## Star Lites

LAST WEEK IN our coverage of the Maize Queen contest, a line was omitted from the story telling about Janette Reed, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Reed, making the top ten.

The way it came out, it said that "Ralph Reed, performed a skit from Star Spangled Girl." We want to set the record straight, for those of you who missed the pageant and may have wondered if Ralph, indeed, did a talent act onstage.

Actually, the credit all belongs to Janette, and we apologize for the error.

We wanted to be sure and get it straight. We can just see the implications, if fathers of queen contestants had to do the talent acts. Can you imagine Baker Duggins belting out a song (maybe he can, we can't), or for that matter, Bill Ellis doing a ballet dance in a tu-tu? Enough of that!

WE HAVE ALWAYS been fascinated by the subject of space, the planets and so forth. As a youngster, we enjoyed science-fiction stories and movies.

Just in time, our children got to be the right age, so it didn't look so funny when we saw Star Wars (twice), Close Encounters, etc., etc.

So naturally, we were interested and impressed recently by the successes of our country's Pioneer II spacecraft, and the remarkable color photographs it sent back of the planet Saturn.

The tiny, nine-foot spacecraft was launched in April of 1973, and has been in space for almost six and one-half years. It is remarkable that it has survived for the two billion mile journey in the first place, let alone transmit back pictures of such clarity after such a time and distance.

This can be chalked up as another major scientific triumph for our nation and "Yankee ingenuity."

It was pointed out that just a month after the craft was boosted into space, one of its twin transmitters went out of commission. But the backup has continued to work, for more than six years.

Through some miracle, the ship passed through the planet Saturn's rings without being destroyed. So, although this mission is virtually accomplished, it may yet record some other fact about our solar system which we have not discovered before.

The Pioneer spacecraft still has enough functioning instruments to begin exploring the secrets of Saturn, such as determining what the temperature of the planet is, the composition of its atmosphere, etc.

Whether the Saturn probe will give us any side benefits, such as the Apollo Moon program did, is not known at this time. However, we would think that it surely will. If they can build a craft that will last six and one-half years and travel more than two billion miles, there still should be hope for an automobile which would last at least as long, and record a fraction of that mileage.

And, when you talk about miles travelled for the amount of energy consumed, the Pioneer II probe has beat the heck out of most of our cars' performance.

## Danny Guerra Wins First Weekly Prize

Danny Guerra, Friona High School student, won the first week's competition in the Friona Star's annual football contest, with a sterling score of 20 correct out of the 22-game slate.

Guerra, a junior at FHS, was the only contestant in the first week's competition who correctly picked 20 games, and he received the weekly first prize check of \$10.00.

All contestants were given a correct score on game number three of the first week's slate of games, which was listed in error. The game was listed as Plainview vs Morton when it should have been Plains vs Morton.

Guerra's only misses were in picking Air Force to defeat Tulsa, and Texas A&M to down Brigham Young University. He correctly picked every high school and professional game.

Two contestants had scores of 19 for the week, and they nailed down second and third place in the contest.

David George claimed second place, edging Randy Boeckman on the basis of his tie-breaker score prediction on the Tulia-Friona game.

George picked Tulia to win by 25-

15, missing the actual score combination by 27 total points. Boeckman picked the Hornets by 35-7, and his miss totalled 29 points. George received \$6.00 for second place and Boeckman \$4.00 for third.

The runnerup for the week, George, missed WTSU vs Texas Arlington, Texas A&M-BYU and Cincinnati-Buffalo. Boeckman missed the Aggie-BYU, UCLA-Houston and Cincinnati-Buffalo games.

The game most missed by the first week contestants was the A&M-BYU contest. More than 90 per cent of the contestants picked the Aggies, who were upset by Brigham Young University.

Five contestants had the good score of 18 for the week, missing by just one point of being considered for one of the cash prizes. They were Rodney O'Rand of Hereford, Louie Martin, Ronnie Melton, Steve Clark and Charlie Veazey.

Thirteen contestants scored 17 games correctly, and another 32 had scores of 16. The scores of all the leading contestants will be printed each week on an inside page. These

may be found for the first week's top entries.

