

Hunter Named Houston Post Managing Ed

HOUSTON (AP) — Edwin D. Hunter, a veteran of 30 years with newspapers in Texas and Oklahoma, has been named managing editor of the Houston Post, effective Monday.

William P. Hobby Jr., president and executive editor of the Post, announced Hunter's appointment.

Hunter, 50, a native Texan, announced his resignation as editor of the Galveston News and of the Daily Sun, published in the Texas City-LaMarque area, and of TODAY, published in the Dickinson-League City area, to accept his new position with the Post.

After beginning his newspaper career as a copy editor for the Fort Worth Press in 1937, Hunter spent 11 years on the staff of the Oklahoma City Daily Oklahoman and the Oklahoma City Times, rising to the post of city editor.

He served as managing editor of the San Angelo Standard Times and Evening Standard for 10 years before moving to the Houston Post as assistant news editor in 1963. The same year he was named editor of the Galveston News, vice-president of the Galveston Publishing Co., and a member of the company's board of directors.

He was appointed editor of the Daily Sun and of TODAY in 1966.

SKILLED NEWSMAN
Hunter was president of the Texas Associated Press Managing Editors Association in 1966 and has been a member of Sigma Delta Chi, national journalism society since 1937. Hunter was educated in public schools in Kingsville and McAllen. He attended Westmorland College now a part of Trinity University in San Antonio. He received his bachelor's degree in journalism and a master's degree in political science from the University of Missouri.

"Ed Hunter's skills as a newsman and the contributions he has made to every community in which he has lived and edited newspapers have won him the respect of his colleagues and all who know him," Hobby said in announcing the appointment.

Science And You Atomic Water For Greece?

One of the grave problems facing Greece, especially around Athens, is a chronic shortage of water. A solution is urgently needed, so the Greek government recently embarked on a cooperative study with the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission to see whether nuclear desalting of sea water might be the answer.

The basic idea of nuclear desalting is to use the heat of power from a nuclear reactor to get rid of the salt in sea water, thereby making the water drinkable. There are several ways to do this and one of the more promising is called flash distillation. Here, the pure water is simply boiled off, using the heat of the nuclear reactor to do the cooking.

This technique has been under extensive investigation here in the United States. Researchers are hopeful that it will solve water problems around Los Angeles and on the East coast. It was very natural that the Greek-U.S. study look into its potential for helping Athens.

In a preliminary study, two kinds of nuclear water plants were considered. One would produce 100 million gallons of water a day, and the other would produce 50 million gallons a day. Such plants could be used for just making water but, in addition the AEC and the Greeks considered dual purpose designs which could be used to produce 300 million watts of electrical power as well.

As usual, the crucial issue in

such plans is cost. It turns out, at least on the basis of these preliminary studies, that an atomic power plant near Athens would be a cheaper source of fresh water than a plant which burned ordinary fuel oil.

To build a 50-million gallon plant, the cost would be about \$36 million. If the Greeks wished to make 300 megawatts of electricity, they would have to spend another \$68 million. These are big numbers.

The Greeks are now investigating several alternatives to nuclear power. One possibility is to do a lot of work on the bottom of the lake which supplies fresh water to Athens at present — Lake Iliki. The lake is plagued with a tremendous loss through sinkholes and leaks. If a suitable amount of engineering were done to seal the bottom of the lake, the fresh water available would go up substantially.

Another idea is to build a system of dams and aqueducts to bring water from distant lakes and rivers.

The ultimate decision will rest upon a careful comparison between modifying the bottom of the lake and building the system of dams and aqueducts at the nuclear power plant. Cost will be the deciding factor and the Greeks hope to make up their minds pretty soon. If they decide on the nuclear method, the people of the land of Democritus — who dreamed up the idea of the atom in the first place — will soon be drinking atomic water.

"They somehow got the idea that there would be free love, free pot, free food and a free place to sleep."

Earlier, Haight Street hippies had predicted nearly 100,000 young people would come to San Francisco for "a summer of love." Thousands gathered Wednesday to celebrate the first day of summer, but officers said most were members of the local set.

U.S. Businessman Fetes Duke, Duchess

PARIS (AP) — The Duke and Duchess of Windsor were feted Thursday at a moonlight party on the River Seine in honor of the Duke's 73rd birthday today.

The party was given by American businessman Nathan Cummings aboard two sightseeing river boats and included a champagne buffet and dancing. About 250 guests, including counts, princes and personalities from the arts and society from both sides of the Atlantic, were piped aboard by trumpeters dressed in black caps and red riding coats.

The glittering gathering was strictly observed as a private event and the Duke himself canceled a proposed fireworks display that was planned as a highlight of the scenic cruise.

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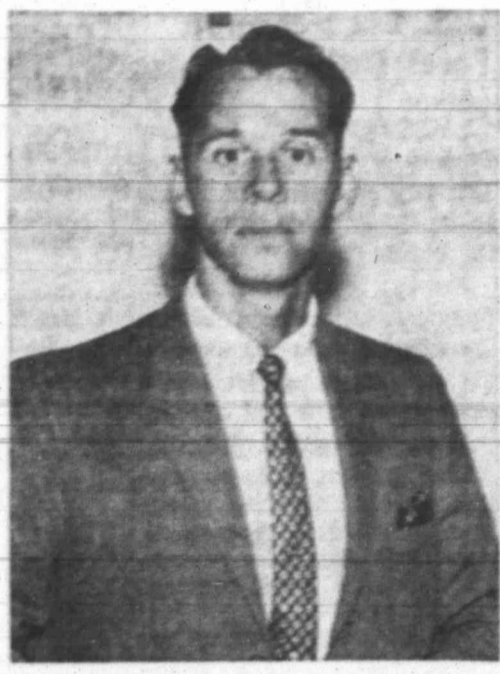

