OIL PRODUCTION TAX **MEASURE ENGROSSED**

HOUSE BILL LEVIES TAX OF TWO PER CENT ON RECEIPTS FOR GROSS PRODUCTION.

Austin, Texas .- In the senate final passage has been recorded the house bill creating a State Board of Dental Examiners and regulating the prac tice of dentistry. The measure pro-vides for a board of six members, who shall pass upon all applications for license to practice dental surgery in Texas and, furthermore, issue new licenses for those already held by dentists practicing at this time. Any dentist who shall advertise or solicit business under any nom de plume or corporation name shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and subject it

Austin, Texas.-The public utilities bill, which has finally passed the senate, provides the railroad commission shall have supervision over all public utilities, except those municipally owned and those operated under the "service for cost plan."

The railroad commission may initiate hearings, or in the event muni cipalities and utilities disagree as to rates, charges or services, either may appeal to the railroad commission. Individuals may lodge complaints railroad commission

Under the bill the railroad com mission has full power and authority to fix rates, prescribe rules and reg-ulations and compel efficient service. local and long-distance, electricity, gas and water companies and gas pipe lines.

PRINCE LEOPOLD IS **NOW IN CUSTODY**

Special Session is to be Called.

Austin, Texas.-The regular session of the thirty-sixth legislature will end about March 21 and there will be no special session until plans made in the governor's office are followed. This was the purport of an agreement reached in a conference in the executive office between Governor Hobby and several members of the house and senate headed by Speaker Thomasson. It was the opinion o the governor that the members might work a week at \$2 per day to finish important bills now on the calendar, and he would call them on June 16.

Civil War Threatened in Bavaria.

Weimer.-Civil war is threatened in Bavaria unless a compromise is fected between two rival elements which set up separate governments following the assassination of Premier Eisner, according to advice received here. The combined soldiers, peas ants and workmen's soviets seized government machinery and proclaim ed a communist republic. A few hours later the majority and independent socialists effected an amalgamation, organized a central council and claimed the right to administer the affairs of the whole of Bavaria

Lean Campaign Will Begin April 21 Washington.-Scores of telegrams reaching the treasury indicated existence of a wide misapprehension that the Victory Liberty loan had been abandoned or modified materially by decision of the House Ways and Means committee to authorize issuance of notes instead of bonds. This prompted Secretary Glass to reinterate that the campaign would be as planned, that it would popular in nature with the exception selling the securities to millions of Americans of small means.

WANT THE RAILROADS RETURNED TO OWNERS

OPPOSE BILL TO APPROPRIATE \$750,000,000 MORE TO COVER FEDERAL OPERATION.

Washington.-Five members of the Texas delegation, Representatives Black, Connally, Dies, Jones and Mansfield, and one Oklahoma member, Mr. Chandler, have voted against final passage of the bill appropriat-ing \$750,000,000 to be added to the revolving fund of \$500,000,000 already appropriated for use in connection with the government's operation of the railroads.

The Texans named, together with Representatives McLemore and Ray burn, supported Mr. Rayburn's amendment requiring that federal control be terminated by Dec. 31, 1919, which was defeated by the house. Mr. Rayburn has introduced a separate bill to carry his amendment into effect. He contended that the railroad own ers ought to know when the proper ties would be returned, and the gov ernment ought to have a date fixed so congress could work with a defi-

nite purpose in view.
"The lesson in government opera tion of railroads has indeed been a costly and bitter one," said Mr. Ray-burn to the house. "It will cost us millions upon millions of dollars to ever get out of this thing. joint stock company, or association of persons, acting oy agreement declaration of trust or otherwise, or ganized for profit, which are now at tempting or shall hereafter attempt to sell or contract to sell any stocks shall, before offering for sale or contracting to sell any stock, or reased stock, file under oath in the office of the secretary of state statement showing in full detail the plan upon which the promoters or those having in charge the sale such stock propose to sell same, together with a copy of all the forms of contract, stocks to be used, the names, location and domicile of all persons who desire to offer for sale such stocks, and if a company corporation, the names of its officers promoters and their addresses; the mount of capital stock and amount at which the stock is to be sold, and such other information as the secretary of state may require; if a foreign corporation, it must file with the secretary a copy of the gestion. Here is instant relief! charter; such statement shall also show the commission, promotion fee and other incidental expenses proposed to be charged for its organiza tion, and how the commissions and fees are to be paid.

I. The Spies Sent Out (13:17-20).

Less than two years have passed since the Israelites were delivered from Egyptian bondage. They are now at Kadesh-Barnea, within sight of the promised land. Moses urges them to go in and take immediate possession (Deut. 1:21) but they fail be cause of their unbelief (Heb. 3:19)

There was a threefold purpose in sending out the spies: (1) to see whether the land was as God had told them (v. 18); (2) to see whether the people who dwelt there were strong or weak, few or many (v. 18); (3) to see whether the cities were made up of strougholds or tents (v. 19). What folly! If God has spoken, to question his word is simply unbelief.

II. The Commission Executed (13: 21-25).

They entered the land from the south and traversed it to its northern limits. They spent forty days in this investigating exploration. It is a sad comment upon human nature when men must spend forty days in finding out the truthfulness of God's word. On their return from the north they gathered some specimens of the fruit of the land. Two of them, perhaps or the land. Two of them, perhaps Caleb and Joshua, bore a cluster of grapes upon a staff between them as a witness that God had spoken the truth about the land.