An even 200 contestants entered the first week's contest, which was just one less than the first week in the 1978 contest. James Ball of Wichita, Kansas had the honor of being the contestant mailing his entry the farthest. A number of contestants mail in their entries each week from across the region, but Ball's entry blank had to come the farthest of any received.

Contestants are shooting for a grand prize of \$100 in the 13-week contest, as well as a \$10 first prize weekly, a \$6 second prize and a \$4 third prize.

Prizes of \$25 will be awarded to the second place finisher in the race for grand prize, and \$15.00 for third.

## Registration Underway For P, P, & K

Registrations are under way for the 1979 Punt, Pass & Kick Competition, sponsored locally by Friona Ford Sales. The contest, open to any youngster eight through thirteen years of age, has become a success throughout the country.

Forms are available at the showroom of Friona Ford Sales. Forms are also available at the schools in Bovina, Lazbuddie and Farwell.

Any boy or girl who meets the age requirements and who can punt, pass and kick a football--or who'd like to try--will want to compete. Participants compete only against others their own age, and there is no body contact.

No special equipment is needed and participation does not impair a youngster's amateur standing. Each youngster competes in three categories--punting, passing and kicking. Judges score one point for each foot the ball travels on the fly, minus one point for each foot the ball lands to the right or left of the center tape.

The contest will be held on Saturday, September 29, at 12 noon. All contestants must be registered by that time.

## United Fund Names Goal, Drive Chief

Friona's United Fund board met recently and set its goal for the 1979 drive, and named drive officials.

Danny Kendrick is the campaign chairman for the 1979 drive. Larry Knowles is the co-chairman. Mike Buchanan has been named as chairman of the rural portion of the drive.

The goal for 1979 is \$10,590. This is \$365 less than the goal had been for 1978, after adding two agencies and dropping one.

New to the drive for 1979 are the Cub Scouts, who are in the budget for

\$800, and Autistic children, who will receive \$800.

Eliminated from the 1979 budget was the July 4th activity fund, which was included for \$1500 in 1978, to pay for the city's annual July 4th fireworks display.

Kickoff date for the 1979 drive will be Monday, November 5 at the Girl Scout House. A speaker for the kickoff breakfast will be named shortly, Kendrick says.

It was also announced that the Lazbuddie community, which has assisted Friona with its UF drive for the past several years, will conduct its own drive this year.

Agencies included in the 1979 budget include Boy Scouts, \$2500; Girl Scouts, \$2300; Red Cross, \$1200; Salvation Army, \$900; Texas Community Service, \$52; Emergency Fund, \$400; Texas Mental Health, \$153; Little League, \$1200; Friona 4-H, \$200; U.S.O., \$100; Cerebral Palsy, \$760; Cub Scouts, \$800 and Autistic Children, \$25.

## Open House Set For Senior Center

Open house for the new Senior Citizens' Friona House of Friendship clubhouse at 15th and Washington will be held Sunday, September 16, from 2:30 to 5 p.m.

Groups from the various Friona churches will be presenting programs at the open house, a different one about every 30 minutes, beginning at 2:30 p.m.

The senior citizens, sparked by a fund-raising committee headed by Velma Lovett, Mrs. W.P. Hutson and Joe Douglas, raised \$43,000 for the building, which is located across the street south of Prairie Acres.

The senior citizens' clubhouse is 50 feet by 75 feet, containing 3750 square feet of floor space. The north end of the building is partitioned off with two 25x25 hobby rooms, where such activities as quilting is carried on. The main meeting room measures 50x50, and includes a complete kitchen.

There have been a number of donations other than cash. For example, the City of Friona donated

the plumbing work for the building, and also donated some tables and chairs.

A woman at Marble Falls donated a new living room suite, through Merv Noah who drove down for the furniture.

Delton Lewellen was the contractor for the building. "We appreciate Delton helping us keep the cost of the building within what we had raised," Mrs. Lovett said.

The senior citizens say they appreciate all of the businesses and individuals who contributed to make the new center possible. "Without the help of everyone, it could not have been done," they say.

