TYPHOON, FLOODS, TRAIN WRECK, THREE AIRPLANE CRASHES

Varied Disasters Kill Over 250 During Weekend

Disaster struck often and hard over the weekend and more than 250 persons were reported dead or missing in a typhoon, floods, a train wreck and three plane crashes from the Philippines to Britain.

200 DEAD In the Philippines: About 200 persons were believed dead or missing as casualty counts poured into Manila after Typhoon Emma rampaged across the island and sank an interisland passenger ship.

In England: 51 were dead and 111 injured when an express train careened off the tracks coming into London Sunday night. Another 37 died in the crash on Saturday of a Spanish airliner arriving in London from Malaga, Spain.

In Hong Kong: Only one per-son died as a huge Cathay Pacific Airlines Convair 880 tilted on takeoff and slid into Hong Kong harbor. The other 126 persons aboard escaped unhurt from the floating fuselage.

In New Guinea: All seven persons aboard a light plane died today when it crashed while taking off from Goroka Airport in the New Guinea highlands.

In Italy: At least 11 persons died in highway crashes during hard rains that pushed rivers in

Venice and the Po River Delta over their banks to flood roads and highways.

The owners of the Philippine ship reported 67 persons are missing and presumed drowned while 14 others are known dead after the sinking of the 300-ton Mindoro in rough central Philippine seas churned up by Typhoon Emma two days ago. They said 134 passengers were

The vessel sank at the height of Emma's fury. Her howling winds, up to 125 miles an hour, cut a swath of destruction across the Philippines. The Philippine News Service reported 106

Among those killed were two Americans, W.N. Perkins of Tyler, Tex., and a Mr. Mendel whose trip originated in Decatur, Ill. Also dead in the crash was British actress June Thorburn, 36. She was expecting a baby in four months.

Sales Tax **Called Boon**

HOUSTON (AP) — City sales taxes will help Texas cities solve that old problem of providing up-to-date service, particularly in fighting crime, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith said today.

Smith was a speaker at the 55th Texas Municipal League Conference. The league led support for local option sales taxes when the new type Texas levy was approved by the last legislature.

Smith, an announced candidate for governor in 1968, noted that more than 100 cities will have held city sales tax elections by Jan. 1.

"If these past elections can be used as guidelines, you will have hurdled a tremendous obstacle which local governments have faced far too longthe problems of providing up to date services in this ever changing space age."

manded an investigation of the police. A collection was taken for the widow and children of James Eller, 32, a Negro whose death touched off the nights of violence.

Eller died two weeks after he was struck on the head by a policeman's blackjack after being arrested on a drunkenness charge. Murder charges were filed against a white policeman, W. E. Owens, but were dropped Monday.

Regime Wants o End War

SAN'A, Yemen (AP) - Yemen's new Republican regime indicates that it will seek reconciliation with the Royalists and an end to the 5-year-old civil war, after its ouster of the president who seemed determined to keep fighting.

The new regime came to power Sunday in a bloodless coup while President Abdullah al-Sallal was out of the country. It said its goal is to "correct the situation" in Yemen.

Cairo's Middle East News Agency quoted the new acting president, Abdel Rahman Iriani, as saying contacts were under way with pro-Royalist tribes with the aim of bringing them into the Republican fold.

Iriani is a conservative and is believed to have great influence with the warring tribes.

The new premier, Moshen el Ainy, said all tribes have expressed backing for the new regime. He also said Yemen would follow a "good neighbor" policy with all sister states, including the neighboring monarchy of Saudi Arabia, which backed the Royalists in the civil war that began when Sallal led the overthrow of Yemen's 11-century-old monarchy in 1962.

Levy Based On County Valuations

Creation of the new authority was advocated by the Chamber of Commerce Aviation Committee after a study of future airport requirements, and a finding that additional bonds issued by the county itself would not be feasible since Howard County is at the statutory tax limit for permanent improvements. Only a marked increase in have accommodated proposed improvements.

The Authority would set a tax fevy based on county valuations, which are presently at 20 per cent of market value.

While the election proposition sets a 25-cent ceiling, fiscal agents studying airport requirements have calculated that about an 18-cent levy would county valuations could thus meet all needs.

Federal Grant Available To Jan. 1

The proposed \$750,000 in bonds is set up to provide for numerous improvements at the airport, and local money would be supplemented with a government grant through the Federal Aviation Agency.

The FAA already has earmarked close to \$200,000 for first phase work at the airport, which would include lengthening and widening of the northsouth runway, providing some additional parcels of land; various ramp and taxiway improvements, new marking and lighting of runways; and a new terminal building.

The FAA has made a stipulation that the local Authority must make a commitment for the airport improvements before Jan. 1. If such commitment is not made the FAA allotment would be withdrawn and distributed to other applicants in Texas.