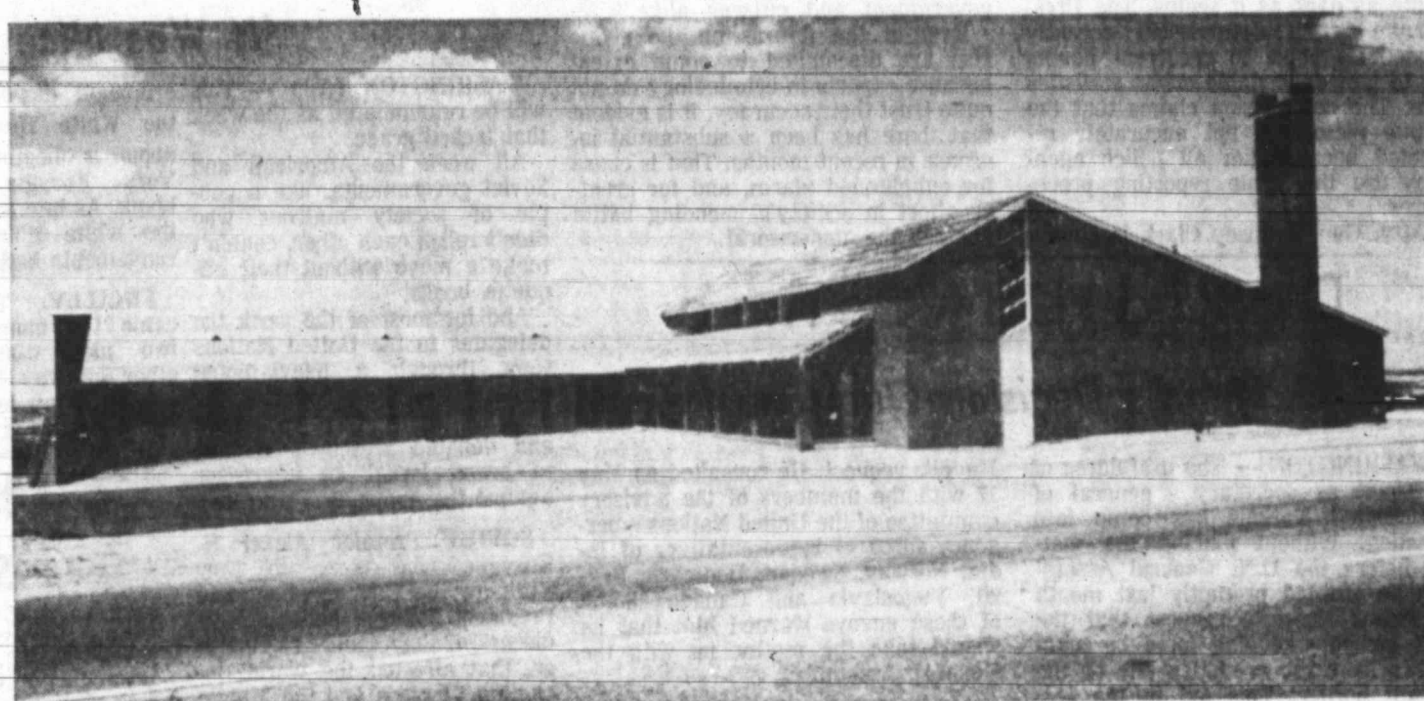

Burnt Bridges Behind Him, The Direction Was Forward

About 15 years ago, Roy Honea and his wife, en route on one of their trips from school in Arlington to their former home at Monahans, broke a fan belt in Big Spring. It was on a Sunday afternoon, and it took about seven hours to get going again. They were agreed on one thing: Big Spring was the last place they wanted ever to be.

Yet, less than a decade later, the Rev. Roy Honea, happily and comfortably engaged as pastor of the Central Baptist Church in Phoenix, Ariz., and freshly moved into a new, large parsonage, got a call inviting him to come and preach at the Grace Baptist Church in Big Spring. Had it not been that he was returning soon to Texas on vacation, he would never have come.

DISCOURAGING

What he and his wife found here was a small congregation, meeting in a semi-basement building and sorely beset with problems. One look was enough to convince them that after the morning service, he would frankly tell the committee to excuse him from the evening service so they could be on their way.

"But there was such a warm spirit, and there seemed such a hungering for a pastor that I didn't have the nerve to tell them," he recalled. Instead, he agreed to meet with the men of the church that afternoon, and to speak at the evening service.

Although he had discouraged a call, he received one a few days later to become pastor of the church. Even when he returned to Arizona he couldn't get it

off his mind. He was against it personally, and so was his family, but finally he decided it was God's will that he come to Big Spring. From every quarter he got pressure to stay, but he felt at peace with his decision.

BASIC DECISION

"I have seen many men fall," he said, "and I observed that it was because they wouldn't cut loose completely when God called."

He had come to this basic decision in 1949 while he was in Civil Service at Poyote AFB, helping register in and then muster out the thousands of B-29 bombers. He and his neighbor were pool hall buddies and had no desire for a church connection. But his neighbor became a Christian, and soon he was urging Roy Honea to come but he deferred with a promise for next Sunday. His friend insisted "this Sunday," and Honea went, and "got under conviction." He fought it for a few weeks, but finally went again. One evening, under deep conviction, he turned to his wife and said: "I'm ready to go; are you?" Tears of joy were in her eyes.

BE WILLING

His pastor told him the best way to serve the Lord was to be willing to serve. So he took a small class of boys. The class grew and was split; grew and was split again. He had it back up to 25 when in 1948 he felt the unmistakable call to preach.

"We just sold out every thing, burnt all our bridges behind us," he said. "We couldn't look back."

