

MAYBE, JUST maybe, the contract can be let for the Highway 214 project by next month.

Recent letters from the City of Friona to senators Bentsen and Tower may have helped get the project beyond the present "logjam," and closer toward some visible results.

Resident Engineer Rhea Bradley, who was in our office this past week, said that the latest delay was caused when the December contracts were called back in. The project had been included among the December projects. Now, hopefully, it can be among the "green light" group in the March bids.

A letter from Senator Bentsen regarding the project may give the Highway Department the "impetus" it needs to get off the pot with the much-needed and often-delayed project. Here's hoping.

The new highway program was announced this week, and Parmer County was included for the strip of Highway 214 from Hub to Clay's Corner, and among other things for right-of-way purchasing from Friona to the county line east, in anticipation of someday having a four-lane highway to join that which has been built from Hereford this way.

However, Bradley says that planning on this road has almost come to a standstill, because of the push out of Amarillo and from a New Mexico delegation for Interstate Highway status for the road.

"An interstate road would miss Friona so far that it wouldn't be even accessible," Bradley says. He points out that there would only be certain points, spaced several miles, where you could get onto such a road.

We're going to propose that Friona go on record as opposed to such a highway, and just shoot for a four-lane facility, which would adequately handle our traffic problems.

WE KNEW BEFORE we tried it that we weren't going to like the new 55 mile-per-hour speed limit, and after having made a couple of trips, one to Lubbock and back, if we needed any further proof that the new speed limit was going to be a tough customer, we got it.

We also were dubious about the lower speed limit saving any gas—and we still are. It seems to cost us about a tank of gas going to Lubbock at 70 mph, and a tank full at 55 mph.

Only difference is—at 70 mph, you can make the trip in an hour and a half or less. The new way, it takes almost two hours. At least our gas lasts longer.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT officials are arguing that the new speed limits will save lives—and maybe this will be one benefit of the new speed limit.

Under the old limits, you sometimes couldn't recognize your own mother as you zipped past vehicles on the highway. With the new, lower speeds, you can almost exchange a conversation with passing motorists.

So—you'd better be careful what you say when someone passes you on the road—they just might be lip readers.

WE NOTICE THAT the latest change in speed limits is the fifth time that the state's maximum speed limits have been changed since the Highway Department was established in 1917.

When the Highway Department was first started, the top permissible speed was a blazing 25 miles per hour. It went to 35 mph in 1923, then up to 45 mph in 1928, to 60 mph in 1941, had been at 70 mph since 1965.

MONDAY IS the deadline for filing for office, and so far the four county races are uncontested. Not much interest in local politics, as indicated by the inaction—except for the Lazbuddie precinct, where three have announced for the county commissioner's post.

TRUCK-TRAIN WRECK

Williams Killed At Summerfield

Weldon Taft Williams, 32, a Friona resident most of his life, was killed Monday when the truck he was driving collided with a freight train about a mile west of Summerfield in northwest Parmer County.

Williams died at 2:30 p.m. in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, four hours after the accident, of massive head injuries.

He is the first Parmer County traffic fatality for 1974. Funeral services were conducted at 2 p.m. Wednesday at the First Baptist Church here with Rev. Charles Broadhurst, pastor, and Rev. Carlos McCleod of Plainview officiating. Burial was in Friona Cemetery under direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home of Friona.

Texas Highway Patrolman Don Samuels said Williams' truck was traveling north on a private road toward U.S. 60

when struck by the train at a minor grade crossing.

IN 68-66 THRILLER

Chiefs Top Bobcats; Take 2nd Half Lead

Fans who can't stand excitement should have stayed away from Chieftain Fieldhouse Tuesday night.

In one of the most fiercely contested games ever seen on the local hardwoods, the Friona Chieftains outscraped the visiting Dimmitt Bobcats, 68-66, and took a giant step toward the overall District 3-AA championship.

In the earlier game, the Squaws squeezed past the Bobbies, 58-57 in a pressure-packed finish.

