THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

SUNDAY, JANUARY 22.

Subject: Jesus and the Law. Scripture Lesson: Mark 2:18-3:6. Golden Text: "Think not that I came to destroy the law or the prophets; I came not to destroy, but to fulfill."

Scripture References: Jesus and personal purity, Matt. 5:27-32; Jesus and perjury, Matt. 5:33-37; Jesus and retaliation, Matt. 5:38-42; Jesus summarizes the law, Matt. 22:34-40; Knowing and obeying the law, Psalm 119:33-40.

We conclude in this lesson a series of studies in the definition of Christianity. Of course, this definition has not wholly covered the field of Christianity's relation to the multi-phased life of humanity.

It is upon this latest norm that we come in this lesson. What is the relation of the Christian to law? In what manner and with what outlook shall a Christian observe the law? Is a Christian ob-

ligated to the keeping of the laws of man? If so, in what sense?

In the minds of Jesus' contemporaries there were great problems to be solved in relation to law. With relation to the ceremonial and civic laws of Moses there is no question.

It was quite otherwise with Jesus. It was upon the occasion of a coalition between the Pharisees and the Herodians, that a conflicting question, which seemed to place Jesus in a dilemma whatever his answer, was propounded to Him.

The contradiction, however, was due to the mental aberrations of two radical schools of thinking. Their attitudes grew out of disproportionate minds.

Under its protection and authority were living both Pharisees and Herodians. Each claimed its protection and used its money in commerce. Its law was the accepted law of the land.

It was quite another matter that the Jews did not like the Roman government. As long as they accepted its immunities and profited by its protection they owed it allegiance in civil matters.

It is always proper to distinguish between the pieces of authority which civil government and religion shall occupy. Our American government, though by the rulings of the United States Supreme Court having defined this as a Christian nation, has carefully enunciated the doctrine of the separation of Church and State.

While holding that the principles of Jesus should thread themselves through the laws and official conduct of this nation, it has held that the church as an organization should usurp no functions of civil government, and that the civil government should usurp no ecclesiastical authority.

This was Jesus' attitude as revealed in his answer to the coalition party of Pharisees and Herodians. He held rigidly to that position throughout his ministry and his attitude is reflected clearly in the conduct and writings of the Apostle Paul.

While it must be recognized that our lesson today deals primarily with questions of Jewish law, it, nevertheless, is true that Jesus revealed plainly his attitude toward all laws. Let us see what he taught with regard to law.

First of all, he teaches that the Christian attitude towards law is constructive in its nature. "I came not to destroy, but to fulfill," Jesus conceived the Christian's relation to law as one of amplification.

We know today that no one who merely lives within the letter of the law can be a good citizen. Many a criminal against society and government has gained his liberty by no greater reason than a technical compliance with law.

Jesus insisted that in order to live by the law one must accept the spiritual implications of the law. This is the gist of the sermon on the mount. It was thus that Jesus sought to fulfill the law.

The second attitude revealed here is that the dead hand of tradition has no right to force obsolescent laws upon humanity. Law in order to preserve the rights of humanity must be kept up to date. It must have pertinence to the conditions of current life.

The third attitude revealed here is that law ceases to have the right to control the conduct of humanity whenever it ceases to be humanitarian in nature. Two illustrations of this attitude are found in this lesson. No law was more sacredly respected by Jesus than the law of the Sabbath, and yet, he insisted that this sacred law should not be so applied as to be inhumanitarian in its effect.

The hungry disciples feeding upon the wheat on the Sabbath day, the man healed of the withered hand on the Sabbath day, met the approbation of the Master and in the latter case his assistance. No one had been pushed into the ditch on this occasion.

It was a plain case of matters which necessitated and justified immediate relief. Adhering rigidly to the strict observance of the Sabbath, he nevertheless did not forget that the mercy and goodness of God should at all times have free rein.

