**HAVING JUST COMPLETED** a successful wheat harvest, our area's farmers have been given a shot in the arm, and things may be looking up from the agricultural standpoint for 1979.

For once, farmers who made good yields on a crop also got a good price in the case of the wheat farmers. Wheat sold for roughly a dollar per bushel more than it had in 1978, when the yields were also down.

At the present time, the price of corn and maize is good, and those crops are off to a good start in Parmer County. With the expectancy that there may be a grain deal made with Russia sometime during the year, this may help the price of grain remain at a good level for 1979. It is known that the Russian wheat crop fell far below the level needed to feed their population.

ON OUR RECENT trip to Tennessee, we came across an unusual solution to the energy crunch, and wonder why this angle can't be used across the country.

Having seen government offices such as post offices with their thermostats set at the 80-degree mark, we were somewhat surprised while visiting the state capitol in Nashville to note that the air conditioners were running full blast. In the state archives, in fact, it was almost "too cool."

Our guide for the day explained that the state of Tennessee has a system of reclaiming trash, burning it to produce the energy needed to fuel the heating and cooling systems for all of the state office buildings.

We thought this was an excellent idea, and solves two problems at once. Everyone has trash; in fact the problem in many of our metropolitan and/or urban areas is how to dispose of the trash. A system such as the one we were told about in Nashville should prove worth its salt in such areas.

CONCERNING THE ENERGY crunch, and the present effort on behalf of the president to come up with a positive energy program, we wholeheartedly agree with the critics who complain because the president has failed to include someone from the major energy-producing states, such as Texas, in his current "energy task force."

"It sort of goes along with the usual 'Washington Syndrome,'" states Texas governor Bill Clements. According to Clements, this is the rule which is stated as follows: "If you know anything about a problem, you can't have anything to do with helping to solve it."

We have to agree with Clements that this often is the case where the government is concerned.

TAKE, FOR INSTANCE the latest faux pas, one of the most ridiculous "solutions" which our fearless leaders have come up with in years. We are referring to the new dollar coins, which are virtually exactly the same size as quarter coins.

The mint people supposedly set out to provide a coin which would give more wear than the paper dollar bill, hence saving the taxpayers' money.

There is only one problem—the new coin by its very design and size is confusing, and has already proven so. We already have encountered people who have received the dollar coins in change, when they should have received quarters. Many businesses across the nation have adopted a "no dollar coin" rule, since they confuse, rather than help.

You would think that the new coin was the result of an eighth-grade civics class, rather than an agency of government. No, come to think of it, you would expect eighth graders to have more horse sense.

PRAIRIE ACRES hit a milestone this week, when the resident total reached 59. This is an all-time high for the local facility.

Although the capacity of Prairie Acres is listed at 60, this is not always obtainable, since you have to have the

## Friona Will Host L'il League Meet

Friona will be host Monday and Tuesday, July 16-17 for the district Little League all-star tournament. It is thought to be the first time the tournament, for boys 11 and 12 years of age, has been held in Friona.

On Monday, Friona will meet Dimmitt in a game to begin at 6 p.m. This game will be followed by a game between South Randall County and the Bovina all-stars. The winners of the two games will meet at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the single-elimination tournament.

The winner of the Friona tournament will advance to the Little League regional tournament at Borger beginning July 23.

Members of the Friona all-stars are Charlie Morgan, Brian Lane, Ricky Barnett, Joe Ballero, Roy Dominguez, Robert Davila, Cody Scott, Ted Prosser, Johnny Trevino, Gerald Kothmann, Rodney Allen,

Larry Fallwell is coach of the all-stars. He is assisted by Bobby Drake and Mitchell Smiley.

During the past year, improvements in the Little League (East) Park were made, costing over \$7,000. This was done so that the park would conform to requirements, and make it qualify for official Little League playoff games.

Included in the remodeling program were installation of new lights. Also, the fence was taken down and replaced, enlarging the field slightly.

