





# Antipoverty Bill Backers Bank On Big Concessions

WASHINGTON (AP) — Backers of legislation to extend the antipoverty program another year count on concessions made in committee to push the administration measure through a largely hostile House.

Debate begins today on the measure with a showdown vote not expected before Thursday.

Never very popular in the House, the program faces its severest challenge so far from a conservative coalition that has already forced heavy cuts in domestic programs.

**BEYOND REACH**  
But the bill's supporters were cautiously optimistic that when the smoke clears the main out-

lines of the program will still be intact.  
They are counting heavily on amendments adopted by the Education and Labor Committee to quiet some of the major criticism directed at the antipoverty program after this summer's big-city rioting.  
The chief amendment would put elected public officials in direct control of community action agencies, most of which are now private, nonprofit agencies beyond the reach of public officials.

### RIOT TENSIONS

In several cities, where riots occurred local officials said antipoverty workers in such agencies helped set them off. But some officials praised workers for easing riot tensions.  
Another amendment would require that 10 per cent of the cost of an antipoverty project be put up in cash by the local agency.  
Both amendments have drawn heavy criticism from the Office of Economic Opportunity, which directs the antipoverty program, and also from House supporters. They contended that putting local officials in control will blunt the imaginative, creative approach needed to deal with poverty.  
There are indications the amendments have succeeded in picking up enough support among Southern Democrats to insure defeat of a substitute proposal to be offered by the Republicans.  
Rep. Albert H. Quie, R-Minn., is the chief author of the GOP version, which would fit most programs into existing job training and vocational education programs and enlarge the role of private industry. He conceded last week there was little hope it would be adopted.

# Hubert Discusses Viet War With Indonesia's Suharto

JAKARTA (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey discussed the Vietnam war with Indonesia's acting President Suharto but did not ask him to mediate, sources in Humphrey's party said today.

The sources said Suharto indicated he could help the United States because he has diplomatic relations with Hanof. They said Humphrey thanked him for the offer but never specifically requested any assistance.

More talks with Suharto were expected at tonight's dinner and it was assumed the war in Vietnam as well as Indonesia's economic plight would be high on the agenda.

LADY BIRD SAYS THE PRESIDENT

'Goes On Working Best He Can'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lady Bird Johnson says the President has a reasoned, searching reaction to mounting criticism and "keeps his head high, his feet on the ground and goes on working the best he can."

"He doesn't want to be rigidly bound into one set of thinking," the First Lady said. "He's always trying to learn and explore."

**LINES IN FALL**

Approaching the anniversary of four years in the White House, Mrs. Johnson said she has never lived so intensely.

"Awareness of this house is like a shot of Adrenalin—intensifying the desire to do the best you can to live up to what this country wants its first family to be."

The President's hair is whiter, he has more lines in his face: "It has taken a lot—it's been worth everything it takes," his wife said.

**CLOSER**

The family has "drawn closer together than we ever have before in our lives—there's just

times of hope and striving that it will be just one of those great days to remember."

Asked whether she wants President Johnson to run again, Mrs. Johnson said: "I want him to do everything of useful work that he can for his country."

Mrs. Johnson is urging the President to relax at golf, and says she hopes someday he'll retire to Texas and teach young people about "the years of government that he has lived."

In the historic second-floor White House treaty room, Mrs. Johnson thoughtfully discussed the White House and her family.

**MASSIVE BED**

She recalled "a lot of things I've loved," like dining by candlelight on the Truman balcony with the President and their oldest daughter Lynda; running the family's dogs and wheeling her grandson's carriage on the south lawn; "spine-tingling moments" like seeing youngest daughter Luci's wedding gown stretched out across President Abraham Lincoln's massive bed; and "earnestly dramatic things" like the signing of the civil rights bill "with the life-

A. Like any mother or mother-in-law, I feel concerned and I'll be praying. But I'll always be very proud. I like that young man and I'm glad there are folks like him fighting for us.

Q. What did you think about the recent antiwar march on the Pentagon?

A. (Mrs. Johnson revealed she and the President drove around Washington after church on the weekend of the Pentagon march.) I was thinking, by gosh, what a big cleanup bill this city was going to face. It must be ankle deep in the trash they left . . . to some extent

Treating Yeast And Fungus Infections

By JOSEPH G. MOLNER, M.D. Dear Dr. Molner: You were explaining about yeast infection in the vagina but you gave no treatment for it. Would you give some form of treatment for yeast and fungus infections? Would douching be beneficial, and with what? - D. R.

