SEVERE TERMS IN TEXAS' DRY LAW

PROVISIONS OF DEAN BILL MAKE GRAVE OFFENSE TO HANDLE ANY INTOXICANT.

Dallas.—Under the new Texas prohibition law, passed by the recent session of the Texas legislature and effective 90 days after adjournment, it is for corporations a \$500 fine for each offense and for individuals a felony, punishable by one to five years' confinement in the penitentiary, to:

"Directly or indirectly, manufacture, sell, barter, exchange, transport, export, receive, deliver, solicit, take orders for, furnish or possess any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication, or any other intoxicant whatever, or any potable (that is, drinkable) liquor, mixture or preparation containing in excess of 1 per cent alcohol by volume, or any equipment for making such liquors, except for medicinal, mechanical, scientific or sacramental purposes."

However, "the provisions of this act shall not prohibit the possession of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes, for use by the owner and members of his family, or bona fide guests, in a bona residence, if such liquors were purchased and deposited in such residence before this act goes into effect."

The prohibited liquors, the manufacture, sale, possession, transportation, etc., of which will be a felony except for the exempted purposes, are defined as "all distilled malt, spirituous, vinous, fermented or alcoholic liquors and compounds, whether medicated, proprietary, patented or not, and by whatever name called, which require a federal tax as a beverage, or which contain more alcohol than is necessary to extract the medicinal properties of the drug contained in such preparation and to hold the medicinal agents in solution and preserve same."

Exemption is given medicines "which are manufactured and sold for legitimate and lawful purposes and not as beverages." It is also permissible to manufacture and sell "bona fide alcoholic toilet or antiseptic preparations or flavoring extracts which do not require the payment of a federal tax as a beverage, and which contain no more alcohol than is necessary for the extraction, solution and preservation of the agents contained therein and which are manufactured and sold for legitimate and lawful purposes and not as beverages."

Combating High Food Prices.

Dallas.—The widespread interest throughout the state in the movement of Dallas women to combat the high cost of food products has caused Mrs. B. V. Samuell, chairman of the organization committee of the Dallas consumers' league, to send out a blanket invitation to Texas towns and cities to send representatives to the meeting to be held in this city next Thursday.

All Foreign Credits Secured.

Washington.—Every dollar of loans and credits advanced by the United States to foreign countries, including Russia, is amply protected by securities and will be paid in full, R. C. Leffingwell, assistant secretary of the treasury told the house committee on expenditures in the state department.

Seamen's Strike Terms Agreed On.

New York.—Terms for settlement of the seamen's strike, which has tied up shipping from Portland, Maine, to Galveston, Texas, have been agreed upon by representatives of the United States shipping board, the American Steamship association and the International Seamen's union.

Wants Trade Restrictions Extended.

London.—It is impossible at present to give legislative effect to the government's trade policy, Premier Lloyd George says. He suggested that the trade restrictions expiring in September should therefore be extended.

Sailings From Liverpool Are Canceled.

Liverpool.—The strike among the dock workers, has resulted in bringing about chaos in the arrangements for handling more than two hundred ships at this port, their sailings being canceled or indefinitely postponed.

Right of Way for Interurban.

Dallas.—Right of way for the Dallas-Wichita Falls interurban has been procured through Denton, Clay and Montague counties, according to advice furnished stockholders of the company.

Peach Shippers Given Facilities.

Washington.—The railroad administration has instructed Texas agents to place at the disposal of peach shippers at Bowie, Texas, sufficient equipment and facilities to care for the crop.

TAX RATE FIXED AT 75 CENTS ON THE \$100

RECORD IS ESTABLISHED IN HIGH RATE ANNOUNCED BY AUTOMATIC TAX BOARD.

Austin, Texas.—The state tax rate for this year is 75c on each \$100 of assessed valuation. It was fixed at that figure by the state automatic tax board, consisting of the governor, comptroller and state treasurer, being divided as follows: Ad valorem for general purposes, 53c; for schools and free textbooks, 35c; and for pensions, 2c.

The total fixed last year was 55c, being 30c, 20c, and 5c respectively. The assessed values this year were estimated at \$3,100,905,726, as against \$2,022,861,892 last year. It was found that the 1 1/2 per cent gross receipts tax on oil would make a net increase of \$700,000 to general revenue and \$200,000 to the available school fund. It was calculated that the receipts from sources other than the state tax rate would be \$6,060,684, as against \$5,360,684 last year.

