



PRIMARY ELECTION day is just around the corner, and candidates are entering the "home stretch" as far as campaigns are concerned.

For the most part, the campaigns have been pretty well "low key" in nature.

There is a race for governor, although you may not have heard much about it.

Then on the local level, we have a race for County Judge, and that is generating the most interest in the primary from a local standpoint.

A large number of absentee votes have been cast, and this indicates that the turnout should be good—at least above average.

With a candidate to support from the Friona area, local voters should all come out and vote on May 4. It only takes a few minutes, and it can be very important.

Be sure and take those few minutes of time next Saturday. Regardless of how you vote, at least vote! Only in free America are we able to vote without fear of the consequences. Let's exercise that right.

FRIONA VOTERS will go to a different place to cast their ballots next Saturday.

The election will be held at the high school, rather than at the junior high, as it has been for the past several years.

So, if you find yourself at the junior high building out of habit—just drive a few blocks west, and cast your ballot.

THE TOM T. HALL show was a big hit here last Saturday, and a big crowd was on hand for the show.

Both Tom T. Hall, as well as Plainview's Gary Sargent and the Storytellers, went over real big with those attending the show. It was a great kickoff for such programs for the community center/showbarn.

Friona's Business Activities Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the show, were still at last report, striving for the "break-even" point in the show.

So far, there have been three major events at the new facility in three months. There was the stock show in February, and this event, the main one for which the building was constructed, drew record crowds.

In March, the Friona Chamber of Commerce held its annual banquet at the building, and it was attended by 685 people—by far a record crowd for a banquet locally.

Now, the Tom T. Hall Show has drawn close to 1,000 people. Next major event for the building is the "Christmas in May" arts and crafts event, slated for May 10-11.

Looks like the community center/showbarn is going to have all of the use that was predicted of it before it was built.

SPEAKING OF BUILDING, it looks like Friona is about to have another "building boom." White's Auto started a new building this week to the west of Piggly Wiggly on Highway 60.

Another new business, or at least a new building for an existing business, is hinted for the area on west of the White's location.

Perhaps if the building material shortage eases up, we'll be able to get some of those other businesses we have heard rumors about from time to time.

AS OF THIS writing, the mayor's proclamation and the "Think Rain" promotion had not borne fruit, although prospects had been better and better for rain all week long.

One night this week some residents did report some light sprinkles, and Thursday night produced lightning in the outlying area.

Weather forecasters were hopeful for a rain Friday or Saturday.

WIN REGIONAL

Friona Debate Team Bound For State

Trip Horton and Mickey Harrelson won the Region 1 boys debate tournament last weekend at Odessa, and won a trip to the state meet in Austin May 2-3-4.

Jeanine Jarboe placed second in informative speaking, and is the alternate to the state meet from this region.

Friona High School scored 27 points in the regional meet, getting 20 points for the debate win and seven points from Miss Jarboe's second place individual.

The FHS boys debaters thus join three other debate teams in Austin May 2-3-4 to decide

the state champion debaters.

In the track portion of the regional meet, Dale Parsons placed third in the mile run, and is the alternate in that event.

Horton and Harrelson became the eighth and ninth entrants from Friona High School in the state UIL contests since 1968.

It's the second time for a boys debate team to qualify for the state competition. In 1969, Bob Thomas and Bryan Elliott made it to the state meet, but lost their opening debate.

Two contestants, Norman Mohr in informative speaking [1970] and Crista Evans in poetry reading [1968] came home with state titles.

Other state entrants have included Norman Mohr in informative speaking (1968), and Sally Kendrick in persuasive speaking (1971).

Other FHS contestants who took part in the regional meet included Gary Stone (poetry interpretation and prose reading), Ronald Land (number sense), Carolyn Gore (spelling), Beverly Bailey (spelling) and Cinda Johnson (journalism).

The trip, which includes the FHA band participating in the Six Flags Over Mid-America Band Festival May 9-10-11, where the Chieftain Band will be pitted against the cream of the crop of high school bands across the country.

In order to be eligible to enter the event, a band must have received a "Division I" rating in an officially sponsored state event.

The trip is expected to cost around \$5800 for transportation, housing and individual entry fee. In addition, those going will have to pay their own meals and incidentals.

Those wishing to contribute to the band fund may do so at Friona State Bank.

