MOST PEOPLE WATCH Monday Night Football, at least once in a while. And, although not all sports fans agree on rooting for the same team, most fans of Monday night football agree on one thing—they don't like Howard Cosell.

One writer we read this week brought up a point which we hadn't considered.

Some people may concede that Cosell is intelligent, but even these same people may not like him as a sportscaster.

But, in spite of Cosell's irritating mannerisms, there is a chance that Howard may be doing a real therapeutic service for the American public, says writer Glenn Rea.

"Think about it a minute. Monday is simply one of those black days. Nothing goes right at work, and the frustrations are building. The husband goes home, eats a charred dinner and then settles in for an evening of Monday night football.

"Now, he can take out his anguish and frustrations on Howard rather than the wife or kids," Rea says.

In fact, Rea tells about a guy in Colorado who is capitalizing on this very theory. The man runs a bar somewhere in the Golden State that includes one of those giant-size screens for the benefit of patrons who want to sip and watch football at the same time.

Each week he buys an old television set and sits it up. He sells \$1 chances for the right to really take out frustrations on Howard Cosell.

The winner of the drawing gets a rifle and one bullet. He then gets the pleasure of shooting out the picture during a closeup on Howard Cosell. Now, that's the American free enterprise system!

AT LEAST PRIOR to the cold snap on Tuesday, the weather for the first eight days of the month of October almost looked like a re-run of July.

Unbelievably, the thermometer had reached a high point of 90 degrees or above on four of the eight days, and the average maximum during that span was 84 degrees, which had one day where the mercury reached only 69, or the average really would have been high.

According to statistics reported to the U.S. Weather Service, Parmer County's average maximum for the month of September was 85 degrees, and the average minimum was 55. That made for a monthly average temperature of 70 degrees, which should do something to save on home heating or cooling bills for the month.

For October, Parmer County (using temperatures kept at the official recording station at Friona) has an average maximum of 73.9, and an average minimum of 42.9.

So, the average maximum for the first eight days of October was a full ten degrees above the regular average for the month, although some cooler temperatures now through the latter portion of the month could pull this average down to normal.

But the farmers in the area have really been "making hay" while all of this sun has been shining. Farmers have been about as busy as one-armed paper hangers, and are likely to remain this way until all the crops are in.

The hot, dry weather has really helped the corn crop mature, and the harvest has picked up steam in recent days, and was heading toward a peak, at least until the cool spell, which might bring some moisture.

Although the new wheat crop could use some moisture, most farmers would just as soon pass on any rain at the present until the harvest is completed.

Hinkle Wins; Takes Lead

For the second time within a month, two tie games marred the scores in the Friona Star's football contest, and once again a handful of upsets added to the misery of the contestants.

Contest veteran Jerry Hinkle weathered the storm to post the winning score for the week. Hinkle and Harry Watkins were the only ones of the 192 entering the fifth week to correctly pick 16 of the 22 games. The two tie games were automatic "misses" for every contestant.

Hinkle claimed first place by virtue of his tie-breaker score. He picked Friona to down Vega, 20-13, which was 23 points away from the actual score. But Watkins had picked Friona by 7-6, and his low score prediction was 43 points away from the score.

Hinkle was awarded the \$10.00 first prize, and Watkins won \$6.00.

Seven contestants correctly picked 15 games, and of these, Edward Burchett's tie-breaker score was the best, so he was awarded the third prize of \$4.00.

Other contestants correctly picking 15 games were Peggy Pope, Steve Williams, Cynthia Smith, Mike Field, Kenny Kennedy and Danny Guerra.

Hinkle's score of 16 moved him

into the lead in the race for grand prize, with a score of 78. Steve Clark, the previous week's leader, scored a 14 for the week, and dropped to second place with a grand total score of 77.

Guerra's score of 15 moved him into sole possession of third place with a score of 75.

Due to the unusual number of tie games which have been noted this season, the Star reminds contestants of its policy of paying \$5.00 to any contestant who correctly picks a tie game. For this special feature, the Star limits contestants to only two tie "picks" on any one week.

Those in the running for one of the grand prizes are warned that the odds against picking a tie game are pretty high, so as not to "waste" a possible point in the grand prize chase.

