## **Twisting Wind Causes Damage In Friona**

"I believe it was a combination of straight and twisting wind that caused the damage," said Jake Outland at City Hall about the broken tree branches and collapsed tool building damaged in the June 20th thunderstorm.



Oddly enough, the damage was only reported to be down Euclid Street. Although no one reported a tornado to officials, whatever the force was, it tore at trees, leaving large branches scattered in the street.

"It was a twisting motion," said Outland. "The branches appeared to have been twisted from their places on the trees. No ordinary straight wind could have done that.

The twisting wind traveled down Euclid, past the Junior High, and across Highway 60 where it toppled the CVAE tool shed at the corner of Euclid and Highway 60. Elvie Jennings had purchased the small shed only days before the storm.

The Friday, June 20 storm moved into Friona around 10 p.m., bringing pea size to marble size hail to many parts of the city, and heavy, blowing rain.

IT WAS GOOD NEWS to area farmers that the Federal Power Commission has extended the "Priority number 2" rating for natural gas for irrigation purposes to June 15, 1976.

The extension is called an "emergency interim" extension, and came about following hearings which were conducted by the FPC in Lubbock, Phoenix and Albuquerque.

#### Farm leaders are hopeful that the extension will result in the "Priority 2" being returned to a permanent basis.

It has been pointed out that if irrigation gas is given a priority 3 rating, this could possibly wreck the entire agricultural and business economy of West Texas.

One farm leader, in a letter to Federal Power Commission chairman John Nassikas, pointed out that 60,000 irrigation pumps in Texas are fueled by natural gas, and that this number represents more than 40 per cent of all the irrigation pumps in the state. However, the majority of the pumps in West Texas are powered by natural gas, it was stated.

+ + + +THE RECESSION, according to the experts, has hit the bottom and started up in this country. According to one report, retail sales for the month of May were up considerably over April, on a national level.

Automotive sales, hit hard by the downturn in the economy, were up 3.5 per cent, but purchases of 1975 models are still 'way below the average year. Business at auto parts stores is up, which is further proof that Americans are keeping that old model a little longer than usual. Appearance of the new models is expected to spur auto sales this fall.

The nation's money supply apparently is in much better shape than it has been for some time, and interest rates, both from banks and mortgage companies, appears to be looking better for borrowers.

So, perhaps the worst is over. One thing is encouraging. The national publicity is beginning to give the economy a little of a boost. And if anything needed a little break from the national news media, it is the economy.

Maybe now we can talk ourselves back into prosperous times.

## **Weather Affects** Wheat, Corn Crops

Rains, hail and severe thunderstorms during the month of June have affected wheat and corn crops in Parmer County.

Moisture, as recorded by the City Hall for the month of June was 1.92 inches. Breaking this total down, on June 3, Friona received .03 inches of rain mixed with hail; June 10, .73 inches; June 11, .33 inches; June 21, .64 inches; and June 24, .19 inches. With many of these rainfalls also came hail storms which damaged many corn standings in the Hub vicinity.

Ron Smiley at Friona Wheat Growers said, "The farmers who did receive hail damage from one or more of the storms are trying to get their corn to come on out and make a crop. Some in the Hub area had to replant, though. But I believe that if

## Friona Flashbacks

from the files of The Friona Star 40 YEARS AGO-JULY 5, 1935

The contracts of two rural telephone lines out of Friona to the Rhea and Lakeview communities was let last week to R.B. Fairly of Lubbock. The two lines are already under construction and about 12 new subscribers will be connected as soon as the lines are completed and there will be a few other patrons connected soon after they are completed. The Hub community has been offered the same contract, provided they can get the required number of subscribers.

35 YEARS AGO-JULY 5, 1940 The Parmer County Old Settlers Association held its first picnic and program at the high school building at Bovina on Friday of last week. A goodly number of people were present for the program and a basket dinner. Following the program in the afternoon a business session of the Association was held for the purpose of electing new officers and designating the time and place of the next meeting.

### 30 YEARS AGO-JULY 6, 1945

Beginning July 1, the Friona Post Office is advanced from a third class to a second class post office, according to information received from the Post Office Department by Postmaster Sloan Osborn. The promotion allows Friona to have regular clerks if needed, along with an increase in salaries.

25 YEARS AGO-JUNE 30, 1950 The demolition of the vault at the Old Friona State Bank location, Fifth and Main this week, brought back memories to many pioneers of one of the most colorful banking histories ever recorded in any era, or any locality. The bank has moved into its new location at Sixth and Main. Having survived through the threat of fire, depressions and bank robberies, the vault this week even defied contractors as they began its destruction last Saturday.

#### 20 YEARS AGO -- JUNE 30, 1955

O.B. Moyer suffered severe bruises on his right leg early Monday morning when his tractor over-balanced and the front of the implement rose from the ground, pinning him beneath the steering wheel. He was digging a ditch on his farm six miles north and six miles west of Friona. L.D. Chiles, a farmer in a neighboring field, was servicing a combine when he heard the cries for help. Chiles' son, Jerry, took a truck, backed it up to the tractor, and Chiles pulled the injured man free.
