High-Speed Chase Ends In Arrests

The theft of \$21.06 worth of gas from a Bovina service station last Friday led to a high-speed chase across two counties, and an exchange of bullets which left an 18-year-old Iowa man wounded, but also facing charges of attempted murder as well as theft.

It was about 7:15 last Friday evening when the late-model green pickup truck occupied by a young man and two girls, pulled into the Bovina Wheat Growers' Co-op station on Highway 60. Herman Grissom, manager, said he had closed the station, and was changing the lettering on the advertising sign which the station maintains.

"The man asked me to fill up the pick-up, and when I explained that we were closed, he said 'I sure need some gas, if you can re-open for me,'" Grissom related.

Grissom said he filled up the pickup tank, and the driver then asked him to fill up a spare tank in the bed of the pickup. The pickup had to be moved to accomplish this operation. While the pickup was backed around, Grissom noticed it had an Arizona license plate.

About the time Grissom finished filling the gas tanks, the pickup driver got out of the cab and asked him "You don't know where I could sell a couple of shot guns, do you?" ("I knew right then I might be in trouble," Grissom said.)

"I asked him what kind he had, and he said '20 gauge.' I asked to look at one, and he got a gun out of the cab and I inspected it. It was a single-shot rifle, which was unloaded at the time," Grissom recalled.

"I told the youngster I wouldn't be interested, that this wasn't the type of gun most folks liked for hunting, and turned toward the station," Grissom continued.

"The man put his hands on the pickup side and vaulted over into the bed, and one of the two girls in the cab slid over under the wheel. They dug out of the station, and turned south at the intersection, going on Third Street," Grissom recalled.

The station manager said he went into the station and called Bovina City Marshal Jerry Atchley, and told him what had happened.

"A few minutes later, Jerry drove up. He had put out bulletins to the area police departments," Grissom continued.

The Bovina marshal asked Grissom to accompany him to Friona, which had radioed and had the vehicle in surveillance.

A little later, they learned that the pickup and its occupants evaded the roadblock, which had been set up on the west side of Friona near West Friona Grain. Friona patrolman Nick Hand pursued the vehicle, which sped through that city at a high speed. Hand notified the Hereford Texas Highway Patrol by radio, and another roadblock was set up near Summerfield.

"At one point when we were following, we heard Patrolman Hand say on his radio 'I'm going 105 mph, and I'm not gaining a bit,'" Grissom said.

One of the officers involved verified the high speeds, and said that the pickup passed at least ten vehicles on the right side. "We were lucky that someone was not hurt during the chase, particularly since it was on a two-lane highway," officer Nick Hand said.

The pickup again ignored the roadblock, and this time fired at THP officer Gary Whitfill of Hereford. Whitfill advised Hand to back off, due to the gunfire.

The pickup turned north off Highway 60 at the intersection which leads to the Armour Beef Plant going the other direction. About a half-mile

north, they "ran out of road." "They went up over a steep irrigation ditch, and literally left the ground. When they landed, the pickup blew out a tire," said Marshal Jerry Atchley.

At about this point, the vehicle became stuck, and its occupants jumped out and left on foot. It was about "twilight" by this time.

The officers continued their pursuit, having to have help after two of their vehicles became stuck.

