IF YOU SOMETIMES fuss about the mail system in the United States, then we have some news for you. Our much maligned postal service could be worse. In fact, it could be a lot worse, as judged against the Italian mail service.

A news release this week pointed out that the mail in Italy is in an indescribably mess. The situation is so bad that every so often, the country's postal authorities truck the overflow of sacks out of the system's overstocked warehouses and burn them.

"Nobody in Italy sends anything important in the mail these days, anyway," blatantly stated an Italian postal worker, as he watched several hundred thousand unopened packages curl in the flames. "There's nothing in that blaze except silly love letters and advertising."

Since the Italian post office also controls the telegraph service, the natives can't save time by this method. It takes the average telegram four days to reach its destination, if sent within Italy, and longer if it goes outside the country.

A newspaper foreign correspondent compared the Italian mail service to Russian roulette. He related the experience of recently receiving some 70 pieces of mail all at one time. Most of the pile contained bills plus angry past-due notes, some of which were 50 days old.

The Italians ordered sorting machines, similar to those used in the U.S., to read and sort zip-coded mail. But the machines have never been removed from the packing cases in which they arrived, and have been sitting unused for ten years.

So, the next time you don't get the mail you were expecting—take heart. You could have been born in Italy, you know.

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IT IS HARD to realize that Kent Hance, who was sworn in last week as our congressman, is the first graduate of our alma mater, Texas Tech University, to gain the House of Representatives.

Perhaps it's not so unusual when you realize that retired congressman George Mahon had served as the only representative of the 19th district had ever had, from 1934 through 1978, and Mahon's old district covers the area of Texas Tech's influence.

We need to quickly add that when Tech finally produced a congressman, it gained two at once, since Rep. Charles Stenholm of Stamford, representing the 17th district, also was elected to congress last November.

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ON THE SUBJECT of politics, it looks as though politicians may have to be more careful in the future where they campaign, and with whom they appear.

Recent items in the news revealed that Rosalyn Carter campaigned at Jim Jones' People Temple in San Francisco during 1978, and also during that presidential campaign, was photographed with and even autographed a picture for mass murderer John Gacy.

These events do not necessarily imply that the Carters were knowingly associating with people with "hazy" reputations, but it underscores the fact that politicians, even on the presidential level, sometimes are not too choosy about where they go, or with whom they associate when they are seeking votes.

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ANOTHER "mini blizzard" this week! Folks are beginning to wonder what we did to incur the wrath of the weatherman. Especially certain cotton farmers, who have had an unusually hard time getting their crops harvested.

Tractorcade Enters Last Lap Of Trip

The American Agriculture Movement's tractorcade was moving steadily along this week, and had reached eastern Tennessee by the Star's deadline on Friday. Barring unforeseen delays, the tractorcade should reach Washington, D.C. by Friday of next week.

The caravan had gained to over 500 vehicles from the 175 which left Bushland the morning of January 15. The tractorcade has averaged something over 100 miles per day.

"We have seen the most water we ever saw in our life while crossing Tennessee," said a spokesman for the AAM who contacted the Star, adding "In fact, you get to see just about everything when you're traveling along at 15 to 18 miles per hour!"

The group is hoping for more support from the local AAM members when they arrive in Washington. A number of farmers who did not make the slow tractorcade are expected to fly up and meet the group, to lend their support to the movement.

Members of the tractorcade continue to be gratified at the support they are receiving along the way. Thursday night was spent in Crossville, Tennessee, where the local implement dealers sent mechanics around to each tractor, to see if anyone needed repairs.

"At most of the towns, people have been lining the streets as we pass through, waving American flags, and wishing us luck. It has been very heart-warming," the AAM leader reported Friday.

On Monday of the past week, the group reached the Mississippi River, camping on the Arkansas side.

"They had sunshine on Monday for virtually the first time since leaving the Texas Panhandle. The weather has not been bad, but they have been travelling in fog and drizzle much of the way," a spokesman for the state AAM office said.

On Wednesday, the caravan reached Nashville, Tenn., where some of the Country and Western stars who were in town turned out for a free show on behalf of the American Agriculture movement, at the fairgrounds. Muri Kilgore served as master of ceremonies.

Included in the vehicles making the trip are tractors, repair trucks, and pickups carrying diesel fuel.

At least six separate caravans in the national tractorcade are known to be moving toward the nation's

capital, where the farm leaders plan to demonstrate for congressional support of the farmers.

The group that left Bushland, which is designated as "Route 2," had taken seven overnight rest stops as of Tuesday.

Overnight stops had been made in Sayre, El Reno, Okemah and Salisaw, Oklahoma, Russellville, Little Rock and Memphis, Arkansas, Granville, Nashville and Crossville, Tennessee.

During the Sunday stopover in Little Rock, the group camped at the State Fairgrounds, and held church services on Sunday in one of the fairgrounds buildings. One of the members of the AAM group, who is a lay preacher, held the service, which was well-attended.

Ralph Roming contacted the Star Tuesday morning, and praised the help and support the caravan had received both from state and local police, as well as motorists and residents they encounter along the way.

"The police have gone out of their way to help us. They have saved us bottlenecks, such as at Memphis, where there was a road under

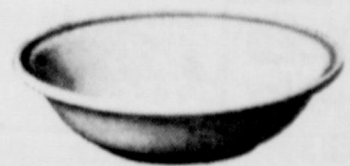

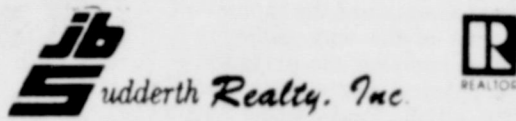

The Friona Chieftain basketballers played a pair of close District 3-AA games during the past week, winning one and losing to tough Morton on the road, in spite of a sterling shooting performance.

