Star Lites By Bill Ellis

DYING DOES NOT have to be a sad occasion, and this has been proven by Dick Hyman in his book, "Cockeyed Americana." Hyman is one of our favorite authors. He has also published "Stop the Presses." "Now See Here, Judge," and "Baseball Wit and Wisdom.

Hyman published a collection of excerpts from people's wills in the "Americana" book, which he entitled "Wacky Wills." Here are a few examples:

An old bachelor, who, having endured the several attempts by members of his family to put him "under the yoke of matrimony," asked his executors to carry out what is probably the most ungallant provision ever contained in a will.

"I beg that my executors will see that I am buried where there is no woman interred, either to the right or left of me. Should this not be practical in the ordinary course of things, I direct that they purchase three graves, and bury me in the middle one of the three, leaving the two others unoccupied," was the wording of the will.

The will of a certain wealthy banker read in part: "To my wife, I leave her lover and the knowledge I wasn't the fool she thought I was. To my son I leave the pleasure of earning a living. For 25 years he thought the pleasure was mine. He was mistaken. To my daughter I leave \$100,000. She will need it. The only good piece of business her husband ever did was to marry her.

It continued, "To my valet I leave the clothes he has been stealing from me regularly for the past 10 years. also the fur coat he wore last winter while I was in Palm Beach. To my chauffeur I leave my cars. He almost ruined them and I want him to have the satisfaction of finishing the job. To my partner I leave the suggestion that he take some other clever man in with him at once if he expects to do any profitable business.

Hyman uncovered this will, left by a New Yorker in 1880: "I bequeath all my fortune to my nephews and nieces, seven in number. They are to share it equally, and on no account to go to law about it, on pain of forfeiting their respective shares.

"I own seventy-one pairs of trousers, and I strictly enjoin my executors to hold a public sale at which these shall be sold to the highest bidder, and the proceeds distributed to the poor of the city.

"I desire that these garments shall in no way be examined or meddled with, but disposed of as they are found at the time of my death; and no one purchaser is to buy more than

one pair." Since the old man had always been more or less eccentric in his ways, no one was much surprised at the clauses in his will, nor to find that each pocket of the trousers had been sewn

up, containing \$1,000 in cash. In 1879 a man died who willed that his friends were to take turns rolling a barrel of beer after his hearse and consume it on his grave. Another old will provided that a new cooking recipe should be pasted on his tombstone each day, due to the fact that his wife had been such a poor

cook. One man disposed of a \$6 million estate with a will scrawled on a hospital chart. Another man did not have a chart handy, so one of his nurses lifted her dress and he wrote his will on her slip. A second nurse witnessed the will. A niece received most of his large estate, but each of the nurses received \$10,000 for

"devotion to duty. A bit actor, who had been long out of work, died in 1945. The Actors Fund paid his final hospital bill and funeral. In his small, bare room, a will was found which stipulated that, because he had often walked the rounds for miles on thin-soled and battered shoes, he was setting up a shoe fund for actors who couldn't afford them. The fund contained over \$225,000.


Clayton and Rev. Murphy will address the subject "Committed Christians and Good Government Build Good Nursing Homes."

Noah has headed the Prairie Acres staff since it opened in August of 1976. In fact, he arrived in Friona in May prior to completion of construction, and helped with the completion of the building.

Noah has been involved in nursing home administration for 13 years, previously serving at Hettinger, N.D., and Marble Falls, Texas.

"What really attracted me to Friona was the fact that Prairie Acres was city owned and community involved, from its conception," said

"I was ready to get out of the nursing home industry, due to the strong drive for 'profits at any cost' in corporation-owned homes. But the

board's presentation was so strong, stressing the commitment of the community, which has raised in excess of \$175,000 for the home, that I could not turn them down," Noah continued.

Clayton is the first person in Texas history to be elected to three consecutive terms as Speaker of the House. He graduated from Texas A&M in 1950, and in 1962 won election to the House of Representatives, filling the seat of the retiring Jesse Osborn.

New Tool Being Produced Locally

A Friona company is producing a new product designed by a local resident who was wanting an easier way to get rid of his Johnson Grass. If the product goes over well, a lot of people may find this method helpful.

The product is a hand-held applicator for herbicides. It is called the "Sideswipe," and was designed by Steve Struve. It is being produced by Struve and Leroy Lundy at Ag-Chem Farm Services.

The applicator consists of a long plastic pipe which holds the herbicide. On the bottom end of the pipe is a roller device which applies the herbicide to the unwanted grass or

Struve says he got the idea for the tool from the wick-type applicators which have become popular with the farmers, since they reduce herbicide 'drift." Wick type application has proven to be considerably more economical, and in most cases does a better job than spraying, Struve says.

It took the local resident about two

months to develop the applicator. He began to call it the "Sideswipe." Struve has applied for a patent for the invention, and also a trademark on the brand, which has been promised.

"I needed some help building the device, and a place to work, so I went into partnership with Leroy Lundy. We build them in his warehouse, and use the equipment there. We had to design most of our tools, such as a device to thread the plastic pipe.

Struve's daughter Carol designed the trademark label, and his son-inlaw, Richard Nicholson, produced the labels for the new product.

Struve said that at first he built some of the tools, and Bob and Nelson Welch began using them. "That was the real test. They gave me some ideas as to ways to improve the instrument," Struve said.

"The local people have encouraged us to proceed with producing the applicator," Struve adds.

School Begins August 27

Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe this week released the schedule for the opening of the 1979-80 school term.

Registration for students in high school will be held on Friday, August 24. Students below the high school level will not need to pre-register.