The Chieftains were in command practically all the way, but they had to fight off a determined bid by the dangerous Bobcats, who trimmed an eight-point lead to the final margin of two during a hectic last minute of clock time which took almost ten minutes to play.

The Chieftains used two jump shots by Gene Strickland in the last two minutes to forge a 68-60 lead, and that gave them the margin they needed. The team shook Strickland open twice, beating the Dimmitt press under the Bobcat basket to earn the two easy shots.

But the Bobcats didn't fold, as they wouldn't throughout the game, and came back for six points in the last minute.

Friona missed a chance to put the game further out of reach with 43 seconds left on a technical foul when a Bobcat slapped the ball out of Dale Cleveland's hand as he attempted to in-bound the ball.

Dale Parsons missed the technical shot, and then the Chieftains threw the ball away trying to get the ball in play.

allowing Dimmitt to close the gap further.

With ten seconds left, and leading 68-64, the Chieftains let Dimmitt score a fairly easy basket, and avoided a foul, as time ran out.

TRAIL TWICE

Friona had trailed only twice in the game, at 3-2 in the first three minutes, and then again at 7-6 and 9-6 with 3:30 left in the opening quarter.

Dale Parsons, who sanged the nets for Friona in the first half, hit from outside to cut Dimmitt's lead to 9-8, and Gene

Strickland's jump shot gave Friona a lead they were not to relinquish.

Dimmitt's Bill Gregory cut a three-point Friona lead to one when he hit a shot with three seconds left in the first quarter, leaving the score 14-13, Friona.

Gregory gave the Bobcats a tie three minutes into the second quarter at 18-all, but Strickland came back with a jump shot, and the 'Cats never even had a tie after that, although it was always close.

SIX-POINT LEAD

Bobby Lewellen's jumper

with 2:15 left in the half gave the team its first six-point lead at 26-20. Then Dale Cleveland completed two three-point plays within a minute of clock time, and the team had an eight-point lead at 32-24. That was also the halftime margin, 34-26.

Dimmitt scored the first two second-half baskets to trim the lead to 34-30, but Dale Parsons responded with a pair of shots for a 38-30 Friona lead.

Friona hit a hot streak at this point. Cleveland hit a follow

1975-77 WORK PROGRAM

\$1.9 Million Tabbed For County Roads

Parmer County has been included for \$1,913,800 in highway construction for the Texas Highway Department's 1975-77 consolidated program of work for District 5, it was announced this week.

Main item on the county's share of the budget, and the one that concerned those interested in the road, was an allocation of \$1,536,900 for reconstructing Highway 214 from Hub to Clay's Corner, a distance of 9.5 miles.

Previously approved, and currently awaiting contract approval are the segments from Friona to Hub, and the portion from Clay's Corner to the county line on the south. Those portions were included under the 1973-74 program, leaving the middle part for the later program of work.

"We hope to be able to go to contract on the Friona to Hub portion of the road by March," stated resident engineer Rhea

Bradley of Littlefield this week. This includes the overpass which will span the Santa Fe railway to the south of Friona.

The Highway 214 project has been in the mill for over 10 years, and has been met with delays at every turn. However, it now appears that the project may be about ready to become a reality. Letters to the state's two senators recently by Mayor R.L. Fleming may have helped to get the project "off dead center."

MONEY ALLOCATED

In addition to the above portion of highway, an allocation of \$254,900 was included on the 1975-77 program of work, which was ear-tagged for reconstruction of Highway 214 from Friona south to Hub, and from Clay's Corner south to the county line.

This allocation was previously authorized in the 1973-74 program, but had to be re-allocated since the funds were not used in the earlier program, and were used for other projects.

Also, a total of \$114,000 in additional funds were approved for purchase right-of-way on U.S. Highway 60 from Friona northeast to the Castro County line, for possible future widening of the highway to four lanes.

An additional \$32,000 was approved for the 2.4-mile portion of Highway 60 in Castro County, for right-of-way purchase.

