Country Club Saved; By Bill Ellis New Policies Begun

WE WERE HAPPY to see Friona Country Club raise the money necessary to keep the club open, and help get the club back on its

The club apparently still faces a rocky road, due to inflation, but it is the concensus of the members for it to continue in operation, and that management take a tighter hold of the reins, and attempt to cut expenses wherever possible.

We feel that the Country Club is an asset to Friona and the surrounding area. The golf course is one of the finest nine-hole courses in the area, and aside from swimming or tennis, this is just about the only form of recreation available to the adults of the area.

We know that the Country Club is just like our residences or businesses in that its cost of operation has mushroomed with the increase in utilities and most other expenses. So, it became necessary for the members to assess themselves special dues as well as higher monthly dues in order to keep FCC going.

Other cities the size of Friona have successful country clubs, and there would appear to be no reason the local club should not be successful.

JACK PATTERSON, the trophy winner in the recent national Bass Fisherman's tournament in Florida, told one of the organization officials that he lived right in the center of the world's best fishing.

"It's just 500 miles in any direction to the good fishing!" Patterson chirped.

A FINAL WORD of praise for the 1975 Friona United Fund drive, chaired by B.K. Buske.

The final figures released this week by the Texas United Way campaigns revealed that only one other city in the state which had a goal as large as Friona raised a bigger percentage of its goal. This was the city of Plainview, which achieved 195.9 per cent of its goal.

Friona raised 154.1 per cent of its goal, having set a goal of \$8,500, and raising \$13,095.

One other community had a larger percentage of its goal than did Friona, the tiny community of Diana in Upshur County (Northeast Texas). That community had a goal of \$1,178, and raised \$1,944, which was 165 per cent of its goal.

Friona's per capital giving came to \$2.91 for 1975, up from \$1.64 the previous year. Friona's per capita giving compared to \$2.22 in Dimmitt, and \$3.50 in Hereford. Dimmitt, holding a UF drive for the first time, had a goal of \$10,000 and raised \$10,327, for 103.3 per cent of its goal.

"This was commendable, since many communities were facing confusing economic situations,"

We think the excellent success of the United Fund drive speaks well for a one-time effort for our charitable soliciting, and as a publisher, we plan to be a lot less friendly to the drives who are not a part of the United Fund. Friona Country Club was rescued from the prospects of bankruptcy at a special meeting of the stockholders and members Tuesday night, which raised \$13,000 to meet the club's current debts.

At the same time, the membership plotted a new course for the club, including a monthly budget and a little closer scrutiny by management in order to see the club through its financial troubles. Dues were increased from \$20 to

\$35.00 per month, with \$5.00 of the total going into a reserve fund for capital improvements.

Effective immediately, only members may play on the course, if they are residents of Parmer County. Guests from outside the county will continue to be welcome, and reciprocal arrangements with other clubs will be continued.

Associate or stock memberships will continue to be available. Jay Beene, secretary-treasurer, will be happy to answer any inquiries concerning prospective new mem-

A good turnout of stockholders and members at the special meeting Tuesday night at Friona State Bank completed the raising of the \$13,000 needed to keep the Country Club open.

It was pointed out that members who had not paid the suggested \$200 are asked to go ahead and pay. A couple of members paid as much as \$1,000 each in order to reach the goal. They will be refunded out of the payments by those who had not paid by last Tuesday night, Beene

The members approved a ten-point proposal at an orderly meeting conducted by Gary Renner, club president.

The first proposal had four subheadings, defining the responsibilities of the course pro.

Among the items approved by the membership were the following: +All standing rules and regulations of the golf course and supper

club are to be strictly enforced. +A monthly report of the financial condition of the country club is to be prepared and be posted at the club, where all members will

have access to it. +Membership structure is to memberships will be available for a \$50 fee and monthly dues. Stock memberships, if available, can be purchased for a lump sum or by installments of a duration not longer than ten years.

+The supper club is to pay its own way, including taxes, lincenses, bonds, utilities, etc., or it will

"We had the surveying equipment and as a community service the boys ran contour lines so the farmers could become eligible. They were the only ones around here qualified to do it.'

"Also back then before Friona had a veterinarian the boys treated cattle for milk fever and other diseases as a community service," Gee added.

"There were other services and skills the boys learned such as cutting rafters and preparing income tax for a farm," he said. "One of the boys knew how to cut rafters and his dad didn't know he knew it, and he went out and cut every rafter for their new barn and they fit perfectly," Gee smiled

Mrs. Gee pointed out her husband's tremendous record of ex-students who have received special recognition not only in farming but in farm-related and professional fields. Together they

reminisced, recalling names of young men who have received high recognition such as D.O. and Jimmy Robason, Jimmy White of Muleshoe, the three Brown brothers: Floyd, Earnest and

Smith County; Robert Lloyd, Charles Schlabs, Carl Schlenker and Louis Welch, most of whom were farmers of the year. D.O. Robason of Siloam Springs, named Gee as the reason he is the farmer

Gee has received honors and awards himself during his 41 years of service. He has served as past president of the Lions Club and is presently on the Board of Directors. He has also served as director of the Chamber of Commerce and was instrumental in acquiring the bookmobile for Friona even before the town had a

He instigated the Parmer County Fair and Livestock Show and was instrumental in getting some prison barracks moved here for the Fair. The barricks were left vacant after the war north of Hereford. Additionally, Gee is holder of both the bachelors and masters degrees from Texas Tech University in Vocational Agriculture.