Pre-School Day Slated Here May

Pre-School Day in Friona Elementary School will be held Friday, May 10. This is a day set aside for next year's kindergarten and first grade students to visit the local school.

To be eligible for the kindergarten program, children must be five years of age on or before September 1, 1974.

Children must be six years of age on or before September 1, 1974 to be eligible to attend the first grade.

Kindergarten students will visit the school from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon and first grade students will visit from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m.

If your child is eligible or if you know of a child that is eligible, be sure to notify the school office at 247-2240.

GOOD TURNOUT SEEN

County Judge Race Tops Demo Primary

The county judge's race is expected to make for a good turnout of voters in Friona and the rest of Parmer County next Saturday, May 4, when the Democratic primary will be held.

There are 50 names on the ballot that voters will scan, but only ten contested races.

The race that will draw the most interest locally is the county judge's race, where Paul Fortenberry of Friona opposed the incumbent, Archie Tarter.

A considerably larger turnout than 1972's primary is expected. In that election, a total of 1575 voters turned out, where the main item of interest was the race for county Democratic chairman.

In 1970, when the judge's race was also contested, a total of 1586 voters cast ballots in Parmer County, with 541 of them coming in the Friona precinct, only 40 per cent of the qualified voters.

One other county race is contested. That is the county treasurer's race, where Benna Felts and Jenoyce Ford are the candidates. Mrs. Felts was appointed last year to fill out the unexpired term of Mabel Reynolds, longtime treasurer, when she retired.

Only other race within the county is in Precinct 4, where three men are contesting for the county commissioner's post. Incumbent Raymond Treider, Jr. is challenged by Pete Jesko and Roy M. Miller. A fourth candidate is on the Republican ballot.

Statewide, the governor's race has four candidates, including the incumbent, Dolph Briscoe, but it has failed to generate much enthusiasm.

Briscoe's main challenger is Frances (Sissy) Farenthold, whose main claim to fame is that she forced Briscoe into a runoff in the 1972 primary.

Mrs. Farenthold's campaign has failed, so far, to reach the point it did two years ago, and Briscoe might win the nomination without a runoff, in spite of the four-person field.

Polling Place For Friona Is Changed

Polling place for the Democratic Primary election in Friona May 4 will be the High School, south hall, according to County Democratic Chairman Hollis Horton.

This is a change from the past, when the primary was held at the junior high school building. The change was necessitated by a band concert at the junior high school on election day.

Complete primary polling places include:

Black-Tri County Elevator; Friona-High School Auditorium; Lakeview-Otho Whitefield residence; Rhea-Parish Hall; Lazbuddie-High School; Oklahoma Lane-Community

Center; Bovina-American Legion Hall; Farwell-Court House.

Precinct conventions will be held at the polling place in every instance except Bovina, where it will be held at the Horn Insurance Agency. Precinct meetings will be held at 3 p.m. on voting day.

The county Democratic convention will be held on Saturday, May 11 in Bovina, at the Community Room of the First State Bank.

Horton reminded that Tuesday, April 30 is the final day to vote absentee for the primary. The special voting is being held in County Clerk Bonnie Warren's office.

Longtime treasurer Jesse James, whose unlikely name has won him more races than any other state office holder, is opposed by Don Yarbrough.

Bob Bullock and Hugh Edburg are seeking the office of comptroller of public accounts, where longtime office holder Robert S. Calvert is retiring.

Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White is opposed by Herbert A. Schroeder.

A referendum concerning pari-mutuel betting on horse racing appears on the Democratic ballot. This is not submitted as a constitutional amendment—but is offered as a means of finding public sentiment on the question.

A complete sample ballot is reproduced on page 15 for the benefit of voters.

SECOND FRIONA WINNER

Hi-Pro Is Winner In Expansion Fete

Hi-Pro Feeds, Inc. of Friona is one of five companies selected to receive the annual Governor's Industrial Expansion Award for 1973. Gov. Dolph Briscoe announced Monday.

Other winners were Datapoint Corporation of San Antonio, Owens-Corning Fiberglas Corp. of Waxahachie, Superior Continental Corp. of Brownwood and the Beaumont Shipyards of Bethlehem Steel Corp.

The winners were nominated by their local chambers of commerce and selected by the Texas Industrial Commission for their civic and economic contributions to their communities.

