IT WAS OUR PLEASURE to attend the annual St. Patrick's Day celebration in the city of Shamrock last weekend. Although we had heard about their celebration for most of our life, it was our first time to attend, and we were sufficiently impressed.

The St. Patrick's Day celebration was first held in Shamrock in 1939, and after an interruption by World War II, was resumed in 1949. This year's celebration was the 33rd for the city, and makes theirs one of the oldest such events in the Panhandle of Texas.

Having worked closely with our Maize Days celebration for the past 17 years, we could appreciate the work that had gone into the staging of Shamrock's annual event, and the participation they get in their events is almost unreal.

For instance, there are 78 entries in the St. Patrick's Day parade, which included 32 (that's right) floats, and eight bands. The floats were beautiful. Most of the businesses in Shamrock had a float in the parade, as well as a number from neighboring towns.

Also, it appeared that virtually every church, club, organization or what-have-you was represented in the parade by a float. In addition, there were the usual riding clubs, commercial entries (tractors, etc.) which go to fill out a parade.

We're trying to figure out what the floats' decorative material was made of, because although it rained the floats were not ruined as sometimes happens when you use napkins and crepe paper. We're going to have to find out their secret along this line, because you'll remember we have had at least one or two Maize Days parades in the rain.

They kick off their St. Patrick's Day celebration with a huge banquet at the Shamrock National Guard Armory. They sell 1,000 tickets to this banquet annually—it's always a sellout, the folks at Shamrock told us.

We thought at first perhaps the banquet doubled for the city's Chamber of Commerce affair, but no, it is in addition to their regular Chamber banquet.

Thanks to our Chamber of Commerce for entering Maize Queen Laura in the "Miss Irish Rose" competition. There were 30 young ladies in the contest, which tells you something about the participation in this event. Each one was either "Miss Amarillo," "Miss Canyon," etc., so had won a previous local contest.

Since most of the Panhandle communities were represented in the contest, we were glad that our Chamber had gone to the trouble of entering our local queen. And naturally, we were pleased that Laura was chosen in the top three of the contest, because there were some beautiful girls in that group.

I guess the thing that impressed us most about the Shamrock celebration were the number of people, both men and women, running around in their green garb, assisting with the various projects. They also had a sizeable list of committee chairmen printed in the banquet program.

They have been having their celebration for some 40 years, and yet you would have thought this was their first one, by the enthusiasm displayed.

The city of Shamrock garners a lot of publicity from St. Patrick's Day, as they should. It seems as though we could learn a little from the folks on the opposite side of the Panhandle, and try to squeeze all we can out of our Maize Days celebration.

We came back from the Shamrock event proud that we, too, live in a "smaller" community, where the residents have enough civic pride to pull together for an annual celebration, which involves a majority of the residents.

In two more years, the City of Friona will officially be 75 years old. It will also be the 25th anniversary of our Maize Days celebrations in 1981. We need to be making plans, at least jotting down ideas, to try to make this an extra-special event.

General Telephone Brownfield division manager, O.D. Hearn, said, "Beginning Friday, customers wanting to place a long distance operator assisted call can dial the digit 0 plus the area code of the distant city, if different from 806, plus the seven digit number of the customer being called."

After dialing has been completed, an operator will come on the line to determine and perform the type of special service desired—collect, credit card, third number billing, person-to-person. The equipment will then automatically record the number of one-party customers as well as send the call to its destination.

Customers with more than one-party service, and occasionally one-party customers when there is a number identification failure in the equipment, will be asked for their number after they have completed dialing the call.

Hearn said there would not be any change in the present 1+ dialing service. He reminded customers regardless of the time of day 1+ dialed station-to-station calls are the cheapest way to call long distance. Operator handled rates where customers dial the operator to dial the number and 0+ rates are the same with an 0+ dialed operator assisted call being faster and more convenient.

Customers will still be able to reach the operator by dialing "0 Operator" and waiting a brief time for the equipment to recognize that an 0+ call is not being dialed.

Company Safe Is Recovered

The safe belonging to Friona Wheat Growers, taken last December 12, was recovered this past week, along with virtually all of the company records it contained, according to manager Ron Smiley.

The safe was discovered by Charles Schlabs about four miles south of Hereford in a ditch alongside FM 1055. The vandals had torn the heavy door off the safe, and the small amount of company cash the safe contained was taken.

However, Smiley said that the records, warehouse receipts and minute book were still inside. "We were really glad to get the records back," he said.

It looked as though the robbers had really worked to earn the \$39 cash they took.

