## New School Term Begins Here Monday

Summer will end officially for some 1500 students in the Friona area on Monday, when the 1974-75 school term begins. Registration for students in grades six through 12 were held Friday at Friona High

School and Junior High. Buses will run their regular schedules for the first time on Monday. School begins at 8:45 a.m., and ends each day at 3:45 p.m. Students who will be in kindergarten through the fifth

grade will register on the first day of school. Those students in grades six through 12 who did not register on Friday will also need to check with their respective principal's office Monday morning.

On the kindergarten program, those children born after Sept. 1, 1968 and before March 1, 1969 will be eligible for the first semester kindergarten, and should report to school on Monday.

Children born between March 1, 1969 and Sept. 1, 1969 will be eligible for the second semester and will not report for school until Jan. 15, 1975. However, school officials would like to have the names of these students, so as to better plan for the second semester.

Birth certificates should be furnished for kindergarten and first grade students. Immunization records are required for all students in order to comply with Texas law. Superintendent Tom Jarboe reminds that immunization shots required by the Friona school system are polio, rubeola, rubella and DPT.

The teaching roster for 1974-75 includes 15 new instructors and six transfers from within the system. (See separate story on new faculty members).

## Friona Youth Found Dead At Castro Jail

DIMMITT (Staff)—A 19-year-old Friona man hanged himself about a half hour Sunday after being arrested for drunk driving in Dimmitt.

Bardemar Barda, an employee of Missouri Beef Packers in Friona, was found hanging in a shower stall of the cell shortly before 3 p.m. when deputies found him on a routine check.

Barda used a strip of material torn from a blanket to hang himself. He tied one end of the material around the shower curtain bar.

Attempts to revive Barda by mouth-to-mouth resuscitation failed. He was pronounced dead at the scene by a private physician. Justice of the Peace Mary Jo Smith ruled the death suicide.

Barda, a resident of Friona

for five years, was born March 5, 1955 in Mercedes, Tex. Barda lived in Hereford prior to moving to Friona.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Barda of Friona; five sisters, Mrs. Maclavia Orozco, Mrs. Beatrice Ramirez and Mrs. Estella Stillman, all of Elsa, Texas, Mrs. Cleotilde Sanchez of Ralls, Texas and Mrs. Consuelo Jimenez of Bovina; six brothers, Manuel R. Jr. of Elsa, Sammy of Hereford, Luis, Jessie and Manuel Jr. III, all of Bovina and Guadalupe of Friona.

Graveside services were held Thursday for the 19-year-old Frionan. Pallbearers were Ambrosio Rios, Jr., Joe Mejia, Pete Mejia, Ricky Antillon, George Olvera and Joe Rios.