"All Texans should join us in honoring these industries, all of which have added significant strength to the economic growth of their communities and the entire state," Gov. Briscoe said in announcing the winners. "It is fitting that we are able to honor our existing industries, which are sometimes overlooked when the bouquets are passed to the industrial growth of our state."

Hi-Pro's award was the second winner for Friona in the Governor's Industrial Expansion program since it was started. Missouri Beef Packers won a similar award in 1970 based on the company's expansion during 1969.

The Governor pointed out that the majority of new jobs created in Texas come from expanding industry, although location of new plants usually receives most of the public's attention.

The five award winners will be honored in ceremonies in the Governor's office and will be feted at a special luncheon hosted by the Governor.

In previous years, the Governor has made the presentations

at a Governor's Conference in Austin, but the Texas Industrial Commission, at the request of Gov. Briscoe, voted to reduce the ceremonies to the winners this year due to the fuel shortage.

The Commission voted at their last quarterly meeting in Brownsville to eliminate the 1974 conference to keep from requiring long travel by the estimated 600 industrial leaders who annually take part in the event.

Jim Harwell, Executive Director of the TIC, said the competition for the 1973 awards was particularly close. Selection was made after analyzing company payroll increases, new employees and plant area enlargement as well as local expenditures for goods and services.

Hi-Pro Feeds, Inc. more than doubled its plant payroll during 1973 to \$686,000. The 42 employees added to the payroll brought the total number employed to 107, a 64 per cent increase.

Hi-Pro expanded its plant facilities to 53,540 square feet and increased its total investment in new equipment by \$4 million during 1973.

Datapoint Corporation reported a 115 per cent increase in plant payroll for last year to \$5.8 million, while total local expenditures increased from \$400,000 in 1972 to more than \$2 million in 1973.

Six special citations for Industrial Expansions were also announced. Receiving the citations will be ARA Manufacturing Company of Grand Prairie, Stanton Supply Corporation of Stanton, Perry Equipment Corporation of Mineral Wells, Maywood, Inc. of Amarillo, Texas Leisure Chair, Inc. of Haltom-Richland and Andy Lou of Dallas.

MBP Stops Slaughter Operations In Idaho

Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. announced recently that it would suspend slaughtering operations at its Boise, Idaho facility on April 12, 1974. Breaking and fabricating will continue. The suspension will affect approximately one hundred and twenty-five of the two hundred workers at the plant.

The shut down is caused by economics. The current prices of live cattle in the Northwest do not permit the Company to

operate. The length of the shut down will be determined by the time required for margins to return to normal.

The Boise plant was opened in October, 1973. It has been slaughtering about 2,800 cattle per week. Missouri Beef Packers also has plants in Rock Port, Missouri; Plainview, Texas; and Friona, Texas, which have been slaughtering over 19,000 head per week.


pastor, officiating. Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home of Friona.

Quarterly Reports Due Next Tuesday

Quarterly wage reports and Social Security contributions for household workers are due by Tuesday, according to William Ent, field representative, Social Security Office.

"People who pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in any three-month calendar quarter must send a report of the wages, along with the Social Security contribution, to the Internal Revenue Service within one month after the end of the quarter," Ent said.

Wage reports and Social Security contributions for the January - February - March

quarter are due by Tuesday. People who employ household workers may file the wage report on a form available at any Internal Revenue Service office. "The Employer's Quarterly Tax Return For Household Employees (for Social Security)."

The 1974 Social Security contribution for a household employee is 5.85 per cent of covered wages, and the employer pays a matching amount. "Some household employers may prefer to pay the full 11.7 per cent contribution," Ent said, "and this is also acceptable."

Social Security contributions help build retirement, disability, survivors, and medicare protection for workers and their families. People who employ household workers may contact any Social Security Office if any questions may arise.





Deadline for entries will be May 10 at 7 p.m.



NOTICE TO CATTLEMEN AND CATTLE RAISERS

Livestock is assessed for tax purposes according to its location on January 1, regardless of the owner's residence.

During the month of January, Mr. and Mrs. Ches Woltmon assisted the school district as representatives of the Tax Office, in counting the cattle located in the Bovina School District.

According to law (Art. 7193), whenever a taxpayer fails or refuses to make a rendition, the assessor shall proceed to assess the property of such taxpayer, and the assessment so made shall be as legal and binding as if rendered by the taxpayer.

Cattle owners who did not do their own rendition have until April 30 to confirm the number of cattle that our office has on record as belonging to them on January 1, 1974.