Dear Dr. Molner: I have had nearly a dozen cysts. I asked the doctor if I would keep having them all my life and he said he didn't know, so I told him I would write and ask you. He told me to go right ahead as you wrote was accurate so evidently he reads your column, too. - Mrs. S. J.

Free Speech For Those Who Respect It

WASHINGTON - There are 456 Federal Judges in the United States. About 100 of them wrote in to the Senate Judiciary Committee, by invitation, to give suggestions on the anti-riot bill (H.R. 421) under consideration.

Only a handful of these jurists opposed a Federal law against "inciting to riot," and the large majority proposed that the language and penalties be strengthened.

THIS AFFIRMATIVE response is almost incredible until you get to the heart of the matter. Federal Judges would ordinarily as soon pick up a live snake as a controversial political issue. They have cushy lifetime jobs, subject to impeachment. They avoid comment on legislation lest their open-mindedness later come in to question and their rulings be reversed by a higher court.

WHY WOULD so many Federal Judges lay their heads on the block for a bill that sizzles with polemic dispute? Its passage in the House raised outcries of Police State tactics. Its most active enemies in the Senate are vindictive fellows named Kennedy.

BUT DESPITE all this, a large number of Federal Judges have edged on the Judiciary Committee to lower the boom on persons who cross state lines or use the mails "with intent" to stir up a riot.

WRIGHT GOES on to say: "Ours is a society which should not tolerate civil disobedience, no matter how legitimate the aspirations. Judge Zack (Pa.) calls it a crime 'that borders on treason,' for which the penalty in wartime is death. Judge Layton (Del.) makes favorable reference to 'loss of citizenship' as a penalty. A number of the Federal Judges propose putting a burden of

proof on the accused by language that "shall create a rebuttable presumption" of guilty intent under circumstantial evidence.

These are typical samplings from presiding magistrates in our Federal courts, and I am told that the total responses are unprecedented in number and vehemence. What, then, is the heart of this matter? My considered opinion is that the Judges are not trying to abridge free speech in America, but are trying to preserve and safeguard it.

FREE SPEECH is a human right, but any right that is abused can be lost. Protection of free speech is a privilege that is guarded in America, and not in many other lands, but a privilege can be eroded by misuse.

The Judges, I think, are saying that the way to keep free speech is to crack down on those who don't respect it for the sake of those who do. (Distributed by McNaught Syndicate, Inc.)

WASHINGTON (AP) - Government officials say 37 school districts in 17 Southern and border states have voluntarily set their own deadlines for meeting federal desegregation requirements.

All have agreed to eliminate dual Negro-white school systems within the next three years, federal officials said.

They said another 44 of the total 4,600 Southern school districts have submitted plans aimed at meeting federal standards over a slightly longer period.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Tax collections indicate Americans are accelerating their intake of alcoholic beverages.

The Internal Revenue Service reported that alcohol tax collections for the year which ended June 30 reached a record \$4.08 billion, up 6.8 per cent from the previous fiscal year.

**ANSWERS TO BRIDGE QUIZ**

Q. 1—As South you hold:  
♠QJ3 ♣75 ○KQ105 ♠AJ109  
Your partner opens with one spade. What is your response?  
A.—Two diamonds, not three spades. The limits of the jump raise are 13-16 points and this holding is worth 17 points in support of spades. Hands which are not quite strong enough for a jump shift response are properly described by bidding new suits twice before making partner.

Q. 2—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:  
♠AQ103 ♣KJ1042 ○K6442  
The bidding has proceeded: South West North East 1♠ Pass 2NT Pass 3♥ Pass ?  
What do you bid now?  
A.—Four spades. Do not bid four hearts which might be construed as a slam try. Your hand is worth 15 points and partner can have at most 16 for his jump raise.

Q. 3—As South, vulnerable, you hold:  
♠Q10643 ♣765 ○53 ♠752  
The bidding has proceeded: North East South West 1♠ Pass 2NT Pass 3♥ Pass ?  
What do you bid now?  
A.—Four hearts. This bid does not indicate any strength, it merely denotes normal trump support for the rebid heart suit. It would be completely pointless to show the spade suit. Nothing could be gained by it and confusion might result.