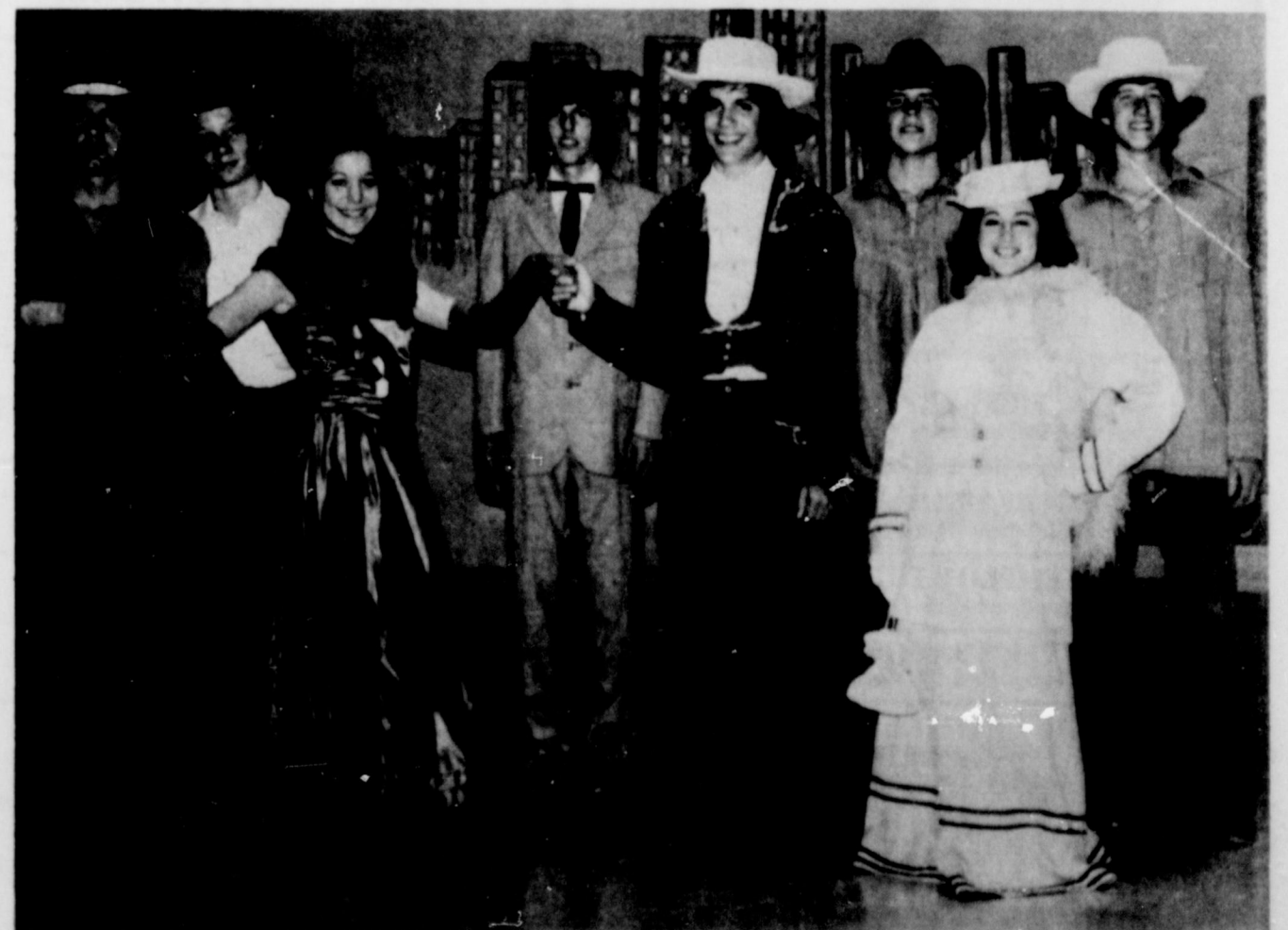
Clark's 18 put him into a tie for the lead in the contest standings with Jerry Hinkle, with a score of 95. Hinkle had a score of 17 for the week.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 11, 1929
Dr. A.P. McElroy has let the contract for the erection of the building that is to house the new Friona laundry, Thomas & Thompson being the contractors. The building is being erected on Main Street in the McMillan-Fergus addition to Friona, on the north side of the city.

W.J. Coffman, living several miles south of town, was the first to bring a

bale of cotton to his Friona gin this season. The bale was brought in last Thursday.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 12, 1934
Those in charge of Friona Consumers Company filling station and oil depot came near witnessing a serious fire in the building on Thursday morning of last week, when a heater got on fire. An over amount of distillate had gotten into the oil burning heater. It appears that two school boys who live in the country, had missed their bus the evening before and had spent the night at the company's sales room with Roy Williams, who was in charge as night man that night. About 5 o'clock Thursday morning while Mr. Williams was outside attending to his duties, the boys proceeded to light a fire in the heater and allowed too much fuel to get into the fire pot of the stove causing flames to cover the stove and fill the building with smoke.

40 YEARS AGO--OCT. 13, 1939
The severe drought of nearly three months duration in this locality, was broken last Saturday when clouds began during the forenoon, to drop their moisture in gentle showers, covering this locality and Parmer County and extending practically to all parts of the Panhandle. The rain left from one to two inches of moisture in the Friona territory.

35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 13, 1944
While working on a windmill tower at the Ivie farm, 15 miles southeast of Friona last Friday, Raymond Adams lost his balance and fell to the ground. No bones were broken, however, he was severely bruised and shaken.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 14, 1954
Law officers are investigating the robbery of the Piggly Wiggly store in Friona Wednesday night at which time \$257.01 was taken from a cash register by someone entering the building through a jagged hole in a rear door. The thieves pried the bars that cross the glass slightly, then broke the glass.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 15, 1959
Hurshel Harding of Farwell has announced his candidacy for the office of county attorney, a position he now holds. His announcement is made subject to the Democratic Primary May 7.

