Gen. R. M. Stillman To Address Class

He will be guest speaker at the Dining In which will be held at the Webb AFB Officers Open Mess at 6:45 p.m.

Gen. Stillman was graduated from the U. S. Military Academy on June 12, 1935 and commissioned a second lieutenant of field artillery. Upon graduation he entered flying school at Randolph Field and was graduated from advanced flying school at Kelley Field in October 1936. Now, he is rated a command pilot. He served with the 50th Reconnaissance Squadron at Hickam Field, Hawaii, from January 1937 to August 1940, returning to the Military Academy each fall during this period as a member of the football coaching staff.

Other assignments took him to Washington, D. C., where he was appointed chief of the overseas section, Directorate of War Organization and Movements at the Army-Air Force Headquarters in September 1938. In October 1943 he became executive officer of the 387th Bomb Group, MacDill Field, Florida.

Overseas in March 1943, Gen. Stillman commanded the 32nd Bomb Group of the Eighth Air Force in England until he was shot down during his second B-26 raid and captured in Holland in May 1943, remaining a prisoner of war until April 1945.

Other assignments in the U.S. included service at headquarters, Third Air Force, Tampa, Fla.; Tactical Air Command Headquarters, Langley Field, Va.; Stewart Field, N. Y., Mitchell AFB, N. Y.

In September 1954, Gen. Stillman was designated commandant of cadets for the newly activated U. S. Air Force Academy. He assumed command of Lackland Military Training Center in September 1958. In October 1961, he assumed command of the 313th Air Division, Okinawa, Ryukyu Islands. Gen. Stillman came to Sheppard AFB as commander in July 1963.



First In Class To Solo

Police Nab Man Accused Of Murder

SOUTH PITTSBURG, Tenn. (AP)—Police shot and captured today a Negro sought in the death of a pregnant white housewife. He was taken by ambulance to Alabama's Kilby Prison in Montgomery.

Johnny D. Beecher, 32, trapped by hunger that brought him to this southeast Tennessee city from Alabama in search of food, was shot in the right leg by a South Pittsburg policeman.

Police Chief E. Dick Burrow said Beecher admitted raping and strangling Marjane Jane Chisenhall, 21, a bride of seven months who was found dead Tuesday on Sand Mountain in northeast Alabama. She had been abducted shortly after Beecher escaped Monday from an Alabama work gang near her home.

After his capture, Beecher was taken to a South Pittsburg hospital under heavy guard. Burrow said his right leg was fractured.

Officers confirmed that he had been transferred by ambulance to Alabama, but first declined to say where.

"I'm not authorized to give out that information," an Alabama highway patrolman said.

"We can't say until we know what is going to happen to the boy. They're a little afraid of mobs."

Later it was disclosed that he was en route to the maximum security prison at Kilby.

Libel Trial Continuing

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—The Associated Press resumes today defense testimony in a \$2-million libel suit brought by former Maj. Gen. Edwn A. Walker. Three witnesses for the news association were heard Tuesday.

A jury of four women and eight men in Dist. Judge Charles Murray's courtroom are trying to decide whether the AP libeled Walker in news stories two years ago out of Oxford, Miss. These involved a segregationist riot Sept. 30, 1962, on the University of Mississippi campus.

Walker, 54, charged that he falsely was reported as leading a charge of student rioters against U.S. marshals, on duty on the campus to insure the entrance to the university of Negro James H. Meredith.

The AP opened its defense on Tuesday and among the witnesses was Craig Ellis, 26, a United Press International newspaperman who was on the Ole Miss campus during the riots as a reporter for the Nashville Banner.

Craig testified that Walker made a speech to students from a Confederate monument on the campus, and added that when it ended:

"He stood where he was for a short period of time, then turned left and stepped down from the monument. He took several steps up the walk by himself. I recall that one or maybe two men caught up with him. These two or three, including Gen. Walker, moved 10 or 12 feet up the sidewalk."

"About that time the people listening to him moved behind him and then a solid line formed behind the general."

Visitors Leave Tributes On Kennedy's Grave

WASHINGTON (AP)—A bab's shoe, a woman's glove, a religious medal, a lone flower have been placed on the hillside grave.

They rest on the sun-seared grass, along with the berets and caps of fighting men—some of the personal remembrances from the multitude which daily moves slowly and silently past the place where John F. Kennedy is buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

The caps—the deep green beret of the Army Special Forces, the standard Army green of the conventional forces, the forest green of the Marines and the Air Force blue—remain.

But each morning the tributes of the visitors are removed, packed away and sent once a week to the White House. From there they are made available to Mrs. Kennedy, who decides what should be done with them. Some presumably are set aside for the time when a Kennedy memorial is built.

An estimated three million persons have visited the grave.

Only a comparative few drop mementos on the grave, but these now total hundreds of thousands.

Some of the tribute objects obviously are brought with the intention of leaving them. Others are spontaneous, like the glove removed and dropped on to the grave by a woman.

A group of pupils from a Richmond, Va., school trooped slowly past. When they were gone, attendants found a five-dollar bill. Clipped to it was a note—contributed by the Kennedy Memorial Library at Cambridge.

There are, of course, the formal floral pieces. Most of them come from organizations, from church groups, from visiting foreign statesmen or diplomatic missions.