Q. 4—As South, vulnerable, you hold:  
♠KQ83 ♣82 ○AKQ75 ♠K  
The bidding has proceeded: South West North East 1♠ Pass 2NT Pass 3♥ Pass 3♠ Pass 4♥ Pass 5♠ Pass ?  
What do you bid now?  
A.—There is little doubt that a slam should be contracted for, but care should be exercised in the selection of the slam contract. Partner has shown the ace of clubs and evidently the ace of spades but seems to lack the ace of hearts for over four diamonds. It would have been easy for him to bid four hearts holding that ace, rather than five clubs. It is a moral certainty, however, that he holds the king of hearts and if you contract for a spade slam you are subject to

the loss of two tricks at once. Our suggestion, therefore, is to contract for slam in no trump, permitting partner to play the hand and protect his king of hearts.

Q. 5—Both vulnerable, as South you hold:  
♠KQ105 ♣AJ1095 ♠A1074  
The bidding has proceeded: West North East South 1♠ 2♥ Dble. ?  
What do you bid?  
A.—Redouble. A faux pas has been committed somewhere along the line and we would assume it was by either East or West. It is almost inconceivable that partner will not be able to win eight tricks if the trumps may be basked against him. If West runs, you are in position to punish soundly anything he bids.

Q. 6—Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:  
♠102 ♣33 ○AKQ10 ♠QJ964  
The bidding has proceeded: North East South West 1♥ Pass 2♠ Pass 2♠ Pass 3♦ Pass ?  
What do you bid now?  
A.—Five clubs. You are not in a position to make any stronger bid, recalling that, since partner has a singleton diamond your KQ of diamonds may prove to be duplication of values.

Q. 7—East-West vulnerable, as South you hold:  
♠553 ♣KQJ862 ♠KJ94  
The bidding has proceeded: North East South West 1♦ Pass 1♥ 1♠ Dble. Pass ?  
What do you bid now?  
A.—The quest for game should be abandoned in favor of gathering rouble. The holding of three trumps in the suit that partner has doubled makes it highly probable that West's dummy will be completely lacking in trumps. A pass is, therefore, indicated.

Q. 8—As South, vulnerable, you hold:  
♠KJ9 ♣AK74 ○732 ♠742  
The bidding has proceeded: North East South West 1♦ Pass 1♥ Pass 1♠ Pass ?  
What do you bid now?  
A.—Our vote is for two spades. There is, of course, a slight objection to raising with only three trumps when partner has presumably shown a four-card suit, but unfortunately there is no other bid available as a progressive step.

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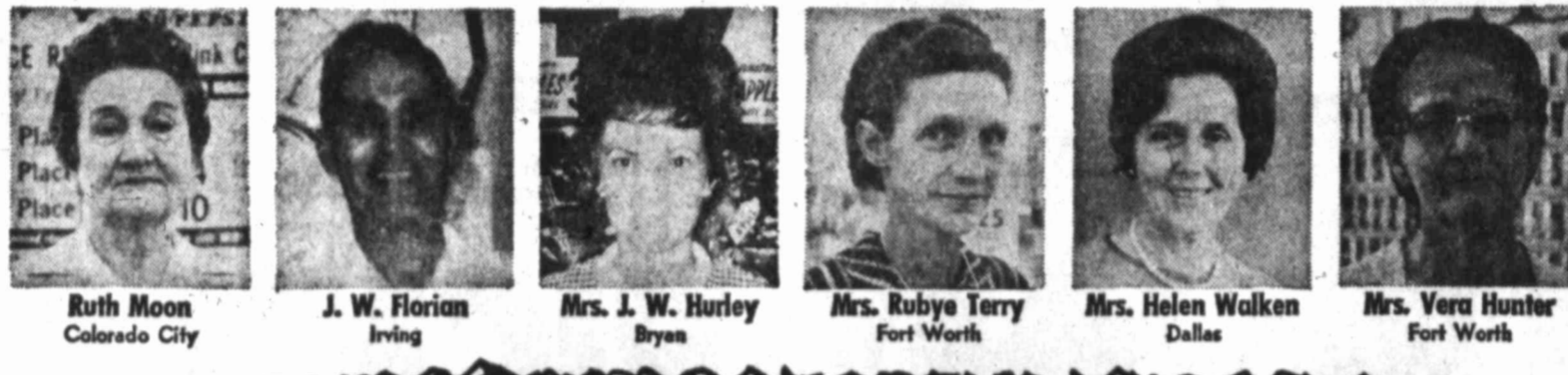

# Texas Violent Deaths Total 37

By The Associated Press

Three multiple-fatality accidents that claimed a total of 10 lives and an outbreak of fire deaths pushed the weekend Texas violent death toll to unusually grim proportions Sunday.

