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THE CURRENT WATER problem

in Friona could be a blessing in disguise to the residents, if it teaches us to be a little more conservative with our water. We all know that the time may come when we will have a serious

water shortage in this area, unless an import program is achieved. So, it may be a good idea that we become accustomed to cutting down slightly on our water usage.

Most of us have become accustomed to using water as if the "well never will run dry," but with our declining water table, we need to adjust our customs.

Residents need, for example, to figure out other ways of conserving water in addition to curtailing watering of lawns and gardens on the odd or even day schedule. It might be pointed out that just because it is your day to water on such and such a day, we need not rush out and turn on the sprinklers. Letting the lawn or garden go a little longer than we are accustomed to would be another way of cutting back our water consumption.

We are reminded of suggestions we picked up in 1977 while visiting California, which was in the throes of a big water shortage.

We had a reminder that men could save up to 19 gallons of water per day when shaving if they filled their basin, rather than allowing the faucet to run. A similar saving, estimated at nine gallons of water, could be effected by not allowing the tap to run while brushing your teeth.

A saving of around 21 gallons of water could be realized by changing your shower routine, it was pointed out. Instead of letting the water run during your entire shower, the leaflet we saw suggested "wetting down, soaping up and rinsing off," which would use only about four gallons of water. Similar savings were recommended for tub baths, by not filling the tub completely. Putting bricks in the water closet portion of your commode is a practice we had already adopted prior to this week's "crunch."

There are bound to be other ways of saving water. Those with automatic dishwashers could adopt a policy of not starting their machines unless they were completely full of dishes. This will make your water go farther.

A similar practice could be used when washing clothes.

For lawn watering, a practice of watering somewhat more often than usual, but for shorter times might be a good idea. Instead of giving the lawn a good soaking once a week, in which case you are apt to have water running down the street, perhaps running your sprinkler for just an hour on two or three days a week would do just as much good.

We commend the people of Friona for the spirit which they have accepted the current shortage. We have heard virtually no griping or complaining, and most folks we have heard comment have been suggesting ways in which they could cut down on their use of water.

NEXT FRIDAY WILL be Independence Day, and once again a great program of activities have been coordinated by the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

We commend the chamber for the good program (see story and advertisement elsewhere in this issue).

Since gasoline is another commodity we need to conserve (at least we can save a bundle of money by not using it), why not stay at home all day and take part in the local activities? There appears to be something for virtually everyone, young and old.

In an effort to display her business proficiency in running the home, the little woman submitted to hubby a detailed account of expenses for the month. Asked to explain an entry marked, ESP-\$26.98, she replied, "ESP means, 'error some place'."

Ration Plan Begun For Water Problem

The City of Friona called on its residents to limit their water usage, after production virtually stopped on two of the city's seven wells earlier

Residents were asked to observe a system of lawn and garden irrigation where those from Grand Street to the west would water on the evennumbered calendar dates, and those to the east will water on the oddnumbered calendar dates.

The water problem has been compounded by a full week of 100plus temperatures and a near-record volume of usage which saw an average of 2,000,000 gallons of water per day being used by city residents.

The Friona City Council met in a special session on Tuesday to discuss the problem, and decided unanimously to dig a new city water well. The board met again on Wednesday after seeking bids, and awarded the drilling job to Big T Pump Company on a low bid of

Big T said they could move onto the site on Monday, June 30, and that it would require five to six weeks to drill, test, set and pipe in the new well, which will be located at First and Ashland Streets, near the

The two wells whose production virtually stopped this past weekend are wells number three and eight. Number three is located at the old city water tower site at Sixth and Pierce Streets and is one of the city's oldest wells, having been drilled in 1953. Well number eight was drilled at Ninth and Grand in 1970.

The last city water well, City well number 9, was completed on April 25. 1973. It is located at Fourth and

City Manager Jake Outland said that a submersible pump would be added to well number eight, in an attempt to reclaim the well, but that no efforts would be made on well number three.