But a child passes by and drops a single flower on the grave.

The military mementos started on the day of Kennedy's bur-

ial. A sergeant of the Army Special Forces, standing by the grave when the funeral throng was gone, removed his beret and placed it on the mound.

The other services were quick to follow the sergeant's gesture and the caps of soldiers, sailors, Marines and Air Force men joined the green beret.

Winter storms and summer sun and rain weathered the caps, then worked at the fabric. A few days before last Memorial Day, officials of the Military District of Washington decided they needed replacing. This was done.

Sixty-Nine Transfers Affect Local District

Sixty-one student transfers out of Big Spring Independent School District, and eight transfers into the district, were approved by the Howard County School board at its June 4 meeting, according to a report from County Supt. Walker Bailey to Supt. Sam Anderson.

Transfers were denied three children from each of two families.

According to the itemized report handed to board members Tuesday night 21 were transferred to the Coahoma District, 25 to Forsan County Line district, 11 to the Borden County district and two to the Sands district.

Anderson said he appeared before the county board to protest mass transfers from any one district to another except in actual emergencies.

Anderson pointed out that most of the children transferred to the Forsan district lived on Dixon, Hamilton, Connally, and Parkway, within a few blocks of Marcy Elementary School, and complained of crowded conditions to secondary schools. Eleven of the 21 going to Forsan are junior high and senior high students, and 14 are elementary.

# Rosy Reports On Economy Pleases LBJ

WASHINGTON (AP) — The capital was abloom today with rosy reports on the nation's economy.

Jobs, personal income, manufacturing profits and production were up, and labor disputes down.

"Our economic prognosis is one of continued growth," declared President Johnson after a look at some of the figures and no doubt pleased at the prospect of having prosperity in an election year.

These were the findings by the various agencies Tuesday after adding up and comparing percentages:

—The Securities and Exchange Commission and the Federal Trade Commission reported the profits of manufacturing corporations were 27 per cent higher in the first three months of this year than last.

Profits after taxes, the report added, were \$5.12 billion, compared to \$4.2 billion in the first quarter of 1963.

—Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges said personal income rose to a seasonally adjusted rate of almost \$485 billion in May, \$25 billion above May 1963.

All was not cheery here, however, for the \$1.25-billion gain was only slightly more than half of the April advance.

—The Federal Reserve Board reported that industrial production increased in May for the ninth consecutive month. Its index inched up from 129.6 in April to 130.3—meaning the output of factories, mines and utilities is 30.3 per cent higher than the 1957-59 average, used as a base figure of 100.

The climb was about average for the past several months but, again, about half as much as April's. The board said the May rise charted a further increase in the output of industrial equipment, a record flow of new automobiles and another jump of the production of furniture and other household goods. The output of iron and steel was near last year's peak.

—The Federal Mediation Service reports the nation is enjoying one of its most peaceful periods of labor relations since World War II, with less working time lost to strikes than to coffee breaks.

—The Labor Department reported employment increased to an all-time high of 71.1 million in May and unemployment dropped 300,000 to 3.6 million, adding up to a 3.1 per cent jobless rate—a four-year low.

"It is heartening to note," Johnson said, "that today more people are at work in the United States at higher wages than ever before."

## IN MOTEL

### Woman Shoots Her Abductor

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — A woman who told police she was a kidnap victim shot and killed her alleged abductor in an east Wichita motel early today.

Mrs. Jane Maxine Duke, 38, of Baytown, Tex., said her abductor, William P. Crawford, 35, also of Baytown, kidnaped her from a grocery store Monday morning.

Mrs. Duke said Crawford forced her to accompany him to a Dallas motel Monday night and to the Wichita motel Tuesday night. She said she had been raped several times.

Mrs. Duke said Crawford bought a gun in Wichita Tuesday and told her he intended to kill her. She said Crawford became weary from the travel and continually watching her and went to sleep about midnight. As he dozed Mrs. Duke said she eased the .38 caliber pistol from beneath his pillow and fired one shot in panic when it appeared Crawford was awakening.

Crawford died instantly.

Mrs. Duke, clad only in a nightgown, went to the motel office and asked that the police and an ambulance be called.

Baytown police said Mrs. Duke disappeared Monday morning. Her abandoned car was found in front of the grocery store. The Federal Bureau of Investigation had been called in on the case and Crawford was being sought when the shooting took place.

Crawford was originally from Lakewood, Calif.

Mrs. Duke said she knew Crawford because he and his family had once lived across the street from the Duke residence.

No charges were filed against Mrs. Duke, police said.

### Rancher Found In Plane Wreck

CENTERVILLE, Tex. (AP) — Searchers learned Tuesday why Joseph F. Burdette, 38, never reached Houston on a flight from his ranch near here the night of June 8.

John Broussard Jr., son of the foreman at Burdette's ranch in the Ninevah community, found the twin Bonanza wrecked in a wooded area only half a mile from the ranch. The body of Burdette was pinned inside.

A hunt did not begin until day before Tuesday, when the elder Broussard telephoned Burdette's Houston office and learned the ranch owner had not arrived.

Burdette owned the Edwards Drilling Co. with a brother, E. M. Burdette of Houston.

