United Fund Drive Kicks Off Monday

Sarpalius served as student body president at Clarendon College, receiving his degree in 1970. He received his degree from Texas Tech University in 1972.



Area Receives Snow, Moisture

An early-season snowstorm on Tuesday of this week followed on the heels of a late-season thunderstorm the previous night. The overlapping seasonal activity resulted in a total of 1.08 in moisture officially measured by the City of Friona--the first beneficial moisture for the local area in almost two months.

The front moved across the area late Monday, and was accompanied by an impressive electrical display. The Friona area was buffeted by pea and marble-sized hail for about ten minutes. The rainfall received Monday night amounted to .83 inch in the city.

The snowfall began in the early morning hours on Tuesday and continued throughout the day and into the night. Another .25 inch of moisture was measured from the snow, although the high wind accompanying the storm blew to an extent that this was probably a light measurement.

One report said that the Hub area received 1.50 inch of rainfall, plus the 12 hours of snow.

The moisture was welcomed by farmers, who were beginning to need the help. Even the cotton farmers, who saw the harvest of their crop delayed for a few days, thought the moisture was well worth it. In addition, the freeze of this week should complete the defoliation of the cotton and get it ready for

Mann was one of two contestants to correctly pick 19 of the 22 contest games, and then claimed the first prize on the basis of the Friona-Morton tie-breaker score.

The Buccaneers scored a fourth-period touchdown for a 12-10 win in that game.

Mann picked the tie-breaker score at 22-16 favoring Friona, missing the actual score by 10 points.

Second place went to C.H. Veazey, the other contestant picking 19 games right. Veazey's only misses were in the pro games, as he mis-fired on Dallas-Pittsburgh, Philadelphia-Cincinnati and New England-Baltimore. For his tie-breaker guess, he picked Friona, 21-13, and was 12

points away from the actual score. A flat-out tie developed for the weekly third prize, where Donnie

McDonald of Lazbuddie and Charlie Morgan each scored 18 correct and were 12 points away from the tiebreaker score.

McDonald picked the score at 14-10 favoring Morton, missing by 12, and Morgan picked Friona, 24-16, missing by the same score. Other contestants correctly picking

18 games were Mark Neill of Canyon, Dianne Morgan, Wright Williams, Steve Williams, Kay Nuttall and Jackie Morgan. The Morgan family came very close

to duplicating their feat achieved during the 1978 contest, when they swept all three of the top places during one week.



of Friona, and 54 grandchildren. Grandsons were pallbearers.



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
