A BILL IS BEING considered in the state legislature which would make a law providing for a presidential primary every four years on the appropriate year, to be held in conjunction with the state primaries.

This would be an excellent law, we feel, and is one we think you should write to your state representative, Bill Clayton, urging him to support.

The presidential primary was given to Texas voters for the first time in 1976, and the result was that for the first time, presidential candidates came into our area—at least as close as Amarillo, stumping for the local vote. The 1976 primary came about as the result of a special, one-time law enacted in 1974.

The pending bill, HB 1018, would set the presidential primary on the regular date for the Democratic and Republican primaries.

According to what we have heard, there are some legislative leaders who want to hold the presidential voting on a date separate from the regular primaries. This is probably supported by office holders, afraid that if the presidential vote was held on the same day as the state primary, it might hurt their chances to be re-elected.

Supporters of the proposed bill, to hold the primaries at the same time, argue that the presidential preference vote could be held in this way, at absolutely no extra expense to Texas taxpayers.

However, if we go the route of shifting the presidential vote to a separate date, it could cost Texans as much as \$4.7 million to hold the extra election.

We have not talked personally to Representative Clayton concerning the bill, but he was not listed as one of the sponsors in a report we received this week. Hence, we urge you to contact Clayton and ask his support of HB 1018.

Going by the usual voter turnout, if the forces succeed in getting the presidential primary shifted to a different date than the state primaries, it would be an approximate cost of \$2.00 per Texas voter.

That may not sound like much to the Texas lawmakers, but we believe it is a totally unnecessary expense, and urge our legislators to practice a little of the fiscal responsibility they would have us believe they are preaching.

State senator Bob Price has indicated his support of the measure, but you might want to contact him also, urging his continued support of the bill.

The presidential primary has received bi-partisan support in the state legislature, and we feel it is a bill long overdue. Such a primary not only causes the candidates for president to take notice of our Texas voters during the primary campaign, but also brings added publicity to our state during the campaign.

Why we have gone so long without a presidential primary is a mystery. We would hope that our legislators take care of this situation, and in a manner that all Texans, and not just special interest groups, would approve.

City, Chamber O.K. Ball Park Expenses

Extensive renovation of Friona's East Little League park, plus improvements at the new softball field at Reeve Lake were approved for funding this week by City of Friona and the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

Representatives of the Little League met with the City Council Monday night to discuss the changes. Carrol Gatlin was the spokesman for the Little League.

It was pointed out that Friona has made a bid to host the district Little League tournament this summer, which is usually held in Borger. This tournament will, besides bringing people to Friona for the weekend, save the local league around \$900 in travel expenses.

However, the older East Little League Park is not a legal size for district competition, and is needing new lights. The league officials plan to tear down the outfield fence, move it back, and replace the light standards, using Quartzite lamps, which provide more light for less power used.

Cost of the renovation has been

estimated at \$7,000. Following the presentation, the City Council agreed to fund half of the expense.

At their meeting the following morning, the Chamber of Commerce agreed to provide the other \$3,500, from the Chamber's Board of City Development Fund.

Gatlin pointed out to both boards that there are 215 youngsters signed up to play Little League baseball this summer.

The Chamber was also approached by Bill Scott, representing the Summer Softball League, asking assistance in lighting the new field at Reeve Lake.

Scott pointed out that there are 15 teams, ten men's and five women's, competing this summer, and in order for all to play, the field needs lights.

Lighting the softball field will cost \$7,000, of which the league has raised \$1,000. Scott pointed out that it is planned to operate a concession stand, and the league could expect at least \$4,000 profits from concessions during the summer.

The Chamber voted to donate \$3,500 to the softball league, from

the BCD fund, with the stipulation for the league to put money back into the Chamber fund from concession profits at the end of the season.

Kipi Wins Medal In UIL Event

Kipi Fleming brought home a medal from the state University Interscholastic League's literary meet last weekend, when she placed third in her event, editorial writing.

Miss Fleming, a sophomore at Friona High School, had placed third in the regional meet two weeks earlier to qualify for the state meet.

Friona's other entrant in the state literary meet, Tracy Horton, lost out in the semi-final round of informative speaking although being ranked first by one judge.

donations which have been accomplished.

An opening prayer was given by Leland Hutson, and Mayor B.K. Buske also made remarks.

"I am always excited about any building that is going on in Friona, and I am particularly pleased to see this building about to become a reality, because of the group that it represents," Buske said.

The Friona mayor joined leaders of the building committee in turning shovels of dirt at the site. Those turning first shovels included Velma Lovett, Mrs. Millican and Mrs. W.P. Hutson, who were leaders in the drive.

Members of the organization who have been active in the fund-raising work include Mrs. Hutson, Mrs. Lovett, Joe and Jessie Douglas, Estis and Zona Bass, Ron Smiley, Ann Carthel and Mrs. Gene Welch.