The 20c school tax last year netted \$3,036,598. It will be 25c this year, for the first time, and 15c of it may be used to purchase free textbooks under the new law, although not all of that amount may be necessary.

Comptroller Terrell says no man should discount his state warrant, issuing the following statement: "There will be no actual deficit in the treasury during the year 1920 or 1921."

It was disclosed that the new scholastic census gives 1,233,861 children within the scholastic age, an increase over last year of 17,941. The current apportionment is \$7.50 per capita, or a total of \$9,119,400. This year's apportionment will easily be \$7.50, and probably more.

Woodman Insurance on Revised Basis.

Chicago, Ill.—Drastic revision of the Woodmen of the World was brought up in the convention. The readjustment of the insurance system upon a business basis was finally settled with a vote of 164 to 49 after a hot session of debate. Beginning in 1920, the old sovereign camp policies will be abandoned and all insurance will be on the basis of the universal policy system inaugurated two years ago. The organization will retain a lien on the old type of policies, which may be paid off in installments or transferred to the universal system or deducted from the insurance paid beneficiaries.

Two Superships to Be Built.

Washington.—Two gigantic ocean liners, larger than any ships now afloat and designed to cross the Atlantic in four days, are to be built by the shipping board. They will be 1,000 feet long and of thirty knots speed and will be equipped for use as commerce destroyers in the event of war. Announcement was made that plans for the ships had been completed and that work on them would be started in the near future. It is proposed to provide a special terminal for them at Fort Pond Bay, Long Island.

New Party Will Be Formed.

Waco, Texas.—According to Clyde Essex of Cleburne, secretary, the People's Democratic party of Texas contemplates having a ticket in the field next year. Members of this party, he says, will not take part in the primaries next July, but will hold a state convention, probably in Waco, after the primaries have been held at which time a state ticket, including candidates for congress and the legislature, will be nominated.

Road Bonds Sell at 100.8.

Dallas.—Out of four offers submitted, one of them representing a syndicate of six bond houses, the Dallas Trust and Savings bank was the successful bidder for the \$2,100,000 of road bonds issued as this year's installment on the total issue of \$6,500,000 voted at the last election. The price to be paid is approximately 100.8, being par and accrued interest, plus a premium of \$16,380. All of the bids submitted were above par.

French Offer to Buy Properties.

Paris.—France will offer to take over American military property in France, consisting mainly of docks, railways and real estate, at one-fifth of its cost to the Americans, according to a statement given out by Louis Morel, undersecretary of state for the liquidation of stocks. Mr. Morel said that what seemed to be a low offer in reality is liberal, because much of the military construction will be of little value in peace time.

Dallas Flyer Wrecks Plane.

Shreveport, La.—While en route to Dallas from Shreveport, where he has been flying for recruiting purposes, Lieutenant Carlton developed engine trouble at an altitude of about 6,000 feet, but volplaned safely to a corn field near Waskom, Texas. In trying to rise his machine struck a fence and was badly smashed, but the aviator was not hurt.

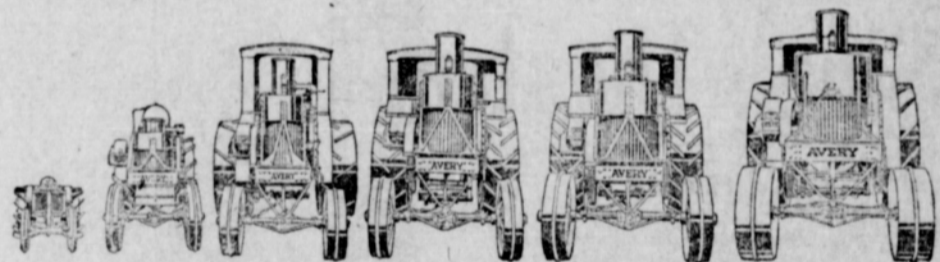

Callahan County, Texas, and Min-
ervia L. Dunaway and her husband, J.
E. Dunaway, who reside in Eastland

county, Texas.

