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Doctor-Bill Insurance Increase Rule Delayed?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's elderly are supposed to find out by Oct. 1 whether the \$3 a month they now pay for doctor-bill insurance under medicare will be increased for the coming two years, but the announcement may be delayed.

It was learned the administration is considering asking Congress to extend the date by which John W. Gardner, secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, is required to announce the new rate.

Department officials say many pending medicare proposals could require a rate increase above whatever increase the department might now find necessary.

Planes Plaster Commie Guns

SAIGON (AP)—High-altitude B52 bombers and low-sweeping jets piled more than a half-million pounds of explosives today on Communist artillery and mortars that wounded more than 100 Marines in 24 hours of heavy shelling near the Demilitarized Zone.

Military headquarters reported one Marine was killed in the firing from the big gun emplacements on sandbagged fortresses near the zone dividing the Vietnams.

The State Department said Tuesday in Washington that experienced North Korean pilots may be at the controls of the Communist jets.

"It is possible that they may be flying combat missions," said spokesman Robert J. McCloskey. "We've reason to believe they have been flying combat aircraft off of operational bases."

BARRACKS CRASH A battle-damaged Air Force F100 Super Sabre jet fighter-bomber crashed into a barracks and dining hall Tuesday while attempting to land at Bien Hoa Air Force Base.

Ground action outside the beleaguered Marine camps near the DMZ were reported today.

In Saigon, intelligence sources speculated that the bombing of the Nationalist Chinese Embassy may not have been the work of the Viet Cong.

BOMBING BID American policies in South Vietnam were cited as the reason for the resignation of the director and three senior staff members of the International Voluntary Services, a private, nonprofit organization working in agriculture, education and community development in hamlets and rural areas.

Although Air Force planes flew 42 missions, mostly in the area above Hanoi, weather elsewhere was so bad that three carriers in the Tonkin Gulf could not send up a combat flight—the first time this has happened since carriers entered the Vietnamese fray.

THREE RAIDS The giant, eight-engine B52s from Guam and Thailand swept over the battlefield three times today with each raid dropping a minimum of 150,000 pounds of explosives.

Marine jets flew 27 missions against the Red gun positions Tuesday and were back at it Wednesday to support their comrades taking the pounding on the ground.

It is very difficult to find those gun positions," Lt. Gen. William W. Momyer, commander of the Air Force in Vietnam, said. He noted they are deeply dug-in, well camouflaged and scattered in jungle territory.

Just A Joke, Claims Barry

WASHINGTON (AP) — Barry Goldwater, who is something of an electronics expert, says his talk about cutting broadcast cables at the 1964 Republican National Convention was just a joke.

Goldwater told a national television audience Monday night his backers at the convention in San Francisco marked every broadcast cable in the Cow Palace left so "if anybody got a little too obnoxious to ourselves—they could always have cable trouble."

Tuesday in Phoenix, Ariz., the former GOP presidential candidate said he really had just joked, "Why not?" when one of his backers remarked on the possibility of cutting network cables.

Goldwater also said Monday of the convention, "You might recall Sen. Hugh Scott got up once with a bullhorn and it didn't work. The batteries weren't in it."

Scott, a Pennsylvania Republican who supported then-Gov. William W. Scranton of Pennsylvania against Goldwater for the nomination, said Tuesday, "I never had a bullhorn in my hand at the convention. His memory of which prank he played on whom is much the same as his memory of the campaign."

Scott said, "The tragedy for our side was that LBJ took the batteries out of Barry's bullhorn in 1964."

Scott told an interviewer that "worse than the technological sabotage was the intellectual sabotage Barry committed against Republicans and other voters."

 South's rebid of two no trump, after his partner's single diamond raise, is somewhat unorthodox inasmuch as he lacks a stopper in clubs. However, holding 19 high card points and completely even distribution, there is no completely satisfactory alternative call. North might have facilitated matters by responding with one no trump initially.

