MOST PEOPLE WATCH Monday Night Football, at least once in a while. And, although not all sports fans agree on rooting for the same team, most fans of Monday night football agree on one thing--they don't like Howard Cosell.

One writer we read this week brought up a point which we hadn't considered.

Some people may concede that Cosell is intelligent, but even these same people may not like him as a sportscaster.

But, in spite of Cosell's irritating mannerisms, there is a chance that Howard may be doing a real therapeutic service for the American public, says writer Glenn Rea.

"Think about it a minute. Monday is simply one of those black days. Nothing goes right at work, and the frustrations are building. The husband goes home, eats a charred dinner and then settles in for an evening of Monday night football.

"Now, he can take out his anguish and frustrations on Howard rather than the wife or kids," Rea says.

In fact, Rea tells about a guy in Colorado who is capitalizing on this very theory. The man runs a bar somewhere in the Golden State that includes one of those giant-size screens for the benefit of patrons who want to sip and watch football at the same time.

Each week he buys an old television set and sits it up. He sells \$1 chances for the right to really take out frustrations on Howard Cosell.

The winner of the drawing gets a rifle and one bullet. He then gets the pleasure of shooting out the picture during a closeup on Howard Cosell. Now, that's the American free enterprise system!

AT LEAST PRIOR to the cold snap on Tuesday, the weather for the first eight days of the month of October almost looked like a re-run of July.

Unbelievably, the thermometer had reached a high point of 90 degrees or above on four of the eight days, and the average maximum during that span was 84 degrees, which had one day where the mercury reached only 69, or the average really would have been high.

According to statistics reported to the U.S. Weather Service, Parmer County's average maximum for the month of September was 85 degrees, and the average minimum was 55. That made for a monthly average temperature of 70 degrees, which should do something to save on home heating or cooling bills for the month.

For October, Parmer County (using temperatures kept at the official recording station at Friona) has an average maximum of 73.9, and an average minimum of 42.9.

So, the average maximum for the first eight days of October was a full ten degrees above the regular average for the month, although some cooler temperatures now through the latter portion of the month could pull this average down to normal.

But the farmers in the area have really been "making hay" while all of this sun has been shining. Farmers have been about as busy as onearmed paper hangers, and are likely to remain this way until all the crops are in.

The hot, dry weather has really helped the corn crop mature, and the harvest has picked up steam in recent days, and was heading toward a peak, at least until the cool spell, which

might bring some moisture.

Although the new wheat crop could use some moisture, most farmers would just as soon pass on any rain at the present until the harvest is completed.

Hinkle Wins; Takes Lead

For the second time within a month, two tie games marred the scores in the Friona Star's football contest, and once again a handful of upsets added to the misery of the contestants.

Hinkle was awarded the \$10.00 first prize, and Watkins won \$6.00.

Seven contestants correctly picked 15 games, and of these, Edward Burchett's tie-breaker score was the best, so he was awarded the third prize of \$4.00.

Other contestants correctly picking 15 games were Peggy Pope, Steve Williams, Cynthia Smith, Mike Field, Kenny Kennedy and Danny Guerra. Hinkle's score of 16 moved him into the lead in the race for grand prize, with a score of 78. Steve Clark, the previous week's leader, scored a 14 for the week, and dropped to second place with a grand total score

Guerra's score of 15 moved him into sole possession of third place with a score of 75.

Due to the unusual number of tie games which have been noted this season, the Star reminds contestants of its policy of paying \$5.00 to any contestant who correctly picks a tie game. For this special feature, the Star limits contestants to only two tie

Council Annexes Two Land Parcels

The Friona City Council awarded a bid for digging a new trash landfill for the city and approved the seeking of bids for a new police patrol car at the regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The bid to dig the new landfill pit was awarded to M.D. Lovvorn of Farwell, on a bid of \$6,799. Bids were received from three firms.

Police chief Bill Denney pointed out to the council that the automatic transmission in the oldest patrol car was beginning to give trouble. A motion was passed authorizing the City Manager to seek bids on a replacement car.

Ordinance 538, annexing a portion of developed property, Block three, Western Addition, was approved, and council members also passed ordinance 534, annexing another parcel of land, noting that the city engineer had approved the paving which had previously been a problem.

