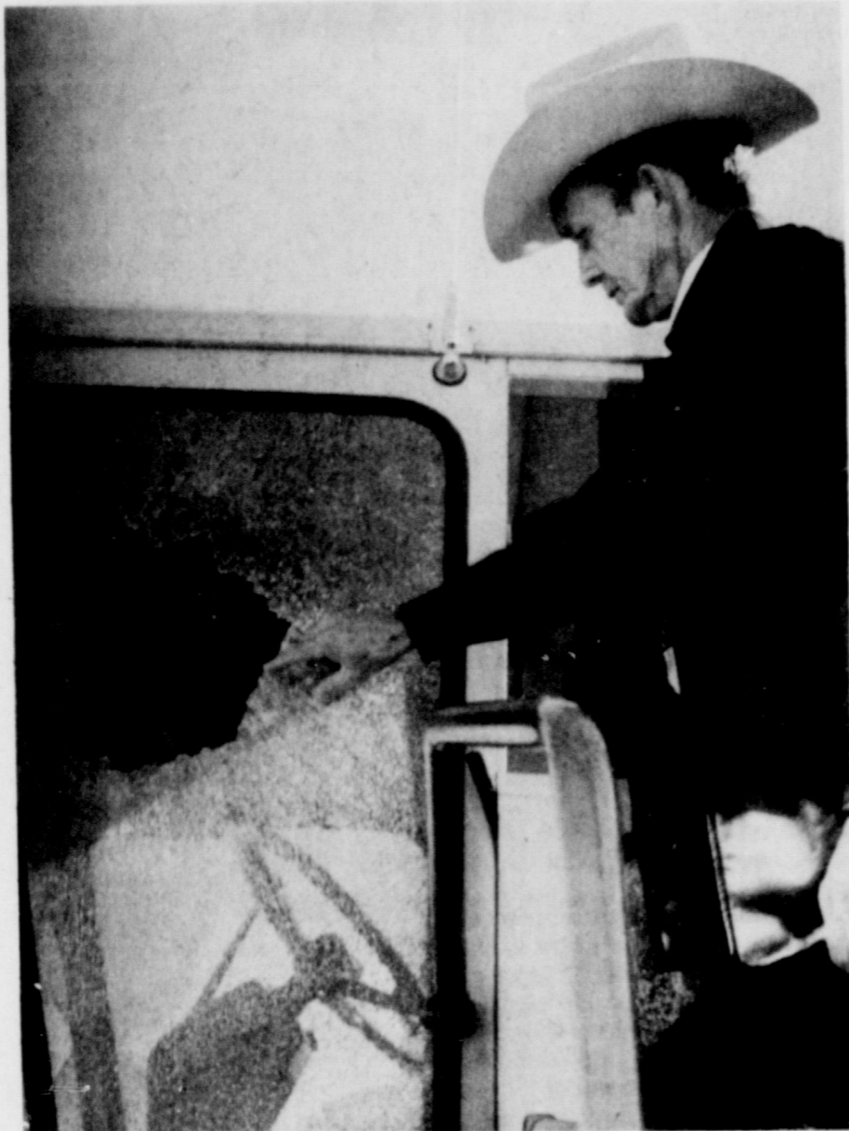
But one of the most popular uses for a used subscription is to spank the new puppy when it forgets what the paper was supposed to be used for.

air out of the tires on a cotton stripper, and stole or drained out over 700 gallons of fuel or chemicals. They also smashed windows on three vehicles parked at the Bruegel Bros. Gin.

Vandals Strike Area Farm, Gin

Vandalism and thefts affected the local area again during the past week, as the lawbreakers this time wreaked their vengeance on an area farmer's machinery, fuel and chemicals. An area gin was also affected.

Sheriff's Deputy Bob Davis reported that vandals hit the Richard Lupton farm, 12.3 miles southeast of Friona on FM 2397, near the Parmer County line.

The vandals broke out all of the glasses in a John Deere combine which was parked in a maize field just off FM 2397. They also drove a quarter-mile south down a turnrow, and broke out all of the glasses in the cab of a cotton stripper parked in the edge of a field.

The assailants flattened all of the tires on the cotton stripper, and knocked a carburetor off an irrigation well near the farm implement, putting it out of commission.