The first day of school will be Monday, August 27.

New students entering the Friona Schools who were not in Friona at the end of the past school year are encouraged to contact their respective principals to pre-register. This request is being made so that schedules and teacher assignments can be made and will save considerable delay for new students when school begins.

New students in grades K thru 4 should contact Freeman Melton, Jr., Elementary Principal at the Primary building. It is not necessary for kindergarten children who preregistered last spring to report early, but those who did not register last spring should report next week.

New students in grades five thru eight should report to Cecil Maddox, Friona Junior High School Principal, at the Junior High building and students entering grades nine thru 12 should check in with John R. Cook, Friona Principal at the High School.

Official registration for students in Friona grades 9 thru 12 will be held on Friday, August 24 at 9 a.m. in the Friona High School Auditorium. All High School students should report for this registration to receive their schedules, locker assignments, and all information to be ready to run a regular schedule on Monday, August

Students in grades K thru 8 will not need to report until 8:45 a.m. on Monday, August 27 for the first full day of school. Students in grades 1 and 2 will report to the primary building, students in grades K, 3 and 4 to the grade school building, and students in grades 5 thru 8 to the Junior High building. Students will receive instructions at the buildings regarding rooms to report to.

45 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 17, 1934

Information from the president of the local board of school trustees, slates that the Friona schools will open for the term on Monday, August 3, that being two weeks from the coming Monday. A complete faculty of teachers has been secured, which includes practically all who were here last year, with at least one additional teacher, the instructor of vocational agriculture. The fleet of eight new school buses has already arrived and the long garage or shed for their protection has been erected on the newly acquired school property.

40 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 18, 1939

This territory and much of the surrounding counties was visited Sunday night by a good and much needed rain, which gave a fall of from three-fourths of an inch to an estimated inch and a half, as reported from the various sections of the territory from a few miles north and west, to the southern limits of the

25 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 12, 1954

The Parmer County Fair Committee met July 26 at the Villa Nu Court Cafe for a steak supper and to discuss plans for the coming county fair setting the dates as September 13, 14 and 15.

Gubernatorial candidate Ralph Yarborough made a brief stop Tuesday evening at the Friona airport, being met by a local delegation and one from Hereford. Though scheduled to speak at Hereford, Yarborough was forced by delay in plane flights to omit the Hereford visit.

20 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 13, 1959

A.T. Eiland, 81, of Olton Route, Plainview, was reported to be improving at Parmer County Community Hospital, Tuesday following a collision Thursday about noon at the Hub corner. Eiland was driving a 1955 Oldsmobile toward Dimmitt when his auto was struck by a 1953 Mack diesel truck loaded with potatoes which was going south toward Muleshoe as the vehicles met in the Hub intersection. The truck, which was driven by J.I. Reames of Amarillo had loaded with potatoes in Hereford and was headed to Midland.

The Friona City Council gave preliminary approval Monday to a \$278,869 annual budget for the fiscal year beginning next October 1. The proposed budget compares to that of \$247,484 adopted for the present fiscal year.

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



how to help avoid injuries.





Delta Kappa Gamma is a society for women educators and was founded on May 11, 1929 in Austin, Texas, by Dr. Annie Webb Blanton.



Electric Company Gets Solar Study Grant

Berl Springer, president and chiet operating officer of Southwestern Public Service Company, has announced that the Department of Energy (DOE) has awarded a grant of approximately \$500 thousand to the General Electric Company and Southwestern Public Service Company to study the feasibility of repowering one of Southwestern's generating units with a solar system.

"This would be one of the largest solar projects in the United States," Springer said. "The grant will fund an engineering study for repowering our No. 3 generating unit at Plant X, near Earth, Texas."

The proposed solar system would utilize a liquid metal-cooled central receiver to repower the 100,000 kilowatt gas-fired unit at Plant X and would be designed to supply 60 per cent of the thermal energy required for the full output of the generating unit.

The solar portion of the system consists of a surround field of glass, unenclosed heliostats reflecting the solar insolation to a tower-mounted cylindrical receiver. The receiver is cooled by liquid sodium with the flow rate through each receiver panel controlled by individual electromagnetic pumps, so that a constant outlet temperature can be maintained.

The impact on the existing plant is limited to piping tie-ins and controls modifications. Minimum intrusion into existing plant operating requirements and capabilities have been a major design objective of GE and SPS.

The overall concept of the solar system represents a highly flexible system that would allow the Plant X unit to operate on solar and gas at the same time or on gas or solar alone. The concept is based on the General Electric Alternate Central Receiver Program solar plant design and will benefit from its past and future engineering experience.

It is expected that contracts for the feasibility study will be signed about September 1 and the project

completed in approximately 12 months.

"We at SPS are very excited at the prospects of working with General Electric on this project and we feel that this could very well be the breakthrough we have been waiting for as an alternate source of energy," Springer concluded.

Deadline Slated For Crop Plan

Wheat growers wishing to insure their investment in their 1980 crops have only until August 31 to apply for a policy, according to Carey G. Johnson, District Director of USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

Johnson suggests that major improvements in the policies being written this year are making all-risk crop insurance attractive to many farmers who have not carried insurance in the past. The improvements offer eligible wheat producers increased flexibility to tailor their insurance protection to their individual financial needs.

Specifically, the policies offer a choice of three different yield guarantees and three different levels of indemnity payments. In addition, premium rates are being determined by a new formula that reduces the cost of insurance to farmers who experience few or small losses. Still another change increases the maximum indemnity payment for crop losses to \$3.50 a bushel from \$3.00 a year ago.
