

Bonds Pass 23-1 For Nursing Home

Friona residents overwhelmingly expressed their desire for a local nursing home by streaming to the polls and passing by a record margin a \$350,000 municipal bond issue here Tuesday.

City voters approved the bond issue with 493 voters in favor, to only 22 opposed.

In passing by a 95.7 per cent margin, the for-against ratio of the election was 22-1, an unbelievable margin, and largest ever for a local bond issue.

The turnout of 516 voters was second only to the election of 1970 when the city sales tax was approved by 551 city voters.

The city election of April 5 had a turnout of only 381 voters.

Ironically, it will be proceeds from the one-cent city tax that will help to make payments on this latest bond issue.

With the passing of the bond issue, the steering committee is optimistic about awarding a contract on the project by June 1, a deadline local leaders are shooting for.

Tuesday's vote was broken down

for taxpayers and non-taxpayers, but the results were virtually the same.

In the taxpayers' box, where a total of 481 people voted, the tally was 460 favoring the issue, and 21 against, a percentage of 95.6. In the non-taxpayer box, the vote was 33 in favor and only one against, an even 97 per cent in favor of the issue.

The voter turnout was gratifying to local leaders, and surprising to some. Additional ballots had to be printed at mid-afternoon, when it appeared that the 500 ballots that had been ordered would be exceeded.

Next move for the project will be to hire an architect, and City Manager Jake Outland and Nursing Home steering committee chairman Percy Parsons plan to invite

interested architects to attend the next scheduled meeting of the city council, May 5, to present their proposals and estimates.

Meanwhile, the city's bond specialist, Bob Davis, is working on a rating for the bonds. He states that there should be little problem selling the local bonds, although the paperwork will take some time.

A special meeting of the council, to further work out details on the bonds, was called for Monday, April 28.

The council, meeting Tuesday evening to canvass the election and officially declare the results, voted to adopt a 12-year payment schedule for the bonds.

Prior to beginning payments on the \$350,000 issue, the city's obligation on bonds stood at

approximately \$37,083 per year. The addition of the just-voted issue is expected to raise this annual obligation by approximately \$12,000.

Davis presented the council repayment plans up to 17 years. The council voted on the 12-year plan, thus saving the city more than \$100,000 in interest.

After the nursing home gets established, the facility will be expected to help make the annual payments. Members of the city council were optimistic that the facility will reach this point within two years, so that the city will only have to foot the entire bill for approximately that length of time.

The \$350,000 from the bond issue is to be supplemented by \$150,000 being raised by a local fund drive.

FRIONA VOTERS left little doubt as to their feelings on the need for a nursing home in Tuesday's election here. We never can recall an issue that won by the staggering margin of 95.6 per cent, as the bond issue did.

The huge victory margin shows what can be accomplished when a town's leaders all get behind an issue, and the issue truly deserves support.

Even with the large victory margin, several folks have commented that they can't believe anyone could have been opposed to it, yet 22 souls placed their "X" in the "against" column. Just goes to show you that some people will vote against anything, we suppose.

We respect the right of those 22 folks who chose to vote against the issue, even though we couldn't agree with their logic.

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THE FUND DRIVE is still grinding along toward its goal of \$150,000 and co-chairmen Hollis Horton and Charles Allen remain optimistic of reaching the goal, more especially since the bond issue passed by such a large margin.

The drive officials say they apologize for the fact that many people have not as yet been contacted. They want everyone who wants to be a part of the drive to have the opportunity, and urge anyone not contacted as yet to call either of them, and they will be happy to pick up the donation.

The last part of a fund drive is traditionally the hardest to raise, so Horton and Allen are anxious that anyone wishing to give please go ahead and do so—regardless of the amount. "Large or small, we'll take it all," is their motto.

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PLAUDITS TO the Friona Kiwanis Club. They get our tip of the hat this week for coming up with the novel idea of a movie which was shown last Saturday at the Community Center.

Club officials said that about 500 children and adults attended the two showings.

Profits after expenses, which amounted to around \$400, were donated to the nursing home fund drive. This is in keeping with the Kiwanis' theme this year, which is helping the elderly.

A spokesman for the club said they were gratified at the response to their first effort. The Kiwanis plan to see if they can secure another good film, and perhaps have another show in about a month, whose proceeds might again go to the nursing home if needed.

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TWO GROUPS FROM Friona High School will be taking part in state meets early in May.

