counties.

The cost of public playground parks and similar recreational features for the benefit of all our people drops into insignificance when compared with the priceless value of safeguarding the health of our men, women and children. And the knowledge that we are doing our full duty in creating conditions which will increase happiness, elevate morals and produce better citizens. The physique of people in cities is deteriorating, and the only way it can be safeguarded and made more efficient is through proper provision of light and air, which are hygienically basic, and healthful amusement, fun and recreation, which are the greatest lubricants for physical welfare and the greatest protection for moral health.

The ideal of a city, however, must rise above mere commercial and industrial supremacy, taking the higher ground of becoming an attractive, composite home for its residents, both of large and small means, as well as for the stranger within its gates. While the wealthier class of citizens in any community can build up beautiful residence sections on well-laid-out avenues and boulevards, what will become of those who have neither organization nor money to aid them in intelligently planning the most meager comforts of ordinary home surroundings? The interests of the inhabitants of the most unfortunate districts must be safeguarded.—Chicago News.

### FOR BETTER PUBLIC HEALTH

Attention of Rural Communities Drawn to Necessary Steps in That Direction.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Much remains to be done in rural districts, according to the annual report of the secretary of agriculture, to control such pests as mosquitoes and the hookworm, to eliminate the sources of typhoid fever, and, even more, to give the country districts the advantage of modern hospitals, nursing and specialized medical practice.

Noting that many agencies, some of them private enterprises with large funds, are working for improvement, the report says that the department of agriculture, through its home demonstration service, is giving valuable aid, and the public-health service is increasingly extending its functions.

To what extent the further projection of effort is a matter for state or local action remains to be determined, says the secretary, but it seems clear that there should be no cessation of activities until there has been completed in every rural community of the Union an effective sanitary service and, through the provision of adequate machinery, steps taken to control and eliminate the sources of disease and to provide the necessary modern medical and dental facilities, easily accessible to the mass of the people.

### Truly Peculiar Bequest.

Some years ago there died in Montreal a wealthy old Scotsman who had been noted for his shrewdness in business matters. One of the bequests in his long will was a hairbrush that he had used for many years. This hairbrush he gave to his nephew, with the proviso that the said brush should be kept in the family vault two months out of twelve.

During the brush's sojourn in the vault the legatee was not to brush, comb or cut his hair. The acceptance of the brush meant that the nephew was to inherit and enjoy two-thirds of the estate, and we have not the slightest doubt that this fortunate young man willingly became a "shock-headed Peter" in order to fulfill his eccentric uncle's wishes.

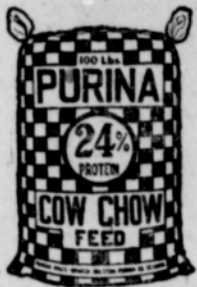

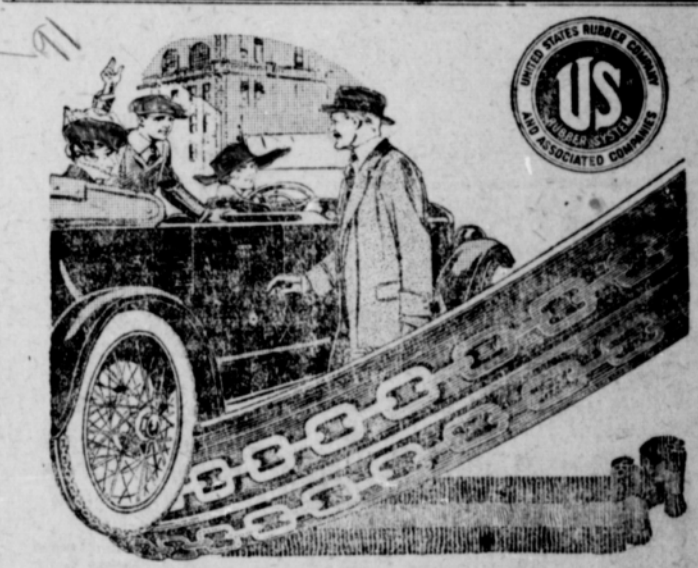