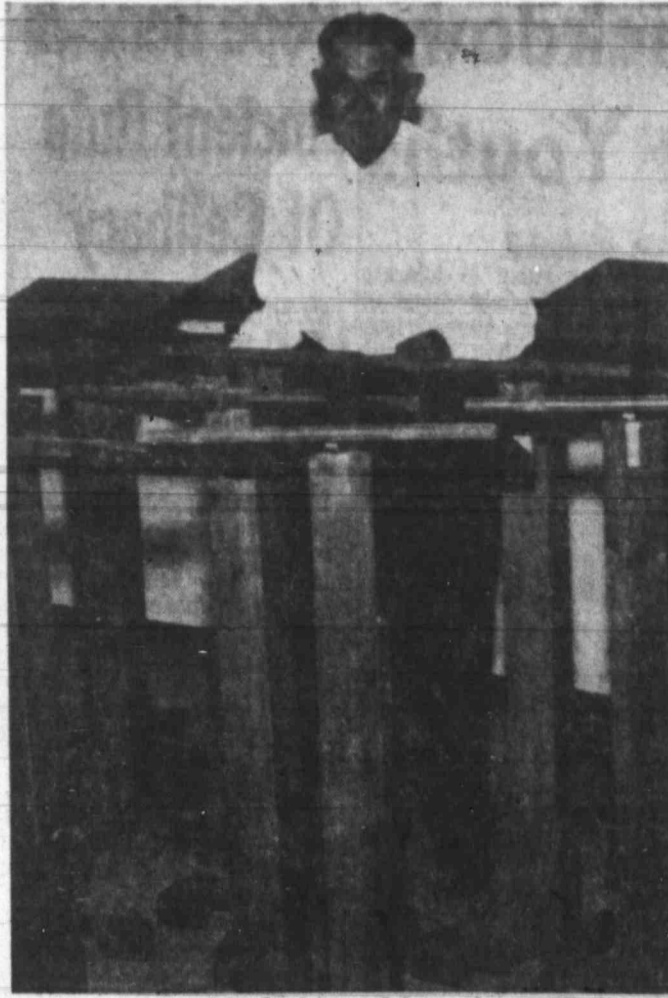
He entered Bible Baptist

Seminary in Arlington in 1949 and graduated in 1952, taking a church at Mt. Pleasant. By 1956 he had completed his graduate work and received his master of theology degree. He went to Clifton, Ariz., founded two churches in Phoenix and assisted in organizing five others. He was chairman of the Baptist Fellowship of the state for five years until called here Sept. 18, 1960.

VARIED CAREER

He was born and reared at Franklin, where he graduated from high school and entered the Navy in July, 1943, for 2½ years, going overseas with the famous Black Cat squadron of F7F Nightfighters as a radio controller. He was married in 1945 to Edna Irene Lindsey at Franklin, and they have two children, Ladona Jo, 17, a senior in Big Spring High School, a son Jonathan D., 12.

He has been chairman of the West Texas division of the World Baptist Fellowship, area youth director, a member of the Bible Baptist Seminary board. He is a member of Thunderbird Masonic Lodge No. 48 in Phoenix, of the Knights Templar and Commandry in Big Spring, and has been a service club member. His work here has been indefatigable except for a period following a heart attack Aug. 2, 1966. He was in the hospital for three weeks and at home for three months. Only now is he back in the harness on a full schedule. If going through a building program has not affected him, he must be more than fully recovered.

Grace Baptist Has Beauty, Utility

Attractive but functional is the new Grace Baptist at Marcy and new FM 790. Erected at a cost of \$150,000, the new brick structure contains almost 15,000 square feet, including a handsome sanctuary which will seat 400. Most of the structure is given over to classrooms and assembly areas on two levels — both of them ground floors. Each department connects with the hallways and adjacent department, and has its own exterior access.

The building has central air conditioning, including a 400-ton Carrier refrigerative air capacity as well as gas heaters for winter. The church office and the pastor's studies have separate units for economy of operation when the entire plant does not need to be conditioned.

Surrounding the plant is approximately two acres of parking space, all paved with asphaltic concrete or hot topping.

The plan for educational space was roughed in by Rev. Roy Honea, pastor, and this was turned over to James P. Oubre, New Orleans, La., who did the actual architectural work and the sanctuary design.

The general contract was handled by Quality Contractors of Dallas. R Electric of Big Spring had the electric contract; Hester's Sheet Metal the air conditioning; Frank Griffin, Brownwood, the church furniture; Sam Robertson, mechanical engineering.

The sanctuary has an offset design which stems from massive prefabricated arch beams, one side arching gently well past the center of the nave, and the other side rising at a sharper angle. The main aisle parallels the roof line and is therefore to the right of the center of the sanctuary. The panel ceiling and roof rest on long strips of 6x10-inch pearling, which makes for an easier distribution of lights.

Aisles and chancel area as well as the rostrum are all carpeted. The new pulpit and communion table are of light walnut. To either side are the piano and the organ, and back of the rostrum is the choir loft, overlooked by the baptistry. The choir loft may be entered from the choir room to the east, and the fibre glass baptistry is flanked by robing rooms for candidates. Illumination is indirect from the east side and from the lofty clear window lights on the west side. Global drop lights add to the effect, and bullet lights spotlight the pulpit area.

LARGE NURSERY

The nursery has 14 beds, each with new mattress and bedding, separated by plywood baffles that extend well above the bed level. The room also contains storage and is adjacent to a service room with a combination sink, range and refrigerator for preparing, warming formulas, etc. This service area also opens to nursery No. 2 for toddlers. This merges into assembly rooms and classrooms for primaries.

On the east side of the sanctuary is a tier of adult classrooms, also the carpeted office of the music director; a spacious choir practice room.

LOWER FLOOR

To the west of the main foyer is the church office, and beyond this is a large study for the pastor. The west end of this wing contains a large assembly room and classroom.