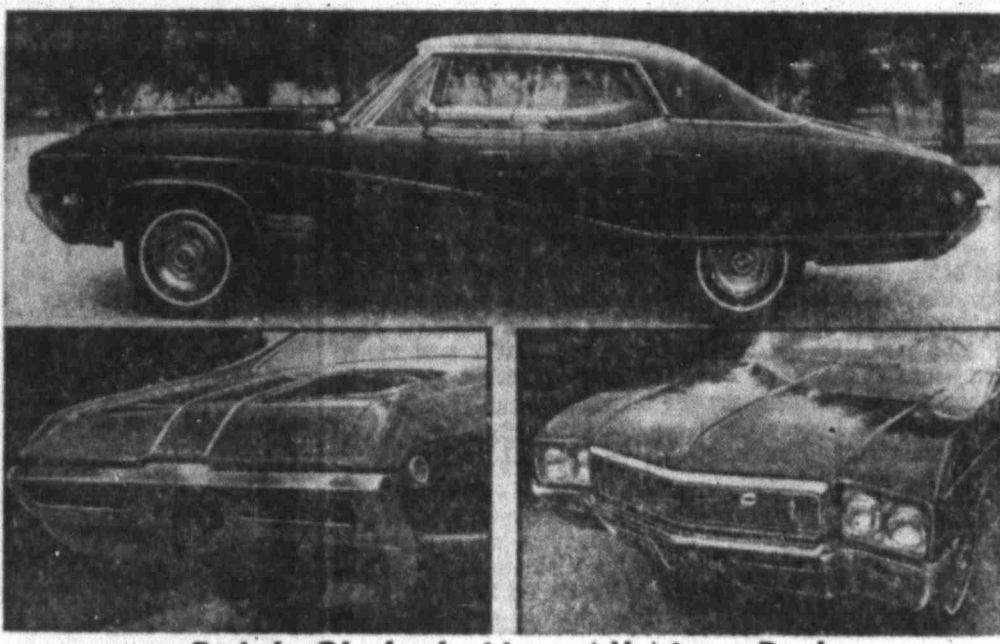
West opened the five of spades against South's three no trump contract and when the dummy was spread, declarer paused to appraise his prospects. The opening lead assured him of three spade tricks. He had four top hearts and in order to bring the total up to nine, it would be necessary to dislodge the ace of diamonds.

There was a risk involved, however, in surrendering the lead: If West has the ace of diamonds, a club shift thru dummy's king may submerge the contract before South can regain control. In order to improve his chances, declarer decided to resort to a little subterfuge to throw the enemy off the track.

The ten of spades was played at trick one, however, when East followed with the three, South put on the king from his hand. His stratagem was to give West the impression that he held only the lone ace-king of spades, and that the play of the ten from dummy was made to induce East to cover if he had the queen.

At trick two the queen of diamonds was led and West was in with the ace. It appeared that another spade lead would dislodge the ace and establish the entire suit for West. He accordingly returned the deuce of spades. To his astonishment, North's jack held the trick when South underplayed with the seven. The latter proceeded to run for cover with 10 tricks.

If declarer had won the first trick with dummy's ten of spades, West would have been alerted to the futility of continuing the attack in that suit when he regained the lead with the ace of diamonds. A club shift would then become obvious and the defense cashes four more tricks in clubs to send South

Science And You

Control Of Fusion

Hardly a day goes by without someone making an alarming announcement that the Soviets may be outdoing the United States in this or that scientific and technical area. For a time, it was almost a matter of standing firm in documents seeking financial support for some project to include suitable U.S.-U.S.S.R. comparisons. But, at least in many cases, the whole business has often taken on a "cry-wolf" character as it became clear that the U.S. was really doing quite all right for itself.

On the other hand, there is one area where it seems pretty certain that the Soviets are doing a lot more work than we are. This is the struggle to control nuclear fusion. Fusion is the key reaction that goes on inside hydrogen bombs. If we could ever produce a steady rate of nuclear fusion instead of quick bangs it would be an incredible source of power.

Controlled fusion studies have been going on in the United States, Russia, Britain and France, and to a limited extent in Japan, for 20 years. The problem is a lot more difficult than people first thought. That is the reason the whole area has been unclassified for the last decade.