West's preemptive bid backfired on him in a strange manner, when it influenced declarer to devise a plan of campaign which ran distinctly against normal expectations.

The three heart bid severely cramped the communication channels for North and South. Despite having rather unattractive distribution, North could see no alternative to making a take-out double. South realized that any pertinent exchange of information was not available at this high level and, since he had a nearly self-sufficient suit and considerable high card strength, he elected to gamble it out for a small slam. His leap to six diamonds is, in our opinion, a reasonable choice.

West opened the king of

hearts which was taken by declarer's ace. The contract appeared to be a reasonable undertaking inasmuch as it hinged on the success of either the spade or club finesse.

Winning one out of two finesses usually presents a player with three to one odds in his favor. South was disinclined to rely on the percentage tables however, for, in view of West's preemptive activities, he placed the latter with nothing but a long heart suit. Declarer mentally assigned the king of spades and the queen of clubs to East, and he sought for a line of play that could cope successfully with his pessimistic assumptions.

After winning the opening lead, South led over to the ace of diamonds and ruffed a heart in his hand. Dummy was reentered with the jack of diamonds to trump the last heart as East discarded a spade. South drew East's remaining diamond to strip him of all red cards.

A club was led but declarer refused to take a finesse. Instead, he played the ace, king, and another club. The suit divided three-three and East was in with the queen. The forced spade return was won by North's ten, and declarer discarded his other spade on the jack of clubs. South lost only a club trick.

Had East turned up with four clubs, he would have been able to get out with a club which South must ruff in order to fall back on the spade finesse as a last resort.

## Conservatives Meet With Gov. Wallace

AUSTIN (AP)—Alabama Gov. George Wallace's executive secretary conferred privately Tuesday with leaders of the Constitution Party of Texas, which held its state convention here.

The convention took no action to pledge the state party's delegates to the national convention in Houston next month to Wallace, but there were indications he might be the delegation's choice to head the National Constitution Party ticket.

Earl Morgan, Wallace's representative, met in a motel room with members of the state party's executive committee, including Jack Carswell of Houston, state chairman, and Joe Rummier, also of Houston, vice chairman.

Wallace addressed the state convention Tuesday night in Dallas of the Conservative Party, formed last fall by dissident members of the Constitution Party.

A number of minor parties have made overtures to Wallace

as a possible standard bearer, and "we will be talking with them," Morgan said.

"The governor's overall plan is to push the unpledged elector idea, and some groups like this apparently are interested in the same thing," he said.

Earlier, Dick Troxell, convention secretary, told the 25 delegates attending that Wallace "thinks exactly like we think" about advancing a slate of unpledged electors to compete with the major national party tickets.

Newsman were barred from Morgan's meeting with the party leaders and no statement was issued at the close of the conference.

Troxell explained that voters for the National Constitution Party ticket actually are voting for a slate of unpledged electors from their individual states.

"The purpose of the national convention is for us to have a common candidate so we will not confuse the people," he said.

## Congress Pushing For Beef Controls

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Johnson administration is having little luck in getting Congress to drop legislation which would impose tighter controls on imports of beef even though foreign supplies have fallen off in recent months.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman told a House Interstate Commerce Committee the week before last that imports this year will be down to the 1963-64 average—the level sought in legislation pending in both houses of Congress and being pushed by cattlemen.

Freeman made the same point at a news conference last week, saying that there was no need for the legislation because of the lower level of foreign supplies.

The slim, 20-year-old daughter of President Johnson is winding up a visit to the 50th state. Tuesday she toured the 13-mile lip of Kilauea volcano on Hawaii Island and shopped with the aid of a Secret Service escort for a muumuu dress.

Miss Johnson tried on several of the shift dresses in a Kailua-Iona shop and each time turned to the Secret Service escort for his opinion. She finally selected a red muumuu with a sunburst design that the agent had approved.

## Parts Of Texas Continue To Receive Soaking Rain

More rain soaked scattered parts of Texas today, but mostly not in the same areas that were hardest hit by cloudbursts Tuesday.

McGregor, 18 miles west of Waco in Central Texas, was still mopping up today from its 13.08 inches of rain that began Monday and just kept coming through Tuesday morning.

A 50-mile-wide group of showers and thundershowers moved down on an area northeast of Sulphur Springs to north of Ardmore, Okla., this morning. Light showers fell north of Denison to north of Paris.

Hundreds of miles away on the Texas coast, more thundershowers were reported.

Besides the rain, it was generally clear to partly cloudy to

day over the state. Visibility at Childress was limited to two miles due to a soupy fog.

There's no end in sight for the rainy weather, officials said. Today's activity was predicted for the east and southern parts of the state and in the Panhandle later. It should be warmer over Northeast Texas Thursday afternoon.

Morning temperatures varied from 68 degrees at Amarillo to 80 at Galveston and El Paso and Palacios.

Nearly every corner of the state has been reached by rains so far this week. Official measurements for the 24 hour period ending at 6 p.m. Tuesday included: Abilene .01, Austin 4.28, Brownsville .24, College Station 3.03, Corpus Christi .02, Dallas 1.20, Fort Worth .13, Galveston

0.3, Houston .02, Lufkin .08, Mineral Wells .43, San Antonio 3.77, Victoria .25 and Waco 3.64.