The Parmer County budget was a portion of a \$12,800,000 program of work for the district, and a state budget of \$235 million.

The program of work was announced by George C. Wall, Jr., District Five engineer.

Third Candidate For Commissioner's Race

With the filing deadline coming up on Monday, so far none of the four county offices which are up for election have contested races.

The county commissioner's race in Precinct 4 became a three-man race this week, with the announcement by Roy M. Miller that he would be a candidate for the position.

Previously announced were the incumbent, Raymond Treider Jr. and Pete Jesko.

Miller, like the previously announced candidates, will run on the Democratic ticket. Thus, the three will meet in the Democratic primary of May 4.

Miller, 51, is a member of the Lazbuddie School Board, a position he has held for the past nine years. He has also been on the board of directors of the Lazbuddie Farmers Supply, Inc. for six years.

A farmer, the newly announced commissioner's can-

didate has been a resident of the Lazbuddie community for the past 22 years.

"If elected, I will do the very best possible job in representing the residents of my precinct," Miller promised.

In other political activity on the local level, Mrs. Raymond (Frances) Euler announced that she would seek re-election to the position of Justice of the Peace for the Friona Precinct.

Mrs. Euler made the following statement:

In announcing my candidacy for re-election as Justice of the Peace of Precinct 2, I would like to thank the people of Parmer County for being so kind during my past term.

I will appreciate your support in the upcoming election and if re-elected, I shall continue to perform the duties of the office honestly and as efficiently as possible.

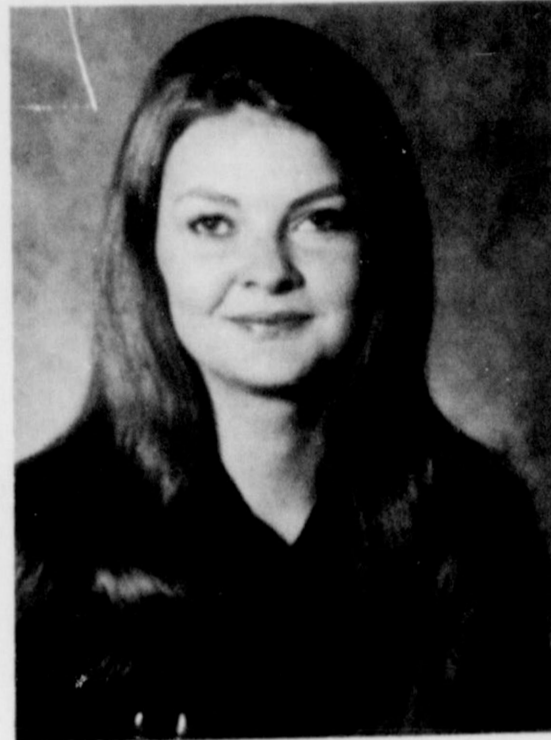

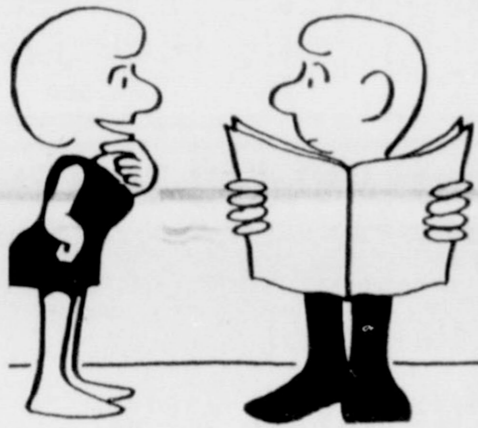

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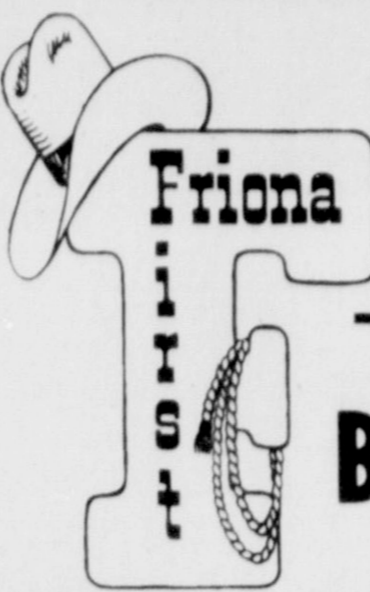