Early reports of this year's grain sorghum harvest show decided signs that this year's crop may even exceed the 18,000,000 bushel proportions which was estimated earlier in the year. According to managers of several elevators in the Friona and northern Parmer County areas the per acre yield is running quite a bit above last year's county average of 3,300 pounds per acre.

15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 15, 1964
Preliminary dirt work began last Friday toward construction of the new \$1 million high school building in the west part of town. Contractors say the building will be ready for classes next fall.

Merylene Massie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.M. Massie, was crowned Football Queen during the Friona-Hale Center game last Friday.

10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 16, 1969
Carleen Greeson was crowned homecoming queen during the coronation last Friday.

The Friona area was startled last weekend with a killing freeze, which came earlier than usual, and may have damaged crops not harvested.

5 YEARS AGO--OCT. 13, 1974
Clay Bandy, Friona High School senior backfield star, was cited this week by both the Amarillo Globe-News and the Lubbock Avalanche Journal as "Player of the Week" for his role in guiding the Chiefs to their 14-6 victory over Hart last Friday. Funeral services were conducted here Wednesday for Bert Shackelford, 81, a longtime Friona resident. Shackelford had lived in Perryton for the past two years.



Mrs. Freeman New Manager For Gibson's

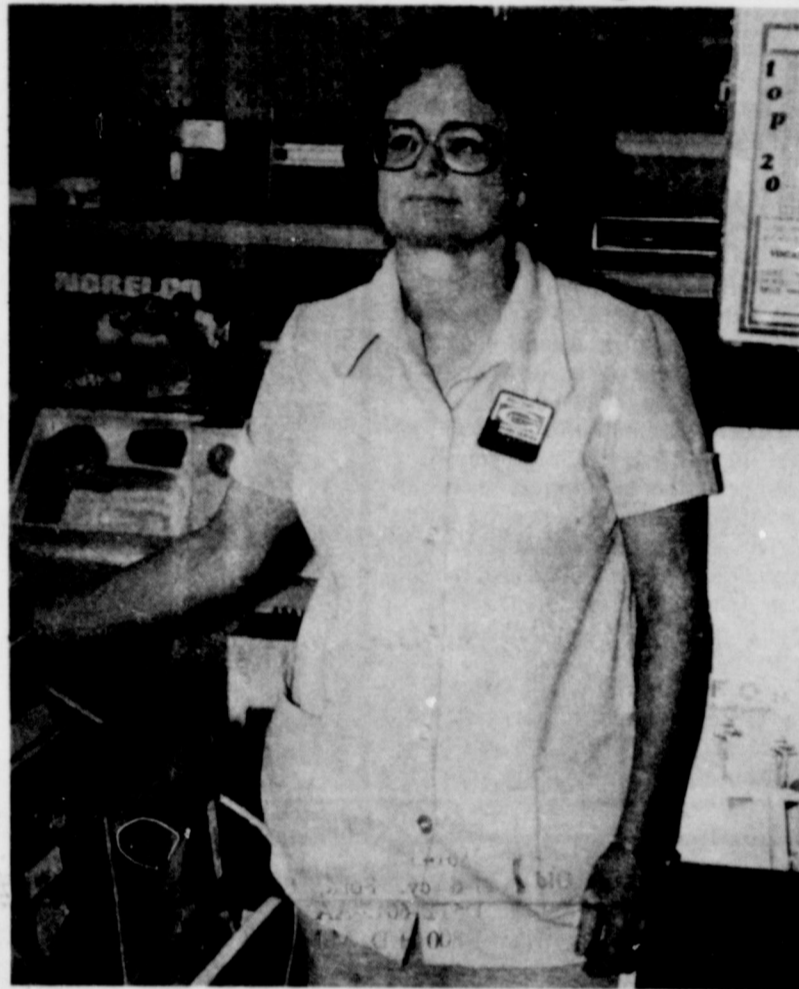
Betty Freeman of Hereford, a longtime resident of the Friona and Hereford area, has been named manager of Friona's Gibson's store.