It was stated that the fund drive lacks only about \$6,000 reaching the established goal.

"We wish to thank the public for accepting us, and for donating to the building fund," said Mrs. Lovett.

The plumbing work has been roughed in, and the group hopes to be in the building by this fall, barring any unforeseen delays.

The new building will contain 3750 square feet of floor space, and will be of steel construction with brick trim. The leaders of the drive say the building will be made available for the use of other groups needing a small to mid-size meeting place.

White Is Ready For State Meet

50 YEARS AGO—MAY 17, 1929

This locality was visited with a much-needed rain which fell last Friday night and again Saturday night, Sunday and Sunday night, removing the gloom from the faces of the wheat farmers and replacing it with ear to ear smiles.

A grader was at work cleaning the sides of Main Street, preparatory to building concrete curbs on the west side of the street between Fifth and Seventh Street.

The committee of the local organization of the Texas Wheat Growers Association and Pool Elevator Corporation completed the arrangements last week whereby the organization becomes owner of the elevator owned by John Gishler and son. No manager has been named for the elevator.

45 YEARS AGO—MAY 18, 1934

A large number of the wheat growers of this locality have incorporated under the name of "Friona Wheat Growers, Incorporated," and have purchased the elevator and other property of the Farmers National Grain Corporation here. Quite a number of the local

growers have taken stock in the corporation.

35 YEARS AGO—MAY 19, 1944

Carolyn Lange is the valedictorian for the class of 1944 at Friona High School, with an average of 90.02, and Dale Treider is the salutatorian with an average of 89.99, it was announced by school officials. Others with top averages included Loretta Johnston, Petrolia Scott, Rosalie Messenger, Viola Weis and Jean Crawford.

30 YEARS AGO—MAY 13, 1949

Wheat prospects in Friona and the surrounding territory were looking much better due to the rains which fell over the weekend. According to J.T. Gee, 3.3 inches of rain fell within the city limits.

Valedictorian for the graduating class of 1949 is Lunell McFarland, with a four-year average of 93.175. Pat Deaton is second with an average of 93.1. Lee Cranfill was third.

25 YEARS AGO—MAY 14, 1954

Gay Ann McFarland has been announced as valedictorian for the Friona Class of 1954, with a four-

year average of 95.6. Clyde Hays is salutatorian with a 93.6 average, and Donna Miller ranked third.

20 YEARS AGO—MAY 14, 1959

Crops, Livestock Census Taken

During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and midyear livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Crop and livestock reports provide a dependable, unbiased picture of Texas' most important industry--agriculture. The estimates in these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing and marketing plans.

Farm organizations and legislatures use them in planning programs. The estimates are also used in establishing the various government program acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state and county.

Extension economists and private farm and ranch management consultants use them as a basis for

advising farmers and ranchers.

Exporters use them in planning and promoting the sale of agricultural products abroad.

Prompt and accurate completion of the survey forms provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs.

All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

This is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Economics, Statistics and Cooperatives Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.



E.H. Cookridge, radio and television commentator, war correspondent and author, is our guide on the world's most famous train. His history of the train and the people behind it is one of these books that will have you wondering--"is this fact or fiction?"

Cookridge was a frequent passenger on the Express and the tales he tells are of real people and events. Dame Agatha Christie did not have to resort to far-out

imagination for her material when she wrote "Murder on the Orient Express."

Aside from the history of European transportation the book is an excellent record of the royal families at the turn of the century. The term "nobility" is avoided--there was not too much about them that could be called noble.

After you finish the Orient Express, read Dee Brown's "Hear That Lonesome Whistle Blow." Now you are in for a real treat! The scene is railroading in the United States. Like Cookridge, Brown is an excellent researcher and you can check your baggage with confidence.

Both books help to sugarcoat the pill of knowledge.







1933 was the year Jerome Kern had the show "Roberts" on Broadway and the senior Trebelaires sang "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes" from "Roberts."

The 1935 show, "Porgy and Bess"

written by Gershwin was highlighted by Linda Murphree singing the lullaby "Summertime," made famous by Abbie Mitchell playing Clara.

1939 brought to life such shows as Walt Disney's "Pinocchio" and Nita Murphy sang "When You Wish Upon A Star" from this show.

1943 was the era of the great American musical, "Oklahoma" by Roger and Hammerstein that ran 2,248 performances on Broadway. Geary Brogden presented "O What A Beautiful Morning" from this musical then Linda Murphree joined him for "People Will Say We're In Love." Both are American classics.

In 1949 Roger and Hammerstein thrilled America with an exhilarating show "South Pacific" which played 1,925 performances in New York. The Senior Trebelaires featuring Jacquelyn Hight, sang "Bali Hai" from this show.