The north wing contains storage rooms, a literature preparation room, stairwell, and a number of classrooms and assemblies for juniors. On the lower floor, which has its own

Not long after becoming a church, the congregation found itself without a pastor and called the Rev. Roy E. Honea, then in Arizona. The first Sunday he

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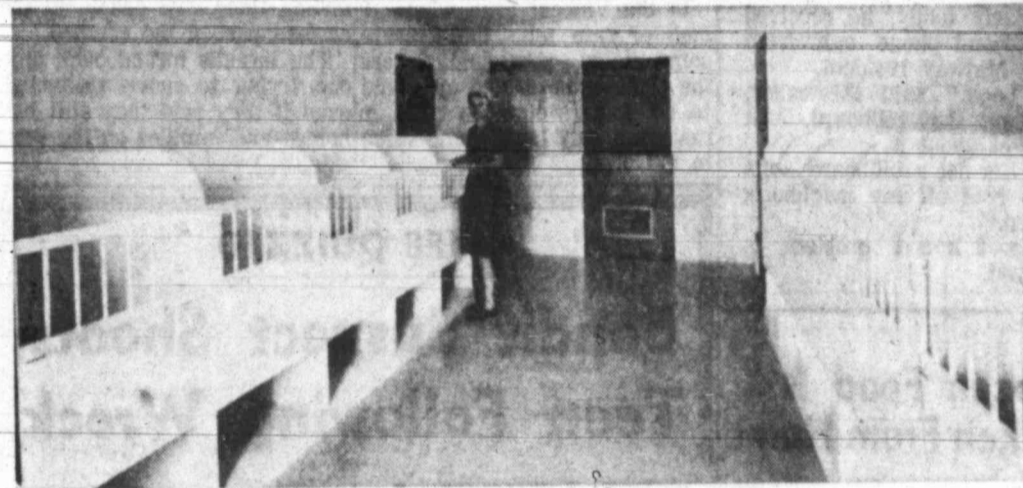

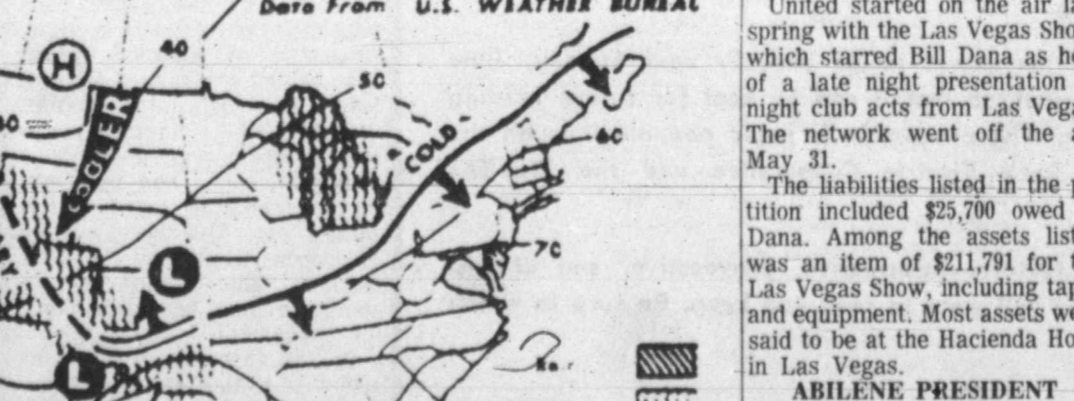

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. pilots today reported successful attacks on two trains northeast of Hanoi, a missile site northwest of the Red capital and the Nam Dinh power plant southeast of Hanoi.

U.S. military headquarters said there was no significant action in 20 previously announced American and allied ground actions, but Saigon announcements often lag far behind operations in the field.

PILOT MISSING

The 125 missions flown against North Vietnam Thursday cost another American plane, a Navy A4 Skyhawk downed by ground fire west of Haiphong. The pilot is missing. U.S. headquarters said it was the 589th American combat plane lost over the North, including one other not previously announced.

North Vietnam claimed three American planes were shot down and "a number of pilots" captured.

A civilian cargo plane and a U.S. Air Force jet collided over the outskirts of Saigon Thursday, killing all seven American crewmen aboard the cargo plane. The two fliers in the Air Force RF4C Phantom reconnaissance plane parachuted and suffered only minor injuries.

BOMBS ON TARGET

F105 — Thunderchiefs — from bases in Thailand pounced on the two trains on the Phu Xuyen railroad siding 31 miles north-east of Hanoi. Pilots on the first flight reported their bombs were on target. A second flight of pilots said they observed 10 boxcars destroyed on one train and 25 on the other.

It was not known what the boxcars were carrying, if anything. Military spokesmen said they had no reports of secondary explosions.

Navy pilots hammered the electric power plant 46 miles southeast of Hanoi with 1,000- and 2,000-pound bombs and reported setting off a large explosion and fire at the 7,500-kilowatt facility that serves the Nam Dinh area.

BLACK SMOKE

The last raids in the Nam Dinh area were May 22 and May 24, when American warplanes attacked the railroad yards.

The strike Thursday was the first against the power plant in more than a year. It was reported knocked out in the previous raid but apparently was rebuilt. Air Force F105 pilots also reported hitting a surface-to-air missile—SAM—site 64 miles northwest of Hanoi. Pilots said black smoke rose 500 feet from a secondary explosion.

Communist shore batteries fired on the 7th Fleet cruiser St. Paul and the destroyer Theodore E. Chandler in the Tonkin Gulf, but neither ship was damaged. The St. Paul said it destroyed one of the shore batteries with counter fire.

80 REDS DIE

U.S. B52 bombers pounded enemy troop concentrations and bunkers. They struck Thursday night nine miles northwest of Khe Sanh, just below the demilitarized zone, and today in Tay Ninh Province northwest of Saigon, facing the Cambodian border.

