## Area Slammed By Gale-Force Wind

**THERE'S AN OLD SAYING** something to the effect that if March comes in like a lamb, it will go out like a lion. Some of us were recalling that March of 1980 came in like a lion, and went out more like a hurricane.

We're not sure what that indicates; probably only that the wind was blowing in the local area on March 1, and that on March 31, it was blowing a "gale."

Staubach was the type of all-American hero that this country's sports fans could really like. Clean-cut, "Mr. Nice Guy," you never heard Staubach running someone down.

In this day of astronomical salaries for sports celebrities, Staubach was not one of those salary holdouts. Although, for our money he was the best in the business with the two-minute drill, Roger was one of the lower paid quarterbacks in the NFL. Of course, he had some fringe benefits that some of the other QBs don't have. That included five trips to the Super Bowl, with the NFL's top organization, the Cowboys.

In this day of the Reggie Jacksons and the Muhammed Alis of the sports world, it was refreshing to have a Roger Staubach come along. Our young people needed this type of pattern.

**THIS PAST SUNDAY** we spent most of the afternoon working on our annual income tax return. "Black Sunday" is the title we usually give this day.

### School, City

### Vote Saturday

The annual City and School election will be held Saturday, April 5. Voting will take place at the Friona Fire Department, 102 East Eighth Street, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Names on the city ballot will be B.K. Buske for mayor, and Clarence Monroe and Mike Chaney for alderman. All three are running unopposed.

On the school board ballot, incumbents Jerry Hinkle and Jerry London are running, also unopposed.

The Friona area has experienced a variety of weather during the past week, running from best to worst, changing virtually every day.

On Saturday, March 29, the area received about an inch of snow, sufficient to cancel the track meet which had been scheduled locally.

After a near-perfect day on Sunday, the area was raked by one of the worst wind and sandstorms on Monday it had seen in a number of years.

Winds had blown out of the southwest, at a moderate speed, for much of the day, until about 4 p.m., boosted by a fast-moving Pacific front, the wind changed to the west, and gusted up to 70 miles per hour at times.

A spokesman for Benger Air Park said that their instruments indicated that the wind blew at a steady pace above 60 miles per hour after the passage of the front, with gusts higher. The high wind continued well past midnight, not subsiding as they usually do at nighttime.

Some damage was sustained by the extremely high wind, and motorists on the highways had difficulty driving, due to the limited visibility brought about by the dust. Although Friona usually is spared this type of dust storm during most of our "spring blow" period, no corner of the Panhandle escaped this week's storm.

Tuesday then turned off as pretty a spring day as you could ask for, and in the early hours Wednesday morning, residents were awakened by a thunderstorm which left a small shower, preceded by pea-sized hail.

A considerable amount of damage was sustained by the unusual high-velocity wind, mainly to shingles on house roofs, and yard fences.

about was sustained by the new home being built on West 11th Street by the B.K. Buskes. The framework for the garage, which is on the west side of the new house, was completely blown down. The rest of the framed structure escaped damage, however.

Among the fences blown down was a brick fence at the Johnny Mars home north of Highway 60 east of town. The fence has stood for a number of years.

Trees also bore the brunt of the storm. The Bill Beenes reported that a young maple tree was toppled in their yard.

At Bovina, a storage building was destroyed at Sherrill Lumber Yard, and a 20-foot evergreen tree was uprooted at the Mike Ware residence.

### Pet Clinics Are Slated

The City of Friona will sponsor its annual pet inoculation clinic on Friday, April 11 and April 18, according to City Manager A.L. Outland.

According to City Ordinance 81, all pets within the city limits should be registered and vaccinated each year. Dr. Gary D. Cash, veterinarian, will be at the Friona Fire Station between the hours of 3 and 5 p.m. both Fridays to administer the shots.

The charge will be \$4.00 for the vaccination and \$4.00 for the tags, or a charge of \$8.00 per animal.

## FHS Captures 3-AA Sweepstakes Award

Friona High School captured the District 3-AA literary contest last Friday at Olton, capping off a successful week of speech, journalism, math and related contests with the district's "Sweepstakes" trophy.

FHS scored a total of 218 points, to outscore rival Muleshoe by 40 points. Friona showed good depth and balance in the various events, taking two of the three medals awarded in several events.

The FHS delegation qualified 14 individuals for the regional meet, and 16 event places.

The local group went into Friday's competition tied with Muleshoe with a total of 43 points, as each school's contest play had been judged a winner. In addition, Friona had the best actor (Mark Blankenship), and Muleshoe the best actress, for the additional three points.