The basic problem is finding a method for containing a mass of gas whose temperature is 100 million degrees. At such temperature the atomic nuclei of the gas atoms could undergo fusion — they would fuse together and release the desired energy.

The gas used is a heavy form of hydrogen called deuterium. It's available in seawater to such an extent that one gallon of seawater would be equivalent in energy to hundreds of gallons of gasoline. So you can just imagine how much power might be waiting for us in the oceans. Obviously, 100 million degrees is well above the melting point of any solid material, so one has to try to hold the gas in a kind of "magnetic bottle" in which magnetic force is used to contain it. This is not as easy as it sounds because the hot gas has a tendency to leak out. This leakage problem is now the focus of most of the U.S. and Russian fusion research.

At the moment, as a result of

information obtained during a visit to Russia by the director of the AEC's Plasma Research Laboratory at Princeton University, it looks as if the Russians are really a lot more serious about this problem than we are. The Russians state that their controlled fusion research has the highest priority of any of their non-military research projects. They've got about 800 scientists working fulltime on the program.

For comparison, the U.S. has about 400 scientists on this job — a level which has held constant over the last five years. We're now spending about \$2 million per year on fusion research. The difficulty is that as you get further down the road the experiments tend to become bigger and more costly. Thus, at a constant level of effort, the U.S. is able to pursue a smaller and smaller number of possible solutions each year.

Old Yellow Stone Is A Ghost Ship

By ED SYERS

Despite her extraordinary career and your good salvage efforts, Texas Revolution's Steamboat Yellow Stone remains Ghost Ship No. 1 on OBT's registry. Hear, among others, Houston's Mrs. Sarah E. Horton, Orange's M. W. Fort Worth's Elwood Taylor and London A. Freear:

The twin-stacked, 130-foot riverboat was built in 1831 for John J. Astor's northwest fur trade, started Mandan Sioux on the upper Missouri, far as the Yellowstone mouth. By 1834, her

too-deep-for-whitewater draft had her primarily on the lower Mississippi, newly owned. New Year's Eve, 1835, she stood out from New Orleans, Tom Grayson skipper, Texas-bound with a detachment of young Mobile Grays, destined for Fannin and Goliad.

She stayed Texian, working the Brazos, was at Groce's Landing (near Hempstead) March 31, when Sam Houston commandeered her to put his across within two weeks, and San Jacinto-bound troops had her working downriver

against the flood of river and runaway refugees. Finally, she ran Mexican gunfire and attempts literally to rope her from the bank, made Brazos-mouth and started guns for Galveston and a battle somewhere above it... already won.

Her San Jacinto cargo then shifted to President David Burnett's entourage, to talk treaty with captured Santa Anna. Back down Buffalo Bayou, she carried that beaten general, finally to Velasco moorage. It was aboard Yellow Stone, Texas Independence was treaty-signed.

Not yet ready for routine river cargo, she would, in six months, carry Stephen F. Austin's body — as best a young Republic could convey its Father-to-Peach Point burial.

For a time thereafter, Yellow Stone labored the Brazos, Quiltana mouth to Washington routine cargo, taking her boiler firewood from riverbank late as 1837. Then, in record

and registry, she disappeared. No one yet has reported her fate.

This ship? Yellow Stone, who tried for Fannin, made it for Houston, brought Santa Anna back, housed freedom's signing, and finally made last voyage with Stephen Austin? Old skippers wouldn't have forgotten this ship. Records, maybe; but not ship's captains.

Somewhere, attic or archive, there's a letter or scrap of paper that tells Yellow Stone's end. It shouldn't be ghost ship.

Longest true shot known hereabouts, OBT carried some years ago: Billy Dixon's near-mile bulletseye with a Sharps Big Fifty at A. Jobe Walls on the far high plains. But tale tops facts — Via Midland's T. J. Chapman, here's a surveyor — handed-down yarn for any marksman.

In Guadalupe Mountain country, up Carlsbad way, a white-bearded prospector told railroad

surveyors too many stories of long shots he'd made for antelope. He could fire, light a smoke, then watch his quarry drop. Exactly busy surveyors tired of it, determined to cure the old man. He found them soaking cartridges in salt water when suppertime came.