An Associated Press survey showed at least 37 persons dead in violence, including 24 in traffic. Four persons died in fires. The others died in miscellaneous ways, mostly shootings.

The AP survey began at 6 p.m. Friday and ended at midnight Sunday.

**UNLUCKY SEVEN**

Two of the traffic accidents were near San Antonio and killed seven persons. The two wrecks Sunday were separated by less than an hour and 35 miles on US 90 west of the city. Another three-fatality wreck near the

South Texas town of Cypress killed three Louisiana residents. The Cypress crash, involving three automobiles, killed three and injured five.

The dead were Darrell Gene Kately, 21, Mrs. Connie M. Duke, 24, and Mrs. Duke's daughter, Treva Duke, 2 months, all of Jennings. Injured were Mrs. Duke's husband, Raymond Lee Duke, 26, Mabel Chambers, 15, both of Jennings; Jack D. Snipes, 26, of Spring, Tex.; and Donald Ray Allee, 17, and Karen Myers, 16, of Houston. Both were passengers in the Snipes car.

**FOUR FLIPS**

Three men died 40 miles west of San Antonio when their pickup truck lurched out of control for 517 feet and turned over four times. The victims, all from

San Antonio, were Ernesto Gallegos, 26, Anselmo Reyna, 27, and Edwardo Moreno, 29.

Two cars slammed together five miles west of San Antonio on a bridge and then a tractor-trailer truck loaded with grapefruit crashed into the wreckage. Killed were three Trinity University students, Elliott McClung Jr., 21, of Dallas, John Winfree Cochran, 21, of San Antonio and Mexico City, and Charles Hall Richardson, 21, of San Antonio, and James Bendele, 20, a National Guardsman from San Antonio.

**SHOT TO DEATH**

Critically injured were another Trinity student, Jack Sochse, 21, of Electra, and Eugene Anthony Decock, 20, also a National Guardsman from San Antonio.

The truck driver, James Peavy of Tampa, Fla., escaped injury. His heavy rig knocked one car off the bridge and then toppled onto the vehicle in the creek bed below.

Albert Scott Jr., 26, of Fort Worth, was shot to death Saturday night at a Fort Worth residence.

A Weslaco woman, Jewel Smith, 79, was killed in a two-car wreck late Saturday on a farm road six miles north of Weslaco.

**TRAIN SMASH**

A Belton man was killed early Sunday when his car flipped over near Holland in the Belton area. He was George Smith, 38.

Alonzo Wayne Aguirre, 19, was

killed and Tony Alvarado, 18, was injured when their car struck a train at Brownwood early Saturday morning.

Allen Augustus Sanford, 41, of Gladewater, a construction worker, died at Dallas early Saturday when fire swept through a residence.

Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Holmes, both 69, of Highlands were killed Saturday when their car and a truck collided at an intersection in northwest Harris County.

## 'Pinball' Satellite Shot Heralds Busy Space Week

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — A multi-purpose "pinball" satellite soared around the globe today as a successful herald to one of America's busiest space weeks.

The new ATS 3, for applications technology satellite, rocketed into orbit from Cape Kennedy Sunday night to test systems that might eventually provide man with greater benefits from space.

Included are new experiments in communications, weather prediction and navigation.

ATS 3 is one of four U.S. space shots scheduled this week. Also on tap are:

—Surveyor 8, set to blast-off from the Cape at 2:22 a.m. (EST) Tuesday on a planned 65-hour flight to the moon. The spacecraft is intended to land in a potential astronaut landing site near the center of the

moon's surface to snap photographs and analyze the lunar soil.

—ESSA 6, another in a series of operational weather-study satellites, to be launched Wednesday from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.

**STEEL BALLS**

—A mammoth Saturn 5 rocket, like that which will one day propel astronauts to the moon, to undergo its first test launching Thursday from the Cape. The rocket, largest, most powerful ever built, is to boost an unmanned Apollo moonship 11,400 miles into space.

## Big Turnout Expected For All-Region Choir

Among equipment for the satellite's 18 experiments are three shiny, baseball-size steel balls which give it the "pinball" nickname.

At a future date, the three balls are to be ejected from the payload in a navigation test. Sensors aboard the satellite are to determine if the balls instead of stars can be used as navigation aids for far-out manned and unmanned space vehicles.