Friona had a good showing in the journalism contests, which had been completed on Monday, March 24, and the results reported on Friday.

Kelli Caudill won the editorial writing event, with Kipi Fleming taking the second place medal. Miss Fleming is the defending regional champion in the event, and was a state medalist in 1979.

Christy Benge placed second, and Tim Mercer third in headline writing, for two regional spots, and Stanley Ellis was in fourth place, or regional alternate, for this event.

Ellis also placed third in the newswriting event, for a medal and regional spot. Shae Dodson placed second in ready writing, to likewise qualify for further competition.

On Friday, the FHS group added four more first places to their collection, and qualified several more individuals for the regional meet.

Stanley Ellis and Kim Taylor took first and second in the slide rule competition, to sweep that event for FHS and add 25 points to the district aggregate.

Sharla Duggins placed first in the shorthand competition, for another 15 points.

### City Told Of Grant For Sewer

Congressman Kent Hance's office notified the City of Friona on Thursday that the city had been awarded an initial grant of \$34,741 for groundwork toward the city's proposed wastewater treatment plant.

"This will give the engineering section the authority to proceed with the initial plans for the proposed improvements," said City Manager A.L. Outland.

The money was provided through the Environmental Protection Agency. The City of Friona hopes to receive around \$185,000 eventually in federal grants for sewer improvements.

Outland said that the Texas Department of Water Resources has a meeting on April 9, with recipients of the latest grants.

The City of Friona has been working for almost five years to secure a grant for the needed improvements. The money was forwarded to Congressman Hance's office from the EPA on Thursday, and he immediately notified the city.

Also placing third in oral reading was Cindy Drake, although this does not qualify for regional.

In speech events, although debaters Mark Blankenship and Mark Zachary suffered a rare defeat and settled for second place, the other FHS debate team of Sonya Gore and Maria Escalante placed third, giving Friona two debate teams qualifying for the regional meet.

Friona also virtually swept two other events, with Kipi Fleming winning the prose reading event and Sharla Duggins placing second.

In poetry interpretation, Christy Benge placed first, and Patti Hinton second.

The district sweepstakes win was the second in a row for FHS, which last year snapped a 19-year streak Muleshoe had going in winning their spring meet. The current year completes four years for Friona and Muleshoe in the same district after a long lapse, with each school winning the meet twice.

Regional competition will be held in the spring events on April 19 at Texas Tech.

### Track Meet Cancelled Here

The weatherman threw Friona's Invitational track meet a curve last Saturday, as residents awoke to find an inch of snow on the ground and temperatures at the freezing mark.

The meet was cancelled for both the boys and girls division. Due to missing their second meet in four weeks, the Chieftains, not previously scheduled for a meet this week, entered the Dumas meet, as Coach Robert Mears felt the team needed the competitive experience.

The Chiefs have several marks in the area's top ten, compiled by the Amarillo Daily News. The best of these is their mile relay mark.

### Softball Meet Slated April 18

A meeting to organize the summer slowpitch softball program in Friona will be held on Friday, April 18 at the Community Room of Friona State Bank.

Everyone interested in the softball program is urged to attend this organizational meeting.



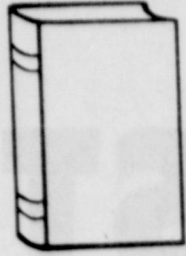

A short visit will show that our shelves hold a wealth of entertainment and learning for our younger citizens. If there be adults who question the necessity for training young minds let them study the present condition of our nation's economy and foreign policy; indications are that those who will inherit the earth will need all the education they can get.

The average patron sees only the lady at the desk. Behind her are dozens of people, the library board, Friends of the Library, and the City Fathers. Going farther afield one finds the Inter Library Association, the State Board and the Library of Congress with its millions of books and worldwide affiliations.

Inflation has become a household word and librarians, too, have felt the pinch. Rising costs have resulted in a cut of almost half of the state funds allowed for the purchase of books.

In spite of these hard facts our local library has continued to grow and improve its service to the area. A few figures will demonstrate the

degree of appreciation felt by the public.

Number of volumes--1979, 11,035; and 1980, 12,354.

In 1980 we gained 307 new readers.

Books bought or donated: 1979, 434; and 1980, 574.

During the summer of 1978 eighty-four children completed the reading program, the number jumped to 137 for 1979.

One of the most popular programs, Children's Story Hour increased from 195 to 319.

In relation to this last figure a vote of thanks to all the ladies who made it work.