"Well I never," said the old man, "seen anybody soak bullets in salt water. How come?"

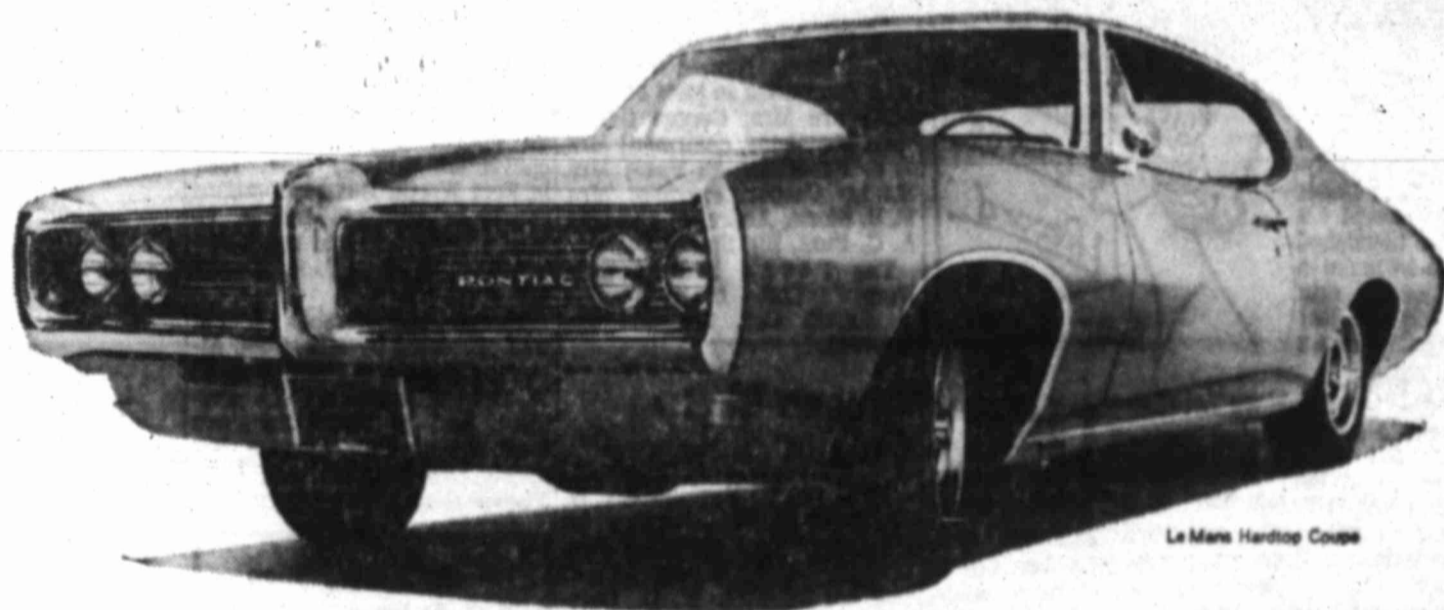

Hair coloring products have reached a high degree of accuracy and safety. It is the human element that most often accounts for problems arising from use. The user slips up! To promote success, never tint without checking off these points:
1. Be sure your hair is in good condition before applying a permanent tint. Under no circumstances should a tint be applied to a bleached scalp.
2. Do not fail to make a patch test for possible skin sensitivity. In making the test follow the instructions that come with your product.
3. Prior to color - treating the entire head, make a strand test. Simply color one small tress under the surface of the hair. That way it is possible to preview results and to adjust coloring solution and timing, if need be.
4. Keep snips of original hair color, in case you ever wish to recolor to that shade.
5. Keep a written notation of your color formula, as a guide to future operations.
6. Never store or use leftover coloring solution. Unless, that is, it is housed in a self-sealing, air-tight dispenser.
7. Be sure to wear rubber gloves when handling tints. And be very careful to avoid splashes on the skin. To safeguard the eyes, wear shampoo goggles.
8. If you need a permanent wave, have it two weeks before tinting, or two weeks afterward.