III. The Spies Rendered a Report (13:26-33).

On their return this committee of explorers rendered a report to the whole congregation. It was not unani-

1. The majority report (vv. 26-29, (1) "The land floweth with milk and ney (v. 27). As a proof of it exhibited the fruit. They all bore witness that this was in accordance with what God had said. (2) "The eople who live there are strong' 28). They seemed to stress this fact. Unbelief dwells mainly upon difficul-ties. (3) "The people live in walled cities" (v. 28). They argued that it was impossible to capture them in such sure defenses. (4) "The land was inhabited by glants" (v. 28 cf v. 33). They saw themselves as grass-hoppers. Furthermore, they saw the people so distributed—the Amalekites in the south country, the Hittites, Jebusites and Amorites in the n and the Canaanites along the seathat it was impossible to take them. This, no doubt, seemed reasonable from the human side, but they displayed their folly in that they left God out of the question. The same God who said to them, "Go, possess the land." would go along to fight the battles

2. The minority report (vv. 30-33). In part, this report agrees with the first; it does not ignore the difficul-ties, nor dispute the facts. It denies the conclusion of the majority. They did not minimize the task before them, but asserted that with God's help they were well able to get possession of the land, and urged immediate action. The ten had their eyes on the difficulties, but Caleb and Joshua fixed their eyes upon God. Caleb lived to right. Just two men against the many thousands, but the thousands were wrong and the two were right. It is not always true that the "voice of the people is the voice of God."

IV. The Rebellion of the People







PRESIDENT ANSWERS CRITICS OF LEAGUE

NEW ENGLAND GIVES DEMON-STRATION EQUAL TO THOSE ON OTHER SIDE.

Failure to Sanction the Plan Would Be a Great Moral Blow to Other Nations Interested.

"Governor Coolidge, Mr. Mayor, Fel-

"I wonder if you are half as glad to see me as I am to see you. (Applause. A voice, "You bet!"). It warms my heart to see a great body of my fellow-citizens again, because in some respects during recent months I have been very lonely indeed without comradeship and counsel, and I tried at every step of the work which fell to me to recall what I was sure would be your counsel with regard to the great natters which were under considera-

"I have not come to report the pro dings or the results of the proc ings of the peace conference; that would be premature.

"The conference seems to you to go slowly; from day to day in Paris it seems to go slowly; but I wonder if you realize the complexity of the task ch it has undertaken. It seems as if the settlements of this war affect. and affect directly every great and, I sometimes think, every small nation in the world; and no one decision can be made which is not properly linked in with the great series of other de cisions which must accompany it, and it must be reckoned on with the final result if the real quality and character of that result is to be properly judged.

What we are doing is to hear the whole case. Hear it from the mouths of the men most interested; hear it from those who are officially commissioned to state the claims that affect nationalities, that affect new areas of the world, that affect new reial and economic connections that have been established by the great world war through which we have gone. And I have been struck moderateness of those who have presented national claims. I can testify that I have nowhere seen the gleam of passion.

"I have seen earnestness. I have een tears come to the eyes of men who pleaded for downtrodden peoples for whom they were delighted to speak. But they were not the tears of anger; they were the tears of ardent hope

"I don't see how any man can fail to have been subdued by these pleas: subdued to the feeling, that he was not there to assert an individual judgment of his own, but to try to assist the cause of humanity.

"And in the midst of it all every interest seeks out, first of all when it reaches Paris, the representatives of the United States. and I think I am stating the most wonderful fact in history-because there is no nation in Europe that suspects the motives of the United States.

"Was ever so wonderful a thing that esteem forever to deserve it?

"I would not have you understand that the great men who represent the other nations there in conference are disesteemed by those who know them. Quite the contrary. But you underagain and again clashed with another competitive interests. It is impossible for men to forget the sharp iswes that were drawn between them in times past.



The cost of public playground parks and similar recreational features for the benefit of all our people drops into insignificance when compared with the priceless value of safeguarding the health of our men, women and children, and the knowledge that we are doing our full duty in creating condi-tions which will increase happiness, elevate morals and produce better citizens. The physique of people in cities is deteriorating, and the only way it can be safeguarded and made more efficient is through proper provision of light and air, which are hygienically basic, and healthful amusement, fun and recreation, which are the greatest lubricants for physical welfare and the greatest protection for moral health.

The ideal of a city, however, must rise above mere commercial and dustrial supremacy, taking the higher ground of becoming an attractive, composite home for its residents, both of large and small means, as well as for the stranger within its gates. While the wealthier class of citizens in any community can build up beautiful residence sections on well-laidout avenues and boulevards, what will become of those who have neither organization nor money to aid them in intelligently planning the most meager comforts of ordinary home surroundings? The interests of the inhabitants of the most unfortunate districts must be safeguarded.-Chicago News.

FOR BETTER PUBLIC HEALTH

Attention of Rural Communities Drawn to Necessary Steps in That Direction.

(Prepared by the United States Depart-

Much remains to be done in rural districts, according to the annual report of the secretary of agriculture, to control such pests as mosquitoes and sources of typhoid fever, and, even more, to give the country districts the advantage of modern' hospitals, nursing and specialized medical practice.

Noting that many agencies, some of them private enterprises with large funds, are working for improvement, the report says that the department of agriculture, through its home demon stration service, is giving valuable aid, and the public-health service is in-creasingly extending its functions.

To what extent the further project tion of effort is a matter for state or local action remains to be determined, says the secretary, but it seems clear that there should be cessation of activities until there has been completed in every rural community of the Union an effective sanitary service and, through the provision of adequate machinery, steps taken to control and eliminate the sources of disease and to provide the necessary modern medical and dental facilities, easily accessible to the mass of the people.