At a storage barn on the Lupton place, the vandals stole two 55-gallon drums of LPG Co-op brand 30-weight oil. Davis said the oil is in blue drums with red tops. The thieves also took a Porter Mfg. rope applicator-sprayer, plus three hand pumps for pumping the oil out of the drums.

Cotton Harvest Picking Up

The cotton harvest was beginning to pick up steam in the Friona area this week, after being delayed for two weeks by wet weather.

Although the harvest was just getting underway in the Bovina and Farwell areas, the gins were beginning to get busy in the southern part of the county. In some parts of the area, the cotton is still too wet, as up to two inches of moisture has been logged during the past two weeks.

Most observers feel that the cotton crop will be average to somewhat better than average in the sections that were not damaged by hail. Late-season hail severely damaged the crop in August in the Lazbuddie area, and again in late October near Lazbuddie and Farwell.

The Star began its weekly survey of gins in Parmer County this week, and found on Thursday, November 15

that a total of 1,457 bales of cotton had been ginned in the county.

If farmers can get a break from the weather during the next two to three weeks, this total is expected to jump sharply. This total probably represents less than four per cent of the crop, which should top 40,000 bales in the county.

Fortenberry Resigns County Judge Office

County Judge Paul Fortenberry, who had three years remaining on a new four-year term of office, tendered his resignation this week to the Commissioners' Court, effective December 31, 1979.

The move was an unexpected one on behalf of the court, who will have the responsibility of appointing a person to serve as judge for 1980. Those interested in the position may file and run in the 1980 elections for the remaining two years (1981-82) of Fortenberry's term.

"I fully intended to fill out the term when I was elected in 1978, but decided on this course lately," Fortenberry said. He indicated that the decision had nothing to do with the commissioner's court, calling his reasons "strictly personal."

"Paul was the perfect man for the job. He was easy to get along with, and he knew his business. The commissioners were stunned at his decision, but at the same time, if he can go and do some things, we understand and wish him well," stated Commissioner Jack Patterson.

"It was just as much a surprise to us as it has been to everyone else. We're going to have a big job finding someone to fill Paul's shoes," stated Commissioner Ernest Osborn of Friona.

"I'm concerned about it, and I intend to be prayerful about the situation. We will appreciate the help and concern of everyone in resolving the situation," Patterson added.

Fortenberry presented the following statement concerning his decision:

"On November 9, 1979, I submitted my resignation as County Judge of Parmer County to the Commissioners Court of Parmer County, effective December 31, 1979.

"This was not an easy decision to make, as there is still three years to go on my present term. I fully intended, when I ran the last time, to complete this term. However, I now feel that I should retire at the end of this year. This decision was not made in haste; rather, I have been considering it for some three or four months.

The Methodist Church will furnish the coffee and tea for the fellowship after the service. Other churches are asked to bring cookies. An offering will be taken for the purpose of helping needy families during the coming year.

The event is sponsored by the Friona Ministerial Alliance.

Star Sets Deadline

"I wish to publicly thank the people of Parmer County for the confidence they placed in me in 1974, and again in 1978. They gave me an opportunity to enter a field which was new to me, and was a great challenge to me. There is a great deal of difference in the grain business and County government, but I have enjoyed it. I am still very much interested in the grain business, as that is where I spent most of my adult life.

"However, being County Judge has given me an opportunity to study and enter into fields that have been very interesting and rewarding. I have made many Judgements while in office, and I assure you that each one was what I believed to be right and just at the time. I have taken full responsibility for each decision. There have been times when I became a bit discouraged, when it appeared that action taken was not appreciated or respected; then when someone responds in an affirmative way, I realized it was all worthwhile. It would be nice to be able to help

everyone who needs help. Of course, that is impossible.

"I must give special thanks to those good friends of my home area, who have stood by me and my family in times of tragedy, as well as times of happiness and accomplishment. They are special friends to me, and I will always treasure their friendship. Their confidence in me lifted me up when I really needed it.

"In closing, I would encourage everyone to become involved in government at all levels. It has reached the point, in the upper levels of government, that the person who pays the bill is given no consideration because most of us are too busy making a living to express our wishes to our representatives.

