IT HAS BEEN a long preliminary season. Over two months have passed since the Friona Chieftains opened its cage year with a 92-52 win

over Farwell. The basketball season will come to a head here Tuesday when Morton

comes to town. If you like hard-nosed basketball, don't miss Tuesday night's game. The two teams are much like Friona and Bastrop, who met last year in the state semi-finals.

There have undoubtedly been state playoff games in which there weren't two teams having the ability that Friona and Morton will have when they take the court Tuesday.

The team that wins the game Tuesday will have taken a big stride toward moving into the state playoffs. There are two halves to the district schedule, but this first one is an important one from a momentum standpoint.

It's extra important to Friona, with the Chieftains playing at home. The team has several things to prove, what with being rated third in class AA and district by an area paper for most of the season.

After Tuesday's barn-burner, there will only be three home games left on the 1975 schedule.

One thing's for sure. All the games from here on in are big games. If you're a basketball fan, you won't want to miss a single game.

Big Game Tuesday: Chiefs vs Morton

The "Big Game" as far as the Friona Chieftains are concerned is slated for Chieftain Fieldhouse on Tuesday night, January 21.

AT FRIONA

The Morton Indians come to town for a "re-match" of Friona's invitational tournament finals, when Morton pinned the only loss on Friona by a 48-44 margin.

Game time Tuesday for the feature will be 8 p.m. Junior varsity teams from the two schools will meet at 6:30 p.m.

Since dropping that game to the Indians here on December 7, the Chieftains have roared to 13 consecutive wins, and were seeking to make it 14 Friday night against Littlefield in the conference opener.

"We've played 22 games, and although we're 21-1, it doesn't mean a thing unless we beat Morton Tuesday," said Coach Larry Dyess. Asked for his opinion on the game, Dyess said he thought the team was "Ready."

Funding Method Is Board Meet Topic

"We have had several good workouts lately. I think the boys are looking forward to the game. They have something to prove," Dyess said this week.

Dyess said he didn't think the team would turn the ball over as often as it did when the teams met in the tournament finals. Friona had 13 turnovers in that one--and 11 of them were on Friona's offensive end of the court. Only two were as a result of the Morton press.

In the earlier meeting, virtually every member of the team was cold. The Chiefs hit only 36 per cent of their field goal shots and only two of the five shots they got from the free throw line. The 44 points scored in that game are far and away the least for the team this season. Next lowest has been 60, as Friona is averaging 75.9 points per game through the first 22 games.

One big incentive for Friona to win the game is to give the team impetus toward the first half district championship. The first half winner has a big edge, as a team can claim the title by tying for the second half, if it won the first half outright.

"It is going to be a chore for the district champion to go through the entire district schedule undefeated," Dyess said.

Going into Friday's games, Morton's season record was 20-1, and Dimmitt was 20-2. Those teams were to meet Friday night at Morton, leaving one member of the "Big Three" a game behind in the early going.

Six-three Mack Williams is averaging around 25 points per game for the Indians, and is a tough man on the boards.

Last year, the Chiefs broke a 16-game losing streak to Morton when they downed the Indians twice

School financing, and possible new methods which could be used for school funds, was a major item of discussion at the regular meeting of the Friona School board Monday evening.

Texas' method of financing school districts came under attack by the Rodriquez case in 1970, in which a federal court stated the need for reforming the tax system, and declared that school districts had relied "too long and too heavily on property tax" as a means of revenue.

The local board adopted a resolution to send to the state legislature, recommending that the legislature investigate sources of funds other than the property tax with which to finance public schools. Tax assessor-collector Porter

Roberts reported that tax collections through December ,31 amounted to \$363,674 on the 1974-75 roll, or 56.27 per cent. There remained \$282,639 in taxes to be collected.



Farmers Face Tax Deadline January 31

"Farmers and crew leaders who hire farm workers have until January 31 to send 1974 wage reports and social security contributions to the Internal Revenue Service," William Ent, social security field representative stated today.

"A farm worker paid \$150 or more in cash wages by an employer in 1974 is covered by social security. A worker who did farm work for an employer on 20 or more days during the year--figured on a time basis rather than a piece-rate basis -- is also covered even if he is paid less than \$150 during the year

"Farm employers send in annual wage reports for farm employees on a form available from any Internal Revenue Service office. This form is mailed automatically to farmers and crew leaders who already have IRS employer identification numbers," Ent continued.

"A farm crew leader is generally considered to be the employer of his crew members if he supplies the workers to the farmer, pays them, and is not an employee of the farmer by written agreement.

The acid content of cottonseed is especially important this year since much of the 1974 cotton crop suffered from wet weather this fall.

Cottonseed delinting plants commonly use the one per cent level of free fatty acid as the breaking point in saving or rejecting seed for planting purposes. Seed with a high acid content often shows a high germination test, initially, but these seed will deteriorate rapidly in storage and germination will drop. Of course, a low acid content does not insure top quality seed. Immature seed may be low in free fatty acid content.

Cottonseed should not be saved for planting that has two per cent or more free fatty acid. Seed delinting companies can assist producers in obtaining an acid test on their planting seed. Numerous laboratories in the state also are equipped to check the acid content of cottonseed.

USING SALT to melt ice on

sidewalks, streets and driveways can injure nearby trees, shrubs and lawn grass.

Salt may drain into the ground when ice melts and damage the root systems of nearby grass and shrubs

Salt in the root systems of trees can cause partial or complete burning of leaves and may result in the loss of valuable trees and shrubs. Patches of dead grass may also result. These effects may not show up until early summer.

Use ammonium nitrate fertilizer instead of salt to melt ice. Ammonium nitrate not only melts the ice, but fertilizes shrubs and plants in the lawn. Any commercial fertilizer

that is high in nitrogen and potassium can be used. Care must be taken to use only enough fertilizer to melt the ice, as a high concentration of fertilizer in the soil can also damage

plants. Sand can also be used to melt ice on sidewalks and driveways. It provides good traction for cars and pedestrians and is no more damaging to floors and rugs than salt.
