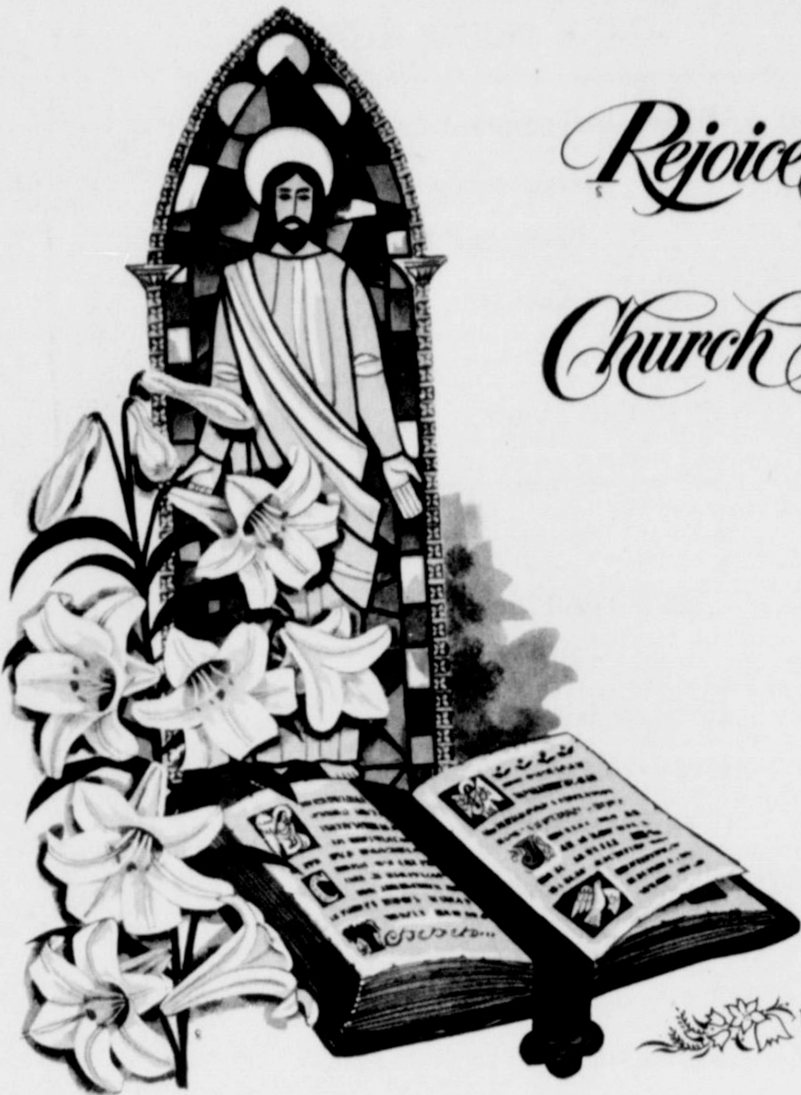

# \$3500 In Jewelry Taken At Gunpoint

A Friona woman, Mrs. Jo Johnson of 1201 Jackson, was robbed at gunpoint early Wednesday morning, of an estimated \$3500 in jewelry.

A young white man gained entrance at Mrs. Johnson's residence, posing as a utility man wanting to check for "leaks." The man appeared at the residence about 7:30 a.m. Wednesday.

After he gained entrance, he pulled a gun and asked Johnson if she had any money. After she told him she didn't, he said "Then give me your suitcase full of jewelry."

Mrs. Johnson is a partner in an antique shop in Texico, N.M., and had a briefcase full of turquoise jewelry in the trunk of her car.

The intruder held the gun at Mrs. Johnson's head as she went into the garage and took the brief case from the trunk of her car.

Before leaving, he tied Mrs. Johnson to a kitchen chair, taping her hands behind her. He warned her not to move or he'd kill her.

After about 20 minutes, Mrs. Johnson managed to break the tape and went to a neighbor's house, the Earl Grahams, where Mrs. Graham called the Friona Police Department.

Roadblocks were set up at the state line, but apparently the thief had escaped by the time authorities

had been notified.

The intruder was described as in his late 20s, or early 30s, tall, slim, with short hair and a heavy brown mustache. He wore matching Levi shirt and pants.

Chief of Police Bill Denney said the department had very few leads to work on.

## Wind, Wind, Blow Away!

Residents of the Friona area have been buffeted for more than a week with a steady diet of wind. Thursday of this week made seven consecutive days for high winds to blast the area.

On at least two days the past week, the wind continued into the night, well past midnight on Monday, contrary to the usual respite that it gives during the evening hours during the annual March spell.