## Construction Underway By Herring Implement

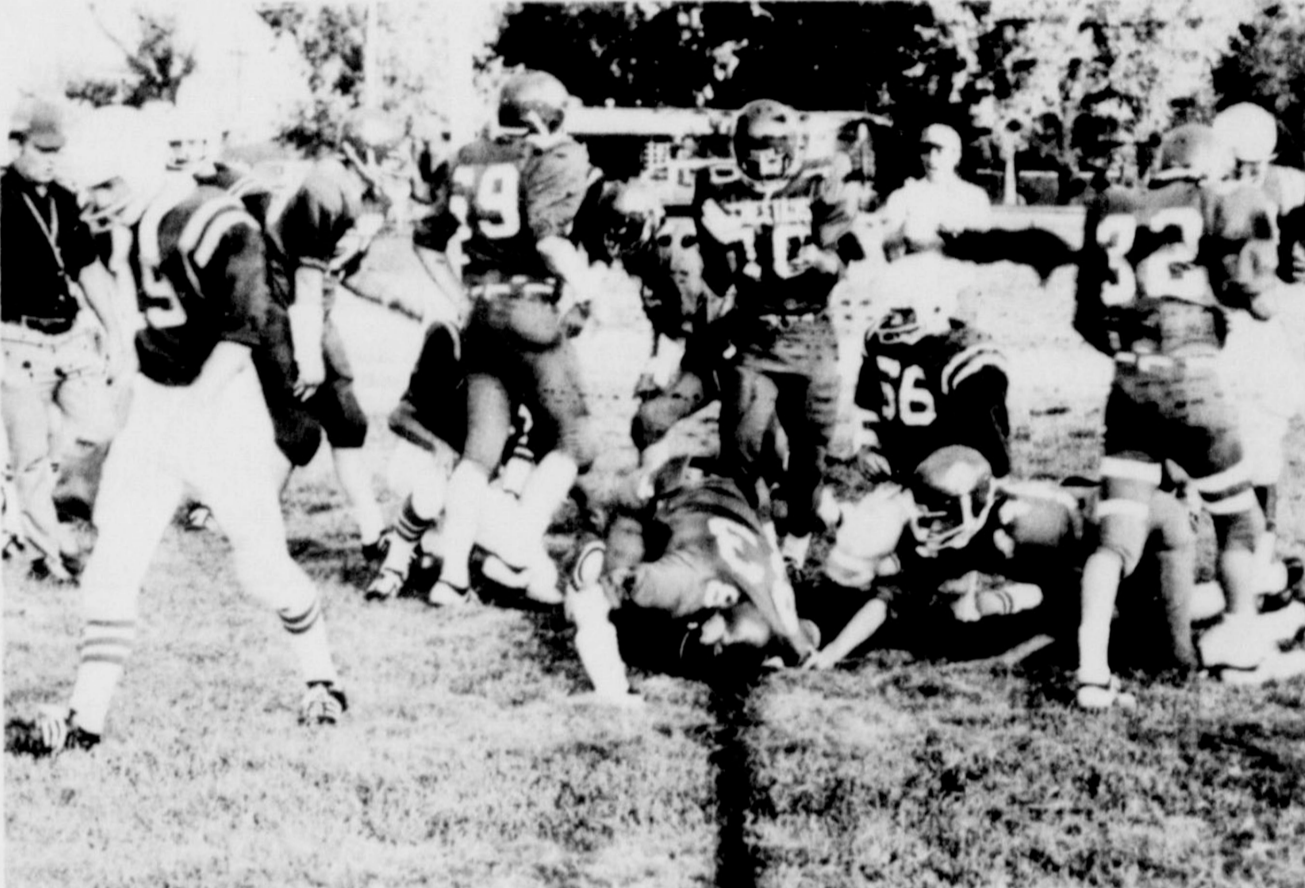
## Good Rains Received Moisture Welcomed

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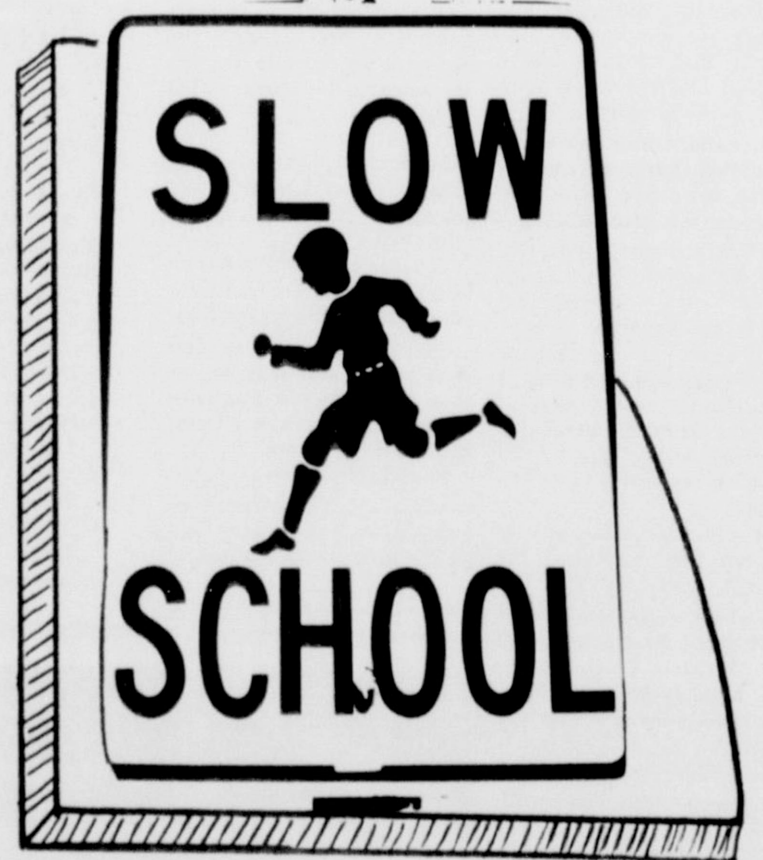
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## Anthony Addresses U.S. Feed Grains Council