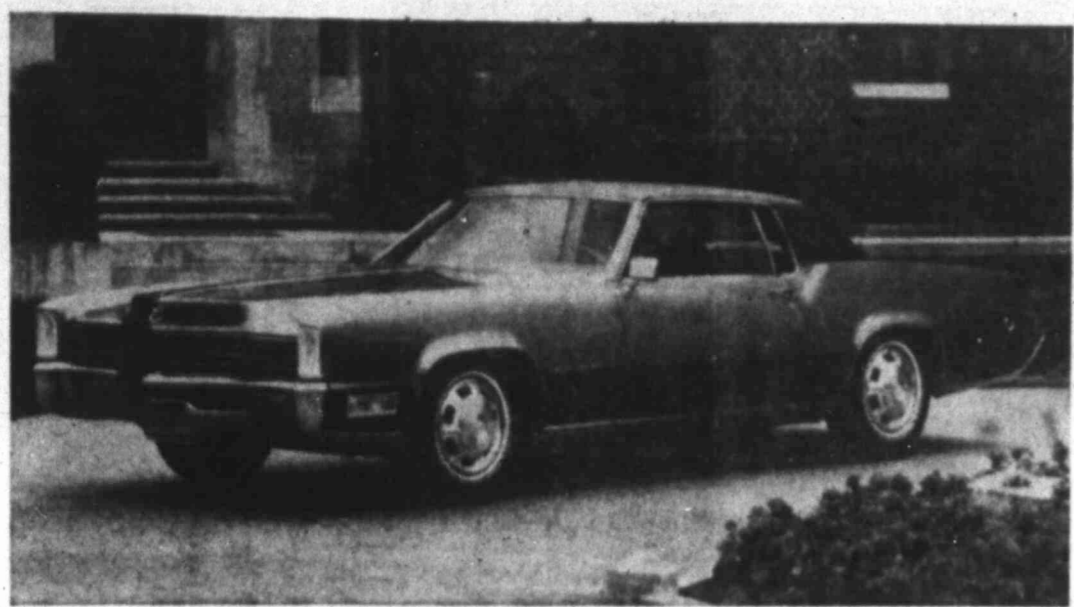

HINTS FROM HELOISE
Protects Clothing From Metal Marks
Dear Folks:
We got many and varied answers to the request for a solution to the problem of dark marks on dresses caused by the metal strip on kitchen drainboards...
This stripping is probably made of aluminum and aluminum is a porous metal. Since it is in the kitchen, it collects carbon and oxidizes just being exposed to the air.
My suggestion to all of you who have this trouble is to first scrub the metal strip vigorously with a soap-filled steel wool pad to remove the imbedded grease and soil.
Then wet a dry rag with pure vinegar and wipe thoroughly to take off all of the soap film. Plain water won't do the job, ladies, you've got to have that vinegar acid. And don't rinse it off.
Many people wrote in that after it was dry, they took clear fingernail polish and painted all the metal stripping along the immediate work area. If you find the tiny brush in the bottle too small, use a water color brush out of the children's paint box.
They all said they had no more black marks across their tummy, and it sure saved their clothes. So since all it takes is a bottle of clear nail polish, which most of us already have on hand, why not try it?
Others wrote that they used CLEAR shellac, lacquer, or varnish with good results. If you have some on hand... fine.
And many, many thanks to those of you who took the time to write us with your solution. Bless you all... Heloise

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Pan Am Strike Is Sputtering

WASHINGTON (AP) — A strike by members of the Brotherhood of Railway and Airline Clerks against Pan American World Airways got off to an uneven, sputtering start early today.

A federal judge in New York declared the strike illegal and another, in Honolulu, ordered strikers there back to work.

About 250 Pan American ground service employees in Honolulu began walking off their jobs nearly six hours before the 12:01 a.m. EDT deadline.

RETURN ORDERED

But Judge C. Nils Tavares of U.S. District Court in Honolulu granted an airline request and ordered the strikers to return to work.

The 7,000 clerks, ticket writers and cargo men represented by the union struck in other areas also. But some local unions voted to respect the temporary restraining order issued Tuesday afternoon by Judge Frederick Van Pelt Bryan of U.S. District Court in New York City.

