1974 Was A Newsy Year In Friona



Building Totals Hold Their Own

Although building totals across the country were down for the most part, construction in the City of Friona during 1974 was within \$18,550 of the totals of the previous year, and amounted to \$25,734 more than the average for the preceding three years.

Records released this week by City Manager Jake Outland showed that 33 permits were issued during the year for construction valued at an estimated \$659,750.

The total for the previous year had been \$678,300, and the average for the period 1971-73 had come out to \$634,016.

However, the totals are still more than \$1 million less than the city's all-time record of \$1,780,475, established in 1970.

Figures released by the city manager showed that nine permits were issued for new residence construction, for a total estimate of \$465,500. Two permits were issued for non-residences. Main item on the non-residence list was the new White's Auto Store, built for an estimated \$90,000.

Also, a total of 22 permits were issued for additions or alterations, which added another \$94,250 to the city's total.

January was the biggest month for permits, with permits issued for an estimated \$136,450 in construction. May was a close second at \$135,150. July was also over \$100,000, at \$122,000.

Year's Moisture Above Average After Slow Start

In spite of an extremely dry start which saw only 1.29 inches of moisture measured during the first five months of the year, the total moisture measured locally during the calendar year 1974 was almost two inches above the average for the city.

Total moisture received, according to City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland, was 17.37 inches. Of this, 13.33 inches fell after the first of August, which made it too late to benefit the 1974 row crops. However, a good supply of ground moisture is now on hand, which the area did not have a year ago.

Wettest month was August, when a whopping 6.54 inches were registered locally, 37.6 per cent of the year's total. Driest month was May, when only .09 inch was logged.

Changes Announced By Cable TV Here

Friona Cablevision announced this week two major changes in the local cable television company.

Two new channels are being added this weekend to the cable's bill of fare. One is channel 8, KSWS-TV of Roswell, N.M. Actually, viewers have been receiving this channel for about 10

The other addition is Channel 3 of Portales, N.M., an educational TV channel.

"The educational channel does not have regular hours like other channels. Viewers will need to consult their schedule to see what programs are offered," stated Carl White, manager of the Friona Cablevision.

White said he had some pamphlets concerning the new educational channel at the company's office if anyone cared for

At the same time, the company announced that beginning Monday, reception on the cable will be switched to "channel on channel," meaning that channel 10 will be received on 10, channel 7 on 7, etc.

This move was made primarily to improve reception on Channel 10, which had been coming in on Channel 2 on the cable.

Channel 2 is used considerably by citizen's band radio, and causes some interruptions on the cable's channel, it was pointed out.

FALL OFFERS numerous advantages for taking soil samples for testing.

First of all, field conditions are more favorable for doing a thorough job of sampling-the key to a good soil test.

Also, the urgency of having test results back immediately is not as pressing as during the spring rush.

More time is available to study results before purchasing fertilizer, and dealers will have a better selection of fertilizer materials to meet specific

With fertilizer costs rising and some materials in short supply, a current soil test is the best guide for fertilization for 1975 crops.

So, get the jump on next season's production schedule with a soil test. It's a step in the right direction for a profitable crop year.

A SEARCH for "empty" pesticide containers and proper storage of left-over pesticides are essential practices for pesticide safety both in the home and on the farm.

So-called "empty" containers, although empty for practical purposes, will contain some left-over pesticides. If the container has been rinsed and drained or triple rinsed after use, the amount of pesticide remaining will have been reduced considerably

Studies have shown that from 0.8 per cent to as much as 4 per cent of the pesticide material may remain in a five gallon container with a pouring spout. Such "empty" containers pose a considerable potential for accidental poisonings of humans, domestic animals, pets and wildlife unless properly handled and disposed of.

On the farm check barns, machine sheds, farm truck and applicator equipment, fence rows and fields. In the home check the garage, under the sink, in the broom closet and pantry and medicine cabinets. Dispose of all "empty" containers promptly and properly.

Proper storage protects the health and well-being of people, protects against environmental contamination, and often extends the shelf life of the chemical. Pesticides to be reused should be stored in a well-ventilated, dry place away from food, feed, fertilizer or seed. Storage in a separate building is preferable, but isolated storage rooms can be used in certain instances. Store only pesticides that are in the original container with fully legible labels intact. label may provide special information regarding storage of the product.







SWPSC Announces Improvement Plans

be invested in new equipment and improvements during the next five years by Southwestern Public Service Company, Roy Tolk, chairman and president of the electric company, announced recently.

The investment for 1975, 62.4-million dollars, will be the largest annual amount ever budgeted for the company, but the record will be short-lived. The projected investment for 1976 is more than 65-million dollars, more than 76-million dollars in 1977, and in 1979, the company expects to spend more than 77-million dollars for the improvements and equipment loads. necessary to continue providing electric service for this growing area.