But the unofficial readings were far higher in some places, such as the 7.90 inches at Austin that forced 40 persons out of homes around Boggys Creek, which runs through the city.

Near Temple at the Stillhouse Dam under construction on the Lampasas River, 5.25 inches fell in 2 1/2 hours Tuesday. Several families were evacuated at Belton from high waters which measured 8.89 inches at the Belton Dam after 24 hours of rain. Gatesville reported 8.35 inches.

Three tornado funnels were also sighted amidst the weather confusion. They were near Ennis in North Central Texas and in Navarro County in Central Texas and did no damage.

There was an all-day open house for the couple, who emigrated from Norway in the 1870s. They were married in 1886. All their eight children were here for the festivities.

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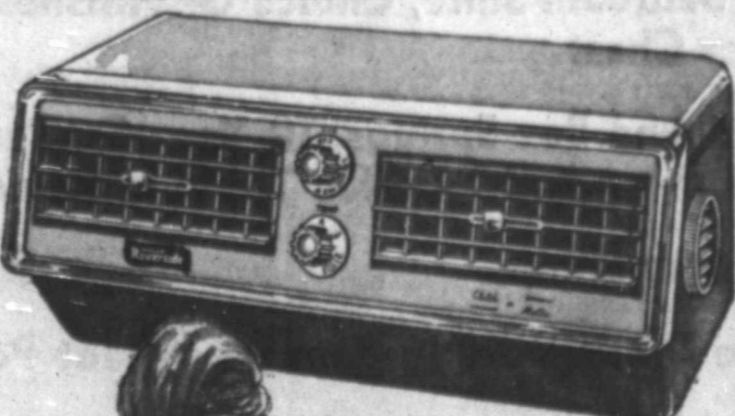

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# States Depending On Growth For Revenue

CHICAGO (AP)—State budgets are continuing to grow but this year, at least, legislators are counting more on an expanding economy for increased revenue than they are on tax boosts. While governors of many states signed new tax laws this year — 22 legislatures were in session — the hopes were that business activity, fed partly by the federal tax cut, would surge upward for the fourth consecutive year.

There is no telling at this time precisely what impact the tax cut will have, but a year ago the Treasury Department estimated that a \$10-billion federal reduction would spur investment, consumer spending and employment to a point where state and local governments would reap close to \$3 billion extra in taxes.

In 20 states, according to a study by Leon Rothenberg, research director for the Federation of Tax Administrators, income tax receipts will rise automatically as a result of the federal tax cut. In these states, individuals and corporations are allowed deductions on their state income taxes based on their amount of federal income taxes. Thus, lower federal taxes mean lower deductions and higher payments to the states.

An Associated Press survey shows several states raised their income tax withholding rates to bring them in line with this windfall. Included were Massachusetts, Oregon, Alabama and Minnesota, according to information compiled by Commerce Clearing House, Inc., of Chicago, a publisher of topical business law reports.

However the added revenues are obtained, they apparently will be spent for present improvements and administration, not for past mistakes.

"Unlike some years in the past," Rothenberg said in his study, "there were few instances where taxes had to be increased because deficits had developed during the current budget period as a result of an excess of past commitments over available resources."

Education absorbs the largest portion of state budgets and where new taxes were imposed this year they were almost always for this purpose. However, mental health, highways and public assistance also will benefit from the increased revenue.

Sources for new taxes vary from personal income to sales of peanuts.

# Study Planned Of Moon Rocks Returned Here

HOUSTON (AP)—Moon samples returned to earth will probably be studied at the Manned Spacecraft Center.

Dr. Clifford Frondel, professor of mineralogy at Harvard University, said the samples would create great competition from the experts, and he believed only the best men should analyze the rocks.

The manned lunar exploration symposium also heard Dr. R. M. Lemmon, of the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory, University of California, say that astronauts should be placed in isolation after they return to earth.

Lemmon said the spaceship should be sterilized to guard against the possibility of pathogens (origin of disease) being brought from the moon.

Lemmon said all objects being placed on the moon should be sterilized also. He said this included any ranger probes planned.

# Negro Students Enter White Schools Peacefully

ATLANTA (AP)—The number of Negro students attending former white colleges and universities in the South has increased this summer — and all entered peacefully.

Most schools do not list students by race and that policy may become a factor in easing the integration problem in more sensitive areas in the Deep South.

The Negroes go their way hardly noticed by white students. Some of the schools have had few or no Negroes in the past but their presence is attracting little general interest, an Associated Press survey shows.

Negroes are attending summer classes at the University of Mississippi and the University of Alabama — scenes of rioting during earlier integration attempts.

Three Negroes have started classes at Northeast Louisiana State College without incident.

The University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa has four Negro co-eds in summer classes. They include Vivian Malone, one of two Negro students who desegregated the university a year ago under federal court orders.

Others are Ruth Benella Lewis of Birmingham and Mrs. Velma Thompson of Tuscaloosa.

The campus hardly knows they are around. It was different when federalized National Guardsmen stood by while Gov. George Wallace made his unsuccessful stand in the school house door last June.

It is different, too, from the rioting which erupted at Tuscaloosa nearly nine years ago when Autherine Lucy became the first of her race to attend the university.

Violence erupted at Ole Miss in September 1962 when James H. Meredith was admitted under court orders. Two white men were killed and hundreds were injured.

