FORCES PLAYOFF

A THREAT to the very base of our area's economy has been posed by the recent re-classification by the Federal Power Commission in Washington, D.C. irrigation gas, from a "commercial" priority to an "industrial" classification.

Apparently, under the classification of "industrial," irrigation gas usage can be severely limited, so much so as to threaten the area's ability to produce its abundant farm products.

"I am afraid the area's crop production may be severely hindered by this ruling," a Parmer County farmer told us this week.

The spokesman said he was afraid the farmer's hands were tied in the matter, and there might be little they could do to get the ruling reversed.

At any rate, this will come under discussion at the annual meeting of the Parmer County Irrigation Gas Users this Thursday at the Hub Community Center.

Everyone with a vested interest in agriculture (and this includes a lot of us) is urged to attend.

It would be a drastic situation if the use of natural gas for irrigation purposes were to be severely limited, not only for the immediate area, but for a wide section of the world, since the High Plains farmers produce a good percentage of the foodstuffs that go to feed our state and nation.

IT HAS APPEARED to us for the last few years that the government is out to put the farmer out of business. Don't know where they expect to get their food when they accomplish this.

First it was the cattlemen who were brought to their knees by the government "watchdogs." Now, it appears that the farmer is to be next in line.

This past year, farmers were forced to pay inflated prices for everything that went into producing their crops. They were put in a position of having to receive high prices for their crops, in order to come out.

Some few were lucky enough to get the prices they needed, but some did not, and a few are still holding their commodities.

If the farmer continues to be


Playoff Game At Levelland

PCA Slates 41st Meeting

The annual 41st meeting of the Plainview Production Credit Assn. will be held at Plainview High School beginning at 11 a.m. on February 22, it was announced this week by Darrell Simpson, manager of the Parmer County branch office in Friona.

Highlight of the meeting will be a barbecue lunch, which will be served from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

At the business session beginning at 1 p.m., two members are to be elected to the association's board of directors.

The term of Bill Carthel of Friona is expiring. Carthel, who has served on the organization's board of directors since 1963, is on the ballot for re-election, along with Randy

Bennett of Plainview. Carthel, 48, has been a member o the association for 27 years. The Carthels, parents of four boys, own 1805 acres of land and rent or lease an additional 641 acres. Carthel's cattle operation consists of around 100 head. He raises wheat, corn, milo, cotton and soybeans. Bennett, 31, has been a member of the association for 11 years. He and his wife have two children. They own 220 acres and rent or lease an additional 1180 acres. He raises milo, cotton, soybeans and wheat, and runs around 160 head of cattle.

Thursday Valentine Was Sweet: Chiefs 57, Dimmitt 55

Three "unsung heroes" came up with stellar performances for the Friona Chieftains here Friday, and their point production made up for a career low by all-stater Gene Strickland, as the Chiefs scuttled Dimmitt's Bobcats, 57-55, and forced a playoff for the District 3-AA title. David Hutson, David Clark and

Dee King, playing in the shadow of the team's better-known stars, came through in the clutch Friday, and their play helped Friona to the completion of a perfect 4-0 second half, tying Dimmitt's season record of 28 wins, three defeats.

Strickland, probably for the first time since he's been competing in



basketball, failed to score a field goal, and came out of the fray with only two free throws on the offensive side of the ledger.

Hutson, meanwhile, canned 20 points, to lead the team in scoring for the second straight game. It was the 5-11 blonde's field goal with 37 seconds left that sent Friona ahead to stay in the hard-fought contest, 55-53

King, a low scorer, proved that he really is "Basketball King," a title bestowed upon the 5-10 senior guard two weeks ago, by canning a pair of crucial free throws with seven seconds remaining to ice the game, giving Friona a 57-53 lead.

Clark came off the bench to score ten points, six quick ones in Friona's big 23-point second quarter, and helped with timely rebounds and a steal. "Clark's play was definitely a big difference," stated Chieftain coach Larry Dyess, admitting that the win Friday was the biggest in his short career as a head coach.

The game was witnessed by approximately 1900 rabid basketball fans, as two rows of chairs were added at floor level--first time ever in Chieftain Fieldhouse.

Dale Cleveland, who played after being slowed all week by a slight case of flu, scored 12 points, five below his average, but dominated the defensive boards like he owned them. Cleveland pulled down 19 rebounds, to pace Friona to a 38-28 edge over the Bobcats in that important category.

