



The Fate of the Natchez

HE attraction of a small bit of real estate for the commandant of a French fort in Mississippi caused one of the bloodiest massacres that ever occurred in North America and subsequently resulted in the complete extinction of the Natchez, a tribe of Indians whose standard of civilization was highest among the native tribes of the continent.

The town of New Orleans was founded by the Fench in 1718 and efforts were begun to colonize a wide territory. An officer named Chopart was placed in charge of the territory of the Natchez tribe and a small fort was erected. Chopart was cruel and tyrannical. He failed to see anything to admire in the tribal life of the Natchez, though their social and religious customs were of a very high type and their pride quite lofty.

On the banks of a little rivulet these Indians, who were sun-worshippers, had built their central town, where dwelt their chief, "the Sun of the Apple." Chopart decided that the site of this town was the spot where he would erect a village for French colonists. The Natchez remonstrated but Chopart refused to hear their protests. Out of the thousands of square miles available, he would have no other site for his village. The Indians tried bribery and Chopart accepted; however, the proud Natchez were only seeking delay.

The great chief planned a massacre. One day in 1829 the Indians began straggling into the French camp. Some braves carried grain as the first installment of Chopart's bribe. When the tribesmen had assembled within the fort a gun was fired as a signal for the killing to begin.

The surprised soldiers made little resistance. The commandant, whose stubborn claim to the town site had raised the trouble was cut down in his garden by one of the common Indians all those of higher rank having refused to touch him. Nearly 700 were slain. The French at New Orleans yowed vengeance. A small army pursued the Natchez for hundreds of miles through the wilderness. Those who were not killed at once were sold into slavery in the West Indies, the women being separated from the men in order that the tribe might be totally extinguished.

A Victorious Retreat

THE retreat of a foe laid the groundwork for the conquest of the great Persian empire by revealing the real weakness of the vast domain of the Asiatic despots.

Artaxerxes, king of Persia, had a rival in his younger brother, Cyrus the Younger, a satrap of Asia Minor, who knew the efficiency of Greek arms This Cyrus recruited an army of Greek mercenaries with the secret intention of wresting the crown from Artaxerxes. Launching upon an expedition in 401 B. C., supposedly against brigands If one of the players is fond of com- in the mountains of his satrapsy, with his Greeks and 100,000 native soldiers, Cyrus suddenly gave orders to march against Babylon. The Greeks at first adventure. Cyrus, by promises and

eloquence, overcame their objections. In the battle of Cunaxa, Cyrus displayed better generalship than his royal brother and the valor of the Greek troops was rapidly giving him the advantage when hatred and impetuosity intervened to ruin him. Cyrus caught sight of the king, his brother, in the midst of his guards and dashed madly against him, hoping to he was himself killed. The death of troops of Cyrus and they were defeated. The Greeks at the same time had been victorious against another

wing of Artaxerxes' army. When the event of the day's fighting became known to the Greeks they paused. Artaxerxes demanded their surrender. Although their strength was only 10,000 men, the Greek captains refused and started on the famous "retreat of the 10,000" under Xenophon. Tissaphernes, chief Perslan general, pursued and harassed them but they fought him off. Treachery was employed against them in vain. For 1,000 miles they marched, fighting as they went and living off the country until they reached the Euxine sea and escaped.

The inability of the Persians to crush this small band of enemies revealed to the Greek world the decay and weakness into which the empire had sunk. Sixty-six years later in 334 B. C. Alexander the Great, with an army of 40,000 men, dared to invade and conquer Persia.

While it must be recognized that our lesson today deals primarily due to the mental aberrations of with questions of Jewish law, it, nevertheless, is true that Jesus revealed plainly his attitude toproportionate minds. They could ward all laws. Let us see what he taught with regard to law.

First of all, he teaches that the Christian attitude towards law is constructive in its nature. "I came not to destroy, but to fulfill.' Jesus conceived the Christian's relation to law as one of amplifica-"Not one jot or tittle, should pass from the law till all be fulfilled. His teachings were even larger than that. The right eousness of the scribes and pharisees aimed at that. Jesus made plain that no one could gain admittance to his kingdom whose righteousness should not exceed the letter of the law.

We know today that no one who merely lives within the letter of the law can be a good citizen. Many a criminal against society and government has gained his liberty by no greater reason than a technical compliance with law, while he had obviously outraged the spirit of law. If good citizenship requires more than the fulfillment of the letter of the law, good Christianity can ask no

Jesus insisted that in order to live by the law one must accept the spiritual implications of the law. This is the gist of the sermon on the mount. It was thus that Jesus sought to fulfill the law.

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

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



Remove Oil Sludge

"Sludge," which is dirty oil emulsified with water and beaten up into a gummy mass, collects in the crankcase of almost every car. It is one of the worst clogs the engine has to contend with. To get rid of sludge, the crankcase should be dropped occasionally and every trace of the gummy mass should be removed with gasoline or kerosene. Be sure that none of the cleaning fluid is left in the case, for it will dilute the lubricant measurements in gasoline and oil.

The American Automobile association statement is predicated on the experience of many of its large affiliated clubs throughout the country, which have from time to time and with the co-operation of officials, staged investigations of and raids on certain gasoline stations suspected of systematic "short-measure" practices. Attendants Criticized.

The experiences of the clubs, according to the American Automobile association, have definitely established that the filling station pump is not responsible for short measurement in nearly so many instances as the station ettendant who recognizes in the inattention of the patron an excellent opportunity to substitute a lesser quantity of gasoline and oil than is ordered. It has also established that the oll companies and the owners of filling stations are in the great majority of instances doing everything possible to prevent sharp practice on the part of irresponsible attendants.

Co-Operation Extended.

Oil companies and owners of individual stations have given unstinted co-operation to the authorities and to the motor clubs attempting to remedy the short measurement sifuation, but the motorist must give his assistance in a similar manner if the evil is to be quickly and effectively wiped out.



Precaution Necessary With "B" Eliminators

With "B" eliminators so widely used. it is surprising now carelessly they are operated by the average set owner. There are right and wrong ways of starting a set equipped with an eliminator, as well as special cautions required in switching it off.

Always plug in the set ac as to light the fliaments before switching on the B" eliminator. The purpose of this is to save the set from the damage of an "open circuit voltage," which is created when "B" voltage is applied while the filament circuit is not oper ating. The damage is directed chiefly against the transformers.

If this rule applies in starting the

set, naturally it applies equally well in shutting it off except for the reversal of the process. Switch off the eliminator and then pull out the plug that controls the filament circuit.

Many set owners get along without any apparent trouble by ignoring this rule. Only excellent transformers prevent trouble, or sometimes it merely is a matter of tuck.

Phone Cord Breaks

Breaks in the phone cord may be determined by pushing the cord together along its length. A break may show up this way, particularly near the ends. The weakness at the ends is overcome by the use of the tie string placed on the cord at these points.






