After his team had drubbed Farwell, 97-31 in a game at Farwell this past Tuesday, Dyess wrote: "Good shooting and defense. We'll find out how good you are this week."

As the meat opened, the boys' division had three unbeaten teams. Hedley was 10-0, Friona 6-0 and Morton 4-0. There were two teams (Friona and Hedley) who were state meet teams of last year.

Another team (Channing), won over 30 games, and made it to the regional tournament. Then there were Morton and Estacado, annual basketball powers who have divided up practically every local tournament title since it was renewed some years back.

So, one can see the meaning of Coach Dyess' statement about finding out how good the team really was. Although the Chiefs were 6-0 going into the tournament, they really had not been tested.

Dyess purposely did a little reshuffling to have his team meet Channing in the opening round, to insure that the team would play three tough games in the tournament.

Spearman's teams were obliged to drop out of the tournament, after the Lynx football team downed Olton, 27-14 last Friday and advanced to the state quarter-finals.

The Spearman teams would have added to the tournament's color, as they always bring good competitive teams. After Spearman dropped, only six teams remained in the boys division. But some quick calling resulted in the addition of Hedley and Hart to fill out the bracket, and Hedley's potent class B team brought more strength to the tournament.

THOSE LOVABLE underdogs, the Baylor Bears, really put it all together this year, and thanks to a helping hand from the Texas Longhorns, the Bears will be playing in this year's Cotton Bowl game for the first time in history.

All good (and some not so good) Baptists, as well as underdog fans all across this section of the country, have sent up a flare for the "Super Bears."

What can you say about the Aggies? They were rolling along like gangbusters when suddenly their well-oiled machine began to miss a little.

## New Outreach Worker At Friona's Office

A new outreach worker has been named for the county's branch office operated by the Central Plains Mental Health Center of Plainview.

Tisha Harrell, a native of California, has been in Friona for about a month, in charge of the Parmer County Office. Office hours for the outreach office are 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The office's telephone number is 247-3976.

Miss Harrell is a graduate of Lone Mountain College of San Francisco, with a B.S. in Behavioral Science. Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. James Harrell.

The new outreach worker was employed at Providence Hospital in Oakland for two and one-half years as assistant coordinator of volunteers.

Roy Alexander, psychologist and director of Central Plains' outreach program, says the Friona office has had tremendous success during its first ten months of operation. The office first opened in mid-February.

"We are proud to have Tisha on our staff. We appreciate the fine reception the office has had in Parmer County," Alexander said.

Alexander spends each Monday in the Friona office. Dale Edmaiston, who is an adolescent specialist, spends Monday mornings in the office. Rick Ran Hersh, psychologist, comes on Wednesdays.

The outreach office, as well as the center, deals in the areas of child psychology, psychiatric consultation, clinical psychology, marriage counselling, alco-

holism and drug rehabilitation, occupational therapy and recreational therapy.

Those needing the services of the center are welcome to contact the office for an appointment. In the event that one of the specialists that spend time at the Friona office cannot help a person, referrals can be made to the Plainview center, which also has inpatient medical facilities.

Officials from the Central Plains Mental Health Center are available to speak or give programs on mental health and family systems to clubs in the area. Alexander pointed out, and emphasized that they are more than happy to be asked.

The center gains referrals from several local areas, including ministers, law enforcement officials, and school officials.

Rent for the Friona office of the center is provided by the City of Friona, in cooperation with the Parmer County Commissioner's Court and Friona Noon Lions Club.

Baker Duggins, Friona High School counselor, is chairman of the Parmer County MH-MR executive committee.

# Chiefs Storm Into Tournament Finals

The Friona Chieftains stormed into the finals of their own tournament with a 76-64 win over Hedley Friday night, but a seldom called violation in the girls game cost the Squaws a 62-61 loss and knocked them out of the championship game.

The Chieftain win set the stage for a showdown with district mate Morton in Saturday's finals. Friona carried an 8-0 record into the first-place battle, to 6-0 for the Indians.

Morton advanced with an 83-66 win over Lubbock Estacado, the defending champion. The game should prove to be Friona's toughest of the season.

Friday's 12-point win is by far the most misleading score of the season. The Chiefs had an eye-popping 32-point lead, 74-42, with only four minutes left in the game, when coach Larry Dyess cleared his bench.

