ONE OF THE LARGEST stumbling blocks faced by our nation, and potential problems for our young people is the problem of government regulations.

Although America is still the greatest country around, and is way out ahead of any other country as far as opportunities go, it undoubtedly is the only major country which causes hardship and added expense to many of its citizens merely under the guise of trying to help them.

The main fault with America today is the desire by many politicians to create a "no risk" society in which every individual will be cared for, regardless of his or her actual contribution to that society.

Recent years have seen a massive increase in the size and power of government. Regulations have increased at a dramatic rate. Many of the new laws which have been passed are seen by most voters as totally unnecessary.

The Clean Air Act is a good example. Although most Americans recognize the need to improve air quality, few people were willing to pay more for a car, to make the air better for their neighbors. So, the government stepped in and decided what was good for the public.

The same thing happened in the field of auto safety. Critics blamed the automobile industry for not responding fast enough to the serious problem of highway deaths and injuries, although optional seat belts, first offered in the 1950s, proved very unpopular.

Once again, the government felt the need to move in to protect the public. The end result has been an increase in the cost of doing business, regardless of whether we have been protected, or whether our air is any purer, and some experts argue that it's not.

In the meantime, thousands of new jobs, which actually produce nothing creative, have been created just to fill in the mountain of government forms.

This extra burden on many of the nation's smaller businesses, especially in the field of consumer protection, credit regulations, etc., has caused a number of these smaller businessmen to throw up their hands and quit. Many found that they were spending more time keeping books for the government than they previously had been spending in total on their own businesses.

Today, the average person works the first four months of the year (we're nearly there!), just to pay for government on all levels. That makes government by far the biggest single expense in the family budget—larger than food and housing combined.

By far the largest government spender is the regulatory agency. Agencies have a way of growing like topsy. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) began with a few hundred employees each. Today, EPA has over 11,000 employees, and OSHA 4,000.

The track record of some of these agencies is well known, and some of the regulations passed have astounded even the government.

Agencies technically exist as a fourth branch of government, apart from the checks and balances provided by the constitution. So, they operate independently, reinterpreting and expanding their own jobs almost at will.

We would hope that the tax revolt, as started in California, will continue to the point that government realizes it must operate on a balanced budget, and quit flooding the country with inflated dollars.

A trend toward deregulation would be a welcome one. And, although we may flinch at the cost of gas for a while, it seems best for consumers to decide where to draw the line.

Daylight Time Set To Begin Sunday

If you have been enjoying those last few minutes of sleep these spring mornings, we have a bit of bad news.

Daylight Savings Time begins its six-month run on Sunday, April 29, so you're going to have to retire earlier, in order to get the same amount of sleep Saturday night.

At 2 a.m. local time Sunday, residents will observe the "spring forward, fall back" rule, which will give everyone except residents of Arizona, Hawaii, most of Indiana and Puerto Rico an extra hour of daylight in the evening.

Daylight time has been virtually a national phenomenon since 1966, when Congress passed a law setting daylight savings time from the last Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October.

Prior to 1966, Daylight Time had been invoked in some localities during the summer months,

beginning as early as 1920. This made it a bit confusing, however, as to what time of day it was in various locations.

Congress first passed daylight savings time legislation in 1918, but it was repealed a year later.

Between 1920 and World War II, various states and cities passed their own daylight savings time, and the practice continued after the war. During World War II, DST was observed nationally, and during the 1974 and 1975 energy crunch, Daylight Time was instituted earlier in the year, although it was debatable how much energy was saved, due to businesses and schools having to start up in darkness in some sections of the country.

At any rate, change your clocks Saturday night—and smile. In just six months, we'll get that hour of sleep back.

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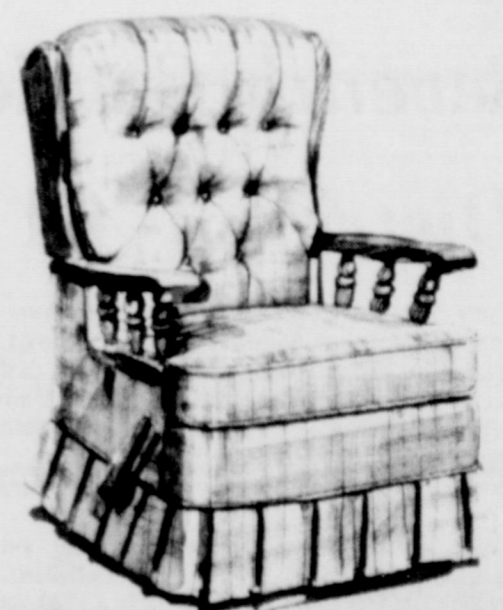

Chiefs Eye Austin Spots; Win District

The Friona Chieftain track and field team is competing in the Region I meet this weekend in Lubbock, after sweeping the District 3-AA championship for the second straight year last Saturday in Hereford.