'Granny' Gaines Buried In Bovina

Funeral services for Mrs. Evelena K. (Granny) Gaines, the oldest resident in Bovina, were held Thursday afternoon of last week in the First Baptist Church of Bovina.

Rev. Larry Heard, pastor, assisted by Rev. John Ferguson, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Denver City and former pastor here, officiated at the rites. Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home of Friona.

Mrs. Gaines died at 2 p.m. Tuesday at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona after suffering an apparent heart attack at her home here.

"Granny," as she was known to most residents of the area, would have been 97 on March 7. A native of Lamar County, she moved from Swisher County to Bovina.

Mrs. Gaines, her husband, the late J. Sam Gaines, and their children moved to Bovina in 1924 from Tulia where they had operated a wagon yard, feed and grocery store.

Upon arriving in Bovina in 1924, the family leased some land and farmed one year before moving into Bovina. At that time, only a grocery store, blacksmithy and two service stations remained after a fire had gutted the town in 1921. The family established Gaines Hardware in early 1925 and it has been operated continuously by a member of the family since that time.

In 1967 in an interview with Allen Crittendon of the Amarillo Daily News, Mrs. Gaines recalled, "We used to have to drive to Amarillo in a pickup truck to get merchandise. We always drove to Canyon and spent the night with friends, then got up early the next morning and drove into Amarillo and made the long trip back home that night. That big hill between Amarillo and Canyon worried us, but we always seemed to make it."

When her husband died in June 1933, their daughter, the late Mrs. Lady Gaines Armstrong, kept the store running in the same family tradition until her death in October 1967. Then another daughter, Mrs. Roberta Mager, and her husband Neal returned to Bovina to continue the Gaines family tradition.

Granny Gaines' birthday was celebrated for over 20 years with a luncheon and afternoon of visiting when relatives and friends from Bovina, other towns and several states called upon her.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Mager of Bovina and Mrs. W.C. [Evelyn] Bryant of Whittier, Calif.; two sons, R.M. [Red] Gaines of

Paris and Herbert Gaines of New Kirk, N.M.; one sister, Mrs. Betty Adams of Paris; five grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