For this coming summer there are new and entertaining books to excite young minds. The "I Can Read" series is wonderful. Very little kids will love the brightly colored picture books. These vary from stories to lessons in shapes and colors. All the covers and bindings are designed for hard usage; however, nothing is really ever child proof!

Some of the titles are amusing, "We Never Get To Do Anthing," "My Mean Old Mother Will Be Sorry" and "Animals Should Definitely Not Wear Clothing."

Treat yourself to the happiest sound on earth--a child's laughter.

Bring your children or grandchildren to visit the library; let them learn that the pill of wisdom can be sugar coated.

# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

### 50 YEARS AGO--APRIL 4, 1930

Occasionally indications of the progress and prosperity of the territory surrounding Friona at the present time appear in unexpected places, yet are the more welcome in that they help establish the fact that people are better contented throughout this region and are planning homes of greater convenience and comfort. During the past week, Blythe Bros., Delco-Light and Frigidaire distributors have installed nineteen Delco-Light plants in farm homes in the region they serve. Among these were R.P. Daniel and Hugh Lee of Friona.

The new building into which the Star office will be moved was announced as ready for occupancy on Friday of this week. The new office will occupy one of the rooms in the Henry Warren building on Sixth Street.

### 45 YEARS AGO--APRIL 5, 1935

In 1935, a one year subscription to the Friona Star cost \$1.50 for a year.

### 40 YEARS AGO--APRIL 5, 1940

F.A. Spring, who has succeeded Dan Ethridge in the insurance business here, moved his family here last Saturday, and is occupying the Kinsley house that was vacated by Mr. and Mrs. Ethridge, when they moved to Lubbock. Spring will be in charge of the agency office, the name of which has been changed to The F.A. Spring Agency.

### 35 YEARS AGO--APRIL 6, 1945

Owing to two wrecks that occurred on the Santa Fe Railroad on Thursday of last week, the mail service here was badly demoralized. One of the wrecks occurred west of Clovis, during the early part of the day, and the other occurred at Friona, just west of the stock pens, during the afternoon. No mail was received here Thursday and Friday.

### 30 YEARS AGO--APRIL 7, 1950

Allen's Jewelry will hold its formal opening Saturday in its modern new quarters in the Friona State Bank

building. Allen Stewart, owner, states that new fixtures in keeping with the new location have been installed, and the merchandise stock has been greatly expanded, giving Friona a really complete jewelry and watch repair center.

### 25 YEARS AGO--MARCH 31, 1955

Dillie M. Kelley was tendered contract for the position of Superintendent of Schools in Friona Monday evening. Kelley, in signing the two-year contract, will take over July 1 from Supt. Dalton Caffey who has submitted his resignation with two years still to run on his present three-year contract.

### 20 YEARS AGO--MARCH 31, 1960

A deed was the culprit that sent City Manager Albert Field to the phone Friday night to call a special city council meeting. Field discovered the city was about to trade off a piece of land that it didn't have title to for a site for a new sewer plant. The present sewer plant site was purchased from Santa Fe Grain Company for \$5.00. This was a bargain, but Santa Fe Grain Company reserved the right in the deed to take back the land, if for a period of a year, City of Friona didn't use the land in question for a sewer plant. So--the city informed the Santa Fe Railroad, with whom they have been dickering for a land purchase east of town and offered them \$100 per acre for the site which the city's engineer has determined best suited for the new sewage plant.

### 15 YEARS AGO--APRIL 1, 1965

The Friona School Board this week let a contract to Vibra-Whirl and Company of Panhandle on a bid of \$52,975 for the construction of a new football stadium at Friona High School. The bid figure will include the building of a permanent stadium on the west side of the proposed field, which will contain 1533 seats exclusive of aisle space. The facility will contain a press box, two ticket offices, a dirt track around the field and new lighting will be installed.

### 10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 2, 1970

Residents of Friona will be called upon for the second time to vote for or against a one-cent city sales tax this Saturday, as a highlight of the annual city and school elections. City Manager Jake Outland points out that in reality, the vote will give residents an opportunity to choose between a sales tax as a means of additional revenue, or the alternative of a raise in property tax. The rapidly developing city is requiring more and more in the way of funds, according to Outland.

