OVER THE WEEKEND I was thumbing through the current issue of one of my favorite magazines, when I noticed a rather provocative article about the American political scene. The magazine offered some rather interesting suggestions, and in view of the 1980 presidential campaigns coming up soon, we decided to pass along some of these innovative ideas to our readers. See what you think of

Political candidates shall not be allowed to receive campaign contributions from individuals or large corporations. However, they will be allowed to finance their campaigns by driving a cab or panhandling on the street.

Outside interests in large corporations, real estate ventures or the stock market will be forbidden to all politicians. However they will be allowed to moonlight as garbage men, soda jerkers, gas station attendants or something equally suitable.

The President of the U.S. will receive a minimum wage (\$2.65 an hour) and, at the end of his term, will be "tipped" by the American public. Tips will not be allowed to exceed \$5.00 per person (since that's too small to be considered a bribe.)

The salaries of the President, his cabinet members, and all members of Congress will not be raised in accordance with the rising cost of living, since it's their job to keep it down in the first place.

In order to prove their dedication to their job, all politicians will be forced to take a "vow of poverty" before entering office.

Because congressmen have a tendency to fall asleep while on the job, a Surprise Quiz will be given at the end of each daily session of Congress, and the results will be published.

A fine of \$50.00 per word will be charged to all candidates who use five-syllable words where a twosyllable word (or less) would do just as well.

Government agencies will no longer be allowed to spend tax dollars for any reason whatsoever without first having to ask permission from each and every taxpayer.

Any politician claiming to be "one of the common people" will be required to live among the "common people" in a slum neighborhood while serving his full term of office.

Expense allowances for Congressmen will not exceed \$149.50 per week. If they can't manage their budget, why should they be allowed to manage ours?

All political candidates will be obliged to draw up a contract explaining in outline form what they plan to do if elected. And at the end of their terms, they will be paid a flat fee for every promise that wasn't broken.

Congressmen, Governors, Mayors and Supreme Court Judges will not be given bodyguards or Secret Servicemen since it's their job to keep the streets safe to begin with.

When they retire, all politicians will receive the same type of pension that is given to the average school teacher, coal miner, auto worker, clerk, etc.

## Club Sponsors Card Project

Modern Study Club will sponsor "Project Christmas Card" in Friona for the 24th consecutive year, the club

announced this week. The project benefits Parmer County Community Hospital during the Christmas season each year, and in the course of its history has raised over \$42,000 for equipment for the local hospital.

Equipment which cost over \$29,400 has been provided in the past nine years by gifts to the project.

Residents of the area are requested by the club each year to donate to the fund rather than mailing Christmas cards to local friends. Names of those contributing are published on a full page in the Christmas edition of the Friona Star, as a community-wide greeting to everyone in the Friona

Donations may be left at Friona State Bank. Club members will also place containers at several local businesses, where residents may leave their donations.

Deadline for donating to the fund and being a part of this year's project will be Saturday, December 15.

There is no set amount for the donations, but each person or family is requested to donate at least the amount of money they would normally spend on Christmas cards

and postage, mailing to local friends. Laverne Burrow, chairman for the event for the second straight year, says that the drive will be made to purchase a table and carts for the hospital's operating room, and a new light for the emergency room. Cost of these items will be around \$2,000, which is approximately what the drive raised in 1978.

Mrs. Burrow and her committee, consisting of Eva Miller, Carol Ellis and Saundra Nichols, were busy this week making posters, which will be placed in local businesses on Monday of next week.

Project Christmas Card was started in 1956, and in the 23 years since its beginning, has contributed to making Parmer County Community Hospital one of the most modern and wellequipped medical facilities in the

In recent years, the fund has purchased a heart monitoring unit, automatic beds for the new hospital wing, heating and air conditioning for the emergency and surgery rooms, fire alarm system for the building, an anesthetic machine, a Coulter counter, a monitor for the surgery room, a spirometer (a device to measure pulmonary functions for lung patients), and I.V. drip counters.

Beginning in 1970, the project has selected a particular object or need for its funds each year, and in that time has purchased equipment costing \$29,600.

Project Christmas Card has become a fine way for residents of the area, and even former residents, to say "Merry Christmas" to their friends, and at the same time assist the local hospital.

### United Fund Tops 100 %

Friona's 1979 United Fund drive topped the 100 per cent mark this

Co-chairmen Danny Kendrick and Larry Knowles reported that as of Wednesday noon, a total of \$10,934 had been deposited at Friona State Bank. This represented 103 per cent of the 1979 goal.

"We might still receive additional funds which could run the total up another three or four per cent, because we know of some workers who have not reported," Knowles

Knowles said that by topping the goal, the designated gift deductions could be paid, and assure that every agency receives 100 per cent.

"We are real pleased with the results of the drive. Everyone pitched in and worked real hard. It's a good feeling to make the goal, and do it in fairly short order," Knowles said.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 29, 1929

What might have been a most destructive fire at the gin Tuesday evening was averted by wise management and presence of mind of the overseer, Mr. Waddell. Raised medians will be removed at both locations and the roadway will be reconstructed to provide four through lanes, continuous left turn lanes and two parking lanes at each

The resurfacing project will repair the existing surface of U.S. 60 from Friona northeastward to the Deaf Smith County line, a distance of 14.6



fourth in duet acting. Amber Smith attained the semifinal round in poetry interpretation.