Friona High School's contest play won its third level of competition last week, and will compete in Austin on May 1. Also in the literary meet will be Jeanine Jarboe, in informative speaking.

The girls mile relay foursome, for the second straight year, gained the state meet. Although the group hasn't had the win record it had a year ago, when it went to the state meet unbeaten, the relay team has run the second-fastest mile relay in history for FHS, a 4.05.4.

Fund Drive Officials Want All To Have Part

The \$150,000 fund drive, designed to supplement the \$350,000 bond issue passed here Tuesday for construction of a Nursing Home in Friona, stood at around \$117,000 as of press time this week.

Drive co-chairmen Charles Allen and Hollis Horton said they feel that the balance of the \$150,000 can be raised in about another week, depending upon whether all contacts have been made.

"We have had to work so fast in such a short time that we still haven't contacted nearly everyone in the Friona area that would like to contribute to the drive," Horton said. He indicated that if a person or business had a contribution they would like to make, they could contact either he or Allen and they will be happy to pick it up.

Horton explained that there had not been a concentrated drive to contact the businesses as such, because the business section has to bear the brunt of every local financial drive.

"We have been truly amazed by the volunteer response that has been made. We have even had several contributions come from out of town, including some from former residents," Horton said.

The local civic clubs and organizations also have rallied to support the fund drive, many giving sizeable donations, and this has been a big help to get the drive to where it currently stands.

The drive officials said that some people had been more prone to give since the passage of the bond issue, which virtually assures the building of a nursing home locally.

"We are optimistic that with a short clean-up campaign, we can exceed the \$150,000 goal," the chairman said.

It was mentioned that there were undoubtedly several residents who would like to give \$20, \$50 or \$100 to the fund. If they would drop their donation by Friona State Bank, it will aid the officials in reaching the goal as soon as possible.

FHS' Contest Play State Meet Bound

Friona High School's contest play qualified for the University Interscholastic League state meet in Austin ... May 1 as a result of its performance at the regional meet April 17 in Odessa.

Although FHS has sent a number of contestants to the state UIL meet in recent years in individual events, this will be the first time, at least in recent history, for the contest play to make the state event.

Adding icing to the cake on Friona's regional win was the naming of Gary Stone as "best actor." Carol Bavousett, Jeanine Jarboe and Phillip Duggins were named to the all-star cast at the regional contest. Honorable mention plaudits went to Hope Mays, Pattijon Talley and Pam Veazey.

Other cast members are Bryan Johnston, Lisa Edelman, Charles Fleming and Cris Beck.

Crew members for the production are Noel White, Jay Jarboe and Shannon Taylor.

Gibson's Hope To Open Here In May

Gibson's Discount Center plans to open its Friona store by late May, according to Jerry C. Wilson of Pampa, financial vice president of the corporation which owns the district store chain.

Gibson's announced last fall that they would open a store on Highway 60 in the building formerly occupied by White's Auto, but due to other expansion, the Friona store's opening was delayed.

However, fixtures are being installed at the company's location, and opening plans are now moving briskly.

"We apologize to the folks of Friona for not opening sooner, but the schedule just did not work out any sooner for us," Wilson said.

The Gibson's official explained that his company, the Sandra Corporation, opened a new store in Elk City, Oklahoma in the late fall, and by the time that promotion had ended, the first of the year had come, and with it the company's usual "slow time."

"We are just as optimistic about coming as we were from the start. We're gung ho and ready to go," Wilson stated.

He said that the late May opening would be contingent on the arrival of the store's merchandise, and wished to hedge with an "early June" opening at the latest.

Wilson said that the company had the managerial situation worked out for the Friona store. A company employee from another city will be transferred here. Wilson did not announce the Friona manager's name at this time.

The Gibson's official said his company looks forward to being a part of the Friona community.

The Sandra Corporation currently operates Gibson's Discount Centers in 12 cities in a three-state area. The corporation's first store was opened in Pampa. Following, in order, were stores in Hereford, Borger, Canyon, Dumas, Tucumcari, N.M., Tulia, Dimmitt, Silver City, N.M., Columbus, Brenham and Elk City, Oklahoma.

The Friona store will be the 13th in the chain.

When the corporation announced its plans last fall, Wilson said "In this case, we feel 13 will be a lucky number."

There are currently around 650 stores across the nation carrying the Gibson Discount Center label. Of these, some 125 are operated by the Gibson family. The rest are operated by franchise holders, such as the local operation will be.

Bank Total Near Record

To supposedly be in a recession, Friona's economic picture looks pretty good.