# City, School Set Election April 5

Saturday, April 5 is election day in Friona, with both the school and city elections slated to be held that day. The joint election will be held at the Friona Fire Station at Ninth and Main. Tuesday, April 1 is the deadline for absentee voting.

Ten names will appear on the school board ballot, with five names on the city's slate.

In the school board race seven of the candidates have announced for the one-year unexpired term of Ann Porter, who resigned from the board when she moved from the city.

Those running for the one-year school board term are Charles Hough, Norman Kothmann, Ken-

neth McLellan, Clarence Monroe, Dr. Jon Mack Roden, V.R. Wilcox and Floyd Reeve.

Seeking the three-year term are Wesley Barnett, Leroy Lundy and Ronald Smiley. Barnett and Smiley are incumbents.

In the City Council race, incumbents Martha Bates and Glenn E. Reeve, Sr. are on the ballot, along with Kenneth Neill, Steve Struve and Patrick Pace.

### SCHOOL BOARD CANDIDATES

CHARLES HOUGH, 35, has been a Friona resident for the past 31 years. He is a farmer in the Hub area, having been named earlier this

month as the "Conservation Farmer of the Year."

Hough attends the First Baptist Church. He and his wife Luann are the parents of two children, Doris, 12, and David, who is 9.

He is a member of the Chamber of Commerce, the Farm Bureau, the National Rifle Association and the Airplane Pilots Assn.

As to his reason for running, Hough said he was interested because of having children in school. "Someone has to be responsible," he said.

NORMAN KOTHMANN has been a Friona resident for about the past five years. He is a federal meat inspector with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and is stationed at Crow's Meat Company.

Kothmann is a member of the Methodist Church, is a member of the Friona Evening Lions Club, the Booster Club and the Chieftain Parents.

## Permit Issued For New P.O.

A permit was issued this week for the new Post Office building in Friona, to be located at 1010 Main.

W.C. Null of Amarillo will be the contractor on the building. The permit issued was for \$75,000. The building, to be 50x70 feet will be of block and brick construction.

The building will be located on a lot measuring 175 by 140 feet. Null has been busy the past week removing the old McCaslin Lumber Yard building from the site.

He and his wife Hazel are parents of three boys, Koty, Kevin and Gerald. Kothmann was not available to comment on the race.

KENNETH McLELLAN, 39, has lived in Friona all of his life. He is a farmer, is a member of the Methodist Church, and belongs to the Chieftain Parents organization, serving as president for the 1974-75 year.

Kenneth and his wife Elizabeth are parents of three children, Ronnie, a senior at Friona High School, Cliff, a sophomore, and Becky, who is in the seventh grade.

As for reasons for running for a board position, McLellan says he's interested in a better school system. "We need to work toward an improved school, and I feel like I could help," he says.

CLARENCE MONROE, 39, has lived in the Friona area for 16 years. He is a member of the First Baptist Church, the Booster Club, Chamber of Commerce, Chieftain Parents, and is on the board of directors for Parmer County Farm Bureau and the Friona Co-op Gin.

Monroe and his wife Peggy are parents of two children. Renae is an eighth-grader and Alan is a freshman in high school.

He was not reached for a comment on the race.

DR. JON MACK RODEN, 34, has lived in Friona all of his life. A dentist, Dr. Roden is a member of the Chamber of Commerce, having served on that organization's board of directors. He presently is serving on the board for the Friona Country Club.

Jon Mack and his wife Nancy attend the Methodist Church. They have three children, Ricky, Ross and Raina.

He was unavailable at press time for a comment regarding the race and his reasons for running.

V.R. WILCOX, 38, has been a resident of the Friona area for the past 16 years. He is a farmer, and is a member of the Friona Booster Club, Chieftain Parents, the Little League board of directors, and is a former Scoutmaster.

Wilcox and his wife Frankie attend the Sixth Street Church of Christ. Their children are Pam, who is a junior in high school; Terry, a freshman, and Kim, a second-grader.

"I thought this would be a good opportunity to serve my community. I have not been too active in civic affairs, but would try my best to do the job that the people would have

me do," said Wilcox in relation to the school board race.

LEROY LUNDY, 38, has been a resident of the Friona area for the past ten years. He is owner of Ag-Chem Farm Services in Friona, and is a member of the Chamber of Commerce, the Little League board of directors and the Booster Club.

Lundy and his wife Louise are parents of four children. Cindy is 16 and a junior at FHS; Christy is 13, and is in the eighth grade; Jeff is nine and is in the fourth grade, and Corrie is six.

