THESE ARE THE DAYS, immediately following the semi-annual time change, when you look at your clock or watch and say "Let's see, it says 11 o'clock, but it's really just 10 o'clock, because I haven't set this one back."

Or maybe you have the clock in the kitchen changed, and the one in the bedroom, but haven't made it to the one in the living room. Seeing one which has been corrected, you start to go through your formula in figuring out what time it really is, when you realize that the clock you are looking at is, in fact right, and all you have to do to figure out what time it is, is to look at the face of the clock.

It's also the time I like best when, early in the morning when your "body alarm clock" awakens you, hinting that it's time to think about getting up for the day. But you squint at your nightstand clock and say "You're wrong, bod--you have another entire hour to sleep!"

FALL CAN BE A wonderful time of the year, particularly when we have the delightful "Indian Summer" weather that we have had these past two months, it can really be enjoyable.

It's harvest time in the local area, and there is a sense of accomplishment and victory as the farmers bring their produce to market.

We're fortunate in Parmer County that our crops are so diversified. We counted the other day on our fingers, and came up with 20 different crops which our farmers actually grow for cash. We were counting the various vegetable crops individually. Perhaps you could even add more. We counted corn, maize (milo), wheat, barley, cotton, sugar beets, soybeans, sunflowers, vetch, rye, haygrazer, alfalfa, cantaloupes, cabbage, potatoes, onions, castor beans, peppers, carrots and cucumbers.

If this isn't diversification, then we don't know the meaning of the word. Naturally, the acreage on some of these crops is small--but nevertheless, it's there, and our farmers grow all of these.

WE NOTICED SOMETHING the other day which we thought deserved favorable comment. So often we are quick to criticize when someone fails to meet a level of performance, and we thought that turn about is fair play.

The workmen who were busy giving the Highway 60 right-of-way its usual fall mowing were not only mowing the grass and weeds--they had litter bags, and were retrieving paper cups, cans and other such trash along the highway right-of-way.

The day we noticed this activity was one of those windy days about a week ago, when it would have been just as easy to have done the mowing and ignored the trash. But they were picking up the trash as well.

No doubt this operation was called for in the contract with the highway department, but we just wanted to say we noticed that it was being done, and our thanks and appreciation to those responsible. See, column writers can still give bouquets.

United Fund Drive Kicks Off Monday

The Friona Area United Fund will officially kick off its 1979 drive on Monday, November 5.

The drive will begin with the annual kickoff breakfast at 7 a.m. at the Friona Girl Scout House. The goal for 1979 is \$10,590. This is within three per cent of the 1978 goal.

Serving as speaker for the kickoff breakfast is Bill Sarpalius of Hereford, the district manager for Representative Bill Clayton.

Sarpalius lived at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch for seven years, and after graduating in 1967 he attended Clarendon Junior College. In 1968 he was elected state president of the Future Farmers of America and traveled over 75,000 miles representing the FFA.

Sarpalius served as student body president at Clarendon College, receiving his degree in 1970. He received his degree from Texas Tech University in 1972.

He spent two years as assistant director of admissions at Boys Ranch, and taught vocational agriculture for two years after that. In May of 1978 he received his master of education degree from WTSU and shortly thereafter went to work for Speaker Clayton.

Danny Kendrick and Larry Knowles are co-chairmen for the 1979 drive. Mike Buchanan is chairman of the rural portion of the drive.

Picking Upsets Pays Off For Contestant

Eddie Mann survived a week of upset games to claim first place in the Friona Star's football contest last week.

Mann was one of two contestants to correctly pick 19 of the 22 contest games, and then claimed the first prize on the basis of the Friona-Morton tie-breaker score.

"I just decided I was going to have to pick some upsets if I gained any ground in the contest, and luckily I did," Mann said when presented his \$10 check for first place.

Mann's only misses were in picking Amherst over Lazbuddie, Dallas over Pittsburgh and Minnesota over Tampa Bay. "It looked for a while like Minnesota was going to beat Tampa Bay, and if they had, I would've had 20 games right," Mann stated. The Buccaneers scored a fourth-period touchdown for a 12-10 win in that game.

Mann picked the tie-breaker score at 22-16 favoring Friona, missing the actual score by 10 points.

Second place went to C.H. Veazey, the other contestant picking 19 games right. Veazey's only misses were in the pro games, as he mis-fired on Dallas-Pittsburgh, Philadelphia-Cincinnati and New England-Baltimore. For his tie-breaker guess, he picked Friona, 21-13, and was 12 points away from the actual score.