The quarterly report issued this week by Friona State Bank showed that the bank had on deposit \$21,377,210.03 as of April 16. This was up by 14.3 per cent, or \$2,680,317 over the figure of \$18,696,893 as of the same date a year earlier.

Assets at the bank climbed from \$21,130,781 on the 1974 statement to \$23,947,398 on the current one, a gain of \$2,816,617 or 13.3 per cent.

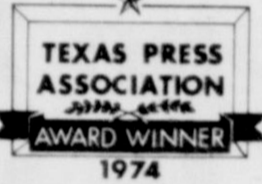
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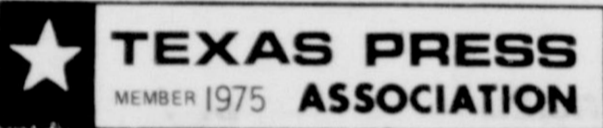
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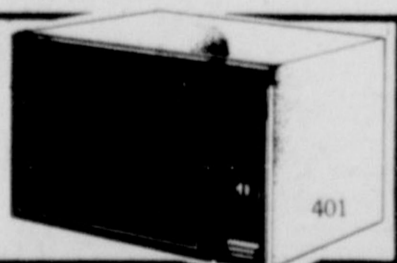
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Current Comments From ...

THE SUBJECT OF public school financing is a big one before the current legislature. As you may recall, Texas is supposed to revise its method of taxation for school financing, as per a federal court ruling sometime back.

Representatives from our area are concerned because they fear the metropolitan-dominated congress may pass legislation that may adversely affect our area.

A couple of our friends in the newspaper business commented this past week on the subject, and we felt our readers would be interested in developments on this vital issue:

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JIM REYNOLDS in the Crosbyton Review....Rep. Bill Healy recently sent a release to newspapers in the 101st District, which he serves, that H.B. 1083 for revaluation of Texas property "will put the agriculture industry out of business entirely." The Paducah legislator is not alone in this evaluation.

During the Panhandle Press Association convention Saturday, a question and answer period with a state senator and two representatives revealed that the same fear is spreading across farm and ranch regions of the Panhandle and South Plains. Property owners, school boards, county and city officials are

expressing a common concern, according to what newsmen told the legislators. The lawmakers noted that numerous local officials and groups of citizens have contacted them.

One proposed bill would require that all taxing agencies with each county-school, county and city-employee a single assessor. This is seen as a move for more rigid state control of local property.

At present, the varying proposals are locked in house committee. Not even the most experienced senator or representative will venture a guess about the eventual outcome.

One lawmaker confessed Saturday that "it looks to us that taxes on agricultural land are destined to be increased...probably by a sizeable percentage." Texas has become a metropolitan dominated state....and guess who that leaves holding the bag?

SPEEDY NIEMAN in The Hereford Brand....Local tax appraisers have warned both the county and school officials that two proposed bills in the Texas Legislature could hit farmers worse than a slumping cattle market or low grain prices. It provides for valuing farm land on an income capitalization method.

Proponents of the measure reportedly claim it will help

farmers. Local tax officials say it will help ranchers and timber men, but it will put ridiculous values on farm land. One bill, called the "Governor's school financing bill" is HB-1083 and SB-478.

The other bill is HB-1463, which has the same approach on valuation of farmland, and relates to the "establishment, administration and enforcement of a system of single, countywide appraisals of property for all property tax purposes." It would set up a new state agency on property appraisal and have a director with wide-ranging power over all county appraisal offices.

The ag committee of Deaf Smith CoC is very concerned about the possible effects of the two bills. After a meeting Monday, the committee plans to send eight representatives to Austin this week to visit with legislators. They prepared a "statement of position" to take to state senators and representatives.

The ag group calls the bill "detrimental to and discriminatory against all ag areas and more particularly the highly productive farmland of the High Plains." The income capitalization method would cause farmers to carry a much heavier load of school taxes—in some instances, two or three times more, claims the committee.

The local ag group also contends the proposed legislation is "unclear and ambiguous in many instances." The committee does make suggestions as to changes in the proposals. These include: 1) Specific guidelines on arriving at net income per acre, 2) Provide that the value, in no instance, would exceed the fair market value, 3) Employ a 10-year running average for determining value of ag land, 4) Implement an alternate method of financing the state public schools—one that would not discriminate against farmers in the High Plains.