Spokesmen for the airline said all flights were arriving and departing on schedule and supervisory personnel were substituting for those employees not on the job.

Condemnation Suit Goes On

The condemnation proceedings brought by the Colorado River Municipal Water District to acquire 4,014 acres from Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Wilcockson in Coke County for the district's new lake basin continued Wednesday.

S. W. Freese, consulting engineer for the district, was due to be the district's last witness Wednesday morning.

George Thompson, Sweetwater, continued his testimony Tuesday, pegging his value on lands to be acquired at \$386,000. Previously C. A. (Joe) Dismore, Coke County rancher, had testified about his land transactions over the past four years.

Robert Fittings, Midland geologist, and Ed Barfield and John Ewing testified concerning minerals, and Ewing, who is employed by Humble, said his company had no plans for further drilling on the lands involved. Ed Reed, Midland hydrologist, testified that the water that the Wilcocksons have been selling to oil companies for repressuring in the IAB field is surface (river) water, although it comes from wells on the bank of the river.

Lewis Rochester, Odessa, whose Lakeside Resort addition is being developed at the lake, testified that the lakeside acreages left to the Wilcocksons would command \$500 an acre. Earlier, O. H. Ivie, CRMWD general manager, gave the background on the project and explained why the district had to have the acreage for the basin if its 488,000 acre-foot lake is to be impounded there in 1969.

The Lubbock district has dispatched 123 plant personnel, together with considerable equipment, to the hurricane area, said Harry Sawyer, manager for the Big Spring operations.