Area Receives Snow, Moisture

An early-season snowstorm on Tuesday of this week followed on the heels of a late-season thunderstorm the previous night. The overlapping seasonal activity resulted in a total of 1.08 in moisture officially measured by the City of Friona--the first beneficial moisture for the local area in almost two months.

The front moved across the area late Monday, and was accompanied by an impressive electrical display. The Friona area was buffeted by pea and marble-sized hail for about ten minutes. The rainfall received Monday night amounted to .83 inch in the city.

The snowfall began in the early morning hours on Tuesday and continued throughout the day and into the night. Another .25 inch of moisture was measured from the

Farmers with any questions as to the status of disaster loans, or previous programs with the SBA are urged to attend.

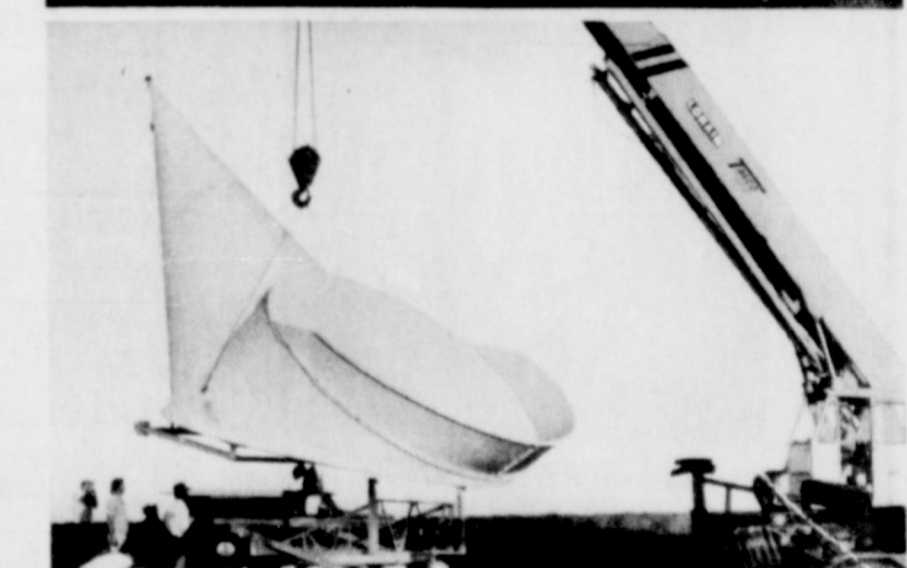
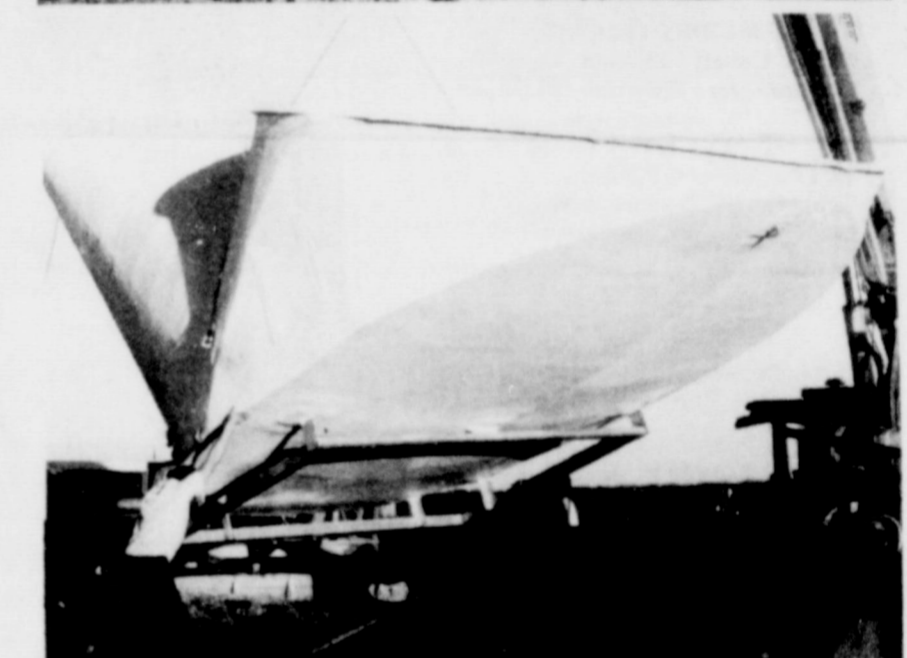
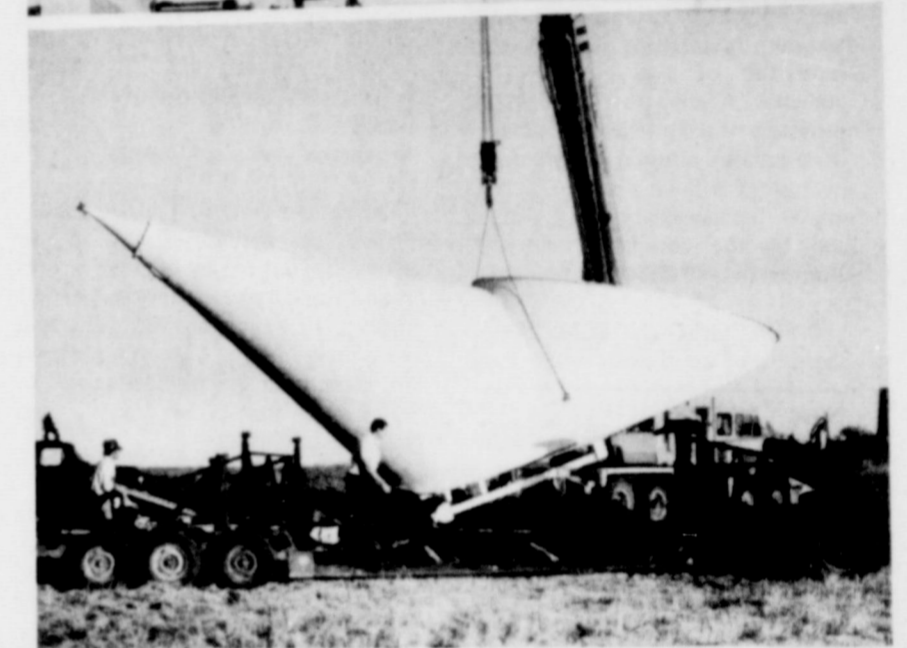
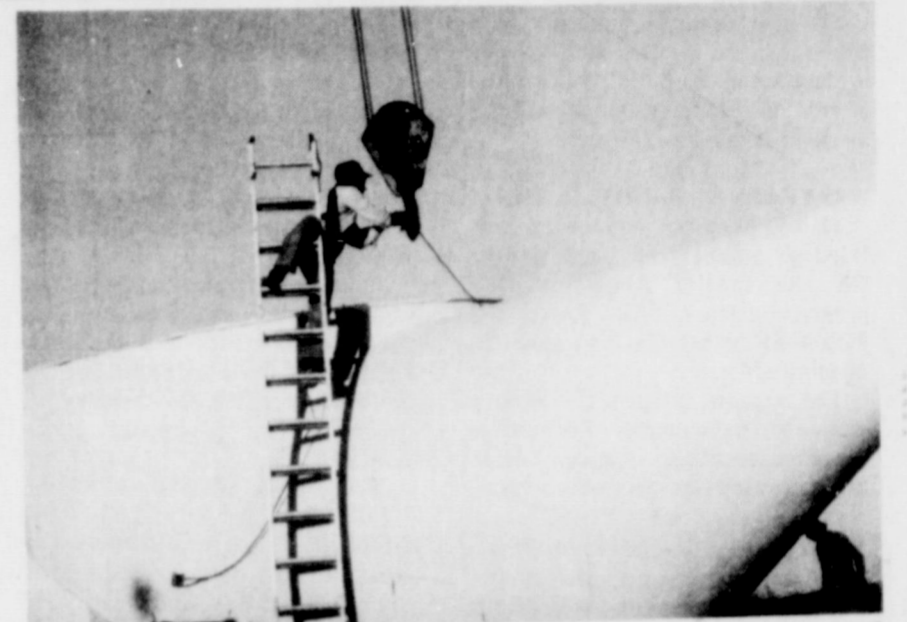
No School November 9