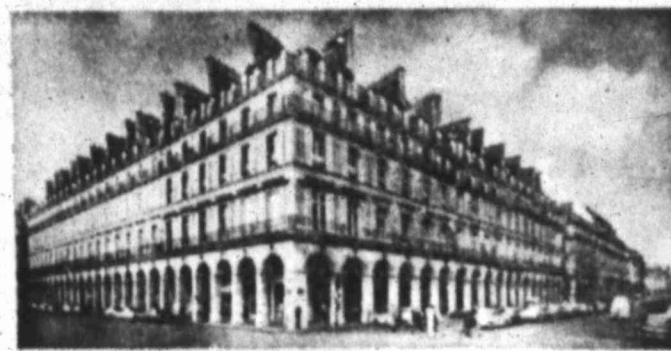

## Postseason Bowl Pictures Gradually Come Into Focus

Unbeaten North Carolina State and strong-coming Penn State clash head-on this week while top-ranked Southern California and surprise Minnesota face formidable rivals in games certain to affect the national rankings and the postseason bowl picture.  
 All major bowl spots are still up in the air, with less than a month to play remaining. Here is the situation:  
 Rose Bowl — Southern Cal (8-0) or UCLA (6-0-1) vs. Indiana (7-0) or Minnesota (6-1).  
 Orange Bowl — Tennessee (5-1) and Oklahoma (5-1) said to have the inside track and both Miami inclined.  
 Cotton Bowl — Texas (5-2), Texas A&M (4-4) or Texas Tech (4-3) the host against possibly the Penn State (5-2)-N. C. State (8-0) winner.  
 Sugar Bowl — Alabama (5-1-1) or Georgia (5-2) vs. Miami of Florida (5-2) at one of the leading teams of the Southwest Conference.  
 Gator Bowl — Penn State, N.C. State and Texas Tech are prime candidates, depending on performances the last weeks of the season.  
 The host spot in the Rose Bowl and probably the national championship will be decided in the nationally televised USC-UCLA game at Los Angeles Nov. 18. But Southern Cal this week must contend with giant-killer Oregon State, the team that beat Purdue and tied UCLA

(16-16), and UCLA must take on tough Washington.  
 With powerful Purdue ineligible to return, the Big Ten role at Pasadena will be borne by the Minnesota Gophers or the Indiana Hoosiers, who play each other Nov. 18. Minnesota meets Purdue Saturday, Indiana takes on Michigan State.  
 Tennessee, rated the best team in the bowl-conscious South, is reported favoring a trip to Miami — and Orange Bowl officials are delighted — while competition likely will come from Oklahoma, which could virtually sew up the Big Eight crown by beating Iowa State Saturday.  
 The Cotton Bowl must await the outcome of the tight Southwest Conference race. The title may hinge on the Texas-Texas A&M traditional head-knocker

Nov. 23 but Texas Tech, with a 3-1 mark in the league, still can demand to be counted.  
 The Cotton Bowl is expected to look to the East or tropical Florida for an opponent and probably will make strong overtures to the winner of the N.C. State-Penn State game at State College, Pa., and Miami of Florida, if the latter can beat Notre Dame Nov. 24.