Three new generating facilities to be installed during this five year period will increase the capability of the SPS system by more than 1-million kilowatts, bringing the total capability to approximately 31/2-million kilowatts.

Station, Harrington northeast of Amarillo, will be the site for the first two additional generating units. The first is now under construction and is scheduled for completion in mid-1976 and completion of the second unit is planned for 1978. These two generators will each have a capability of 350,000 kilowatts and will use coal as their primary fuel.

"Construction of the third generating unit will start during the latter part of the five year period and will also use a coal fired boiler,"

Tolk said. In September of this year, SPS announced its interest in taking a lead role in the construction of the nation's first nuclear power plant using a gas-cooled fast breeder reactor. The company signed a letter of intent with the General Atomic Company of San Diego, California indicating

More than \$345,000,000 will that SPS would contribute \$100-million to such a project.

> Transmission lines and transmission substations to be built during the five year program will represent an expenditure of more than \$50-million. The lines will be 115,000 and 230,000 volt and will serve the major load areas in Southwestern's

Construction will start in the near future on a 115,000 volt transmission line from Cunningham Station, near Hobbs, New Mexico, to Carlsbad, New Mexico. This new line will provide additional power for new existing industrial

"This region can avoid the recession which is gripping much of the nation if the people of the area will continue the planned development program for growth which utilizes all of our assets. Planning is the key word and our area development people are dedicated to helping every community that wants to work at planned progress. Finally, the whole region can count on adequate electric power being one of the assets at work," Tolk concluded.

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



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Chieftains Repeat As Amarillo Champions

Running their season record to 15-1, Friona High School's Chieftains won the championship of the Amarillo Christmas Holiday Basketball Tournament for the second straight year last weekend, scoring three fairly easy wins in the

The Chiefs were threatened only briefly in the semi-finals, in disposing of three formidable class AA opponents in the tournament's Division I (larger schools). Last year, Friona scored four wins in taking the title in the first-ever Amarillo Holiday tournament. In that one, all schools played in one

The opening game found Friona coasting past Spearman, 70-51. The Lynx, who were making their first basketball start due to being in the state football finals, raised some eyebrows by coming back to win the division's consolation crown

with wins over Dumas and Canyon. Friday, the Chieftains scored a 79-48 win over Abernathy in the semi-finals, in a game that was razor-close for the better part of three quarters before Friona blew things wide open with a 40-point explosion, in the last ten minutes of the game.

Abernathy, which has a 14-4 season record, proceded to win third place on Saturday over Alamo Catholic of Amarillo, so that all three teams played by the Chiefs turned out to be trophy

. The championship came after a 63-41 win over the Childress Bobcats in the finals on Saturday. It marked the second straight year for the Chieftains to down Childress in the tournament.

The Chiefs are probably not winning any friends in the Childress area, since it was Friona that eliminated the Bobcats from the state title chase with a 65-48 victory in the regional semi-finals last February at Lubbock.

Childress came out scrapping, and carried the fight to the favored Chieftains in the opening quarter. After Friona took an early 6-2 lead, the Bobcats rebounded to tie the count at 10-all with 3:05 remaining in the quarter. The 'Cats took their first lead at 12-10 25 seconds later.

Gene Strickland tied the count for Friona, and Childress' Mark Lanham put his team back in front

However, Dale Cleveland's turning jump shot tied it back up for Friona, and Strickland's jumper gave Friona a 16-14 lead that the Chiefs would not surrender.

The score at the first intermission was 20-16 in a hard-fought

Childress continued to apply pressure as the second quarter began, pulling to within two points at 22-20, 24-22 and 26-24. However, a rash of Friona baskets, by David Hutson, Strickland and Cleveland shot Friona into a 34-24 lead just before halftime and the Bobcats were never that close again.

Dusty Peters, who didn't have a real high-scoring tournament, came in to score three baskets in the third quarter, and Cleveland, having his best game of the meet, added three more, as Friona stretched its lead to 16 points, 50-34, and began to salt the game away.

Less than three minutes into the final quarter, Friona opened up a 21-point lead, on a three-point play by Cleveland, and it was all over but the shouting. Coach Larry Dyess began to sprinkle his lineup generously with reserves at this

Cleveland led all scorers with 29 points, and had complete control of the boards, with an eye-popping 31 rebounds for the game.

The most interesting game from a spectator standpoint was the semi-finals' win over Abernathy. In that one, fans really watched two different ball games. One lasted until 2:30 remained in the third quarter, with Friona nursing only a three-point lead at 36-33.