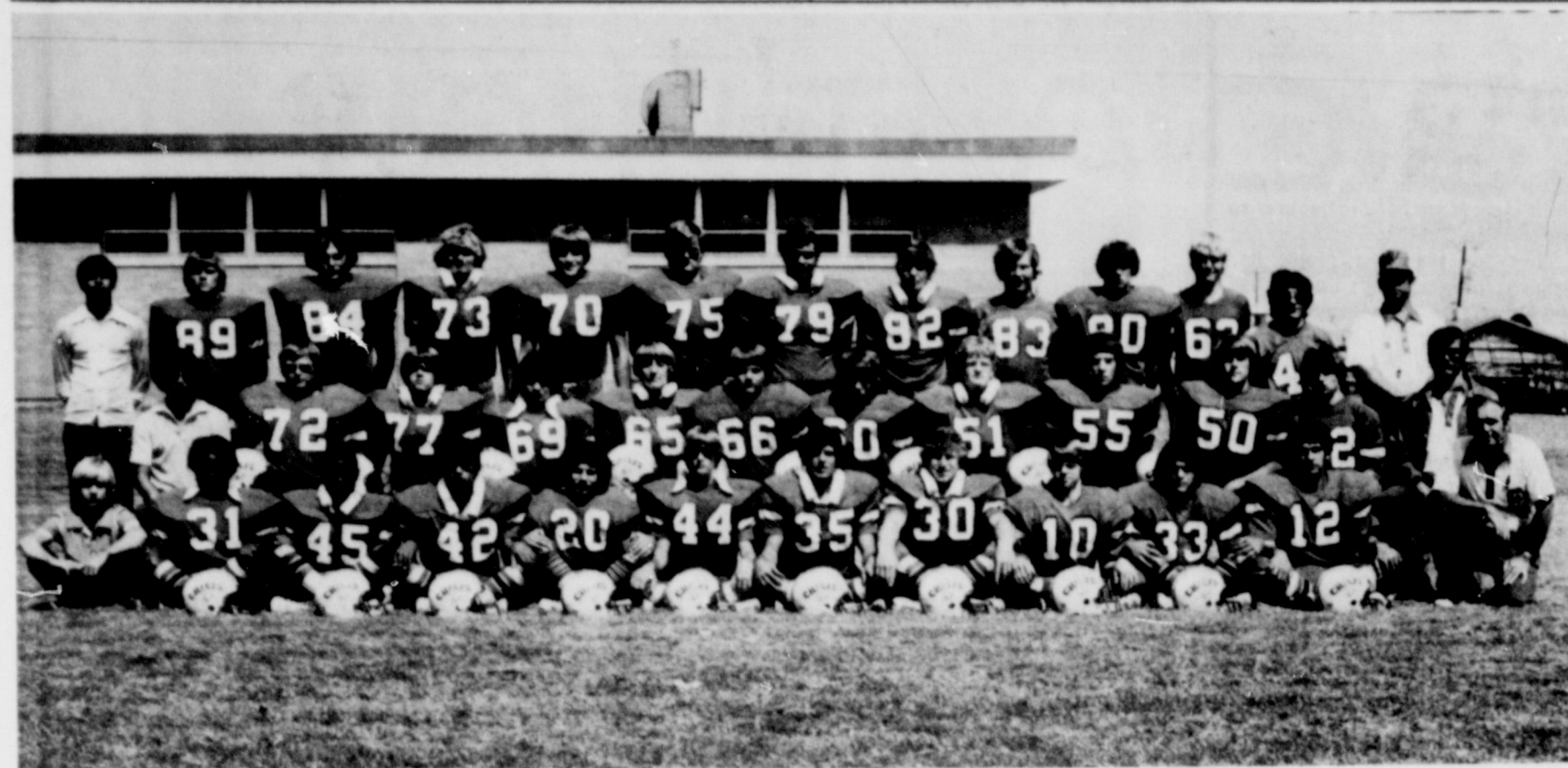

Chiefs Have Edge In Stats

A compilation of the statistics at mid-season causes you to look twice at the season record (1-3-1) of the Friona Chieftains, since the Chiefs have compiled a good set of records.

The team leads five season opponents in first downs, 62-55, in net yards gained rushing, 975-508, in total net yards, 1180-1058, and trailed in total points scored, by only 84-74.

Friona led or held their own against each of their first five opponents with the exception of Tulia, which had a statistical lead over the Chieftains.

In scoring, the Chiefs held a big lead in the third quarter aggregate scoring, 34 to 13, but trailed in fourth quarter points, 29-12. This fourth quarter deficit was due entirely to the last non-district game against Vega, which outscored the Chiefs, 21-6, to snatch victory away from Friona in the latter stages.

