MEMBERS OF the Friona Lions Club were given renewed hope Thursday evening by the president of Water, Inc. for a water import program, which would assure the continued prosperity of the High Plains area

George McClesky of Lubbock told the club "I don't think there is any question that the import program is feasible."

McClesky pointed out that the 1973 Corps of Engineers' report on the import question, which concluded that importation would not be economically feasible, was considering only the farmers directly involved with using the water, and not the thousands of businesses and industries who are affected by the economy of the area.

The similarity of the proposed water importation program for this area with California's Feather River project was discussed by the Lubbock attorney. He pointed out that the water would be moved a near identical number of miles, and lifted a similar number of feet in elevation.

"It's not a question of whether or not it can be done-it's being done right now in California," McClesky commented.

The Water, Inc. head stated that he believed the issue would not need to be submitted to Texas voters again, but that sufficient efforts were being made in Washington to point out how vital a water import program for this area is for the entire nation.

He pointed out that in 1973, the High Plains produced 22 per cent of the grain sorghum grown in the United States, and 24 per cent of the cotton

"I can't imagine losing this chunk of American agricultural production," said McClesky. He further stated that as the nation's population grows, although it may slow down, the additional need for food and fiber makes the productivity of the High Plains a key factor in the nation's

The water leader, who played a key role in securing water depletion allowances from the Internal Revenue Services for the area's irrigation farmers, complimented Governor Dolph Briscoe on his vigorous stand on a water program for Texas, to include an import program for the High Plains.



Following good preseason showings, district play will get underway for the Friona Chieftains and Squaws this week with contests here on both Tuesday and Friday nights.

Tuesday night the Squaws, coached by F.G. Crofford will open district competition against the Dimmitt Bobbies at 7 p.m. while the Chieftains will meet Channing in a non-district encounter in the

The Chiefs met Channing here in the local tournament and won 66-46. Friday night (Jan. 17) both squads will face Littlefield in district play beginning with the girls game at 7 p.m. and followed by the boys' contest. The nightcap Friday will

Mentor Larry Dyess noted that he "real pleased" with the Chieftains' showing thus far, saying "We have been up and down some, but have looked better the last few games than we have all season." According to Dyess, the district race should be a close one between the Chieftains, Dimmitt and Morton.

Dimmitt sports an 18-2 record and Morton, who claimed a four point win over the Chieftains in the finals of the Friona Tourney in December, is 17-1 for the season, while the Chieftains stand 19-1 at presstime.

According to Dyess, the 1974 edition of the Chieftains is a "little stronger on the bench and a little more balanced," than were the Chieftains of 1973. "The team that wins district will have to go undefeated, more than likely,' according to Dyess who feels his Chieftains are "ready."

According to Squaw mentor, F.G.

Crofford, the District 3-AA title is 'up for grabs among five teams that appear to he evenly matched." Crofford, who has a young team with only a pair of seniors starting, also feels that his team is ready for district play.

According to Crofford the Squaws have been in every game except one and "have been working hard and gaining confidence with every outing.

With a 10-10 record at presstime Coach Crofford felt the Squaws have a chance at the district crown "if they can eliminate fundamental errors and win at home.

Receipts Set Record

Postal receipts at Friona increased by more than \$15,000 during the calendar year 1974, it was reported this week

Figures released by Postmaster Wright Williams indicated that receipts reached an all-time high of \$107,255.85 at the Friona post office during 1974.

The 1974 receipts reflected a gain of \$15,255 from the estimated receipts for calendar year 1973, which was \$92,000. The total was an

increase of \$21,000 over the totals for 1972, which had amounted to \$86,200.

One of the main contributing factors to the 16.5 per cent gain in the postal receipts locally was the increase in first class postage last March 1. First class letters went from eight to ten cents each on that date, with corresponding increases

in other mail. Having reached an all-time high in revenue lends more support for the new post office building for Friona, preliminary steps for which have

already been taken. The new post office building is to be built in the 1000 block of Main Street. The Postal Service was taking bids for the new building, it was announced last month. Bids were to have been opened Friday, January 10.