The weekly winner, Hinkle, missed the Tulia-Dimmitt, Washington-Philadelphia, Houston-St. Louis and Green Bay-Atlanta games in addition to the two ties.

Watkins missed the Tulia-Dimmitt, Buffalo-Chicago, Houston-St. Louis, San Diego-Denver games.

In addition to the \$20 in prizes offered each week, contestants are shooting for grand prizes worth \$100.00, \$25.00 and \$15.00 at the conclusion of the three-month run.

President Jerry Poarch reported that the chamber showed a profit of \$604.49 from the recent Maize Days celebration, which indicated that the chamber-sponsored activities were well-attended.

New Christmas lights for the city was one item of discussion. The Chamber is asking the City Council to participate in the cost of new lights, with the total cost to be around \$10,000. The matter is to be discussed with the city council.

The Chamber will once again sponsor a Christmas lighting contest, and the board approved prizes of \$100, \$75, \$50 and \$25 for the top four winners. It was decided to have all compete in one category—businesses and residential and rural homes.

Council Annexes Two Land Parcels

The Friona City Council awarded a bid for digging a new trash landfill for the city and approved the seeking of bids for a new police patrol car at the regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The bid to dig the new landfill pit was awarded to M.D. Lovvorn of Farwell, on a bid of \$6,799. Bids were received from three firms.

Police chief Bill Denney pointed out to the council that the automatic transmission in the oldest patrol car was beginning to give trouble. A motion was passed authorizing the City Manager to seek bids on a replacement car.

Ordinance 538, annexing a portion of developed property, Block three, Western Addition, was approved, and council members also passed ordinance 534, annexing another parcel of land, noting that the city engineer had approved the paving which had previously been a problem.

Also discussed was the need for the city office for a copying machine. The manager was authorized to try

out various models and purchase the one most appropriate and within the budget.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

...from the files of The Friona Star

50 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 4, 1929

Judge I.R. Kelso, of St. Louis, president of the Texas Utilities Company, and J.B. Scott, of Plainview, general manager of the company, were business visitors here one day last week. The chief object of the visit was that they might inform the people of Friona who are patrons of the company that another rate cut had been made to users of light for domestic purposes.

A deal was consummated here the latter part of last week whereby W.F. Bays, of Vaughn, New Mexico, becomes the proprietor of the Friona Motor Company and the Farwell Motor Company, having purchased the entire interest of J.H. Elder in these two promising business concerns.

45 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 5, 1934

The city's new well has been completed at a depth of 192 feet with 55 feet of water in it and the new pump has been received and installed. The well has been tested out and found to throw a stream of clear water, from an apparently unfailling supply.

The West Texas Gas Company, which serves Friona with natural gas for fuel, has arranged a new schedule which is estimated to be quite a savings for its patrons over the rate that has been in effect here and still is, for that matter, since the acceptance of the new rate is optional with the patron.

40 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 6, 1939

The Star is authorized to announce that the people of the local Methodist Church will hold their first worship services in their new church on Sunday, October 8.

35 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 6, 1944

G.E. and Nelson Welch, who are arranging to open an auto supply store here sometime about the first of November were in town Monday morning, when G.E. was seeking a suitable residence for he and Mrs. Welch to live in while fitting out the

store building. Nelson Welch, the junior member of this firm, is a Friona boy and well known by all our people. The other member is an uncle of Nelson. They have secured the O.G. Turner building on Main Street and remodeled the building for their business.

25 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 7, 1954

Parmer County gins have all been placed in operation this week in plenty of time to serve the current harvest. Two new gins in the central section of the county, the L&H Gin, just west of Friona, operated by John Davis, and the Tri-County Gin at Summerfield, operated by S.W. Patterson. Both these gins are owned by Floyd Linsey and Fred Huls.

Parmer County Farm Bureau's sixth annual convention will be held at the Friona High School Auditorium, beginning Saturday morning at 10, according to A.J. Ellison, president.

20 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 8, 1959

Lee Thompson, veteran Parmer County politician who is now serving as county tax assessor-collector, has officially announced his candidacy to succeed himself, subject to action of Democratic primary in May of next year. Thompson has served eight years as county judge and six years as county commissioner.