In the ground war, U.S. headquarters said Marines have completed Operation Arizona, in which they killed 80 Communist soldiers in a nine-day sweep 20 miles southwest of Da Nang. Marines of the 5th and 7th Regiments had eight killed and 65

wounded in the operation, the command said. Two U.S. Army helicopters were shot down in Long An Province just south of Saigon, but both were recovered and there were no casualties.

Plant Blast Kills Three

BURLINGTON, Iowa (AP) — Three women employees were killed and four were injured, one critically, in an explosion Thursday night at the Army ordnance plant near West Burlington.

George Mathis, public relations officer said seven women working at the spot where the blast occurred about 10:30 p.m. were accounted for but only three injured could be identified. Other names were withheld pending notification of relatives.

Mathis said the explosion occurred in one room of one building on line No. 9 where heavy ammunition is loaded. He said the cause of the blast was not determined but it involved a munition containing a conventional chemical explosive. The building was extensively damaged and was knocked out of production.

The plant, employing nearly 5,000 persons, is operated for the Army by Mason and Hanger-Silas Mason Co., a private contractor.

NACOGDOCHES (AP) — Former County Judge F. L. Harris, about 62, died Thursday night

after a heart attack. Prior to his election as county judge several years ago he was in a heavy machinery sales business. He had been semi-retired since a heart condition developed.

Suggestive Songs Ban Is Endorsed By Gov. Connally

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. John Connally has endorsed a Brady radio station's crusade against popular songs with suggestive lyrics. He said he hopes other stations will join in banning such recordings.

The governor expressed his views in a letter, made public today, to P. Bert Haney Jr., president and general manager of Radio KNEL at Brady.

Haney and his station have adopted a policy of refusing to play over the air popular songs with lyrics they consider indecent. A number of other stations also have such policies.

"I hope that other broadcasters who have not already done so will voluntarily join in banning the use of recordings whose lyrics are not only suggestive and indecent, but outright profane," Connally said.

"There is no need for such lyrics in popular music which is enjoyed so universally by the

young people of our state and nation. I believe the music itself is what promotes popularity—not lyrics which touch upon obscenity."

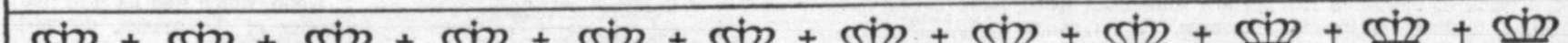
The rose comes very close to man's standard of perfection. Its delicate beauty seems to mock every effort of the artist or camera to capture it.

Aaron Takes Out Enmity On Giants

It's a good thing Hank Aaron isn't mad at San Francisco. There's no telling what kind of damage he'd do to the Giants then. Aaron, who was involved in a squabble with teammate Rico Carty as Atlanta flew west Sunday night, continues to take it out on the rest of the league. He walloped a two-run homer in the eighth inning lifting the Braves to a 6-4 victory in the second game and a doubleheader sweep against the Giants Thursday. He doubled home Atlanta's first run in the 2-1 first game triumph. In the only other National League game played Thursday, St. Louis beat Los Angeles 7-2. New York's game at Philadelphia was postponed by rain, and the other teams were not scheduled. Aaron's 18th home run, which won the second game for the Braves, gave the Atlanta slugger the National League homer lead. He drove in three runs in the doubleheader with three hits in seven trips and raised his batting average to .322. In the first game, Aaron doubled home winning pitcher Phil Niekro in the third inning. An inning later, Woody Woodward's double drove in Denis Menke with Atlanta's second run. That was enough to beat Gaylord Perry, who struck out 10 but lost his eighth game. Niekro, sprung from the bullpen, hurled a six-hitter and won his third game. Aaron broke open the nightcap in the eighth against Frank Linzy with Tito Francona on base. Mack Jones also had a two-run shot for the Braves. Willie Mays' 10th home run of the season and 552nd career shot accounted for the Giants' only run in the opener. Claude Raymond, who got credit for the second game victory, got Mays pinning hitting, to smack into a rally-ending double play in the nightcap. St. Louis scored three times in the sixth inning to go ahead of the Dodgers. Dal Maxvill's scoring single drove home the tie-breaking run as the Cardinals beat Los Angeles for the sixth straight time. Steve Carlton limited the Dodgers to six hits including run-scoring singles by Ron Fairly and Wes Parker.

William's Magic Is Working Again

SHAWNEE ON DELAWARE, Pa. (AP) — Before the 70th annual NCAA golf Championships started Wednesday at the Shawnee Golf Course, someone commented that Houston coach Dave Williams probably could walk on water and with his luck he wouldn't even get wet. Many a true word is said in jest as the humorist who came up with that one found out Thursday when one of Williams' undaunted lads shot a ball into the water but it didn't sink. Hall Underwood, steady playing junior came to his last hole of the final round of team play in the gathering darkness and hit his tee shot into a 75-foot lake. The ball skipped three times on the water and finally landed on the bank short of the green. Underwood tried to pitch close to the pin but fell about 30 feet short, and Houston's chances of a fourth straight title and 10th in 12 years appeared dead. Underwood calmly rolled in the birdie putt, however, and Houston was champion once again as the University of Florida blew its shot with four bogeys on the final five holes by anchorman David Oakley. Houston's four best shot a 585 against 588 for Florida, 592 for Louisiana State, which with the University of New Mexico faded from a first round tie. Purdue was fourth with 596 and Wake Forest fifth with a 597. Florida, disappointed with its fupold, still has a shot at glory as its Steve Melnyk held on to a one-stroke lead in the 72 hole individual competition. The 215-pound Jack Nicklaus look-alike also resorted to dramatics to keep the lead he held by a stroke after the first round. Melnyk finished his round in a driving rain by rolling in a 25 foot downhill putt that broke to the right and dropped in the cup for a birdie 2. He had a 36-35-71 to go with his opening round three under par 69 for a 36 hole total of 140. Dick Harris, a history major from Stanford, who hopes to be a U.S. diplomat some day, took over the runner-up spot at 141. He had a 71 to go with his first round 70. Other qualifiers for the last half of individual competition and their 36-hole totals included Doug Olson, Houston, 142; Rick Massengale, Texas, 145; Hal Underwood, Houston, 145; Warren Lyebeck, North Texas State, 146; Bob Barbarossa, 147; John Buffin, Texas A&M, 149; Terry Noble, North Texas State, 149; and Mike Nugent, Lamar Tech, 150. Among the runners-up in team standings were North Texas State 599, ninth; Texas 603, 13th; Texas A&M 606, 16th, and Baylor 619, 30th.