The Chieftains held leads of five points twice during the opening period, and had a pair of six-point leads during the second quarter, including the halftime edge of 35-29.

But the Bobcats battled back,

repeated the act from the side a moment later for a 4-1 edge.

After a jump shot by Wayne McKee, Dale Cleveland pushed home a missed Strickland shot, and Dusty Peters drove in for a layup shot on a rare fast break opportunity, and Friona had an 8-3 lead with 4:35 left in the opening quarter.

Hutson's jumper from the side kept Friona's five-point lead at 10-5, but McKee, Birdwell and Myatt responded to shoot Dimmitt into the lead for the second time at 11-10. Strickland, fouled by Craig Williams, sank his only points of the night 17 seconds prior to the buzzer, to give Friona a 12-11 first quarter lead.

Birdwell and Myatt scored early second-quarter baskets for Dimmitt to give the Bobcats a 15-12 lead--their longest edge of the ball game. But Cleveland responded with a hook shot at 6:20 and a tip-in at 5:51 to get the Chieftains back on top at 16-15.

Clay Bandy sank a pair of free shots to attain an 18-17 lead, and Clark, in for Hutson, got a jump shot inside the circle for another five-point lead, 24-19.

Clark again made his turn-around jumper 3:08 before halftime, and Friona had its first six-point lead at 27-21. Dimmitt rallied for a two-point deficit, but Clark responded by ripping the net from the corner at 1:38 for a 31-27 edge.

King then made two free shots, and Hutson canned his jumper for the 35-29 edge that became the halftime score.

The Chieftains had bombed the nets for nine of 15 field goal shots in the second period -- a torrid 60 per cent, to finish the first half shooting at 47 per cent, 14 of 30. The beginning of the third quarter has been a bad time for the Chiefs all season, and Friday was no exception. The team missed its first four field goal attempts, and seven of its first eight shots, while Dimmitt was outscoring the home team, 10-2 to start the second half. It was Clark that started the scoring for Friona at 5:22, but his goal was wedged among five by the visitors as Dimmitt took a 39-37 lead. Hutson sparked an offensive revival with a pair of baskets to knot the score at 39 and 41-all, and his third straight bucket gave Friona a 43-43 tie as the third quarter ended. Friona got the tip to start the vital fourth quarter, and Cleveland tipped home his own missed shot for a 45-43 lead. Hutson's shot from the corner gave Friona a 47-43 lead, but Williams sank a long set shot, and after McKee stole a King pass, Williams got an easy layup to knot the score at 47-all at 5:36, and prompt a time out by Coach Dyess. King hit his only field goal of the game 20 seconds later, and Bandy

James Andrews Wins National Contest

James Andrews, assistant band director for the Friona schools, was named first place national winner in the music composing contest sponsored by the College Band Directors Association and held last week at the University of California in Berkeley

Andrews, whose composition "Sinfonietta for Winds and Percussion" was previously judged winner of the Southwest regional contest last August in Colorado Springs, won the top prize sought by six regional winners from across the country.

Gas Rationing For Irrigation Probed

The possible "rationing" of natural gas for irrigation purposes by the Federal Power Commission will be the main topic as the Parmer County Irrigation Gas Users hold their annual meeting Thursday, February 20.

The meeting will be held at the Hub Community Center, beginning at 8 p.m.

"The shortage of all fuels, and particularly the increased demand for natural gas, has placed the use of natural gas for irrigation in jeopardy," stated Pete Jesko, president of the Gas Users Assn.

The Federal Power Commission, in an opinion dated December 19, 1974, changed the classification of irrigation gas from a Number 2 priority, which is classified as 'commercial'' use, down to a Number 3 priority, which is classified as "industrial" use.

'Admittedly, no evidence was heard by the commission as to the impact on agriculture that such a decision would have, and verbally representatives of the Federal Power Commission have indicated that the classifications will be changed back and irrigation gas given a Number 2 priority, but this is not certain and will not be until the opinion is changed, and farmers everywhere need to be aware of the threat," Jesko stated.

The leaders of the Parmer County Gas Users Assn. will attempt to secure the support of all irrigation farmers in the county to retain the use of natural gas for irrigation.

New officers will also be elected at the meeting. District officers are expected to be present, along with the association's attorney, John D. Aiken, to give a current report on the status of the classification of irrigation gas.