If conditions continue to deteriorate throughout the grain sorghum production area, the total overall production level will be near disaster, according to A.W. Anthony, Jr. of Friona, president of the Grain Sorghum Producers Assn.

Anthony made the remarks during an address at the annual meeting of the U.S. Feed Grains Council this week (Aug. 7-9) in Stratton Mountain, Vermont.

"This year adverse weather conditions, including severe drought, have caused prices to soar, but only a few producers will be wearing broad smiles with the increased prices," Anthony said. "A farmer whose production has been wiped out because of drought will receive no benefits, even if grain prices were to go up to \$10 per hundred pounds."

"Those of us who have irrigated but will have a short crop because of the extremely hot, dry summer will not be receiving the income that the higher prices might indicate due to reduced yields. The farmer who has only half his normal yield would have to

receive twice the normal price in order to maintain the same income."

In summarizing sorghum crop conditions throughout the U.S., Anthony said the only bright spots are the valley area of South Texas and the Gulf Coast area. Crops in the Blacklands, East Central Texas, Rolling Plains, South Plains, eastern New Mexico, High Plains and throughout Kansas and Nebraska are far below earlier expectations and production levels will be down considerably from 1973.

"Just a rough estimate at this time is that our total production will be at least 20 percent below last year's crop," Anthony said. "This would drop the total production for 1974 to 750 million bushels or less. And we feel that it is quite possible for it to drop another 10 per cent, even without further crop deterioration."

Including stocks on hand, Anthony estimated this county's total supply of grain is very likely not to exceed 800 million bushels for the coming marketing year. "Earlier predictions by the USDA showed an export market of 200 million

bushels and a domestic market of 700 million. With the higher price levels of this fall's crops, both the domestic and export markets will be cut somewhat but taking everything into consideration, it appears that we will be about 100 million bushels short of earlier demand estimates," Anthony said.

During the meeting, Elbert Harp of Lubbock was named chairman of the U.S. Feed Grains Council.

**SYBIL**

Sybil, an almost unbelievable true story, describes the life of its namesake, Sybil I. Dorsett (a pseudonym). Born to a schizophrenic mother and a father who appeared totally ignorant of her environment, she was tortured mercilessly and cruelly by her mother as an infant and young girl. Unable to cope with the situations which arose, her mind created a new and different personality. When Sybil could no longer continue to cope with a certain situation, this new personality would "take over."

Sybil herself could remember none of what took place during the occupancy of this personality. An example of this is: When Sybil was in the fourth grade her grandmother died, a woman she truly loved and adored. Her parents sent her

upstairs, telling her they would come get her before the funeral started. They came and got her but only to take her to the burial for the funeral had already taken place.

Learning that her parents had deceived her, Sybil got angry, but since she herself was not capable of anger, the personality which was took over. From that time until a day when she was in the sixth grade, a period of a year and a half, this and various other personalities had control over her body. When Sybil "awoke," she thought she was in the wrong room, for the last thing she remembered was her grandmother's burial and she was in the fourth grade then. All the schoolwork she had done during the time she was "gone" meant nothing to her. She had no idea what was going on. Things she knew the day before she did not know today.

These lapses were to take place many times afterward, but only for a few days or

weeks at a time. They were to take her on trips, buy things she herself would not have bought. One of her personalities broke a lot of glass, a reaction to a childhood experience.