The visitors, who already had 11 wins entering Friday's play, used the chance to whack the lead, using a press to advantage. The Chiefs never trailed in the game. Dale Cleveland

scored the team's first ten points, as Friona raced to an 18-8 lead at the end of a quarter.

Some great shooting and feed passes allowed the team to score 25 second-period points, and go to halftime leading 43-20.

Just prior to the end of the third quarter, Friona took a 60-30 lead, as the Owls, a state tournament entry last year, were hanging on for dear life. The Chiefs were hotter than a \$5 pistol.

The first team exited with a good portion of the last quarter left, and Hedley's press avoided a real embarrassing score.

The Squaws had battled back gamely to catch and pass the inspired Steerettes, taking a 60-59 lead with three minutes left.

However, the team's delay game backfired, and allowed Farwell to regain the lead.

It looked like sure overtime when Terri Patterson had a 1-1 free shot. She calmly sank both shots, but the official called her for being on the line on the second shot. Time ran out with Farwell holding a precious one-point lead.

Miss Patterson's 32 points are the most by a Squaw this year. Amanda Mason had 20.

The Squaws face once-beaten Nazareth for third place at 3 p.m. Saturday.

# Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

## 45 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 13, 1929

Beginning last week the post office at Friona receives and dispatches mail four times daily. The regular morning west bound mail and the noon east bound mail will remain as they have been for several years, but instead of these constituting the only mails received and dispatched, there will be an out-going mail in the evening, at six o'clock, and be received by the west bound train that passes here at night, and carried as far as Clovis, where it will be assorted and all east bound mail will be transferred to the east bound train and forwarded to its destination.

## 40 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 21, 1934

The Friona Star trusts that all our readers will read each and every advertisement in this issue of the Star, as many of our business people are expressing to you their appreciation of you as patrons and friends and wishing for you a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year, as well as calling your attention to the many nice things they have to help you solve your Christmas gift problems.

## 35 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 15, 1939

Emergency crop and feed loans for 1940 are now available to farmers in Parmer County, and applications for these loans are now being received at Farwell by Carl Hill, Field Supervisor of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration. This early opening of the loan program in Parmer County is part of a plan recently announced by the Farm Credit Administration whereby emergency crop and feed loans are being made available immediately in all areas where farming conditions are seriously affected this year by drought.

## 30 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 15, 1944

Bills are out announcing the sale by J.T. Gee of his entire herd of high quality dairy cows and milking

equipment, at his home in the northwest part of Friona, this Saturday, December 16. There will be at least 29 head of good cows, heifers and calves, and 12 head of registered hogs, and many other desirable articles.

## 20 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 9, 1954

The Texas Highway Commission has announced from Austin the first step which will set up a new program of work in Parmer County for the calendar year of 1955. E.H. Thornton Jr., chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, stated that the funds for this program are being derived from state sources. Mr. S.C. McCarty, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department in Lubbock, Texas, has stated that the following State highways and roads in his area are scheduled for work under this program: Seal Coat on U.S. 60 from Farwell to Castro County Line, a distance of 27.0 miles; Seal Coat on FM 690 from U.S. 84 to 0.5 mile East of FM 299, a distance of 16.7 miles; Seal Coat on U.S. 84, from New Mexico State Line to Bailey County Line, a distance of 10.7 miles.

A new feed, seed and fertilizer firm is to be built in Friona soon, according to announcement this week by E.H. and Doyle Cummings who are planning the operation. The plant will be located across the corner southeast of Houlette's Laundry, the Cummings men announce. They are selling their farm equipment this week, leasing the farm and plan to start immediately on the Friona enterprise.

## 15 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 10, 1959

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. for David Randall Price, 13, known to his friends as Randy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Price of the Black Community from the Sixth Street Church of Christ in Friona. Young Price was killed immediately in a one car accident about 7:30 p.m. Monday night as he and a friend, Ricky Bob Coon, 12, also of the Black Community, were returning home from a Boy Scout meeting at the Black Community House. The two boys were going west on a dirt road that parallels Highway 60 after leaving the regular Monday night scout meeting. According to investigating officer Charles Skinner of the Texas Highway Patrol, the car, driven by Coon, went out of control and skidded down the road overturning in a barrow ditch. Coon was thrown from the car and wasn't seriously injured.