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# Khrushchev Talks Trade

COPENHAGEN (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchev and Danish Premier Jens Otto Krag met today in a country manor outside Copenhagen today for talks that were billed as political but that probably dealt mostly with trade and cultural relations between their nations.

Khrushchev drove through a gentle rain to the Danish government's Marienborg estate nine miles north of Copenhagen. The Soviet leader bantered and joked with his hosts.

Khrushchev indicated to Krag after his arrival Tuesday that he wanted to concentrate on economics and farming. The Danes, members of the North Atlantic Alliance, said they could not envisage any political issues on which the two countries could agree.

Obviously envious of Denmark's agricultural output, Khrushchev remarked at a government reception Tuesday night: "We know you Danes have a high level of agriculture, and that proves that we are dumb and you are clever."

"We know you are good farmers, but you must know that in different countries, nature matures at different times."

# Rum Producer

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Mexico is becoming a major producer of rum and the country's two major breweries — Ron Bacardi and Ron Castillo — last year reported sharp increase in profits and sales. Ron Bacardi reported 1963 profits of \$2.5 million.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—"It's—it's unbelievable," gasped shopowner Nasimo Sargis, groping for words. "There's no middle-of-the-stream. It's either shock or 'wow!'"

That was Miss Sargis' reaction after she introduced topless swimsuits in San Francisco.

The first dozen suits were snapped up and another 14 ordered for immediate delivery she said.

"Mostly to men," said Miss Sargis, "for their wives. Or at least that's what they said."

Reaction of other San Franciscans to the weekend showing of the latest low in high fashion was immediate, and predictable.

"Nakedness," snapped a clergyman, "almost perversion." The police department wondered aloud what it would do with the first bare bosomed lass to breach the beach.

Another downtown San Francisco shop placed the suits on sale Tuesday.

Held up by two narrow straps that cross in front and back, the suits were denounced by the clergy as an invitation to lust, a return to paganism, a corruptor of morals and "not very nice."

"Just two straps closer to the moral decay in America," declared the Rev. Jacob Belling of Oakland's Neighborhood Church.

What do the cops say? "A touchy, legal subject," said Assistant Police Chief Alfred Arnaud. "Nudity isn't illegal unless it's lewd. This'll have to be settled when they show up on the beaches—and I guess they will."

Capt. Daniel W. Kelly, responsible for policing the city beaches, observed that when the first woman appears in the suit "the main police problem will be the riot that occurs. The size of the riot probably depends on how well she's endowed."

## Texas Will Get Naval Stations

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two naval stations will be built in South Texas to conduct research and development of satellite detection techniques.

The Navy notified Rep. Joe Kilgore, D-Tex., that it will publicize plans about June 18 for a proposed transmitting station near Roma and receive bids for the work 30 days later.

On July 6 bids will be advertised for a receiving station near Raymondville, with bids asked July 30.

The stations will conduct experiments for improving the present Navy space surveillance system. Each unit will cost over one million dollars.

## Communist Attack Repulsed, Ends Lull In Fighting

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—A Communist Viet Cong battalion backed by mortars attacked a big government outpost 15 miles west of Saigon early today but was thrown back, an American military spokesman reported.

Nineteen guerrillas and 13 government troops were killed during the attack on Duc Hoa, the spokesman said. Thirty-six of the defenders were reported wounded.

The Viet Cong withdrew from

the region at dawn. A government force was sent after them. The Viet Cong attack came after a month of comparative lull in the Vietnamese war. The sounds and flashes of artillery fire could be heard and seen by Saigon residents before dawn.

A Ministry of Defense spokesman said the Communists were repelled after three hours of fierce fighting.

The Viet Cong overran the district police headquarters on the outskirts of Duc Hoa but were stopped short of the mili-

tary headquarters by a company of Vietnamese Rangers. The Viet Cong assault was preceded by heavy shellfire, a Defense Ministry spokesman reported.

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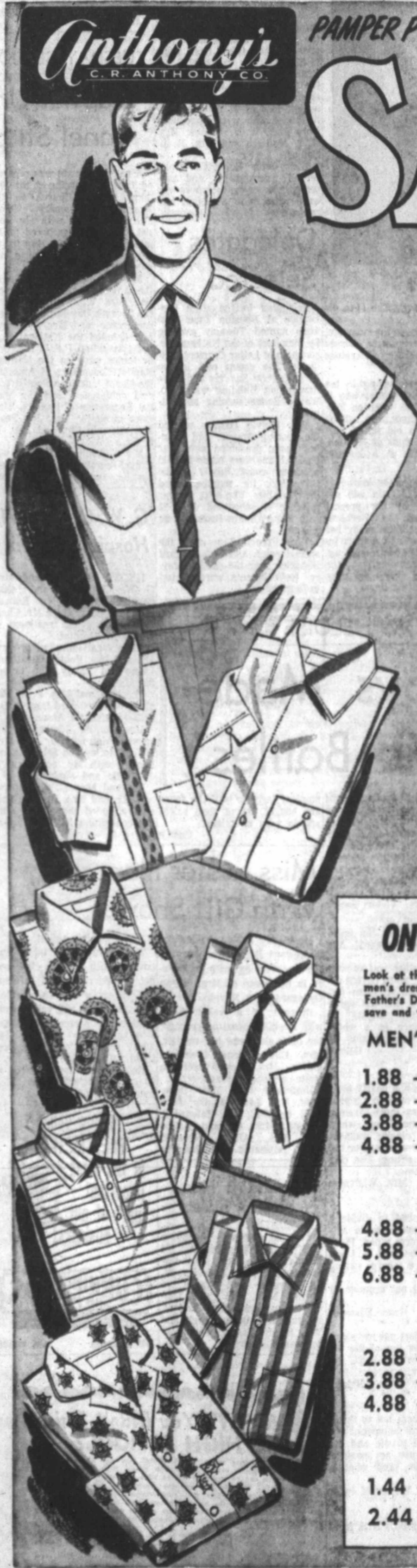