### 5 YEARS AGO--MARCH 30, 1975

A Friona woman, Mrs. Jo Johnson of 1201 Jackson, was robbed at gunpoint early Wednesday morning, of an estimated \$3500 in jewelry. A young white man gained entrance at Mrs. Johnson's residence, posing as a utility man wanting to check for "leaks." After he gained entrance, he pulled a gun and asked Johnson if she had any money. After she told him she didn't, he said "Then give me your suitcase full of jewelry." Mrs. Johnson is a partner in an antique shop in Texico, N.M., and had a briefcase full of turquoise jewelry in the trunk of her car. The intruder held the gun at Mrs. Johnson's head as she went into the garage and took the brief case from the trunk of the car. Before leaving, he tied Mrs. Johnson to a kitchen chair, taping her hands behind her.

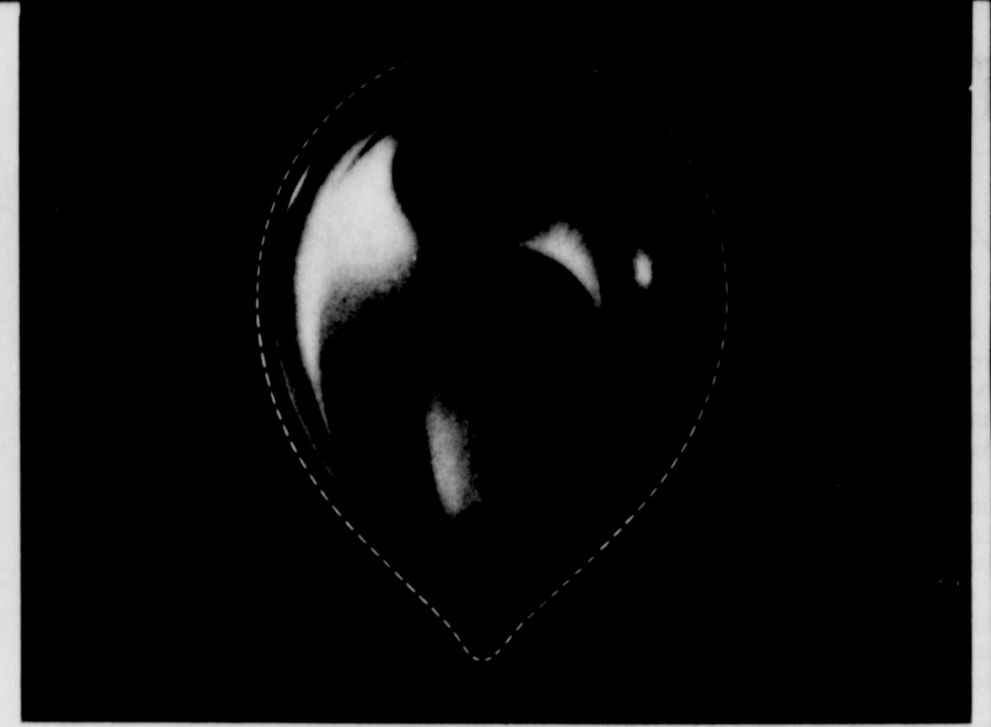
## Girl Added To Johnson Family

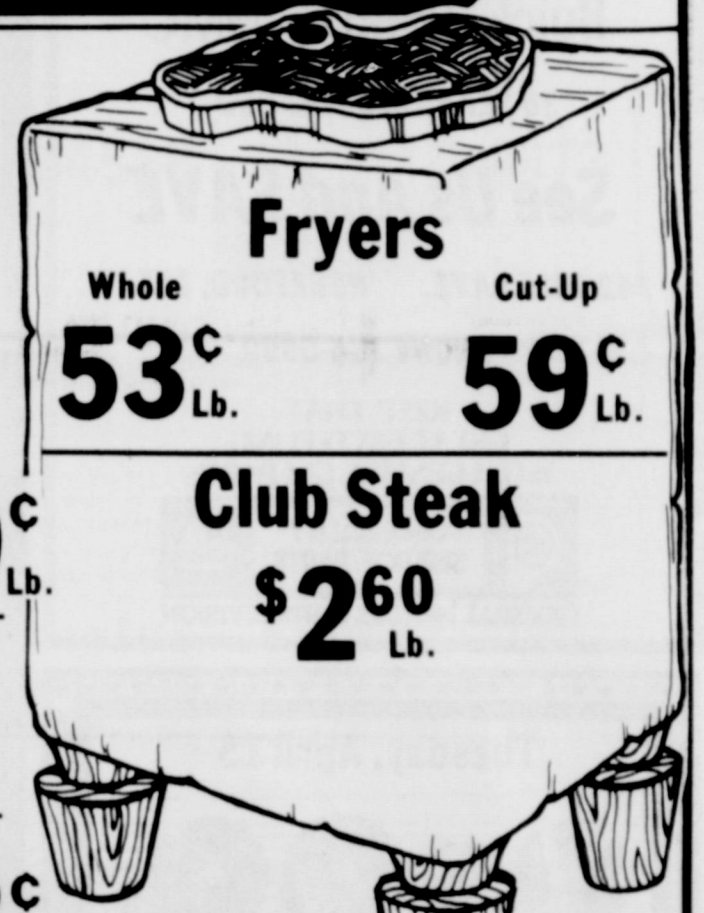

## Vandals Cost REC \$70,000 In Repairs

Thursday, March 14, a substation transformer was the most recent victim of vandalism. The transformer, located on Farm-to-Market