Rushing leader for the non-district

schedule was Mike Hubbard, with 410 yards gained on 88 tries, a 4.7 average. Rod Owen is next with 235 yards on 43 attempts, or 5.5 yards per carry.

Tony Jackson is the leading pass receiver, with four catches good for 110 yards, a 27.5-yard average. But Owen has two catches for 88 yards, including one for a 79-yard scoring play, averaging 44 yards per pass catch.

The Friona Volunteer Fire Department is asking the cooperation of all drivers in the Friona area.

Volunteers ask that all drivers pull over and stop whenever they hear the fire alarm. The local fire department is completely volunteer, and each fireman responding to the alarm will be driving his personal car.

Most firemen will have the emergency flashers on his vehicle in operation. This allows other drivers to identify the fireman and give him the right of way.

Getting to the fire station in a minimum amount of time is just as important as getting to the fire with the fire trucks. Main Street is a particular problem, especially if the alarm sounds, as it did recently, when there are a number of young drivers driving up and down the street.

The average amount of time taken to respond to an alarm is three minutes. The time saved by yielding right of way could very well save a life or someone's home. Remember--what if you had a fire and no fireman came??

Recent fire calls were made to a corn dryer, a fire at a local feed yard, and a minor fire at Hi-Pro Feeds where an acetylene bottle caught fire.

The department also assisted at the recent Homecoming bonfire to see that the fire did not get out of control.

Serendipity--Accidentally discovering things of importance while investigating subjects of only minor interest.

This is a situation that a researcher even a serious reader, will encounter quite often. I'll give you a "for instance."

A few weeks ago my favorite son-in-law treated me to a trip into the state of Colorado. Our destination was Bent's Fort seven miles east of La Junta (the junction or crossroads). Space here does not allow a full description. I suggest anyone interested in Western history make the trip. William and Charles Bent and their partner Ceran St. Varain established a trading post that became the largest business between Independence, Mo. and Santa Fe, N.M.

Kim and I were fascinated by the size and scope of the operation. It has been completely restored at a cost of several millions of dollars. A "must" trip!

While there I purchased a book that tells all about it. I'll leave it in the library for your enjoyment.

Now for the serendipity connection.

One bedroom at the fort is called the Susan Magoffin room. It was here that nineteen year old Susan Shelby Magoffin stayed for about two weeks while accompanying her brand new husband on a trip to Santa Fe and on into Old Mexico. I had brushed shoulders with Susan many times but standing in her room at Bent's Fort made me realize that I knew very little about her.

The above mentioned book gave as a reference "Down the Santa Fe Trail and Into Mexico"--the diary of Susan during parts of 1846 and 1847. Edited by Stella M. Drumm, published by Yale University Press in 1926, it is a true account that proves again the power of truth over fiction. It is a rare book and only responsible patrons may obtain it--so be ye forewarned.

For the casual reader I suggest Janice Holt Giles excellent little book, "Voyage to Santa Fe"--this is in our library and I am positive Mrs. Giles leaned heavily on Susan's diary.

Whichever route you follow--have a nice arm chair adventure.

Texans warned of water shortage

COLLEGE STATION -- While the rest of the country struggles with the energy shortage, oil and gas-rich Texas is facing a potentially greater crisis: lack of water.

"We are simply drawing on our underground water supply faster than it is being replenished," warned Dr. Jack Runkles, director of the Texas Water Resources Institute at Texas A&M University.

"If the state continues to grow at its current pace, we may in fact have to consider bringing in water supplies from outside and that would be very, very expensive," he said.

Runkles predicted by the year 2,000, Texans will be consuming 24 billion gallons of water a day, up from an estimated 15 billion gallons a day currently.

Jimmy did much of the work since he had once been a carpenter.

But he also had help.

His dad, L.R. White of Friona, Texas, came to help with the project and his mother and father-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Nowell, also lent a hand.

The Nowells, who bought a nearby home at the same time, farmed in West Texas and they, too, wanted to live in an area where the trees grew tall and where the grass was knee-high.

Although the house is long-since complete, construction at the White ranch is an on-going process. Jimmy and his father-in-law have been busy among other things, building metal cattle pens since the move was complete.

Mrs. White--Jaqueta--is also known about Fort Towson for her cake decorating, which she does commercially. And, she also sews, paints and works in the family garden.

In addition she likes to do craft work. "If I can find some scissors and glue, I'm happy," she explained.

The girls are also busy from daylight 'till dark. They--in addition to joining mom and dad for the customary farm chores--sew, paint, and play musical instruments. Kristi, who won first place in county 4-H sewing competition year before last, plays the piano, violin and guitar. Kathy plays the violin, a skill she learned by taking private lessons in Paris.