Local officials of the Friona Little League are proud to be hosting the district tournament, and they encourage everyone to attend the playoff games on Monday and Tuesday.

## MBPXL Announces Plant Improvements

Approximately a year after the kickoff of the fabricating plant at MBPXL, things are going relatively smoothly, and the work at the plant has been enhanced tremendously.

This was the report this week from Scotty Cronin, manager of the fabricating division of Friona's MBPXL. Cronin also announced that the company was launching a drive to improve the appearance, as well as community relations of the Friona plant.

This week, Cronin was heading the installation of nine state flags, which will be flown each day by the plant. The flags represent the plant and office locations for MBPXL. The giant corporation touches six states with its beef production facilities.

"We would be happy to have a city or school flag denoting Friona, to add to the flag collection," Cronin said.

"We are anxious to be a part of the community and its functions. We had a small part in the fund drive for the new senior citizens center, and were glad to have been contacted," he added. MBPXL has, since it opened in 1968, been a major supporter of the Friona Chamber of Commerce each year.

The company has a bulletin board which is checked by the employees, and clubs and organizations are urged to use the bulletin board to publicize

community events, the MBPXL chief said.

"We do our best to buy whatever we can in Friona stores. The parts houses are making an effort to stock the things we use, and I have noticed that they have a lot more items than they did previously. If local businesses can furnish the things we need, at competitive prices, we would do virtually all of our buying locally," Cronin said.

"We appreciate the cooperation and help of the local business people," Cronin added.

The MBPXL chief pointed out that all plant employees have a personalized identification card, similar to a driver's license, which includes the employee's picture. Anytime a local merchant is asked to cash an MBPXL paycheck, he should ask to see the ID card if there is any

reason to be suspicious.

"Every plant employee has an ID card, and the pictures contained on the card will have been taken within the past six or seven months," Cronin said.

Dorothy Blankenship, registered nurse and longtime employee of Parmer County Community Hospital, has been employed by MBPXL as the company's staff nurse. Dorothy has been provided with an office, medical supplies and equipment.

The staff nurse's main duties will be to give physical examinations, which are required for every employee of the plant. "We sometimes have ten to 15 people taking examinations in a day's time, and this was just more than the local hospital could handle, with their

# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

**50 YEARS AGO--JULY 12, 1929**

The City Commission Tuesday morning granted a franchise to the West Texas Gas Company for supplying gas to the city for lights, fuel and power.

The Texas Company, which has been erecting offices and sales building and installing tanks, pumps and pipe lines for the past several weeks, has completed the installation. The company announces that it is now ready for business of dispensing and delivering its varied line of products, including gasoline, kerosene, oils and greases.

**45 YEARS AGO--JULY 13, 1934**

While Everett Talbot and family were enjoying the big 4th of July celebration Wednesday of last week at Palo Duro Canyon, thieves broke into their home north of town and carried away a large number of articles including family apparel and other property.

Arrangements have been completed for the "Musical Grays Big Tent Show" to be in Friona one week starting Monday, July 16. This same show was in Friona last summer.

**40 YEARS AGO--JULY 14, 1939**

Roy Price, who has for the past decade, or nearly so, been operating a jeweler's shop here, informs the Star that he has decided to move his equipment to his home on the farm near Black and discontinue his business here.

The room in the M.A. Crum building, which has been vacant since the Regal Theatre moved from it a few weeks ago, is again occupied as a grocery store. The new stock was placed in the store and the store opened for business Monday with Mr. P. Dobbs, formerly of Friona in charge.

**35 YEARS AGO--JULY 14, 1944**

A meeting was held at the Club House on Thursday afternoon, July 6, for the discussion of a proposal to organize what will be known as The Friona Cemetery Association. This was a preliminary meeting of representatives of various civic and religious organizations.