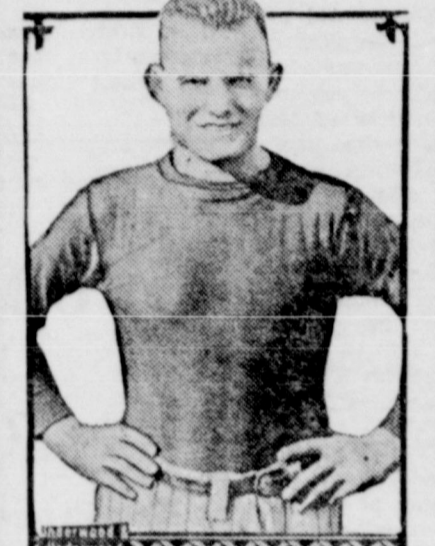

After the family moved to an Oklahoma farm the elder Waner's playing skill became tradition in the family. Paul was playing ball in the feed lots at nine years. He sharpened his batting eye hitting at cornucops, the most elusive of all thrown objects. He was pitcher for his high school nine at fourteen. At sixteen the Oklahoma City Western league club wanted to sign him, but his dad insisted he attend the state normal. After three years in school he left in 1921 to pitch for the Frisco club. He was nineteen then. The first thing he developed on the Pacific slope was a sore arm. As a pitcher with a crippled wing he mourned on the Frisco bench. In 1924 he got his chance to play regular in the outfield and batted .350. In 1925 he batted .401 and won his big league trial. He was married at the close of the regular season last September.

torist is the chief cause for the tremendous yearly losses through short measurements in gasoline and oil.

The American Automobile association statement is predicated on the experience of many of its large affiliated clubs throughout the country, which have from time to time and with the co-operation of officials, staged investigations of and raids on certain gasoline stations suspected of systematic "short-measure" practices.

Attendants Criticized. The experiences of the clubs, according to the American Automobile association, have definitely established that the filling station attendant is not responsible for short measurement in nearly so many instances as the station attendant who recognizes in the inattention of the patron an excellent opportunity to substitute a lesser quantity of gasoline and oil than is ordered.

Co-Operation Extended. Oil companies and owners of individual stations have given unstinted co-operation to the authorities and to the motor clubs attempting to remedy the short measurement situation, but the motorist must give his assistance in a similar manner if the evil is to be quickly and effectively wiped out.

In a recent raid staged by city officials with the co-operation of the Cleveland Automobile club, 16 stations serving from 500 to 1,000 customers daily were found to have attendants who were manipulating the pumps in such a way that short measurement of gasoline was resorted to in order to provide them with easy money, the statement points out.

Anti-Glare Cap Is Good Protector for Motorist

Instead of having a separate pair of goggles to wear as a glare protector at night, the motorist will welcome the idea shown in the illustration, where the goggles are incorporated in the cap and, therefore, always at hand. Cut out a piece of the cap just above the visor and replace this with a piece of green celluloid.

Of course, the cap must be large enough to permit this. The band of the cap is cut and a button and buttonhole are provided, as indicated. 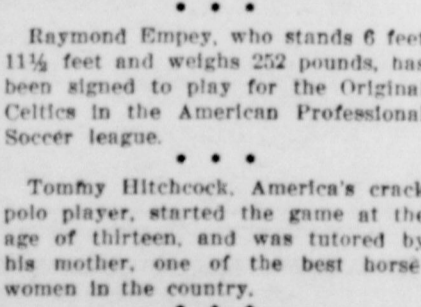

Remove Oil Sludge

"Sludge," which is dirty oil emulsified with water and beaten up into a gummy mass, collects in the crankcase of almost every car. It is one of the worst clogs the engine has to contend with. To get rid of sludge, the crankcase should be dropped occasionally and every trace of the gummy mass should be removed with gasoline or kerosene. Be sure that none of the cleaning fluid is left in the case, for it will dilute the lubricant that is added afterward.

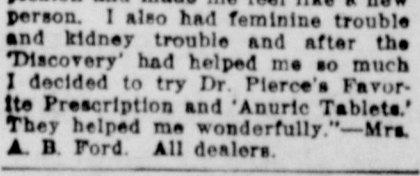
Laundry by Airplane