## 10 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 10, 1964

A feature of the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet was the naming of Friona's outstanding citizens. Honored as "Man of the Year" was Frank A. Spring, president of Friona State Bank. Mrs. H.K. Kendrick was named "Woman of the Year." Mrs. R.L. Bates was chosen "Teacher of the Year," and Stanley Bengel was tapped as "most courteous employee." Bengel has worked for Parmer County Pump Company since 1957.

## 5 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 11, 1969

Building permits issued by the City of Friona rang up the register for construction estimated at \$135,400 for the month of November. The total brought the calendar year's total estimated construction in the city a healthy \$923,400 and renewed prospects of a yearly total in excess of a million dollars for the second straight year.

## Farm Census To Be Taken

Information about farm work done for pay during the past year and about migratory farm work will be collected by the Bureau of the Census in this area. Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau's Regional Office in Dallas, announced that interviewers will visit a sample of households here during the week of December 9-13.

The farm work questions are in addition to the ones asked regularly in the monthly survey on employment and unemployment conducted by the U.S. Department of Labor.

This ongoing survey provides a continuous measure of conditions in America's labor force. The Labor Department's report for third quarter 1974 showed that the Nation's unemployment rate averaged 5.1 percent, well above the 5.1 percent average rate of the second quarter. Employment reached a new quarterly high of 86.3 million, though the rate of growth has slowed since last year, the report states.

About 50,000 households across the country, scientifically selected to represent a cross section of U.S. households, take part in the survey each month. All

information reported to the Census Bureau is confidential by law and can be published only in statistical totals so that no person or household can be identified. Interviewer visiting households in this area is Faye Gaines of Springer, N.M.

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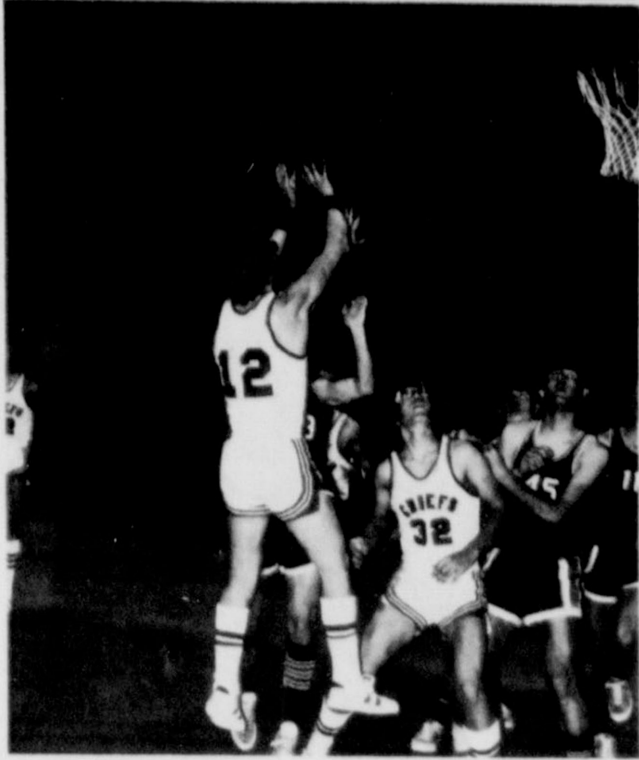

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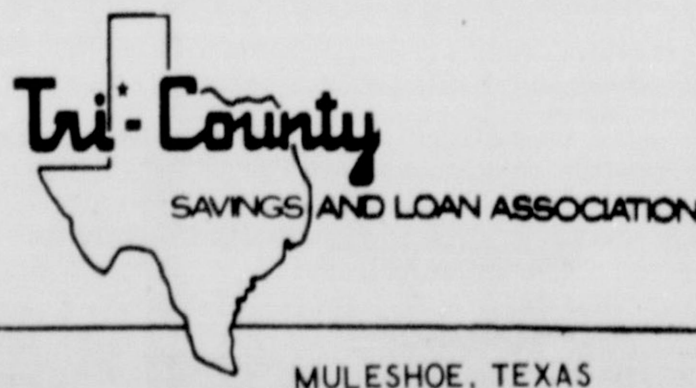
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# Chiefs Whack Steers, 97-31