## Unitas' Footrace Helps Colts Win

 Green Bay turned back the clock on Johnny Unitas, but Unitas turned the tables on the Packers.  
 Unitas, who fumbled away Baltimore's last hope for the title when the Packers caught him on the run, won a frantic fourth-down footrace in Sunday's rematch and then pitched the unbeaten Colts to a 13-10 comeback triumph over the defending NFL champs.  
 With less than two minutes to play and the Colts behind 10-0, Unitas, forced out of his pass-pocket by the Packer rush, scrambled through a patch of daylight and picked up six vital yards for a first down on the Green Bay 23-yard line.  
 On the next play, the magnificent quarterback fired a touchdown strike to Willie Richardson, ending the Colts' five-game losing streak against Green Bay and keeping them atop the NFL's Central Division with a 6-0-2 mark.  
 Unitas' second TD pass in the final 2 1/2 minutes — after rookie Rich Volk recovered Lou Michaels' onside kick — averaged a 14-10 loss to the Packers at Baltimore last Dec. 10 — a loss that eliminated the Colts from the Western Conference race.  
**OTHER GAMES**  
 In Sunday's other games, Los Angeles remained one game behind the Colts in the Coastal race by trimming San Francisco 17-7; Cleveland buried Pittsburgh 34-14; St. Louis outscored Washington 27-21; New Orleans whipped Philadelphia 31-24 for its first NFL victory; Minnesota overtook New York 27-24 and Chicago bounced Detroit 27-13, and Dallas beat Atlanta 37-7.  
 The Rams, 5-1-2, spotted San Francisco a 7-0 first quarter lead, then shut out the 49ers while quarterback Roman Gabriel led the counter-attack. Gabriel set up one touchdown with a 54-yard pass to Jack Snow and flipped three yards to Les Josephson for another score.  
 Frank Ryan, playing despite injuries for the eighth straight week, fired first quarter TD passes to Gary Collins and Leroy Kelly and guided Cleveland to a 31-7 third-period bulge over the Steelers before bowing out.  
**INTERCEPTION**  
 Larry Wilson intercepted a pass on his one-yard line and raced 44 yards to set up the first of two St. Louis scores in the final 15 minutes. Jim Hart followed Wilson's runback with a 35-yard pass to Jackie Smith before diving the last yard to put the Cards in front for good.  
 Walter "The Flea" Roberts bolted 91 yards with the opening kickoff for one touchdown, zipped 27 yards for another after picking up teammate Jim Taylor's fumble and scored a third on a 49-yard pass from Gary Cuozzo, leading New Orleans' expansion Saints out of a seven-game skid.  
 Fred Cox' 13-yard field goal with 10 seconds to play capped Minnesota's second half comeback against New York. The Giants squandered a 24-7 lead and fumbled away a chance for a tie-breaking FG less than two minutes before Cox booted the winner.  
 Gale Sayers scored on a 97-yard kickoff return and sped 43 yards to set up another touchdown, pacing the Bears to their second victory of the season over Detroit.

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## Don Peps Dallas, But Reeves Does The Damage

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Dan Reeves, pro football's noted free agent, had another big day Sunday when he caught two passes for touchdowns and ran for two more as the Dallas Cowboys moved two full games ahead in the Capitol Division of the National Football League.  
 He was the big man in Dallas' 37-7 victory over Atlanta in a game that showed several things:  
 1. That there are jewels among free agents if the scouts look closely enough.  
 2. That Dallas picks up in strength by just having Dan Meredith in the lineup.  
 3. That Don Perkins is one of football's greatest runners. He became the 10th man to ever go over 5,000 yards when he romped to 111 against Atlanta. His total is 5,063 for seven years.  
 4. That any club in pro football would do handsprings to get a linebacker like Tommy Nobis of Atlanta.  
 Reeves, the man from South Carolina signed by Dallas three years ago when no one felt he was worth drafting, teamed up with Meredith to form a dazzling pass combination. It already was known that he could run. He showed that last year.  
 Reeves not only scored four touchdowns but helped set them up. His 15-yard run kept a drive going on the first Dallas touchdown made on a 60-yard pass from Meredith.  
 The other Dallas touchdown was on a pass interception by Lee Roy Jordan, who ran it back 33 yards.  
 The Dallas defense was never finer, harassing Randy Johnson into three interceptions and throwing him for 22 yards in losses, recovering two fumbles, and limiting Atlanta's ground attack to 66 yards.  
 Meredith showed the effects of a three-game layoff because of injuries, wasn't too sharp with his passing and did no running at all. His presence was enough to fire the Cowboys toward the offensive form Coach Tom Landry talks so much about.  
 It was easy to keep up with Nobis. When a tackle was made he was either in on it or had set it up. He got 10 for the day and assisted on eight others.

## Super Chiefs Get Back On The Track

 The Kansas City Chiefs, pulled by their mighty little engine, appear on the track again and picking up steam, looking more and more like the Super Chiefs of 1966.  
 Still hopeful of another shot at the Super Bowl, the once-faltering American Football League defending champions ran over the New York Jets 42-18 Sunday after crushing Denver last Sunday.  
 The victory enable the Chiefs to hold their ground against the "Discos," the teams ahead of them in the Western Division.  
 Oakland raised its record to 7-1, but did not resemble any of the teams in huffing and puffing by Denver 21-17. San Diego was idle.  
 In the other AFL contests, Boston kept Houston off the Jets' back by slowing down the Oilers 18-7, while Buffalo got back on the track against Miami 25-13.  
 Kansas City lay sidetracked with a 2-3 record two weeks ago after two straight losses before Mike Garrett, their 5-foot-9, 190-pound dynamo, moved it into high gear.  
 Oakland had a much tougher time against Denver. Two Daryle Lamonica to Bill Miller TD passes and two George Blanda field goals provided a 21-7 Oakland lead late in the third quarter before the Broncos came alive.  
 "This was a long way from one of our better games," Oakland coach John Rauch admitted. "Still, we had it on offense and defense when we needed it."  
 Houston, 4-3-1, missed its chance to tie the Jets as its vaunted defense held Boston to three Gino Cappellelli field goals and a safety until late in the final period, but could set up only one Oiler TD. That came after recovering a Boston fumble that led to a 45-yard scoring march that closed the gap to 11-7.  
 Buffalo, winning only the third time in eight tries, ran up its biggest point total of the season as Wray Carlton ran 15 times for 97 yards and two touchdowns.