"Write your representatives often and express your feelings about any subject. For instance; the SALT Agreement, the Panama situation, bussing, inflation, welfare, foreign policy, Cuba, defense, just to name a few. They will answer your letter, and probably inform you further about the subject. This way, we can all be better informed.

"Again, thank you for your confidence and friendship over the years. I will always treasure it."

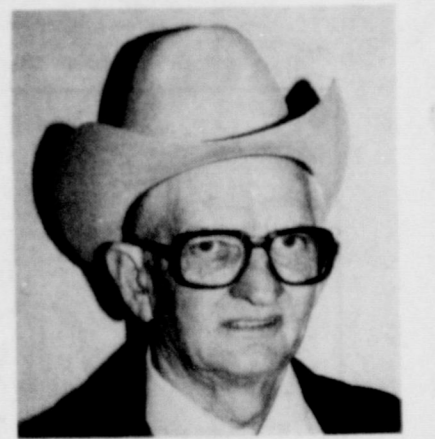

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 22, 1929

Street commissioner F.W. Reeve has a force of men with tractors and teams employed loosening and removing the dirt along Main Street from the places where it is too high to the low places, thus making it of an even grade in all places. It is Mr. Reeve's plan to thus level the street thus make it perfectly smooth, with grader and drag and thus get rid of the bumps and chuck-holes and allow the water which falls to be carried away by the gutters. Then it is planned to treat the entire business portion of the street with a thick covering of caliche and give it a thorough packing, followed probably with a coat of tarvia or some cheap oil filter. If this can be done, Friona's main street will be in A-1 condition and should last several years.

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 23, 1934

The annual Thanksgiving service in which all our Friona churches unite, will be held next Thursday night at seven o'clock in the First Baptist Church building. The address will be given by the Rev. H.L. Thurston, pastor of the local Methodist Church. All other ministers in the city will share in the services, and appropriate music will be provided.

40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1939

The nicest parade, perhaps, to have ever traversed Friona's streets, was the Armistice Day parade, that was given last Saturday afternoon. The parade was under the auspices of the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary and sponsored and arranged by these organizations and the Entertainment Committee of the local Chamber of Commerce.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1944

Just as the Chiefs were getting ready to play their last game of the season and pack their suits away, they found themselves in a tie for the district championship. The Chiefs defeated the Tulia Hornets earlier in the season, and then fell to the Hereford Whitefaces. Tulia, then, stinging from the defeat handed them by the Chiefs, ran roughshod over the Hereford eleven. This makes Hereford and Friona all even, and Tulia still has a game to play with Dalhart, and could make it a three-way tie.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 18, 1949

Don Edwin Lewis, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lewis of Friona, will be the featured soloist on the Co-op round-up radio program

over Station KFDA, Amarillo on Saturday. Young Lewis will sing two songs, "The Old Refrain" and "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling."

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 19, 1954

Organization of a local credit association Tuesday evening became a reality for Parmer County. The Friona Texas Federal Credit Union now chartered, completed organization at an open meeting in the Friona Legion Hall, with all supervisory personnel elected.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 19, 1964

The First Baptist Church will officially observe its 50th anniversary this Sunday, with special services throughout the day. Former pastors and members will be the speakers for the occasion. Rev. Russell Pogue, now of Petersburg, will bring the message at the Sunday morning service.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 20, 1969

Tragedy struck the community of Friona another blow during the past week, as two city teenagers died following a wreck a mile west of town. Becky Broyles, 14, was killed instantly, and Billy Rushing, 15, died Tuesday, after the car in which they were riding went out of control about 11 p.m. last Saturday night. Investigating officers said the right front tire on the 1967 Ford LTD blew out, causing the car to turn over. The vehicle skidded some 250 feet. Both occupants were thrown out of the car.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1974

The cotton harvest season was kicked off here Friday when Jean K. Anthony brought a bale in to Friona Farmers Co-op Gin, the gin's first bale of 1974 cotton. The first bale weighed an even 500 pounds, and yielded 760 pounds of seed. The turnout averaged 26.1 per cent.

The Friona Area United Fund drive stood at 46.5 per cent completed as of Thursday, it was announced by Don Gatlin, general chairman of the 1974 drive. Amount deposited to the fund at Friona State Bank amounted to \$3,301.15.