That the plaintiff and T. E. Bran-
don were husband and wife. That
they were married many years ago
and long prior to 1917. That at the
time the plaintiff and T. E. Brandon
were married they owned no prop-
erty whatever, and that since said
marriage they acquired as a result
of their joint efforts, the land here-
in described, and that by reason
thereof said property so became the
community property of the plaintiff
and T. E. Brandon. That T. E.
Brandon is dead. That he departed
this life in the spring of 1919. That
he had never been married except to
this plaintiff. And that there were
no children born to the plaintiff and
T. E. Brandon, and that by reason
thereof the plaintiff, at the death of
T. E. Brandon acquired the entire
right, title and possession of the
lands herein described.

That on or about May 1, 1919,
the plaintiff in her own right was
seized and possessed of the follow-
ing described lands and premises sit-
uated in Callahan County, Texas,
holding and claiming the same in

That plaintiff's husband and her-
self purchased said property by
General Warranty Deed, said deed
being dated April 18, 1917, which
deed was corrected on the same date
by S. E. Short and wife and duly
recorded in the Deed Records of
Callahan County, Texas. The first
deed recorded in Vol. 61, Page 190,
second deed recorded in Vol. 61,
page 75 in the Deed Records of Cal-
lahan County, Texas. That the
said T. E. Brandon pur-
chased said property from Gus
Brandon and wife, as shown by the
said deed first above described.
And that Gus Brandon purchased
said property from E. A. Short of
date September 2, 1914, which deed
was duly recorded in Vol. 54, page
597; Deed Records of Callahan
County, Texas, and that the said
Short duly acquired the title to said

property from S. E. Short, deed
dated December 23, 1912, recorded
in Vol. 63, page 268, Deed Records
of Callahan County, Texas. And
that the said S. E. Short acquired
the title to said property from vari-
ous parties as shown by the deed
from Augustus Priest, et al. to S. E.
Short, dated May 6th, 1911, record-
ed in Book 46, page 342, Deed
Records of Callahan County, Texas,
and by deed from Jasper Kile dated
November 10th, 1909, recorded in
Vol. 46, page 323, deed records of
Callahan County, Texas, and by
deed from M. R. Surles to S. E.
Short dated November 16th, 1909,
recorded in Book 46, page 322, Deed
Records of Callahan County, Texas,
also by deed from M. R. Surles et
al dated September 30, 1902, re-
corded in Vol. 45, page 376, Deed
Records of Callahan County, Texas,
to all of which deeds and records
reference is hereby made for a full
and complete description of the
matters contained therein.

That the claims of the said de-
fendants to said lands, in so far as
known to this plaintiff, are by rea-
son of the fact that they were the
children of J. B. Short and his
wife Matilda Short. That said chil-
dren are the sole and only heirs of
the said J. B. Short and that J. B.
Short was married to Matilda Short
long years ago, and that as a result
of said marriage the children and
grand-children as named herein as
defendants constitute the sole and
only children and descendants of
children of the said J. B. Short and
Matilda Short and from no other
source.

That the plaintiff herein is claim-
ing her title through conveyances
from said heirs as above set out and
under the five and ten year Statute
Limitation.

That the plaintiff and her grantors
are claiming under the deeds and
chain of title hereinabove set forth,
all of which is duly recorded as
above set forth, that they have had
peaceable, continuous and adverse
possessions of the lands, tenements
hereinabove described, cultivating
using and enjoying the same and
paying all taxes due thereon for
more than ten years next prior to
and preceding the filing of this suit.
And this plaintiff pleads the five and
ten year Statute Limitation as
against the interest of any and all
persons whomsoever claiming any
part of the above described premises.

Wherefore premises considered,
this plaintiff prays that the defend-
ants and each of them be cited in
the terms of the law and that a
guardian ad litem be appointed as
required by law and that upon final
hearing that she have her judgment
against each and all of said defend-
ants and for title and possession of
said premises and for her damages,
and for costs, and for all other and
further relief, both in law and equity
general and special, to which she
may show herself justly entitled.

showing how you have executed the

* Candidates for governor next year are sprouting, and one has already popped out. Pat Neff, of Waco, has announced. He is a popular man and would make a good governor. Next.

