The really valuable public opinion surveys are those on issues - education. civil rights, taxes, for instance - on which there are few if any elections. To find out who's going to win an election we have the election itself. There are so many good reasons why a poll may not predict an election, that the test is sometimes extremely harsh.

Question: What are some of these reasons?

Belden: I've mentioned turnut; the entire electorate never votes and frequently elections do not accurately reflect total public opinion. In effect, therefore, a poll must be twisted to match this failure of many people to exercise their duty to vote: Timing is of the essence: the poll has to be made in advance, and it may not parallel the election results simply because candidate choices change rapidly and very late. President Johnson making a televised speech on behalf of a candidate the eve of the election, for instance, can have a telling effect, after the poll has been made. The questions asked are very sensitive. All experienced pollsters know that they have to word their interviews with great care. But they can't always tell which combination of questions will work best.

Cooley, Runs Scared Race

Harold D. Cooley, for 16 years the chairman of the powerful House Agriculture Committee, is running hard to turn back the challenge of a young Republican who gave him the scare of his political life two years ago.

At this point, say the experts; the race between Cooley, 69 and businessman James Gardner of Raleigh, 34, is a

In 1964, Cooley won a surprisingly close race by 5,000 votes in North Carolina's 4th District, historically a Democratic stronghold.

Cooley is campaigning on his congressional seniority, telling voters that his loss would remove a powerful voice from a committee vital to North Carolina, still dependent on the farms for much of its economy

Gardner, handsome, soft-spoken and intense, was a registered Democrat until 1963, but changed "because I was dissatisfied with the party. I have always believed that the gov-ernment should serve the people, not the people being slaves to the government."

Gardner, who owns a chain of frive-in restaurants, was elected chairman of the North Carolina GOP in 1964, but stepped down the following year to concentrate on another shot at

The war in Viet Nam has been one issue between Cooley and Gardner. The young Republican has demanded a blockade of North Viet Nam's principal port, Haiphong, against all shipping, including that of U.S. allies. This, says Cooley, is an "immature and irresponsible"





If he has the king, then cashing out becomes a routine matter. If he has a lower honor, however, then the partnership must pro-

ceed with caution. West was reluctant to release the ace of spades prematurely, so he returned the nine. North followed with the deuce and now it was East's turn to make a judicious decision. Observe that, if he puts up the queen of spades, South will cover with the king and the defense is thereby limited to one spade trick,



Idea Whose Moment Has Passed

Aside from the serious ever-present risk of triggering mass violence, that olitical phenomenon of the unsettled Sixties-the "peaceful protest demonstration"-is becoming a debased, and hence spent, force for change.

At the inception in this country of what it is hoped history will record as a passing fad, the protest demonstration generated first alarm and then a response for ameliorating reform. Then came fright and a reaction against the demonstrating protestors labeled "backlash." The emergent feeling now, however, seems o be a mixture of disgust and weary

A case in point was the peremptory squelching, to the general public's indifference, of a trio of Nazi-uniformed nuts who tried to carry anti-Semitic and racist banners to an appearance on the Southern Methodist University campus at Dallas of the United

States ambassador to the United Nations, former Supreme Court Justice Arthur J. Goldberg. What impact did that "protest" have on Texas public opinion? Our guess would be resentful embarrassment, the further discrediting of whatever points the demonstrators were trying to make, and a tired shrug or sigh by most who read about it.

Under the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, the legal right to make a peaceful and orderly protest demonstration, whatever against, cannot be seriously questioned. But frivilous and extremist abuse of that right has, temporarily at least, robbed its exercise of power of any constructive purpose. The protest causes and tactics have deteriorated to such a ludicrous level as to be not only impotent but self-defeating. It's fadeaway time for this unlamented political and social phenomenon-an idea

One Mark Of A Good Citizen

Less than a week separates us from -but actually on Nov. 8. the general election.

On Nov. 8 voters select the individuals whom they will have serve them for the next two, four and six years; also make decisions on such sues as constitutional amendments (16 of them on the ballot this time).

Too often Texans get all worked up for the primaries, but these are to choose nominees who will appear on the general election ballot. The election is not in May and June-

his supplier. It costs the grocer about two cents on each \$1 of sales to supply you with trading stamps. Put another way, the grocer pays \$2.40 for the 1,200 stamps

needed to fill a certain stamp book Is it possible, then, that these costs won't, in turn, be added to your bill? The trading stamp companies and contest promoters say these gifts are really free, and that they add nothing to your bill.

WHO PAYS then? Is there really. a Santa Claus in all this?

The usual answer is that, yes, there is a Santa Claus. It is volume. Promotional schemes, so the theory goes, provide so much added volume to a store that they pay for themselves. The needed increase might be about 15 to 20 per cent.

Not only do promotional schemes provide you with a gift and put dollars in the grocer's pocket too - but in doing this they apparently bring profits also.