Schueler Is SCS Director

Raymond Schueler was elected a director in Zone 1 at an election held in October of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Schueler is from the Rhea Community, and will serve an area roughly outlined by the Rhea and Bovina School districts. He owns and farms about 1860 acres of land in the Rhea area.

He has served in various capacities in Parmer County including ASCS Committee, chairman of the Farm Bureau, and Democratic precinct chairman.

"He will be a very real asset to the Conservation District Board and conservation in general for Parmer County," a spokesman for SCS commented.

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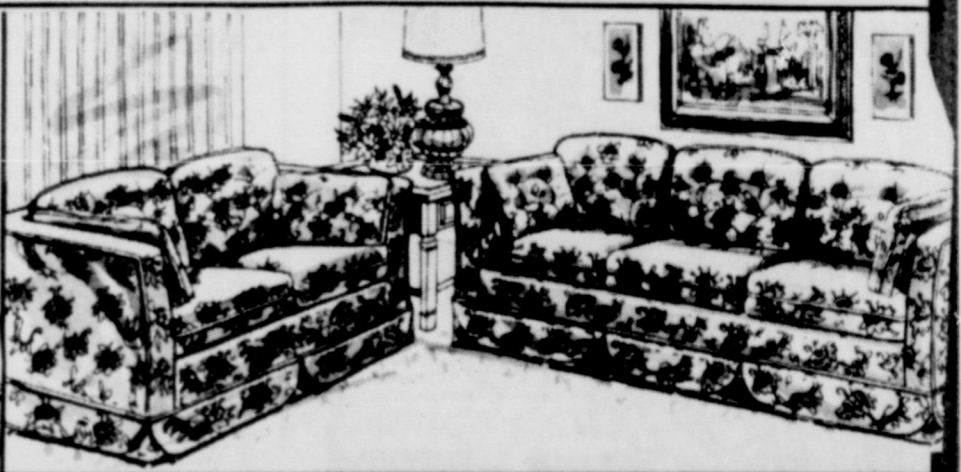

JVs Whitewash Olton Team, 32-0

The Friona Junior Varsity scored a 32-0 win over Olton last Thursday, completely dominating the Jr. Mustangs. Friona scored all of its points in the first half, and coasted during the final stages.

The junior Chiefs had the benefit of some long runs, including a 94-yard scoring dash by Nelson Jackson, and a 72-yard burst by Robert Osborn.

The Chieftains scored in the first quarter when Mark Tucker blocked a punt and recovered it in the end zone for a 6-0 Friona lead.

Robert Caballero ran 24 yards for the second Friona TD. The PAT try was no good, and the score was 12-0. Osborn followed with his 72-yard run for six points, and the score became 18-0. That also was the score at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Jackson ran

28 yards for a score, and Craig Lookingbill ran for two points and a 26-0 lead. Jackson came back the next time Friona had the ball for his 94-yard dash up the middle, and a 32-0 Friona lead.

Friona led in first downs, 16-6. Jackson had 120 yards on eight carries. Osborn gained 118 yards on only seven tries, and Caballero had 68 yards on eight tries. Ricky Mercado and Lookingbill led the defense with 13 and 12 tackles, and Mark Osborn had ten.

Mercado also had an interception. Marciano Escalante had six tackles and a fumble recovery. Jackson recovered a fumble, and Tony Lafuente blocked a kick.

Chiefs' Luck Still The Same -- All Bad

Friona's Chieftains dropped their fourth District 3-AA game to the Olton Mustangs, 29-10, in a frigid game last Friday at Olton.

It was a frustrating loss for the Chiefs, who had scored 23 points against the league-leading Muleshoe Mules, yet could manage only ten points against the Mustangs, who like the Chiefs had not won a district game.

Like they have done in most of their district games, Friona had a good offensive night, with 165 total yards. But the Chieftains were hurt by their inability to keep a sustained drive underway.

Olton got on the scoreboard first, with a drive in the first quarter capped by a three-yard run by Danny Garcia, who scored three of Olton's four touchdowns. Kenny Smith's kick gave the Mustangs a 7-0 lead.

Friona came back with a drive of their own, and sparked by the running of Mike Hubbard and Chuck Nichols, marched the ball downfield. Nichols raced 18 yards for the touchdown, and Friona converted a two-point conversion with Hubbard running it across, to give the Chieftains an 8-7 lead.

