

Five Fellowships Provided By Funds

Mrs. Cordie Vargas of Bovina revealed recently that an additional \$50,000 has been allocated in Christmas Seal funds to train Texas chest physicians in 1975. Mrs. Vargas is the Parmer County representative of the American Lung Association of Texas, Top of Texas Area.

The Christmas Seal funds will provide fellowships of \$10,000 each to five physicians training in lung disease through Baylor and Texas University centers. A number of other specialists are training in Texas on fellowships awarded annually, she said.

Citing a critical and dangerous shortage of chest specialists to care for the nation's lung patients, she said that "it's a little late to think of training a chest doctor when the patient is in acute pulmonary failure. We're acting now to save the lung patients of tomorrow."

Mrs. Vargas urged local residents to answer Christmas Seal letters, stating that the campaign is lagging behind last year while the number of lung patients is steadily increasing. She said that area Lung Association plans include a multi-phase program on asthma and

other lung disease in 1975, to include update training for physicians, nurses and other hospital personnel, as well as a program for parents of asthmatic children.

Mrs. Pearl Cervantes and Mrs. Lucille Walling of Bovina serve with Mrs. Vargas as Parmer County representatives to the Area Lung Association, formerly known as the TB and Respiratory Disease Association.

Bond Sales Released

Sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$3,985 in Parmer County were reported by County Bond Chairman Frank A. Spring.

Sales for the eleven-month period totaled \$75,355 for 75 per cent of the 1974 sales goal of \$100,000.

Sales in Texas during the month of November amounted to \$17,763,713, while year-to-date sales totaled \$212,780,156 with 90 per cent of the yearly sales goal of \$236.8 million achieved.

DPS Investigates Ten Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated ten accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of December, 1974, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and seven persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the year of 1974 shows a total of 123 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 66 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for December, 1974, shows a total of 598 accidents resulting in 11 persons killed and 340 persons injured as compared to December, 1973, with 499 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 277 persons injured. This was 99 more accidents, six less killed, and 63 more injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The 11 traffic deaths for the month of December, 1974, occurred in the following counties: three in Potter; two in Haskell; and one each in Clay, Garza, Lamb, Moore, Randall and Wheeler.

Johnny Cash Film Is Slated Here Sunday

The story is old, but the perspective is up-dated and brought into sharp focus by the film, "The Gospel Road" to be shown on Sunday, January 19 at First Baptist Church. The showing will begin at 7 p.m.

Tax Deadline Set This Month

Plainview--Although the mention of tax usually brings to mind that square on the calendar marked April 15, the month of January contains three very important tax deadlines which will affect many taxpayers in North Texas.

Employers are reminded that the deadline to give employees their 1974 W-2 forms is Friday, January 31. Adherence to this date is important because of the delay in filing individual income tax returns that can be caused by late W-2 forms.

January 31 is also the deadline for reporting social security and withheld income taxes for the calendar quarter ended December 31, 1974. If employers make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due, 10 additional days are allowed to file the return. Employers who received a pre-addressed form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return," should use this form to report their tax liability. Other employers can obtain blank forms from their local IRS office.

The last day of January is also the last day to report and pay any balance of Federal Unemployment Tax not over \$100.00 for 1974,

using form 940. If the balance of tax due is over \$100.00, the employer must make a deposit with FTD form 508. Employers depositing the full amount of tax on time will then have until February 11 to file the accompanying return.

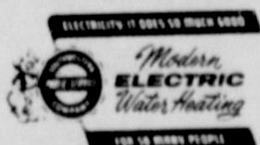

Gov. Proposes New Driving Program

Governor Dolph Briscoe plans to recommend an expanded driver education program in his legislative proposals to be presented to the next session of the Texas Legislature.

The plan is one of many, designed by Governor Briscoe, to upgrade and provide the necessary financial support for driver education in the state's high schools.

Recently, the State Board of Education included driver education expansion in one of 14 propositions for improvement of the school systems.

While many students are participating in the program, thousands of eligible high school pupils are not being reached, primarily because behind-the-wheel instruction requires a laboratory fee of between \$40.00 and \$60.00. Currently, federal funding provides only \$10.00 per student and

federal regulations prohibit even this amount of funding beyond June 30, 1975.

Essentially, this means that the student is presently required to pay a large percentage of the fee and will be required to pay 100 percent of the fee after that date.

Often, this prohibits lower-income students from participation in the driver education program. One observer termed the high fees as "discriminatory" to students with a desire to improve themselves despite a lack of money.