Altogether, there were sixteen different personalities, fourteen female and two male, each at a different stage of emotional and physical maturity. They saw themselves as human beings, different as we are different, different tastes, physical features, backgrounds, friends. They knew about each other, while Sybil knew about none of them. One of them, Vicky, knew about everything that went on, either during Sybil's "reign" or one of the others'.

It took eleven years of psychoanalysis to rebuild Sybil's personality into one. The outcome was one of a seventeenth personality, a combination of Sybil's sixteen different personalities, a unique and individual one.

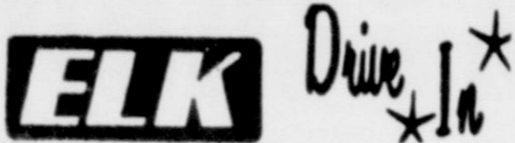

Boys Ranch may have helped that along because they came to play and they stuck us pretty good," added Coach Owen.

Offensive guard Roy Don Rector and tackle Kenny Stowers were singled out for good play along with center Dave Clark by the head coach.

Owen was pleased with the defensive unit with their

aggressive hitting and gang tackling. Defensive ends Dale Cleveland and Dave Clark contained the Roughriders' wide running attack very well and Gene Strickland did a bang-up job in the secondary for the Chiefs.

One point in the scrimmage, the Roughriders burned the Chiefs with a long bomb, but the Friona goal line defense stiffened up and held the Roughriders inside the five for three plays. Coach Owen pointed out that the Chiefs had not worked on a goal-line defense as of yet and was very pleased with the effort by the team.

On the good news side, Kevin Welch was given a release by the doctors to get into pads. Welch is being counted on by the coaching staff to give the Chiefs more depth in the backfield. Welch was operated on for an infected leg this summer and his status was in doubt, but the senior running back is ready to get it on.

The Chiefs will host the tough Canyon Eagles next Friday here in Friona for their second scrimmage of the season. The Eagles are a big team and the Chiefs are expected to have their hands full with the size of the offensive line and big backs.

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Back in the 1870's when the Mennonites began their migration from Europe to America—Santa Fe was there! A representative of the railroad traveled abroad in those early days to influence homeseekers to settle along the pioneer rail routes being built westward across Kansas. At that time, hardly anyone realized that their efforts would be rewarded through a few sacks of wheat seed which thrived in Kansas and spread to help make mid-America the breadbasket of the World.

### 100 years of moving wheat

Wheat is usually moved in a short period of time to meet harvest deadlines, export schedules and marketing requirements. These conditions make great demands on the railroads and it takes Santa Fe's modern facilities, an up-to-date car fleet and skillful employees to get the wheat job done year after year.

During the past century many things have been done to move wheat efficiently. Two examples stand out in Santa Fe's history:

- (1) The giant 100-ton covered hopper car first introduced for moving wheat in 1963. Today, Santa Fe has 12,000 of these cars in service, the largest fleet in the rail industry, and 1,000 additional are now on order. Altogether these 13,000 hoppers have a capacity equivalent to approximately 21,000 conventional box cars.
- (2) One of Santa Fe's greatest achievements in handling grain was completed earlier this year when we moved a record-breaking billion bushels, a total of 350,000 carloads, in just twenty months.

Those few sacks of seed of Turkey Red hard winter wheat carried to America by early Mennonite homeseekers started one of the greatest agricultural developments in the nation. It's a history the Santa Fe has been proud to be a part of the past 100 years—all the way!

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# Chieftain Opponents Eye Improved Years

Despite the fact that a well-known high school prep magazine predicted the Friona Chieftains would capture the District 3-AA football title, the road to the championship will be a hard-winding one.

The Chiefs, with a host of returning lettermen, have a good or better yet—an excellent chance of wearing the district crown, but the Red and White clad warriors of Coach Bob Owen will have to play the games one at a time and not get caught looking ahead.

## FARWELL STEERS

The first stone in the path of the Chiefs will be played in Farwell September 6. Since the series with the Steers began both teams have won 18 times and tied one game.

The Steers have a new head coach in Eugene Jennings, formerly an assistant at Pampa and head coach at Silverton.