THE STAR is indebted to Congressman Blanton for a copy of the Congressional Directory of the 66th Congress, also a copy of the Treaty Peace with Germany. The treaty makes 192 pages of the Congressional Record. Possibly it is the longest treaty ever written, and has caused more heated arguments than any treaty ever made.

The other day we noticed a string of probable candidates for governor next year. Some of them are men of ability and some have held, and others are now holding state office, but with perhaps one exception the very mention of their names in connection with the governorship of Texas a quarter of century ago, would have excited only derision from the voters. All of which emphasizes the need of a strong opposition party in Texas, and it is coming because needed so badly.

Certain Democratic politicians are urging President Wilson as a candidate for a third term, regardless of the deep seated opposition of the American people to a third term. They think, and with some reason too, that the American people have submitted to so many innovations during the war that they will accept the third term proposition also. Better not count on that too much. Is the Democratic party so reduced in leaders that we only have one man available as a candidate? We do not think so—at any rate, there is danger in the third term proposition for Wilson or any other man. The reason is easy to explain: If a third term, why not a fourth, fifth, and even a life term in office for a president?

We regret the race troubles in the north, but one thing perhaps northern people will learn the truth about the negro that they never would have believed from reports from the south. A negro is a negro and when you attempt to make him equal socially with the white race you either spoil a good negro or make a mean negro meaner. The people of the South understand the negro, but the North never have understood him. The North gets its idea of the negro from the educated negro characters in Uncle Tom's Cabin, who are about as real as Ridder Haggard's white negroes in darkest Africa.

Alabama has rejected woman's suffrage. That is, the senate of Alabama by a vote of fifteen to thirteen, defeated ratification. It is coming regardless of Alabama or other southern states where the lawmakers are of the opinion that the world is flat.—Fort Worth Record.

Not much of a compliment to the men of the South, eh Fitz? Texas, you remember, defeated woman's

suffrage by twenty-five thousand majority and in less than 30 days thereafter the Texas legislature ratified the Susan B. Anthony amendment. According to the Record a majority of the people of Texas believe the earth is flat, but our legislature believed it is round and felt it their duty to reverse the will of their constituents by ratifying the federal suffrage amendment. Thus Texas is saved by an enlightened legislature from the flat earthitis (like Bill Easterling) and the tallow dippers. Yet when we come to think of it, those old flatearthites and tallow dippers like Sam Houston, Thos. J. Rusk, Anson Jones, J. W. Throckmorton, John H. Reagan, Dick Coke, O. M. Roberts, Jim Hogg, Oxcart John Ireland, Sul Ross wrought well in their day and made it possible for us today to enjoy the steam and electric railways, automobiles, electric lights gasoline tractors, natural gas for heating and cooking and a thousand and one conveniences. Do not be too hard on those who do not believe in every new fangled idea and cureall for political ills. We are a great people and making wonderful strides in improvements, but every change proposed is not a reform. The Editor of THE STAR is old fashioned enough to believe that a member of the legislature should represent the will of his constituents or quit the job. Guess this puts us in the flat earth gang too, according to the Record. Is it not so Fitz?

CITATION BY PUBLICATION

You are hereby commanded, that by making publication of this Citation in some newspaper published in the county of Callahan, if there be a newspaper published in said county, but if not, then in the nearest county where a newspaper is published for four weeks previous to the return day hereof you summon J. Mederia and M. H. Woodruff, of Callahan county, to be and appear before the District Court, to be holden for the county of Callahan, at the court house thereof, in Baird, Texas on the 11th day of August 1919, File No. being 1856, then and there to answer the petition of C. W. Logsdon filed in said Court on the 4th day of June 1919, against the said C. O. Pyeatt et al and alleging in substance as follows, to-wit: C. W. Logsdon vs C. O. Pyeatt et al. No. 1856.