The youngest member of the family, Kyle, three, spends much of his time playing cowboy or napping on the living room floor.

Although most days are filled, White still finds time to serve as a member of the Fort Towson School Board and he keeps a boat nearby just in case there's time enough for a short fishing trip to Hugo Lake.

Mrs. White is a member of the Fort Towson Parent-Teacher Association and is a Cancer Crusade worker.

The Whites also teach the Couples Sunday School Class at the First Baptist Church in Hugo.

The Whites have won other awards for their farming and ranching operations. He was once named Jaycee Farmer of the Year by the Muleshoe Jaycees and was selected Soil Conservation Farmer of the Year by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, District 9. Mrs. White also shared the honors by being named District Homemaker by the SCS.

A look at their Fort Towson home and farming operations explains why they were selected.

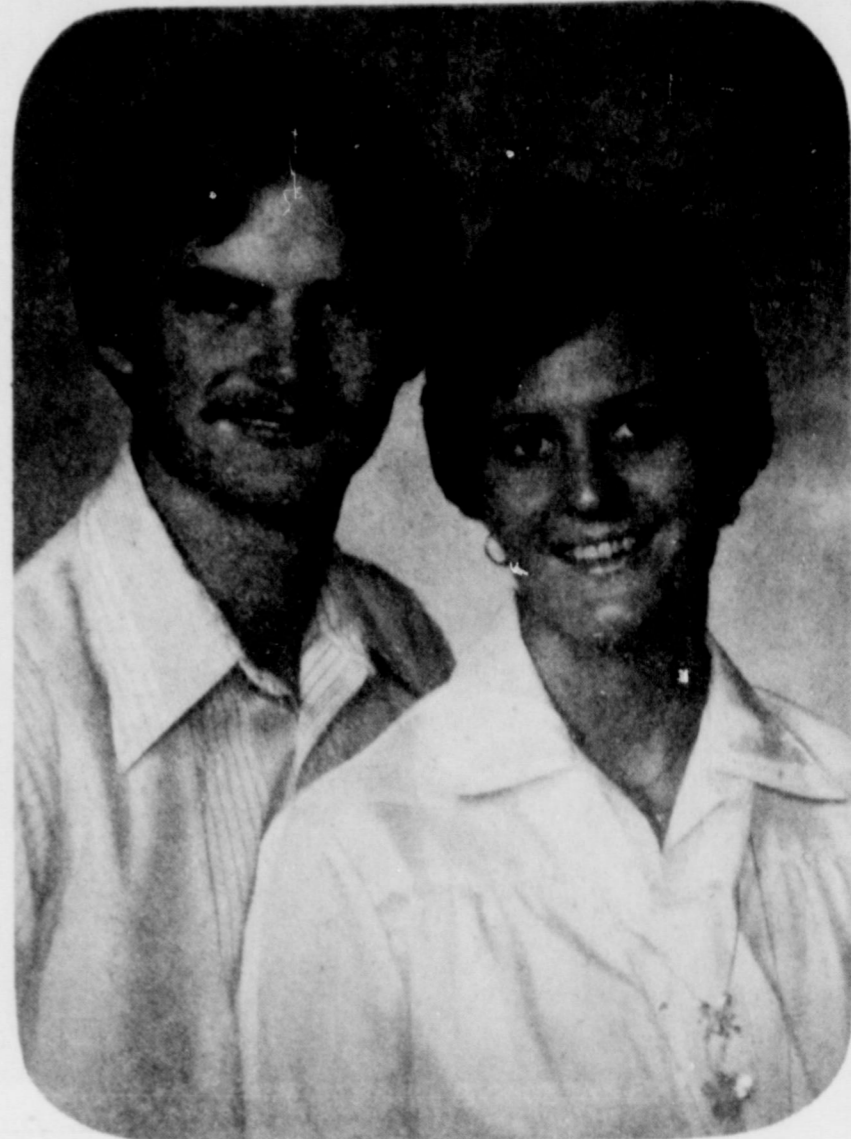

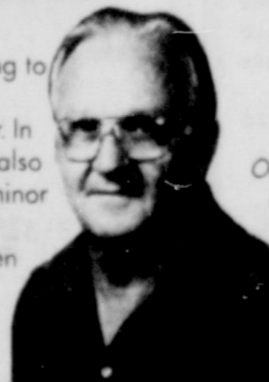