Chamber, Postmaster Urge Shop-Mail Early

Officials of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and the U.S. Postal Service this year are joining forces to encourage shoppers to shop early and mail packages early during the holiday season.

Postmaster Richard Wilson and Jerry Poarch, Chamber of Commerce President, declared the official opening of the Christmas shopping season for Friona.

"By shopping early and mailing early, the public can be better assured their cards and parcels will reach their destinations in plenty of time for Christmas," said Poarch.

"With the Christmas shopping season now officially open, we wish to further emphasize that many suggested overseas mailing dates, including the U.S. Armed Forces, fall due before the end of this month," Postmaster Wilson said. "These dates, as in past years, vary according to different parts of the world. Specific information can be obtained by calling the Friona Post Office. The important thing to remember is to do your shopping early and mail your cards and parcels early," he added.

"In addition to planning early shopping," Postmaster Wilson suggested, "you should take the necessary time to properly prepare your cards and gifts for mailing. Use ZIP-Codes. Legibly write your own ZIP-Coded address and the full ZIP-Coded address of the recipient."

"This helps in processing your mail more rapidly and assists in making delivery in case portions of the address become illegible," he said. The Post office also recommends proper wrapping of gifts to be mailed, including use of strong packaging materials.

"Remember," Postmaster Wilson said, "the key to the successful mailing of cards and parcels is to allow adequate time. Shop early, allow enough time to properly prepare cards and parcels for mailing, and mail early."

"By cooperating with the Post Office in this matter, you will help us help you have a better Christmas," Wilson concluded.

Chiefs Can't Win For Losing; Morton Steals Last-Ditch Win

Halloween came five nights early for the Friona Chieftains this season. The Chieftains' victory carriage turned into a pumpkin as the clock struck "midnight." Morton scored with 45 seconds left to snatch the win away from the snake-bit Chiefs, who suffered their third straight loss in the final minutes, 20-16.

Friona completely dominated the game from a statistical standpoint, with 292 total yards. But penalty flags

broke the team's back. Whereas the Chieftains escaped without a single penalty at Muleshoe in the district opener, the team drew 12 penalties for 160 yards at Morton.

The team drew two penalties for 30 yards on a single play late in the first half, when Morton was driving for the lead touchdown.

It was a bad turn of events that set up Morton's first score. Friona fumbled on their first offensive play

and Morton recovered.

The Indians threw a pass toward the end zone. Defender Bret Moore tipped the ball, but it was still caught for a touchdown, and a 7-0 Morton lead.

Friona came storming back, driving the length of the field, paced by the running of Rod Owen and Mike Hubbard. Owen scored from a yard out, but Montoya's kick was wide for a 7-6 score.

Friona got the ball back, and put on another good drive, but their drive bogged, and freshman Mark Montoya was called on to kick a 36-yard field goal to give Friona a 9-7 lead.

Later in the second quarter, fullback Chuck Nichols ran 60 yards for an apparent Friona touchdown which would have given Friona at least a 15-7 lead, but the run was nullified for a holding penalty and Friona had to give up the ball.

Late in the half, Morton took to the air in an effort to score. On one long pass, Friona was called for pass interference. Later, Michael Gowens intercepted a pass in the end zone, but was called for pass interference.

Morton was given the ball on the one yard line, scoring on the next play for a 14-9 halftime lead.

The third quarter belonged to Friona. The Chieftains took the opening kickoff and drove in for the go-ahead score. Chuck Nichols ran over for the touchdown, and Montoya's kick made it 16-14.

Morgan led the rushers with 112 yards. Others gaining yardage were Johnny Gomez, Reese Fleming, Eloy Caballero and Matt Loftis.

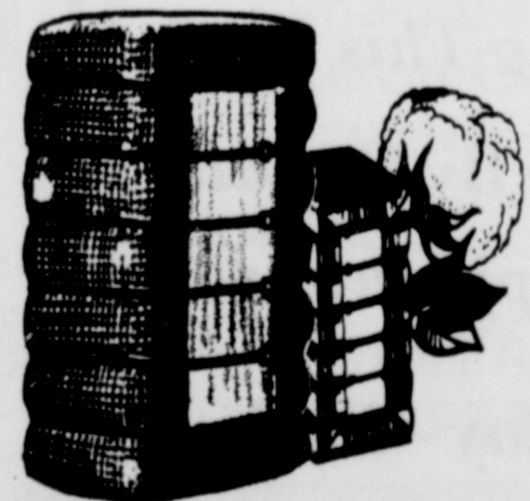
Cecil Maddox, principal, said "The boys played their best football of the year during the second half of this game." Friona was playing Littlefield on November 1 here.

Dr. David Reeve Named Diplomate

Dr. David Lee Reeve, Jacksonville, Florida has been named a diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice (ABFP) as a result of passing a certification examination offered by the ABFP. He is now certified in the medical specialty of family practice.

The intensive 2-day written examination is designed to prove the candidate's ability in the areas of internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics, gynecology, pediatrics, psychiatry and community medicine.

To qualify for the examination a physician must have successfully completed three years of residency training in family practice. There are some 375 such training programs in teaching hospitals and university medical centers across the United States.

ABFP diplomates also must continue to show proof of competence in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by being recertified every six years. No other medical specialty requires diplomates to prove competence on a continuing basis.

The latest group of diplomates brings the total number to more than 22,000. Most are members of the Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family

doctors. The Academy was the first national M.D. group to require members to take continuing medical study, and was chiefly responsible for securing specialty status for family practice. This year is the tenth anniversary of the specialty.

Reeve is a 1968 graduate of Friona High School and is now serving in the U.S. Navy stationed at Jacksonville Naval Air Base. He is the son of Mrs. Fay Reeve.