Qualifying nine individuals for regional in 11 events, including both relay teams, the Chieftains dominated the district meet, winning six events and placing second in five others.

"We think we have an excellent chance to qualify some people for the state meet. We have not seen all of the regional qualifying times as yet, especially from those to the southern part of the district, but we're going to give it a good try," said Coach Robert Mears this week.

Probably the best chances for the Chieftains will be in the mile relay, in the 880-yard dash and the 440-yard dash, where Friona's qualifying times were excellent.

However, the mile relay foursome, which posted a 3:29.4 timing in winning district will face a battle royal from the likes of Slaton and Post. It is known that Slaton has run the event in 3:26 this season, presenting a big challenge for the Chiefs.

The mile relay team added the frosting on the cake for the district win, beating back a challenge by Olton for the gold medals. Members of the team are David Fleming, Rod Owen, Robert Alexander and Chitto Caballero, who ran a 51.8 anchor lap for the Chiefs.

The relay win gave Friona 145 points for the meet, a nice edge over second-place Dimmitt, which had 119. Olton was third with 98 points, followed by Muleshoe, with 97.

Friona's bevy of quarter-milers accounted for three of the top five places in that event scoring 20 points, and FHS grabbed both regional spots when David Fleming won the event with a time of 51.1, followed closely

by teammate Chitto Caballero in 51.7.

Robert Alexander, the team's other entrant in the event, placed fifth with a time of 52.7.

Leslie White, who has been Mr. Consistency in the 880-yard dash, won his specialty with a time of 2:03.1, and will be one of the favorites in that event at regional.

The Chieftains also had a trio of winners in the field events. Chuck Nichols won the pole vault with a leap of 12-6, and will be contending at regional. White placed fourth in this event at district, clearing 11 feet.

Scott Fangman pulled a surprise in the high jump, winning the event by clearing six feet. Mike Hutson, the most consistent point-getter in the event prior to district, placed fourth with a best leap of 5-10, and White was fifth in the event at the same height.

Rod Owen won the long jump with a jump of 20 feet. Joe Malouf was fourth with a best jump of 19-3/4, and Michael Gowens was fifth at 19-2/2.

The 440-yard relay team pushed rival Dimmitt all the way to the wire, finishing second with a time of 44.7. Members of the team are Michael Gowens, Robert Alexander, Rod Owen and Mike Hubbard. Gowens ran a 10.1 leg to get the team off to a flying start.

Caballero was second in the 120-yard high hurdles, qualifying for regional in that event with a time of 15.4 in the finals.

Owen was second in the 330-yard intermediate hurdles with a time of 41.0, and will enter regional for FHS in the event. Michael Gowens blazed to a 23.1 timing in the 220-yard dash, to also place second and grab a regional berth.

Other Chieftains scoring valuable points at the district meet included Mike Hubbard, fifth in both the 100 and 220 yard dash events, Alexander,

fifth in the 440; and Ben Landrum, sixth in the mile run with a time of 5:07.3.

Best times of the season were recorded by the 440-yard relay team; White in the 880; Fleming in the 440; Gowens in the 220; and the mile relay team, although it has a slightly better time in the event on a meter basis (at Bovina).

Preliminaries and field events begin at 3:30 Friday at the regional meet, to be held on the Texas Tech track, with running finals to begin at 1:30 p.m. Saturday.

The regional meet will be run on a yardage basis for running events, it is thought, with the state meet to be on a meter basis.