Farwell returns 11 lettermen from a squad that dipped to a 1-9 win-loss record last year. Coach Jennings plans to run the Wishbone offense (triple option) and hopes to utilize a platoon, letting the first team offense play as second team defense and the number two defense as the number one offense. Coach Jennings has 40 players out, some players will be going both ways.

The Steers will probably tab Leslie Curtis as the number one signal-caller directing a backfield composed of fullback Gene Chastain, and halfbacks Mike Woods and Jay Hanna. Chastain may be utilized as a center also.

Mark Haseloff and Barry Goldsmith have been called the best linemen in the camp by the new head mentor.

Quickness will be the main asset for the Steers and many games can be turned around with speed. Weakness of the Steers seems to be size.

## MULES LACK DEPTH

The 1974 version of the Muleshoe Mules hope to improve on a 3-6-1 win-loss record, but lack of experience and depth could possibly hamper the Mules this season. The Chiefs trail the Mules in the series, 7-15-1.

Muleshoe will host the Chieftains on Sept. 20 and will have played two games compared to Friona's one game. The Mules will have a new head coach in Chuck Stout, who plans to operate the I-formation.

Running is the name of the game in the Muleshoe camp this season, but Coach Stout feels that the Mules will have to throw the ball more than they did last season.

Slated to direct the offense is Cory Sudduth, a junior quarterback. Sudduth will have Robert Shafer at fullback while Randy Norman and Bill Grogan fight it out for the wingback slot. Top candidates for the tailback slot are juniors Tommy St. Clair and Hector Posadas, who both started some last year.

The down linemen are the most experienced on the team. Returning starters are Robert Stovall (6-2, 200) and Dusty Davis (6-3, 215) at tackles. Danny Vela (185) started at guard

last year. The left tackle spot is up for grabs between Billy Balderas and Hector Torres.

Ruben Gonzales, Jeff Skipworth, Doug Crawford and Jim Wisian along with Max Burhman are candidates for the end position.

## TULIA HAS SIZE, SPEED

The Tulia Hornets are bigger and faster than last year. This could be bad news for the Friona Chiefs Sept. 27 if all the hopes of Coach Earl Miller comes true. The Chiefs have been beaten 11 times compared to three victories against Tulia.

The Hornets were weak in the line last year and have better backs this year. According to Coach Miller, the line will average about 175 pounds per man.

Tulia's attacking backfield is loaded with returning lettermen. Top returner is fullback Raymond Williams (185), who was selected All-District as a sophomore. Monte Malcolm, another All-District selection returns to battle it out with Carl Smiley, who started some as a halfback last season. Another returning starter, Jimmy McCaslin will take up his position at the other halfback.

The only untried spot in the backfield, but the most vital is at quarterback where junior Monty Cannon and sophomore Steve Brown are competing for the starting role. The contest is close with Cannon holding a slight edge.

Starters across the line will be Van Latham or Larry Billingsley at tight end, John Mays and Rusty Perry at tackle, Gary Gilleland and Barry Cosby are the guards with Jan Kiker at center.

Defensively, the Hornets return nine starters from last season with three of the four starting linebackers back.

## LONGHORNS STRONG

Enthusiasm runs high in the Hart Longhorn corral this fall and the 'Horns have plenty of reason to feel that way with 15 lettermen back. Friona meets the 'Horns on Oct. 4 in Hart. The Chiefs have won the only two encounters played between the two teams, back in 1955 and 1956.

The Longhorns return two of their starting backfield in tailback Barry George and fullback Terry Hill. Danny George will operate the Power I formation at quarterback. Gilbert Rodriguez and Berto Menjares will fight it out for the other halfback slot vacated by the great Jimmy Brown.

Possibly the only big weakness is the line depth, but the first unit will be solid with Kent Irons leading the trench strength. Irons will snap the ball while the ends are Danny Carson and Randy Finch, both seniors.

Senior Jesse Perez will handle a tackle slot and is a returnee while Freddy Mancias returns as one guard. Mario Martinez should handle the other guard position with his 195-pound senior frame and 220-pound junior Dean Hill should take up the other tackle spot.

