Services Held Here For Carl C. Maurer

Funeral services for Carl C. Maurer, pioneer Friona resident, were conducted Wednesday morning at the Congregational

Maurer, longtime Friona businessman, died about 5 p.m. Monday, Oct. 28, at Parmer County Community Hospital, where he had been admitted on Friday after suffering an apparent heart

Officiating at the funeral services was Maurer's sonin-law, Robert E. Cleveland of Denver. Assisting were Rev. David Plumb, pastor of the Union Church, and Rev. Paul Lee of Littlefield, former pastor.

Burial was at Friona cemetery, under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home

Pallbearers were Doug Stephenson, Dean Blackburn, Von Edelmon, Elvie Jennings, Harold Lillard

Survivors include Maurer's wife, Luella of the home; a son, Gaylord of great-grandchild.

Maurer moved to Friona with his family in 1909, when he was seven. He graduated from Friona High School in 1918, and then attended West Texas State College, which was a junior college. In 1929, Maurer built the

two-story building at Fifth and Main, which was to house his business for almost 45 years. He began by selling farm implements and ready-to-wear. The company discontinued the ready-to-wear in 1934. It was also in 1929 that

Maurer took on the line of machinery that was to become known as Minneapolis-Moline. The company sold M-M farm implements for almost 45 years, as Maurer Machinery Co.

In 1944, Maurer purchased land just east of the city and established the city's first airport, which he later sold to Elvie Jennings. Maurer also established Friona's first fertilizer business. dealing in anhydrous ammonia for some ten years.

The longtime resident put in his share of time from a church and civic standpoint.

He was one of the most staunch supporters of the Congregational

At one time, he served on both the Friona City Council and the Friona school board at the same time. He was a charter member of the Friona Lions Club. He also had served as a director of the Friona United Fund, and was always generous toward worthy charities.

The Maurers had celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary only earlier this month-on October 12.

After a grey, drab day Sunday during which it misted most of the day, a line of thunderstorms crossed the area, setting off an unusual late-season electrical display. Most of the Texas Panhandle was placed in a severe weather watch Sunday night, with some large hail reported in

The cloud struck Friona between 8 and 9 p.m., with pea-sized hall falling for a short time. Although not as large and damaging as farmers feared, the hail was enough to damage the milo crops somewhat.

Monday and Tuesday were partly cloudy, with some drying. Farmers were just beginning to try to get back in their fields when rural roads have been another front pushed thr- hampered severely by the ough the area and again wet down the farmland.

A rainstorm hit the Friona area early Wednesday morning, finally quitting about mid-morning and clearing off.

Farmers who weren't too upset about previous rains have definitely decided at this point that "enough is enough." Prospects for a cotton crop are very dim at this point and most farmers are becoming concerned about the mile and corn crop

remaining in the fields. However, the rain could not be better for wheat land since it has fallen slowly and soaked into the ground. Cattlemen are also thinking in terms of the beneficial moisture since grass land will be aided.

People living on unpaved

weather. The roads have absorbed as much as possible and have turned into boggy mires for the most part. Stories of being stuck have been a dime a dozen this month.

Although the rain has fallen slowly, the sodden land has not been able to absorb the four inches received this past week and run-off problems are now occurring. Land which has been prepared for planting has been washed out with some farmers planning to re-list some of the land.

Since the drought of '74 (remember that) was broken the first week in July, from 15 to 22 inches of rain has been recorded in Parmer County with the average probably in the





45 YEARS AGO-NOVEMBER 8, 1929

Work on new buildings is progressing nicely this week, thanks to the good weather which has visited the area. O.G. Turner has the walls of his new building on the east side of town up, and the framework on the new Baptist Church has been erected.

Friona grain prices are as good as at any other Panhandle point, it was shown in an investigation on Monday. A false rumor had it that Bovina dealers were paying 15 cents per hundredweight more than local elevators, but the truth of the matter is that local prices were 98 cents on Monday, and had never been as low as the 80 cents, which was rumored.

40 YEARS AGO-NOVEMBER 9, 1934

The members of the Friona PTA held their annual Halloween Carnival at the high school building last Friday night, October 26.

The king and queen were crowned with the usual ceremony. The king was George Taylor of the senior class, and the queen was Lois Pressley of the junior

35 YEARS AGO-NOVEMBER 3, 1939

The people of Friona were horrified this week when they learned of the death of R.H. (Reube) Kinsley, who had been terribly burned Wednesday morning in the west part of town

The burning occurred about 10 o'clock when a can of blasting powder exploded in the little workshop where Mr. Kinsley was working. Kinsley had workmen engaged in building a new garage at his home, and the can of powder had been used the day before in blowing a stump from the ground where the foundation was being built.