## Cancellation Due 19 Throat Treatments

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Food and Drug Administration announced today it proposes to cancel certification of 19 types of throat lozenges or troches containing antibiotics, on the ground that evidence of efficacy is lacking. The effect would be to bar the products from sale in interstate commerce.

The agency said interested persons have 90 days within which to furnish any information which, in their opinion, demonstrates substantial efficacy of the drugs or to submit written comments.

A spokesman said the proposal applies to some 30 products, made by something like 11 basic manufacturers and handled by about 25 distributors including the manufacturers.

The proposal would affect only those troches containing

antibiotics, for which certification was required before May 1, 1963, when regulations went into effect making all antibiotic products certifiable by FDA.

It would not apply to at least 200 other troches on the market which contain antibiotics which were not certifiable prior to that time.

The spokesman said the manner in which these 200 other troches will be dealt with has not been announced.

FDA said the proposal would cover the following troches, most of which are sold without prescription:

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# New Specifications Drawn For Line To Sewage Plant

New specifications for sewage lines in Beal's Creek could be ready for bids in August or September, City Manager Larry Crow told city commissioners at a special meeting, held Wednesday morning.

The specifications are being drawn by Forrest and Cotton, Dallas, consulting engineers. The city turned down bids on the line Jan. 28 when the lowest bid was over \$100,000 higher than estimates by the consulting engineering firm.

Only two bids were received

in January. The apparent low base bid, \$588,378, was submitted by Clyde Construction Co. of Odessa. The only other base bid was \$630,238.20 from the Elm Fork Construction Co. Bids on the same project, received in March, 1962, also were considered prohibitively high, according to city officials.

Originally scheduled for completion in 1964 as part of the Master Plan program, the Beal's line originally was estimated at \$327,000 with an additional \$40,000 for an interceptor sewer and \$3,000 for relief connections. Crow told the commissioners this summer would be a favorable time for the sale of city bonds, according to present indications. He said he could contact the city's fiscal agent (First National Bank of Dallas) concerning the advisability of selling \$460,000 in general revenue bonds.

Following the meeting, Crow said in substance, additional funds probably will be needed to complete the Beal's project. The necessary money can be raised from one of four sources, he said: (1) Diverting funds from other projects, (2) a federal grant, (3) increasing the scope of the Master Plan, or (4) issuing warrants.

The new edifice will house a chapel with a seating capacity of 230. The present church building, which has ceased to be adequate to the needs of the parish, will be remodelled into offices and rooms for other church activities.

The church has approximately 200 communicants. The Rev. Robert J. McDermott, priest of St. Thomas Church in Big Spring, is pastor of the Coahoma church.

The land on which the new building is to be erected was bought 10 years ago.

Father McDermott and the Very Rev. Bernard Binversie, chancellor for San Angelo, assisted in the groundbreaking exercises. St. Joseph's Church serves Coahoma, Sand Springs and most of the eastern half of Howard County.

## Architect Asks Fees On Center

Fred W. Day Jr., Austin architect, has filed a damage suit in 118th District Court against J. Y. Robb, Charles R. Jones, James O. Duncan and H. B. Robb, the latter of Dallas, asking that he be paid \$21,200, plus attorney fees for work he claims he has done on a proposed shopping center.

The petition recites that in early 1963, the defendants made an agreement among themselves to promote and build a shopping center on land located at the southeast corner of the intersection of FM 700 and US 87. The project was to be called the Highland Shopping Center.

Day claims that he was contacted by Jones to draw up plans and specifications for the center. In the course of the following several months he prepared much material, making numerous requested changes. He says that at the same time the agreement was made with him for architectural services, the promoters entered into an agreement with R. Miller Hicks, Travis County business consultant, for services aimed at finding tenants for the center. Ultimately, he claims, 93 per cent of the floor space was leased tentatively. He then alleges the project was dropped, but he claims he has \$21,200 coming to him for fees plus \$7,066 attorney fees.

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## Flood Waters Cover Parts Of Nebraska

Flood waters spread across areas in Nebraska and rain dampened many sections in the western half of the nation today.

Torrential rains Tuesday and during the night caused flooding from Norfolk, town of some 20,000, to Omaha, a city of more than 300,000. Residents in many homes and trailer camps in West Omaha and nearby Millard and Papillion were evacuated.

Heavy hail pelted Omaha, Norfolk and Fremont, causing property damage. More than three inches of rain fell in a one-hour period in Omaha. Lowlands in the entire western half of Douglas County, in which Omaha is located, were under a foot to a foot and a half of water between the Elkhorn and Platte rivers.