Two-Stage Improvement Plan Drawn

The proposed airport development is in two stages, the FAA commitment made for the first stage; the agency has indicated that it could make another grant of some \$238,000 for future improvements (probably within two years) which would cover widening and lengthening of the east-west runway and other expansion and refinement.

The proposed cal bond issue would not be committed unless and until the federal grant is confirmed, and local monies would be spent along with such development as approved by the FAA.

Leaders for the airport improvement have said that the new Authority, if voted, either would not issue all the bonds at one time; or if sold as a unit, unused money would be reinvested to draw interest.







The Problem Of Flood Insurance

Hurricane Beulah, its tides and seas, and the flooding rainfall which accompanied it, emphasized once again the need for flood insurance for businessmen and homeowners. It emphasized, too, the difficulties inherent in any flood insurance program.

In South Texas as a whole, rising water from storm tides or from flooding rivers and creeks caused most of the damage. None of this loss, with the exception of automobiles carrying comprehensive coverage was covered by insurance. That insurance can be obtained, but only at prohibitive cost.

The insurance industry has never been unmindful of the problem, but members profess to know no answers to it except through very high premiums. A succession of yearly hurricanes striking the Texas coast, a pos-

sibility that insurance companies cannot ignore, has persuaded insurors that flood insurance is not a practical risk that can be insured at reasonable

Hence, the people who have lost heavily from rising waters, in South Texas as well as in many other parts of the United States, have appealed to Congress for help. One of the possibilities now being explored by members of Congress is a variation of reinsurance, in which the federal government would back up insurance companies against catastrophic loss, Several business groups have endorsed a federal approach to enable property owners to receive insurance protection from flood waters at reasonable rates.

A federal re-insurance plan seems to offer the only practical solution.

Desalting Of Ocean Water

Not much more than a year hence, thanks to a U.S. Export-Import Bank loan, the world's largest desalting plant will start pouring out 7.5 million gallons of fresh water daily for the Mexican city of Tijuana in Baja California. This enterprise undertaken by the government of Mexico is interesting for a number of reasons.

The project is, for one thing, another practical indication that the world is rapidly moving toward use of sea water in comparatively arid regions. Before long this will have a transforming effect on many parts of the globe. It is significant that we have passed beyond the strictly experimental stage of a few years agothat now desalting plants are accept-

ed as entirely practicable.
It also is of interest that the expected cost figure of \$6.4 million is well below earlier estimates by both American and Mexican experts. As more and more plants are built, the state of the art improves and the cost of the water also will decline. This will be of growing importance as world population rises. All in all, the conversion of sea water into potable fresh water is one of the most promising fruits of modern technology.

The President's Position

WASHINGTON - President Johnson is having difficulty keeping up with his critics. Day after day they make attacks on his Vietnam policy, and he is so busy with dozens of domestic as well as foreign-policy projects that he apparently doesn't have the time to give to constant rebuttals.

Also, as happened last Wednesday when the President held an unscheduled news conference, much of what he said was not distributed because it came at an hour which was too late for the afternoon newspapers. Apparently the press associations did not carry the text across the nation, nor did the television networks quote the President's remarks fully that same night.

MR. JOHNSON did not say anything sensational, but there was nevertheless an emphasis in his comments which has not been there before. The President stated that he was concerned about many of those critics who are discussing the Vietnam war problem, yet who are not familiar with all that is happening. He said it is necessary to give consideration to statements by members of Congress and others, but he added:

"In considering them I must always bear in mind that most of those people - not even the intellectuals or the editorial writers or the columnists, pro or con - have not had the benefit of the hundreds of cables that come from 110 countries, or from the men in charge, or men who really have the responsibility for the planning and execution of some of the

THE PRESIDENT called attention once more to the Tonkin Gulf resolution, passed by Congress in 1964, which, unfortunately, has not gotten very wide publicity. Yet it sets forth explicitly the reasons why American troops are in Vietnam. Mr. Johnson

"In presenting that resolution to Congress, we made clear to Congress some of the things that I would ask you not to overlook now - namely, that we had a vital security interest in Southeast Asia; that Asian security was important to our own American

MR. JOHNSON was emphatic when he said the matter of a negotiated settlement in the Vietnam war was not the problem of the American government or its soldiers. He said:

The problem is with the Communist enemy who insists on continuing the course that places us in Vietnam and that will keep us there until they decide might does not make right, and they cannot gobble up weaker people because they are stronger.

"WE ARE GOING to stand for limited objectives. We are going to try to keep from widening the war. We are going to try to deter aggression and to permit self-determination in South Vietnam. And when that is done, we are going to be content. We do not want bases, domination, colonization. We do not practice colonial-

Because of the volume of adverse statements being publicized, much of which is based on a superficial study of the whole problem, the President is not getting across to the people his refutation. Hippies Vs. Free Enterprise

NEW YORK (AP)-Is the fate of the free enterprise economy endangered by a bunch of unwashed, unkempt, fuzzy-minded youths lacking goals or business instinct but now, inevitably, attaining a more important role in the economy? This is the night-mare that in a few frantic moments some businessmen see before them. Some sociologists and educators tend to agree that the nightmare could be-

come reality.
Dr. Marshall McLuhan, the famed Canadian professor and social critic, even foresees an economic depression resulting from this takeover of the economy by a generation poorly adapted to the demands of business.