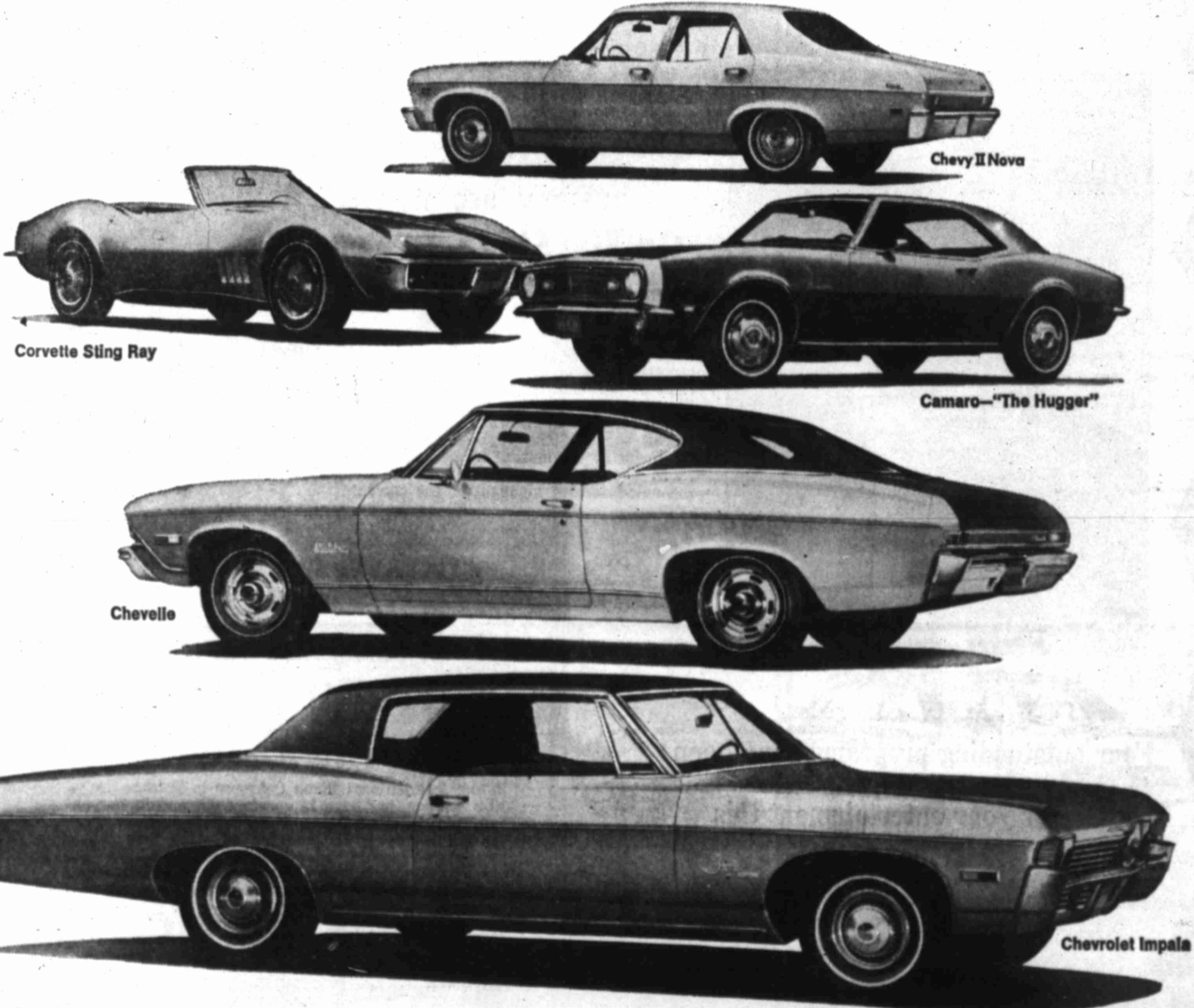

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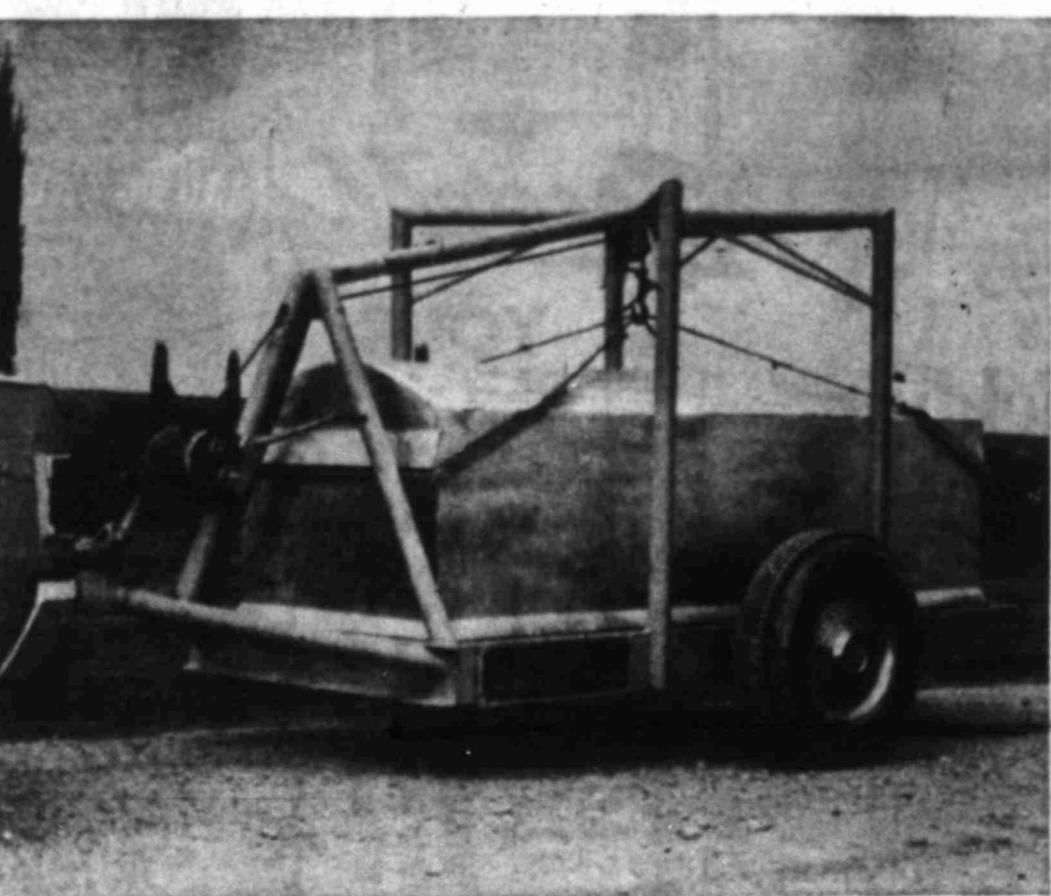