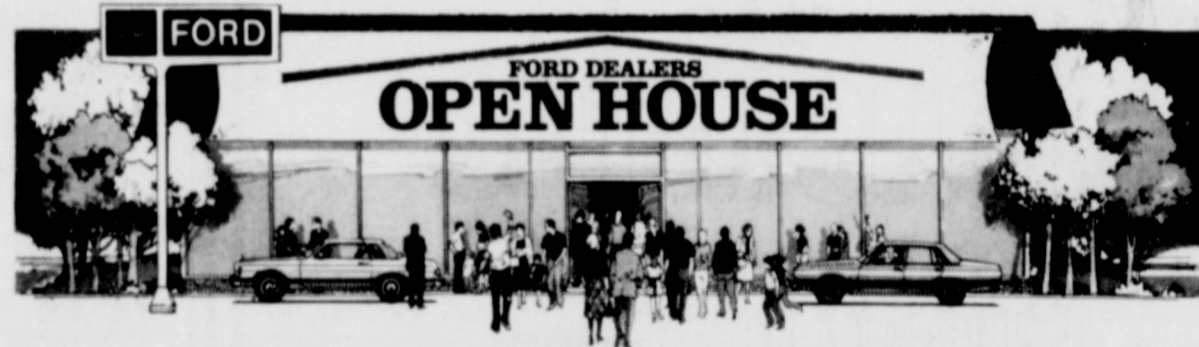

Milk Production Highlights Big Texas Output

AUSTIN--Texas dairy farmers have increased milk production to the highest level since 1950, the Texas Department of Agriculture has reported.

Production during 1978 totaled 3.4 million pounds, Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service figures show, up 2 percent from the previous year.

"The most outstanding aspect of the annual production report was the increase milk produced per cow," commented Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. Annual per cow production was a record 11,039 pounds, 334 pounds above the 1977 average.

The number of milk cows in the state was 311,000, a drop from 315,000 head in 1977.

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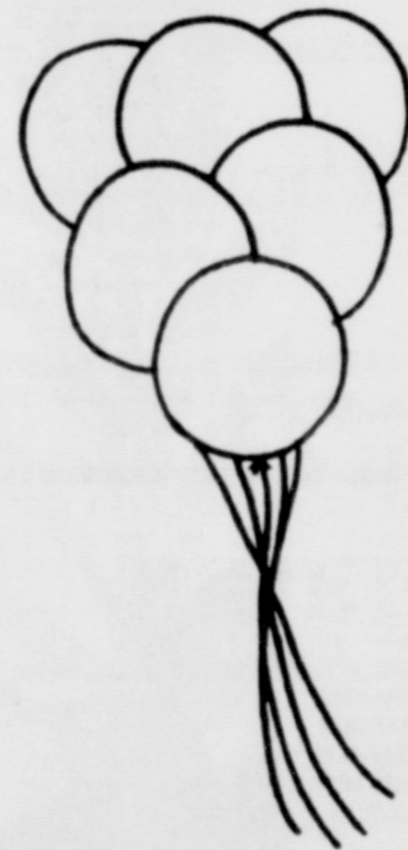

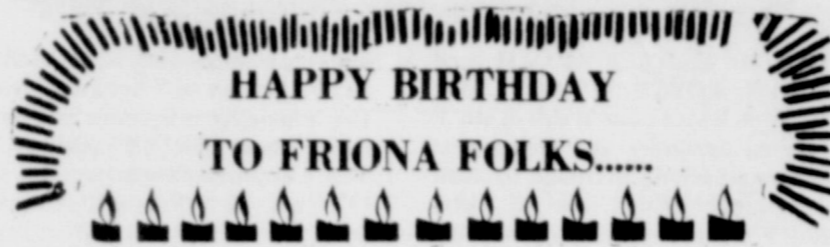

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Prairie Acres' Volunteers Have Training Program

The orientation and training program for volunteers at Prairie Acres was held Thursday, April 5 at the Friona United Methodist Church.

During the registration, coffee and social time which kicked off the day's activity, guests were given name tags with handicaps written on them and they were to "act out" these handicaps all day. Some of the handicaps were: being in a wheel chair with restraints, using a walker, bladder problems and sight and hearing losses.

Merv Noah, administrator of Prairie Acres, moderated the program and introduced the "learners" to aging problems through a devotional taken from Ecclesiastes 12, verses one through eight and related how these verses refer to the inevitable decay in man and how we need to accept this reality and be ready to meet the changes rather than trying to suppress or avoid them.

Madie Schmidt, R.N. and Director of Nursing Services at Prairie Acres, spoke next on the "Physical and Medical Geriatric Problems" using the word acrostic ARTERIO-SCLEROSIS. The one word meaning for each letter was: Aging, Rehabilitation, Tactile (touch), Energies, Reality, Irreversible, Oxygen, Smell, Cataracts, Loss, Environment, Resist (disease), Orientation, Senescence, Independence and Self Concept.

Arteriosclerosis or in simpler terms "hardening of the arteries," she stated, is experienced by most people 60 years of age or older along with high blood pressure. Some doctors recommend exercise and diet of low unsaturated fats THROUGHOUT LIFE to help with these problems.