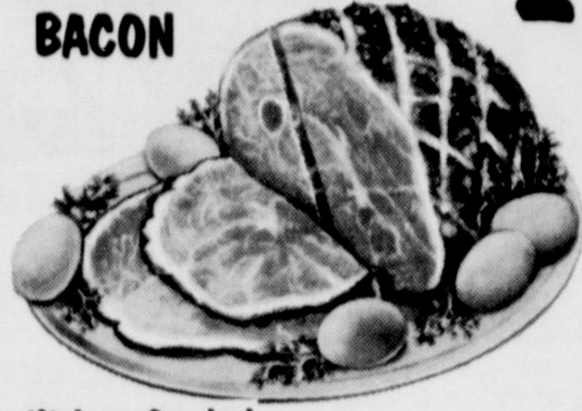

Hurst said he was more than pleased with the turnout for the event. The company's official expression of thanks to those attending can be found elsewhere in this issue.

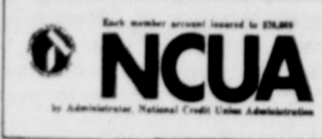

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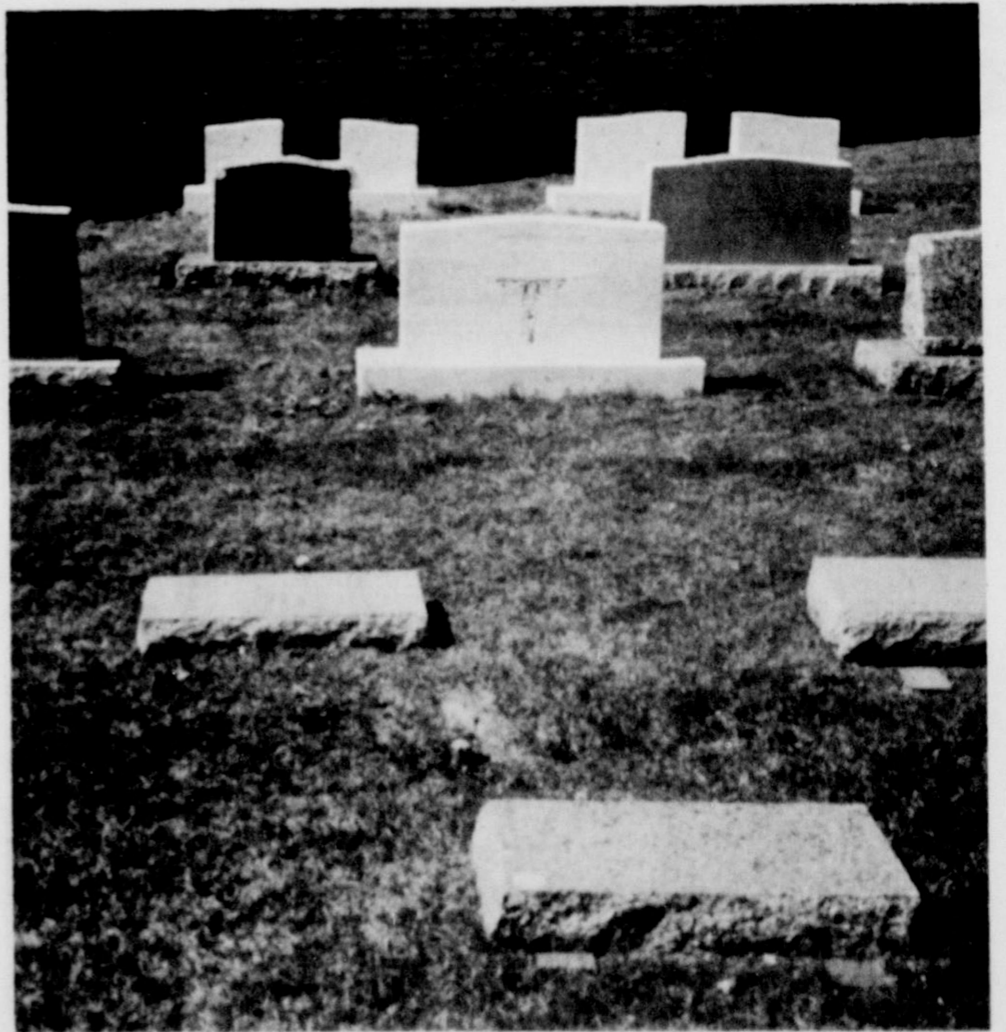