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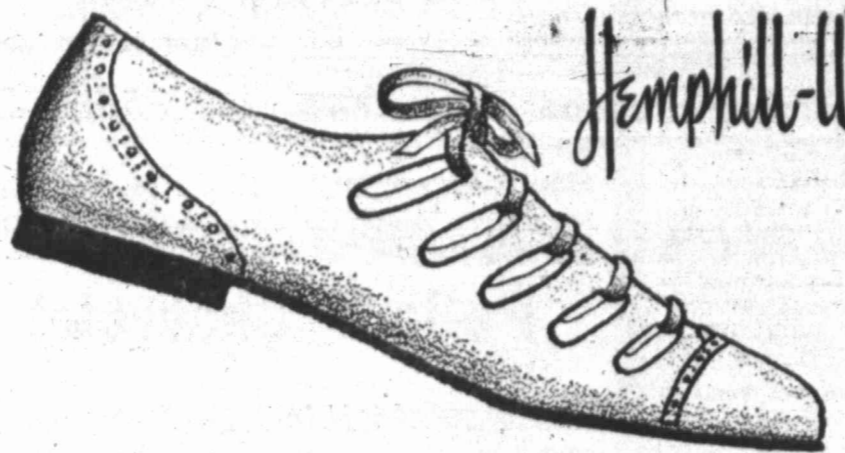
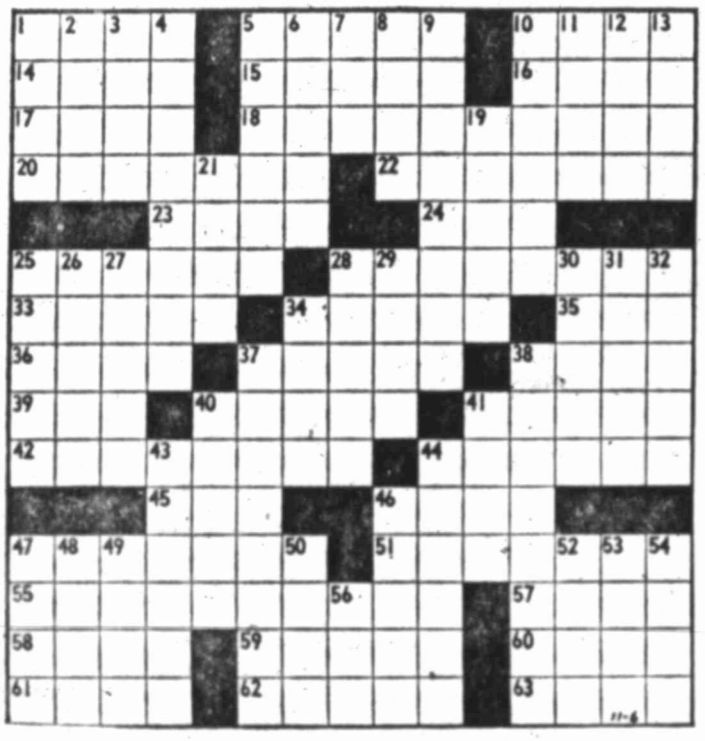

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## Nixon Says He Must Win Four

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard M. Nixon has told some Republican leaders he thinks he'll have to win all of the first four presidential primaries next year to keep alive his chance for the GOP presidential nomination.

In discussions with Republican governors who support he has been seeking, the former vice president has made it clear he thinks only a surge in the primaries will make him a top contender in a convention he has predicted will be wide open.

The first four primaries include New Hampshire on March 12, Wisconsin on April 2, Indiana on May 7 and Nebraska on May 14. Two later primaries fall on May 28 in Oregon and June 4 in South Dakota.