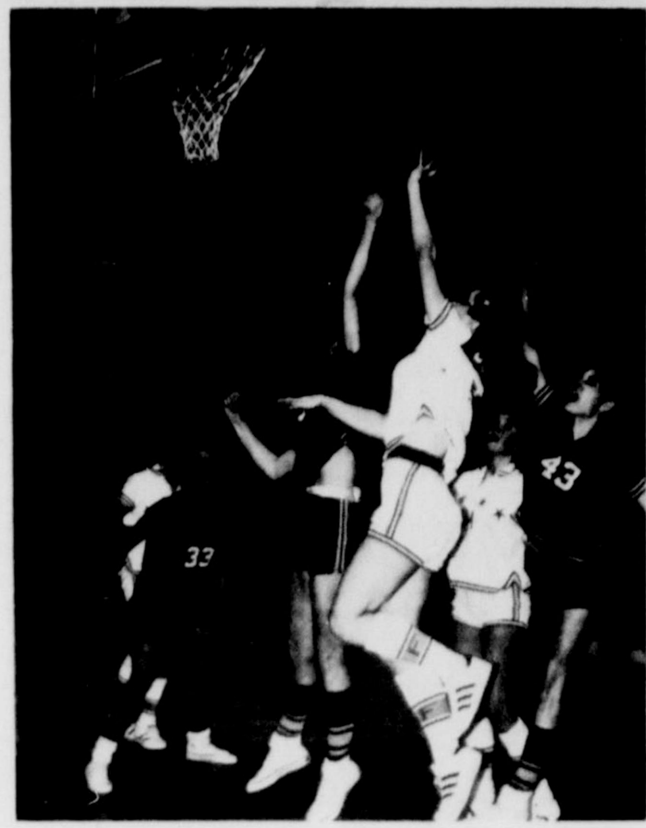

### On The Farm In Parmer County MACK HEALD County Agent



AS IF SUMMER drought, a wet fall, disease, hail and low prices were not enough, some cotton producers now may have to face the prospects of reduced grades and possibly even yield due to "barky" cotton.

The strange condition is the result of prolonged periods of wet, humid conditions during the latter part of the season.

Cotton plants that were killed by desiccants, verticillium wilt or other diseases prior to the prolonged wet spell now have deteriorated to the point that limbs and stalks break off during stripping. Strips of bark are peeled from these broken sticks and limbs in harvesting the ginning operations.

With green stalks, it is difficult to remove the bolls from the plant, requiring close setting of the stripper rolls to get the cotton. Under these conditions, considerably more barky bales can be expected.

Under dry, open weather

conditions, stripping will improve each day. Grade, whiteness of the cotton, also will improve with open weather. But, excessive delay of harvest will result in deteriorated plants, and thus bark, loss in grade and even yield can be expected.

Only dry cotton should be harvested. This is essential in maintaining lint quality, whether it's ginned immediately or placed in storage.

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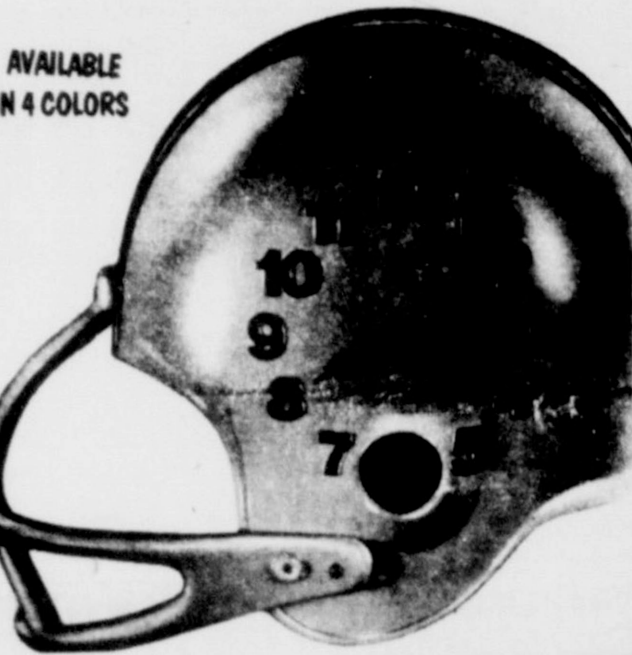