The rate on government wheat loans has been increased seven cents a bushel, it was announced this week at the local AAA office. The newly announced rates are \$1.35 a bushel on

warehouse-stored wheat and \$1.42 a bushel on farm-stored.

**25 YEARS AGO--JULY 9, 1954**

Irrigation well drilling is no longer a seasonal operation in Parmer County, according to committeemen who issue permits here. Fifteen permits were granted at the last meeting. Since the first of the year, 240 irrigation well permits have been issued to Parmer County residents, reports Raymond Euler, Farm Bureau Service representative.

**20 YEARS AGO--JULY 9, 1959**

Winds of tornadic velocity struck the entire Friona area Sunday night accompanied by heavy rains. One tornado was reported about 9:15 p.m. on the J.E. Knight farm about two miles east of Friona. It was reported by Jack Williams, who was combining on the farm immediately before the weather struck.

**15 YEARS AGO--JULY 9, 1964**

The sale of Harry's Supermarket in Friona and Dimmitt was announced this past week. Roy Keith Moore of Chillicothe and Kenneth Moore of Olton purchased the store from Harry Brown of Dimmitt. The two brothers currently operate grocery businesses where they live.

**10 YEARS AGO--JULY 10, 1969**

Mr. and Mrs. Leland Hutson are celebrating the opening of their new

White's Auto Store with a grand opening sale Friday and Saturday. The store is located on West Highway 60 and Highway 214.

The Friona City Council passed Ordinance 424, raising water rates for the city, and establishing a water tap fee and new water deposit fees, during the regular monthly meeting Monday night. The new rates, which will go into effect on September 21 after the annual summer water rates expire, will increase the water bill of Friona residents an estimated five to six per cent on the average.

**5 YEARS AGO--JULY 14, 1974**

Johnny Spring, 14 year old son of Dr. and Mrs. Paul Spring of Friona was injured Sunday while practicing roping a calf during the weekly "playday" activities when he became entangled in the rope and was dragged a considerable distance by his horse.

The Friona area was visited this week by some good rains in some areas, with measurements up to 1.5 inches in places.

Fred Locker, an employee of Longhorn Spraying Service, Lazbuddie, escaped with burns after his spray plane crashed and was totally demolished about three and one-half miles southeast of Lazbuddie Wednesday afternoon.

**Growers Get Cash**

Holly Sugar Corporation announced today it is mailing checks totalling nearly \$960,000 to area sugarbeet growers for sugar produced from the 1978 crop.

This amount brings the total Holly Sugar Corporation has paid area sugarbeet growers to nearly \$10 million. This averages \$476.77 for the grower who grew 20 tons per acre and had 15% sugar.

Marketing of sugar from the 1978 crop will continue until October 1979 when the market year ends. At this time, final settlement is agreed upon by growers' representatives and Holly Sugar Corporation.

The growers furnish the raw product, sugarbeets, which Holly Sugar processes and markets the sugar, then pays growers according to a schedule which is in the sugarbeet purchase contract.

Calvin Jones, agricultural manager at Holly's Hereford plant, said at this point, this year's crop is ahead of previous years.

"Growers need to make every effort to control diseases and insects and push this crop to attain maximum yields," he said. "With irrigation costs increasing, every effort needs to be made to control weeds which use large amounts of water."

Irrigation efficiency for sugarbeets averages nearly .75 tons per acre inch of water. This efficiency can

reach 92 tons of sugarbeets per acre inch under good timely management practices.

The sugarbeet crop got off to a good start this spring, he said, and unusually cool weather late in the season was actually helpful rather than a hindrance to the beets.