The Lundys attend Sixth Street Church of Christ.

Concerning the race, Lundy said "Every parent has an obligation to serve. I would like to share this responsibility to be of service."

## Hereford Meeting Vital To Farmers

A meeting for all farmers, cattlemen, agri-businessmen, bankers and their wives has been called for Monday, March 31 at the Bull Barn in Hereford. The meeting will get underway at 8 p.m.

Concerned agricultural leaders and financial institutions in Deaf Smith, Parmer, Bailey, Lamb, Floyd, Crosby, Swisher, Castro, Sherman and Oldham counties are sponsoring the meeting.

"Agricultural producers nationwide are becoming exceedingly alarmed at the economic situation facing them. At a time when their production costs are soaring 200 to 300 per cent, they are witnessing drastic drops in their market prices to levels much below production costs," said a Parmer County spokesman.

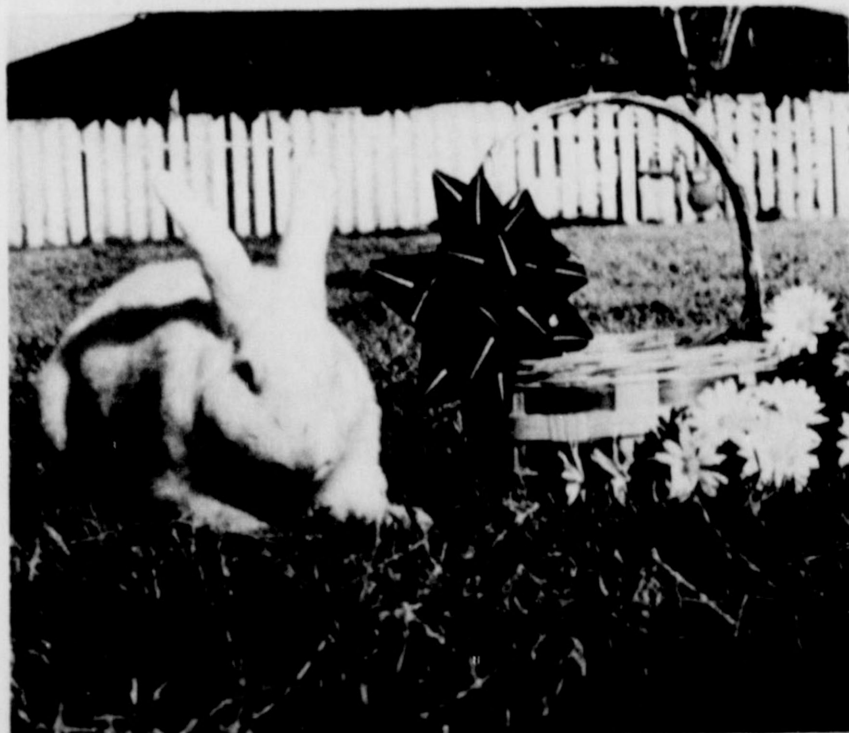
"Markets have been lost due to interference by the government in normal export channels; livestock

taken off feed due to the bad state of the feeding industry; and a general lack of confidence on the part of buyers of agricultural commodities," he continued.

"Due to these lost markets, it is now apparent there will only be a need for approximately 80 per cent of our projected 1975 feed grain and wheat production.

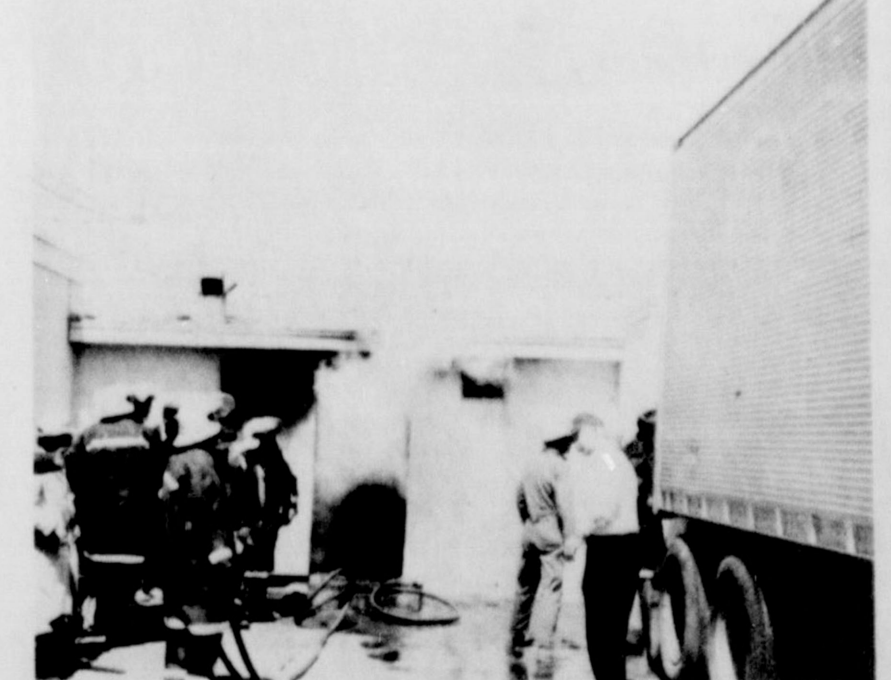
"It is estimated that prices of all grains will be cut in half if this excess 20 per cent is produced. Conversely, a study by Iowa State University indicates that prices of grain would rise by 46 per cent if acreage was cut by only nine per cent," the spokesman said.