Stretches of Union Pacific Railroad track were washed out west of Omaha. Eastbound passenger trains were delayed at Valley and Grand Island.

Rains that pounded wide areas in Texas spread into sections of Oklahoma and Arkansas, but amounts there were comparatively light. Earlier, downpours ranged up to nearly 14 inches in McGregor, near Waco. Almost 8 inches drenched Austin, which reported some flooding.

## Garry Moore Show Leaves Amid Tears

NEW YORK (AP)—"I don't know who those geniuses are going to put on Tuesday nights next year," said comedian Alan King, "but it's going to be a very lonely Tuesday."

He referred to the demise, after six years, of CBS' "Garry Moore Show," whose swan song Tuesday night was bright, amusing, sentimental and sad. Moore, speaking of the sudden cancellation of the show, minced no words and showed a bit of resentment. The studio audience expressed its feelings with loud and long clapping, cheers and whistles for the star and members of the show's family—Dorothy Kirby, Marion Lorne, Carol Burnett, King and Allen Funt whose "Candid Camera" was a spin-off of the show. Moore was close to tears at the end.

The abrupt dropping of the show is a real mystery. It has been consistently, from 1958 on, a lively, joyous variety hour, invariably in good taste and with imaginative production numbers. It will indeed be a lonely Tuesday night for a lot of people. The CBS programmers will replace it next season with "The Nurses," moved over from another night. Hospital drama is no real substitute for people who enjoy comedy - variety shows.

Moore, as often has been pointed out, isn't a terribly funny comedian and he can neither dance nor sing. But he projects as a fine, kindly man and works well with a lot of people of diverse talents. The result has been, usually, an entertaining hour. The show will really be missed.

Tuesday night's re-run of "Mr. Novak" on NBC was an earnest little tale about the triumph of a fine teacher over his personal problems, mostly involving alcohol. It was interesting to compare that serious-minded show with the trite half-hour comedy

called "Hey Teacher," on CBS Monday night, first of a summer series replacing "The Lucy Show." The program was made as a pilot for a projected series but never was sold. Dwayne Hickman played a scared young teacher on his first day with his third graders strictly for laughs. The students were smarter and tougher than teacher, the smartest man in the whole school was the janitor and the hero was so inadequate he hid in a closet as the kids trooped into the classroom. Both programs were made at about the same time. One, understandably, got nowhere. The other was a mild success. The only difference and it was a very big one, was the very different treatment.

## Cage May Be Returned

WASHINGTON (AP)—Efforts to bring fugitive Texas embezzler BenJack Cage from Brazil are expected shortly on ratification of an extradition treaty with that country, the State Department said Tuesday.

Cage, an insurance promoter, drew a 10-year prison sentence in an \$8 million swindling case at Dallas, posted bond and skipped the country about five years ago. Brazil long has been known as a refuge for fugitives from the law in this country because it was one of the few nations not covered by an extradition treaty with the United States. Cage at last report was promoting a land project near Sao Paulo. He has become a naturalized citizen of Brazil. The Brazilian Senate finally approved an extradition treaty this month. An order by the Brazilian president to finish constitutional processing of the treaty is expected shortly.

## Dinner Honors Mrs. Kennedy And Trustees

NEW YORK (AP)—President and Mrs. Johnson, accompanied by several Washington dignitaries, flew here Tuesday night and attended a dinner in honor of Mrs. John F. Kennedy.

The dinner at the St. Regis Hotel also was a tribute to New York area trustees of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Library to be built near Harvard University. Mrs. Kennedy sat next to Johnson at the dinner, attended by 200 guests and given by Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Smith of New York City, the late president's brother-in-law and sister. Mrs. Johnson sat at another table. Mrs. Joseph P. Kennedy, the late president's mother, and Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, his brother, attended the dinner. The attorney general and Adlai E. Stevenson, ambassador to the United Nations, both of whom arrived at the hotel after Johnson, were cheered by the guests.

Actor Fredric March and actress Florence Eldridge, his wife, read some of the late president's favorite passages from Shakespeare, Irish poetry and quotations from Kennedy's inaugural address and speeches. Because of the press of White House business, Johnson was not sure until late Tuesday whether he could make the trip. They returned to Washington early today.

## Desegregation Set In Virginia

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Giles County next fall will become the first Virginia locality to eliminate segregated schools. The State Pupil Placement Board Tuesday assigned all 131 Negro pupils in the county to two white schools. The county school board had planned to close the two Negro schools. Giles has a total school enrollment of about 4,500.

## Committee To Report On Movies Suggested

DALLAS (AP)—A Baptist lay preacher and television actor has suggested that Baptists establish a special committee in Hollywood to inform Christians about upcoming movies and television shows that downgrade Christianity and over-emphasize sex and immorality.

Gregory Walcott expressed the view Tuesday in talking to the 192-member Texas Baptist Executive Board at its quarterly meeting. Walcott praised Roman Catholics for their "seal of approval" policy on films. He said it gives them power to put out unfavorable sections of scripts and film before the movies are offered publicly.