Second Semester Kindergarten Begins Jan. 15

The second semester for public school kindergarten will begin in Friona on Wednesday, January 15. Eligible to attend the classes, which are not mandatory, are children born between March 1 and September 1, 1969 (five years old as of September 1).

The first semester of kindergarten will end on January 14.

Children starting to school on January 15 must bring their birth certificates (if they did not bring one on Pre-School Day last spring), and a record of their immunizations.

School officials remind that the following shots must be at least started before January 15: (1) DPT (Diphtheria, Whooping

Cough and Tetanus); (2) polio; (3) rubeola (common measles) and (4) rubella (German measles). "A certificate of immunization from your doctor will be required

before the child can enter school.

This is Texas State Law," says J.T. Gee, principal. The new kindergarten students are to be picked up at noon for the first three days.

Bank Deposits Hold Close To Record

Deposits at Friona State Bank were within two per cent of the all-time record at the close of business December 31, 1974, it was revealed this week.

Total deposits on the last day of 1974 stood at \$21,779,231. This compared to the total on December 31, 1973 of \$22,266,824. The deposits for the last quarter of 1974 lacked \$487,593 equalling the former record for a quarterly statement, and was a much better figure than many thought it would have been.

"Due to the fact that there is still a lot of grain and other crops to be sold by our farmers, this difference isn't too bad," said Robert Neelley, bank president.

Last year's deposit totals had topped the former record for the year-end by over \$5 million; hence this year's figure ranks high in comparison to all but last year's. Total assets on December 31

amounted to \$23,560,501. This

compared to \$24,502,961 a year ago.

Biggest difference in figures was in the loan category, which had stood at an all-time high of \$15,061,000 on Dec. 31, 1973, but

were down to \$11,820,507 this year. This difference was attributed to the decrease in cattle feeding and its related financing during the calendar year just past, Neelley explained.

Friona Industries Buys Local Trucking Co.

Friona Industries. Inc., has purchased Friona Transport, Inc., a trucking firm primarily engaged in feed and grain hauling, announced John G. Carrothers, president of Friona Industries.

The acquisition was made for an undisclosed amount of cash and notes from William D. Buske and

John Bingham, co-owners of Friona Transport. 'This purchase will give us greater flexibility and result in certain economies in our feed and

grain transport operations, particularly in view of recent increases in freight rates which could have had an adverse effect on our competitive position in the feed business,' explained Carrothers.

Friona Industries manufactures about 190,000 tons of cattle feeds and supplements annually at its Hi-Pro plant, and Friona Transport has been the principal hauler of these

"In addition to handling our own feed and grain, we can perform the same services for other customers of Friona Transport," said Carro-

The acquisition includes 29 trucks, 17 trailers and other equipment, plus Friona Transport's headquarters building and shop facilities, which have about 8,000 square feet.

John Bingham will remain as the operating head of Friona Transport.

In addition to feed manufacturing, Friona Industries is engaged in the retail marketing of animal health supplies, the grain storage business, and the operation of cattle feedlots. In November, a 57,000-head capacity feedlot was purchased, giving the Company a total cattle-feeding capacity of 124,000 head. The Company, whose common stock is traded over-the-counter under the NASDAQ symbol FRNA, has annual sales in excess of \$50 million

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





GREEN THUMB TIPS

Fragrance in a flower is not too common a characteristic any more, since many flower varieties — such as roses and sweet peas — have been improved at the expense of fragrance, and it is necessary to check variety descriptions to determine this. The most satisfactory flowers for fragrance include mignonette, carnations, sweet alyssum, lavender, heliotrope, stocks, sweet sultan and

Modern hybrid varieties of pansies can be planted from seed indoors in January and February for blooms in May, and they are more heat tolerant than the old-fashioned standard varieties. It used to be that pansies needed planting in July and holding in a cold-frame during winter to flower in April, but the new hybrids are so vigorous they don't need that much of a start.

