## Broadhurst To Leave 1st Baptist

Rev. Charles Broadhurst, pastor of Friona's First Baptist Church for the past four years, announced his resignation to the church last week. Rev. Broadhurst said he was resigning to accept a position as pastor of the Southeast Baptist Church in Lubbock. His resignation will be effective June 2. Charles, his wife Carolynn, and their three children, Leslie, Lance and LaDonna, have been active in community and school activities during their four years in Friona.

**LAST THURSDAY'S** speech by Gen. Robbie Risner of Cannon Air Force Base was very well received here. We were delighted to see the big turnout, and were proud of Frionans for their interest in a program of this nature.

Mrs. Jo Witten, elementary school music teacher, and her students in the first four grades, brought a stirring program of patriotic music—very appropriate, and well performed. Gen. Risner turned out to be as articulate a speaker as he is a writer.

Many Frionans were familiar with the Air Force official through his book, "The Passing of the Night." Gen. Risner did a good job of communicating to his audience.

It was a very inspiring speech, and made some of us feel that we have never sacrificed anything for our country. When you stop to think about what the many prisoners of war went through, it makes you very humble, indeed, to realize that you've never had to even worry about where your next meal was coming from.

**FREEDOM** is something that most of us take for granted. Unfortunately, it's sort of like water. You never miss the water until the well runs dry. Gen. Risner said he was able to enjoy all of the simple things of life to the fullest, since returning from seven and one-half years in a North Vietnamese prison camp.

It was a tribute to the recently promoted officer's stamina that he went through all of the prison experiences, and came back not a bitter person because of his ordeal, but even more convinced that our system of government in the United States is the greatest on the face of the earth. It was a truly refreshing and a stirring experience, and we were happy that so many residents of the area turned out to enjoy seeing and hearing this great American.

**THE PEOPLE** who arrange the July Fourth program should have announced that their program was being held seven weeks early. That was a great patriotic program, and would have made a dandy July 4th program.

**THINGS ARE GETTING** to the hectic point around the schools, where everyone from the school officials on down are involved in trying to get everything to "come out even." Some seniors may be sweating out final exams to know whether they will receive their degrees, but because of the new quarter system, at least 15 members of the graduating class have had their requirements met for some time.

Now, we have such things as "first quarter graduates" and "second quarter graduates." In the old days, you sometimes had students who were juniors who completed the requirements early. The new system takes care of all that.

**THE PAST WEEK'S** edition of TV Guide carried a story in which the producers of the Johnny Carson show admit that the talk show host "created" a shortage of toilet paper merely by suggesting that one existed during one of his shows last December.

Americans went out the next day and began hoarding toilet paper, and pretty soon, there almost was a shortage, the article points out.

We've thought for some time that television does its part in making many things much worse than they actually are—such as gas shortages, beef boycotts, kidnappings, "sky-jackings," race riots, etc., etc.

Admittedly, the TV newscasters have a right to report the news. However, the boob tube has become so much a part of people's lives, that TV officials fail many times to realize how much influence they have.

If they did, they would surely use this influence for the good, more often than they do.

Beverly Bailey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Bailey, will give

the salutatory address. Miss Bailey ranked second to Miss Reznik with a 95.7 average for four years.

The class has co-historians, with a tie declared for the third place students. They are Gayla Self, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Max Self, and Kay Cochran, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs.

W.A. Cochran. The two girls had identical 94.71 averages. They will present the class history.

Pianist for the two exercises will be Pattijon Talley. Organist will be Phillip Duggins. Joe Cunningham and Carol Bavousett, members of the junior class, will serve as honor guards.

Wesley Barnett, president of the school board, will present the diplomas.

A total of 131 eighth graders are expected to take part in the ceremony.

## Friona Faces Loss Of Employment Office

Friona's local office of the Texas Employment Commission will close Friday, May 31, it was announced this week by Lester Rape, office manager from Hereford.

Reason for closing the office was stated as "lack of activity," based on cost accounting studies conducted by the state headquarters, Rape said.