The next project for the center is some paving for the front, which will cost around \$12,000. The center has applied to the PRPC for a grant, but they are not too optimistic that they will receive funds from the regional governmental agency.

The group had a crowd of 68 people at its monthly luncheon this past Tuesday, which was an all-time high.

## Dillie M. Kelley Accepts New Post

Dillie M. Kelley has been named Associate Superintendent of Public Instruction for Administration for the Nevada Department of Education.

Superintendent Ted Sanders announced Kelley's appointment and that he would assume his new duties October 1, 1979.

Kelley comes to Nevada from Austin, Texas where he was Coordinator of Services with the Southwest Educational Development Laboratory, a position he has held since 1969.

Prior to joining the Southwest lab, Kelley was a high school principal for the Buena Vista Independent School District, Imperial, Texas from 1947 through 1949. From 1949 through 1955 Kelley was high school principal in Friona, and from 1955 to 1959 he was Superintendent of the Friona Independent School District.

After this experience, Kelley broadened his horizons by entering business management. From 1959-65 he was business manager of the Brownfield Independent School District, Brownfield, Texas; he held the same post with the Hereford Independent School District from July 1, 1965 to October 14, 1966. From that time until 1969 Kelley was associate director of fiscal services with the Southwestern Cooperative Educational Laboratory, Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Kelley, 58, was born in Palestine,

Texas, graduated from Montalba High School in 1939. He received his Bachelor of Science, and his Masters of Business Administration degrees from North Texas State University. Kelley and his wife, Cornelia, will make their home in Carson City, Nevada.

"Kelley surpasses all qualifications set by law for the unclassified position that pays \$28,000 annually," Superintendent Sanders said. "The associate superintendent must have experience in the preparation of government budgets, government accounting and government research. Kelley looks forward to working for the Nevada Department of Education; he considers the assignment his greatest professional challenge," Sanders concluded.