"We have had four city wells in the general area where number three is located, which was not good judgment to begin with," said

Due to the two wells being out of service, the city's other five wells have been pumping non-stop to try to keep pace with the city's water needs.

"The public's participation and cooperation in observing these conservation measures will be appreciated," Outland said

Outland explained that the city has 800,000 gallons of above-ground storage, including the 500,000-gallon ground-level tank at Sixth and Grand. Thus, during the peak usage periods, the city's wells are hard pressed to keep up with the demand

Last Sunday afternoon, between the hours of 2 and 7 p.m., the water level in the tower on Fifteenth Street dropped from its maximum level of 26 feet to zero, which was the first indication to city officials that there was a problem within the system.

Outland indicated on Thursday that the public's reaction to the need for conservation could already be noticed on the city's water system.

It was expected that the rationing plan would be necessary for three to five weeks in order to allow the system to adjust to the loss of the two

Area Melts Under 105 - Degree Heat

The Friona area, indeed the entire Panhandle and state, have been reeling this week under the first major "heat wave" of the 1980 summer season, with temperatures above the 100-degree mark on several consecutive days.

Friona's high for the week had been 105 degrees on Tuesday. The city had three consecutive days above the 100-degree mark, starting with 103 degrees on Monday. The mercury hit 102 degrees on Wednesday, but on Thursday topped out at 99 degrees.

Even with these soaring temperatures, the immediate area might feel somewhat cool in comparison with others. For instance, at Dallas on Thursday, the temperature reached 113 degrees, and with the added humidity of that area, being out of doors could have been punishing.

On the eastern side of the Panhandle, Childress had been up to 110 degrees this week, while readings in Altus and Hobart, Oklahoma went up to 111. Lubbock also pushed close to the 110 reading, although the Hub City's official high for the week was

Very little relief was being promised by weather forecasters, although the readings for this weekend were supposed to be somewhat lower than the century

Wheat farmers have taken advantage of the dry, hot weather to push ahead with the harvest of their crop, and had made a good dent in the crop by the end of the week. However, row crop farmers were wishing for some rain relief as the hot

Friona might well mark the passing of an era this week with the removal of the old windmill tower on the W.E. McGlothlin lot in southwest Friona. The tower had stood for over half a century. The well was the first to furnish water for the city of Friona, being dug by "Uncle Andy" Wentworth. It has been a famous and well-known local landmark.

County CDs Re-Invested

Re-investing of \$80,000 in county right of way funds and awarding of a contract for a new tractor and shredder for Precinct 3 highlighted the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners on Monday,

County Treasurer Benna Felts discussed the standing of several Certificates of Deposit belonging to the county.

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The court passed a motion to reinvest an \$80,000 certificate from the county's right of way fund for a period of four months. Another \$10,000 was invested in a CD, from money which had been set aside for Social Security payments. The certificate will mature on September

Bids were opened from Peek Industrial Tractor Parts Co. of Amarillo and Massey-Ferguson Inc. of Clovis. The bid was awarded to Peek Industrial Tractor Parts, on a low bid of \$24,540.

Conservation work was approved for the following projects and amounts: Ralph Roming, \$100; Jack D. Turner, \$25; Cash Richards, \$25; Owen Seamands, \$100 and L.D. Knight, \$200.

Also, Jim Curtis, \$25; Mack Haseloff, \$25; Bill Martin, \$25; Bruce Billingsley, \$25; Joe White, \$50; Don Geries, \$25; Gene Hardage, \$25; James Haseloff, \$37.50; Adolph Haseloff, \$12.50; Richard Haseloff, \$25 and Dee Pearson, \$37.50.

The Happy Homemaker

For a happy homemaker, happiness is a well stocked freezer. What nicer addition to our food supply could we have than an assortment of containers of home made ice cream.

Of course, this is good any time of year, but especially during the summer months when our outside temperature registers ninety-five plus.

If you plan to freeze several freezers of ice cream in succession, you can make better use of your ice and salt. It is a good idea to choose early morning for this job so that you can finish before it gets too hot.

After the ice cream is frozen to the proper consistency, you will need plastic containers for storage in the deep freeze.