Friona's lead was short-lived. In fact, it lasted just as long as it took the team to tee the ball up and kick it off, and Olton to return the kickoff.

Garcia fielded the ball at his own ten yard line, bounced away from a couple of would-be tacklers, and raced 90 yards for the touchdown. Smith's PAT kick made the score 14-8, Olton.

Before the half ended, Olton scored again, on a 15-yard pass from Lance Strobel to Roy Luera, and Smith's kick gave the Ponies a 21-8 halftime lead.

Things did not change appreciably for the Chieftains during the second half.

Olton scored a third quarter touchdown, and this time added two points running, to stretch their lead to

29-8.

Before the quarter ended, Robert Jackson and Jeff Landrum tackled Olton quarterback Strobel in the end zone for a two-point safety that cut the margin to 29-10, but Friona was unable to push across a touchdown during the second half, which was more defensive than the first.

It was a physical game, with quarterback Joe Malouf sidelined after being hit during a passing attempt. Malouf was on a sprint-out pass play when he was hit by an Olton defender. The Chieftain signal-caller suffered a back injury and a burst blood vessel, and was out the rest of

the game.

End Joel Hight also suffered a sprained shoulder during the game. Coach Lonnie Phillips indicated this week that Hight was questionable for the season-ender against Dimmitt, and a decision on Malouf's status also was up in the air.

Hubbard was the leading ground-gainer for the Chieftains with 69 yards and Nichols added 58.

Defensively, the statistics were as follows: Rondee Clark had 16 tackles, Jerry Harrelson 13 and Jeff Landrum 11 to pace the defense. Otherwise, tackles were registered by Robert Jackson, eight, Chuck Nichols, Joel Hight and Chitto Caballero, seven, and Tony Jackson, six.

Martin Mercado had four tackles and a fumble recovery. Jackson and Landrum had a quarterback sack, and Scott Fangman had a blocked kick and caused a fumble, in addition to four tackles.

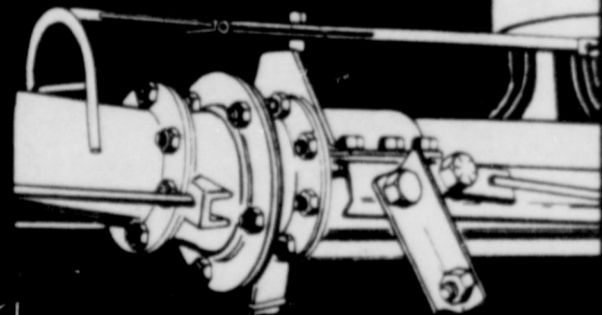

Parmer County Brands Enshrined By A&M

The search is on throughout Texas for outstanding cattle brands to include on county panels at the Kleberg Center's "branded stairway" at Texas A&M University.

L.A. Maddox, chairman of the unique branding project, said that some 3,500 brands, or more, are expected to be imprinted on the 254 "county oak panels" in the University's new \$9.5 million Robert J. Kleberg Animal and Food Sciences Center.

"County Extension agents are working with their local beef cattle committees to select eight brands per county, and with historical societies to select other brands for the panels," Maddox, Texas Agricultural Extension Service beef cattle specialist, said.

Recently, a delegation from Parmer County added local brands to the county's oak panel. Participating were: James Dixon, and his two sons, Milon and Mendan of the Rhea community; B.K. Buske, his wife Janet, and his mother Myrl of Friona; Jacquelyn Langford of

Farwell; and Seth Ralston, CEA, Parmer County.

There are some 200,000 brands recorded in Texas and on file with the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in Fort Worth. This is the state's most complete record.

The "branding" was an idea of Dr. O.D. Butler, for many years head of Texas A&M's Animal Science Department and now associate vice president for agriculture and renewable resources. He said that not only are cattle brands a rich part of Texas livestock history but a prized possession of ranchers identification of their cattle.

"We felt that the branding ceremonies would bring about a closer tie-in between cattlemen and our animal science facilities on campus as well as with research and educational work throughout Texas," Butler said.

Maddox said that branding ceremonies will be conducted by Extension district groups until "all panels are branded."