Following a short break, Jim Couzzourt, of the Texas Department of Health, a medical social worker from Canyon, spoke on the "Social and Psychological Needs of the Aged." He underscored the words of Mrs. Schmidt to stress that people suffering from "arteriosclerosis" are not "crazy" but the disease is the reason for their behavior. It is

irreversible and accepting what has happened and working from day to day with the problems is important, he said.

Couzzourt gave Friona a big "pat on the back" for the beautiful, friendly, non-profit atmosphere at Prairie Acres. He said that Texas has more laws dealing with Nursing Homes than most states. As a result, Texas has higher quality nursing homes including no major fires resulting in loss of life in more than two years.

Couzzourt further stated that there were no "organized psychological and social programs" in nursing homes ten years ago. The activity director's job was created by law to help with the spiritual, mental and physical needs of the residents.

The volunteer program like that being used at Prairie Acres, makes for a warm "home" feeling, rather than a cold place where everything is done for profit. There are only minor laws that apply to volunteers, the main one being that a volunteer is not expected to do any work that is normally a paid job.

Also, a volunteer's work should comply with the nursing home's policies. Their main aim is to help the activity director carry out helpful programs.

The question was asked "Does Prairie Acres have enough trained help right now?" Mr. Noah responded: "Yes, we have more nurses and aides than required by the State," however, he went on to say, "Friona's home could use more women and men with spiritual, mental and physical maturity to stabilize the staff."

Couzzourt mentioned that every person's basic needs are no different at 26 than 76.

"We all need independence, love, compassion, contact with others, activity and most of all self-respect. If we work as volunteers or hope to become one we need to remember these things. We can learn a great deal about life from the elderly people of our society," he said.

The state official stressed that we should be willing to listen to older people tell us what they have done historically and today. Minds have to be exercised to stay healthy and alert just like our bodies, he said.

"The mind can be stimulated by relating to everyday happenings. This concept of 'reality orientation' or facing reality is encouraged in nursing homes control of fear and depression and a calmer, happier person will be the result," Couzzourt said.

One of the ladies present made the statement, "We protect ourselves and our children from unpleasant things."

This drew quite a discussion on how it sometimes depresses a person to visit a nursing home, let alone work there! The answer for some with this "depression problem" is to support the programs from outside the door. Volunteers are needed in all areas. The only limitations of what can be done is in our imagination.

Affirmative verbal support of the Home will "recruit" other volunteers to join those now involved in hair care, crafts, Bible study, group worship services, newspaper reading, bingo and a host of other daily activities at Prairie Acres. A list of available volunteer jobs can be obtained from Joy Osborn, Activity Director of Prairie Acres.

A salad luncheon was enjoyed by some 25 people who were present for the day.

After lunch a slide show covering the different types of volunteers was shown by Couzzourt. One slide showed the admittance of a new resident to a nursing home. It was then pointed out that the common idea is that most older people end up in nursing homes but actually only five per cent are in homes.

The changes of moving from a private home to a nursing home were shown and discussed with ways to make the transition easier and more pleasant for the resident and family. Things you will expect to see were shown, such as the different

atmosphere, controlled medications, controlled smoking, special diets, uniforms and varieties of personnel.

The activity director has a lot of paper work and personal contact with residents. He or she must know the people as well as the doctors or nurses. They deal with the part you can't see: soul, ego and what is left of the body and mind. The activity director cannot do it alone.

Joy Osborn stressed in her talk on "Activities As Experienced by the Aged," that the most important thing is to get on a "one to one" basis with a resident—get acquainted, listen to them and above all be patient and slow down, as they do not like to be rushed. They all need to be loved, touched and shown that someone cares. It is also important to older people a challenge as you'll never know what the results will be. The volunteer needs to know what they can do and learn about the residents' needs from the activity director in compliance with the nursing home's policies.

Noah concluded the meeting with a discussion of "Institutional Living." He presented the "Administrator's Dream" which addressed itself to some of the space problems the staff and volunteers are facing. The "dream" included enlarged beauty shop facilities, extension of the dining room, a large congregate meeting area, activity room and training area.

As the physical roots of the facility are strengthened Noah will present the needs to the Board of Directors, correlating his plan with the volunteers.

He said, "Prairie Acres is an exceptionally well-planned and constructed facility, really a 'dream come true for Parmer County,' and has become recognized state-wide as a friendly, loving home, created and maintained by the love and hard work of the community, volunteers and paid personnel."

The seminar was supported in attendance by volunteers from the communities of Friona, Bovina and Rhea.