From the following six recipes, any homemaker should be able to come up with the kind of ice cream she prefers.

Vanilla Ice Cream

- 1 quart milk
- 21/2 cups sugar
- 1 tall can evaporated milk 4 heaping tablespoons flour
- 4 eggs

2 tablespoons vanilla

Scald milk in heavy sauce pan. Cream sugar, flour and eggs until light and fluffy. Gradually add 3 cups hot milk; mix thoroughly; then pour egg mixture into sauce pan with remaining milk. Heat until thick and creamy.

Just before removing from heat, add canned milk. Return to large bowl of electric mixer; beat to remove

any lumps that may have appeared during cooking; cool; add vanilla and pour into 1 gallon freezer. Fill to within two inches of top with whole

Quick Ice Cream

5 eggs, well beaten 1 cup sugar 2 cups white Karo pinch of salt 1 pint whipping cream

1 tablespoon vanilla Add sugar and Karo to well beaten eggs. Mix well. Add salt, cream and vanilla. Pour into gallon container and add whole milk until 2" from top of can. Freeze as usual.

Strawberry Ice Cream

- 4 eggs
- 1/4 teaspoon salt 11/2 cups sugar
- 1 cup white Karo
- 7 ounces marshmallow cream 1 package strawberry Jello

Separate eggs and beat whites and yolks separately. Beat yolks until light and fluffy. Beat whites until they stand in peaks (do not underbeat). Add 3/4 cup sugar and beat well. Then add remaining 3/4 cup sugar and beat again. Thoroughly combine beaten yolks with beaten

Add Karo, salt and marshmallow cream and mix thoroughly. Pour into one gallon freezer can and add enough whole milk to fill to within 2"

whites and sugar. Add Jello. Mix

Freeze. Let set one hour before serving or dip into containers and place in deep freeze.

Banana Nut Ice Cream

7 eggs

- 1/4 teaspoon salt 11/2 cups sugar
- 1 tablespoon vanilla
- 1 cup white Karo
- 1 cup pecans 1 pint whipping cream
- 2 ripe bananas, mashed fine

Beat yolks and whites separately. Beat yolks until light in color. Beat whites until they hold standing peaks (this is important). Add half of sugar

and beat well.

Then add rest of sugar and beat again. Combine beaten egg mixtures and blend together. Add Karo, cream, salt and vanilla. Pour into freezer. Add bananas and nuts. Add enough milk to fill freezer. Freeze and let set one hour. Makes one gallon.

Cherry-Walnut Ice Cream

2 cups sugar 1 can Eagle Brand milk 1 pint coffee cream 1/4 teaspoon red food coloring 6 tablespoons cherry juice 1 No. 2 can Bing cherries

11/2 cups black walnuts 1 tablespoon vanilla

Beat eggs until lemon colored. Add sugar; beat until blended. Add milk to fill gallon freezer can. Freeze

Basic Ice Cream

This recipe may be used for any kind of fresh fruit, vanilla or other flavors. 2 cups powdered milk

21/4 cups water 1 large can milk 3 tablespoons Karo 2 pints coffee cream

Mix above ingredients in freezer can. Add peaches, strawberries, bananas, apricots, vanilla or other

Pour into freezer can and add enough whole milk to fill can to within 2" of top. Freeze.



Memorial Is Named For F. Rierson

Officials at Clovis High Plains Hospital today announced that the hemodialysis unit at the hospital has been named as a memorial for the late Frank Rierson.

"Frank Rierson was the motivating force behind establishing a hemodialysis unit in Clovis," according to Bob Brooks, Associate Administrator at Clovis High Plains Hospital. "We felt it would be a fitting tribute to designate the unit as the Frank Rierson Hemodialysis Unit in his memory."

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Rierson, a long-time Clovis resident and auto dealer, was diagnosed as having end-stage renal disease in 1971. He initially underwent dialysis treatments in Albuquerque but subsequently worked with his Albuquerque nephrologist and officials of Memorial Hospital to make the dialysis treatments available in Clovis.