Hollis Horton, Jr. nosed out Thelma Watkins for top honors in this week's Cotton Bowl Football Contest by guessing the closer in the tie-breaking Friona vs. Sunray football game.

15 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 8, 1964

Contract for the \$1.25 million school construction program was awarded at a special meeting of the Friona Independent School Board last Saturday morning. General contractor for the job will be the firm of Knox, Gailey and Meador of Lubbock, on a bid of \$839,927. Hodges Electric Company of Plainview was awarded the electrical contract on a bid of \$87,564. C.A.

Gray Plumbing of Midland was given the plumbing contract on a bid of \$141,245.

The Friona City Council this week passed a resolution placing the city's population at 3,149 as of October 1, 1964, and at the same time requested the State Highway Department to change the figure on the city limit signs.

10 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 9, 1969

The Friona City Council postponed action annexing Hillside Addition to the city at its regular meeting Monday night.

Pallbearers were Wayne Phillips, Andy Anderson, Robert Stewart, Allen Stewart, Charles Allen and John R. Cook.



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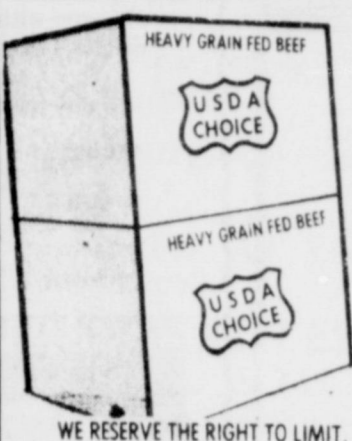

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Last-Ditch Rally Topples Chieftains

You don't have to be a great mathematician to figure out that 56 points were scored in last Friday's 30-26 Vega win over the Chieftains in Friona's Homecoming game.

But what the final score doesn't show is that 27 of those points were scored in the final 4:36 of the game, 21 of them by visiting Vega, which snatched victory out of the jaws of defeat with their last-minute heroics.

Friona was coasting along with a 20-9 lead with five minutes to play in the game, and had allowed Vega just one first down and 16 net yards during the entire second half when suddenly the roof caved in on the Chieftains.

Vega had gotten on the scoreboard first, when midway through the opening period quarterback Scotty Cook passed to Rick Jones on a 53-yard scoring play. The PAT try was no good.

Chiefs To Have Open Date Friday

The Friona Chieftains were having their open date this Friday, having reached the mid-point of their 1979 football season.

The team was using the extra week to re-group and get ready for their district schedule. Having dropped their second come-from-behind loss, Friona stands at 1-3-1 for the season, and could have been 4-1 at the season midpoint if breaks had gone their way.

No major injuries were reported against Vega, so the Chiefs will attempt to get those who had been out of action earlier ready for their first district game, which will be played October 20 at Muleshoe.

Muleshoe, which had a 2-1-1 record going into action this week, was playing ~~Friday~~ Friday in their final non-district tune-up.

Friona responded, when on their second play from scrimmage Rod Owen scampered 47 yards for a touchdown to tie the score. Mark Montoya's kick gave Friona a 7-6 lead with 5:13 left in the quarter. Owen had set up the TD by returning the Vega kickoff out to the Friona 32, and the Chiefs were helped by a face mask penalty against the 'Horns.

Vega threatened early in the second quarter, having the ball first and goal at the Friona four, but a great goal-line stand by the Chiefs denied the visitors a score.

A little later, Vega drove to the Friona 15 and were stalled when Fred Fangman kicked a 31-yard field goal to give Vega a 9-7 lead with 1:50 left in the half, and that was the halftime score.

Friona dominated the third quarter. A 56-yard punt by Montoya got Vega in a hole early, and gave Friona good field position. Mike Hubbard ran 14 yards around left end with 7:46 left in the third quarter for a TD, and after Vega blocked the PAT, Friona led, 13-9.

The teams traded pass interceptions, and Hubbard capped a 33-yard drive by running two yards for the score. Montoya's kick was good, and Friona led, 20-9 with 1:59 left in the third.