The Chiefs came from behind in a slow-moving cold shooting game against Olton, for a 41-38 win at home on Friday.

Then on Tuesday, in a game that was just the opposite type, Friona had perhaps their best shooting game of the year, hitting 55 per cent of their shots from the field, only to lose to an even hotter Morton team, 71-68.

Coach Jim Pope had nothing but praise for his team's performance at Morton. "The Morton coach told me it was by far their best game of the season. They hit an incredible 80 per cent of their field goals in one quarter," Pope said.

The Friona coach pointed out that even with Morton's unreal shooting statistics, the Indians outscored the Chiefs by just one field goal, 29-28, and one free throw, 13-12, during the game.

The junior varsity Squaws scored a pair of District 3-AA wins during the past week, beating Olton, 34-24, and Morton, 43-27.

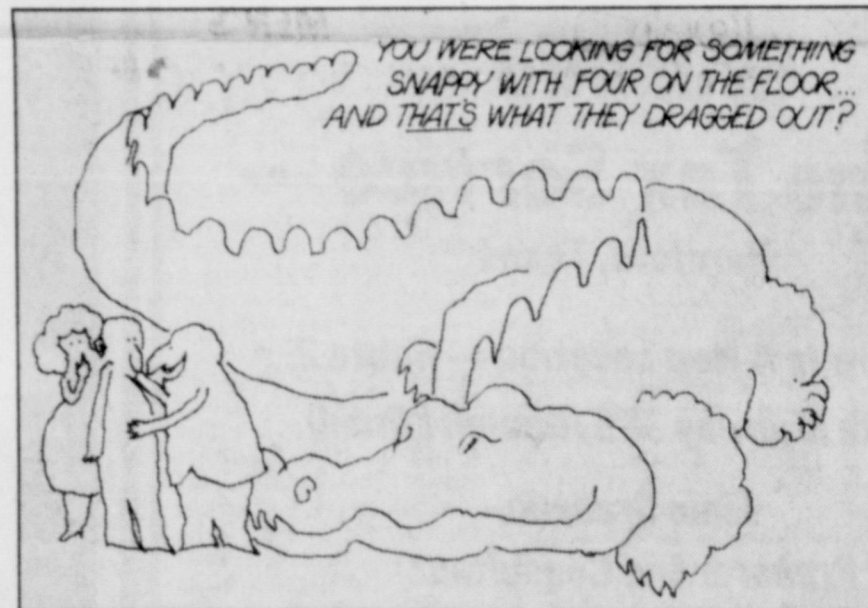

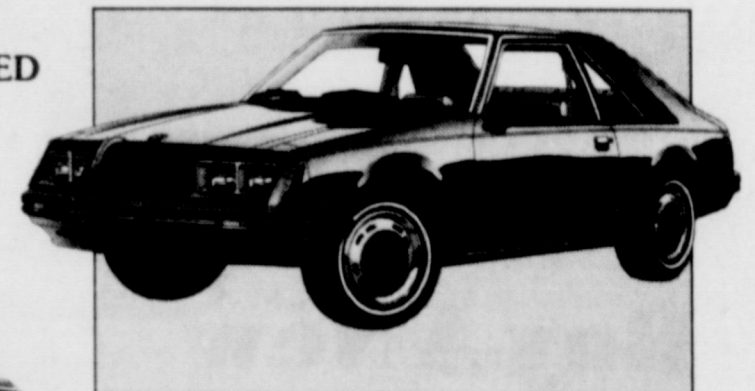

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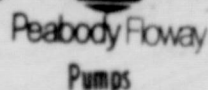

Residents Warned Ice Play Dangerous

As winter's cold forms a layer of ice on ponds and lakes, children are filled with visions of their northern and western neighbors enjoying winter sports. The novelty of ice, however, lures many youngsters to their death.

"Ponds around here seldom freeze

thick enough to support the weight of even small children," Mack Mauldin, district conservationist with the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in Friona, said.

The most dangerous ponds, he stressed, are those that freeze fairly thick in areas around the edges.

W-2 Forms Due Jan. 31

Employers must provide their employees with completed Wage and Tax Statements for 1978 by Wednesday, January 31, 1979, the Internal Revenue Service said.

If a Wage and Tax Statement is not received by January 31, an employer should contact his or her employer first, according to the IRS. After February 15, the employee should contact a local IRS office.

By not issuing Wage and Tax Statements on time, employers must be penalizing employees who will have to wait until February or later to file their tax returns, possibly missing out on the quick refunds available to early filers.

Employees who do not receive their Wage and Tax Statements must still file by the tax deadline. These individuals should report of their income and attach a statement explaining tax computations for the missing wage and tax statement information, the IRS said. These individuals may also use Form 4852, "Employee's Substitute Wage and Tax Statement," which can be obtained free from most IRS offices.

"Usually the down-wind edge of the pond will freeze first, and the ice may support a large person for several feet from the edge in that area. But, over deeper water and on the up-wind side of the pond, the ice is usually very thin," Mauldin continues.

There is no really safe ice thickness for skating, according to the National Safety Council, because ice conditions are always changing. For example, four inches of new ice can support more weight than four inches of "old ice" that has been subjected to the effects of the sun, refreezing after thawing, wind, and changing water levels under the ice.

Realizing how hard it is to curb the natural curiosity in children, Mack suggested that children be made aware of the dangers of thin ice. He has warning posters available free of charge for this purpose.

Also, children should be taught rescue techniques.

"Some pond owners keep a life ring or other flotation device attached to a long rope handy at the pond. A long pole can also be used to rescue victims of broken ice," Mack said. "If you must go onto the ice to help a drowning person, be sure to use a large board, ladder, pole, or sheet of plywood to distribute your weight. If none is available, lie prone on the ice and slide gently.