**EARLY LEAD**  
 In the first four of these contests, Nixon is regarded as holding an early lead over Michigan Gov. George Romney and others whose names may be on the ballot. Romney is a certain entry in New Hampshire if he tosses his hat into the ring at a scheduled Nov. 18 Michigan meeting.

California Gov. Ronald Reagan, who wants his state's favorite-son designation, has said he will act to keep his name off the New Hampshire ballot. But a write-in campaign is being organized for him that could take votes away from Nixon.

## Dairy Herds Dip Continues

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's dairy herds are continuing to decline, the Agriculture Department says.

In an outlook report, the department said 1968 milk production is expected to continue at this year's reduced level with prices and returns to dairy farmers remaining about the same.

"Milk cow numbers may continue to decline in 1968 at about the same rate as in 1967. A continued firm beef-cattle market and favorable off-farm opportunities will encourage cow culling and sale of dairy herds," the department said.

**BETTER BREEDING**  
 Dairy cow numbers have declined about 4 per cent this year, the department reports.

The decrease in numbers has been largely offset, where milk production is concerned, by an increase in output per cow. This increase reflects better breeding operations, culling of lower producing animals and better feeding and care.

The report estimated that cash receipts from milk sales this year will be a record \$5.5 billion. But production costs have increased to limit net returns.

**INCOMES RISE**  
 Stocks of dairy products are expected to total more than 8 billion pounds at the end of 1967, compared with 4.8 billion pounds a year earlier. Most of these stocks will be held by the department under price support operations.

The report said commercial use of milk in all products this year is falling about 5 billion pounds below 1966.

However, commercial disappearance in 1968 may resume the upward trend of past years, since population and personal incomes are rising and retail dairy prices are expected to change little from 1967 levels," the department said.

## 'Black-White' Show Sheds Light, Heat

NEW YORK (AP) — "PBL," the experimental series underwritten by a Ford Foundation grant and broadcast Sunday night on a special network of educational stations across the nation, devoted all of its time to a "black-white dialogue." It was touchy, controversial and undoubtedly stepped on toes, but it succeeded in shedding some light as well as heat.

**'WHITE POWER'**  
 The program set the stage for a recapitulation of political campaigns where race is an issue—in Gary, Ind., Cleveland, Ohio, and Boston, Mass. Then it moved into the high point of the program: a filmed "confrontation" of Chicago Negroes and whites. There opinion, emotion-charged, ranged from hostile threats by Black Power exponents to one angry white woman who exploded in exasperation with, "I want white power."

A vocal, tough-talking Negro, Russ Meek, earlier had done the narration of a film made in the Chicago slums under his direction. His fury and hatred spewed out then and even more during the "confrontation." One Negro woman who had started with calm reason was so stung by a white woman's talk of integration that she retorted, "I've been integrating too long. I've got these freckles and red hair as the result of the rape of my great-grandmother . . ."

**BITTER SATIRE**  
 While the talk, often jumbled as many spoke at one time, was more emotional than reasoned, the confrontation was exciting television.

Actually, neither Negroes nor whites made good cases for their causes.

The final portion of the program was devoted to a play, "Day of Absence," performed by a company of Negroes in white face—a minstrel show in reverse. This told in bitter, broad satire the calamity that befell a Southern town when suddenly all its Negroes disappeared. No menial jobs were performed, and it painted an ugly picture of incompetent, foolish whites. Although it made its point very quickly, the play went on and on.

**'MAYA' AXED**  
 There were occasional breaks in the program for local station identification, and twice there was a break called "a word for the consumer." These breaks were in the form of commercials, but one told viewers that

the least expensive pain killer was as effective as the expensive kind and the other that long cigarettes contain harmful ingredients. They were the sole glimmers of humor in the two and one-half hours, and the humor in them was certainly on the skimpy side.

The program was too long—the play could have been cut sharply—and tended to be heavy-handed. But it was an interesting, ambitious beginning. And it certainly was not bland.

NBC will cancel "Maya," the child-oriented action series filmed in India some time in February. The show suffered from low ratings.

**'CANT WIN'**  
 Politicians agree it is too early to chart the likely winner in Oregon. They feel, however, that as a West Coast governor, Reagan will have strong support in the state. Romney's strength there is untested.

Nixon carried Oregon, along with New Hampshire, Wisconsin, Indiana, Nebraska and South Dakota in his losing 1960 race for the presidency with John F. Kennedy. But eight years have made some changes that are difficult for the political strategists to compute.

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