Kaline Powers Detroit Tigers To Two Wins

By The Associated Press It took Al Kaline just one day to rediscover the thrill of hitting a home run in a winning or losing game. And it felt so good, the Tiger slugger did it twice. Kaline broke out of a hitting slump — he slipped to third in American League batting while it was going on — with a home run in Wednesday night's contest against Minnesota. But the game was rained after eight innings because of rain and the teams tied 5-5. But Thursday, with rain still plaguing much of the league's schedule, the Tigers and Twins managed to complete their contest, with Kaline's two homers, which gave him 15 for the season, powering Detroit to a 5-2 victory. In the only other American League game not rained out, California shut out Cleveland 7-0. Victims of the weather were Kansas City at Baltimore and Boston at New York. In all, Kaline drove in three of the Tigers' runs, giving him 51 for the season and making him third among the league leaders. "It felt," he said succinctly, "good." Norm Cash also homered for Detroit. Joe Sparga gave the second-place Tigers something else to grin about, turning in a four-hit performance and picking up his seventh triumph of the season against just one defeat. A double by losing pitcher Jim Kaat and a sacrifice fly by Zoilo Versalles accounted for the Minnesota runs. Jim McElathlin of the Angels turned in the pitching gem of the evening, allowing the Indians only three singles as he rode a powerful California attack to his seventh victory of the season. He has lost one. A two-run homer by John Werhas and a solo shot by Paul Schaal provided the muscle in the early innings, and the Angels got two runs in both the eighth and ninth innings to rub it in. Sam McDowell, took the defeat despite striking out nine Angels.

Georgia Unknown Is Cleveland Leader

CLEVELAND (AP) — Two of golf's greats, Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus, were surprised by first-round developments in the \$103,500 Cleveland Open. "Who?" asked Palmer, after he was told that Wayne Yates was the 18-hole leader. The popular Pennsylvania pro admitted he did not know who Yates was after the 25-year-old Atlanta performer carded a four-under-par 66 in Thursday's first round. That gave Yates, in his second year as a tour regular, a one-stroke edge over Palmer, veteran Dan Sikes and young Dick Lotz. But Palmer figures the scores are going to get better on the par 70, 6,611-yard Aurora Country Club layout. "Somebody will shoot 65 before the week is over... maybe even 60," Palmer, the tour's leading money-winner, predicted. Nicklaus, who played erratically and admitted he was bothered by the wet course, disagreed. "Sure someone can shoot 60, if he quits at 14," the power hitter from Columbus, Ohio, quipped. 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Demos Boost Debt Ceiling

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Democrats, reversing a stunning administration setback of two weeks before, pushed through a \$22-billion boost in the national debt ceiling.

Sent to the Senate on a 217-196 vote was a measure to raise the debt from a temporary \$336 billion to a permanent \$358 billion.

The action eases fears the Treasury might face a severe money shortage.

Failure of Congress to reset the debt limit by July 1 would see the ceiling drop to its permanent \$283-billion level. The actual debt as of Wednesday was \$330.37 billion.

BIG MARGIN

But while the Senate still has to act on the measure — and won't start work until it has disposed of the measure — Democrats held a comfortable margin in that chamber and are confident of getting speedy approval for the bill.

Chairman Russell B. Long, D-La., of the Senate Finance Committee scheduled hearings on the measure for next Monday and Tuesday. Long said he hopes it can be brought to a floor debate Wednesday.

GOP OPPOSITION

It had been another story in the House, which stunned President Johnson's administration June 7 by defeating 210 to 197 a bill to increase the borrowing ceiling to \$365 billion.

Republicans voted solidly against debt ceiling increases both times, insisting Johnson provide more information on the fiscal outlook and scale down domestic spending.

The GOP's initial victory was possible through the help of Southern Democrats and a sprinkling of Northern Democratic liberals, some of whom claimed their opposition resulted from Johnson's Vietnam war policies.

MONEY CUSHION

But the House leadership reclaimed 14 of these votes Wednesday, splitting the dissent. Southern Democrats about in half and picking up all but a handful of the antiwar faction.

The White House said later Johnson "congratulated the House leadership for this act of fiscal responsibility."

In addition to the \$338-billion ceiling provided by the new measure, a \$7-billion cushion goes into effect July 1, 1968. Intended to provide for the fluctuations in income and output during the year, the cushion is to be renewed annually. It will expire, however, one day before the end of each fiscal year.

SPENDING BRAKE

Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., of the House Ways and Means Committee, argued this device would provide a brake on spending.

The bill also would allow the Treasury to issue notes with maturities up to seven years, instead of five. The notes are exempt from the 4½ per cent interest limitation that has halted the sale of longer-term securities.

It also would include in the national debt for the first time the participation certificates, or interests in pools of government-held loans, sold to private investors. This was a point strongly pushed by Republicans, who accused the administration of using the certificates to hold down the debt.

Gains Noted By Commissioners

Commissioners of the Lone Star Scout district checked over status of the Cub, Scout and Explorer units Thursday and noted an 84-boy gain.