It was pointed out that because of the situation facing producers, the meeting was called to discuss what can be done to avert a "major agricultural disaster this summer and fall," following a pilot meeting on March 20.

# Friona Flashbacks ...from the files of The Friona Star

## 45 YEARS AGO—APRIL 4, 1930

Occasionally indications of the progress and prosperity of the territory surrounding Friona at the present time appear in unexpected places, yet are the more welcome in that they help establish the fact that people are better contented throughout this region and are planning homes of greater convenience and comfort. During the past week Blythe Bros., Delco-Light and Frigidair distributors, have installed nineteen Delco-Light plants in farm homes in the region they serve. Among these were R.P. Daniel and Hugh Lee of Friona.

The new building into which the Star office will be moved was announced as ready for occupancy on Friday of this week. The new office will occupy one of the rooms in the Henry Warren building on Sixth Street.

## 40 YEARS AGO—APRIL 5, 1940

In 1935, a one year subscription to the Friona Star cost \$1.50 for a year.

## 35 YEARS AGO—APRIL 5, 1940

F.A. Spring, who has succeeded Dan Ethridge in the insurance business here, moved his family here last Saturday, and is occupying the Kinsley house that was vacated by Mr. and Mrs. Ethridge, when they moved to Lubbock. Spring will be in charge of the agency office, the name of which has been changed to The F.A. Spring Agency.

## 30 YEARS AGO—APRIL 6, 1945

Owing to two wrecks that occurred on the Santa Fe railroad on Thursday of last week, the mail service here was badly demoralized. One of the wrecks occurred west of Clovis, during the early part of the day, and the other occurred at Friona, just west of the stock pens, during the afternoon. No mail was received here Thursday and Friday.

## 25 YEARS AGO—APRIL 7, 1950

Allen's Jewelry will hold its formal opening Saturday in its modern new quarters in the Friona State Bank building. Allen Stewart, owner, states that new fixtures in keeping with the new location have been installed, and the merchandise stock has been greatly expanded, giving Friona a really complete jewelry and watch repair center.

## 20 YEARS AGO—MARCH 31, 1955

Dillie M. Kelley was tendered contract for the position of Superintendent of Schools in Friona Monday evening. Kelley, in signing the two-year contract, will take over July 1 from Supt. Dalton Caffey who has submitted his resignation with two years still to run on his present 3-year contract.

## 15 YEARS AGO—MARCH 31, 1960

A deed was the culprit that sent City Manager Albert Field to the phone Friday night to call a special city council meeting. Field discovered the city was about to trade off a piece of land that it didn't have title to for a site for a new sewer plant. The present sewer plant site was purchased from Santa Fe Grain Company for \$5.00. This was a bargain, but Santa Fe Grain Company reserved the right in the deed to take back the land, if for a period of a year, City of Friona didn't use the land in question for a sewer plant. So—the city informed the Santa Fe Railroad, with whom they have been dickering for a land purchase east of town and offered them \$100 per acre for the site which the city's engineer has determined best suited for the new sewage plant.

## 10 YEARS AGO—APRIL 1, 1965

The Friona School Board this week let a contract to Vibra-Whirl and Company of Panhandle on a bid of \$52,975 for the construction of a new football stadium at Friona High School. The bid figure will include the building of a permanent stadium on the west side of the proposed field, which will contain 1533 seats exclusive of aisle space. The facility will contain a press box, two ticket offices, a dirt track around the field and new lighting will be installed.

## 5 YEARS AGO—APRIL 2, 1970

Residents of Friona will be called upon for the second time to vote for or against a one-cent city sales tax this Saturday, as a highlight of the annual city and school elections. City Manager Jake Outland points out that in reality, the vote will give residents an opportunity to choose between a sales tax as a means of additional revenue, or the alternative of a raise in property tax. The rapidly developing city is requiring more and more in the way of funds, according to Outland.