Anyone wishing to protest the closing of the local Texas Employment Commission office are urged to write to R.C. Coffman, U.S. Department of Labor, Manpower Administration, Federal Building-U.S. Courthouse, 1100 Commerce St., 7th Floor, Dallas, Texas 75202.

The local office manager Tom Stanfield, will be transferred to Lubbock, it was announced.

The TEC has been furnished office space, rent free, by the

City of Friona, since opening here early in 1968.

Local TEC officials indicated that use of the Friona office has been good, for the size of town. It was opened primarily due to Missouri Beef Packers' locating in the city, and the giant meat packing concern has been a major user of the office.

Rape said there was always possibility of opening the office again at a later date. He explained that the TEC has had its budget cut across the state, and that another office in this area, at Spearman, was closed recently.

People needing employees, or jobs after May 31 are asked to contact the TEC in an adjoining county—at Hereford, Dimmitt or Muleshoe.

The depressed cattle market may have been a factor in the office's recent slow activity, since feedlots, feed mills and related businesses have been slow to hire new personnel.

## BAC Discusses July 4 Activities For City

Possible activities for Friona on July Fourth was the main topic of discussion at the meeting Monday night of Friona's Business Activities Committee (BAC), held at the Community Room of Friona State Bank.

Carrol Gatlin, president, also gave a final report on the committee's Tom T. Hall venture. The report showed that income for the show amounted to \$4,501.79, while expenses came to \$4,931.31, or a loss for the committee of \$429.52.

Gatlin praised the local merchants for their work and support for this project. "It was the most unified effort I've ever seen. We had more people out working on this project than any other I can remember in Friona," Gatlin said.

The BAC chairman also came in for a vote of thanks from the members, for his hard work in setting up the Tom T. Hall show, which included bringing chairs from Amarillo for the affair.

"We learned a lot from the project, and if we decide to have something along this line in the future, there are a number of things we can do differently," Gatlin said.

It was the general consensus of opinion that the show was well-received by residents of the Friona area, and that the publicity received by the city by staging the show was well worth the loss sustained by the project.

Among the things discussed as possibilities for the 4th of July were a box supper and a talent show. Gatlin said he felt it would be in order to schedule a number of events locally for the holiday, in order to encourage people to stay in Friona.

One merchant suggested that the price of gas, plus the fact that July 4th falls on a Thursday, would probably help in keeping folks at home.

A committee was appointed to discuss the possibilities. It will report back when the BAC meets again, on Monday, June 3.

The group viewed a film, "Defense, Defense," on the subject of taking care of your steady customers.

## Friona Flashbacks

45 YEARS AGO—MAY 31, 1929

Announcement was made this week that the Turner-Parr Trading Company has contracted for two lots on the west side of Main Street adjoining the south side of the F.L. Spring building.

A 50x140 foot building will be constructed on the lots, all in one building, but just what the building will be used for is not known at this time.

Crop prospects in the Friona territory are said to be better than for the past several years. The wheat is looking like a better than average crop, and while only a few row crops are planted, hundreds of acres of sorghum grains, sudan and corn will be planted in the next few days.

40 YEARS AGO—JUNE 1, 1934

On Friday evening of last week the Frio Draw overflowed its banks at Friona and as usual swept down the State Highway No. 33 for the distance of nearly a mile. This overflow was caused, not by any heavy rain falling within the immediate territory, but from rain that fell over in New Mexico.

Two cars, unaware of the recent overflow, dashed into the wet road at this point, one being overturned and nearly buried, while the other barely escaped being ditched right where the other capsized.

35 YEARS AGO—JUNE 2, 1939

Miss Alice Guyer of Friona, and Mr. Charles B. Lovelace of Farwell were married in the home of the groom's sister, Mrs. H.L. Thurston at Aspermont May 27. Vows were read by Rev. H.L. Thurston, a former pastor of the Friona Methodist Church.

