

The loss came in Friona's first outing in district play, and left the team needing a series of "ifs" to happen, in order to get back into the title chase, while leaving Olton with a stellar 2-0 district mark with Littlefield and Dimmitt left to play.

Olton won the battle of the district's top defenses in a game of breaks. Going into the game, Friona had given up the least points of any district team--21, while Olton had given up less yardage-less than 100 per contest. The Mustangs capitalized

on their one big break for the game's only score. Friona missed out on two big scoring opportunities, either of which might have given them the win, with a TD and an extra point kick. Friona won the toss, for the seventh straight time, and to the amazement of many fans, elected to kick off, giving Olton the ball first. However, the choice proved to be a good one, and almost gave Friona an early lead and momentum in the

a member of the organization's board of directors, presented a program on behalf of Girlstown at the regular meeting of the Friona Lions Club this week.

"Inflation has hurt everyone, and it has hurt Girlstown doubly," stated Dr. Milton Adams of Hereford, also a member of the board.

Dr. Adams explained that it costs something over \$300 per girl per month to operate Girlstown, and that the charitable organization currently has some 150 girls at its three campuses. This amounts to around \$45,000 monthly for operating expenses.

At the present time, Girlstown is faced with expenses amounting to \$60,000, and only has around \$7,000 in the bank.

The Girlstown board member explained that it was a common occurrence for Girlstown to be in a financial bind at this time of the year, since gifts to the organization ordinarily pick up after the harvest season and around Christmas.

However, this year Girlstown is further behind than it ever has been on its bills, and prospects this fall are perhaps less than usual.

The Texas CowBelles have adopted furnishing meat to Girlstown as a project, and this will be a big relief, but there are other needs to be met, such as clothing, other food items, and general operating expenses.

It was pointed out that gifts to Girlstown are tax deductible. Other than outright cash gifts, some other means of helping which have been suggested include monthly drafts, trust funds or endowments, and bequeaths in wills.

Also, it was suggested that people might send memorial gifts to Girlstown when friends or relatives pass away

Standard Time To Return On Sunday

> Central Standard Time returns Sunday morning, for four months at least.

Clocks will be turned back one hour at 2 a.m. Sunday over the United States, ending the longest spell of Daylight Savings Time ever in the United States. DST went into effect in January when the then President Richard M. Nixon signed the new DST bill designed to conserve energy. The bill was slated to have Daylight Savings Time run through October 1975.

In Friona, it seems people will have an extra hour's sleep before Sunday School and worship services begin in local churches, school children will get to classes an hour later beginning next week and lose an hour of daylight between the end of classes and bedtime.





Farm Census To Be Taken

agricultural statistical project of the past five years, will begin in January. It will be conducted by the Bureau of the Census, part of the Department of Commerce's Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

From Alaska to Florida, from Maine to Hawaii, farmers and ranchers will receive census forms in the mail around the first of the new year. The report forms are to be filled out and mailed back promptly.

Representatives of farm organizations such as the Farm Bureau, The Grange, Farmers Union, National Farmers Organization, and Farmers Cooperatives serve on the Advisory Committee that recommends to the Bureau the questions that should be included in the census.

Three kinds of information are requested about operations during 1974:

Agriculture, the largest resources, number of farms, Department of Agriculture, area of farm land, acres of cropland and pasture, number of each kind of livestock and poultry, number of persons working on farms, number of various kinds of farm equipment; second, a record of farm products produced and sold during 1974; and third, selected farming activities during 1974 such as number of days of off-farm work by the farmer, amount spent for farm labor, for custom

work, for feed, for gasoline and oil. To report this kind of information, a farmer will need to have a few simple records. The Census Bureau is urging each farmer to have his records of quantities harvested, products sold, major farm expenses and the like readily available so that he can easily and accurately fill out his census report when it comes

confidential by law. It may be seen only by sworn Census employees and may be used only for statistical purposes. The mail census method reinforces confidentiality. And it allows the farmers to complete his report on his convenience with accurate information



September, 1974, shows a total of 471 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 213 persons injured as compared to September, 1973, with 601 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 364 persons injured. This was 130 less accidents, seven less killed, and 151 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time. The 17 traffic deaths for

the month of September, 1974, occurred in the following counties: two each in Lipscomb, Moore, Parmer, Haskell and Parker; and one each in Castro, Deaf Smith, Hartley, Oldham, Randall, Hale and Lamb.







Operation I.D. has basically two parts. First, a safe, fire-proof place. mark all your easily stolen valuables so they can be identified. Second, display a warning sticker which tells burglars that your property is protected with your mark. Marking property accom-

plishes several things. Items marked in Operation I.D. are harder for the burglar to see or "fence," and an Operation I.D. sticker on a front and back burglars because your property can be easily and the identification mark simplifying the apprehension of criminals.

The Friona Police Department has purchased engraving pens which can be checked out at no cost to

When home owners and businessmen obtain an etching pen, the department encourages them to talk to their friends and neighbors about marking their property while the pen is handy.

The actual marking process is simple. Use your driver's license number to mark your property in the following manner: Engrave TX for state identification, so that if the property is taken out of the state, the number can be easily traced; then write your license number. (Example: TX5551212).