At a meeting in Plainview on February 3, Carl Schlenker of Friona was elected secretarytreasurer of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Assn.

45 YEARS AGO -- FEBRUARY 21, 1930

The building committee of the Methodist Church met Thursday night and adopted plans for the new Methodist Church building. It is to be a three-story brick building, containing 14 rooms besides the auditorium. The auditorium, including the balcony, will seat about 500 people and the general dimensions will be 42 by 74 feet, and the cost will be between \$12,000 and \$14,000.

40 YEARS AGO -- FEBRUARY 22, 1935

The Parmer County basketball tournament held here the latter part of last week was, in all respects, the most satisfactory tournament that has ever been held in Parmer County. The local teams, both the Chiefs and the Squaws, won the championship of the county by good safe scores, and will be thus entitled to represent the county in the district tournament.

35 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 23, 1940

The local highway leading into Friona from the north on the west side of the city is now receiving a substantial caliche surfacing, the work being done by WPA workers of the county. It is proposed to extend the surfacing to a distance of three miles north. This will be a decided help to traffic from that part of the territory.

30 YEARS AGO -- FEBRUARY 23, 1945

The Air Medal and Oak Leaf Cluster has been awarded to Staff Sgt. Roy E. Hughes, and the decorations will be sent to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Buford Hughes, according to word received here last week from the Air Force.

25 YEARS AGO -- FEBRUARY 17, 1950

The \$93,000 sewer system was completed in Friona this week, finishing a project which was started by passage of a bond issue in June of 1946. Completion of the new system should pay big dividends to the estimated 1550 Friona residents.

20 YEARS AGO -- FEBRUARY 18, 1955

Construction has commenced on a cotton gin located one-half mile west of Hub, the owners announced this week. To be known as the West Hub Gin, the firm is to be headed by Leo Ruzicka, manager. The gin expects to be completed in March. The project is reported to involve about \$210,000.

15 YEARS AGO -- FEBRUARY 18, 1960 Funeral services for Mrs. F.L. Reed, a resident of Parmer County the past 52 years, were conducted from

the Friona Methodist Church at 4 p.m. Saturday. Needing a victory to enter the district playoffs against Tulia, the Friona Squaws soundly defeated the Canyon girls, 83-48 last Friday night.

10 YEARS AGO -- FEBRUARY 18, 1965

Chiefs Stage Great Rally, Top Morton

The Friona Chieftains fought their way to a hard-earned 65-62 win at Morton last Friday, partially avenging two previous losses to the Indians on their home court, and keeping pace with Dimmitt in the second half district race.

The win must rank as one of the greatest come-from-behind performances by a Friona High School sports team in history. Even more impressive was the fact that it was accomplished on the Indians' home court-a place Friona held only one other varsity win in their past ten tries.

A fantastic fourth-quarter rally accomplished the trick, after Morton had held the lead for more than three quarters. Friona had never led until a "five point play" with 6:35 remaining in the game.

Up until that point, the Chieftains had trailed, except for an early 2-2 tie, by as many as 11 points, and as late as 4:14 into the third quarter.

But the team never gave up, and battled back for the "must" win, which kept them in the running for a shot at the district title.

The first half was a bit frustrating for the Chiefs, who hit 53 per cent of their shots (16 of 30), but still were trailing by three at halftime, 40-37 to the hot-shooting home team.

Athough playing without their tall post-center, Mike Williams, the Indians hit the floor determined to bounce back from their previous game loss to Dimmitt.

Led by the shooting of Ken Standmire (20) and Ray Dean Thompson (30), the Indians bolted to an 18-10 lead with only 1:22 left in the opening quarter. Standmire and Thompson were hitting every shot they put up.

Friona had gained a tie only at 2-2 on Gene Strickland's layup shot.

Strickland's three-point play at 1:07 and another basket a moment later trimmed the Morton lead to three at 18-15, and his shot from the corner kept the Chiefs within three at the first quarter buzzer, 20-17.

Strickland, who connected on six of his first seven shots from the field, made another jumper to start the second quarter, to trim the Morton lead to one, 20-19. However, the Chiefs hit a momentary cold spell while Morton hit one of their hot flurries, and the Indians suddenly had a ten-point lead at 30-20, only 1:30 into the second quarter.


Forty seconds later, Cleveland scored on a followup of a missed shot, to trim the lead to 51-49, and set up the fantastic "five-point play" that shot Friona into the lead for the first time.