It can be a problem deciding what to plant on dry slopes, especially if you'd like something colorful. Crownvetch has become extremely popular. Planted from crowns or seeds it creates a bushy, spreading plant with pink pea-shaped flowers. Also worth consideration are perennial sweet peas, or lathyrus, growing dense vines with white and pink flowers resembling sweet peas. Both lathyrus and crownvetch are good for erosion control and last indefinitely without getting out of

Texas Motorists To Use 'Multi-Year' Plates

If all goes according to plan, the Texas motor vehicle license plate might soon outlast the motor vehicle that "wears" it.

Beginning February 1, the majority of motor vehicles operating in Texas may be eligible to use the new "multi-year" license plate, renewable annually for five years of driving. According to Bob Townsley, Director of the Highway Department's Motor Vehicle Division, approximately 9.2 million renewal notices are already in the mail to vehicle owners announcing the fact.

"Motorists will notice no change in the registration procedure this year," said Townsley. "Only the license plate to be issued will be different."

Instead of the usual metal plate, a heavier, non corrosive steel will be used for greater endurance. Also, the plate will be reflectorized and will feature black letters and numerals on a white field, considered by experts to be the most

SCS Report

How do you handle a thirsty crop? The two accepted methods of giving a crop a drink are furrow irrigation and sprinkler irrigation. If under furrow irrigation there are "hot" spots or super saturated spots irrigation efficiency is low. This means wasted fuel and wasted water.

Ed Corn and Wendol Christian have decided that for at least one of their operations a sprinkler system is the answer to their furrow irrigation problems. Sprinkler systems apply a prescribed amount of water at a precise rate to the irrigated area. This means money in the bank for more than one reason. Uniform crops can be harvested more efficiently. Sprinkler systems permit a reduced amount of tillage operations. Reduced tillage operations requires less labor, less wear and tear on equipment and less water.

The most apparent draw back is the initial cost. Most sprinkler owners believe this cost will be repaid within 5 to 10 years. If you are considering purchasing a sprinkler system, but still have doubts ask your neighbor--he probably has one. If he doesn't contact the Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

"The real change in registration procedure will come in 1976," explained the Highway Department official. Next year, instead of buying a new license plate, owners will purchase a 1- by 2-inch adhesive-type validation tag that will be placed in the debossed upper left corner of the plate.

In 1977, the tag will be stuck in the upper right corner to cover the debossed "75," and alternated for the ensuing years. Townsley said the tags cannot be easily removed without deterioration, a part of the plan to discourage vandalism or theft.

The "multi-year" plate to be used in Texas is almost identical to the one adopted by California some years ago. Specifications for plate design, letters and numerals were obtained from that state after careful study by Highway Department officials. "We found California to be completely successful with its 'multi-year' licensing system and it came closest to the 'new look' we wanted for Texas," said

Director Townsley. The 1975 Texas "version" is expected to cost the state 44 cents per plate to produce, almost double manufacturing cost for the '74 plate. The difference in costs being attributed to different materials and plate design. However, the validation tags to be used beginning in 1976 will run some three cents apiece. According to Townsley, the state will realize an \$8.5 million savings in additional revenue from using the semi-permanent plates for the five-year period

Some motorists will recall this is not the first time "multi-year" license plates have been used in Texas. During the war years 1943 and 1944, small metal tabs were issued to renew the

1942 plate. Then again in 1947, when there was a shortage of metal plates, windshield stickers were issued as evidence of the payment of registration fees.

Townsley praised the convenience the five-year plate will afford motorists, "Especially those who find changing license plates annually a chore!" He reminded, "Certain classes of motor vehicles will still require annual purchase of plates. These include radio operators, dealers, state officials and those passenger cars displaying 'personalized' plates."