Gee taught vocational agricul-

years and during the last 17 years he served as elementary principal supervising the kindergarten. primary and elementary schools. Altogether, his teaching years have numbered 47 years, having taught six years elsewhere.

He first taught for two years at Sudan, then spent the next four years teaching at Bovina and acting as high school principal. Gee laughed and added, "In my spare time I courted and married the home ec teacher, and I'm still living with her.'

Gee remembers when a small child went with some of his friends to the Tasty Cream, a "crime" which meant a trip to the office, and Gee talked to them very sternly, causing them to cry. However, they were so relieved that he didn't paddle them that one



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

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New Guidelines In Lunch Program

In accordance with Public Law 94-105, enacted on 1975, new guidelines are being put into effect by the Friona Schools for free and reduced price lunches. Reduced price lunches are being added to the school's lunch policy to comply with this legislation.

Reduced price lunches will sell for 20 cents per meal. In addition to this change, the guidelines for 11 free lunches have been 12 changed as shown on the attached income scale. Children in grades K-4 who are eligible for free lunches are also eligible for an extra carton of milk.

A family may apply at any time for free or reduced price lunches. If the family income is greater than shown on the scale below, but has unusually high medical bills, shelter costs, 11 special education expenses, 12 disaster or casualty expenses, their children may still

qualify for free or reduced price lunches. In these cases the principal should be contacted and this matter discussed with him. In certain foster children may be eligible for these benefits. Anyone having foster children living in the home should also contact the principal.

To apply for free or reduced price lunches some adult member of the family should submit an application to the office of their principal. The school will then let you know within 10 days whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the decision you have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling Tom B. Jarboe, Supt. of Friona Schools at 247-2281 or writing him at Box 607, Friona, Texas 79035.

Eleven Accidents During January



Dimmitt held their longest lead of 30 points in the third quarter, they held this twice, 50-20, with 2:31 left and 52-22 with 1:34 left.

The fourth quarter saw Friona score eight points to ten for Dimmitt for the final score of 63-36. Friona drew 23 fouls to 22 for Dimmitt. The Chiefs made eight of 25 free throws and the Bobcats hit 13 of 28. John Jarecki was high point for Friona with ten.

Linda Raquel Collins Bovina High School First Place CONSERVING OUR LAND AFTER 200 YEARS Thousands of acres of land in this country are abandoned every year because the surface has been washed and gullied beyond the possibility of profitable cultivation.

Soil depletion and erosion began to take their toll early in the history of the American Colonies. Most of the early colonists came from areas where rains fall gently. Therefore they were not prepared to handle soil in the North American climate, where rain often falls with great intensity.

A couple of years later, a few farmers in the older sections noticed a change in the soil. At first it was dark, and in some places almost black, but gradually it became lighter in color. When the heavy rains came, the loose soil mixed with the water and the muddy mixture flowed down the hills carrying with it the richest portion of the soil.

I have found in the research that I have conducted, that destruction of the soil by gullies and floods has been noted by writers even before the Revolutionary War and that by 1715 rivers that once ran clear were described as being black with mud. Early Massachusetts records indicate that most of the land near the coast was abandoned at least once before the 1800's.

Some of the leading men of that time were deeply concerned with conservation: Patrick Henry, George Washington and Thomas Jefferson were constantly looking for ways to improve the productivity of the soi!

But people were generally not interested or concerned about soil damage since there was so much virgin land. Early in the 20th century President Roosevelt called the first conference of governors to consider conservation of natural resources. Interest then aroused led to the purchase of the first national forests and the establishment of the United States Forest Service.

safeguard the nations natura resources. Pioneer farmers had cut and burned their way westward, with ax and fire, transforming forest lands into farmland. With careless generosity the federal and state government had encouraged

The government gave land to private industry, farms, and ranches. They also gave the land rights oil industries, mineral miners, and water power sites. The people who own these industries do not care what happens to the land. The owners of the timber land destroyed the land and trees without regard to wildlife or replanting. The cattlemen and sheepmen overgrazed the land. Oil companies worked the oil out of the ground and wasted the natural gas. Rivers and streams became polluted killing most of the fish and water creatures. The only excuse Americans had was that they thought the natural resources would never run out.

By the 1800's the United States had started growing. The demand for natural resources increasedand the factories and businesses started devouring the raw materials in large quantities.

An organization of American Association for the Advancement of Science forced the President to take the timberland off the market for public sale. The President set aside seventeen million acres since, Presidents have doubled this

Today there are organizations such as the Forest Bureau in the Department of Agriculture and Parks and Wildlife Association. These organizations see to the bettering of parks and wildlife.