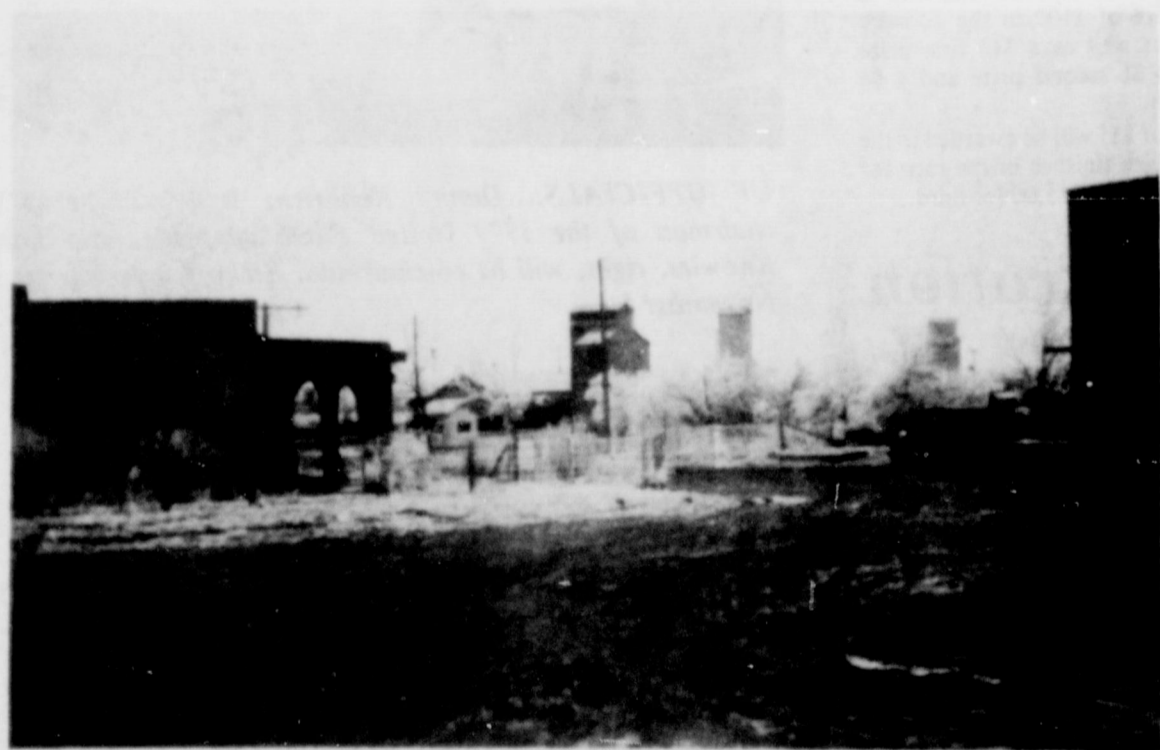

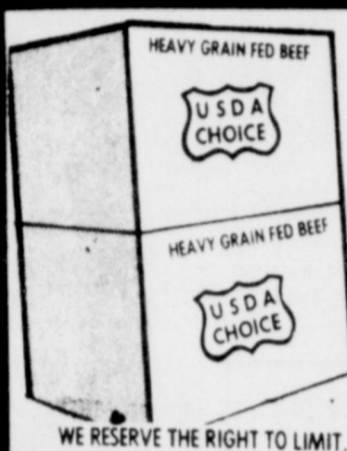

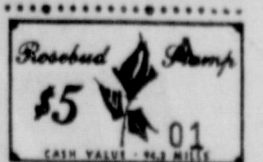

# Tulia Spoils Friona's Opening Game Party

The Tulia Hornets threw a damper on Friona's opening football game plans, scoring a 13-0 win over the Chieftains. The game also was during the city's Maize Days celebration.

But the Hornets were the only ones who got to celebrate last Friday. They scored a pair of touchdowns within 14 seconds of clock time, and that turned out to be all of the scoring for the night.

The Chieftains, meanwhile, never could get their Wishbone offense fully untracked. The team had only 96 total yards, 87 on the ground and nine by passing, and only seven first downs.

The first quarter was played on almost even terms, as each team had "opening night jitters."

Friona had a good opportunity after Tulia's first possession and a short punt gave the team the ball first and ten on the Hornet 45. However,

three downs gained nine yards, and on fourth and one from the 36, Tulia held quarterback Joe Malouf for no gain and took over.

The Hornets put together the game's first drive, getting three first downs in a row and moving to the Friona 33. However, the drive was halted when Tony Jackson intercepted a Tulia pass in the end zone.

After the teams swapped possessions, Tulia again mounted a drive, and this time was not to be denied. The Hornets took over after a short Friona punt into the brisk southwest wind, at the Friona 48. Nine plays later, quarterback Barry Cowan rolled seven yards into the end zone for the touchdown, and the kick made it 7-0, with 4:18 remaining in the half.

Jackson ran the kickoff out to the 20 for Friona. But Malouf never had control of the snap on the first play

from scrimmage and Tulia pounced on the ball.

On their next play, Cowan lofted the ball toward the Friona goal, and end John Hurd ran under it, making a nifty catch for six points. The kick was wide, but Tulia had assumed a 13-0 lead. The clock had lost only 14 seconds from the visitors' first touchdown.

Turnovers foiled the Chieftains in their first three possessions of the second half. Malouf had a pass intercepted at midfield on Friona's second offensive play, and getting the ball back a moment later, a pitchout went haywire, and Tulia recovered.

The Chiefs did put together two first downs—the only time they accomplished that during the game, and moved into Hornet territory at the Tulia 35. They were aided at one point by a pass interference penalty against the visitors.