Cleveland got it started with a free shot with 6: 45 remaining. He missed his second shot (twice), and Hutson scored on a rebound play to make the score 52-51 Friona, with 6: 42 on the clock.





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City Tables Phone Rate Hike Request

A request from General Telephone Company for a rate increase of approximately 20 per cent took up the major portion of the regular monthly meeting of the Friona City Council Monday night.

Rad Richardson, district manager for the telephone company, presented the request. He also reported that the completion of the city's automatic dialing system would be made around February 27. After this date, residents aren't expected to have to give their numbers on calls which are dialed direct.

In other business, the council passed a resolution authorizing Friona State Bank as a depository for the city's general obligation bonds.

The proposed extension of the contract with Jake Diel Dirt and Paving Company for the city's annual street sealcoating program, to include 21 blocks, one alleyway and three-foot aprons on ninth street in Western Addition was approved at an estimated cost of \$9,917.50

Fallwell Floor Covering of Friona was awarded the bid on installing carpet and floor mat for the front office of City Hall. Fallwell submitted the low bid of \$1,401.85. A resolution and order for the city

election on April 5 was approved. **Chamber of Commerce members** presented the council an alternate park plan for Reeve Lake Park Area, to include a four-foot level parking area directly south of the community center and Boy Scout buildings, which would require considerable dirt work.

A new street light was authorized to be installed from property owners.

A notation was received concerning the pending rate adjustment in cost of operating the city's street light service, along with the monthly gas rate adjustment from Pioneer Natural Gas Company.







USDA Releases Grass Report

Barnyardgrass, also called watergrass, can be controlled in irrigated sorghum fields with a combination of herbicides and cultivation, according to Dr. A.F. Wiese, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station scientist at the USDA Research Center near Bushland. Results of a three year research effort were presented at the Weed Science Society of America Meeting on February 6 in Washington, D.C.

"Farmers occasionally complain that herbicides won't do the job," Wiese stated, "but nine times out of ten the rate of application was too low." He hastened

Studies were conducted from 1971 to 1973 on the Harvey Garrison Jr. farm near Dumas. Garrison noticed effective treatments in 1971 experiments, and by 1974 his four sections were free of barnyardgrass. Wiese stated that the most consistent treatment was two to three pounds per acre of Milogard applied preplant followed by a preemergence treatment of Milogard at one to two pounds per acre. Milogard at three pounds per acre preemergence was the next best treatment. Milogard applied three pounds per acre pre-plant and incorporated with a rolling cultivator also did a good

Effective short residual preemergence herbicides were Igran, Lorox mixed with Milogard and Ramrod mixed with Milogard. Wheat can be double cropped after sorghum on fields where Igran is used. After using short residual herbicides some barnyardgrass came back in August, but grain yields were not reduced. "Applying Milogard preplant or one of the preemergence herbicides and cultivating the young sorghum is the most practical approach," Wiese stated, "but if grass shows up after a rain or first irrigation AAtrex can be applied postemergence to one inch grass." If it doesn't

rain in a week, control from AAtrex will be increased by incorporation. Using this system may save some money because AAtrex doesn't have to be purchased unless emerge.

"However," Wiese concluded, "saving money by not using enough herbicide is false economy. Doing a good job of controlling barnyardgrass increased sorghum yields from 1600 to over 5000 pounds per acre in one study."

Morton called time and then made six straight points to lead 8-6. Ernest Mills tied it at 8-8 on two free throws and twice more at 10-10 and 12-12 on baskets after Morton had scored.

Castillo put Friona ahead, 14-12, seven seconds into the second quarter but Morton came back after a scoreless two minutes for both teams and outscored the Chiefs twelve points to four to take a 24-18 halftime lead.

Friona pulled to within two, 24-22, with 7:17 in the third quarter and 26-24 with 5:34, but Morton went on to lead by eleven points, 43-32, with 24 seconds left in the third period. Castillo cut this to nine with 11 seconds on the clock.

In the fourth quarter, Castillo scored twice and Kothmann once to pull the Chiefs within three, 43-40. Morton got a basket and two free throws to widen the margin to seven, 47-40, with 4:11 left in the game.

Kothmann made a basket and Todd Bandy made two to pull within one, 47-46, with 3:01 in the game. Morton missed the first of a one and one and Friona got the ball and Mills sank a basket to give Friona their first lead, 48-47, since early in the second quarter.