## Monitor School To Be Held

Use of radiation detection equipment by emergency personnel will be the subject of a three-day Radiological Monitor School beginning April 1, 1975 in Friona under sponsorship of the Division of Emergency Medical Services of the State Health Department and the Parmer County Civil Defense Office.

The April 1-3, 1975 school will be held at the Fire Station in Friona beginning at 7 p.m. Further information may be obtained from A.L. Outland, City Manager of Friona.

The instructors from the Emergency Medical Services Division of the State Health Department in Austin will be Garland Latham and Bill Patrick.

Use of radioisotopes has increased greatly in Texas, and the risks of an accident involving transportation or use of these materials also has increased, strengthening the need for emergency personnel trained in using monitoring equipment.

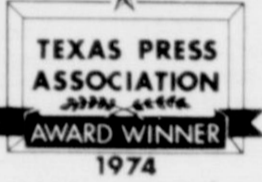

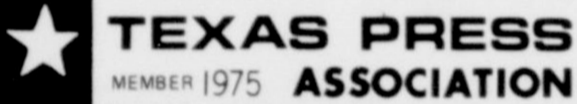

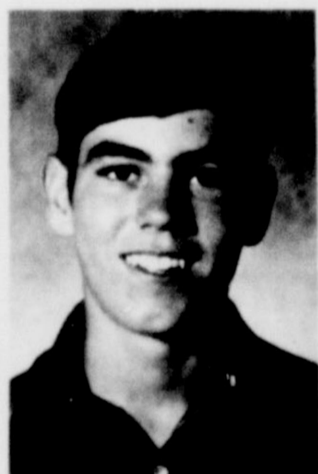

**Licenses Need To Be Updated**

The Texas Department of Public Safety advises that Texas drivers should examine their Texas drivers license to verify that the address on their license is correct. If his address is incorrect, it will be necessary to contact the local Drivers License Office as soon as possible. It is a misdemeanor offense for not changing your address within 10 days after moving. This particular law is going to be enforced more strictly in the future. The procedure for changing an address on a license is to have a duplicate license made with a new picture and a \$1.00 fee.

The Texas License Law, C.S. 66876, Sec. 20, states that whenever any person after applying for or receiving an Operator's, Commercial Operator's or Chauffeur's license shall move from the address named in such application or in the license issued to him or when the name of the licensee is changed by marriage or otherwise, such person shall within ten (10) days thereafter notify the Department in writing of his old and new addresses or of such former and new names, of the number of any license then held by him, and such person shall apply for a duplicate license as set out in Section 14.

Section 14 states that in the event that an Operator's, Commercial Operator's or Chauffeur's license issued under the provisions of this Act is lost, destroyed or there is a change in pertinent information, the person to whom the same was issued may obtain a duplicate or correction thereof upon furnishing proof satisfactory to the Department that such permit or license was lost or destroyed or upon the

supplying of the required information which has changed, together with proof acceptable to the

Department supporting such change, and upon the payment of a fee of one dollar (\$1.00).

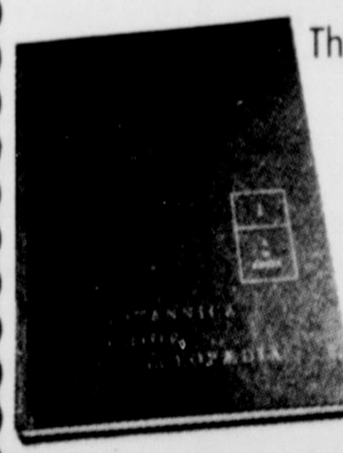

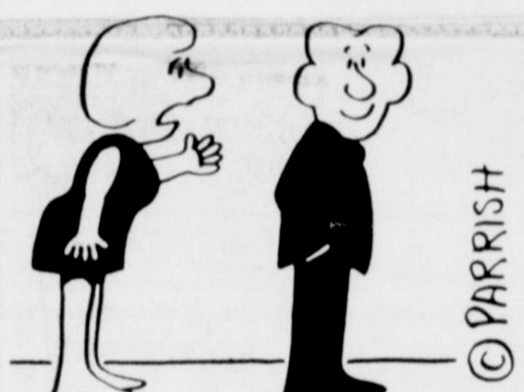

## Bank President Lauds Youth Advisory Board

Friona State Bank's youth advisory board is in its second year, and bank president Robert Neelley, coordinator of the program, says he is real proud of the project's accomplishments.