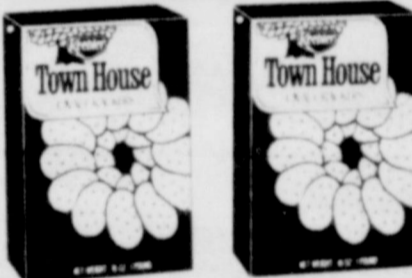

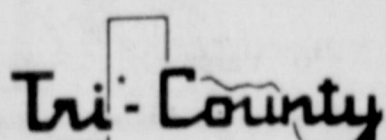

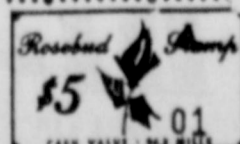

## Parmer's Cotton Yield Tops 25-County Area

Figures released this week by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service (TCLRS) showed that Parmer County had the top yield per harvested acre among 25 High Plains counties for cotton production.

Parmer County's yield per harvested acre amounted to 414 pounds, or .86 bales per acre. Next highest yield figure was in Floyd County, where the average was 398 pounds per acre; Hale, 388 pounds, and Lubbock, 359 pounds.

Lubbock County led the area in total production, with 228,000 bales, followed by Gaines, 172,000; Floyd, 164,900, and Hale, 164,800. The bale figures are based on a 480 pound net bale weight.

Parmer County had a planted cotton acreage of 57,500 during 1978, and harvested 50,700 acres. The county's running bale total was 43,700.

Parmer's bale count was an increase over the 1977 figure. The totals for 1978 were somewhat late being tabulated, due to the fact that the cotton harvest was not complete in the area until February, being delayed by weather.

Despite early-season problems, the 1979 county cotton acreage will be a modern record, according to Prentice Mills of the ASCS office.

"We had planted 77,000 acres of cotton to begin with, but lost about 17,000 acres due to weather, so that around 60,000 acres are still standing," Mills said this week.

The ASCS official estimated that at the present time, approximately 15 per cent of the cotton crop was "real good," 50 per cent was "acceptable," and the other 35 per cent was below average.

"But it all depends on the weather from here on. If we have 'cotton weather,' we can still have a good cotton crop," stated the longtime county agriculture specialist.

The 1979 cotton acreage for the county is Parmer County's biggest since the early 1950s, as the crop continues to make a "comeback."

The acreage losses were sustained in May, and were attributed to hail, along with cold, wet weather which caused plant disease for the young plants.

Most of the acreage which was lost has been replanted to sunflowers and soybeans.

The meeting will be a family affair to which everyone is invited. An evening meal will be served to all those attending and special entertainment will be presented by Jan Bunch, ventriloquist from Portales, New Mexico.

Featured speaker for the evening will be Jay I. Naman, President of Texas Farmers Union and established leader in the National Farmers Union organization. Naman, a farmer from the Waco area, has devoted over 15 years to guiding Farmers Union and currently serves as Chairman of the

National Farmers Union Executive Committee.

Farmers, ranchers, businessmen and their families, anyone interested in learning more about Farmers Union are cordially invited to this meeting.

Donaldson, who has served on the reorganizational committee with Joe Bradburn of Bovina and Ricky Bennett of Farwell, says there are 99 family members of the organization in the county group now and it is hoped more families will join.

This committee has worked well over four months in the initial endeavor to recruit members and structure the county organization under the guidance of Texas Farmers Union staff so that a beneficial and active group might be formed to represent the agricultural families of the area.

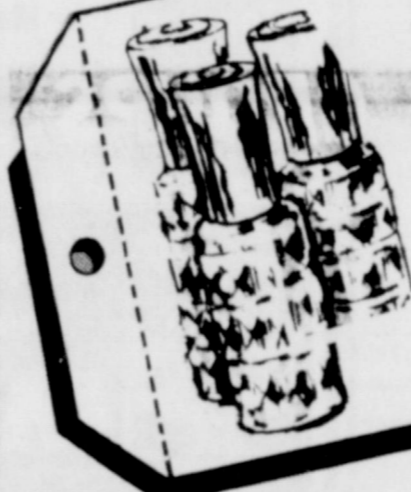

regular load of patients," Cronin said. "We are most happy to have Dorothy in this capacity, and feel that this is a step forward for the company," he added.