One sweepstakes promoter says its business has tripled in the past few years. And Sperry & Hutchinson, a trading stamp distributor, reported profits from January through September of \$17.881,000.

PROMOTION companies offer documentation for their claims that a good sales scheme can more than offset its own cost by means of added volume. This, however, leaves unanswered a big question: Where does the volume come from?

Generally speaking, the added sales come at the expense of a competitor. It is difficult to increase the vol-

> The other store, however, doesn't usually permit this without a fight. It increases its advertising and promotion and perhaps takes on a stamp of its own. The quality of stamps then becomes a competitive factor.

Well aware of this, the stamp companies strive to improve the value of their products and the location, appearance and efficiency of their redemption centers.

IF EVERY store had trading stamps what kind of a situation would we be in? It hasn't happened nationally yet. About 40 per cent of the nation's food dollar carries a stamp premium with it. But some neighborhoods have been nearly saturated.

When this situation is reached you can watch for one big market to pull out of the competition, announce it will reduce prices and thus use price savings rather than gifts as a promotional tool.

With surveys showing eight of 10 households now save stamps it is difficult to determine whether it is the demand of housewives for savings or the supply of stamps that keeps people saving, pasting, clipping, redeem-

Some promoters say housewives enjoy playing sales promotion games, but, now that food prices have risen, some of the fun and some of the playful mood seem to have disappeared.

WHAT OTHERS SAY

The party bloodhounds in Peking are closing in on their quarry. Many had suspected that one of the top men they were after was Peng Chen, Mayor of Peking and member of the Chinese Communist politburo, and that the intellectuals who had taken the initial drubbing were but a stalking horse.

Peking radio has announced the appointment of a new man, Li Hsuehfeng, as first secretary of the Communist central committee in the capital-that is the city, not the national committee. In Mr. Peng's case, one of the difficulties is that his public utterances in the past have shown him a tough party-liner. His views on Russian "revisionism" have been uncom-

Since Mr. Peng is the local party chieftain in Peking, it may well be that Chairman Mao (or whoever has most say these days) is persuaded that he must be held responsible for the contumacy going on right under his nose

But it could be something with deeper implications than that. For example, it might be that the other members of the politburo have ganged up against Mr. Peng because he seemed the most immediate threat to each and every one of them as a possible successor to veteran Mr. Mao. And caught up in all this is the suspicion of many outsiders that there is also raging in Peking a sierce struggle between the obtuser ideologues and the professional soldiers. Perhaps even more significant events are in the offing.

Wash Day

Wash day at our house was something of a family affair. Uusually it came with sunup Monday, and it was the responsibility of my brother and me to see that the pot was cleaned, filled and fired, and the battery of No. 3 tubs filled with fresh water. All this had to be done before going to school, and my sisters pitched in and had all the clothes sorted, the pockets and socks turned. In the summer, they had their assignments at the rub board along with Mom. THE POT was just that, a big black

cast iron kettle which had three legs that had to be seated securely on three bricks or sturdy rocks. Once we had the inside scrubbed and rinsed, we carried buckets of water until the pot was about two-thirds filled. Meantime a chunk of lye soap, or bars of Crystal White or P&G soap had been shaved down with a butcher knife, and these pioneer soap flakes put into the pot, which by now had a fire of kindling and mesquite grubs burning merrily under and around it.

WHEN THE WATER got boiling hot, the clothes, first the white ones such as shirts, sheets, underclothes, etc., went in and were pushed down with a wash stick. This was a piece of by constant prodding in the hot and

soapy water. Once the clothes had been boiled sufficiently, the ticklish business of dipping out the steaming pieces without touching the sooty potsides got underway. The aroma of steam and soap was wood ashes was

dresses went in next, while the first Mom could stand that hot water was past understanding, but she rubbed the clothes with more soap and made that board sing. Soon she wrung out a piece with a vise-like grip and tossed in in the rinse tub. This required a little more scrubbing, too. Sometimes, depending on how things were going, the clothes went to another rinse tub, or perhaps to the prettiest tub of all - the bluing water: Just the right amount of bluing had been added - enough to make the clothes snowy white but not enough to give a blue cast. Once the bluing water had been wrung out, the clothes went to a tub or basket that was carried to the clothes line.

MEANWHILE, other clothes such as work garments, overalls or coveralls, and dresses that were apt to fade were making their way through the pot to the tub, etc. Finally, the socks were dropped into the pot and given their baptism of heat. As these made their way through the series of tubs, they had to be turned again before they cleared the bluing water.