## Vehicle Registration Deadline Approaches

"Are you plated or belated?"

That's the question motorists may be facing after midnight, April 1, deadline for motor vehicle registration in Texas. After that time, law enforcement agencies have been instructed to stop motorists not displaying the 1975 plates to remind them of their licensing responsibilities.

Since February 1, county tax offices and selected substations throughout the state have been conducting registration business as usual. Early reports indicate the annual procedure, required of the state's 9.2 million motor vehicle owners, is running smoothly. However, many registrants traditionally wait until the "last minute" to react, resulting in longer lines and necessary delays.

According to a Highway Department spokesman, public response to the new five-year license plate, being issued for the first time in Texas, has been good. In fact, motorists have shown an uncommon interest in the "label" their motor vehicle will wear through 1979.

In lieu of annual replacement, motorists will be issued an adhesive-type

sticker beginning in 1976, that will update their plate for another year of driving. The sticker will be placed in the debossed upper left corner of the plate. The following year, the tag will be stuck in the upper right corner to cover the debossed "75," and alternated for the ensuing years. Once in place, the tags cannot be easily removed without deterioration, a part of the plan to discourage vandalism or theft.

County tax offices will continue to issue annual plates to certain classes of motor vehicles. These include radio operators, dealers, government officials and those passenger cars displaying "personalized" plates.

Remember the registration deadline: MIDNIGHT, APRIL 1ST!

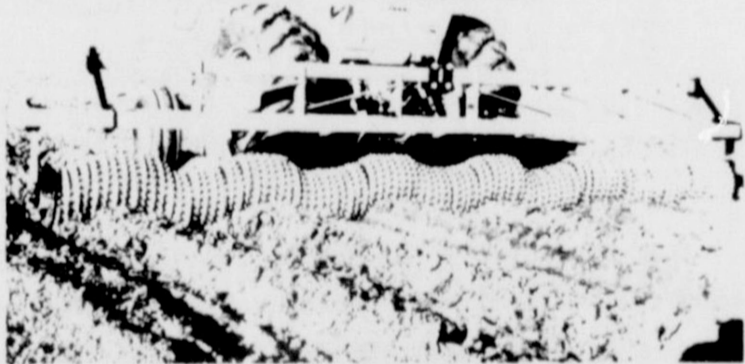

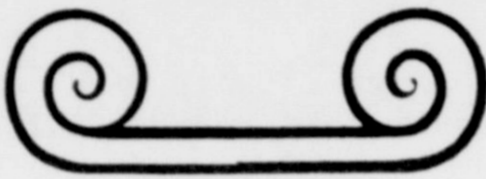

# Tracksters Do Well At Deaf Smith Meet

Facing their toughest competition of the season last Saturday at Hereford, the Friona Chieftain tracksters were equal to the test in the events they have been winning this spring, scoring big in the field events, and improving their marks in every event.

However, the team's lack of depth in the running events hurt their chances at defending the team title they had won there in 1974. The team placed third with 66 points. The talent-deep Sunray Bobcats raced to the team championship with 123 points. Dimmitt, looking great in the sprints, was second with 108 points.

The Chiefs won four events, including placing 1-2 in the high jump and discus.

Clark was making his first start of the season in the high jump event, the event he won district in last year. He has been nursing a knee injury, and did not compete at all in the team's first meet. At Farwell, he entered only the pole vault.

Clark's 6-3 was three inches better than the old meet record for Division II, and the blonde senior barely missed getting a 6-4 when the bar was lifted an inch for three tries at extending the record. It had appeared that he had cleared 6-4 earlier when he was jumping 6-2, but his feet knocked the bar down once at the higher attempt.

Clark, using an unconventional back-flop, had only one miss through the 6-2 height. Cleveland, who passed on the first jump when the bar was at 5-6, made it without a miss at 5-8, 5-10 and 6-0. However, it took a third try for the 6-4 senior to clear the bar both at 6-1 and 6-2, as the two Chieftain stars battled tooth and nail.

For a time, the Chiefs had all three of their high jumpers in the running, but Friona's other entrant, Gene Strickland, went out at 6-0.

The discus throw resembled the high jump battle, in that two entrants wearing the Red and White battled for the top two spots. Mitchell Wiseman and Davy Carthel, who have swapped out on their placings in the team's three meets to date, out-threw the entrants from the 11 other teams in Friona's division.

Wiseman won the event with a heave of 147-5, his best of the season, and Carthel, who had thrown it 145-9 the previous week, was second at 136-7.

Kenny Stowers gave the Chieftains a sweep in the weight events by winning the shot put with a heave of 47 feet, one-half inch, his season best by two inches.