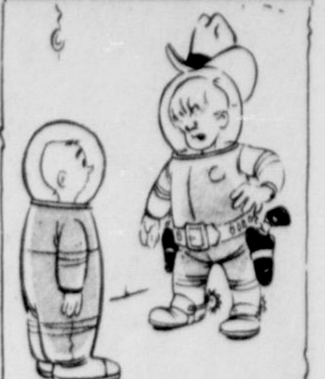

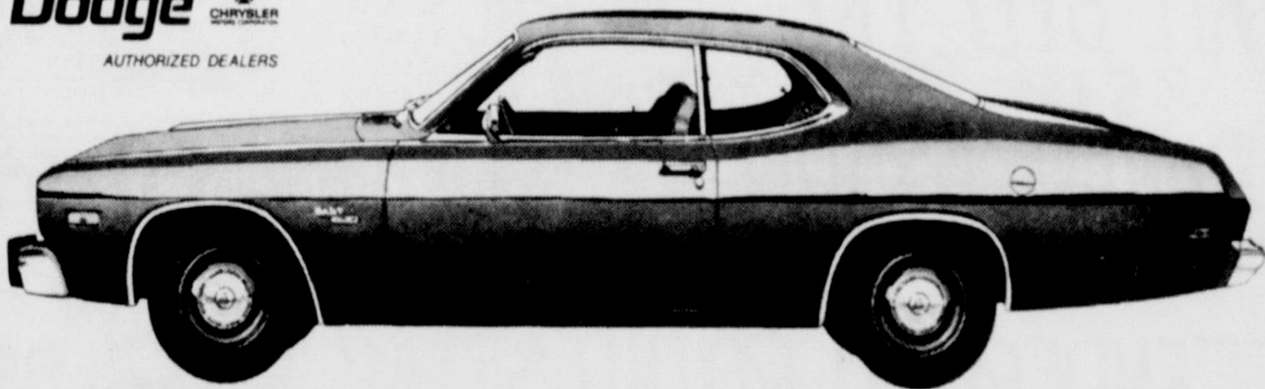

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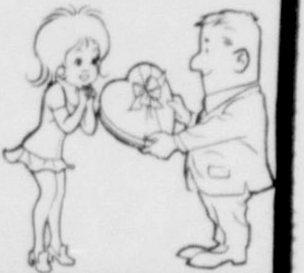

TGSPB Authorized Research Grants

Six research grants were authorized by Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, Tuesday, December 11, 1973, during their bi-monthly meeting. The grants are as follows:

(1) Renewal of grant for \$15,000 to Dr. George Teetes and Texas A&M University to continue studies of sorghum insects.

(2) Approval of grant for \$3,600 to (a) establish a laboratory culture of Banks grass mites for use in biology and control studies, (b) measure the level of resistance to chemicals used in control attempts of mites.

(3) Renewal of grant for \$13,133 to Dr. Jerry Johnson and Texas A&M University for use in breeding sorghum for insect resistance.

(4) Approval of grant for

\$2,000 to Dr. Richard Frederiksen and Texas A&M University for the study of stalk diseases.

(5) Renewal of grant for \$5,000 to Dr. Hollis Klett and Texas Tech University Pantech Research Center, for a comparison study of three types of sorghum to corn.

(6) Renewal of grant for \$3,000 to Dr. Lloyd Sherrard and Texas Tech University Pantech Research Center, to study the value of sorghum stubble processed by different methods and its influence on mother cows.

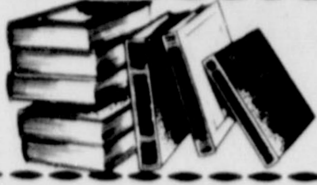

LCC is now a fully accredited senior college offering liberal arts and pre-professional programs.



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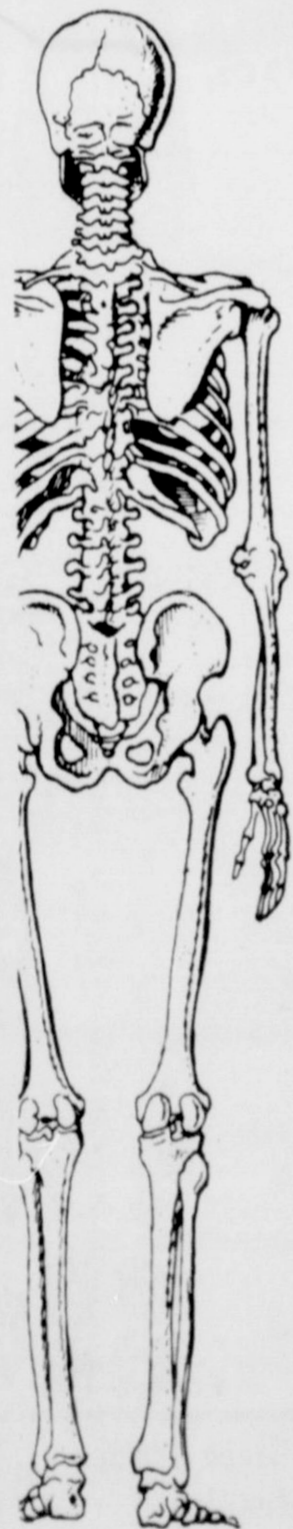