## Opposition To Center Needs To Speak Out

*A couple of weeks ago, we printed a letter to the editor, in which the writer was asking that further studies be made before the proposed new law enforcement center is built at Farwell.*

*We have heard a number of statements along this line, but we see no positive action as yet.*

*If there is considerable opposition to the new center, it is imperative that those opposed communicate immediately with their elected officials.*

*Plans are proceeding on the center, and it may soon be too late to change anything that has been planned.*

*The commissioner's court is planning to pay for the new law center out of Revenue Sharing Funds. This does not allow the taxpayer to voice their opinion, one way or another.*

*If there is sufficient opposition to the center, then such needs to organize, and let their feelings be known, at the earliest possible time.*

*If not, then residents of this part of the county shall no doubt have to be content with the court house and other county offices remaining in Farwell.*

20 YEARS AGO—MAY 8, 1954

The contract was let Monday to Hammock Bros. of Lubbock for the new elementary building. Contract price was \$147,200. The location is across the street east from the old grade school building. The building will house grades one through four, putting the school on a four-four-four basis.

### Farmers Are Urged To Use Treatment Against Wireworms

Farmers throughout the grain sorghum belt are cautioned to use planter box treatment against wireworms.

The wireworm warning came from Elbert Harp, executive director of Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board and Grain Sorghum Producers Association at Lubbock, Texas.

Harp pointed out that wireworms can devastate hundreds of acres of grain sorghum when a farmer fails to use planter box treatment on seeds.

Dr. George Teetes of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock said, "I think the only effective treatment against wireworms is Heptachlor." Dr. Teetes cautioned that farmers should carefully follow directions on the label when applying planter box treatment.