Half-miler Ronnie McLellan, undefeated thus far in his specialty, went out and set the pace as he always does, and beat his Sunray opponent by five yards. Despite the high wind that buffeted the performers, McLellan turned in a season best of 2:08.6.

The 880-yard run event was held in two heats, with runners being pitted against the clock as well as their opponents. In the second heat, Friona freshman Glen London caused some raised eyebrows by running a strong race, and winning the heat in the time of 2:12. When the times of the two heats were combined, London was given fifth place.

Hurdler Roy Don Rector gained the finals in both the 120-yard high hurdles and the 330-yard intermediate hurdles. Although posting his best times of the season (15.8 and 44.3), Rector gained only sixth place in each event. Both events produced record times by the winners.

Other Chieftain points were scored by Kevin Welch in the long jump, sixth with a leap of 19-4½; Jimmy Allen, fifth in the mile at 5:05.3; David Barnett, fifth in the pole vault

at 10-6, and Clark, sixth in the vault at 10-6.

Clark had cleared 11 feet in the vault the previous week, and this was the winning height at Hereford. However, his long duel with Cleveland in the high jump caused that event to overlap the start of the pole vault, and the missed his early turns. Clark cleared 10-6, but seemed to be too tired to make 11

feet after the high jump effort.

The Chieftains will have an open date this weekend, and their next outing will be at Springlake April 5.

The following weekend, April 11-12, Friona will be entered in the Amarillo Relays, and on April 18 the District 3-AA meet will be held at Littlefield.

# SCS Report

Contrary to what some people think and others advocate, change is not always progress. The center pivot sprinkler irrigation system is about the biggest change Farmer County farmers have seen. The sprinkler has been presented as a machine that will cure all ills, from weak irrigation wells to arthritis. No matter how unrealistic some of the claims sound sprinkler irrigation systems have real value on a lot of farms.

However, some farms have a potential of much greater irrigation efficiency than sprinkler irrigation can afford with not near the expense. This new breakthrough is the old fashioned row irrigation system. If soil types, land slopes, and row lengths are correlated together, many farms could be getting up to 90 per cent irrigation efficiency with furrow irrigation. With furrow irrigation, air temperature and wind speed is not a major factor. The slope of the land must be less than one foot fall per one hundred linear feet to achieve this kind of effi-

ency. Some farms are ideal for this and some are not.

Sprinkler systems are suited for permeable soils or sloping soils, but flat, tight soils may be better suited for furrow irrigation. Sprinklers are not the answer for weak water. Corn and milo use over two inches of water per week during part of the summer. The decision is not can I stretch my water twice as far, but which system is the best suited for my needs. Crops need the same amount of water no matter how they get it.

"We at the Soil Conservation Service are in no way trying to say that sprinklers are not good," explained Herb Evans, "but in some cases row irrigation may be better. We invite anyone who is undecided which way to go to stop in at our office in Friona. We have good information and can impartially help anyone study his potentials and alternatives," concluded Evans.