Also discussed was the need for the city office for a copying machine. The manager was authorized to try

out various models and purchase the one most appropriate and within the budget.



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

Last-Ditch Rally Topples Chieftains

You don't have to be a great mathematician to figure out that 56 points were scored in last Friday's 30-26 Vega win over the Chieftains in Friona's Homecoming game.

But what the final score doesn't show is that 27 of those points were scored in the final 4:36 of the game, 21 of them by visiting Vega, which snatched victory out of the jaws of defeat with their last-minute heroics.

Friona was coasting along with a 20-9 lead with five minutes to play in the game, and had allowed Vega just one first down and 16 net yards during the entire second half when suddenly the roof caved in on the Chieftains.

Vega had gotten on the scoreboard first, when midway through the opening period quarterback Scotty Cook passed to Rick Jones on a 53-yard scoring play. The PAT try was no good.

Chiefs To Have Open Date Friday

The Friona Chieftains were having their open date this Friday, having reached the mid-point of their 1979 football season.

The team was using the extra week to re-group and get ready for their district schedule. Having dropped their second come-from-behind loss, Friona stands at 1-3-1 for the season, and could have been 4-1 at the season midpoint if breaks had gone their way.

No major injuries were reported against Vega, so the Chiefs will attempt to get those who had been out of action earlier ready for their first district game, which will be played October 20 at Muleshoe.

Muleshoe, which had a 2-1-1 record going into action this week, was playing Idulou Friday in their final non-district tune-up.

Friona responded, when on their second play from scrimmage Rod Owen scampered 47 yards for a touchdown to tie the score. Mark Montoya's kick gave Friona a 7-6 lead with 5:13 left in the quarter. Owen had set up the TD by returning the Vega kickoff out to the Friona 32, and the Chiefs were helped by a face mask penalty against the 'Horns.

Vega threatened early in the second quarter, having the ball first and goal at the Friona four, but a great goal-line stand by the Chiefs denied the visitors a score.

A little later, Vega drove to the Friona 15 and were stalled when Fred Fangman kicked a 31-yard field goal to give Vega a 9-7 lead with 1:50 left in the half, and that was the halftime

Friona dominated the third quarter. A 56-yard punt by Montoya got Vega in a hole early, and gave Friona good field position. Mike Hubbart ran 14 yards around left end with 7:46 left in the third quarter for a TD, and after Vega blocked the PAT, Friona led, 13-9.

The teams traded pass interceptions, and Hubbart capped a 33-yard drive by running two yards for the score. Montoya's kick was good, and Friona led, 20-9 with 1:59 left in the third.

Friona was driving early in the final quarter. Hubbart made a first down on a pitchout good for 13 yards to the Vega 37. But a motion penalty set the Chiefs back, and things began to fall apart for the home team.

The teams traded punts, and the next time Friona had the ball, a holding penalty set the Chiefs back to their own 27. They were forced to punt, and did not guard against the rush. Vega blocked the punt, and the ball went into the end zone and was recovered by Fangman for a touchdown. A two-point pass made the score 20-17, Friona.

Lightening struck twice for the Longhorns, who caused a fumble on Friona's first play following the kickoff, and scored just four plays later. That gave the visitors the lead at 23-20, and Vega had scored twice

in 1:46 of clock time.

Nor were the Longhorns through with their antics. Friona, which had not completed a pass, went to the air, and Vega intercepted a pass and returned the ball to Friona's 25 yard line. Five plays later found Vega scoring on a nifty pass play on fourth down, and the kick made the score 30-20, with 1:05 left in the game.

After a short Vega kick, the Cffiefs made a good drive in the last minute of play, sparked by a 32-yard pass play from Joe Malouf to Tony Jackson and Chuck Nichols' 17-yard run to the Vega four. Owen got the TD from two yards out with just eight seconds left, making the final score 30-26.

The final quarter left fans numb for the most part, and some who had left early to prepare for Homecoming post-game activities could not believe their ears when they heard the score.

It was the second year in a row for the underdog Longhorns to upend the Chiefs. Vega shocked Friona, 21-7, in a game on the Longhorns' home field last season.


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Friona Woman Heads Writers Convention


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