Motorists using the new plates will notice the use of vowels for the first time. Since 1975, when the "English" system of a three-letter prefix and a two to three digit basic number was adopted, only consonants were used. Townsley says there are just too many vehicles in Texas to allow consonants only. The first 1975 plates will be AAA 10 to be issued in Bastrop County.

Also for the first time, a new five-year travel trailer plate will be available. This classification includes all camper trailers and house trailer-type vehicles which are (1) not in excess of 6,000 pounds gross weight or (2) not in excess of 8 feet wide or 55 feet in overall length when measured in combination with the towing vehicle, regardless of weight. The registration fee is based on actual weight including all furnishings. Annual license plates and movement permits will be available for mobile homes and house trailer-type vehicles exceeding these specifica-

Annual registration fees for motor vehicle owners will remain the same as in the past-\$12.30 for vehicles weighing up to 3,500 pounds; \$23.30 for vehicles weighing 3,501 to 4,500 pounds; \$30.30 for vehicles weighing 4,501 to 6,000 pounds; vehicles weighing 6,001 pounds or more are charged at the rate of 55 cents per hundred pounds of weight.

Motorists are encouraged to register their vehicles early and avoid the "last minute" rush. Registrants may apply by mail immediately, or "in person" at

their county tax office and substations beginning February 1. Mail applicants are reminded to return the entire renewal notice along with their payment and one dollar per vehicle to cover postage and handling. Allow at least 30 days for delivery of plates. The registration deadline is midnight, April







Clayton Elected House Speaker

His new office may be bigger, his appointment list a little longer and his pace more hectic, but Rep. Bill Clayton, speaker-apparent of the Texas House of Representatives, hasn't changed much.

He's still the man from District 74.

The forty-six-year-old representative from Springlake spoke from the organized confusion on his desk at the State Capitol. Lined against the windows in his office was evidence of a few of the stands he's taken on issues affecting his constituents the 12 years

he's served in the House--books and reports on water legislation, conservation and county and municipal governments. And standing out on an almost-barren bulletin board behind his desk was a small sticker with "Think Water" printed across it.

"I've always prided myself in voting my district," he said. "I suppose it's easy for me to identify with farmers and ranchers in my district because I farm right along with them. When they need water for crops, I need water too. I guess I know about the plight of the farmer and rancher just about as well as anybody."

With a long list of accomplishments during his tenure as a state representative, Clayton still maintains his principal legislative achievement is a 700-page recodification of the state's water laws. His credentials in the areas of water and land legislation are a mile long--leader in the fight to write a financing plan for a Texas Water Plain to the State Constitution, chairman of several interim water committees, chairman of the Standing Sub-Committee on Water of Natural Resources Committee, chairman of the Southern Environmental Resources Conference and former executive director of Water, Inc. of Lubbock.

As Speaker, Clayton's interest in water and land legislation will not diminish. Sixty-fourth in the line of Texas House Speakers, Clayton will be the only representative from his district ever to be elected Speaker. Only Lee Satterwhite, representative from Potter County, (whose district then included two

counties now in Clayton's district, Deaf Smith and

Oldham), has served any part of the district as

Speaker. Satterwhite was Speaker from 1925-27. Although not from the district, former Attorney General Waggoner Carr, then serving as representative from Lubbock, was the only other area representative to be elected to the most influential position in the

House. Constitution, the Speaker is selected by his peers at the beginning of each term. The Speak rship has come to be the most revered position of authority in the House and is said by many to be second in importance only to the Governor.

Observers have said Clayton has congregated the most widely diverse coalition of support in years, drawing votes from the most conservative to the most liberal representatives. Clayton says such a coalition is needed to effectively deal with the important issues facing this

session.

Top on the list of Clayton's priorities this session is school financing. He expects the Legislature to provide guidelines for assessment of real and personal property