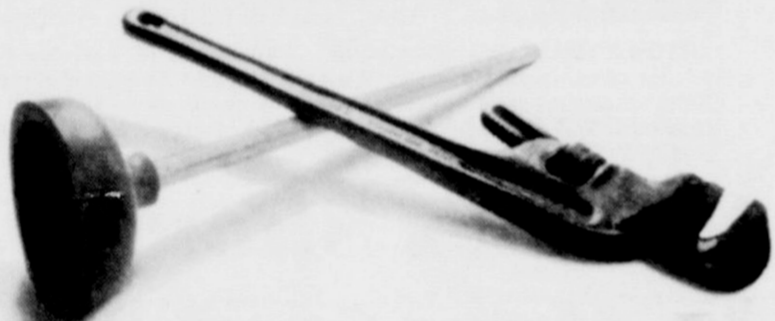

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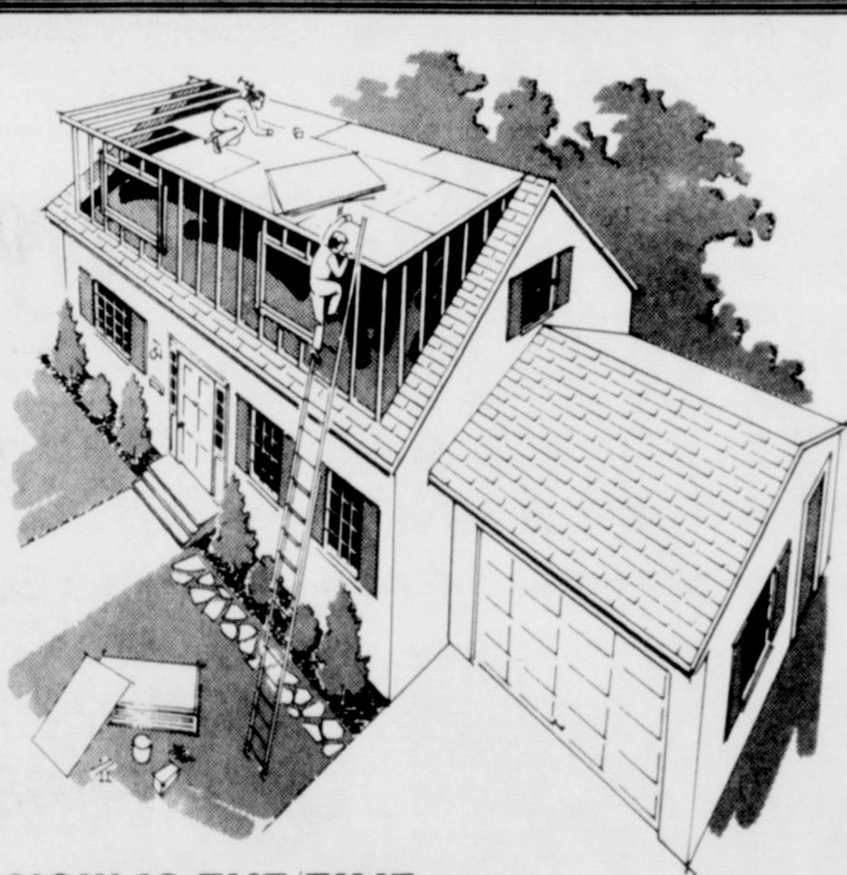
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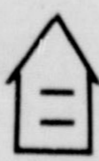
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## Jenisu Fallwell, James Roy Morris United In Double Ring Ceremony

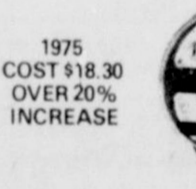

Names of the honorable mentions as well as the scholarship winners will be included in a roster of outstanding students to be distributed to four-year senior institutions throughout the nation.

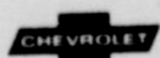

## Terri Bingham To Do Evangelistic Work

Terri Bingham of Friona is among 200 Baylor University students who will carry the message of Christ halfway around the world this spring.

The students, members of Baylor's Baptist Student Union, will travel during the university's annual spring break to Singapore and Malaysia where, according to BSU director Lonnie Hayter, they will "share Christ through evangelism and Christian training of young Christians."

The group is going overseas under the sponsorship of the Southern Baptist Convention's Foreign Mission Board.

"This is the first time the Foreign Mission Board has ever used students in any kind of 'exposure overseas,'" Hayter said, "and it's the first time Baylor has ever sent out students to do evangelistic work to this extent."

Hayter said that the students are going "not as tourists or singers, but to work in the countries," and that they will witness in Singapore and throughout each of the major cities in Malaysia where Southern Baptists have worked.

"We will be doing a cooperative ministry," he said, "according to each area's needs. We feel this is all a part of a worldwide vision that we believe Baptists have for the world, and it certainly goes with the BSU motto of 'helping equip Baylor students to reach the world for Christ.'"

Hayter said there are about 40

Southern Baptist missionaries currently working in the Singapore-Malaysia area and that the people there are "particularly receptive" to the Christian message.

Hayter, as well as BSU staff members Pam Rogers, associate director, and Chuck Kelley, student assistant director, and several members of the Foreign Mission Board will accompany the students. Hayter said he also has invited Baylor head football coach Grant Teaff and BSU members at Baylor's School of Nursing in Dallas.

Hayter said that about 150 students already have committed themselves for the mission endeavor. Requirements of those who go are that they attend a weekly Bible study and training sessions in how to share their faith with those of other faiths.

Each student who participates will be required to pay his own way, which Hayter said would be about

\$750 per person. Money raised through work projects will be divided equally among those making the trip.

Hayter said the goal of those in the mission, theme of which is "Venture with a Vision," is to "reach the maximum number of people with as effective a presentation of Jesus Christ and what He means to their lives as possible."

Hayter said he anticipates that several students who go on the trip will want to become missionaries upon their return. He said that Baylor already has educated more foreign missionaries than any other school, and Southern Baptists have the largest mission force of any Protestant denomination.

But, Hayter said, one of the most important aspects of the trip is that, when the students return, they will have "a new joy and strength to share with Baylor people."