## WOLVES TO CONTENT

The Dalhart Wolves return only seven lettermen, but will rely heavily on their strong B-team from last season, which has a 25 game winning streak going. Dalhart invades Friona Oct. 11. The Wolves lead the series in games 8-5.

Dalhart's strength lies in its tradition and a few quality athletes returning.

Jason Robertson is considered the leader of the pack and is a prime candidate for all-state laurels. Robertson is one of the ends in the Wing-T offense directed by quarterback Mike Smith or promising newcomer Jim Bob Matthews. Fullback candidates are Mike Slatten and Richard Stewart. Jeff Reynolds has the inside track at wingback while Rusty Hammett and Bob Coffey shoot at the halfback spot.

## DEFENSE SPARKS ABERNATHY

Most coaches feel that if they have one All-South Plains defensive lineman returning they're lucky, but to have two it's a blessing. The Abernathy Antelopes are happy to be blessed

with two.

Returning is 240-pound David Thomas who averaged 10 unassisted tackles per game. Roy Esquivel, who was named to the elite team while playing noseguard at Idalou, recently moved to Abernathy.

Friona will meet the Antelopes Oct. 18 in Abernathy. The Chiefs lead the series, 5-3.

Abernathy returns eight lettermen and six starters back to the gridiron campaign this season. The Antelopes lost a pair of starters when Kent Harrison did not recover from a neck injury and Robert Scott was hurt during a rodeo.

The Antelopes will rely primarily on the passing game since no running backs returned this season. The backfield is very inexperienced.

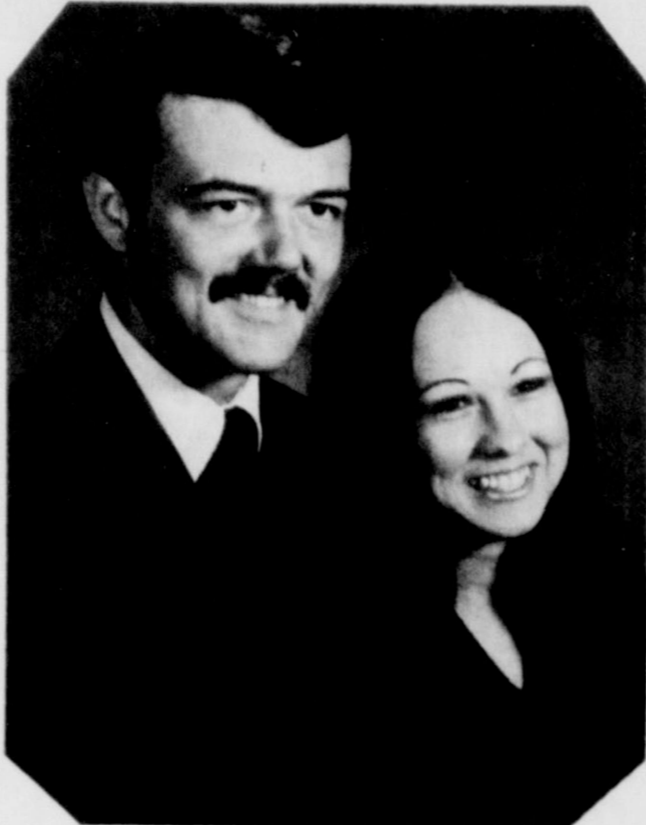

Ronnie is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth McLellan of Friona. He is active in FFA,

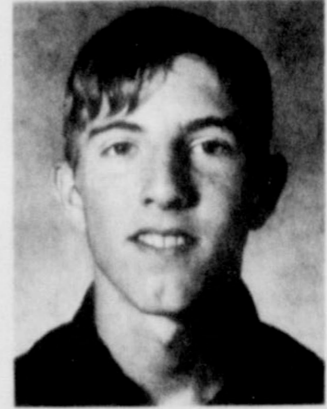
football, track, is a member of the annual staff, and earned his Lone Star Farmer's degree in FFA this summer.