If such owners do not bother to make this confirmation, we will expect them to be liable for the number of cattle rendered by our representative, when taxes become due next fall.

We appreciate the cooperation of cattlemen in this regard. It is important to the Bovina School District for our office to have a 100% count.

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

FHAers who have achieved unusual accomplishments by completing all three levels of the Encounter Growth and Development program were honored at a breakfast on Friday morning.







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A MESSAGE TO PARMER COUNTY RESIDENTS

From County Judge Archie Tarter

I am running for a second full term as Parmer County Judge, having previously been elected for the unexpired term of Loyde A. Brewer, now deceased, and for one full term.

I promise nothing to each of you except honesty, integrity and proper fulfillment of the duties of this office to the best of my ability and knowledge regardless where you reside in Parmer County. This county as a whole has been, and always will be, considered in any official decision I have to make so long as I serve as your County Judge. I believe in and shall always work for a financially sound county government. I believe at this time our county is on a sound financial basis.

A few of the financial changes since I have been serving as your County Judge are as follows:

The available county funds have been increased from \$404,764.13 to a present balance of \$584,468.81, being a total net increase of \$179,704.68.

The County Judge also serves as Ex-Officio County School Superintendent and administers the Parmer County Permanent School Fund.

The Permanent School Fund has been increased from \$576,825.60 to the present balance of \$732,109.63, being a net increase of \$161,284.03.

When I went into office as your County Judge, this county was receiving only \$19,000.00 annually from the Permanent School Fund for the schools of our county. The funds were being held on short-term bonds and I cashed the same and placed all of them into long-term Federal bonds. These bonds are increasing in value approximately \$30,000.00 each year since purchase, and should continue to increase accordingly. In addition, these funds are paying interest into the available school fund which is distributed annually to the Parmer County schools on a per-student basis. In 1974 \$30,865.28 will be distributed from this fund to our schools. Law prohibits the Permanent School Fund from being consumed, and it is regulated as to how it can be invested.

As each of you know, in the last several years State and Federal funds have been severely limited for construction of farm-to-market roads. Most of the available funds have been spent in metropolitan areas and in areas around larger towns such as Lubbock and Amarillo. However, Parmer County has received some money for farm-to-market road construction and the County itself has spent some money for rights-of-way and easements for such construction during my tenure of office, as follows:

[a] Farm-to-Market Road 1140, consisting of 4 miles, located East of Friona to connect U.S. Highway 60, and Farm-to-Market Road 2397 \$43,133.33 spent for rights-of-way and removal of utilities

[b] Farm-to-Market 1172, consisting of 11 miles, connecting from State 86 to U.S. 60 NE of Lazbuddie, \$49,732.31 spent for rights-of-way and utility line removal

[c] Farm-to-Market Road 292, consisting of 1 mile, connecting U.S. 60 to U.S. 70-84 NE corner of Farwell - \$6965.00 spent for rights-of-way and utility line removal

[d] Farm-to-Market Road 214, approximately 2 miles - Removing utility lines, easements and rights-of-way for construction of a new overpass to be located immediately South of Friona, in the very near future - \$163,548.27 spent by Parmer County

I support expenditure of all future money received for farm-to-market road construction wherever the need is greatest in the County.

In addition, approximately \$42,000.00 has been spent for repairs, maintenance and upkeep to the Parmer County courthouse building, including installation of central heat and air-conditioning, District Courtroom repairs, installation of modern glass doors at the entrances, and renovation of the hallways.

Parmer County is scheduled to receive \$516,000.00 Revenue Share Funds from the Federal Government. Of this amount, approximately \$220,000.00 has been received and the remainder will be received between now and the end of 1976. \$225,000.00 of this amount has been allocated for construction of new jail facilities in compliance with the Federal Court ruling of Judge Sarah Hughes. The remainder will be spent for the best benefit of Parmer County.

During the last six years I have disposed of over 680 criminal cases filed in the County Court, as well as handling many civil cases and other court proceedings. As County Judge I have carried out the duties of my office on a full-time basis to the best of my knowledge and ability. Many of you I have come in contact with one way or another while I have served as your County Judge. I would hope to meet and visit with each one of you personally before election day but know this is impossible.

I earnestly solicit your vote for re-election as County Judge for Parmer County on May 4, 1974.