THE NIGHTMARE theory may ignore some important factors, however, including the prospect that youthful rebels often become conventional adults, transition that parents may recall from their own experience. It may give too little value also to the fact that youthful protest, a consistent theme of society, often inspires constructive change by exposing weaknesses, inequities and falsehoods. Busi-

THE MOST powerful tranquilizer for businessmen's nightmares is a change of viewpoint, to realize, for instance, that the society that produces hippies produces Peace Corps volunteers as well. A changed point of view may also reveal that, although much of the business community doesn't attempt to communicate with younger generations, some business organizations make it their avocation.

IN THE JUNIOR Achievement program, businessmen and industrialists give guidance to 150,000 high school students in organizing and managing their own small-scale businesses.

This educational program, now 48 years old, has chapters in more than 500 communities, where youngsters organize businesses by selling stock and then operate their businesses, hopefully, for profits. In doing so they learn about profit and loss statements, taxes, mergers and, if need be, bankruptcies.

AS AN ANTIDOTE to all the publicity about hippies, the Reader's Digest has chosen 16 outstanding Junior Achievers from around the country and is sending them out as speakers. The students will write their own speeches; they won't be censored.

Based on interviews conducted by the Digest and Junior Achievement for The Associated Press, their talks will be informed, tolerant and generally acceptable to the business community. But they might provoke it as

> WHY WOULD so many Federal Judges lay their heads on the block for a bill that sizzles with polemic dispute? Its passage in the House raised outcries of Police State tactics. Its most active enemies in the Senate are vindictive fellows named Kennedy. The emotional arguments against it are that it violates the First Amendment's protection of free speech, and that it is aimed against the downtrodden Negro race which is demanding its civil rights.

> BUT DESPITE all this, a large number of Federal Judges have egged on the Judiciary Committee to lower the boom on persons who cross state lines or use the mails "with intent" to stir up a riot: U. S. District Judge Lieb (Fla.) says "radio, telegraph or television" should be added to "telephone" so as to tighten the provisions. Judge Hall (Calif.) stresses television which, he says in unjudicial language, "has been used with impunity by rabblerousers." Judge Timbers (Conn.) wants the maximum imprisonment under the bill raised from five years to 20 years; Judge Wright (Del.) says the crime of incitation is at least as serious as bank-robbery, which draws up to 25 years in prison.

WRIGHT GOES on to-say: "Ours is a society which should not tolerate civil disobedience, no matter how legitimate the aspirations. Judge Zack (Pa.) calls it a crime "that borders on treason," for which the penalty in wartime is death. Judge Layton (Del.) makes favorable reference to "loss of citizenship" as a penalty. A number of the Federal Judges propose putting a burden of proof on the accused by language that "shall create a rebuttable presumption" of guilty intent under cir-cumstantial evidence.

These are typical samplings from presiding magistrates in our Federal courts, and I am told that the total responses are unprecedented in number and vehemence. What, then, is the heart of this matter? My considered opinion is that the Judges are not trying to abridge free speech in America, but are trying to preserve and safeguard it.

FREE SPEECH is a human right. but any right that is abused can be lost. Protection of free speech is a privilege that is guarded in America, and not in many other lands, but a privilege can be eroded by misuse. No freedom is absolute. The classic limitations on speech forbid the false cry of "Fire" in public places and forbid immunity in the use of insulting or threatening epithets. Incendiary diatribes, such as those spewed forth by Rap Brown and Stokely Carmichael, are not going to be suffered forever. An offended citizenry will take the law into their own hands, or will demand that the Constitution be amended to curtail what is now a full freedom within reason.

The Judges, I think, are saying that the way to keep free speech is to crack down on those who don't respect it for the sake of those who do.

A vocal, tough-talking Negro, Russ Meek, earlier had done the narration of a film made in the Chicago slums under his direction. His fury and hatred spewed out then and even more during the "confrontation." One Negro woman who had started with calm reason was so stung by-a white woman's talk of integration that she retorted, "I've been integrating too long. I've got these freckles and red hair as the result of the rape of my great-grandmother . . . "

BITTER SATIRE

While the talk, often jumbled as many spoke at one time, was more emotional than reasoned, the confrontation was exciting

Actually, neither Negroes nor whites made good cases for heir causes

The final portion of the program was devoted to a play, 'Day of Absence,' performed by a company of Negroes in white face-a minstrel show in reverse. This told in bitter, broad satire, the calamity that befell a Southern town when suddenly all its Negroes disappeared. No menial jobs were performed, and it painted an ugly picture of incompetent, foolish whites. Although it made its point very quickly, the play went on and on