The other "game" came in the final 10:30 of play, when Friona bombed the nets for 43 points while holding Abernathy to only 15. The first quarter started slowly, with each team feeling the other out. Friona held a 12-6 lead at the

Abernathy fell behind by nine points as the second quarter opened (19-10), but rallied on the shooting of Artis Betts (number 42), and trimmed Friona's lead to only two at the half, 26-24.

As the third quarter unreeled, Friona fans began to hope they weren't about to watch an upset, as Abernathy finally tied the game at 30-all 2:30 deep in the period.

But the Antelopes never were able to take the lead. Strickland's jump shot from the side sent Friona back into the lead at 32-30, and a pair of baskets by Peters gave Friona a 36-32 lead.

Leading by only three points (36-33), Friona called time out. Chieftain fans hope that Coach Dyess remembers whatever it was he told the team, because when they hit the floor, they were a different team.

The Chiefs were fast-breaking, stealing the ball, causing Abernathy to make several costly mistakes, and hitting just about every shot they took.

At one stretch in the fourth quarter, Friona reeled off 19 straight points without Abernathy scoring, and the lead went from 46-36 to 65-46. It was an unbelievable rally for the Chieftains, but one the Antelopes would just as soon forget.

Abernathy came back on Saturday for a 70-45 win over Alamo Catholic, a team that had played Childress to within two points in the semi-finals.

In the Abernathy game, the team had four players in double-figure scoring, and would have had five if Peters had had one more point.

AFTER 16 GAMES

Four Players Share Team Stat Leadership

Four players are dividing up statistical honors on the 1974-75 Friona Chieftain basketball team, according to statistics compiled on the team through its first 16 games.

Gene Strickland leads the team in scoring, with 376 points, an average of 23.5 points per game. Dale Cleveland is runnerup, with 279 points for a 17.4 average.

Cleveland is the team's leading rebounder, with 258 rebounds, an average of 16.1 per game. In the finals of the Amarillo tournament, Cleveland raked off 31 rebounds while scoring 29 points.

Dusty Peters is the leading field goal shooter, hitting 54.8 per cent of his shots, 57 of 104. Peters is good from inside, and usually plays for the good shot.

Another senior, Dave Clark, is the leading free throw shooter, with a torrid 93.7 per cent of his shots, making 15 of 16 he has tried this season. Clark had not missed a shot until the Amarillo tournament, when his streak was snapped at 15 straight.

As a team, the Chiefs are averaging 74.8 points per game through 16 games, to 47 for the opponents.

72-71 Loss Ruins Squaws' Title Bid

After lacking just one point being in the tournament finals, the Friona Squaws dropped their third place battle against district mate Dimmitt, 39-33, in the second annual Christmas Holidays Basketball Tournament.

In one of the tournament's most hotly-contested games, the Squaws dropped a thrilling 72-71 game to McLean in an overtime battle in the semi-finals, to knock the team out of a chance to defend the title it had won a year earlier.

That semi-final game produced a record of sorts when officials called 63 fouls on the two teams. McLean lost four players due to fouls, and the Squaws lost three.

Friona's loss proved more costly, as high-scoring Terri Patterson fouled out of the game just two minutes into the third quarter. However, Myrna Phipps, Terri's replacement, played a stellar game, and the Squaws could have won the contest if they could have hit their free shots.

Even with three starters on the bench, the Squaws battled back from a six-point deficit to tie the score and take the lead on two separate occasions in the second

Leading by 65-64 with 50 seconds left in the game, the Squaws missed a golden opportunity to sack up the game when a technical foul was called against the McLean coach. Amanda Mason, the Squaws' high-point girl, made only one of three free shots to increase the lead to two, 66-64.

Myrna Phipps then missed the first of a 1-1 free throw attempt with 15 seconds left and McLean tied it up on a shot with only one second showing to force the overtime.

McLean took two leads in the overtime period, but baskets by Misses Phipps and Connie Lindeman pulled the team back into a tie. Miss Lindeman completed a three-point play with 1:25 left to play, to give Friona a 71-70 lead, and the Squaws attempted to freeze out the clock.

However, a travelling violation in the last 30 seconds foiled the bid,

and a jump shot by McLean's star forward Sherri Haynes (21) with seven seconds ruined Friona's sterling effort.

Miss Haynes, a super-star selection, scored 48 points in spite of sitting out the entire third quarter with four fouls. She came back in to score her last 22 points still carrying four fouls.

Fouls again proved costly to the Squaws on Saturday, as Miss Patterson again fouled out, this time in the first half. However, Dimmitt equalized things a bit as their usual leading scorers, Cindy Dyer and Beth Cleveland, both fouled out of the game.

The Squaws had led, 8-4, after one quarter, but fell behind at the half, 21-14. They were trailing 30-21 entering the final quarter.

The Squaws advanced with an easy first-round win over Dumas, 70-30. This is only the second year for Dumas to field a varsity girls