25 YEARS AGO-NOVEMBER 4, 1949

Three people were killed and three others critically injured in a head-on collision of a truck and car three miles east of Friona on Highway 60 Thursday morning. Dead are Frank Phillips, 53, of Farwell, Mrs. Loretta Essie Stone, 25 and her infant son, Billy, both of

20 YEARS AGO-NOVEMBER 5, 1954

Continued ideal harvest conditions, coupled with the record yields of Parmer maize fields this week, have taxed elevator and shipping facilities to the greatest extent since the early 1930s. Most elevators have experienced temporary shutdowns since the middle of the last week, awaiting cars for shipment.

Oscar Hellman, local agent for the Santa Fe, states that some 1100 cars of grain have been shipped this year.

At Home In Parmer County Jana Pronger

MOST HOMEMAKERS spend about one-third of their food dollars on meat.

This isn't a surprise, but with inflation, most of us are looking for ways to hold this expenditure down a little.

When buying beef, consider cost per serving, instead of cost per pound.

An estimate of the number of servings per pound is based on ground and stew meat with four servings and boneless steaks and roasts with three servings. Meat with some bone provides two servings per pound and bony and fatty meat, only one serving.

Another cost-cutting measure is to buy pork liver, which is generally less expensive than beef liver. And bulk packages of luncheon meats usually cost less than sliced bulk packages of presliced vacuum-packed meats.

Check items bought on credit that wouldn't have been bought if cash had been necessary. This does not include planned or emergency credit purchases.



For added security, take photographs, preferably in color, of items too small or delicate to be engraved, such as rings, other jewelry and fine silver or china.

Statistics from the National Crime Prevention Institute show that since 1963, only three burglaries have been reported among the 4,000 participants in Monterrey while 1,800 have been reported from 7,000 nonparticipating households.

Since then, cities all over the United States have become enthusiastic about Operation Identification as they watch burglary rates drop dramatically. But the success of the program depends on you, the property owner. It will not work unless you do your part in marking your property.

Some frequently stolen items which should be marked include bicycles, television sets, radios, tape recorders, guns, business machines, lawn mowers, hubcaps, stereo tape decks and cartridges, cameras, car wheels, tools and kitchen appliances.

But there's never been a burglary in your neighborhood? Then you're ripe for one--or more. A few hours now spent marking and photographing your property can save you days and even weeks of problems as you hope first for recovery, file insurance claims, and then probably wind up having to replace it all while someone else is enjoying your unmarked equipment-"bargain" purchased with no suspicion of its being

AMERICANS AREN'T eating enough beef, and a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has the figures to prove

Taking into consideration the recommendation by the American Heart Association that three-and-a-half ounces of cooked beef is adequate for most Americans on a daily basis Dr. Ed Uvacek contends that we still aren't eating enough beef, despite claims to the

He arrives at his belief by closely looking at two statistics-the three-and-a-half ounces daily serving suggestion by AHA and the popular figure of 116 pounds per capita consumption of beef, the record high level attained in 1972.

First of all, three-and-a-half ounces of cooked beef eaten daily amounts to a total of 78.75 pounds of cooked beef per year.

The 116 pounds of beef consumed annually per person is actually a production figure rather than a true figure of consumption. It means that an average of 116 pounds of carcass beef was available for each American during 1972, not that each person actually ate that much beef.

Considering the 116 pounds, this figure must be reduced by amount 30 per cent for cutting losses, bones and fat because it is stated in terms of carcass beef. Furthermore, since the amount of cooked beef is in question, another weight reduction of 25 per cent is necessary due to cooking.

What is left then is a total of only 61 pounds of cooked beef available in 1972 for each American. That's 18 pounds less than the amount recommended by the AHA diet for good health.

The specialist also notes that beef production in 1973 was about 10 pounds per person less than the 1972 record and may be even lower this year.

It's quite clear, that we're really not eating too much beef. Actually, we may not be eating

"UNCERTAIN" is one way to describe fertilizer supplies as farmers begin to plan next year's crop production pro-

Nitrogen, a key plant nutrient in fertilizers, is expected to continue in short supply. In fact, top officials in the fertilizer industry predict short nitrogen supplies until the late 1970's.

Phosphorus, another important ingredient in fertilizer, is also in generally short supply, but production is increasing so that an adequate supply should be available by late 1975.

Turning back to the nitrogen situation, nitrogen production in the United States faces a questionable future because natural gas supplies are limited. This means that U.S. agricultural producers must depend heavily on imports. Consequently, the price of nitrogen will continue high as the need for food production

With regard to expanding nitrogen production, four to six new ammonia plants are on the drawing boards in the U.S. and Canada. However, at least three years are required to get these plants into operation. Some relief to the world supply may come with the construction of nitrogen plants in a number of foreign countries, including China and Russia.

Of course, one factor that has caused U.S. companies to be cautious in planning for expansion of fertilizer production in some foreign countries has been political instability and the lack of agreements allowing companies freedom to market the nitrogen produced. Changes here could lead to increased production