When clothes went up on that line, they had to be clean. You somehow got the impression that the family could stand a skeleton in the closet better than it could a dingy wash upbroom handle with one end softened on that line. It was a matter of

One Man's Marked Ballot

WASHINGTON - Some years ago, before a university audience, I was accosted by a shrill, insistent heckler who demanded to know my batting average in the endorsement of candidates. It was a puny one, I admitted, but look how the country had gone to the dogs for ignoring the recommendations. This year I give them in convenient categories of menace to the faltering republic:

VOTE FOR any candidate who, in effect, is against Governor George Wallace. The Alabama spellbinder was a useful abrasive when he first came along and began to rough up the racial radicals and sentimental ists. But the South doesn't need an indispensable man, which is what Wallace would become if allowed to increase his power by the election of his wife and other governors in and pear Dixie. Votes against Maddox (Ga.), Mahoney (Md.), Johnson Ark.) and Lurleen Wallace (Ala.) would be healthful for the nation.

VOTE AGAINST almost any candidate who wears the livery of Robert Kennedy, Neither Wallace or Kennedy is the worst man alive, but overambition is a grievous fault in them both. I wouldn't know how to decide whether Wallace or Kennedy is the more virulent race-rouser, one anti-black and one anti-white, But Bob is also a rouser of flaming youth, economic mendicants, blood donors to Communist Viet Nam, sponsors of the enemy in Red China, meddlers against our friends in Rhodesia and South Africa, Leftists against Lyndon, promoters of nuclear disarmament and other assorted anti-social elements in America. The Senate would be a safer and saner place if the voters declined to choose such potential Kennedymen as Roncalio (Wyo.),

Duncan (Ore.), Metcalf (Mont.) and Harding (Idaho). Votes against them would be sound investments in America's future.

VOTE AGAINST boobs and spoilers. High on the boobosity list is Milton Shapp (D), gubernatorial candidate in Pennsylvania, and tops among spotlers is Franklin Roosevelt (Lib.), a governorship aspirant in New York. Gov. Pat Brown (D., Calif.), along with both gubernatorial candidates in Florida, High (D) and Kirk (R), could be listed under "B" for boob without much loose usage. Under "S" for spoilers would have to come the two Conservative party candidates for Senator in Virginia, Hawthorne and Carter. They have no place in the race except to knock down the totals of the two true-blue conservatives. Senator Harry Byrd Jr., (D) and former Mayor James Ould (R).

A FULL-BLOODED boob, of course, is "Soapy" Williams (D., Mich.), who is trying to displace Senator Robert Griffin, a very good man,

Vote against peace-mongers. No rule is valid without an exception, and Gov. Mark Hatfield (R., Ore.) probably should be given this year's waiver. Hatfield's real indiscretion is boobosity-by-association with Senator Wayne Morse, but it is involuntary and shouldn't be held against the

THE DAY will come. I'm sure, when another heckler will charge me with endorsing losers. But, surely, there must be a dispensation for columnists who mark their public ballot against power-seekers, boobs, spoilers and most of the peace-mongers. Better to ride with losers than the wrong kinds of winners.

David Lawrence Answer To China's Nuclear Threat

gime may have thought that its announcement of a missile test with a nuclear device would intimidate the other countries of Asia and weaken their ties with the United States. But the event will have exactly the opposite effect. It will strengthen the new alliance being formed by America with Asian countries.

PRESIDENT Johnson was quick to perceive the need for an immediate assurance to the friendly nations of Asia that they will have the nuclear strength of the United States behind them if any threats of nuclear warfare are made against them by Peiping. Mr. Johnson, in his speech in Malaysia, warned the Red Chinese that they were inviting danger to themselves and that America would make her nuclear power available to defend Asia. This could be a deterrent against the employment of any nuclear weapons in that region just as it has been in Europe... President Johnson, in commenting

on Red China's test, said:

"The pursuit of a national nuclear capability not only makes international arms control, including a nuclear test ban and a non-proliferation treaty vastly more difficult. It also invites danger to China itself. For the leaders of China must realfze that any nuclear capability they develop can and will-be deterred.

"We have already declared that nations which do not seek nuclear weapons can be sure that they will have our strong support, if they need it. against any threat of nuclear black-

THE WORD "deterrent" has a significant application in the military vocabulary of today. It has never been sharply defined, but it can mean that, if a nuclear power shows evidence of irresponsibility and a likelihood of attack without warning, the interceptive devices of the United States could be instantly employed as a defensive measure. Maximum power would then ~ be immediately released in an offensive move against the territory of the overnment which had struck the first

The military theory is that, by making known to all the world the intention to use nuclear power without limit if any nuclear bomb is dropped on American forces or those of its allies anywhere, a deterrent will have been

THIS IS THE strategy which, it has been assumed for some time, would be used if any member state of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization were assaulted by nuclear weapons. The treaty itself declares that an attack on one member is the same as an attack on all members.

President Johnson evidently is beginning to intimate that the same principle may be invoked in Asia. The Southeast Asia Treaty Organization does not require America to regard an attack on an Asian state as the same as a hostile move against the United States, but provision is made for cooperative military action to be taken by constitutional processes."

PRESIDENT Johnson is already pointing out that it would be much better if Red China concentrated her resources on economic development. and there is every reason to believe that the United States stands ready to aid the Chinese people to attain that