Road 1731, ten miles west of Friona was shot with a high powered rifle causing the oil to leak out and a short caused the transformer to burn up. The transformer is valued at \$70,000.00 and serves approximately 584 homes, farms and businesses in the Rhea and other communities in Parmer County.

Vandalism of electric utility property is dangerous and according to Texas law, is punishable with up to a \$10,000 fine and imprisonment for ten years.

James Hull, Manager of Deaf Smith Electric stated, "individuals do not realize that these costs are paid for out of revenue that otherwise would be returned to our consumers as Capital Credits. In essence, these vandals are taking from all members of the REC."

A few months ago, gunmen shot three insulators south of Friona and the expense of labor, materials and outage time was in excess of \$500.00 to replace them. Not only should the cost be a consideration, but also the inconvenience of homes, businesses and farms being out of service. Sometimes if service is not immediately discontinued, the damage is not noticed until it rains, then the lights go out. This is often the case when you hear it said that "everytime we have a rain, the lights go out."

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative would like to encourage you to report to the Cooperative office any peculiarities near substations or Cooperative electric lines involving vandalism of any kind. Remember this damage is paid for by you, via reduced Capital Credits.

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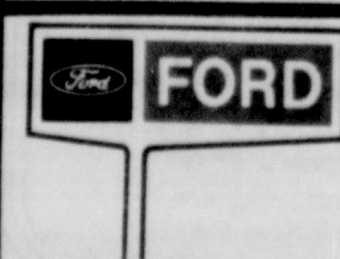

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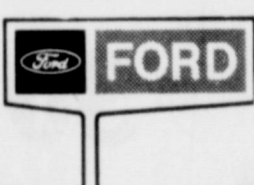

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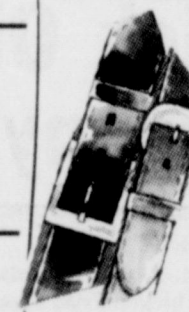

## Notice To Homeowners And Farmers

Deadline for filing homestead, over 65 or disabled and open space land exemptions. These exemptions must be filed with the school tax office by April 30, 1980.

### WHO SHOULD FILE:

**General Homestead**-If you qualify for a residence homestead, you will be entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. The amount of an exemption which you receive cannot exceed the market value of your homestead.

The school homestead exemption is available to the general public as long as valid applications are filed with the school district before the end of the rendition period, April 30, 1980.

**ARE YOU OVER 65?** If you are 65 years of age or older, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of your residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only and you must apply for the exemption before the end of the rendition period, April 30.

You may not receive both a \$10,000 over-65 exemption off the market value of your homestead and \$10,000 disability exemption (discussed later). If you are qualified for both, you must choose one or the other.

**ARE YOU DISABLED?** If you are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to receive an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of your residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only.

"Disabled" for purposes of this exemption means either that, because of physical or mental disability, you are unable to engage in any substantial gainful work; or that you are 55 years of age or older and blind, and by reason of the blindness are unable to engage in your previous work.

If you are receiving disability benefits under the Federal Old Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance Program administered by the Social Security Administration, you will qualify as long as you apply on time.

If you are receiving disability benefits under any other program, you will not automatically qualify. You must still meet the definition of disability stated above and apply before the end of the rendition period, April 30, 1980.

You may not receive both a \$10,000 over-65 exemption off the market value of your homestead and a \$10,000 disability exemption. You must choose one or the other.

Farm & Ranch Open Space Land Applications: In addition to the exemption described above, qualified farmers and ranchers may enjoy another form of tax relief.

Two amendments of the Texas Constitution permit agricultural and open-space land to be taxed generally at its productivity value instead of market value. These provisions are effective only if applications are filed with the tax office in a timely manner.

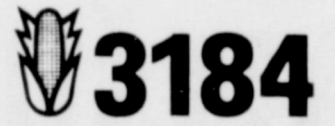