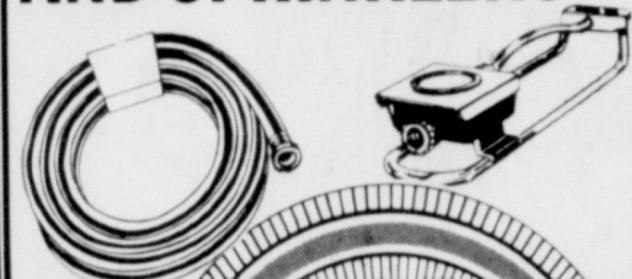

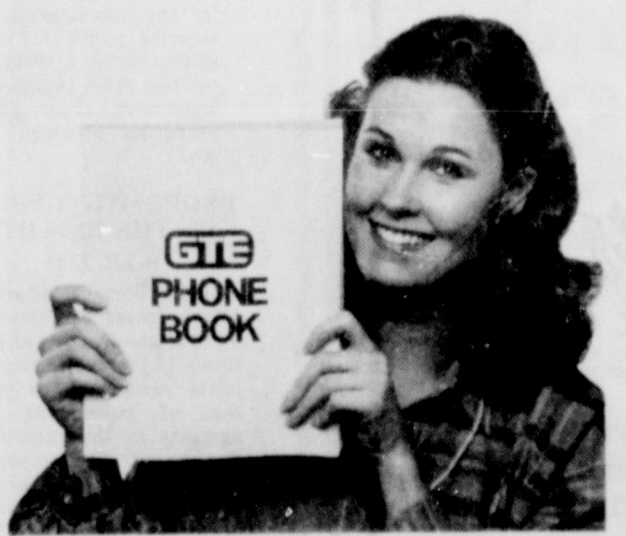

## PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would:

- Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and
- Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

La Resolución Conjunta Senatorial #13 propone una enmienda en la constitución de Texas para autorizar a la Legislatura para que provea una garantía de préstamos a las personas calificadas, para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas. De esta manera, la enmienda propuesta podría permitir a la Legislatura el proveer, emitir y vender bonos de obligación general llamados "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" (Bonos de Seguridad Para Préstamos Agrícolas y Ganaderos) del Estado de Texas, sin exceder la cantidad de \$10 millones de dólares. Todo dinero recibido de la venta de estos bonos sería depositado en un fondo diferente en la Tesorería Estatal y sería administrado por el comisionado de agricultura, sin más apropiaciones. Estos fondos garantizarían préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas. El comisionado de agricultura usaría estos fondos bajo las provisiones prescritas por la Legislatura, con el propósito de garantizar préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas; para adquirir hipotecas de bienes raíces o escrituras de bienes raíces garantizados. Estos fondos serían usados también para adelantar el prestatado del principal y del interés debido en esos préstamos, a la persona que califique para el préstamo. La Legislatura también podría autorizar al comisionado de agricultura para que venda cualquier terreno adquirido mediante esta enmienda. El comisionado de agricultura requeriría al menos un 6 por ciento de interés en dichos préstamos. La enmienda propuesta apropiaría la cantidad suficiente para pagar el principal y el interés de los bonos que van adquiriendo más valor, o que se venzan durante el año fiscal, menos la cantidad del fondo de interés y amortización al final del año anterior.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional para autorizar a la Legislatura para que por medio de la venta de bonos de obligación general del Estado de Texas, provea una garantía para que las personas calificadas puedan obtener préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas."

Mrs. Jayson Grimsley of Friona and Mrs. Steve Smith of Sudan, sisters of the groom, served from the groom's table.

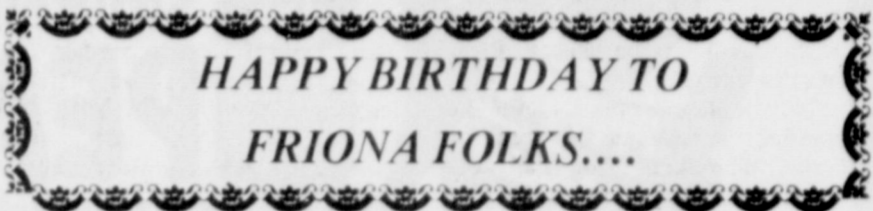
For a wedding trip to Denver, Colorado, the bride chose a peach colored street length dress with matching gold shoes and purse.

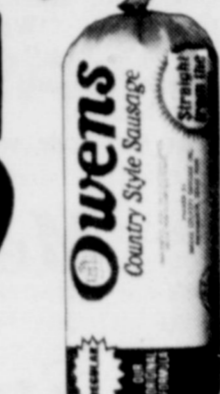