Burial Vault Is Needed For Lasting Protection

Concrete's inherent quality of durability and increasing strength as it ages makes concrete burial vaults a popular choice from the viewpoint of both the funeral director and the cemetery operator. Its economy of material and manufacture make this fine product available to the public at reasonable prices.

Rigid standards regulate the manufacture of concrete burial vaults to insure quality of concrete and workmanship. Dense concrete with a strength of over 4,000 pounds per square inch is required, and tests have shown that this concrete increases in strength as the years go by. A water proofing agent is added to the concrete to protect against moisture. The earth with its moisture and chemical acting properties attacks and breaks down many materials—but the moisture only serves to complete the curing of concrete.

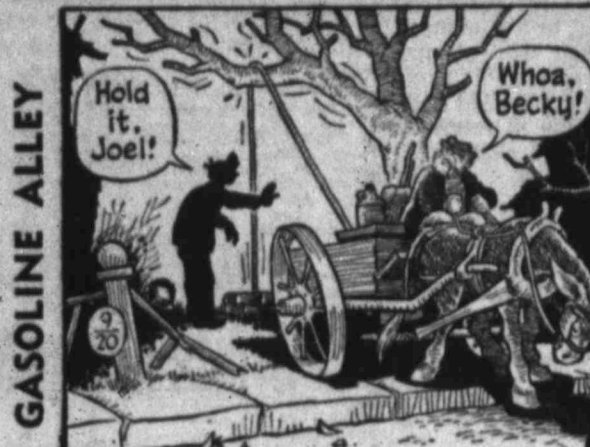

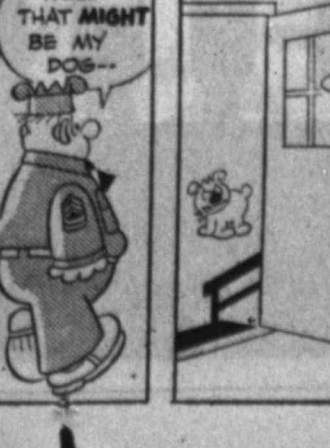

TIED TO CROSS

Guards Use Hot Irons On Chinese Catholic

HONG KONG (AP) — Pro-Maoist Red Guards in Shanghai tied a Chinese Catholic to a cross and then stoned him and burned him with hot irons, a Hong Kong businessman reported today.
The 43-year-old Chinese businessman, who recently returned from Shanghai, said the Red Guards first arrested the man late in August when they saw him wearing a crucifix.
The Red Guards then took him to a school building they

were using as a barracks and tried him on charges of following "running dog religion" instead of the thoughts of Chairman Mao Tse-tung, he said.
"KILL HIM!"
A big crowd of students and Red Guards at the trial shouted throughout, "Kill him and crucify him!" the businessman said. After the trial, the Christian was tied to a cross the Red Guards put up in the school yard.
First they threw sticks and stones at him. Then some Red Guards heated iron rods and burned him, he said.
The businessman, who gave his name but asked that it not be used to protect relatives still in China, said the Christian's agonized screams finally brought Communist Chinese authorities who forced the Red Guards to give him up. The man reportedly died later in a Shanghai hospital.

The Hong Kong man said he was told the story both by witnesses and by Shanghai police sources.

Deputy Rescues 'Coffee Hound'

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Sheriff's Deputy Loren Caddy had his hands full the other day when he was asked to rescue a dog from a coffee pot.
Elsie McGarry reported that a huge dog—a cross between a Labrador retriever and a German shepherd—had gotten stuck in a 50-cup coffee maker that had been left in a junk pile in her yard.
Caddy doused the dog with liquid detergent and pulled him out of the pot a little at a time.