The board also heard a plea to fight what was painted as an all-out campaign set for 1965 to legalize pari-mutuel betting at race tracks, on a local option basis. A "face sheet" on betting was presented. In business action, the board named the Rev. Chet Reams of Denton as associate in the convention's division of student work; and named Charles Ar-

rendell of New Orleans as a press representative in public relations. The Rev. Mr. Reams is Baptist Student Union Director at North Texas State University and Arrendell is news director at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

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# Ghosts Shadow Election Booth

**EDITOR'S NOTE**—In some elections there seems to be a part of the voter's personal feeling overhanging the outcome. Here, from studies of voter actions in past elections, is a yardstick to measure the racial issue in the upcoming election. This is the second of four articles in a series on voting analysis.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—Perhaps the darkest part of the shadow cast by the American voter when he steps into the polling booth is his personal prejudice — his dislikes, his hates.

These are the critical ghosts of an election — the voter's strong feelings about a situation or an element of the candidate's personality.

In 1960, it was John F. Kennedy's Roman Catholic religion. In other years before that the list had included questions of divorce, religion or personality traits.

In 1964, a critical question underlying the election may be the public attitude on race, integration and civil violence.

Such an issue is ghostly, only

because it is hard to measure. The voter's prejudices are seldom plumbed—they are guessed at.

The Democratic and Republican parties reflect this. Says Prof. Angus Campbell of the Survey Research Center of the University of Michigan's Institute for Social Research—

"The parties won't align on civil rights. It's too dangerous."

"In Europe, each party courts its own people—the farmers, the factory workers — and it cares much less about anyone else," Campbell explained. "But in the United States, both parties are trying to win over everybody—and will do nothing to irritate anyone."

Perhaps the best current measure of the racial attitudes of at least some voters has been the votes for Alabama's segregationist Gov. George C. Wallace — campaigning in Democratic presidential primaries in the North on the issue of state's rights.

Does the American voter really consider state's rights an issue?

Not likely, Campbell said. "Federal encroachment — real or imagined — is not a great public issue. Every time you ask the voter if he wants some federal program like Social Security, he invariably says yes." "My guess is that the larger part of the Wallace vote is a resistance to the changing racial picture."

Actually most of the racial activity on the public scene has come since 1960.

Perhaps its first major overt move was in the 1960 campaign — when Republican Henry Cabot Lodge said his party would put a Negro in the Cabinet, and John F. Kennedy made his celebrated telephone call to the wife of a jailed integrationist Negro minister, the Rev. Martin Luther King.

But the 1960 national interviews by SRC, the voter was not preoccupied with the race question. When the 250 SRC interviewees asked what voters liked or disliked about individual parties and candidates, they found that for many voters there was one overriding issue — the fact that John F. Kennedy was a Catholic.

It won Kennedy 80 per cent of the Catholic vote — against some 70 per cent a non-Catholic Democrat might expect normally.

But the SRC analysts says it resulted in a net loss to Kennedy of something over two million votes — as projected by such

answers as these to SRC interviewers:

"I'm afraid Kennedy is going to win. It's going to be close. I was raised a Democrat. I have always been a Democrat. Kennedy is smart and as far as I know he'd be all right in a lot of ways, but I hope he don't get in. If we get under the heel of the Pope, I don't know where we could go next time."

Many Democrats singled out the question of religion and dismissed it as being silly or not relevant to the election. Some Catholics thought Kennedy should play down his religion as much as possible, and one said he felt it would not only hurt Kennedy's chances, but the attitude toward Catholicism as well.

Nevertheless, one statistic that emerged from the 1960 election was that Kennedy had raised the Democratic share of the presidential vote 8 per centage points — from Adlai E. Stevenson's 42 per cent share in 1956.

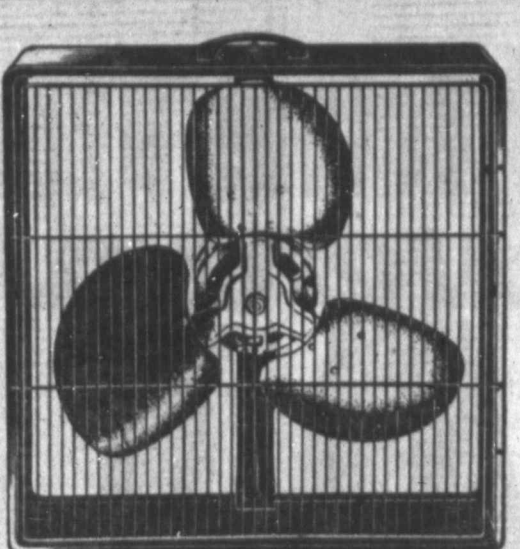
Campbell concludes that the short-term forces which had been at work in 1956 — and given Dwight D. Eisenhower his whopping 58 per cent of the popular vote — had not held. And many persons reverted to their original party loyalty in 1960.

But on closer look, analysts found that the 6 per cent who voted for Richard M. Nixon after voting for Stevenson in 1956 were largely Democrats who obeyed the short-term force of anti-Catholicism to switch parties.

It is another example, the SRC experts said, of short-term forces causing a vote shift in a major election among people with both strong and weak party allegiance.

There were signs in 1960 that the race situation was affecting some voters, notably in the South.

As a prime force — the kind that can decide elections — the racial attitude is one ghost behind the 1964 election.