In the District Court of Callahan County, Texas, August Term, 1919. To the Honorable District Court of said county:

Now comes C. W. Logsdon who resides in Andrews county, Texas, hereinafter called plaintiff, and complaining of C. O. Pyeatt, who resides in said Callahan county Texas, and Beulah Pyeatt, who resides in said Callahan County, Tex. and J. Maderia, whose residence is to plaintiff unknown, and M. H. Woodruff, whose residence is to plaintiff unknown, and for cause of action herein respectfully shows to the Court: That heretofore to-wit on or about May 9th, 1916 defendant C. O. Pyeatt and Beulah Pyeatt made and executed and delivered to J. C. Welch two certain promissory notes dated to-wit, May 9, 1916 and being in principal sum of Five Hundred Dollars each and payable to the order of said J. C. Welch at Clyde, Texas, or before the 1st day of January in the years of 1918 and 1919 respectively and bearing interest from date hereof until paid at the rate of nine per cent per annum, interest payable annually and all past due interest bearing nine per cent interest from its maturity at the rate of nine per cent per annum, said notes each substantially providing that if same is placed in the hands of an attorney for collection or if collected by suit, maker will pay ten per cent additional on the principal and interest then due thereon as attorney's fees and each said note also substantially providing that failure to pay same or any installment of interest thereon when due, shall at the election of the holder of all of the series of notes, or any one of them, mature all of the notes and they shall at once become due and payable and the vendor's lien therein mentioned shall become subject to foreclosure proceedings as the holder may elect, said notes reciting in substance that same are given for part payment for a certain lot or parcel of land situated in Callahan county, Texas, and fully described by metes and bounds in deed of even date therewith conveyed to C. O. Pyeatt by J. C. Welch and wife and that to secure payment of same a vendor's lien is retained in conveyance and is acknowledged in said notes, became liable and bound to pay and promised to pay to said J. C. Welch or order the sums of money in said notes specified respectively, together with interest thereon provided for and said ten per cent attorney's fees upon accrual thereof.

Same being a part of a survey of 640 acres patented to S. P. Ry. Maderia by assignment of record on page — of Vol. — of said Callahan County, Deed Records and said J. Mederia assigned said lease to M. H. Woodruff in so far as

twenty acres of said land is concerned, said twenty acres being the S. 1-2 of the S 1-2 of the E. 1-2 of the S. E. 1-4 of said Survey No. 1. Plaintiff further alleges on information and belief that said J. Mederia is claiming to be the owner of said lease as to all of said land other than said twenty acres and said Woodruff claims to be the owner of said lease as to said twenty acres, but that said lease and all rights thereunder and all the rights, titles, claims and interest of said Maderia and Woodruff and each of them in to and under said lease are subsequent to and inferior to the lien of this plaintiff on said East one-half of said S. E. 1-4 of said Survey No. 1. That all defendants herein are charged with notices of plaintiff's said lien. Plaintiff alleges on information and belief that said Beulah Pyeatt and B. M. Pyeatt are one and the same person and that said Beulah Pyeatt is probably claiming some homestead rights or other rights of title to said land, but same are inferior and subsequent and subject to the rights and lien aforesaid of this plaintiff.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays the the Court that all defendants be cited to appear and answer herein, that citation against defendants, J. Mederia and M. H. **COLUMBIAN TREATY
TAKEN UP IN SENATE**

WORK ON PEACE PACT AND LEAGUE COVENANT TEMPORARILY HELD UP.

RECESS WILL CAUSE DELAY

Shut-Down of House Will Put Off Enforcement of Measure Until September.

Washington. — Senate controversy over the peace treaty with its league of nations covenant will be halted temporarily this week to allow consideration of the long pending Colombian treaty. However, the peace treaty and related subjects are expected to be to the fore every day, if not on the floor of the senate, at least in the cloak rooms and in conferences.

While the senate considers the two treaties, the house will be occupied with a rush of legislation preparatory to the planned recess of five weeks beginning August 2.

The recess will delay enactment of several bills, including the prohibition enforcement measure, until September.

The Colombian treaty involving payment by the United States of \$25,000,000 to that republic resulting from the partition of Panama, but with the original clause expressing America's "regret" for the loss by Colombia of Panama eliminated by agreement between the state department and Colombia, will be taken up by the foreign relations committee. The treaty is expected to be reported by the committee and ratified by the senate promptly.

Developments thought probable this week in the treaty fight included statements by President Wilson outlining his stand on the proposal for ratifications and giving new information as to the Shantung provision. Both of the expected statements would have a direct bearing on debate. The Shantung provision is the subject of diplomatic discussions now in progress with Tokio designed to obtain publication of the secret understanding for restoration of the province or some other public declaration of Japan's intentions.