Together with the other auto dealers in Clovis, Rierson raised funds to send nursing personnel from Memorial to Albuquerque for the special training required and for purchase of the first dialysis equipment.

From that initial machine, the unit grew to a six-station facility that has provided life-saving treatments for as many as 15 patients. Currently, 12 patients are scheduled for treatments three days each week. Albuquerque nephrologists provide the specialized consulting needed by local physicians.

"Frank Rierson's enthusiasm for the Clovis dialysis unit was shared by everyone associated with the project," Brooks said. "Having the treatment available locally drastically reduces the disruption to the patient's lifestyle by eliminating long trips to distant dialysis facilities. This is especially important when you remember how frequently patients

must undergo dialysis treatments."

Frank Rierson died in a Lubbock medical facility on June 14 of an illness unrelated to his kidney disease.

The Clovis High Plains Hospital will place a memorial plaque with the hemodialysis unit's new designation in the near future.

County's Cotton Figures Released

Cotton production from the 25 High Plains counties represented by Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. in 1979 came to 2,750,600 bales of 480 pounds net weight, according to figures just released by the Texas Crop & Livestock Reporting Service (TCLRS), Austin.

The total was the third highest on record, trailing the 1977 crop of 3,215,400 bales and the 2,888,700 bales produced in 1973.

Planted acreage according to TCLRS was a record 4,565,800, over a half million acres above the 4,043,000 seeded in 1978, which was the previous high. But adverse weather, including one of the most severe hailstorms ever seen in August, cut 1979 harvested acres by 17 per cent to 3,789,250. Yield per harvested acre for the 25 counties averaged 348.4 pounds, up from the 274.4 pounds harvested in 1978 but far below the area high of 513.2 pounds

set in 1965. The 10-year High Plains average yield per harvested acre, 1970 through 1979, now comes to 356.3 pounds.

Dawson County, with 243,800 bales, led the area in total 1979 production. In second, third and fourth places were Lubbock (240,600), Gaines (228,700)

Per-acre yield leaders on the Plains in 1979 were Martin (552 pounds), Howard (525), Midland (510) and Garza (505).

The U.S. Treasury Department is asking Congress to pass a law requiring that 15% of the interest you can earn on your savings account be withheld and sent to the Government before you ever see it.

If the savers of this nation let Congress knowwithout delay-that they oppose this proposal, then Congress will kill it. Otherwise, it is expected to become law this year.

We urge you to write to your Congressman and Senators without delay and object to this illadvised proposal.

This proposal would saddle you (and also people who receive other forms of interest and dividend income, including earnings from stocks and bonds) with new tax forms, procedures and requirements. In millions of instances the tax sums involved would be inconsequential.

It would work a special hardship on the millions of people on fixed incomes who depend on interest from their savings accounts to help meet living expenses.

It would reduce the total return on your savings because when interest is withheld and sent to the government, you would lose part of the compounding effect that helps your savings account return a higher yield.

Though the Treasury Department says it will develop an exemption plan for some taxpayers, you would be required (if eligible) to file an exemption form with each bank and savings and loan association and with every other source of your interest and dividend income and keep that paperwork current.

Dear Senator or Congressman:

interest you earn. None of us condones evading our fair share of taxes. But withholding on savings interest is unnecessary because the Treasury's Form 1099 system—the Information Return sent to you at the end of each year with a copy to the IRS already gives the government the means checking on those who don't pay their taxes.

The Treasury claims this withholding is needed

to cut tax evasion through failure to declare interest

and dividends. We know that you pay taxes on the

Rather than impose a tax withholding plan on savings, and reduce the interest your deposits will earn, our nation needs further incentives to build savings—to provide the capital and jobs for a sound non-inflationary economic future. A recent law will let you exclude \$200 from interest and dividend income (for single people) or \$400 (for married couples) starting next year. That Congressional action is a sound first step toward encouraging savings.

We urge that you write your members of Congress-your representative in the U.S. House and your two U.S. Senators-now. Ask them not to complicate further our already over-complicated tax system. Ask them to vote against the withholding proposal.