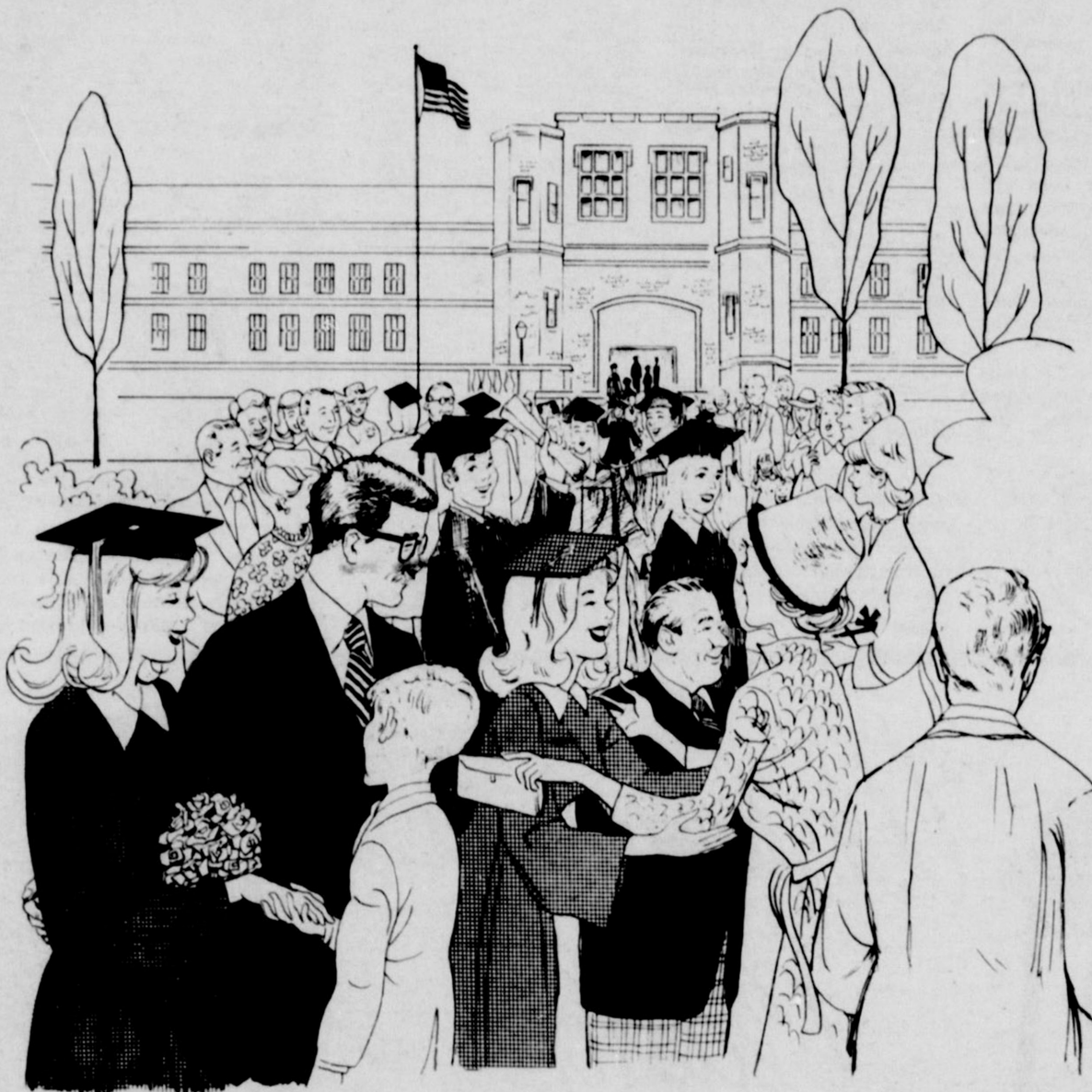

## Chieftain Basketballers' State Entry

### Tops Great FHS Sports Year

Topping a fantastic year sportswise at Friona High School during the 1973-74 school year was the appearance of the Chieftain basketball team in the state meet.

The Chiefs battled to the state finals--the first time ever for a boys team to go that far--and captured the state runnerup trophy.

The 1973-74 Chieftains established a number of records for future teams to shoot at. They won more games than any other team (28), and were the highest scoring cage team ever at FHS (70.2 average for 35 games).

It was the first time a boys basketball team ever won regional for Friona, and the second place finish in state was the best ever.

Gene Strickland, Dale Cleveland and Dale Parsons were named first team all-district. Strickland and Cleveland then went on to make all-regional and all-state.

The duo was named to the all-regional and all-state tournament first teams. Then later when the regular all-state teams were announced, Strickland was on the second team and Cleveland the third.

Seniors Bobby Lewellen and Kent Patterson were honorable mention all-district.

The Chieftains began to draw

attention to themselves in December when they won the first annual Amarillo Invitational Tournament at the Civic Center Coliseum. Lewellen was named to the all-tournament team.

Friona also won the Vega invitational. The Chiefs were edged by two points in the finals of their own meet by Lubbock Estacado, a loss they avenged a week later on the Matadors' home court.

Reserves on the team included Trip Horton, Dave Clark, Gary Land, Clay Bandy, Bill Fallwell, Ted King and David Hutson.

The 28 wins added to 53 in four other years made coach Ray DeBord the winningest basketball coach in FHS history.

The Chiefs hadn't been favored to win district in pre-season, but went unbeaten with an 8-0 mark, beating tough Dimmitt on the road for the first time in 25 years, and likewise last year's state entry Morton.

For his efforts, DeBord was chosen "Coach of the Year" by



both the Amarillo Globe-News and Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

He has accepted a position at

Bell Hurst High School in Fort Worth, and will be replaced by former assistant Coach Larry Dyess next season.

Joy Morton was faculty coach

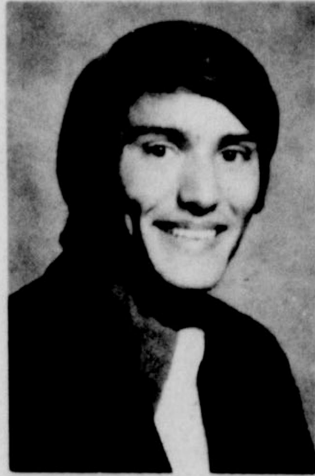
for the play.