**BOILER EXPLOSION
KILLS SIX IN NAVY**

FOUR DREADNOUGHTS OF PACIFIC FLEET LIFTED THROUGH GATUN LOCKS OF CANAL.

On Board the U. S. S. New Mexico. — Six men have been killed in a boiler explosion on the U. S. S. Melville, a naval tender attached to the Pacific fleet, Captain Twining, the chief of staff, has been advised.

Four dreadnoughts of the Pacific fleet, the New Mexico, Arkansas, Texas and New York, were lifted successfully through the Gatun locks. This was the first attempt to negotiate the waterway with a fleet of the dreadnoughts and the warships lie anchored in the fresh water of Gatun lake 85 feet above sea level.

The names of five men killed were: Claude Turner, Knoxville, Tenn.; Floyd Grisham, Rogersville, Mo.; John J. O'Grady, Brooklyn; Douglas M. Hambliss, Jasper, Texas; Joseph Burt, El Paso, Texas.

Change Insurance Rates on Gins. Austin, Texas. — Changes in the cotton gin rate schedules effective in Texas, and also changes in the forms heretofore used for writing cotton gin products, have been made by the Texas fire insurance commission. The cotton gin rating schedule was ordered amended reducing the basis rate on cotton gins from \$2.50 to \$2. The charge for a country gin was increased from 50c to \$1.

Congress Will Have Recess. Washington. — Legislation for the enforcement of war time and constitutional prohibition probably will not be enacted for two months at least, as the result of the decision of republican leaders to have the house recess from Aug. 2 to Sept. 8.

Lapsed Insurance to Be Reinstated. Washington. — Discharged servicemen who let their government insurance lapse are given the privilege of reinstating their policies within 18 months without payment of back premiums, under an order signed by Secretary Glass.

Ship Forced to Jettison Sugar. Philadelphia, Pa. — The crew of the steamship Sag Harbor had to throw overboard \$100,000 worth of sugar before the ship was able to reach this port. It struck a reef off Cuba while bound from Puerto Padre to Philadelphia.

Italy Asks \$1,000,000,000 of Bankers. Rome. — It is reported here that an appeal has been made to American bankers for financial aid for Italy to the extent of \$1,000,000,000.

BOTH FOREIGN AND DOMESTIC

Carefully Prepared for Those Who Desire to Keep Thoroughly Posted on Events.

FOREIGN—

The full peace terms of the allied and associated powers are now in the hands of the Austrians.

An all-Siberian congress of municipalities and Zemstvos has been decided upon by the council of ministers.

The chamber of deputies recently gave a vote of confidence in the cabinet of M. Clemenceau by a vote of 272 against 181.

Premier Lloyd George is considering dominion home rule for Ireland, including county option for Ulster, it was rumored in parliamentary circles.

Prompt action by the government of Honduras has prevented a threatened revolution, according to dispatches received from Tegucigalpa, Honduras.

France may again be put on bread rations in September. It was said that the system of bread cards probably would be established in that month, because of a possible shortage of wheat.

The strike among the dock workers has resulted in bringing about chaos in the arrangements for handling more than two hundred ships at Liverpool, their sailings being canceled or indefinitely postponed.

French troops have been sent to Fach, Luxemburg, on the demand of the communal court to protect the foundries. This action was taken because of the departure of the American troops from Luxemburg.

One of the towns in Mugello Valley, Italy which was wrecked recently by earthquake, is to be renamed "America," in recognition of the great amount of American aid extended the sufferers through the Red Cross.

Bulgarian oppression to Eastern Macedonia during the period of occupation of that territory resulted in the reduction of the population by almost 100,000 and the death of some 32,000 inhabitants in the course of three years of hunger and ill treatment.

France will offer to take over American military property in France, consisting mainly of docks, railways and real estate, at one-fifth of its cost to the Americans, according to a statement given out by Louis Morel, undersecretary of state for the liquidation of stocks.

Communication has been re-established with the American military column in the Suchan district after more than a week's interruption. The American troops which had been clearing out the bands of Bolsheviki in the Suchan valley, suffered two men killed and 11 wounded during a week's skirmishing.

DOMESTIC—

The west wing of the federal prison at Leavenworth has been badly damaged by fire.