Should the legislation be approved, 100 percent funding would be provided for behind-the-wheel instruction. This would permit an estimated additional 74,000 eligible students being offered driver education in 1975-76 school year. Presently, 158,983 students are receiving driver education courses in the Texas school system.

Other advantages of additional state funding would allow districts to provide more comprehensive courses, authorize cooperative programs among districts, and would assure a continuing driver education program.

The essays can be up to 300 words. The age limit is 18 years old. Each essay must be written in ink and in longhand.

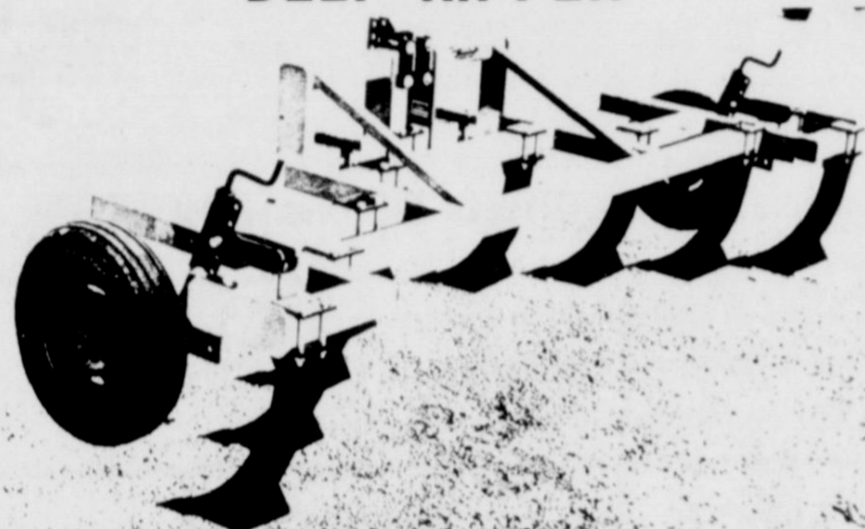

**On The Farm
In Parmer County**

A TEAM of Extension Rural Development Specialists will be talking to people throughout Parmer County next week. They will be interviewing citizens in every walk of life to determine the County's needs. This will be a special type of survey that hasn't been conducted before in Parmer County. The information that is gathered will be used by Parmer County citizens and not by someone outside of the county as most other survey material is. This interview should produce some interesting facts and put some light on the County's greatest problems.

Heading the survey team will be Tim Shaunty, Area Resource Development Specialist and Dave Rue-sink, Sociologist, with the Extension Service in College Station.

COTTON FARMERS who are planning on saving seed from their 1974 crop should be sure it is high in germination and low in free fatty acid.

Most farmers check germination closely but may not be aware of the importance of the free fatty acid content.

Free fatty acid is a by-product of seed deterioration so its content should not be more than one per cent. Seed exposed to long periods of wet weather prior to harvesting or subjected to poor storage after harvesting will generally have a higher acid content, indicating considerable seed deterioration.

The acid content of cottonseed is especially important this year since much of the 1974 cotton crop suffered from wet weather this fall.

Cottonseed delinting plants commonly use the one per cent level of free fatty acid as the breaking point in saving or rejecting seed for planting purposes.

Seed with a high acid content often shows a high germination test, initially, but these seed will deteriorate rapidly in storage and germination will drop. Of course, a low acid content does not insure top quality seed. Immature seed may be low in free fatty acid content.

Cottonseed should not be saved for planting that has two per cent or more free fatty acid. Seed delinting companies can assist producers in obtaining an acid test on their planting seed. Numerous laboratories in the state also are equipped to check the acid content of cottonseed.

++++
USING SALT to melt ice on sidewalks, streets and driveways can injure nearby trees, shrubs and lawn grass.

Salt may drain into the ground when ice melts and damage the root systems of nearby grass and shrubs.

Salt in the root systems of trees can cause partial or complete burning of leaves and may result in the loss of valuable trees and shrubs. Patches of dead grass may also result. These effects may not show up until early summer.

Use ammonium nitrate fertilizer instead of salt to melt ice. Ammonium nitrate not only melts the ice, but fertilizes shrubs and plants in the lawn.

Any commercial fertilizer that is high in nitrogen and potassium can be used.

Care must be taken to use only enough fertilizer to melt the ice, as a high concentration of fertilizer in the soil can also damage plants.

Sand can also be used to melt ice on sidewalks and driveways. It provides good traction for cars and pedestrians and is no more damaging to floors and rugs than salt.