However, Don Womack warned that four or five units, particularly those in Exploring, are in danger of lapsing. Plans were made for a number of the commissioners to take their families to the Scout Ranch in the Davis Mountains July 21-22 for a special session of the commissioners' staff. The entire ranch will be turned over to the men and their families.

Power Loans Okayed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The office of Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., announced Thursday that two Rural Electrification Administration loans to Texas cooperatives for systems expansion were approved.

The E-Tex Telephone Co-Op, Henderson was to receive a \$450,000 loan while a \$383,000 loan was to go to McLennan County Electric Co-Op at McGregor.

WICHITA FALLS (AP) — Steady Joey Dills, 17, of Muskogee, Okla., held a one-shot lead today going into the 36-hole finals of the Texas-Oklahoma Junior Golf Tournament and he figures he can take top honors if he can shoot even par.

New Analysis Is Made On Assassination Findings

The Warren Commission made the most extensive investigation of an assassination in the history of the United States. It presented its conclusion in a report and 26 supporting volumes.

But did it solve who killed President John F. Kennedy? Some say not. More — and their number is apparently growing — somehow feel, without knowing exactly why, that justice was not done.

For one thing, there are all those books. By Mark Lane, Edward Jay Epstein, Leo Sauvage. And there is New Orleans where a man faces trial for what Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison says was a

conspiracy to assassinate the president. A court of law will decide in New Orleans. But who will read it, and keep permanently for future study and reference. It is recommended by the editors as an important report on one of the critical events in this nation's history.

The story does not answer all the questions raised about the Warren report. Rather, it deals at length with some of the central areas of the assassination. In these areas it asks of the critics: Did you tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth? And it finds they did not always do so.

The program Thursday featured a film and a talk about an orphanage in Vietnam which GI's are helping and which is being largely financed by the service men in the area. The films were made by Lt. Col. Jack Bailey, commander of 476th Air Crew Training Squadron, who worked to get the orphanage on its feet while on a second tour of duty in Vietnam last year.

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DWI Driver Draws New 5-Year Term

DALLAS (AP) — Lloyd Madison Stewart, 36, who was sentenced to five years in prison in 1961 for killing four persons in a car wreck, drew another 5-year term Thursday for second-offense driving while intoxicated.

He was convicted of murder without malice in 1961 after his car crashed into an Irving family, killing two women and two small children. Police said he was under the influence of alcohol and was traveling 100 miles an hour.

ABC-IT&T Merger OK'd

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission has for the second time approved the merger of American Broadcasting Companies Inc. into International Telephone & Telegraph Corp. — the biggest merger in broadcasting history.

But the Justice Department has not decided yet whether to take its fight against the consolidation into court.

FCC Commissioners Robert E. Lee, Leo Loewinger, James J. Wadsworth and Chairman Rosel H. Hyde formed the majority in the same 4-3 lineup that prevailed when the FCC first approved the \$2.8-billion merger Dec. 21.

The majority said ITT's strong financial backing would enable ABC to better compete with the other two major networks — National Broadcasting Co. and Columbia Broadcasting System.

The network says it will expand its color programming and build new studios as part of a \$141-million program.

The new FCC decision was accompanied by a strongly worded 138-page minority opinion that accused some of the ABC officials and witnesses of both companies of lack of candor and misrepresentations during their testimony at recent FCC hearings on the merger.

The minority also charged ITT and ABC officials with "overbearing and presumptuous conduct toward the press" during the hearing and with trying "to distort and pervert the media in their reporting of these proceedings."

The commission earlier this spring agreed to the rehearing on the merger to give the Justice Department a further chance to present its opposition.

The two companies now have agreed to hold off completion of their merger for 30 days to give the department time to decide whether it will go to court to block it.

The FCC has jurisdiction in the case because ABC wishes to transfer ownership of its 17 radio and television stations to ITT.

The Justice Department claimed the merger would harm the integrity of ABC's network news operation, and that by taking over ABC, ITT would eliminate itself as a possible source of a fourth national television network.

1,000 Cops To Guard LBJ

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Police, reinforcing their ranks to an unusual extent, expect up to 20,000 antiwar demonstrators to march around the hotel where President Johnson is to appear tonight.

A police spokesman said about 1,000 officers will guard Johnson and the Century Plaza Hotel at a Democratic party fund-raising dinner-bill.

That's nearly one-fifth of the Los Angeles police force.

A White House aide said the President would fly to Los Angeles following his meeting with Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin.

A reception begins at 7:30 p.m., followed by a dinner-dance at which 1,000 guests are expected at \$1,000 per couple.

Johnson, his wife and their daughter Lynda Bird reportedly plan to go to their Texas ranch early Saturday.

Twisters Roam Across Texas

By The Associated Press
 Wild weather battered Texas from one end to the other late Thursday, leaving portions of East Texas soaked after five inches of rain and much of the Panhandle jittery following a barrage of tornadoes. No injuries were reported from the widespread turbulence. Wills Point, 50 miles east of Dallas, recorded 5.22 inches of rain for the 24-hour period ending at 7 a.m. today. Other heavy falls included Ferris 1.34, Waxahachie 1.15, Ennis 1.15, Burleson 1.08, Dalhart 37, Texarkana 29, and Tyler and Wink 24.

BOOMING STORMS
 Tornadoes and booming electrical storms lashed the Panhandle-Plains sector into the morning. The Weather Bureau and other sources reported sightings of at least eight twisters, but no major damage was reported. Brilliant lightning kept the skies alight until 2 or 3 a.m. in some areas and briefly torrential rains and hail dotted the area from near Plainview northward.

FRONT FADES
 The turbulence cropped up in midevening as perhaps the last significant effect of a dissipating cool front, so weakened by this morning that official observers said it no longer was a weather factor. An airline pilot told of sighting one twister as it lifted off the ground just west of Tulla after hitting an open country. The Weather Bureau said another touched down near the government's helium plant west of Amarillo, while a third tornado stayed aloft southeast of Amarillo.