MBPXL has also added a hot lunch facility as a part of the new fabricating plant. Since employees have a 30-minute lunch hour, this also has proven to be a good addition. A spacious cafeteria room was included in the new portion of the plant.

With the new fabricating plant in full operation, and with two shifts, MBPXL currently employs over 900 people, making the Friona plant the largest employer in the MBPXL chain.

Concerning the fact that such a large percentage of plant employees live outside of Friona and commute to work each day, the MBPXL officials figure that if housing were available, many of this number would move to Friona.

"I expect that eight to ten of our foremen are now living in Friona. Some are playing in the summer softball league. I think they enjoy living in Friona," Cronin concluded.

The MBPXL official said that at the current time the Friona plant was slaughtering from 1700 to 1800 cattle per day. The local plant did not experience a cutback in employees recently when other plants tightened their belts. Reason that Friona's plant was able to remain stable was cited as the work of the fabricating plant, which does contract work for several large accounts.

## Films Available At Local Library

What is the "reel lowdown" on how to obtain 16 mm films in this area of the world?

Well, you could buy them. You could rent them. Or...you could borrow them through your own local public library.

More than 1000 films are available to users of the Friona Public Library. The films are housed in the Amarillo Public Library and sent to public libraries in the Panhandle as a service of the Texas Panhandle Library System. The service is free of any charge to library users except for the return postage back to Amarillo.

How can you best make use of this service?

Suppose you are charged with arranging a program and you want to show a film. First of all, begin planning early. Over 250 films a month are borrowed by persons outside Amarillo alone, so the chances that you'll be able to get the film(s) you want are higher the earlier you put in your request.

Talk with the librarian and explain what you'd like to do. She will be able to tell you if you are eligible to borrow films and what the library's rules are. One major rule is that you will not be eligible to borrow these films if you are going to charge admission to see them. You must also provide an experienced operator to run the projector.

The Friona Public Library has a copy of the Amarillo Public Library's film catalog. Browse through it and note down the film(s) you'd like to

receive. It's a good idea to choose a couple of alternates in case your first choice isn't available on the date your program is planned.

The librarian will contact the Amarillo library and make the request for you. In about a week, the library will let you know what film has been reserved and when you can pick it up.

After you've shown the film, return it to the library promptly, pay the return postage costs, and the librarian will send it back to Amarillo.

Remember that this service is available only through your local library. If you go to Amarillo and try to borrow films, you will have to pay a \$3.00 per film non-resident fee.

This film program is only one of the many services that the Friona Public Library, as a member of the Texas Panhandle Library System, provides people in your community. Libraries are a lot more than they used to be—if you don't believe it, just go to 111 East Seventh and check it out!

## Postal Users Told Of New Regulations

July 15 is the deadline mailers have to use up small and undersized envelopes and cards, Friona Postmaster Richard Wilson reminds customers.

Starting that date, the Postal Service makes its new size standards effective. Cards and envelopes measuring less than 3 1/2 inches high or 5 inches long will no longer be mailable and will be returned to sender.

Extra large first-class envelopes, more than 6 1/8 by 11 1/2 inches, will incur a 7-cent surcharge if they weigh one ounce or less.

Postmaster Richard Wilson advises these oversized pieces will be returned to the sender if they do not carry the 7-cent surcharge but can be mailed when the surcharge postage is affixed. However, delays for these pieces can be avoided if mailers make sure that sufficient postage has been applied.

The new regulation also will prohibit thin or flimsy cards. After July 15, the cards must be at least seven thousandths (.007) of an inch thick.

"Small envelopes and flimsy cards tend to jam mail processing equipment and cause damage to other mail as well," explained Postmaster Wilson. "The surcharge on oversized or odd-shaped pieces is intended to cover the added cost of handling such pieces which must be processed manually," he said. "These standards have been established to allow the Postal Service to process mail more efficiently and this will mean better service for customers."