Friona was driving early in the final quarter. Hubbard made a first down on a pitchout good for 13 yards to the Vega 37. But a motion penalty set the Chiefs back, and things began to fall apart for the home team.

The teams traded punts, and the next time Friona had the ball, a holding penalty set the Chiefs back to their own 27. They were forced to punt, and did not guard against the rush. Vega blocked the punt, and the ball went into the end zone and was recovered by Fangman for a touchdown. A two-point pass made the score 20-17, Friona.

Lightening struck twice for the Longhorns, who caused a fumble on Friona's first play following the kickoff, and scored just four plays later. That gave the visitors the lead at 23-20, and Vega had scored twice

in 1:46 of clock time.

Nor were the Longhorns through with their antics. Friona, which had not completed a pass, went to the air, and Vega intercepted a pass and returned the ball to Friona's 25 yard line. Five plays later found Vega scoring on a nifty pass play on fourth down, and the kick made the score 30-20, with 1:05 left in the game.

After a short Vega kick, the Chiefs made a good drive in the last minute of play, sparked by a 32-yard pass play from Joe Malouf to Tony Jackson and Chuck Nichols' 17-yard run to the Vega four. Owen got the TD from two yards out with just eight seconds left, making the final score 30-26.

The final quarter left fans numb for the most part, and some who had left early to prepare for Homecoming post-game activities could not believe their ears when they heard the score.

It was the second year in a row for the underdog Longhorns to upend the Chiefs. Vega shocked Friona, 21-7, in a game on the Longhorns' home field last season.

Friona tallied 313 yards rushing and 65 passing for the game, and 14 first downs.

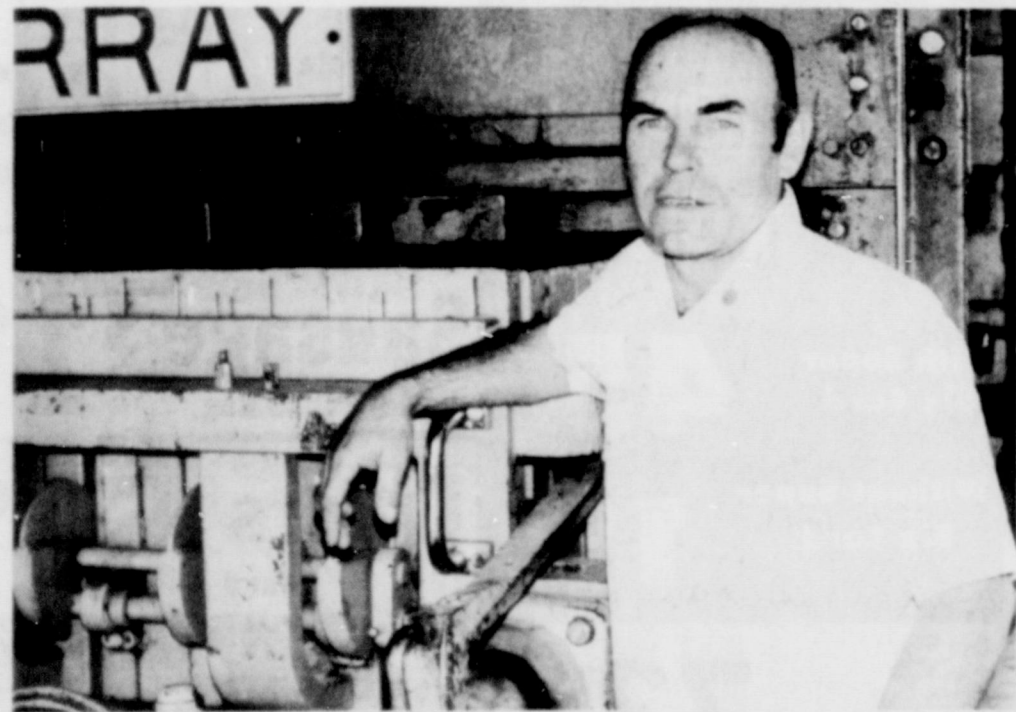
Local Youth Wins P,P,K