HEAVY HAIL
 State police relayed word of a twister spinning on the ground near White Deer, 40 miles northeast of Amarillo. Police in Pampa reported still another was spotted north of Pampa and three more twisters appeared around Miami, 21 miles to the northeast. A couple of those near Miami also struck harmlessly. Rain estimated at more than an inch, heavy hail and vicious winds battered the Hereford vicinity, inflicting at least some damage before the storm system surged northeastward. A creek overflowed into farm fields south of Hereford. Another heavy downpour drenched the area around Kress, 11 miles north of Plainview. Tulla, a bit farther north, saw only a sprinkle but powerful winds snapped power lines west of town.

NO HEAT LETUP
 Amarillo itself received only a trace of moisture but radar indicated hard rains over much of the surrounding countryside. In the north edge of the Panhandle, Perryton measured 1.37 inches of rain and Dalhart .07. Borger measured up to .72 inch. Skies were generally clear and temperatures on the warm side over the rest of the state.

Rains which spread eastward after storms in West Texas the evening before finally ended late Thursday in East Texas, where the measurements ranged up to 5.06 inches at Wills Point. Temperatures ranged into the upper 90s across most of the state Thursday afternoon, hitting a high of 110 degrees at Presidio in the always torrid Big Bend country. Forecasts called for widely scattered thunderstorms again tonight or Saturday across the north half of the state, occasional showers in the south and no letup in the heat.

Bond Denied Four Raiders

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP)—Four members of a band of Spanish-Americans arraigned in connection with an armed raid on a rural courthouse have been ordered held without bond in the state prison for safekeeping. Reies Lopez Tijerina, 40, leader of an organization claiming thousands of acres of New Mexico land under ancient Spanish land grants; Tobias Leyba; Juan Valdez and Baltazar Apodaca were formally charged Thursday with first-degree kidnapping, a nonbondable offense which could carry the death penalty. They also were charged with assault to commit murder and assault on a jail.

Thirteen other defendants appearing in the District Court were ordered by Judge Jerome Angel of Las Vegas, N.M., held in lieu of \$2,500 bond. Odd Sequence Of Events Sets Stage For Plant Blast

It may be several days before damage to one unit of the collecting system at Sid Richardson Carbon Company plant can be accurately assessed. On the other hand, it is fairly certain that the unit will be down for several weeks. Grant Boardman, plant superintendent, said Thursday. A cleanup job stands in the way of appraising the extent of structural damage to the unit. This is the point where the black is collected and therefore is probably the blackest point in the entire point. Once the walls are cleaned, engineers and technicians can check to see the effect of the blast on them. Delivery on structural materials and on the 30-ft. long glass fibre bags through which the minute particles of black are filtered may present something of a problem. The unit was rocked by an explosion when a violent thunderstorm struck the area late Wednesday afternoon. Even then it took an incredible sequence of events to bring about conditions for an explosion. One of these may have been a sudden drop in atmospheric pressure as the storm center moved in, which with a power failure at that moment, and a subsequent rapid rise in pressure may have sucked air into the unit in just the right amount for an explosive mixture. The remainder of the Sid Richardson plant is continuing to operate at capacity, said Boardman.

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Pests Threaten Egypt's Cotton

CAIRO (AP) — Egypt's cotton crop, largest remaining source of hard currency for the war-battered economy, was reported Thursday to be threatened by large scale infestation. Drives were on all through the nation to enlist school boys in the fight against pest plant killers, by hand picking.

Orders went out to observe stringent economy in the use of insecticides imported largely from the West. The threat to cotton comes on top of other blows to Egyptian revenues of hard currency as a result of closing the Suez Canal and a slump in tourism.

U.S. Court Orders Stay Of Execution

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ordered a 60-day stay of execution Thursday for Clifford Darrell Carroll, convicted of murder with malice in Texas. The court said Carroll's execution must be stayed until he can exhaust remedies available to him under the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure. Carroll, whose trial began Sept. 21, 1964, had appealed a denial by the U.S. District Court in North Texas on his petition for a habeas corpus writ. He said he was denied right of counsel when a confession was elicited from him. Through his lawyers, Carroll also claimed presence of deception in the courtroom deprived him of a fair trial.

 West opened the deuce of hearts against South's four spade contract, and declarer played the ace from dummy. The queen of spades was led next, for a successful finesse. South followed up with the ten, and East ducked again. A third round of spades cleared up the trump situation.

South led a club from his hand. West followed with the eight and the ten was played from dummy. Without a sign of hesitation, East put the deuce of clubs on the trick. From South's point of view, the queen was apparently located in West's hand. He accordingly led back to the ace of diamonds to repeat the club finesse.

His plans received a severe jolt, when East topped dummy's jack of clubs with the queen. A diamond return placed considerable pressure

on South. He chose to play the jack from his hand and West covered with the queen to dislodge dummy's ace. East won the club continuation with the ace, and after cashing the king of hearts, he led a diamond to his partner's ten for the setting trick. South was the victim of his own carelessness as well as a spirit of greed. His handling of the trump suit, for example, was not well thought out. He should have arranged to win the second round of spades in his hand by leading a small spade to the nine, so that he could begin work on the club suit. This enables him to save the ace of trumps for a reentry to make a second play in clubs, without having to open up the diamond suit.

Had he coordinated his play of the spades and clubs, East's deft footwork would have gone for naught.

Declarer had it in his power to save the day even after East had permitted North's ten to win the first club trick. All South has to do is to lead a small club from the dummy at this point. East will make his two club tricks; however, North's long card in the suit will provide a parking place for South's losing diamond.

Even if West turns up with the queen of clubs, declarer can lead a club later up to dummy's king-jack in order to establish the necessary discard. The suggested play may cost an overtrick, but surely that is a negligible price to pay for assurance of the contract.