"That's about as much cash as we ever have at one time. I don't know why anyone thought we had a lot of cash, unless it was just the idea of the large safe," Smiley said.

Friona Area Gets Beneficial Rains

The Friona area was blessed with some early spring showers during the past week, with some parts of the area getting big, measurable rains, with others still waiting their turn.

A thunderstorm which produced some hail moved through the area last Saturday evening about 9 p.m., leaving some good moisture in places. A considerable amount of pea to marble-sized hail accompanied the early season storm, and although it was not considered damaging to the winter wheat, some property damage may have been noted. Friona's Saturday measurement was .15 inch.

A new front invaded the area on Tuesday, leaving it cloudy and overcast. Light rain fell off and on throughout the day, with Friona's total coming to .22 inch. Tuesday's high temperature reached only 49 degrees.

The cloudy conditions prevailed again on Wednesday, although temperatures warmed considerably, and this probably helped set off another round of showers, between 3 and 4 p.m. in the afternoon.

The official city measurement showed that .75 inch was received here in a 50-minute period, which included about five minutes of pea-sized hail. Again, the hail was

not considered particularly damaging. Friona's total for the week was 1.22 inches.

Wednesday's rain apparently was not of the "general" variety, since areas to the south did not receive nearly as much as the city of Friona measured, and the Rhea community reported just a shower. However, a spokesman at Rhea said they had received 40 inch last Saturday, without hail, which was a welcome rain.

Lazbuddie, on the other hand, received a sizeable rain on Tuesday, accompanied by some hail, and a motorist that day said that it came a "small flood" between Sudan and Muleshoe, with water getting over the road in places.

Mrs. R.J. Sanderson reported that the new dam on Running Water Draw which crosses their place northeast of Lazbuddie, had the beginning of a lake following Tuesday's rain, with the "low places" having water. An inch of rain was received at their place on the draw, Mrs. Sanderson said.

"Living With The Bible"

-Moshe Dayan

This beautifully illustrated volume is near the top of the "must" list for anyone interested in Biblical history.

Most of us think of Moshe Dayan as a general in the Israeli army or more recently a statesman. Now we meet the diplomatic historian who admits to being an amateur archaeologist. During the course of the book he takes the reader along to ancient sites that are neglected in most travel stories. He proves his worth as a guide by letting us see what has existed in the Holy Land while at the same time showing how wars and political upheavals have changed his beloved country.

One feature of the book that pleases this reader is the simple style used and the frequent passages quoted from the Old Testament. As the title implies Dayan really lives with the Bible. He is thrilled, as we would be, to walk among ruins of cities that have played such important roles in the lives of us all.

Not only is a new look at history provided but one is made aware of the most recent events in our economic and political affairs.

I should like to recommend this book to Sunday School teachers regardless of their doctrinal preferences.

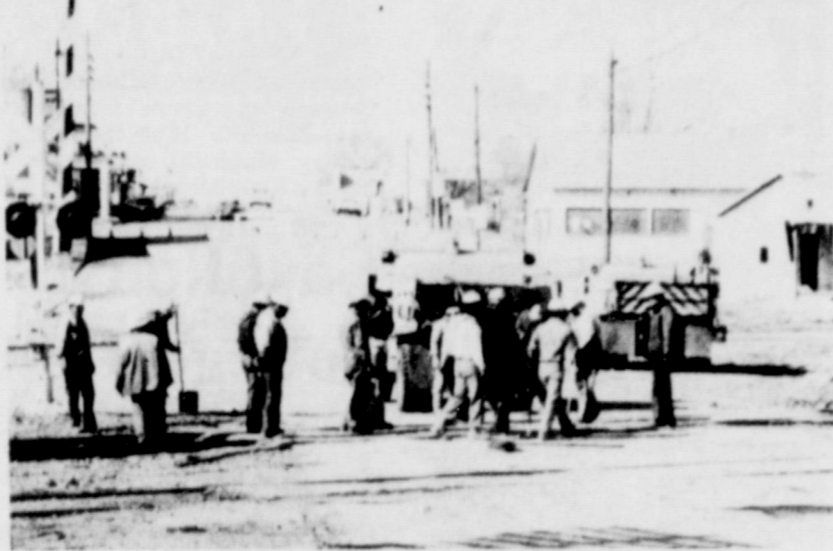

Scott Fangman was second in the high jump event.

The Chieftains won the meet with a total of 149 points, 45 more than second-place Olton, which had 102 points. Dimmitt was third with 102 points, and Muleshoe scored 94, as the meet resembled a District 3-AA tune-up.