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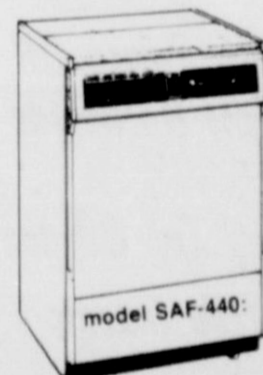
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Six-Packs Whack Spade

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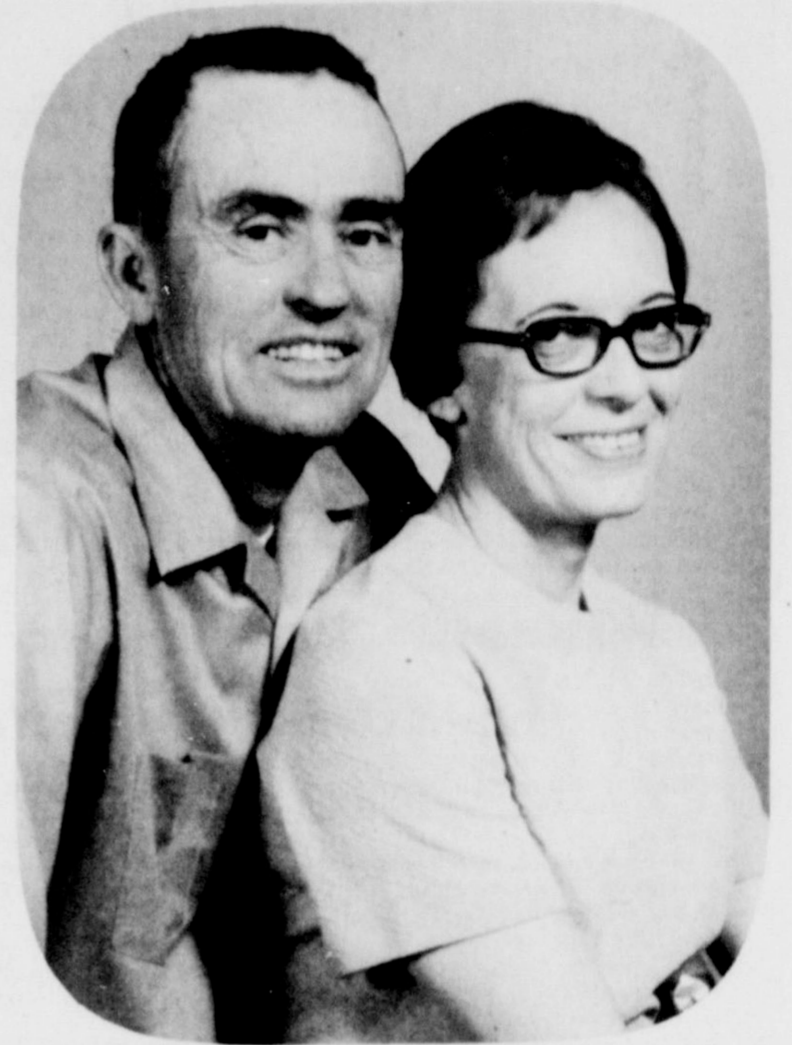

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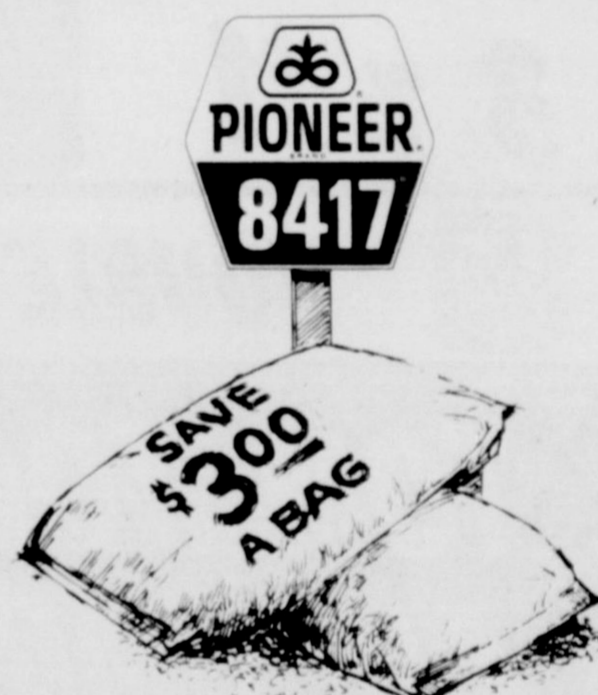
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