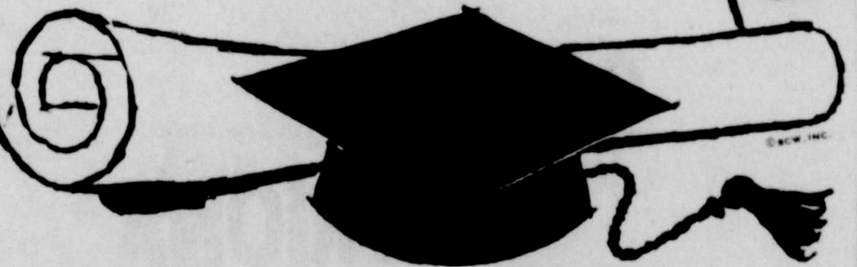

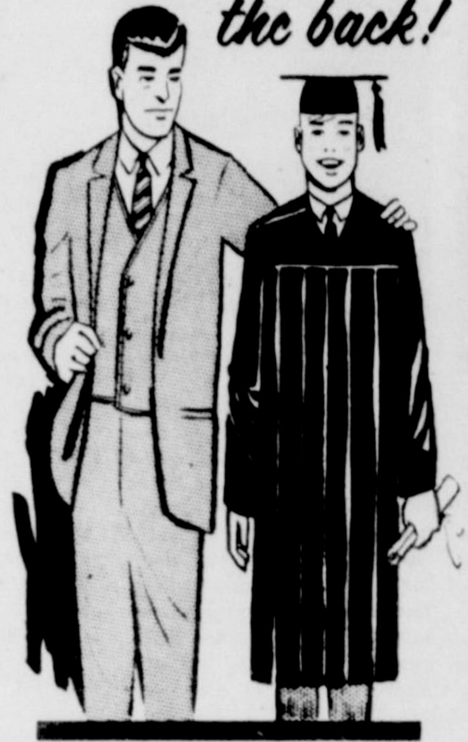

High scoring forward Darla Rhodes, who led the Squaws in scoring with 674 points this year, was chosen to the all-star team's forward group.

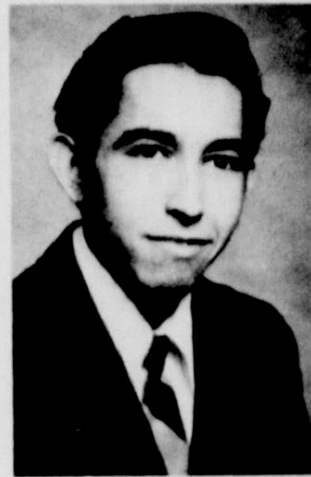
Two guards made the all-district team, Tena Day and

Teresa Ingram. Miss Day was the team's leading rebounder. Miss Ingram missed the last few district games due to a knee injury.

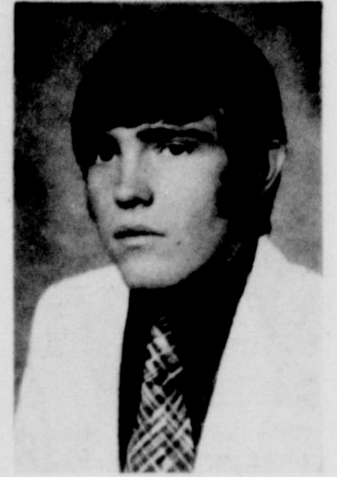
It marked the second year in a row for Misses Rhodes and Ingram to be picked for the all-district team.

# Friona Debate Team Second In State

state meet in Austin on May 2-3-4.

Friona High School scored 27 points in the regional meet, getting 20 points for the debate win.

Other FHS contestants who took part in the regional meet included Gary Stone (poetry interpretation and prose reading), Ronald Land (number sense), Carolyn Gore (spelling), Beverly Bailey (spelling) and Cinda Johnson (journalism).
